WON BY AIR FOR FSU VERSUS EAGLES

The passing game has been the main weapon for the Seminoles against Boston College in the first three meetings between the two schools as conference opponents. Quarterback Drew Weatherford threw for 354 yards last season, 326 yards in 2006 and 231 the year before. More than half of Florida State's touchdowns the last three years (5-of-9) have come through the air versus BC.

DEFENSE HAS BEEN DISRUPTIVE

Florida State has recorded at least four tackles for a loss in each of the last three games against Boston College. The 2005 contest was one of the best defensive games Florida State has had in recent memory. The Seminoles recorded 10 quarterback hurries, seven tackles for a loss, two pass break ups, had two interceptions - including one that was returned for a touchdown in the first seven seconds of the game - and blocked a kick. In 2006 Florida State had a half dozen tackles for loss, including a seven-yard sack by defensive end Everette Brown. Last season the Seminoles picked off three BC passes, returned one for a touchdown, forced a fumble and broke up five passes.

UNIFORMS A TRIBUTE TO SEMINOLE TRIBE

Florida State will be wearing a special tribute uniform against Boston College. The primarily black uniform will feature pants that read Seminoles down one leg and Unconquered down the other. The word Unconquered is a tribute to the fact that the Seminole Tribe of Florida never signed a treaty with the U.S. and remains unconquered as a tribe to this day. The special Nike uniforms feature garnet numbers and gold piping and also include a special black, gold and garnet Nike cleat. This is the third time the special uniform has been worn and the second time against Boston College. The Seminoles also wore the black uniforms in 2006 versus Boston College (24-19, L) and again in 2007 against Duke (25-6, W). This is the second straight homecoming in which FSU has worn the special Unconquered uniforms.

CARR IS HOMECOMING KING

Greg Carr has been very productive during his two Homecoming games. In 2006 against Western Michigan he only hauled in a pair of passes but they both went for a touchdown. In his first Homecoming in 2005 he had four catches for 55 yards and a score. For his career,

Carr has six catches for 100 yards and three touchdowns in homecoming games. Carr did not play in last season's Homecoming game versus Duke.

HOMECOMING STATITUDES

- Florida State's first overtime **victory** came on Homecoming 2003. FSU beat NC State 50-44 in overtime in the second overtime when Leon Washington dashed in from 12 yards out. The first OT game in school history was played the season before in a loss at Louisville.
- The most points ever scored at a homecoming are 73 in a 73-14 victory over Tulane in 1987.
- This will be the second time the Seminoles have played Boston College on Homecoming. The first time was in 1980 when Florida State defeated the Eagles 41-7. Ricky Williams rushed for 109 yards and the Seminoles had a great defensive effort led by Reggie Herring. Herring had a team-high 13 tackles and an interception. Current Seminoles television analyst Keith Jones also had an interception. Florida State's defense had six sacks and Ron Hester blocked two kicks, including one that was returned for a touchdown. The game was played in front of 52,396 fans.
- As a member of the ACC, Florida State is 14-1 against conference opponents during Homecoming. Overall against ACC members, Florida State is 21-3 on Homecoming.
- The only time FSU lost a homecoming game versus an ACC opponent or under head coach Bobby Bowden was against NC State in 2001 (34-28).
- Head coach Bobby Bowden is 31-1 in his career at Florida State on Homecoming.
- Bobby Bowden's first Homecoming victory at Florida State was a 30-27 triumph over Southern Mississippi. The Seminoles scored 21 points in the fourth quarter for the comeback victory. The winning play was a 95-yard pass from Jimmy Black to Rudy Thomas, which is the third-longest passing touchdown in school history.
- Florida State's very first Homecoming victory was a 33-12 win over Tampa in 1948.
- The Seminoles have played 36 different teams on Homecoming. The most wins have come against Wake Forest, whom FSU holds a 5-1 mark against. Florida State also has multiple wins over Tampa, Stetson, Southern Miss, NC State, South Carolina, Western Carolina, Cincinnati, Maryland, Clemson and Duke.

STATITUDES - THE TEAMS

- Florida State is 4-2 all-time against Boston College. Bobby Bowden is 6-3 against Boston College (2-2 while at West Virginia) and 4-1 while at FSU. Overall FSU has outscored BC 30-19 per meeting.
- FSU is 2-1 against Boston College in ACC play, both wins coming on the road.
- FSU lost the first ever matchup between the schools 20-7 in 1956. The other two times the teams have played, FSU beat the Eagles 41-7 at home in 1980 and won 28-9 on the road against then #9 Boston College in 1976 (Bobby Bowden's first season and his first road win at FSU).
- Last year's 27-17 win at #2 Boston College was the first time FSU has beaten a team ranked in the top five since the 2005 season when FSU beat #5 Virginia Tech 27-22 in the ACC Championship.
- Last time FSU had beaten a team ranked in the top five during the regular season was a 30-7 win against #4 Florida in 2000.
- Last time FSU beat a team ranked in the top two was the 46-29 win against #2 Virginia Tech in the 1999 National title game.

BOWDEN'S 500th GAME AGAINST COLORADO

Florida State's Bobby Bowden reached a milestone against Colorado by coaching his 500th career collegiate football game. Bowden is only the third coach in college football history to coach in 500 or more games - joining the legendary Amos Alonzo Stagg (last coached at Pacific in 1946) and Penn State's Joe Paterno (currently active) who coached the 500th game of his Penn State career when he led his Nittany Lions into the Alamo Bowl in 2007. After Bowden and Paterno, the closest active coach is Frank Beamer who has coached 330 games so far in his career.

NOT JUST A BIRTHDAY

Head Coach Bobby Bowden didn't just celebrate a birthday versus Clemson, he also celebrated another milestone. When FSU faced off with Colorado in Jacksonville on September 27, it marked the 500th game coached in Bowden's career. Versus Clemson he hit a similar mark as he coached his 400th game at Florida State University. That puts Bowden in elite company once again as he becomes just the sixth coach in college football history to coach 400 games at one school. That means of the 695 games in FSU history, Bowden has coached over 57% of the all-time games in school history.

While last season's 7-6 record was below head coach Bobby Bowden's expectations, it did continue a remarkable streak in the legend's career. The 2007 season marked the 31st straight year the Seminoles have posted a winning record under Bowden. The only losing season in his FSU career came in his first year on the job when Florida State posted a 5-6 record. Since then the Seminoles have won more than they have lost every year. With a win versus Clemson, FSU will once again finish at .500 or better for the 32nd straight season. No other university in the FBS can claim to have a current season win streak as long as Florida State's 31 in a row.

THAT WAS NO. 300

The storied career of FSU head coach Bobby Bowden added another chapter versus Maryland in 2007. Bowden entered the game versus the Terps with 299 wins at Florida State. With the victory over Maryland he joined Joe Paterno as the only Division I-A coaches to ever win 300 games at one school. Bowden became just the sixth coach in NCAA history to join that list as well. Bowden has won at least seven games for 26-straight seasons and only twice in his 31 years at FSU has he failed to record at least seven victories.

ONE OF AMERICA'S BEST STAFFS

When it comes to assistant coaches, Florida State has assembled one of the best staffs in America. That opinion is shared by CBS Sportsline's Dennis Dodd. Dodd rated all of the assistant coaches in America this summer and compiled his list of the best at each position. Florida State finished in a first place tie with Southern Cal and Florida for the most assistant coaches to make the list. Four of the Seminoles' assistants were named among the best at their job in all of the NCAA. Rick Trickett (offensive line), Odell Haggins (defensive line), Jimbo Fisher (offensive coordinator) and Mickey Andrews (defensive coordinator) were all singled out for their excellent work by Dodd. Florida State was the only school to have both its offensive and defensive coordinator on Dodd's list.

ANNIVERSARY TIME

The 2008 season marks some milestone anniversaries for members of head coach Bobby Bowden's staff. The most celebrated will be defensive coordinator Mickey Andrews' 25th season at FSU but the Seminole coaching veteran is not the only staff member marking an anniversary in 2008. Executive head coach Chuck Amato is entering his 20th season at FSU. While he has only been back in Tallahassee for two years, the linebacker coach was with Florida State for 18 years prior to leaving to coach his alma mater NC State. Defensive tackles coach Odell Haggins will celebrate his 15th anniversary as an FSU coach and Andy Urbanic, the longtime head of football operations, is opening up his 20th season on the staff.

RECORD NIGHT FOR FISHER

Just one year into rebuilding the Florida State offense, coordinator Jimbo Fisher had his most successful night in Garnet & Gold versus Western Carolina as far as statistics go. The Seminole offense not only put up 561 yards of total offense but it also produced nine touchdowns. The most impressive part for Fisher had to be the balance. FSU rushed for 290 yards and passed for 271.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS - JIMBO FISHER

After just one season in Tallahassee, Jimbo Fisher's offense showed considerable progress. While there were not huge improvements in the NCAA rankings, there was huge growth when you look more closely at the way the FSU offense operated. Florida State did improve in rushing yards and total offense but those gains were not nearly as impressive as the strides made when it came to being a 'big play' offense, cutting down on mistakes at the QB position he coaches and an improvement in red zone production.

Rushing - FSU's ground game improved by 31 yards per game (an improvement of 9%)

Passing - QB Drew Weatherford went from 11 interceptions in 2006 to just three in 2007, a 73% reduction, as the junior led the FBS in interception avoidance

Passing - Weatherford set the FSU and ACC career and single season records for consecutive passes without an interception (270)

Big Plays - The number of plays over 40 yards

more than doubled in 2007 from six to 13

Big Plays - Under Fisher FSU had 10 passing plays of 40 yards or more versus four in 2006

Big Plays - Fisher's offense doubled the number of touchdowns of 40 yards or more going from two in 2006 to four in 2007

Total Offense - The Seminoles averaged 39 yards per game more in 2007

Red Zone - Both opportunities and scores went up inside an opponent's 20

Receiving - For the first time in school history FSU had three players with 700 receiving yards in a season

WORKING HIS MAGIC AGAIN

When offensive line coach Rick Trickett was brought to FSU in 2007, he was charged with rebuilding the Seminoles' up front and just one year into the rebuilding process, the improvement was unmistakable. Florida State's rushing offense averaged 127 yards a game in 2007, an increase of over 30 yards per game compared to the year before Trickett's arrival. He coached a converted defensive lineman (Ryan McMahon) and a true freshman (Rodney Hudson) to All-America honors. It was the first time in school history FSU had two linemen named freshmen All-Americans. Under Trickett FSU reduced the number of sacks allowed by 15% in his first season despite the fact he had three starters who had combined to play in just two collegiate games in their careers.

PUTTING PLAYERS IN THE PROS

Florida State's assistant coaches have a long track record of supplying the NFL with talent. The *Wall Street Journal* named FSU the #1 school for producing NFL players and when you look at the numbers there is little doubt why:

Mickey Andrews - 18 defensive players in Andrews' 24 years as defensive coordinator have been taken in the first round of the NFL draft and nine of those players were top 10 picks. More than 70 players under his tutelage have gone on to play in the National Football League.

Jimbo Fisher - Coached three players selected in the first round of the 2007 draft including the #1 overall pick. During seven seasons at LSU, Fisher coached five quarterbacks that were NFL draft picks.

Chuck Amato - As the head coach at NC State, Amato produced five first round draft picks including the only #1 overall pick in ACC history. He also coached the highest draft pick in FSU history in former walk-on Andre Wadsworth. During his career, 11 players coached by Amato have been taken in the first round.

Rick Trickett - In six years at Auburn, Trickett coached four offensive linemen taken in the first round of the NFL draft.

Odell Haggins - Since 2000 Haggins has coached seven defensive tackles taken in the NFL draft and three that were first round draft picks. In 2005 and 2006 Haggins had one of his tackles selected in the first round.

Jody Allen - Coached Cleveland Browns 2006 first round pick Kamerion Wimbley. Following the 2004 season, both of Allen's ends were taken in the NFL draft and in 2001 he was assisting Mickey Andrews with the safeties when Derrick Gibson was selected in the first round by Oakland.

WHAT A RUSH IN THE FIRST

Florida State finished the first half versus Clemson with 146 rushing yards on 17 attempts, the second most yards gained on the ground in the first half this year. FSU ran for a season-high 172 yards against Miami. It also marked the fifth time in 2008 that the Seminoles have rushed for over the century mark in the first half - 172 vs. Miami, 146 vs. Clemson, 141 vs. Georgia Tech, 140 vs. Clemson and 113 vs. UT Chattanooga.

MULTIPLE RUSHING TD GAMES

With three rushing touchdowns including a pair of 1-yard dives versus Clemson, Florida State has now registered multiple rushing touchdowns in six of nine games in 2008. It marks the fourth time that the Seminoles have matched that number since 2000 (2002, 2003, 2006 and 2008). It ties for the second most multiple rushing touchdown games since 2000. Florida State tallied eight in 13 games in 2000.

SEMINOLES OVER 200 YARDS ON THE GROUND

With 266 yards on the ground in Saturday's victory against Clemson, the Seminoles out rushed the opposition for the seventh time in nine games. It marks the fourth time this year the Seminoles have gained over 200 rushing yards in a game, the most in a season since 2004. In 2004, the Seminoles gained over 200 yards on the ground against Syracuse (254), North Carolina (279), UAB (251) and West Virginia (301) in the Gator Bowl. This year the 200-yard rushing games have come against Western Carolina (290), Colorado (259), Miami (310) and Clemson (266). FSU came close to 200 yards rushing in two other games this season as well. The Seminoles ran for 197 versus Chattanooga and 196 versus Georgia Tech.

TRYING TO DO IT AGAIN

Coming into this week's slate of ACC games, there are Seminoles sitting in first and second place in the ACC for scoring. Kicker Graham Gano leads the way with 10.3 points per game and Antone Smith is second averaging 9.3 points per game. The last time two players from the same team finished the season first and second in scoring in the conference was 1995 and they were Seminoles. That season the top three scorers were actually all Florida State players. Dunn was the last non-kicker from FSU to finish the season as the league's top scorer.

SEMINOLES' RUSHING TOWARD SUCCESS

The Seminoles enter Saturday's game against Boston College ranked 19th nationally in rushing offense with 205.2 yards per game and FSU has rushed for 200 yards or more four times this season. The Seminoles haven't averaged 200 rushing yards per game since the 1995 season (222.8) and have averaged 200 yards or more on the ground only three times (1992, 1993 and 1995) since the 1990 season. Florida State has an eye-popping 5.3 yards per carry average. The Seminoles have gained 1,847 yards rushing through the first nine games of the season - the most since the 2004 season when the Seminoles gained 1,944 yards in 12 games. The Seminoles' 5.3 yards per carry average is its best since the 1995 season when Florida State averaged 5.8 yards per carry. The Seminoles are averaging more than 5.0 yards per carry for only the fourth time since 1990.

BIG PLAY POTENTIAL

Versus Clemson FSU recorded two runs of 40 yards. It was the 10 th and 11th play of 40 yards or more by

Jimbo Fisher's offense. Last season FSU recorded 13 such plays in 13 games. This year's team is on pace to best that mark. Even more impressive is the number of plays of 20 yards or more turned in by the offense in 2008. FSU has rushed for 20 yards or more 22 times and passed for 20 yards or more 20 times. The biggest increase has been in rushing where FSU already has five more runs of 20+ yards than the team did in 13 games last season (15).

JUST THE SECOND TO DO THAT

Florida State's win over Clemson may have not raised a lot of eyebrows considering the Tigers' 4-5 record but you need to look a little closer to see how impressive it was. Clemson came into Doak Campbell allowing just 16.8 points per game and only 132 yards per game on the ground. The Seminole offense scored 34 points (one TD came on an INT return) and racked up 266 rushing yards. The 34 points scored equaled the most Clemson's defense has allowed versus any team this year (Alabama) and the 266 rushing yards was the most allowed by the Tigers' in 2008.

OFFENSE FINDS THE END ZONE THROUGH THE AIR

Florida State's quarterback Christian Ponder threw a touchdown pass against Clemson to mark the seventh time in nine games this season that one or both of the Seminoles' quarterbacks had completed at least one scoring pass in a game. The Seminoles have thrown at least one touchdown pass in five consecutive games now. Florida State's quarterbacks have completed 14 touchdown passes in nine games this season as compared to 15 touchdown passes in 13 games during the 2007 season.

AND ON THE GROUND

Quarterback Christian Ponder scored his second career rushing touchdown against Clemson. It was his second straight game with a rushing TD. Ponder's rushing touchdown versus Georgia Tech marked the 21st rushing touchdown by the fifth different player for Florida State this season. The Seminoles scored a total of 12 rushing touchdowns in 2007 with five different players finding the end zone on a rushing attempt. Florida State's 21 rushing touchdowns are the most by the team in a single season since the 2005 Seminoles scored 20 rushing touchdowns. A total of eight Seminoles found the end zone on at least one rushing touchdown in 2005 as the Seminoles won the ACC Championship and played in the Orange Bowl.

14 PLAYERS SCORE A TD IN 2008

Led by tailback Antone Smith's career-high 14 touchdowns (13 rushing and one receiving) a total of 14 Seminoles have scored at least one touchdown during the 2008 season. Neefy Moffett added his name to the list against Clemson when he grabbed an interception and returned it 18 yards for a touchdown. A total of 14 Seminoles have scored a total of 38 touchdowns this season.

SEMINOLES FINDING THE ENDZONE

Florida State has scored more touchdowns in nine games this season (38) than it did during the 2007 season when the Seminoles scored 32 touchdowns in 13 games.

SEMINOLES SCORING POINTS

Florida State has scored 323 points and is averaging 35.9 points scored per game through nine games of the 2008 season. The Seminoles scored 303 points and averaged 23.3 points scored per game during the 2007 season.

FSU PERFECT ON FOURTH DOWN CONVERSIONS

Florida State was a perfect two-of-two on fourth down conversion attempts against Georgia Tech with both conversions coming in the fourth quarter of its near comeback against the Yellow Jackets. Both conversions were passes from Christian Ponder and both found freshman wide receiver Bert Reed. The first fourth down

conversion came on a fourth-and-three situation that saw Reed catch an eight yard pass from Ponder. Quarterback D'Vontrey Richardson found wide receiver Preston Parker on the next play on a 39-yard touchdown pass which helped the Seminoles get to within 31-28. Ponder then found Reed on a fourth-and-six situation that prolonged the Seminoles' final drive of the game. Florida State took the ball to the Georgia Tech three before a turnover ended its comeback bid.

FOURTH DOWN SUCCESS

Florida State has completed three of its six fourth down conversion attempts in its first nine games of the season. The first came on a three-yard rush by Jermaine Thomas in the first quarter of the Seminoles' victory over Colorado and two came on passes from Christian Ponder to Bert Reed against Georgia Tech.

THIRD 100-YARD RUSHER OF SEASON

Freshman Jermaine Thomas rushed for a career-high 130 yards against Georgia Tech to become the third Seminole to rush for 100 or more yards in a game this season. Senior tailback Antone Smith rushed for a team-high 154 yards in the Seminoles' victory over Colorado while sophomore quarterback Christian Ponder totaled a career-high 144 yards rushing in the Seminoles' victory over Miami. The Seminoles had a total of four 100 yard rushing performances (three by Smith and one by Preston Parker) during the 2007 season.

FIRST DRIVE

Christian Ponder's TD run on the first drive of the Georgia Tech game marked the first time this season that the Seminole offense has scored a touchdown on the game's first drive. FSU's offense also scored on its' first drive of the game in wins against UTC and Colorado, but that was after the FSU defense had been on the field. The score also marked just the second time in five ACC games this season that the Seminoles have scored first. Miami was the other time.

HOLDING ON TO THE BALL

Florida State seems to have learned its lesson from the Miami game. With the Seminoles leading the Hurricanes 24-3, a fumble led to a Miami TD to cut the score to 24-10. An interception for a TD cut the lead to five points at 34-29 and a fourth quarter fumble led to a field goal that made the lead just two points after having a 21-point advantage. The Seminoles played back-to-back games (NC State and Virginia Tech) without a turnover and as you guessed they have won both. That was the third time this season FSU has not turned the ball over (Western Carolina as well) and the Seminoles are 3-0 in those games. The last time the Seminoles went consecutive games without a turnover was 2002 against Georgia Tech (Nov. 9) and North Carolina (Nov. 16). The Seminoles won both of those games. The last two turnover-free games ended a streak of 72 games since Florida State didn't commit a turnover in back-to-back contests.

KEEP IT GOING

One of the biggest improvements in the Seminole offense this year has been the rarity of three-and-outs. Florida State went 28 straight series without a three-and-out heading into the Virginia Tech game. The Hokies broke that streak on the first drive of the game and forced FSU to three straight three-and-outs to start the game. After a slow start, the Seminoles had just one more three-and-out the rest of the way (the Seminoles did have one to kill the clock in the fourth quarter which is

not included). Versus Georgia Tech and Clemson, FSU went the entire game with just on three-and-out in each contest and now Florida State ranks eighth in the FBS in the fewest three-and-outs at 1.67 per game. That is more than one less per game than the 2.77 FSU's offense averaged in 2007. The best streak the Seminoles had during the 2007 season was 36 straight drives without a three-and-out.

DOUBLE DOWN ON THE GROUND

Antone Smith and Christian Ponder both scored rushing touchdowns versus Clemson, Smith twice. It marked the sixth time this season that the Seminoles have scored two or more rushing touchdowns in a game. The 2008 Seminoles are on pace to best any FSU team this decade when it comes to that category. The last time a Seminole squad had two rushing touchdowns in more than six games was 2000 when that squad did it eight times and ended up playing Oklahoma for the National Championship.

200-YARD RUSHING GAMES

With 266 yards on the ground in a 41-27 victory over Clemson, Florida State tallied its fourth 200+ yard rushing game of the season (290 yards vs. Western Carolina, 259 yards vs. Colorado and 310 vs. Miami). FSU has gained over 100 yards on the ground in all but one game on the season (Virginia Tech). The Seminoles are averaging 205.2 yards on the ground this year. RUSHING ALONG

Florida State has now recorded 100+ rushing yards in eight of its nine games this season. Florida State ran for 138 yards in its victory over NC State marking the first time since 2004 that the Seminoles recorded six straight 100 yard rushing games and the first time since 2002 that FSU has started a season with six straight 100 yard rushing games. The streak came to an end versus Virginia Tech when FSU ran for its lowest total of the season (89 yards).

SUCCESS ON THE GROUND

Florida State is off to a 7-2 start and a big reason for that has been the ground game. The Seminoles' rushing offense is ranked 19th in the nation among FBS schools. Considering the fact that FSU was ranked 91st or lower the previous three seasons, the improvement in 2008 is staggering. The Seminoles finished in the 100's in 2005 and 2006 and then moved up to 91 last season. This is the fourth-straight year of improvement but the most drastic by far. The last time a Seminole rushing offense finished better than 50th in the nation was in 2002 (35th) and there has not been a time this decade where the FSU ground attack was among the top 25 in the country.

RED ZONE SUCCESS CONTINUES VS. NC STATE

Florida State was a perfect three-of-three on scoring chances in the red zone against NCST and VT and has now converted 33 of 37 (89 percent) of their scoring chances in the red zone this season. Of the 33 times FSU has scored in the red zone, 23 have been touchdowns and 15 of those touchdowns have come via the rush.

SUCCESS CONTINUES ON THIRD DOWN

Florida State converted on 59 percent of its third down conversion attempts in its victory over NC State - marking the second straight game FSU had converted more than 58% of its third downs. That was followed by the squad's worst showing on the year versus Virginia Tech where the Seminoles converted just 28% of the time. The

Seminoles bounced back in the Clemson game converting 50%. FSU enters this week's game converting 48.3% of its third downs. Only five teams have converted 50 percent or more of their third down conversion attempts for an entire season in the Bobby Bowden era at FSU.

THREE RECEIVERS WITH FIVE CATCHES

Juniors Preston Parker and Marcus Sims and freshman Taiwan Easterling had five catches each in the Seminoles' victory over NC State. It marked the first time since Dec. 31, 2007, in the Music City Bowl, that three receivers had at least five catches in the same game. Parker (eight catches), senior Greg Carr (six) and De'Cody Fagg (five) helped the Seminoles catch 22 passes for 480 yards against Kentucky.

RUN QB'S RUN

When D'Vontrey Richardson recorded a 52-yard run earlier this season versus Western Carolina we went scrambling to the record books to find out where that jaunt ranked in FSU history. The next week Richardson made all that research moot when he recorded a school-record 55-yard TD run by a QB versus Chattanooga. After a couple weeks without a long QB run, Christian Ponder ripped off a 45-yard rush versus Miami in the 41-39 Seminole win. That run gave FSU quarterbacks three runs of 45 yards or more this season marking the first time in the Bobby Bowden era at Florida State that has happened.

ON FURTHER REVIEW

During Florida State's game with Miami, Shawn Powell mishandled a snap and was forced to drop kick the ball out of the endzone for a Miami safety. The play was originally called a team rush for -29 yards. The Miami stat crew looked into the play during the week and with help from the NCAA got the ruling correct. The play actually went down as a team punt giving the Seminoles 29 yards of offense back. More importantly 29 yards of rushing offense back. That put FSU at 310 rushing yards for the game. It marked the first time since the 2005 Gator Bowl that a Seminole team rushed for 300 yards in a game. The last time FSU rushed for 300 yards or more in an ACC game was back in 2002 versus Virginia when Florida State amassed 397 yards on the ground.

PUNCHING IT IN FOR 6

Florida State's offense, which is second in the ACC in red-zone efficiency and first in the league in red-zone touchdowns, has become proficient in scoring touchdowns (rather than kicking field goals) when it advances the ball inside of its opponents 20-yard line. The Seminoles have scored 23 red-zone touchdowns in nine games of the 2008 season after scoring 21 red-zone touchdowns during the entire 2007 season (13 games). The Seminoles have scored touchdowns 70 percent of the time (23 of 33) in the red-zone this season as compared to last season when they scored touchdowns 54 percent of the time (21 of 39). The Seminoles have settled for field goals on only 30 percent of their scores this season (10 of 33) after setting for field goals 46 percent of the time (18 of 39) during the 2007 season.

In the first nine games of the 2008 season the Seminoles offense has already recorded seven scoring plays of 40 yards or more. Last season Florida State had four total TD plays of 40 yards or more and in 2006 that number was just two. So in just 36 quarters of football, the 2008 Seminoles already have more big play TDs than the previous two years combined.

YOUNG UP FRONT

The River City Showdown in Jacksonville between Florida State and Colorado on September 27 featured the two youngest starting offensive lines in America among BCS schools. The Seminoles feature the youngest offensive line in the FBS with three true freshmen, one true sophomore and one redshirt sophomore starting.

FSU SCORES 10 TOUCHDOWNS AGAINST WCU

Florida State scored 10 touchdowns against Western Carolina - five rushing, four passing and one on a punt return. The Seminoles came within one touchdown of tying the school record for touchdowns scored in a single game, 11. Florida State scored 11 touchdowns in a 77-17 victory over NC State on Sept. 16, 1995 in a game played in Tallahassee. The Seminoles' near school record tying 10 touchdowns marked the eighth time in school history (all under head coach Bobby Bowden) that they had scored at least 10 or more TDs in a single game.

FIRST HALF PRODUCTION

Florida State's 30 points in the first half versus Chattanooga marked the most points that the

Seminoles have scored in a first half since September 29, 2001 when FSU scored 42 first half points on the way to a 48-24 win over Wake Forest in Doak Campbell Stadium. With 28 points in the first half versus WCU, FSU scored 58 points in the first half in the first two games combined. Last season, FSU did not total 58 points in any two full games in consecutive contests. The best two-game point total in 2007 was 54 versus Miami (29) and Duke (25).

MOST POINTS IN CONSECUTIVE GAMES

With Roosevelt Lawson's blocked punt for a safety versus Chattanooga, FSU topped the 100 point mark for the season in just the first two games. The last time FSU combined to score 100 or more points in back-to-back games was 1996. FSU put up 102 points in wins over Southern Miss (54) and Maryland (48). This is the quickest any FSU team has reached 100 points in a season since 1949 when Don Veller's first squad put up 110 points versus Whiting Field (77) and Mississippi College (33). The 115 points FSU posted in its first two games rank in a tie for fifth for the most points accumulated in consecutive games in school history.

LINE HOLDS MIAMI WITHOUT A SACK

Florida State's offensive line held Miami without a sack in the Seminoles' victory over the Hurricanes. It marked the third time this season (also against Western Carolina in the season opener and in the Seminoles' victory over Colorado) that the offensive line had not allowed a sack. The Seminoles' offensive line, which is the youngest in the nation in 2008, has now held an opponent sackless six times in the last 20 games. In addition to keeping Western Carolina, Colorado and Miami out of the backfield this season, the offensive line held UAB, Wake Forest and Virginia Tech without a sack during the 2007 season.

PONDER ACCOUNTABLE FOR 13

Sophomore quarterback Christian Ponder scored his second rushing touchdown of the season in the Seminoles' victory over Clemson. He has now thrown for 11 touchdowns and run for two more - making him responsible for 13 touchdowns this season. Senior tailback Antone Smith scored two rushing touchdowns in the Seminoles' victory over Clemson to bring his season total to 14 (13 rushing and one receiving). He is currently the team leader in touchdown responsibility and first in scoring with 84 points.

One of the biggest things for a young QB is learning to respond to adversity. Christian Ponder continues to show he is learning how to do that. After completing just 3-of-7 passes for 15 yards in the first half of the game versus Virginia Tech, the sophomore quarterback made the necessary adjustments in the third quarter going 6-for-9 for 118 yards and a touchdown. Ponder found Greg Carr for passes of 48 and 39 yards in the third quarter as he led FSU to two TDs that took FSU from down 13-10 to a 24-13 lead. In the second half Ponder was 8-for-12 for 144 yards with a TD.

PONDER LEADS FIRST 4TH QUARTER COMEBACK

Sophomore quarterback Christian Ponder rallied Florida State from a 17-13 fourth quarter deficit to a 26-17 victory over NC State with his first career fourth quarter comeback. The Seminoles trailed 17-13 with 14:51 remaining in the fourth quarter before Ponder rallied his team to the win. Ponder led FSU on a 70-yard TD drive after the Seminoles gave up a 67-yard TD pass to fall behind 17-13. The sophomore was 6-for-8 for 71 yards on the fourth quarter march that culminated in a 17-yard TD pass giving FSU a 20-17 lead they would never relinquish. He also completed a 23 yard pass on third-and-17 early in that drive. Florida State scored the final 13 points of the game on a Ponder touchdown pass to Bert Reed (Florida State, 20-17) and two field goals by Graham Gano (44 and 53 yards).

PONDER SPREADS IT AROUND

Christian Ponder had a career night versus NC State. He recorded the first 200-yard passing game of his career (254), his best completion percentage (23-of-35, 68 %), most completions (23), most attempts (35) and he has now completed a pass to five or more receivers in every game this season.

PONDER PASSES FOR FIRST DOWNS

Sophomore quarterback Christian Ponder enjoyed a very effective passing game in the Seminoles' victory over Colorado. Despite completing just 10 passes in the victory, he completed 70 percent (seven of 10) for first downs including four of five in the first half. Ponder averaged 11.9 yards per completion against the Buffaloes. Versus Miami, Ponder was effective again, throwing for 159 yards on 14 completions, an average of 11.4 yards per completion. After another 11.0 yards per completion game against NC State, Ponder completed 11 passes for 159 yards versus Virginia Tech for a season-high 14.5 yards per completion. For the second time in the last six games, Ponder dropped below 11 yards per completion versus Georgia Tech and Clemson.

PONDER THIS

Christian Ponder recorded the second highest rushing total by a Seminole quarterback in FSU history with his 144 yards versus Miami. Ken MacLean holds the record for a Seminole quarterback with 146 yards vs. Cumberland 60 years ago in 1948. Prior to the Miami game, the last FSU quarterback to rush for 100+ yards in a game was Charlie Ward with 111 yards vs. Maryland in 1992.

PONDER RUSHING

Sophomore quarterback Christian Ponder rushed a career-high 19 times for a career-high 144 yards in leading the Seminoles' over Miami. Of his 19 total rushing attempts, nine were for first downs and six were for at least nine yards. Ponder's longest rush of the game (and the longest of his career) went for 45 yards and led to a second quarter rushing touchdown by Antone Smith that put Florida State ahead 14-0.

PONDER ON THE GROUND

Quarterback Christian Ponder ranks second on the team in rushing attempts (85) and third in rushing yards per game (32.1) and in rushing yards (289).

FIRST START, FIRST GAME

Christian Ponder made the first start of his FSU career on opening day versus Western Carolina. He is the seventh quarterback since 1990 at Florida State to make his first start in the first game of the year. With his win all seven QB's have won their first starts. While wins have been the norm among this group, the one thing that has been different is the year of the QB's. The first three QB's in this group were all juniors. The last four have all been freshmen or sophomores.

PONDER OPENS CAREER IN GOOD COMPANY

Quarterback Christian Ponder threw six touchdowns in his first two career starts. The last Seminole to accomplish that feat in consecutive games was Charlie Ward when he tossed for six against Duke and Clemson to begin the 1992 campaign. The only other Florida State passer to toss six or more touchdowns in his first two career starts since 1985 was Danny Kanell. He threw for five touchdowns filling in for an injured Ward on November 6, 1993 against Maryland and then threw four more TD passes a year later when he made his next start against Virginia to open the 1994 season.

SEMINOLE QB'S FINDING THE ENDZONE

Florida State's quarterbacks have thrown for 14 touchdowns in the first nine games of the season and are closing in on the Seminoles' 2007 total of 15 passing touchdowns. Drew Weatherford passed for a team-high nine touchdowns in 11 games last season. Christian Ponder has already passed for 11 touchdowns in nine games of 2008.

RICHARDSON LEADS FSU IN RUSHING AND PASSING

Sophomore quarterback D'Vontrey Richardson led the Seminoles in both rushing (eight carries for 46 yards) and passing (six completions for 66 yards) against Wake Forest. It marked the first time this season and the second time since Nov. 10, 2007, against Virginia Tech that the same player led Florida State in rushing and passing in the same game. Quarterback Christian Ponder led the Seminoles against the Hokies with 51 yards rushing and 105 yards passing.

HE DID IT AGAIN

Offensive coordinator Jimbo Fisher said D'Vontrey Richardson can beat you from the pocket. The redshirt sophomore QB sure can beat teams from outside the pocket as well. Versus Western Carolina he tied the Florida State record for the longest run by a QB with a 52-yard TD jaunt that equaled a Bobby Renn TD run from 1957. Versus Chattanooga he broke that record with a 55-yard touchdown run. He then showed off his arm versus Georgia Tech with a 39-yard TD pass to Preston Parker.

RICHARDSON DIALING IN FROM DEEP

D'Vontrey Richardson saw his first extended action under center since the Chattanooga game versus Georgia Tech and he made the most of it. The redshirt sophomore completed the longest TD pass of his career when he found Preston Parker for a 39-yard TD in the fourth quarter to close the Georgia Tech lead to 31-28. It was the first TD catch for Preston Parker in 2008.

DEUCE-THOUSAND

Antone Smith's 8-yard run in the third quarter versus Virginia Tech pushed the senior tailback over 2,000 career rushing yards. Smith finished the game with nine carries and 57 yards increasing his career rushing totals to 2,003 yards. Smith is just the 12th Seminole to ever break the 2,000 yard career rushing mark. With 57 yards against Clemson, he became the 10th most productive rusher in school history where he joined players like Warrick Dunn, Greg Allen and Travis Minor. Smith will have a chance to finish in the top five if he ups his average of 80 yards per game just slightly over the final three-plus games.

SMITH NEARS THE 2,100 YARD MARK

Senior tailback Antone Smith enters Saturday's game against Boston College with 2,095 career yards. He is currently in 10th place in Florida State's all-time career rushing list and is looking to become only the 10th player in school history with 2,100 or more career yards.

MORE DEUCE

Antone Smith's fourth quarter 39-yard touchdown run versus Virginia Tech marked the senior's fourth straight game with a rush of 20 yards or more for a TD. He also recorded a 60-yard TD run in the win vs. Colorado in Jacksonville, a 20-yarder in the win at Miami and a 27-yard scamper in the Thursday night win over NC State. With his TD versus Clemson, the Pahoekie, Fla., native now has 13 rushing touchdowns this season, which ranks 4th on FSU's single-season rushing TD list. He is just the 10th player in FSU history to record 10 or more rushing TDs in a single season and the first player to do so since Warrick Dunn had 12 rushing TDs in 1996. Smith now has 24 career rushing touchdowns which puts him in sole possession of fifth place on FSU's career rushing touchdowns list ahead of the likes of Pooh Bear Williams (17), Dexter Carter (17) and William Floyd (16).

SMITH'S OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

Antone Smith's four rushing touchdowns versus Miami marked the first time an FSU player has scored four TDs in a game (rushing or receiving) since Greg Allen did it vs. Louisville in 1982. Coming into the season, Antone Smith had just two multi-rushing touchdown games in his career. Now he's done it in back-to-back games this season (Colorado and Miami).

SMITH FINDS THE ENDZONE AGAIN

Senior All-ACC candidate Antone Smith scored his 13th rushing touchdown of the season versus Clemson on

a 41-yard run in the fourth quarter. He now has a rushing TD in eight of the Seminoles nine games this season. Smith now has 15 rushing touchdowns against an ACC opponent in his career.

SMITH SECOND IN THE ACC IN SCORING

Senior tailback Antone Smith leads the ACC in scoring for non-kickers with 84 points on 14 touchdowns through nine games this season. Teammate kicker Graham Gano is first in the conference in scoring. Smith is looking to become only the fifth Seminole (and only the second non-kicker) to lead the ACC in scoring since Florida State began playing football in the ACC in 1992. Warrick Dunn, a standout Seminole running back, led the ACC in scoring during the 1995 season as he averaged 8.7 points per game on 16 touchdowns. Smith is looking to become the second straight running back to lead the ACC in scoring; Brandon Ore of Virginia Tech led the league in scoring with an average of 8.5 points per game in 2007 (17 touchdowns). Smith is averaging 9.3 points scored per game. Since the 1980 season when the ACC changed its ranking system to points per game, the record for average points scored per game is 13.5 by running back Kelvin Bryant of North Carolina (108 points on 18 touchdowns).

SMITH RUSHING UP THE CHARTS

Senior running back Antone Smith is in the midst of his final year in Garnet & Gold. The Pahokee native had one of the best off-seasons of his career and is now completely healthy in 2008. He finished the 2007 season with the best rushing game of his career. Smith put up 156 yards rushing versus Kentucky in the Music City Bowl marking the third time in 2007 that he went over 100 yards rushing in a game. He notched his fourth career 100-yard rushing game when he amassed 154 yards on the ground in the River City Showdown against Colorado in 2008. Smith carried the rock 192 times for FSU in 2007, the most carries by a Seminole back since Greg Allen carried it 200 times in 1983.

SMITH PASSES LAST YEAR'S TD TOTAL

With 14 total touchdowns, 13 rushing and one receiving, running back Antone Smith has eclipsed last year's leading touchdown producers. Smith has more TDs than wide receivers Preston Parker and De'Cody Fagg combined to score with five touchdowns each in 13 games last season.

PLAYING THROUGH THE PAIN

Senior Antone Smith was the workhorse of the Seminole offense in 2007. Despite fighting through injuries all season long, Smith accounted for 43% of FSU rushes in

2007 and that number jumps to almost 57% when you take rushes by quarterbacks out of the equation. Smith was also a big part of the passing game catching 22 balls. With 192 rushes and 22 catches, 30% of FSU's total offensive plays were completed to Smith last season despite the fact he missed part of the UAB game with a concussion, half the Virginia Tech game with a shoulder injury and the entire Maryland game. In 2007 Smith became the first Seminole to account for 30% of the Seminoles' offensive plays (runs and receptions) since 1979 when Mark Lyles also accounted for 30% of the offensive plays for an entire season.

MAKE THEM COUNT

Freshman tailback Jermaine Thomas is coming off two of the best outings of his young career. The Jacksonville product has rushed 20 times for 224 yards in the last two games. Thomas has carried the ball 52 times this season and he has made the most of those opportunities. Of his 52 rushes 23 have gone for either a first down or a touchdown. That means 44% of the freshman's carries ended up in a first down or a touchdown.

THOMAS A PRIME-TIME RUNNING BACK

True freshman running back Jermaine Thomas, who has gained 224 yards in the last two games, is the Seminoles' second-leading rusher with 437 yards. In the last three games Thomas is averaging a team-leading 75.0 yards per game.

JERMAINE HAS HIS BEST OUTING

Freshman RB Jermaine Thomas had the best day of his young career versus the Yellow Jackets with 130 yards on nine carries. Included in that total was a 62-yard-run in the second quarter. It was not only the rookie's

career long (previous long was 30 yards) it was the longest run by a Seminole in 2008. Thomas' previous best game was 13 carries for 91 yards against Western Carolina.

THOMAS KEEPS HIS RUSHING AVERAGE UP

Freshman running back Jermaine Thomas earned a pair of rushes for 51 yards against Miami - a 25.5 yards per rush average. TRUE FRESHMAN LEADS SEMINOLES IN RUSHING

True freshman running back Jermaine Thomas led the Seminoles in rushing attempts (13), rushing yards (91) and tied for the team lead in rushing touchdowns (two) in Florida State's victory over Western Carolina. It marked the first time a true freshman led Florida State in rushing since Leon Washington in 2002 against Georgia in the Sugar Bowl. Washington led the Seminoles in rushing three times as a true freshman - against North Carolina (13 carries for 56 yards), Florida (26 carries for 134 yards) and against Georgia. Thomas again lead the Seminoles a second time this season against Clemson where he had 11 carries for 94 yards. Thomas became the first true freshman to score two touchdowns in a single game since Travis Minor scored twice in a 47-21 victory over NC State on Nov. 1, 1997. Minor scored two touchdowns in three different games as a true freshman that season - two against NC State, Virginia (Oct. 25, 1997) and against Miami (Oct. 4, 1997).

SIMS SCORES SECOND CAREER TD

Junior fullback Marcus Sims registered his second career rushing touchdown on a one-yard touchdown run in the third quarter versus Virginia Tech. Sims' first career TD run came on a one-yard lunge against UAB in 2007. The score against the Blazers also came in the third quarter. Sims finished the game versus the Hokies with eight rushes for 29 yards. He entered the game with five rushes for 14 yards in two games in 2008.

CARR DRIVES THE OFFENSE VS. HOKIES

Senior wideout Greg Carr recorded the eighth 100-yard receiving game of his FSU career in leading all offensive players on both teams in the Seminoles 30-20 win over Virginia Tech. Carr recorded the eighth-longest reception of his career as he caught a 48-yard pass from Christian Ponder in the third quarter. The pass play was the second-longest pass completion of Ponder's career. The 100-yard receiving performance tied Carr with Jackie Flowers (five catches, 100 yards in 1979) for the fifth-most receiving yards by a Seminole against Virginia Tech. His 48-yard reception set up the Seminoles' go ahead score (17-13) and his 24-yard reception set FSU up to punch in another TD and take a 24-13 lead.

CARR MOVES INTO TOP 10

Greg Carr continues to make his mark on the record books when it comes to receiving records. Carr notched the eighth 100-yard receiving game of his career versus the Hokies, which puts him seventh all-time at FSU for career 100-yard games. He is now one behind Jessie Hester and current position coach Lawrence Dawsey.

Senior All-American candidate Greg Carr caught a 54-yard touchdown pass from Christian Ponder to give Florida State a 35-0 lead early in the third quarter of its victory over Western Carolina. The 54-yard scoring catch was the second longest touchdown reception of his career and the seventh catch of 50 yards or more during his career.

With five catches and 68 yards against Georgia Tech, senior wide receiver Greg Carr has now caught 133 passes (7th all-time) for 2,412 yards (fifth all-time) during his career. Carr passed his position coach Lawrence Dawsey, former teammate De'Cody Fagg and Seminole great Warrick Dunn in career passes and Barry Smith in career receiving yards. Carr needs 248 yards to tied for fourth with Kez McCorvey. If Carr reaches his career average for yards in a season (677) he will end his career as the fourth all-time leading receiver for career yardage.

Of the 133 passes he has caught, 20.3% have been for TDs. 22 of his 27 career TDs have come from 30 yards and in. Most importantly the Seminoles are 14-5 when he catches a TD.

Freshman wide receiver Bert Reed, who has caught 15 passes for 226 yards, has quickly developed into one of the Seminoles main offensive threats. His athletic talent and speed have allowed the Seminole coaching staff to utilize him as a running back (9.4 yards per carry), a wide receiver (15.1 yards per reception), a kickoff returner (22.0 yards per return) and he has been credited with four punt returns for 19 yards.

HEAD EASTERLING YOUNG MAN?

Taiwan Easterling is having a phenomenal season and you just have to look at the stats to see that. The redshirt freshman is first on the team in catches (26) and second in yards (286). To really gauge just how

good of a season Easterling is having you have to look deeper at what Easterling's passes have meant to FSU. Half of the Mississippi native's catches have gone for either a first down or a touchdown. Easterling has 12 pass receptions that have moved the chains and another for a touchdown. He also got FSU a first down on a pass interference call on top of another first down grab that was wiped out by a holding penalty. Two of Easterling's most important grabs came in ACC wins as he helped convert long third down situations. Versus NC State he hauled in a 21-yard pass on 3rd-and-17 that kept a TD drive alive putting FSU in the lead for good. Then against Virginia Tech he made a diving grab on 3rd-and-10 for 21 yards that set up a field goal for the final score of the game putting FSU up 30-20. Seven of the nine drives where Easterling has converted at least one third down have resulted in FSU points. That means if Easterling converts a third down there is a 78% chance the Seminoles will wind up with points.

OWENS HAS BIG NIGHT

Junior wide receiver Rod Owens caught a career-high tying four passes for a career-high 61 yards in the Seminoles' victory over Western Carolina. He caught three passes for 50 yards from quarterback Christian Ponder on Florida State's first touchdown drive of the season in the second quarter against the Catamounts. Despite not scoring the Florida State touchdown (Antone Smith scored on a five-yard run), he earned 50 of Florida State's 56 yards on the drive. Owens had nearly as many receiving yards on that second quarter scoring drive (50 on three receptions) as he had during the entire 2007 season (55 yards on six catches).

SURRENCY BACK IN THE ZONE

Corey Surrency registered his team leading fourth touchdown reception of the season as the junior wide out caught a slant from Christian Ponder and scampered in from 12-yards out to put FSU up 27-17 versus Clemson. It was Surrency's first touchdown reception since the second quarter of the UT Chattanooga game, when he caught a 39-yard strike from Ponder with just over three minutes remaining in the first half.

BIG QUARTER FOR SURRENCY

Corey Surrency began his Seminole career with two catches for 14 yards and a TD versus Western Carolina. He had two catches in the first quarter against UTC but they went for 83 yards and two TDs. The last Seminole before Surrency to catch two touchdowns in a game was De'Cody Fagg in 2007 versus Alabama. The junior college transfer had one of the most dominant quarters in FSU history versus Chattanooga. The wideout ended the day with three catches for 87 yards. His 83 yards receiving were the most in the first quarter by an FSU player since Craphonso Thorpe hauled in three passes

for 124 yards in the first quarter versus Notre Dame November 1, 2003.

PARKER ENJOYS BEST GAME OF 2008 SEASON

Junior wide receiver Preston Parker accumulated 127 all-purpose yards (77 receiving and 50 on kick returns) in the Seminoles' game against Georgia Tech. It was Parker's first 100+ yard all-purpose outing of the 2008 season while his fourth quarter touchdown pass from D'Vontrey Richardson was his first touchdown of his junior season. Parker accounted for at least 100 all-purpose yards in nine of the Seminoles' 13 games during the 2007 season and now has 11 career 100+ all-purpose yardage games following a 169-yard effort against Clemson. Parker's 169 all-purpose yards marked the second best all-purpose yardage total of his career.

GIVENS HIMSELF A CHANCE

Everyone at Mars Hill College told walk-on Louis Givens he was dreaming to ever think he could be playing football for the Florida State Seminoles but that didn't stop the 5'8" wide receiver from chasing his dream. The Jacksonville, FL native had to return home to get his AA to just be admitted to Florida State. While he was getting that degree he spent five months working the phones as a debt collector. The biology major did get admitted to FSU and then was impressive enough in a walk-on tryout to stick around during the spring. Offensive coordinator Jimbo Fisher asked him to stick around and workout with the team over the summer in the hopes of securing a coveted walk-on spot in the fall, which Givens once again did. The sophomore then made a name for himself on special teams highlighted by two TD saving tackles versus Travis Benjamin against the Hurricanes. Following a three tackle performance versus NC State, Fisher told the wideout he was planning on using him in the offense but it never happened versus Virginia Tech or Georgia Tech. That all changed against Clemson. Givens caught the second pass of his career for three yards and then busted a 27 yard run down to the Tiger one-yard line setting up Christian Ponder's TD plunge that put FSU in the lead 20-17.

ALL-AMERICAN -- ALL-EVERYTHING

In 2007 true freshman Rodney Hudson started the first game of his college career on a Monday night in Clemson in front of a national television audience. Not only was he starting his first-ever collegiate game, it was just the third college football game he had ever been to and he was playing in it. Hudson had a forgettable first night but went on to have one of the most memorabile seasons by a freshman offensive lineman in FSU history. This past spring Hudson moved to tackle in anticipation of a position change this fall. While that change never happened the sophomore was prepared to play either gaurd or tackle. Now you can add a third position to the list -- center. Hudson moved over one spot and played center as well as he played gaurd in FSU's victory over WCU. He has been named the ACC offensive lineman of the week twice already this season.

HOW GOOD IS HE?

Freshman All-American guard Rodney Hudson is doing everything in his power to garner All-America honors again as a sophomore. The Alabama native has received the top overall grade in five of nine games this season among offensive linemen and has been number two three times. He has been ranked first in either run blocking or pass blocking nine times. Versus Virginia Tech Hudson was whistled for a false start penalty marking the first time in his career, covering 1,024 snaps, that the true sophomore has been penalized for anything. Considering he has started 18 games since his true freshman season last year, it is a remarkable stat. Hudson also saw another amazing streak come to an end. In the first game of his career in 2007 versus Clemson, he allowed one sack. Sixteen games later he was beat again for a ½ sack versus the Hokies. The first one he has allowed since his first-ever start.

IRONMAN MCMAHON BREAKS HIS STREAK

When sophomore center Ryan McMahon gave way to freshman A.J. Ganguzza in the third quarter of the Seminoles' victory over Western Carolina, he snapped a streak of 994 consecutive snaps played at the center position for the Seminoles. He made all 959 snaps during the 2007 season and the first 35 snaps of the 2008 season.

100%

Seminole center Ryan McMahon had his best game of the season versus Virginia Tech leading the offensive line with a total grade of 88% playing all 60 snaps. McMahon became the first player this season to receive a 100% grade in either run or pass blocking from OL coach Rick Trickett. McMahon was a perfect 28-for-28 in pass blocking situations and he also had three knockdowns, the second-highest total on the team. McMahon and the offensive line paved the way for two rushing TDs marking the fifth time this season FSU has rushed for multiple TDs in a game.

GOOD JOB ROOKIE

David Spurlock made his first start since opening day when he was forced into the line-up versus Virginia Tech due to an injury. The true freshman played all 60 snaps at right guard and posted an 80% grade. His 82% in pass blocking situations was the second-highest grade on the team and he led the entire line with six knockdowns. Spurlock and the offensive line paved the way for two rushing TDs marking the fifth time this season FSU has rushed for multiple TDs in a game. Spurlock proved that performance was more than beginner's luck when he recorded an 89 versus Clemson, tying Rodney Hudson for the highest grade on the line. He was second among the group with five knockdowns versus the Tigers.

CAZZLE DAZZLE

Caz Piurowski tied his single-game career-high for catches in a game with three versus Colorado. His last three catch game came against Boston College in 2006. Piurowski also finished with a career-high 33 receiving yards. His previous high of 27 yards came all on one catch against Maryland in 2007.

YOU THOUGHT ONE WAS BAD

Last season FSU opened the year with a true freshman guard in Rodney Hudson. Despite a rocky start versus Clemson, Hudson went on to be named a freshman All-American and became the best offensive lineman on the team. Line coach Rick Trickett will need to work that kind of magic again in 2008 as he now has three true freshmen among his first five starters. While Hudson and fellow freshmen All-American Ryan McMahon return, the rest of the line will feature inexperienced players. Joe Tonga is the only senior Seminole lineman, in fact

he is the only lineman that isn't a true freshman, redshirt freshman or sophomore. Despite his seniority, Tonga had never played an FBS game before coming to FSU.

HOLLOWAY MOVES AHEAD

Senior fullback Seddrick Holloway has 27 career rushing attempts for 129 yards. In those 27 carries he has been dropped for minus yardage only once and has lost only one yard rushing in his career. Holloway has an ongoing streak of 15 consecutive carries without being dropped for a loss – a streak that dates to Florida State's victory over Boston College on Nov. 3, 2007.

BEHIND THE LINE

Junior defensive end Everette Brown finished the game versus Clemson with five tackles, three for tackles for loss and sacks. The three tackles for loss pushed Brown's career total to 40.0 moving him past Broderick Bunkley (37) into sole possession of fifth place all-time at Florida State. Kevin Emanuel currently sits in fourth place all-time with 41 career tackles for loss. Brown tied a single-game career-high with three sacks against the Tigers as he also registered three sacks earlier this year against Virginia Tech. With nine sacks on the season, Brown moved into a tie for 13th place all-time (Brodrick Bunkley - 2005, Reinard Wilson - 1995, Carl Simpson - 1992) for sacks in a single-season at FSU. Brown is now one of just four players in the country to be among the top five in tackles for loss per game and top ten in sacks per game. He is averaging 1.00 sack per game and has 15 tackles for loss on the year.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU?

Junior defensive end was a one-man wrecking crew versus the Tigers. Brown sacked the Clemson quarterbacks three times. Versus Virginia Tech Brown became the first FSU player to record three sacks in a game since Alonzo Jackson in 2002 when he recorded four versus Louisville. Brown set a single-game career-high with four tackles for loss against the Hokies. His three sacks set a new single-game career-high surpassing his previous record of two set last year against Alabama and Chattanooga earlier this year. The last time a Seminole recorded three or more sacks in two games during a season was in 1997. Greg Spires had four against North Carolina and three versus Wake Forest. Surprisingly, he was not the only Seminole to accomplish that during those two games, Andre Wadsworth posted three in each of those games as well.

ANOTHER TFL

Junior defensive end Everette Brown continues to make big plays for FSU. With three sacks in the Clemson game, he passed Broderick Bunkley for sole possession of 5th

all time on FSU's career tackles for loss list. It is the eighth time in nine games this season that Brown has been credited with a tackle for loss. He needs one more to tie for fourth all time.

BROWN BRINGS THEM DOWN

Everette Brown added to his career sack total (18.5) with three versus Clemson. It was Brown's third multi-sack game of the season. Brown's two sacks in the first half versus UTC marked the first time a Seminole had a multi-sack game since Geno Hayes recorded two versus NC State in 2007. You have to go back to 2002 to find the last game in which a Florida State player had three or more sacks before Brown matched that mark versus the Hokies.

SEMINOLES' DEFENSE STOPS THE RUN

Florida State's defense limited Clemson to a total of 79 yards rushing in its victory over the Tigers. It marked the third fewest rushing total of the season by Clemson's offense. It also marked the sixth time this season the Seminoles' defense had held its opponent under 100 yards rushing on offense. The Seminoles are 5-1 this season when they hold their opponent to less than 100 yards rushing.

RUSH DEFENSE BEST SINCE 2004

Florida State's rushing defense is limiting its opponents to 102.9 yards per game, 3.2 yards per carry and has allowed only eight rushing touchdowns in the first nine games of the season. The Seminoles' defense has not been that stingy against the run since the 2004 season when it allowed 83.1 yards per game, 2.4 yards per carry and a total of five rushing touchdowns by their 12 opponents. The Seminoles held seven opponents under 100 yards rushing including holding UAB to -24 yards on the ground on Sept. 18, 2004.

NOT GIVING UP MANY YARDS

Florida State's defense is among the nation's best ranking 5th in the FBS overall. There is a key statistical comparison clearly showing one reason why the Seminoles are a much improved team this season as compared to last season. The Seminoles are allowing nearly 100 yards of total offense less per game than they did last season. In limiting their opponents' total offensive yards, the Seminoles are allowing 3.6 points per game fewer than then did last season in finishing 7-6.

MORE ON FLORIDA STATE'S DEFENSE

Florida State's defense is limiting its opponents to an average of 265.6 yards of total offense. That is the

lowest per game average allowed since the Seminoles' 1998 team allowed 214.8 yards of total offense per game finishing with an 11-2 record and playing for the National Championship in the Fiesta Bowl against Tennessee. The Seminoles' dominating defense is limiting its opponents to the sixth lowest average total of offensive yards per game during the Bobby Bowden era (1976-Present).

SIX SACKS AGAINST CLEMSON

Led by defensive end Everette Brown's single-season career-high 10 sacks, the Seminoles have record 28 sacks in the first nine games of the season. The Seminoles' tied their season high with six sacks in their victory against Clemson on Nov. 8. Florida State has recorded 12 sacks in its last three games with six each coming in victories over Virginia Tech and Clemson. Florida State's 28 sacks this season are only one fewer than they totaled in 13 games in 2007 and are one more than they totaled in 13 games during the 2006 season.

SACKING THE QUARTERBACK AT A HIGH RATE

Florida State is averaging 3.1 sacks per game. That's the highest per game average for the Seminoles' since the 2005 season when they averaged 3.4 sacks per game on their way to the ACC Championship. Florida State defeated Virginia Tech in the ACC Championship game and lost in overtime to Penn State in the Orange Bowl.

MOFFETT MAKING THE MOST OF HIS TACKLES

Defensive lineman Neefy Moffett has six total tackles this season with four of those six counting as tackles for loss and three counting as sacks. During his career Moffett has a total of 47 tackles with more than one-third of his total tackles (17.5 / .372) coming as tackles for loss and more than 15 percent (7.5 / .160) coming as quarterback sacks. Moffett has a career-high 3.0 sacks on the season and 13 tackles for loss in the last two seasons.

FIRST INTERCEPTION...FIRST TOUCHDOWN

Senior defensive end Neefy Moffett came up with a great time to collect his first career interception. Moffett picked off Cullen Harper in the first quarter versus Clemson and returned the interception 18 yards for a Seminole touchdown tying the game at 10-10. It was the sixth interception of the season for the Seminole defense and the first interception returned for a touchdown. The last time such a feat happened was in 2007 when Dekoda Watson returned an interception 40 yards for a TD against Virginia Tech.

NEEFY GRABS FIRST INT AND TD OF HIS CAREER

Senior defensive end Neefy Moffett came into the Clemson game telling his coaches he was going to score and he did just that in the first quarter of the game. He picked off a pass from Cullen Harper on the third play of the drive. The interception also marked the first in his career and the sixth of the season for the Seminole defense.

MOFFETT'S ON TOP OF IT

In just six games played this season (Colorado, Miami, NC State, Virginia Tech, Georgia Tech and Clemson), defensive end Neefy Moffett already ranks second on the team in sacks with three. He now has 7.5 sacks in his career. With his sack in the fourth quarter of Clemson game he reached a season-high three sacks.

FOURTH QUARTER SHUTOUT AGAINST JACKETS

Florida State's defense pitched a fourth quarter shutout against Georgia Tech as it nearly rallied for one of the top comeback victories in program history against the Yellow Jackets. The Seminoles held Georgia Tech scoreless over the final 28:42 of the game as they fell just short of the victory. The Yellow Jackets were limited to 65 total yards on 19 plays and did not complete a pass in the final five drives of the games - in fact the only completed pass by a Yellow Jacket quarterback in the second half came on an interception by the Seminoles' Patrick Robinson late in the fourth quarter. The Seminoles' fourth quarter shutout was just their third of the season with the first two coming against Western Carolina and Chattanooga in the first two games of the season.

SECOND HALF D AGAINST GEORGIA TECH

Florida State's defense allowed only seven second half points and did not allow the Yellow Jackets to put a point on the scoreboard in the final 28:42 of the game. The seven second half points allowed by the Seminoles' defense marked the third consecutive game the Seminoles had allowed only one touchdown in the second half. Florida State has held its last four opponents - NC State, Virginia Tech, Georgia Tech and Clemson to a total of 31 second half points and a total of 436 second half yards.

NO PASSING TOUCHDOWNS

Florida State's defense held Georgia Tech without a passing touchdown - the third time this season it has held its opponent without a passing touchdown. The Seminoles also held Western Carolina and Wake Forest from getting into the end zone through the air.

ROBINSON PICKS ON THE ACC

Junior cornerback Patrick Robinson earned his first interception of the 2008 season and the seventh of his career when he picked off a fourth quarter pass against

Georgia Tech. His interception began the Seminoles' near game-winning drive that ended in a turnover on the three-yard line with less than one minute to play against the Yellow Jackets. With his interception against Georgia Tech Robinson has now earned seven in his career with all seven coming in ACC play. Robinson earned a single-season career-high six interceptions as a sophomore in 2007 with picks coming against NC State, Wake Forest, Miami, Duke, Boston College (in a school record five consecutive game stretch) and Maryland. Clemson is one of only three ACC teams that Robinson does not have an interception against. Robinson is also interception-less against both Virginia Tech (two games) and Virginia (one game).

NICHOLSON CLIMBING THE TFL CHART

Senior linebacker Derek Nicholson recorded one tackle for loss against Clemson to bring his season total of 10 through the nine games of this season. His 10.0 tackles for loss ranks as a personal single-season career-high and is the same as what he had during the first three years of his career. Nicholson enters this week's game with 20.0 career tackles for loss and is approaching the Seminoles' all-time top-20 for career tackles for loss. He needs only one tackle for loss to move into a tie for 10th place in school history with Derrick Alexander (1992-94) who earned 21 tackles for loss in his career.

LOOKING INTO NICHOLSON'S NUMBERS

Senior linebacker Derek Nicholson leads FSU in tackles (54), unassisted tackles (34) and is tied for quarterback hurries (three) and recovered fumbles (one) while ranking second in tackles for loss (10.0) and forced fumbles (one). After earning a total of 27 tackles and 20 tackles for loss in the first two years and 18 games of his career he has earned 153 tackles and 18.0 tackles for loss in his last two years and 22 games.

NEVER TOO OLD TO DO SOMETHING NEW

Senior Derek Nicholson has started 24 straight games for FSU but that doesn't mean the linebacker has done it all. The first turnover of the game versus Virginia Tech was caused by the senior linebacker who forced a fumble and recovered the loose ball off a carry over the left end by Hokie tailback Josh Oglesby. It marked Nicholson's second forced fumble but the first fumble recovery of his career.

CONVERSION DEFENSE NATION'S BEST

Florida State's defense held Virginia Tech to a nine percent success rate (one of 11) on third down conversion attempts in its victory over the Hokies. The Seminoles' defense has allowed their opponents to convert on less than one-fifth (21 of 116, 18 percent) of their third down conversion attempts and just below half of their fourth down conversion attempts (9 of 20, .450) this season. FSU's third down conversion defense is best in the FBS by a large margin.

Georgia Tech's Jonathan Dwyer's 145 yards rushing marked the most rushing yards the FSU defense has allowed this season and just the second 100-yard game by an opposing player this year. Colorado's Rodney Steward surpassed the century mark with 107 yards in the victory by the Seminoles. The Yellow Jackets' 288 team rushing yards is the most FSU has allowed this season as the previous high was 157 yards rushing by NC State.

THE LAST TIME

Heading into the Georgia Tech game, the FSU defense had only allowed three rushing TDs all season but the Yellow Jackets more than doubled that total with four rushing touchdowns. The last time FSU's defense allowed four rushing TDs in a game was against NC State on

November 10, 2001 when the Wolfpack took a 34-28 victory. Of GT's four rushing touchdowns, three came in the first half. The last time FSU gave up three rushing TDs in a half was way back on January 2, 1997 when Florida scored three touchdowns on the ground in the second half of the National Championship game at the Sugar Bowl. The last time FSU allowed three rushing touchdowns in a first half was November 19, 1993 when Notre Dame led 21-7 in the first half and went on to win the game 31-24.

FSU AT THE TOP OF THE ACC IN SACKS

Florida State, which has earned at least two sacks in seven of its nine games of the 2008 season, is first in the ACC in sacks with 28. The Seminoles have led the ACC in sacks four times since joining the ACC for the 1992 season.

VERDELL OFF TO BEST EVER START

Senior linebacker Toddrick Verdell has more tackles for lost yardage (4.5) in the first nine games of the 2008 season than he did in the first 17 games and two seasons of his career (1.0). In addition, his three tackles in the Seminoles' game against Clemson gave him 41 for the season which is a single-season high for the senior. Verdell totaled 22 tackles in 10 games as a junior during the 2007 season.

TWO FOR TONY

Tony Carter recorded his second interception of the Miami game in the fourth quarter. Carter was also the last player to record two interceptions in one game and he did it last year at Colorado. Carter now has nine career INTs which puts him tied for 19th with 10 other Seminoles on FSU's career interceptions list. The last player to crack FSU's career interceptions list was Pat Watkins with 10 from 2002-05. Carter has only had one career interception at Doak Campbell Stadium and that was November 4th 2006 in the 33-0 win over Virginia. The other eight have been on the road, including his last seven straight interceptions.

FIRST TIME STARTER

Freshman Nigel Bradham became the sixth true freshman to start a game on offense or defense this season for the Seminoles when he opened the game on the field versus Miami. He joined Moses McCray as only the second true freshman to start on defense.

SEMINOLES GET PUSH UP FRONT

Florida State's defense tied its season-high six quarterback sacks in their victory over Clemson (the other game was Virginia Tech). The Seminoles are averaging more sacks per game (3.1) than they have in the past three years since the 2005 season when they averaged 3.4 sacks per game.

WATSON MAKES IMMEDIATE IMPACT

Dekoda Watson set a career-high for tackles in a game with 10 (7 solo, 3 assisted) in his first game back against Colorado. His previous high was eight set on two prior

occasions, against Boston College in 2006 and Wake Forest in 2007.

ONE PLAY, TWO FIRSTS FOR KENDALL SMITH

Sophomore Kendall Smith was credited with his first career sack and first career forced fumble in the second quarter versus Wake Forest. Smith got to Demon Deacon quarterback Riley Skinner in the backfield on the Deacs' fifth offensive possession of the game forcing the first Wake Forest turnover of the game.

SWEET SHUTOUT

The 69-0 victory for Florida State over Western Carolina was the first shutout for the Seminoles since taking a 33-0 victory over Virginia on November 4, 2006 at Doak Campbell Stadium. The last time Florida State had pitched a shutout in the season opener came in their 37-0 win over North Carolina on August 30, 2003 in Chapel Hill, N.C. That year they went on to win 10 games and win the Atlantic Coast Conference. It was the seventh season opening shutout in the Bowden era.

GRANO HAS MADE 17 CONSECUTIVE FIELD GOALS

Senior place kicker Graham Gano has made 17 consecutive field goals, a school record. His three field goal effort against the Hokies helped put Gano's name into the record books with 13 straight. The previous mark of 12 was set by Bill Capece during the 1980 season. Gano has made 17 of his 18 attempts this season with his only miss coming in the first attempt of his career against Wake Forest (from 52 yards).

GRANO HITTING FROM 50

Senior Graham Gano, who made a career-long 53-yard field goal in the Seminoles' victory over Miami and then tied that mark versus NC State, has now made five straight field goals of 50 yards or more. He made a 50-yard attempt against the Hokies making him the only player in school history to kick even field goals of 50 yards or more in four consecutive games. He also became only the third FSU player to make five or more field goals of 50 yards or more in a career.

...He totaled 11 of the Seminoles' 41 points in their victory over Clemson. It marked the fifth time in the seven games he has kicked in this season that he has scored in double figures. Gano averages 10.3 points scored per game - nearly as many as Wyoming (11.8 points scored per game) who is the lowest scoring team in the College Football Bowl Subdivision;

...He hasn't missed a kick (point after touchdown or field goal) since the second quarter of the Seminoles' game against Wake Forest on Sept. 20. He has made 38 consecutive kicks (21 PAT's and 17 field goals);

...He averages 9.8 points scored in six ACC games and totaled his career-high of 14 points in the Seminoles' 26-17 victory over NC State.

...He totaled a career-high 18 kicks against Clemson (two field goals, five PAT's, three punts and eight kickoffs.).

WELCOME BACK GRAHAM

Graham Gano tore his meniscus in late August. After surgery and rehab, Gano missed the first two games of the season before returning versus Wake Forest. The first field goal attempt of his career was from 52-yards and it just went wide left. Since that kick, Gano is 17-for-17 including an FBS-best five field goals from 50+ yards. Gano has four of the 14 longest field goals kicked this season in the FBS and he is the only kicker to make more than one field goal of 53 yards (he has 2).

GRANO SETTING THE STANDARD

Graham Gano was not even on the preseason watch list for the Lou Groza Award, which was no big surprise since he had never kicked a field goal in college prior to 2008. Then he missed the first two games of the season due to injury so it was going to take a massive effort to get the Seminole on the list of 20 semifinalists and that's just what the senior has turned in. Not only has he put his name in the hat, he looks to be one of the favorites for the award now. None of the 20 semifinalists has more than two field goals from 50 yards while Gano has five. He is one of only three kickers on the list averaging two or more field goals per game and he leads the entire group in that category. His field goal percentage is the third-highest on the list and the second-best among players with 10 or more field goals made.

How important has kicker Graham Gano been in 2008? The senior kicker has accounted for 69 of FSU's 205 points in the last six games. That means 34% of the team's points have been courtesy of Gano's right foot. Gano scored double digit points in five games, which four were made consecutively from Colorado to Virginia Tech. Gano's first of the year, while it was the first Florida State punt not taken by Shawn Powell in 2008. Gano tallied 155 yards on three punts in the game good for an average of almost 52.0 yards per punt. As a junior, Gano recorded 16 punts of 50 yards or more. As Gano continues to heal from pre-season MCL surgery, he gets closer to fulfilling his intended role as punter, place kicker and kick-off specialist.

RETURN THE FAVOR

Florida State's return game has been as good as it has been in years in 2008. For the first time since 1992 the Seminoles have returned a punt and a kick-off for a touchdown in the same season. Tony Carter took a punt back for six versus Western Carolina and Michael Ray Garvin returned a kick-off for a TD versus Colorado. Those aren't the only big plays supplied out of the return game. This season the Seminoles have totaled five returns of 40 yards or more in just eight games. That is more than 2007 (4), 2006 (2) and 2005 (3).

That is the percentage of Gano's six punts that have traveled at least 50 yards. That is close to the answer but the correct number is 75%. With his participation in the Georgia Tech game Gano reached that magical number meaning he has played in 75% of the Seminoles games and can now qualify for the NCAA stats where he debuted at No. 1 for FG per game in the FBS. Gano, who was not included in the national stats, has been quietly having the best year in America but now everyone will get a chance to see his name. He ranks fifth in scoring with 10.91 points per game, more than any other kicker. Gano leads the nation in field goals per game (2.43) and most 50 yards field goals (5), he is second in field goal percentage (.944) and is tied sixth in field goals made (17) despite missing two games this year due to injury.

GARVIN SETTING THE STANDARD

Senior speedster Michael Ray Garvin is currently leading the nation in kick-off returns and is on a school-record pace with 34.3 yards per kickoff return average this season. He has amassed 411 yards (the 18th highest single season total in school history) on 12 returns through the first eight games of the 2008 season. He had one return for 64 yards against Georgia Tech.

GARVIN TAKES IT TO THE HOUSE

Senior Michael Ray Garvin earned his first career touchdown on a kickoff return as he gave the Seminoles a 25-14 fourth quarter lead over Colorado with a career-long 94-yard kickoff return. His return was the first kickoff returned for a touchdown by a Seminole player since Leon Washington returned a kickoff 97 yards for a touchdown against Clemson on Oct. 3, 2002 in Doak Campbell Stadium. That was a stretch of 75 games without a kick-off return TD. Garvin's 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown is tied for the 10th longest in school history and marked the 17th time in school history that a kickoff had been returned for a touchdown.

WATSON HOLDS PERSONAL BLOCK PARTY

Junior linebacker Dekoda Watson blocked the second punt of his career in the Seminoles' victory over Colorado. He blocked a Matt DiLallo punt in the second

quarter which was recovered in the end zone by Colorado for a safety. The safety was part of a flurry of action which saw Florida State score 12 points in a span of just under 2:00 at the end of the second quarter. The flurry helped the Seminoles push a 7-7 tie with under three minutes left in the first half to a 19-7 lead at halftime. Watson's blocked punt was the second of his career - he also blocked a third quarter punt against UCLA in the 2006 Emerald Bowl. His blocked punt led to a 25 yard touchdown run by Lawrence Timmons. The Seminoles also won that game, 44-27.

HAS IT BEEN THAT LONG?

Senior Tony Carter got the season off to a good start for the FSU special teams. The first time a Seminole touched the ball in 2008, it turned into a touchdown. After the FSU defense forced Western Carolina to punt on the first possession of the season, Carter took the punt back 68 yards for the score. That set the table for what has been a phenomenal first half of the season for the FSU special teams. Michael Ray Garvin is the nation's third-leading kick returner, Graham Gano is having one of the best seasons in the nation among field goal kickers and outside of one sloppy game in Miami, the punt team featuring true freshman Shawn Powell has been solid. Another sign that this is a good year for the FSU special teams is the fact that the Seminoles have returned a punt and a kick-off for TDs this season. The last time that happened was 1992 when Shannon Baker had a kick-off return TD and Corey Sawyer and Clifton Abraham both returned punts for scores.

BOWDEN BALL

Frank Beamer isn't the only coach in the ACC who knows how to get his team to block kicks. Dekoda Watson's punt block in the second quarter versus Colorado was the 127th blocked kick in the Bowden era at FSU. Last season FSU blocked two kicks, both punts and have matched that so far this season. The blocked punt makes it four in a row. The last time the Seminoles had four or more consecutive blocked kicks from punts was from 2003-05 when FSU had 10 consecutive blocked kicks that came from punts. The blocked punt versus UTC went out of the endzone for a safety marking the first time FSU scored a safety off a blocked kick under Bowden. Lightning struck in similar fashion for the Seminoles in the second quarter against Colorado when a blocked punt also netted FSU two points.

CARTER RETURNS PUNT FOR TOUCHDOWN

Tony Carter took the first punt return of the season 68 yards for a touchdown versus Western Carolina. It was Carter's first career touchdown on a punt return and fifth touchdown return overall. Carter has three career interception returns (35-yards vs. UVa - 2006; 86-yards vs. UCLA - 2006; 24-yards vs. Kentucky - 2007) and one blocked field goal return (69-yards vs. Clemson - 2006). The senior from Jacksonville, Fla., also added a blocked PAT for two points to his resume in 2006 (vs. Clemson). The punt return was just the second of his career. Carter's first return off a punt came in 2006 as he tallied 19 yards.

The Seminoles' 199 kickoff return yards against the Buffaloes marked the fourth highest single game total in school history.

TWO OF THE NATION'S BEST STREAKS

Florida State became bowl eligible with its seventh game of the season as it defeated Clemson, 41-27, on Nov. 8. It marked the 27 consecutive season the Seminoles have earned at least seven victories in a season and the 32nd consecutive season the Seminoles will finish with a .500 or better record. Florida State achieved its seventh victory of the 2006 season with a 44-27 victory over UCLA in the Emerald Bowl on Dec. 27 and won its seventh game of the 2007 season with a victory over Maryland on Nov. 17. With Michigan eliminated from bowl consideration, FSU now jumps to the top of the list for consecutive bowl appearances at 27. The next longest streak after FSU is Florida's 17-game run of consecutive bowl game appearances.

RED ZONE SUCCESS

Florida State is doing an unbelievable job inside the 20 on both sides of the ball. The Seminole defense ranks 12th in the FBS in red zone efficiency and the FSU offense is No. 15. Florida State is one of only five teams in the FBS with its offense and defense in the top 15 for red zone efficiency. Florida, Vanderbilt, Arkansas State and Texas are the only other teams with both sides of the ball among the best inside the 20.

TACK ON TWO

FSU cut the Georgia Tech lead to 31-28 thanks to a two-point conversion from Christian Ponder to Greg Carr. It was the first time FSU hooked up on a two-point conversion since 2006 versus Clemson. Drew Weatherford connected with Chris Davis for a two-pointer in that 27-20 loss.

KEY QUARTERS

If you are looking for reasons the Seminoles are 7-2, just look to the second and fourth quarters, Florida State is dominating the quarters before the half and before the end of the game. FSU has trailed in time of possession in the second quarter just three times and has only trailed in that category once in the fourth. Overall, the Seminoles have a 16:00 advantage in second quarter TOP and almost a 25:00 advantage in the fourth. While the second quarter has been the best for FSU as far as scoring goes (95-41), the fourth quarter performance by the team has been crucial. When you outscore your opponents in the last quarter (83-55) and average 5:00 more possession time per game, that is a formula for success.

SEMINOLES HOLD ONTO THE BALL AGAINST UM

Florida State held the football for 39:23 during its victory over Miami. The Seminoles' time of possession against the Hurricanes works out to more than 65 percent of the entire game. During the 41-39 win, Florida State ran a season-high 85 plays (it averaged 64.3 offensive plays per game in its first four games of the season) and ran 22 more offensive plays than Miami. The last time the Seminoles' offense held the ball longer was against Duke during the 2007 season when they held it for 39:38 in a 25-6 win over the Blue Devils.

2 IN 2 1/2

This summer something pretty remarkable took place in the Tallahassee Leon County Civic Center where FSU holds all of its graduation ceremonies. The summer commencement was a little more special than usual and that was due to two Seminole football players. Quarterback Christian Ponder and rover Myron Rolle both earned their undergraduate degrees that day. When any student completes their degree in 2 1/2 years it is amazing but when a student-athlete is able to do that it is extra special. Ponder and Rolle came into school as part of the same recruiting class and they are the only two FBS teammates to graduate in 2 1/2 years and they did it with identical 3.7 GPAs. Rolle (exercise science) and Ponder (finance) both received their undergraduate degrees in August and both are now pursuing their masters.

JUST THE FIFTH TIME?

Over the years, one of the thorns in head coach Bobby Bowden's side was close losses versus the Hurricanes. From 1975-2004, the Seminoles lost all nine games in the series decided by a field goal or less. That has changed as of late. With FSU's 41-39 win versus Miami this year, the Seminoles last three wins over the Canes (2005, 2006 and 2008) have all been decided by three

points or less. The win over Miami was actually just the fifth win for FSU by three points or less this decade. Since 2000 Florida State is just 5-6-0 in games decided by three points or fewer. Five of those six losses came versus Maryland and Miami and all six of those defeats came away from home. The last time FSU lost a game by three points or less in Doak Campbell Stadium was 1991 when the Seminoles lost 17-16 to Miami.

Last year when the NFL opened its 2007 campaign, Florida State was third for the most former players on opening day rosters. That ranking improved in 2008. On opening weekend 37 former Seminoles were on NFL rosters second only to another ACC school (Miami - 44). FSU leapt over Ohio State to claim second place. Overall the ACC trails only the SEC for the most players on opening day rosters. The SEC barely edged out the ACC with 259 players compared to the ACC's 255.

PLAYING THE BEST

The Florida State Seminole football team has always had one of the toughest non-conference schedules among BCS football schools. That national reputation for being willing to play some of the stiffest competition was once again illustrated in a September 5 report by Thomas Neumann on ESPN.com. According to Neumann's neutral research, the Seminoles have played more non-conference games against members of BCS-level conferences than any other BCS football program in the nation. Heading into the current campaign, since the 1998 season, FSU has played 37 non-conference tilts and 26 of them have come against fellow BCS member schools, a 70.3% clip. Over that span, the Seminoles are 16-10 against BCS schools while also holding a 9-1 record against FBS schools that hail from outside the BCS ranks. Neumann published a Top 10 list that illustrated the BCS schools that play the highest percentage of games against fellow BCS schools and seven Atlantic Coast Conference schools appeared on the list including: FSU (1st), Georgia Tech

(3rd), North Carolina (5th), Miami (8th), Clemson (T-9th), Duke (T-9th) and Virginia (T-9th). Notably, the Seminoles out-ranked Southern California, who has played 64.9% of its games in the last 10 seasons against members of BCS conferences, for the top spot on Neumann's list as well as UCLA (4th), Michigan State (6th), Iowa (7th), Penn State (T-9th) and Syracuse (T-9th).

BEST WEEK EVER

When head coach Bobby Bowden announced the 2008 team captains at the 57th annual kickoff luncheon the biggest smiles came when senior Benjamin Lampkin was named the special teams captain. The Panama City native has been a member of the FSU football team since 2004. He started out as a walk-on linebacker, moved to defensive end in 2007, played significant minutes in the Music City Bowl, was awarded a scholarship this pre-season and then named a captain. Lampkin has been an ACC Academic Honor Roll member and has worked his way up from not seeing any game action in 2004 and 2005 to a scholarship captain.

HE REALLY CAN DO IT ALL

What can't Myron Rolle do? The junior graduated in just over two years, he has started 26 consecutive games since his true freshman season, he is applying for a Rhodes Scholarship, studying to become a doctor and serving on the Athletic Board at FSU on top of a million other things. Among everything else he found time to write a season preview for a major newspaper. You may have heard of it 'The New York Times'. Myron's FSU season preview appeared in the August 24 edition of the Sunday Times.

THIS IS MORE LIKE IT

For just the second time in Bobby Bowden's FSU career, his Seminoles played seven regular season games away from home in 2007. The only other time the Seminoles played away from home seven times was in 2002. Last year the Florida State football team traveled 4,996 miles to get to its seven games. You have to go back 30 years to find the last FSU team that traveled more cumulative miles to get to its games. In 1977 the Seminoles logged 5,575 miles to get to its six road games. That won't be the case in 2008. Nine of Florida State's 12 games this season will be played in the state of Florida. The Seminoles have seven home games, a game versus Colorado in Jacksonville and then a trip to Miami. When you add a short trip to Atlanta for the Georgia Tech game, that leaves FSU with just two trips of any significance as far as travel goes and those are to Raleigh, NC and College Park, MD.

NEW LOOK DOAK

There are going to be a lot of changes in Doak Campbell Stadium for the 2008 season. The most obvious additions are the new scoreboards and ribbon boards. FSU now has a 100-foot high-quality digital video board in the north endzone and a 24'x'45 video board in the south endzone where there was no board in the past. There is also 500 feet of ribbon board added to the stadium as well. For the first time since 1984 the endzones have been re-designed and there is also a new team entrance featuring the Marching Chiefs with Osceola & Renegade.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Christian Ponder threw three touchdowns passes and backup D'Vontrey Richardson ran for two more scores to lead Florida State to a 69-0 win over Western Carolina on Saturday night in a game interrupted more than two hours by lightning.

Ponder, making his first college start after throwing only 18 passes for the Seminoles, completed 11 of 17 passes for 196 yards before giving way to Richardson after the first series of the second half.

Richardson ran for a 52-yard score on his second play and moments later scored on a 7-yard run as Florida State (1-0) took a 48-0 lead early in the third quarter. He also hit Jamon Fortson with a 3-yard TD pass.

Florida State coach Bobby Bowden claimed his 374th career win to stay abreast of Penn State's Joe Paterno as the winningest major college coach. Penn State beat Oregon State earlier Saturday.

With more than a dozen players, including several starters, sitting out, 22 true freshmen played for the Seminoles and two scored touchdowns - Fortson and Jermaine Thomas, who ran for two TDs.

Western Carolina (1-1) trailed by only a touchdown, 7-0, midway through the second quarter before surrendering three quick touchdowns in the final 6:54 of the half.

Tony Carter's 68-yard punt return 1:49 into the game spotted the unranked Seminoles a quick lead, but the game was stopped after the point-after kick for 55 minutes and Ponder and the offense seemed out of sync when the game first resumed.

The 6-foot-2, 218-pound Ponder, who beat out incumbent starter Drew Weatherford for the starting job this fall, shook off a sluggish start and completed seven of 10 passes for 123 yards in the second quarter. In the period, he teamed with Bert Reed on a 41-yard scoring pass and then hit Corey Surrency with a 7-yard TD throw to give the Seminoles a 28-0 at the break.

On Florida State's opening drive of the second half, Ponder hit 6-6 Greg Carr with a 54-yard scoring pass as the Seminoles took a 35-0 lead.

The start of the game was delayed by 1 hour, 21 minutes because of lightning and then for another 55 minutes right after Carter's touchdown.

Florida State is 3-0 against the outgunned Catamounts - a member of the NCAA's Football Championship Subdivision formerly known as I-AA - outscoring the Southern Conference school by an aggregate 175-20.

Ponder - Owens Connection

In Florida State's first scoring drive of the season, starting quarterback Christian Ponder was a perfect 3-for-3 connecting all three times with junior wide out Rod Owens. Owens established a career-high with 50 receiving yards on the drive surpassing his previous career-high of 45 yards against Florida in 2007. Owens caught six passes for 55 yards a season ago. Owens added one more catch later in the second quarter tying his career-high in receptions with four (vs. Florida, 2007). He finished the first half with 4 catches for 61 yards.

Touchdown For Antone

Tailback Antone Smith recorded the first offensive touchdown for the Seminoles with a 5-yard run in the second quarter. It was Smith's first touchdown since scoring on a 5-yard run against Alabama on September 29, 2007 in Jacksonville, a span of eight games.

FSU 46 -- Chattanooga 7 (Sept. 13, 2008)

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Christian Ponder threw three first-half touchdown passes and Florida State wrapped up its Saturday with a 46-7 victory over Chattanooga.

The Seminoles (2-0) had three touchdowns on the board just 12 minutes into the game and led 30-7 at the half.

Coach Bobby Bowden collected career win No. 375, staying abreast of Penn State's Joe Paterno.

Florida State begins the meatier part of its schedule next Saturday when Wake Forest (2-0) visits in search of a third straight win over the Seminoles in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both teams.

A sophomore making his second collegiate start for the Seminoles, Ponder threw to 6-foot-5 Corey Surrency for 44- and 39-yard touchdowns. He also teamed with Antone Smith on an 8-yard scoring pass. Smith added a 12-yard TD run.

Ponder, who beat out three-year incumbent Drew Weatherford for the starting job, has thrown six TD passes in two games without an interception.

And for the second straight week, second-team quarterback D'Vontrey Richardson came up big as well - throwing for 117 yards, including a 36-yard touchdown to Bert Reed.

Richardson ran for another, his third of the season. His 55-yard run was the longest scoring run by a quarterback in Florida State history - a record he'd set last week with a 52-yard scoring burst.

Florida State is 2-0 against the Mocs, also winning in 1984, 37-0.

What A Scoring Streak

What a start to the 2008 season for the Seminole offense. Between nine consecutive TD drives to end the Western Carolina game in the season opener and three consecutive TD drives to open the Chattanooga game, FSU scored a touchdown on 12 consecutive drives. The streak came to a conclusion when Chattanooga held the Seminoles to a Zach Hobby field goal attempt that bounced off the uprights on FSU's fourth drive of the game.

First Half, For Starters

Florida State's 30 points in the first half marks the most points that the Seminoles have scored in a first half since Sept. 29, 2001 when FSU scored 42 first half points on the way to a 48-24 win over Wake Forest in Doak Campbell Stadium. FSU scored 58 points in the first half of the season's two games combined.

Ponder Off To Hot Start

Christian Ponder raised his season total to six TD passes with three in the first half versus Chattanooga. The last time an FSU QB threw for three touchdowns in any half was November 3, 2001 in a 41-27 win at Clemson. Chris Rix had three first half TD passes (one in the first quarter to Javon Walker and two in the second quarter to Talman Gardner and Walker again) in leading the Seminoles to victory.

He Did It Again

Offensive coordinator Jimbo Fisher said D'Vontrey Richardson can beat you from the pocket. The redshirt sophomore QB sure can beat teams from outside the pocket as well. Last week he tied the Florida State record for the longest TD run by a QB with a 52-yard jaunt that equaled a Bobby Renn TD run from 1957. Today he broke that record with a 55-yard touchdown run. It is the second longest run by a QB since Lee Corso's 60-yard rush in 1956 that unfortunately did not result in six points.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Sam Swank kicked four field goals and No. 18 Wake Forest forced seven Florida State turnovers in running its winning streak over the 24th-ranked Seminoles to three games with a 12-3 victory Saturday night.

The Seminoles (2-1, 0-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) sputtered all night on offense, losing two fumbles and throwing five interceptions.

Florida State's only points also came on a 37 yard field goal by Graham Gano. It was his first game since undergoing knee surgery on his right - kicking - leg Aug. 22.

Wake Forest's Riley Skinner completed 17 of 28 passes for 217 yards, but he committed a costly fumble at the Florida State 2 near the end of the first half that quashed a potential score.

Wake Forest got the ball back just minutes later when Brandon Ghee forced a fumble by Antone Smith that was recovered by Aaron Curry at Florida State's 27 yard line. An apparent Wake Forest touchdown pass was nullified by a holding penalty and then Swank missed for 27 yards wide right.

It was Swank's first missed field goal of the season and broke a string of nine straight including his first three this year.

Wake Forest drove to the Florida State 10 late in the second quarter. Swank trotted onto the field for another 27-yard attempt on fourth-and-one, but coach Jim Grobe changed his mind and called his star kicker back to the sideline.

Kenny Ingram knocked Skinner's pass down in the backfield and Florida State took over. Wake Forest soon got the ball back deep in Seminole territory when Ponder was intercepted by Kevin Patterson. He returned the ball 32 yards to Florida State's 17. Two plays later, though, Skinner ran the ball 11 yards to the Florida State 2 where he fumbled with 29 seconds left in the half.

The Streak Comes To An End

Graham Gano's 37-yard field goal in the third quarter was the first points scored against Wake Forest at home in 103 minutes and 58 seconds, a streak dating back to the fourth quarter in 2005. The last score for the Seminoles at home against the Demon Deacons came on Xavier Lee's 1-yard touchdown run in Florida State' 41-24 victory.

Carter Ties A Career-High In Tackles

Senior cornerback Tony Carter was credited with seven tackles (six solo and one assisted) in Saturday night's game against Wake Forest, tying a career-high. It marks the fifth time in his career that Carter has recorded seven tackles in a single game. The last time Carter recorded seven tackles in a game was in the 2007 Music City Bowl against Kentucky. Carter also registered a fumble recovery and a pass break-up in the game.

Seminoles Hold Rushing Advantage

The Seminoles finished the game out rushing the Demon Deacons 102-59 on Saturday night. It marked the first time since 2004 that Florida State out rushed the Deacs (138-133). Wake Forest held the rushing advantage in 2005 (247-192), 2006 (169-26) and 2007 (180-47).

FSU 39 -- Colorado 21 (Sept. 27, 2008)

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) - Antone Smith ran for 154 yards and three touchdowns Saturday as Florida State defeated previously unbeaten Colorado 39-21 in Bobby Bowden's 500th game as a college head coach.

Bowden, in his 43rd season as a head coach and 33rd at Florida State, notched his 376th career victory to momentarily catch Penn State's Joe Paterno, whose team was scheduled to play Illinois later Saturday.

Florida State (3-1) scored three times in the final 2:29 of the first half to take a 19-7 lead on the way to its first win of the season over a Bowl Subdivision team. The Seminoles opened the season with wins over Western Carolina and Chattanooga before last week's 12-3 loss to Wake Forest.

Smith, who carried 25 times, went 60 yards down his own left sideline with 2:29 left in the half to give the Seminoles a 14-7 lead.

After holding Colorado on downs deep in its own territory, Dekoda Watson blocked Matt DiLallo's punt out of the end zone for a safety and Graham Gano finished off the half with a 36-yard field goal. He added field goals of 52 and 44 yards in the second half.

Florida State relied on its running game for 259 yards while quarterback Christian Ponder completed just 10 of 22 passes for 119 yards and one interception.

Colorado's Cody Hawkins threw for 154 yards and three touchdowns, connecting with Josh Smith, Riar Geer and Patrick Devenny for scores.

Colorado (3-1) was unable to put much together offensively until an 80-yard scoring drive that culminated early in the fourth quarter on Hawkins 2-yard touchdown pass to Geer. That cut the lead to 25-14.

But Florida State's Michael Ray Garvin, a world class sprinter who qualified for the 2008 Olympic trials, answered 12 seconds later with a 94-yard kickoff return to give the Seminoles a 32-14 lead.

Florida State capitalized on an early Colorado turnover to grab a 7-0 lead three minutes into the game on Smith's first 2-yard TD run. Smith had all 27 yards on the drive, which followed a Neefy Moffett fumble recovery. Smith's third touchdown came with 3:37 left in the game.

Seminoles' River City Rushing Attack

Florida State's Antone Smith finished the first half against Colorado with a season-high 101 yards on the ground. The last Seminole to rush for over 100 yards in the first half was Leon Washington when he ran for 135 yards against West Virginia in Jacksonville in the 2005 Gator Bowl. Washington finished the game with 195 yards on the ground including a long of 69 yards. Smith finished with 154 yards in the game.

Garvin Takes One Back

Senior Michael Ray Garvin registered a 94-yard kickoff return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter, his first career special team's touchdown. It snapped a string of 75 consecutive games before the last FSU kickoff return for a touchdown when Leon Washington returned a kickoff 97 yards against Clemson in 2002.

200-Yard Rushing Games

With 259 yards on the ground in Saturday's 39-21 victory over Colorado, Florida State tallied its second 200-yard rushing game of the season (290 yards vs. Western Carolina). FSU has gained over 100 yards on the ground in all four games this year.

MIAMI (AP) - Antone Smith rushed for a career-best four touchdowns, including a game-clinching 20-yarder with 3:57 remaining, and Florida State wasted most of an early 24-point lead before hanging on to beat Miami 41-39 on Saturday.

Smith - who scored three TDs last week - finished with 92 yards on 27 carries for the Seminoles (4-1, 1-1 ACC), who handed Miami its second straight home loss on a stormy afternoon. Christian Ponder ran for 144 yards, becoming the first Florida State quarterback since Charlie Ward in 1992 to run for triple-figures, and Tony Carter made two interceptions for the Seminoles. Travis Benjamin had an 18-yard touchdown run on an end-around, caught a 51-yard TD pass from running back Graig Cooper, and finished with 274 all-purpose yards for Miami (2-3, 0-2), which has lost 12 of its last 15 conference games.

The Hurricanes trailed 24-3 at the half and 31-10 in the third quarter, then closed to within 34-32 with 8 minutes remaining. Two botched snaps on Florida State punts led to Miami points, Sean Spence ran an interception in for a touchdown and the Hurricanes seemed poised for what would have been an enormous rally. But Smith sealed the win with a third-down run up the middle, giving coach Bobby Bowden just his 14th win in 34 games all-time against Miami. Smith's other scoring runs were for 2, 19 and 5 yards, part of Florida State's 281-yard rushing day as a team. Ponder completed 14 of 31 passes for 159 yards for Florida State, including a 15-yard score to Greg Carr, and looked at ease in his first taste of the Seminoles-Hurricanes rivalry.

Miami left tackle Jason Fox rushed for a 5-yard touchdown with 14 seconds remaining, but the onside kick was controlled by the Seminoles, as a downpour made it difficult from one sideline to see the other. Ponder knelt for the final play, and the Seminoles began leaping in celebration - knowing they just dealt their biggest league rival a huge blow. Florida State scored the game's first 24 points and wound up holding a 440-256 edge in total yards, largely because of Ponder's running ability. He had nine carries for 107 yards by intermission; in the previous 13 meetings between the teams, Florida State quarterbacks ran for a combined 111 yards on 99 attempts.

The first of Carter's interceptions set up Smith's opening score, and the Seminoles just kept rolling. When Graham Gano connected on a 53-yard field goal, the Seminoles had a 24-0 lead with 1:07 left in the half. An odd decision followed, giving Miami some life. Florida State tried a short kickoff after the long field goal, giving Miami possession at its own 48. The Hurricanes only got a field goal out of it on the final play of the half, but to coach Randy Shannon, that 28-yard kick by Matt Boshier was huge.

Smith fumbled early in the third quarter deep in Florida State territory, and Benjamin scored on the next play to give Miami some life. A high snap on a punt gave Miami a safety, Benjamin gave the Hurricanes great field position on the ensuing kickoff, and Cooper hit him with a perfect pass for a trick-play TD that drew the Hurricanes within 31-22. Miami hadn't had an interception return for a touchdown since 2003, but with 11:23 left, Spence - playing in place of injured linebacker Colin McCarthy - caught a deflected pass and rumbled seven yards to make the score 34-29, and Boshier got Miami within two points with a field goal three minutes later. But the Seminoles went back to what worked - Ponder and Smith running right at Miami, to put the game away.

Something To Ponder

With a career day, Christian Ponder recorded the second highest rushing total by a Seminole quarterback in FSU history with his 144 yards. Ken MacLean holds the record for a Seminole quarterback with 146 yards vs. Cumberland 60 years ago in 1948. Prior to today's performance by Ponder, the last FSU quarterback to rush for 100+ yards in a game was Charlie Ward with 111 yards vs. Maryland in 1992.

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) -- Christian Ponder threw for the go-ahead touchdown and Antone Smith ran for a score Thursday night to help Florida State beat North Carolina State 26-17.

Smith finished with 89 yards rushing for the Seminoles (5-1, 2-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), who trailed by four points early in the final quarter before scoring 13 straight to end the game. Bert Reed added the 17-yard catch for the lead and Graham Gano kicked four field goals--including a 53-yarder with 1:53 left to seal the win.

Russell Wilson threw for 181 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Wolfpack (2-5, 0-3).

The game marked a homecoming for Seminoles assistant Chuck Amato, who led the Wolfpack program for seven years before being fired at the end of the 2006 season and replaced by Tom O'Brien. Amato won 49 games and reached five bowl games, with most of that success coming during the career of four-year starter and NFL first-round draft pick Philip Rivers at quarterback.

Last year, the Wolfpack started 1-5 in O'Brien's first season heading into the off week, but came out of the break with four straight wins that put bowl eligibility within reach before closing with consecutive losses. The Wolfpack came out of this year's break with another surge--this one behind a once-anemic ground game.

N.C. State entered with an ACC-worst 80 yards rushing per game and faced the league's top run defense (64 yards per game), but rolled to a season-best 157 yards on 22 carries. Jamelle Eugene led the team with 74 yards on six carries, while Andre Brown added 50 yards.

That opened things downfield and set up Wilson's long play-action pass over the middle to Owen Spencer, who sprinted away from defender Korey Mangum for a 67-yard score and a 17-13 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter.

But Ponder directed a 70-yard drive to answer, pushing to N.C. State's 17 before finding Reed, who got a solid block at the line and then weaved through the Wolfpack defense for a 20-17 lead with 10:40 to play.

Then, after forcing a three-and-out, the Seminoles put together a drive that took more than 4 minutes. This one ended with a 44-yard field goal from Gano to make it 23-17 with 4:33 left, forcing the Wolfpack to go the distance to take the lead.

That was too much to ask, as N.C. State made two critical mistakes on its last best chance. First, a holding penalty negated a 14-yard run by Wilson to midfield, then Wilson took a sack and a 9-yard loss instead of throwing it away on third down. That forced N.C. State into a fourth-and-14 from its own 30, and Rod Roberts tipped Wilson's pass intended for Eugene to end the possession with 2:55 left.

RUSHING ALONG

Florida State ran for 138 yards in its victory over NC State. Florida State has now recorded 100+ rushing yards in each of its six games this season, marking the first time since 2004 that the Seminoles have recorded six straight 100 yard rushing games and the first time since 2002 that FSU has started a season with six straight 100 yard rushing games.

SMITH'S OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION

Antone Smith's third quarter 27-yard touchdown run in tonight's game, which put the Seminoles ahead 13-10, marked the senior's third straight game with a rush of 20 yards or more for a TD. He also recorded a 60-yard TD run in the win vs. Colorado in Jacksonville and a 20-yarder in the win at Miami. The Pahokee, Fla., native now has 10 rushing touchdowns this season, after having 11 career rushing touchdowns heading into the 2008 season, which ranks 10th on FSU's single-season rushing TD list.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Greg Carr made two finger-tip catches on long pass plays to set up touchdowns in the third quarter Saturday and 24th-ranked Florida State rallied from an early 10-point deficit to defeat Virginia Tech 30-20.

The win leaves Florida State (6-1, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) tied with Maryland for first place in the ACC's Atlantic Division and in control of its own destiny for a shot at the league's Dec. 6 championship game.

Carr, who had three catches for 100 yards, beat Hokies star cornerback Victor Harris for a 48-yard pass from Christian Ponder to set up the go-ahead score. Moments later his 39-yard catch along the sideline set up another touchdown that gave Florida State a 24-13 lead.

Taiwan Easterling's leaping catch just in front of the goal post on a high throw from Ponder gave Florida State its first lead, 17-13, and Marcus Sims scored from the 1 to hike the advantage to 24-13 after Carr's grab put the ball on the Virginia Tech doorstep.

Graham Gano added three more field goals and has now made a Florida State record 13 straight, including another from 50 yards or further for the fourth straight game.

Virginia Tech (5-3, 2-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) lost starting quarterback Tyrod Taylor on the first play of the game and backup Sean Glennon was knocked out in the third quarter. Both players had left ankle injuries.

Cory Holt finished for the Hokies and threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Andre Smith in the fourth quarter.

Losing Taylor was about the only thing that went wrong for the Hokies early as they built a 10-0 lead.

Dustin Keys' 15th field goal of the season started the scoring and Glennon pushed in from the 1 for a 10-0 lead while Virginia Tech's defense held Florida State to a minus 18 yards in the first quarter.

But the Seminoles caught up quick with 10 points in a span of just over three minutes early in the second quarter.

On a third-and-1, Antone Smith broke free around his own left side and zipped 39 yards down the sideline untouched for a touchdown. Gano kicked a 50-yard field goal moments later after Derek Nicholson forced a fumble by Tech's Josh Oglesby.

Keys' 20-yard field goal with three seconds left in the half that put the Hokies ahead 13-10.

Virginia Tech dominated the first half, rolling up 205 yards and 11 first downs while limited Florida State to only 70 yards and three first games, but the second half was a different story as Florida State's defense, which collected six sacks in the game, limited the Hokies to 38 yards.

It was coach Bobby Bowden's 379th career win.

12, 13 In A Row For Gano

Senior Graham Gano's 29-yard field goal in the fourth quarter was his second of the game. He added a 46-yard attempt with 2:14 left to play marking the third time this year that Gano has made three or more field goals in a game. His third field goal of the game was his 13th straight, setting the school record for consecutive field goals surpassing the previous record of 12 set by Bill Capece in 1980.

ATLANTA (AP) - Marcus Sims fumbled into the end zone to end No. 16 Florida State's comeback hopes in the final minute, and Georgia Tech held on to beat the Seminoles 31-28 on Saturday.

The Yellow Jackets beat Florida State for the first time since 1975, after going 0-12 against Bobby Bowden and the Seminoles in the ACC.

Cooper Taylor's hit popped the ball loose and Rashaad Reid recovered it with 45 seconds left. Florida State trailed 31-20 before scoring with 6:04 left and then got the ball back with an interception.

Florida State (6-2 overall, 3-2 ACC) ended its four-game winning streak because it couldn't stop Georgia Tech's big-play, option attack. Three of Georgia Tech's four touchdown drives lasted no longer than three plays.

The Yellow Jackets overcame the loss of quarterback Josh Nesbitt to an ankle injury.

Florida State backup D'Vontrey Richardson threw a 39-yard touchdown pass to Preston Parker with 6:04 left, and Christian Ponder's pass to Greg Carr for the 2-point conversion cut Georgia Tech's lead to 31-28.

Florida State's Patrick Robinson intercepted a pass from Georgia Tech freshman quarterback Jaybo Shaw with 5:49 left. Jermaine Thomas, who rushed for 130 yards, helped move Florida State into scoring position before Sims' fumble.

Shaw fumbled on his first play when hit by defensive end Everette Brown. Kendrick Stewart recovered at the Seminoles' 43, but Florida State gave the ball back when Ponder was stripped by Michael Johnson and Derrick Morgan recovered for the Yellow Jackets.

Dwyer found a big lane between left tackle Andrew Gardner and left guard Joseph Gilbert for his first long touchdown run, and only 30 seconds later Taylor intercepted a pass for Greg Carr deflected by Michael Peterson and returned the ball 28 yards to the Florida State 4.

Greg Smith scored on a pitch two plays later from the 4 for a 24-10 lead.

Florida State recovered to score the final 10 points of the half. A 62-yard run by Thomas set up Ponder's 4-yard touchdown pass to Seddrick Holloway, and Graham Gano added a 45-yard field goal late in the half.

Michael Ray Garvin had a 64-yard kickoff return in the first quarter to set up Gano's first field goal before leaving the game with an undisclosed injury.

ANOTHER TEL

Junior defensive end Everette Brown continues to make big plays for FSU. In the third quarter he forced a fumble and that tackle for loss brought his career total to 37 which ties him with Broderick Bunkley for 5th all time on FSU's career tackles for loss list. It is the seventh time in eight games this season that Brown has been credited with a tackle for loss.

JERMAINE HAS HIS BEST OUTING

Freshman RB Jermaine Thomas had the best day of his young career with 130 yards on nine carries. His previous best was 13 carries for 91 against Western Carolina. Thomas is now just the eighth true freshman in FSU history to run for 300 yards or more in his first season. His 343 yards this season is the eighth highest rushing total by a true freshman Seminole in school history.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Christian Ponder threw for a touchdown and ran for another Saturday and Antone Smith ran for two scores as No. 24 Florida State defeated Clemson 41-27 Saturday on coach Bobby Bowden's 79th birthday.

Clemson (4-5, 2-4 Atlantic Coast Conference) had won the last three games in the series under Bowden's son, Tommy Bowden, who was fired last month after a 3-3 start. Interim Clemson coach Dabo Swinney is 1-2 since taking over.

A crowd of nearly 80,000 sang "Happy Birthday" to Bowden in the final moments of the game. The victory was the 380th for Bowden, which is second all-time among major college coaches. He is now 5-1 in games coached on his birthday and just one game behind Penn State's Joe Paterno, whose team lost Saturday at Iowa.

Florida State (7-2, 4-2) overcame an early 10-0 deficit to lead 20-17 at halftime after both teams converted turnovers into touchdowns.

It was the fourth straight week the Seminoles have spotted an opponent at least 10 points--rallying for wins in three of those, losing the other on a last-minute fumble.

The win makes Florida State bowl eligible for the 27th consecutive season-- now the longest streak in the country--and keeps them tied with Wake Forest for first place in the ACC's Atlantic Division.

Clemson started fast with C.J. Spiller going 44 yards on a short pass from Cullen Harper to finish off a quick 80-yard opening drive. The Tigers went ahead 10-0 five minutes later Mark Buchholz's 41-yard field goal.

Harper threw for 240 yards and two touchdowns, but it was his costly interception that got Florida State started.

Defensive end Neefy Moffett scored on an 18-yard interception of an ill-advised throw by Harper to get the Seminoles a 10-10 tie, a minute and 40 seconds after Florida State's Graham Gano stretched his school mark to 16 straight field goals with a 52-yard kick.

After Gano put Florida State up 13-10 with his 17th consecutive made field goal, this from 37 yards, Clemson took its last lead at 17-13 on Harper's 8-yard touchdown pass to Michael Palmer. The Tigers were set up when they recovered a fumbled punt by Florida State's Tony Carter at the Seminoles 9.

Ponder's 1-yard TD run put Florida State the lead for keeps at 20-17 with 1:25 left in the half and he hit Corey Surrency on a 14-yard touchdown pass on the opening drive of the second half as the Seminoles stretched their advantage to 27-17.

Smith scored his 12th and 13th rushing touchdowns of the season on runs of 1 and 41 yards in the fourth quarter around Spiller's 2-yard TD that got Clemson to within a touchdown with 2:20 left. It was coach Bobby Bowden's 379th career win.

Seminole Gain Over 200 Yards On The Ground

With 266 yards on the ground in Saturday's victory against Clemson, the Seminoles out rushed the opposition for the seventh time in nine games. It marks the fourth time this year the Seminoles have gained for over 200 rushing yards in a game, the most in a season since 2004.

Multiple Rushing TD Games

With three rushing touchdowns including a pair of 1-yard dives on Saturday night, Florida State has now registered six multiple rushing touchdowns in nine games in 2008.
