Jackets Wrap Up Regular Season at Duke

Georgia Tech's seventh-ranked baseball team wraps up the regular season at Duke with a chance to capture the Atlantic Coast Conference's regular season crown. The two teams will meet at 7 p.m. Thursday, 2 p.m. Friday and 1 p.m. Saturday at Jack Coombs Field.

The Yellow Jackets (33-13-1, 16-8-1 ACC) have to win all three games this weekend to finish atop the league standings but will have their hands full against the Blue Devils (32-21, 13-14 ACC), who haven't been swept in a weekend series all season.

Both teams are coming off midweek losses, as Tech dropped a 7-5 decision to Georgia Tuesday at Turner Field while Liberty stopped Duke, 4-1, in Durham.

Georgia Tech was a consensus preseason top-25 team that moved into the top-10 in the season's first official polls. The Yellow Jackets have been ranked as high as No. 3 this season (by Collegiate Baseball in March) and currently appear among the top-10 in all five polls, peaking at No. 7 in the Baseball America Poll. Collegiate Baseball, USA Today, Rivals.com and the NCBWA all have the Jackets listed at No. 8 in their respective polls.

Team Updates

Georgia Tech - The Yellow Jackets enter the final weekend of the regular season winners of five of their last seven games, but lost their last contest, 7-5, to Georgia at Turner Field Tuesday night. The Yellow Jackets rallied to tie the game at 5-5 in the seventh inning, but Georgia plated two runs in the top of the ninth to win their fifth-straight Turner Field game. This weekend, the Yellow Jackets will look to remain atop the Coastal Division standings, but to do so they will need to play a complete series. North Carolina is just percentage points behind Tech in the Coastal Division and will face Boston College in Chestnut Hill this weekend. The Jackets also have a chance to win the ACC regular season title but will need to sweep the Blue Devils this weekend to do so. Florida State, which currently has the best winning percentage in the league, has secured its third-straight Atlantic Division title but is in wait-and-see mode after concluding conference play last weekend.

Duke - The Blue Devils are vying for a spot in this year's ACC Tournament, and one or two wins this weekend could go a long way to securing that invitation. Duke currently stands fifth in the Coastal Division and seventh overall in the league with the three game series remaining against the Yellow Jackets. As mentioned before, Duke hasn't been swept in an ACC series this season, and has won four league series this season. Matt Williams (.353-5-44-1) is leading the Blue Devils in batting average, while Alex Hassan (.351-2-24-3), Jeremy Gould (.350-6-35-5) and Nate Freiman (.348-17-59-2) are providing a spark on offense. The pitching staff, highlighted by Saturday starter Andrew Wolcott, has held opponents to a meager .262 batting average in 2009. Wolcott is leading the team with a 2.65 ERA and has a team-best six wins in 2009. He and Friday starter Christopher Manno have combined to start 23 games in 2009, while no other Duke player has started more than seven games.

Tech vs. Duke (Tech leads, 76-25)

Duke avoided a three-game sweep by the Yellow Jackets in 2008 to earn its 25th win against Georgia Tech, but the Yellow Jackets still lead the series 76-25, against the Blue Devils. The Jackets have dropped just two games - one in 2007 and the finale a year ago - to the Blue Devils since the 2001 season, posting a 23-2 record over the last 25 games.

Tech is 26-10 against the Blue Devils in Durham, and 9-1 in the last 10 games played at Jack Coombs Field. The Jackets have posted a 42-9 record against Duke since Danny Hall's arrival in 1994, with five of those nine losses coming by just one run.

The Hall Era at Georgia Tech

Georgia Tech is 685-307-1 in 16 seasons under head coach Danny Hall, a winning percentage of .690 and an average of 42.8 wins per season. Over the last seven seasons, Hall has led Tech to the College World Series (2002 and 2006), ACC tournament championship (2003 and 2005) and ACC regular season championship (2004 and 2005). Hall, the 2005 ACC Coach of the Year, became Georgia Tech's all-time winningest coach in an 11-10 win at Miami on March 27, 2005.

The Yellow Jackets have made 13 NCAA appearances in 15 years under Hall. Tech has won six NCAA regionals and finished second in three others, and advanced to the championship game of the College World Series in his first season in 1994. The Yellow Jackets have made CWS trips under Hall in 1994, 2002 and 2006.

Hall was named the ACC Coach of the Year and National Coach of the Year (by The Sporting News) in 1997 after leading the Jackets to an ACC regular season title, and was again tabbed the ACC's Coach of the year in 2000 after leading Tech to the ACC regular season and tournament championships. He earned his third ACC Coach of the Year award in 2005.

Tech is 258-145-1 vs. the ACC under Hall, finishing third or better in nine of his 15 years.

Along the way, 84 of his players at Tech have gone on to play professional baseball, 27 have earned All-America honors and 71 have made the All-ACC team; 124 have made the ACC Academic Honor Roll and 17 have been named either Academic All-America or All-District honorees.

Hall Meets Former Yellow Jacket

When Georgia Tech and Duke square off this weekend, it will pit current Blue Devil hitting coach Matthew Boggs against his former head coach Danny Hall. From 1998-2002, Boggs served as an infielder and outfielder for Hall's Georgia Tech teams, and his career culminated with a trip to Omaha in his senior season. Then a third-baseman for the Jackets, Boggs had the best year of his career, batting .363 with 12 doubles, 43 RBI and 12 stolen bases and was tabbed to ESPN The Magazine's Academic All-America second team. Boggs went on to serve as an assistant coach at Georgia Southern and Tulane before being tabbed to his current position as the hitting coach and recruiting coordinator for the Blue Devil baseball program in 2006.

Streaking in the ACC

Georgia Tech swept just two Atlantic Coast Conference series during the 2008 regular season and has two sweeps in 2009 after winning all three games against Maryland on the first weekend of conference play and all three vs. Wake Forest in late April. The Yellow Jackets also won the single game they played against Boston College in March before the remainder of the series was rained out. The Yellow Jackets have swept 64 weekend series since the conference adopted the current three-game round-robin format in 1987.

The Yellow Jackets had a streak of seven consecutive ACC series wins snapped by UNC in early April, but has won six league series in 2009. Since 1987, Tech has won 122 of 184 (.663) ACC series, including 38 of its last 57 (.667) weekend series.

Road Warriors

Georgia Tech has played 19 games away from Russ Chandler Stadium this season, including a string of seven over a nine-game span in late March and nine over a 10-game span in mid-April. While several teams struggle when they enter another team's stadium, the opposite is actually true for this Yellow Jacket squad.

Tech is 12-6 on the road, 0-1 in neutral territory and 21-6-1 at Russ Chandler Stadium. Four members of the starting lineup have posted higher batting averages away from the Rusty C than at home. As a team, the Jackets are batting .321 while scoring 8.3 runs per game on the road, as compared to .323 with 9.5 runs per game at Russ Chandler Stadium.

The offense isn't the only part of this team that doesn't mind hitting the road. While Tech's weekend starters have posted better ERA's at home, the team as a whole owns a 4.47 ERA on the road vs. a 4.73 ERA at home. Even more impressive is the work of Tech's bullpen in road games. The group hasn't allowed opposing fans to get to them, but have instead posted a 2.47 ERA while opponents are batting just .228 in 73.0 innings against them on the road. Conversely, Tech's bullpen owns a 5.76 ERA at home while opponents are batting .258 against them in 100.0 innings at the Rusty C.

Yellow Jackets in the RPI

Georgia Tech enters the weekend ranked No. 4 in the nation in the latest Pseudo-RPI (source: *BoydWorld.com*). (The NCAA releases its RPI just once a week, and the Yellow Jackets are listed No. 2 in the official RPI released on May 12).

The Atlantic Coast Conference is well represented in the most updated RPI, with four teams ranked among the top 10 in the nation. North Carolina (3) leads all conference teams while Georgia Tech, Clemson (9), Miami (11), Virginia (12) and Florida State (16) all rank in the top-25. Only three ACC teams stand outside of the top-75.

Georgia Tech has played 17 games against teams that currently appear in the top-25 in the RPI, with eight of those contests coming away from Russ Chandler Stadium. Tech is 8-8-1 against teams currently ranked in the top-25 in the RPI this season.

Duke stands at No. 85 in the latest Pseudo-RPI.

In terms of schedule strength, Georgia Tech's is ranked No. 8 while Duke's schedule stands at No. 100 in the latest rankings.

Haniger Tabbed Lowe's Senior CLASS Award Finalist

While catcher **Jason Haniger** continues to rack up athletic and academic honors, the senior has been recognized for his work off the field and away from the classroom as well. In March, Haniger was named one of 30 candidates for the 2009 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, which recognizes exceptional senior baseball student-athletes that excel in the classroom and competition but also give back to the community and are of honorable character.

On April 15, the list of candidates was narrowed to 10 finalists, and Haniger is one of three ACC baseball players included in the list of finalists for the award. **A portion of the vote is decided by fans, who can log onto www.senior-classaward.com daily (through May 31) to vote, or they may text BSB6 to 839863.**

Power Surge

In 2008, Georgia Tech nearly doubled its home run output from the 2007 season and marked the biggest increase in home runs from one year to the next in school history. Last season, the Yellow Jackets belted 92 home runs, the seventh-best single season mark in school history and the fourth-most since Hall's arrival in 1994.

This season, the Yellow Jackets have smacked an ACC-leading 96 home runs, which ranks sixth in the nation and fifth all-time in school history.

The Yellow Jackets have eclipsed the 90-home run mark just 11 times since the program's inception in the late 1890's, with seven of those seasons coming under head coach Danny Hall.

Tech's 96 homers have come in 47 games (the fewest played by any ACC school this season), to give the Yellow Jackets an average of 2.04 home runs per game - the third-best mark in the country in 2009.

Tech is 32-7 this season when a Yellow Jacket hits a home run and 1-6-1 without.

On the Offensive

Over the last 16 games, the Yellow Jacket offense has blistered opponents for 80 extra base hits while batting .341. Three starters are batting over .350 during that span, and eight Yellow Jackets have hit at least two home runs in those 16 games. The recent hot streak has raised the Jackets' batting average to .321 on the season, which ranks second in the league and would be tied for the program's 10th-best mark if the season finished today.

Balance of Power

The Yellow Jackets have been blessed with a talented lineup in which nearly any player can hit one out of the park on any given day. Eight different Yellow Jackets have hit at least four home runs this season, led by the talented trio of Luke Murton (15), Tony Plagman (15) and Matt Skole (13), who have combined for 43 of the Jackets' 96 home runs in 2009.

Seventeen different players have hit home runs for Georgia Tech in 2009, including 13 that have hit more than one.

Waving Them In

Third base coach Bryan Prince has been busy this season, waving more than nine runners home per game. The Jackets have scored in bunches this season, and their average of 9.02 runs per game currently ranks 16th in the nation and first among all ACC schools.

The majority of those runs have come off extra-base hits by the Yellow Jackets, and Tech currently ranks ninth in the nation in slugging percentage, with 91 doubles, 14 triples and 96 home runs in 553 hits this season (36 percent of the Yellow Jackets' hits are for extra bases).

Sitting Them Down

Not to be out-done by the offense, Tech's young pitching staff has put in a masterful performance on the mound in 2009. The Yellow Jacket pitchers are striking out an average of 9.25 batters per game, which is the 10th-best mark in the nation and second-best in the ACC in 2009.

Avoiding the Big Inning

A common theme in 10 of the Yellow Jackets' 13 losses this season has been a big inning by Tech's opponent. In those 10 losses, the Jackets have given up three or more runs in at least one of the innings.

Only three times this season have the Yellow Jackets lost without giving up a big inning to the opponent - a 6-5 loss at Georgia Southern (Feb. 24), a 4-2 defeat at the hands of North Carolina (Apr. 3), and a 7-5 loss to Georgia at Turner Field (May 12).

This season, when an opponent has scored at least three runs in an inning against the Yellow Jackets, Georgia Tech is 12-10. However, when an opponent has scored more than three runs in a single inning, the Yellow Jackets are 1-6 in 2009. See below for a listing of those big-inning (4+ runs) games.

The "Rusty C"

Affectionately known as the "Rusty C," a new era in Russ Chandler Stadium began in 2002 with a \$9.7 million reconstruction of the facility. The current facility seats 4,157 with room for future expansion down the left field line.

The stadium was originally built in 1985, in time for Tech to host the ACC Tournament. It has been the site of eight NCAA Regional tournaments (1987, 1993, 2000, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005 and 2006) and an exhibition game between the Yellow Jackets and the first team from the Soviet Union to tour the United States (1989).

In the summer of 1996, Russ Chandler Stadium served as an official training site for the Centennial Olympic Games.

Rose Bowl Field, the tract of land on which the stadium sits, which includes the adjacent football practice fields, has been the site of Tech baseball since 1930, when the field was built with funds from Tech's 1929 Rose Bowl appearance.

Tech was 486-125 in the old Russ Chandler Stadium, a winning percentage of .798.

Capitalizing on the Big Inning

While Tech's pitching staff and defense has to avoid the big inning, the offense has lived off of it in 2009, scoring four or more runs in an inning 32 times this season. When the Yellow Jackets plate four or more in an inning, Georgia Tech is 19-3 in 2009.

The only exceptions were the 9-5 loss at Virginia Tech (see prior note, when Tech gave up four in the fifth), the 11-10 loss to Virginia (again, see prior note, when the Jackets yielded six in the top of the ninth) and an 8-6 defeat at the hands of No. 6 Florida State, when the Seminoles plated three runs in the ninth inning to win, 8-6.

Holding Opponents to 6 or Less

Georgia Tech is 27-4-1 on the season when holding opponents to six or fewer runs after posting a 36-2 record in 2008 under the same circumstances.

The Yellow Jackets have scored over six runs in 26 games this season and are averaging 9.02 runs per game in 2009.

Bullish on the Bullpen

Georgia Tech's pitching staff is holding opponents to a .243 batting average and 3.93 ERA over the last 16 games, but those numbers are highlighted by the impressive play of the Yellow Jacket bullpen.

During that span, the bullpen has allowed just 19 earned runs in 59.2 IP, which translates to a 2.87 ERA. That encompasses 46 total appearances by 10 different Yellow Jacket pitchers, of which 29 have been scoreless outings with only nine of the 29 runners that the 10 pitchers have inherited actually crossing the plate.

Playing With a Full Deck

With nine wins this season, Yellow Jacket ace **Deck McGuire** has improved to 17-1 in his career. His .941 career winning percentage currently stands as the best winning percentage in school history (for pitchers with a minimum of 10 wins), eclipsing Ed LaFitte's school record .900 winning percentage. While it may not be noteworthy to some, what IS impressive is LaFitte set that school record with an 18-2 mark from 1906-07. That's right - over 100 years ago.

While McGuire's near perfection is one for the record books, another note of interest is that the sophomore hurler has 94 strikeouts this season, which is tops in the ACC and ranks 12th in the nation.

Only one former Yellow Jacket has recorded more wins while remaining undefeated in a season - Scott Erwin went 13-0 in 1988.

When the Heat is On...

When the pressure is on, head coach Danny Hall has his pick of pitchers in the bullpen that have proven time and time again that they can do the job. Mark Pope, Jake Davies and Zach Brewster have been those guys Hall has turned to when the heat is on. All three have entered games in key situations, and all three have responded well. Even more impressive is the fact that Davies and Pope are both freshman while Brewster, the "veteran" of the trio, had just one collegiate pitching appearance to his credit entering the 2009 season.

For the season, Pope has inherited 20 runners upon his entry into games, allowing just four to score. Brewster has inherited 26 runners in his 28 appearances this season, and he's allowed just six to score. He has stranded the last six inherited runners on base. Finally, Davies, too, has inherited 26 runners this season, and the left-hander has allowed just four of those to score. He has a streak of seven-straight inherited runners that have been stranded on base.

Saved by the Pope

Right-hander **Mark Pope**, a freshman on the 2009 Georgia Tech roster, has been the guy head coach Danny Hall has turned to to close out games. The Marietta native hasn't disappointed either - posting a 5-1 record with seven saves this season. Pope's seven saves are tied for the 10th-best single-season mark in school history and tied for 13th in Tech's career record books.

Brewing in the Bullpen

Sophomore **Zach Brewster** is having one of the most productive seasons out of the bullpen as any Yellow Jacket over the last 10 years, and his career is just taking off. The Murrayville, Ga., native was a member of the team as a true freshman but missed the majority of the season recovering from offseason surgery to fix a blood clot and remove a rib. This year, he's made a team-high 28 appearances, including pitching in each of Tech's last four games. His 28 games is tied for 21st in the Tech annals for most in a single season, and he needs just one more appearance to stand in a tie for 16th.

Murton Climbs Record Books

Yellow Jacket senior **Luke Murton** entered the 2009 season ranked 16th in school history with 49 doubles in his career. With 12 more this season, the outfielder has climbed to fourth place in the Tech annals.

Speaking of Murton's power numbers, with 15 home runs this season, the Yellow Jacket right fielder has moved into a tie for fifth in the school record books with 42 home runs in his career. He has hit more home runs than any other Tech player over the last 12 years.

He also stands 10th in Tech's career RBI listing (188), ninth with 441 total bases and 22nd with 246 hits from 2006-present.

In mid-April, he became just the 21st player in school history to compete in 200 games. He currently stands 14th with 214 appearances in his career and ranks 12th with 777 career at bats. (See page seven of notes for additional categories)

As the Weather Warms, So Has Murton

The Yellow Jackets have learned that **Luke Murton** enjoys playing in warmer weather, and his bat backs up that fact. Fifteen of the Yellow Jackets' first 25 games of the season came when the temperature was 60 degrees or higher, and in those contests, Murton batted .431 (25-for-58) with five home runs, five doubles, 18 RBI and 20 runs scored. He also had a .776 slugging percentage in addition to a .507 on base percentage. In the sub-60 degree games however, Murton wasn't quite as fortunate - the Yellow Jacket hit just .257 (9-for-35) with three doubles and a triple, six RBI and eight runs in those 10 games. He had a .400 slugging percentage and a .400 on base percentage in the sub-60 degree weather.

Murton is batting .424 with four home runs, two doubles and nine RBI in his last 10 games and has hit safely in 17 of his last 19 games, batting .397 with 15 home runs and 22 RBI during that span.

Leonida's Wait Pays Off

Cole Leonida has spent the last two years as a backup to Jason Haniger, but his wait has been well worth it. The Colorado native has spent the time improving his offense, and the Yellow Jackets are reaping the benefits. As a freshman in 2008, Leonida batted .145 with two home runs and a pair of doubles in 26 appearances. He is batting .309 with four homers, three doubles and 12 RBI in his 23 game appearances this season, thanks in part to the current hot streak he's on.

Leonida is batting .455 (10-for-22) with four runs and four RBI over his last six games, and the Yellow Jacket backstop has hit safely in seven of his last nine games, going 12-for-33 (364) with a pair of home runs and a double during that span.

Burning Up the Pitching

Sophomore outfielder **Chase Burnette** hasn't been a batter opposing pitchers have enjoyed facing over the last eight games - the Buford, Ga., native has a seven-game hitting streak in which he's batting .571 (17-for-28) with five home runs, four doubles, eight runs and 16 RBI.

His hot streak is highlighted by a 6-for-6 performance against Presbyterian the first weekend in May. In that game, he tied Tech's single-game records for hits (6), doubles (3), home runs (3) and RBI (9) while breaking a 25-year old school record with 18 total bases in the game.

Since that series finale, Burnette hasn't cooled off, going 5-for-9 with a double and a home run.

Lineup is Anyone's Guess

Georgia Tech head coach Danny Hall is known for mixing up his lineup, and 2009 has been no different. The Yellow Jacket skipper has made out 39 different lineup cards through 47 games this season. On only one occasion has he used the same lineup more than twice. (*Lineups listed on page 12 of notes*)

From Second Base to Pitcher...X2

In the outfield, on the infield or on the mound? If in the lineup, where do **Thomas Nichols** and **Patrick Long** appear? It's likely that where they begin the game isn't exactly where they will end up.

This season Nichols has served as a relief pitcher on nine occasions, the starting left fielder three times, the starting second baseman on seven occasions and the designated hitter 15 times. Of the three positions, his offense is best when he serves as the DH, as he's batting .348 with two HR and eight RBI in those 17 games.

Long was the Yellow Jackets' primary second baseman early on in the season, but his work out of the bullpen has been so valuable that he has spent more time toeing the rubber than he has digging in the batters box. He has started 14 games at second base in 2009 and made 14 appearances out of the bullpen.

Racing Up the Charts

In just his second year on the Flats, centerfielder **Jeff Rowland** has already raced into the Yellow Jacket career records for stolen bases, standing in a tie for 20th in history with 39 swipes in his first two years.

The Tech leadoff hitter finished the 2008 season with 22 stolen bases and has already swiped 17 this year. He needs just five more stolen bases to move into the top-20 in Tech's single-season record books.

Milestones Ahead

- * Brandon Cumpton is 4.1 innings away from reaching 100 for his career. He has tossed 95.2 innings over the last two seasons.
- * Tony Plagman needs one more home run to appear in the top-20 in Tech's career record books - he has hit 33 homers in his 2+ years at Tech.
- * Andrew Robinson has pitched in 65 games since 2007 - He needs just one more appearance to crack the top-20.

Wrecked by Rain

The 2009 season has marked several rainouts for teams throughout the nation, and the Yellow Jackets have not been immune to the delays and cancellations. The latest cancellation came last Wednesday, when Georgia Tech was scheduled to travel to Chattanooga for game against Tennessee at AT&T Park.

This season, the Yellow Jackets have had six games cancelled due to weather - five to rain and the fifth, snow. Due to all of the cancellations, Georgia Tech has played fewer games than any other team in the ACC in 2009.

Tech Receives NCAA Public Recognition Award for Academic Performance

Tech baseball was one of three Yellow Jacket sports teams to receive the NCAA Public Recognition Award for their academic performance, as announced by the NCAA office April 22 and again when the APR was officially released May 6. The awards are given to teams in all divisions that finished in the top 10 percent in their sport with their APRs (Academic Progress Reports). High-performing teams receiving public recognition this year posted APR scores ranging from 976 to a perfect 1,000. The baseball team's APR was 989.

Dietrich Tabled Academic All-District by ESPN The Magazine

Speaking of smart kids, Yellow Jacket sophomore **Derek Dietrich** was named to ESPN The Magazine's Academic All-District III first team for 2009 and is now eligible for Academic All-America honors. The Parma, Ohio native maintains a 3.41 GPA as a management major and has started every game at shortstop over the last two seasons for the Yellow Jackets.

McGuire, Dietrich Among USA Baseball National Team Trials Invitees

USA Baseball announced an initial invitee list for the 2009 USA Baseball National Team Trials, and Yellow Jacket sophomores **Deck McGuire** and **Derek Dietrich** were among the list of 17 college baseball players to receive invites. The National Team Trials, held at the USA Baseball National Training Complex in Cary, N.C., June 15-24, will be comprised of 36 players vying for 22 spots on the final roster, which will be announced June 24.

Dietrich Named to Brooks Wallace Shortstop Watch List

Derek Dietrich has been named to the initial watch list for the 2009 Brooks Wallace Award. For the first time since its creation in 2004, the Wallace Award will honor the country's finest shortstop after previously being given to the national player of the year. The list includes three shortstops from the Big 12, ACC, Big West and Conference USA.

McGuire Named to National Pitcher of the Year Watch List

Yellow Jacket sophomore **Deck McGuire** has been named to the initial watch list for the 2009 National Pitcher of the Year Award. Three conferences outpace the others in representation with the Big 12, ACC and SEC claiming a combined total of 21 pitchers. McGuire is 9-0 on the season and 17-1 in his two years as a Yellow Jacket. He currently leads the ACC in wins, strikeouts (94) and opponent batting average (.216) and ranks fourth with a 2.67 ERA.

Haniger Receives ACC Postgraduate Scholarship

Yellow Jacket senior **Jason Haniger** was one of 42 Atlantic Coast Conference scholar-athletes selected to receive an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship in 2009. He joins two other Georgia Tech student-athletes - golfer David Drago and softball standout Whitney Haller - on the list and is the **ONLY** baseball player among the league's 12 schools to receive the honor this season. The conference office will give Haniger \$5,000 to put towards a graduate degree, and the senior Santa Clara, Calif., native scheduled to receive his undergraduate degree in management this December. After registering a 4.0 GPA this spring semester, he currently has a 3.53 overall GPA and maintains a 3.80 GPA in his finance (minor/certificate) classes.

Haniger Tabled to Johnny Bench Award Watch List

One week after learning he'd received an ACC Postgraduate Scholarship, catcher **Jason Haniger** received word that he was one of 44 catchers named to the 2009 Coleman Company-Johnny Bench Award Watch List. The notification came two years after former Tech All-American Matt Wieters was a finalist for the award, and was the latest in a long list of honors Haniger has received his senior year.

The senior elected to return for his senior season despite being selected in the 2008 MLB Draft by the Pittsburgh Pirates. He currently bats in the middle of the batting order, and has hit safely in all but nine games this season.

Jackets Tested

The Yellow Jackets ended one of the toughest stretches on the 2009 schedule with an 11-6 victory over top-ranked Georgia in Athens in mid-April. The Yellow Jackets played 12 games from March 27 through April 14, and 10 of those 12 games were against teams ranked among the top-11 in the nation, with the other two coming against a Georgia Southern squad that appeared at No. 26 in the rankings. Tech concluded the 12-game stretch with a 6-5-1 record.

Georgia Tech vs. In-State Opponents

Georgia Tech has posted an 8-4 mark against in-state foes in 2009. The Jackets had a total of 14 regular season games on the schedule against schools from Georgia this season, two of which were rained out.

Since 1999, the Yellow Jackets own a 97-33 (.746) record against its in-state foes. In 16 years under head coach Danny Hall, Tech is 141-50 (.738) against teams from Georgia.

Jackets in Season/Home Openers

With a 9-0 win over Lipscomb to start the season, Georgia Tech improved to 60-47-3 in season openers and 41-21-2 when the season opener occurs at home. The Yellow Jackets have fared well in season openers under head coach Danny Hall, posting a 12-4 record in such games since his arrival prior to the 1994 season. Tech has opened the season at home on just six occasions under Hall, going 5-1 in those contests.

The Yellow Jackets' home field has been good to them in home openers, as Georgia Tech has a sterling 76-29-3 record in its first game at home each season, and the Yellow Jackets have lost just one home opener (15-1) under Hall. That loss occurred in 2005 to crosstown rival Georgia State.

Ending the Six Year Drought

Prior to Tech's game against Georgia earlier this season, the last time the Yellow Jackets faced the No. 1 team in the country was in April, 2008, when Miami came into Atlanta and swept a three-game series from Georgia Tech on a somber weekend. Prior to that series, the Yellow Jackets hadn't played a top-ranked team since the 2003 ACC Tournament, when Georgia Tech defeated consensus No. 1 Florida State on April 25, the final day of competition.

Georgia Tech's April 14th win over No. 1 Georgia was the first victory over a top-ranked opponent for the Yellow Jackets since that Florida State game in 2003.

Jackets Receive Highest Ranking Since 2006

Riding a nine-game winning streak, the Yellow Jackets climbed to No. 3 in the March 16 Collegiate Baseball poll, marking Georgia Tech's highest ranking since the 2006 season. The Yellow Jackets remained at No. 3 in the polls in the two subsequent weeks with series victories at Virginia Tech and No. 2 Miami.

Tech climbed as high as No. 1 in the polls in 2006 before finishing the season ranked No. 7 by Baseball America and USA Today. Prior to the three weeks at No. 3 this season, the last time Tech was ranked as high as No. 3 was in the March 27 (2006) USA Today and Baseball America polls.

McGuire Honored for Opening Weekend Performance

With a 13-strikeout performance on opening day, sophomore **Deck McGuire** received the Atlantic Coast Conference's first ACC Pitcher of the Week honor for the 2009 season as well as College Baseball Insider's Region Player of the Week honors. He was also named to Recruiting Closer's Pitcher of the Week List and the Collegiate Baseball Foundation's National All-Star Lineup for Feb. 22. The Richmond, Va., native yielded just three hits and one walk through seven innings while combining on a three-hit shutout of the Bisons. His 13 strikeouts were the most by a Tech pitcher since the 2000 season, and eclipsed McGuire's previous career high of nine, set against Georgia in 2008.

Georgia Tech Cracks Preseason Top 25 for 16th Time Under Hall

Georgia Tech has been ranked in the preseason Top 25 by at least one of the major polls (*Baseball America*, *Collegiate Baseball*, *USA Today/Baseball Weekly*) in each of Danny Hall's 16 seasons as the Yellow Jackets' skipper. Tech has been a preseason Top 10 pick in six of the last 11 years and a top five selection in four of the last nine seasons.

Jackets in ACC Openers

With a win over Maryland on March 6, Georgia Tech improved to 21-9 in ACC openers. The Jackets have started conference play at home on all but four occasions since joining the league in 1980 and have now won four of their last five league openers, and 12 of 16 under head coach Danny Hall.

How the Yellow Jackets fare in the ACC opener typically indicates how they will finish their first ACC series. When Tech has won its ACC opener, the Yellow Jackets have gone on to win the three-game series every year since 1992. The same is true for when the Jackets have lost their ACC opener. Tech has swept the first ACC series of the season 10 times under Hall.

The Jackets have begun ACC play against the Terrapins three times since Hall's arrival in 1994, and on all three occasions they have not only won the opener, but they have swept the series.

Tech Picked to Finish Second in Coastal Division

Georgia Tech was picked to finish second in the Coastal Division race according to the 2009 ACC Preseason Coaches Poll, voted on by the league's 12 head coaches. Coastal Division leader North Carolina, who has earned a trip to Omaha each of the last three seasons, was the overall favorite, finishing with 72 votes, five ahead of Florida State, who led all Atlantic Division teams with 67 votes.

The Yellow Jackets (56 votes) and 2008 ACC Champion Miami (49 votes) followed North Carolina in the Coastal Division standings, with Virginia (34), Duke (24) and Virginia Tech (17) rounding out the list. Behind the Seminoles in the Atlantic Division race were Clemson (61), NC State (50), Wake Forest (33), Boston College (25) and Maryland (16).

Draft Dodgers

Six current Georgia Tech players have previously been drafted seven times by Major League teams. The highest concentration of drafted players ever on one Yellow Jacket team occurred in 2000 and 2003. Those teams featured 11 players previously drafted.

The 2009 list includes **Derek Dietrich** (3rd, Astros, 2007), **Jason Haniger** (19th, Pirates, 2008), **Brandon Miller** (33rd, Red Sox, 2008), **Luke Murton** (40th, Yankees, 2007; 33rd, Diamondbacks, 2008), **Mark Pope** (17th, Braves, 2008) and **Zach Von Tersch** (38th, Nationals, 2006).

In the Bigs

In 2008, Georgia Tech set an all-time high when 12 of its alumni baseball players appeared on major league rosters, breaking the previous season-high of 11, set in 2003.

Former All-America third baseman Mark Teixeira began the season in Atlanta as a member of the Braves before being traded to the Los Angeles Angels prior to the trade deadline. He signed an eight-year, \$180 million contract with the New York Yankees during the offseason.

Jason Varitek, one of three first-team All-Americans on Tech's 1994 team and the captain of the Red Sox, played his 11th full season in Boston, leading his team to the American League Championship Series. Nomar Garciaparra, another member of Tech's 1994 College World Series runner-up team, spent his third season in Los Angeles, helping the Dodgers to the National League Championship Series, while Jay Payton, his former Yellow Jacket teammate, played for the Baltimore Orioles for the second-straight season.

Matt Murton and Eric Patterson, teammates from 2001-02 at Georgia Tech, began their second year as Chicago Cubs teammates before being traded to the Oakland Athletics in a package deal.

Speaking of teammates, Marlon Byrd, in his second year with the Texas Rangers in 2008, welcomed a Major League newcomer to Arlington when former Yellow Jacket Brandon Boggs was called up in late April. Boggs proceeded to play in over 100 games for the Rangers, recording over 25 extra-base hits in his rookie campaign. Byrd wasn't too shabby himself for Texas, belting 10 home runs in addition to 28 doubles during the season.

He may not have been stationed in Arlington, but David Newhan made his state of Texas debut by playing over 60 games for the Houston Astros, while Kevin Cameron spent his second season with the San Diego Padres.

Micah Owings, the hard-hitting pitcher from Gainesville, Ga., began the season with the Arizona Diamondbacks, but finished the year as a member of the Cincinnati Reds.

And the final member of Tech's alumni class in the Majors in 2008? That would be none other than Jason Perry - who was released by Detroit during spring training, but picked up by the Braves organization. He spent the majority of the season between Mississippi and Richmond before making his major league debut July 4th. He became the first player in Atlanta history to record a triple in his first career at bat.
