### Did You Know?

Georgia is 12-4 under **Mark Richt** following an open date including 1-1 when it comes before this game. The Bulldogs dropped their 2009 matchup 41-17 after a bye week. In 2007, No. 20 UGA upset No. 9 UF 42-30 following a week off. This year will mark only the seventh time in the history of the series that UGA has had a bye the week before.

Overall, Georgia is 3-3 against the Gators coming off a bye, and before the 2007 meeting, the last time Georgia had a bye before the Florida game was 1991.

This year marks the 20th time in the series that UF has a bye week before facing UGA including 15 of the past 18 years. Florida is 15-4 in these games.

### And What About This?

- The Bulldogs are the only team in the league to score first in all of their games this season.
- This weekend's game will pit two of the three winningest programs in the SEC since 2002. UGA is second at 74.4% (93-32) while UF is third at 73.6% (92-33).

### Reaching The Century Mark

Against Tennessee this year, **Mark Richt** (101-36) won his 100th game as head coach of the Bulldogs in this his 11th season. There have only been two other UGA head coaches who have reached the century mark in victories. **Wally Butts** (140 wins) and **Vince Dooley** (201 wins) each captured their 100th win in their 14th season with the Bulldogs.

### Captains Vs. The Gators

Georgia's captains for the Florida game are LT **Cordy Glenn**, C **Ben Jones**, DE **Abry Jones** and DE **DeAngelo Tyson**.

### Jacksonville Welcomes UGA-UF Game

The Georgia-Florida game is one of the more unique rivalry game sites in the nation. It features a 50-50 ticket split and is under contract through 2016. The city of Jacksonville estimates the general revenue generated by the game is between \$25-30 million. The series has been played in Jacksonville annually since 1933 with the exception of two years. In 1994-95, the game moved on campus while the Gator Bowl transformed into Alltel Stadium for the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars. The biggest crowd for a Georgia-Florida game came in 2004 when 84,753 saw the Bulldogs edge the Gators 31-24. The facility is now known as EverBank Field.

### Georgia-Florida Series

The Georgia-Florida series began in 1904, a 52-0 Bulldog win in Macon. Georgia leads the series 47-40-2, including 40-38-1 in Jacksonville. After Georgia dominated the 1980s by going 9-1 in the series, the Gators are 18-3 over the last 21 seasons. In 2010, the Bulldogs fell to the Gators in the first-ever overtime game in the series history 34-31. Florida came into that contest on a three-game losing streak following an open date. This year will mark the first time since 2004 that the Bulldogs enter this game ranked and the Gators are not. That year, Georgia won 31-24.

### A Glance At The Gators

Florida enters the Georgia game having lost three straight games to ranked teams, falling to No. 1 LSU, No. 3 Alabama and No. 24 Auburn. Since taking a 10-3 lead versus the Tide, the Gators have been outscored 93-17 with only one touchdown in their last 11 quarters. Florida has only scored 17 points in the 10 quarters since quarterback John Brantley's leg injury on a sack by Alabama's Courtney Upshaw. The Gators lead the SEC in penalties with 61 for 461 yards (65.9 avg.) and they have allowed 17 first downs by penalty this year. Florida is 12th in the conference in turnover margin at -7 and the Gators have not forced any turnovers during this three-game slide.

Florida's defense will be the best Georgia has faced since opening the year against #5 Boise State. The Gators rank third in the SEC in scoring defense at 18.9 points per game. In their last contest at #24 Auburn, the Gators had eight tackles for loss, nine hurries and one sack, and the Tigers were just 1-for-13 on third down conversions. However, Florida's offense had three turnovers, four muffed punts and were held to 194 total yards on offense in the 17-6 defeat.

### Five-Game Winning Streak

Georgia is now on a five-game winning streak after beating Vanderbilt 33-28 in Nashville, Tenn. The Bulldogs have also topped Tennessee, Mississippi State, Ole Miss and Coastal Carolina during this span. During this streak, Georgia has outscored the opposition 163-63. The Bulldogs have held their opponents to just five offensive touchdowns in the last five games.

The last five-game winning streak came in 2007 when Georgia won its last seven, including beating Hawaii in the Sugar Bowl to cap an 11-2 season. The Bulldogs ended up winning 11 in a row after capturing victories in the first four games of 2008.

### Keep An Eye On No. 1 & 2

Senior **Brandon Boykin** and junior **Branden Smith** are seeing action on defense, offense and special teams this season. Boykin has four career kickoff returns for a touchdown, and against No. 5 Boise State, he had an 80-yard rushing touchdown on his first career carry. He had a school record seven kickoff returns and tallied 198 all-purpose yards against No. 12 South Carolina. Smith has carried the ball twice and had a 26-yard reception versus Vanderbilt on Oct. 15. Smith and Boykin split time as punt returners while Boykin is one of the top kickoff returners in the nation.

### SEC Record Book - Career Kickoff Return Yardage

Boykin has a school record 2,319 yards on 94 returns, including four touchdowns (three 100 yarders). He is the active SEC career leader in the kickoff return yardage category and fourth all-time with the best average return.

## OFFENSE

### Murray Showing Flashes During Sophomore Season



Sophomore QB **Aaron Murray** is building on a spectacular start to his career in his second season. Under Murray's direction this season, the Bulldogs are leading the SEC in passing offense, averaging 245.8 yards per game. Currently, the Tampa, Fla., native leads the SEC in total offense in league games at 253.2 y/g. Murray recorded a career-high four touchdown passes against #12 South Carolina as he was able to complete 19-of-29 attempts to eight different receivers. He led Georgia to its fifth victory in a row after

scorching Vanderbilt for a career-high 326 yards and three touchdowns. In his 11 wins as a starter, Murray has 23 TDs to six INTs. The Bulldogs are the only team in the SEC to score first in all of their games this season.

Two of his best games as a freshman in 2010 came against eventual national champion Auburn on The Plains and versus arch-rival Georgia Tech between the hedges. He completed 15-of-28 passes for 273 yards and three touchdowns for the Tigers. Versus the Yellow Jackets, Murray went 15-for-19 with 271 yards and three touchdowns, which tied his career high for the sixth time. He tied the school record for touchdown responsibility by a QB in a season with 28 (24 passing, 4 rushing). D.J. Shockley also had 28 in 2005.

Murray's backup is sophomore **Hutson Mason** (9-of-17, 102 yds., 1 TD in four games in 2010). Mason played most of the second half in the win over Coastal Carolina this season and finished 6-for-9 for 68 yards, including a 33-yard touchdown strike to **TE Orson Charles**.

Murray had the highest passing efficiency rating for a freshman in the nation and finished 14th overall at 154.48, which is second in school history only to Bulldog offensive coordinator **Mike Bobo** in 1997. That marks the second-highest rating in Georgia history.

Murray, a 2010 Freshman All-SEC selection, ranked among the best freshman quarterbacks in SEC history and posted one of the more impressive seasons in UGA history. Now, he ranks in the top four in school history in career touchdown passes:

### Quick Start

The Bulldogs have benefitted from a quick start this season, outscoring their opponents 61-10 in the first quarter. In fact, the Bulldogs have held their five SEC opponents to just three points in the first quarter this year.

### Senior Trio & Versatile Guards Hold Line Together

Georgia has a senior-laden offensive line featuring C **Ben Jones**, LT **Cordy Glenn** and RT **Justin Anderson**. A trio of sophomores in **Kenarious Gates**, **Chris Burnette** and **Dallas Lee** have split time at the guards this year. Lee has been the healthiest of the three, playing in all seven games.

The five starters average a height of 6-4 and a weight of 329. Glenn leads the trio with 43 starts, including the last 39 games. He started all 13 games in 2010 at guard. Jones has appeared in 42 games, starting 12 games in 2010. The most starts for a Bulldog lineman is 50 by Clint Boling (2007-10), who is now playing for the Cincinnati Bengals after graduating from UGA.

### A New Look Backfield

Freshman **Isaiah Crowell**, junior **Richard Samuel IV** and junior **Carlton Thomas** are splitting time in the backfield for the Bulldogs. During his second career start in a win at Ole Miss, Crowell carried the ball 30 times for 147 yards, both career highs. He had another 100-yard game versus Miss State (22 carries, 104 yds.), giving him three in his career as he was named the **SEC Freshman of the Week** for the third time this year.

Crowell, who was limited at Vanderbilt with a wrist injury, is third in league action averaging 92.4 yards/game, trailing Alabama's Trent Richardson and Auburn's Michael Dyer. Samuel was sidelined with a heel injury vs. Coastal Carolina so Crowell got his first career start and responded with 86 yards rushing and a score on 16 carries. Crowell exploded for a then career-high 118 rushing yards and 40 receiving yards against #12 South Carolina.

### Top Targets

This season, **Aaron Murray** has thrown touchdowns to eight different Bulldogs. Statistically, the top target has been freshman WR **Malcolm Mitchell**, who has 25 catches for 438 yards and three touchdowns. His first score came on a 51-yard reception versus #5 Boise State. Mitchell missed the Vanderbilt game due to a hamstring injury and junior **Marlon Brown** stepped up with his first 100-yard receiving game, highlighted by a career-long 75-yard touchdown catch from Murray. Also, redshirt freshman **Michael Bennett** registered a career-high seven catches for 89 yards in the win over the Commodores.

Georgia's tight ends have also been called upon to play a bigger role in 2011. **Orson Charles** led all Bulldogs against the #5 Broncos with six catches for a career-high 109 yards and a touchdown. He added his team-leading third touchdown catch in a five-catch, 59-yard performance at Ole Miss. Charles is second on the team with 22 catches for 299 yards. Also at TE, senior **Aron White** recorded his first touchdown catch in two seasons versus the Rebels and finished with three receptions for 52 yards. Junior **FLK Tavarres King** is third on the Bulldogs with 22 catches for 246 yards and four scores.

## DEFENSE & SPECIAL TEAMS

### Stifling Opponents

During the current five-game winning streak, Georgia has surrendered 63 points. In the past 20 quarters, Georgia's defense has allowed just five touchdowns. UGA's opponents have reached the Red Zone only six times in the last five games and that resulted in 26 points. In the Bulldogs' most recent victory, Vanderbilt managed 28 points. However, 14 of those points came on breakdowns by the special teams. The Commodores first touchdown was helped by a 35-yard gain on a fake punt. Vanderbilt also had a 96-yard touchdown on a kickoff return. In SEC action, Georgia ranks fourth in the league in scoring defense at 21.6 points a game. The Bulldogs are also third in rushing defense at 104.4 yards a game in conference games.

The Bulldog defense has allowed 14 touchdowns this year. Georgia's special teams have surrendered three touchdowns and the offense has allowed two.

### Linebackers Lead The Defense As Gilliard Steps Up

Junior ILB **Mike Gilliard** has been the leading tackler for the Bulldogs four of the past five games. He had a career-high nine against Miss. State and followed that up with a new career high against the Vols, getting 12 stops along with one forced fumble, a sack, a pass breakup and one tackle for a loss. Junior ILB **Christian Robinson** returned to action against MSU after missing two games with a foot injury. He played primarily on third downs as the Bulldogs limited MSU to 27 percent conversion rate (4-of-15). Gilliard leads the team with 44 tackles while sophomore OLB **Jarvis Jones** is second on the team with 39. *Jones was recently named a Butkus Award semifinalist.*

### Ogletree, Washington Return To Give Bulldogs A Boost

The Bulldogs will have sophomore ILB **Alec Ogletree** back for the Florida game after injuring his foot in the first quarter of the season opener versus #5 Boise State. Ogletree is a converted safety who earned All-SEC Freshman honors in 2010. A Parade Magazine All-American, Ogletree has proven to be one of the most talented Bulldogs on defense. Georgia will also return junior OLB **Cornelius Washington** to its lineup versus the Gators. Washington ranks second on the team with 3.5 sacks and is coming off one of his best performances as a Bulldog in the win over Miss. State.

### Sack Totals On The Rise

After having just one sack through the first three games, the Bulldog defense has tallied 13 sacks following the last four wins over SEC opponents. Georgia had four in the road win over Ole Miss and then exploded for five against Mississippi State. Sophomore OLB **Jarvis Jones** has four sacks (-28 yds., fourth in the SEC in league games) to lead the Dogs. Jones is also second in the league with 10.0 tackles for loss.

### Plugging The Middle

During Georgia's five-game winning streak, the Bulldog defensive front has held its opponents to a combined 332 yards rushing (66.4). However, Vanderbilt did have the most success during the current streak as VU tallied 200 yards on 36 carries. The Bulldogs are getting solid production from its two nose tackles in junior **John Jenkins** and redshirt sophomore **Kwame Geathers**, along with ends junior **Abry Jones** and senior **DeAngelo Tyson**. Jones and Tyson have both earned captain spots versus UF.

### Bulldog Secondary

The Bulldogs rank third in conference games in the SEC with 11 INTs (nine in SEC games) in 2011, including five from FS **Bacarri Rambo** which is tied for second in the nation. Georgia had a season-high three picks in the win at Vanderbilt.

Senior CB **Brandon Boykin** has started 31 games in his career and has 27 tackles, including 4.5 tackles for loss, and two INTs this year. Rambo is the team's active leader with 10 interceptions. Like Boykin, junior CB **Branden Smith** is a versatile threat who has also seen time on offense and special teams. Junior CB **Sanders Commings** and junior SS **Shawn Williams** round out the usual starters in the backfield. Commings ranks third in the SEC with nine passes defended (1.43/g).

### The Butler Keeps Doing It

Georgia senior Academic All-American and All-SEC punter **Drew Butler** is one of the nation's top punters. He is a two-time Ray Guy Award finalist and took home the hardware in 2009. In the road win over Ole Miss, Butler averaged 55.2 yards (*tied for third-best game in school history*) a punt on four attempts, including a season-long 59 yarder. He leads the SEC in punting overall at 46.1 as well as a 45.9 average in SEC games.

In 2010, Butler averaged 44.5 yards on 50 punts, 15 that went for 50+. The Bulldogs finished second in the SEC and fourth in the nation in net punting with an average of 40.6.

Butler is the son of former NFL standout and Bulldog All-American Kevin Butler. He is also the holder for **Blair Walsh**.

### Boca Bulldog Booter Back

Senior PK **Blair Walsh** has been one of the nation's top place-kickers since 2009. He was a semifinalist in 2010 and a finalist in 2009 for the Lou Groza Award. Walsh is fifth in the SEC record books for points scored kicking in a career (365--67 FGs, 164 PATs). He has hit at least one FG in 26 of the past 28 games (no attempts vs. GT in 2010, 0-1 vs. #5 Boise State in 2011--54-yard att.).

Entering the 2011 season, the NCAA record for most games kicking a field goal was 40 by Gary Gussman (Miami-Ohio, 1984-87). Walsh has now tied that by hitting one in 40 games in his career. His career-long 56 yarder versus Coastal Carolina is the longest in the nation this year. Walsh was named *SEC Special Teams Player of the Week* after scoring eight of the team's 20 points versus the Vols.

Currently, he is 67-for-88 (76.1%) overall. He has the most field goals of any active SEC kicker, which is tied for sixth most in league history. Walsh owns the school record for PATs with 164, highlighted by hitting eight versus Coastal Carolina. He set a career high with 15 points in the win at Vanderbilt which was the most for a UGA kicker since Billy Bennett equaled that total in a win over Georgia Tech in 2002. Walsh tied a school record with six attempts in that contest.

### Boykin Sets School Career Return Yardage

Senior CB **Brandon Boykin** took over UGA's No. 1 mark in career return yardage during the 2011 season. Currently, he has 2,319 yards on 94 returns and four touchdowns. Boykin sped to his fourth kickoff return for a touchdown (*third 100-yd. return*) in his career to tie an SEC record against Kentucky in 2010. Tennessee's Willie Gault and Arkansas' Felix Jones also had four KOR TDs in their career. He passed Scott Woerner's 1,916, who tallied his on punt and kickoff returns from 1977-80. *Boykin has now been named to the Paul Hornung Award Weekly Honor Roll five times in seven game weeks for being one of the nation's most versatile players.*

**Did You Know?** Boykin is the only player in SEC history to record three plays of 100 yards of any kind in his collegiate career.
