## GEORGIA TECH SEASON IN REVIEW

Final Record: 21-16 • ACC: 8-10 (11th place) • Post-Season: NIT finals

### Tech's Season to Remember

Georgia Tech played in its first National Invitation Tournament championship game in 46 years in 2017, capping an inaugural season under head coach Josh Pastner which defied all pre-season projections and expectations. Tech won 21 games and an 8-10 ACC record for the second straight year after being picked to finish 14th in the conference.

Along the way, the Yellow Jackets knocked off No. 9 North Carolina, the eventual national champion, No. 6 Florida State and No. 14 Notre Dame, as well as Boston College, Clemson, Pittsburgh and Syracuse in conference play.

Tech defeated Indiana and Belmont at home in the first two rounds of the NIT, completing a school-record 17-win home schedule, then went on the road to defeat Ole Miss to reach its first NIT final four since 1971. Once there, the Yellow Jackets won their semifinal game over CSU Bakersfield before losing in the championship game to TCU.

The Yellow Jackets return their top three scorers – sophomore guard Josh Okogie, senior center Ben Lammers and senior guard Tadic Jackson – from that team. Lammers, who ranked No. 3 in the nation in blocked shots and No. 4 in the ACC in rebounding, earned second-team All-ACC honors and was named the ACC Defensive Player of the Year. Okogie, who accumulated the third-most points of any Tech freshman in program history, was named to the ACC All-Freshman team.

### The Starting Lineup

- Despite the fact that Georgia Tech loses six seniors from the 2016-17 squad, its top three scorers and two of its top three rebounders from that team - Josh Okogie (16.1 ppg, 5.4 rpg), Ben Lammers (14.2 ppg, 9.2 rpg) and Tadic Jackson (12.1 ppg) - return for Pastner's second season on the Flats. Five players who averaged 10 or more minutes per game return for 2017-18.
- Georgia Tech played in the NIT for the ninth time, and made it to the finals for the first time since 1971, when the Yellow Jackets lost to North Carolina in the championship game. It was the 25th post-season appearance overall in program history.
- Tech's last trip to play in Madison Square Garden occurred in November of 2003. That season, the Yellow Jackets knocked off

top-ranked Connecticut and No. 25 Texas Tech to win the Pre-Season NIT at the Garden, helping propel the Yellow Jackets to a 12-0 start and an eventual berth in the national championship game against UConn.

- **Tech defeated four top-100 RPI teams in the NIT** - Indiana (79), Belmont (60), Ole Miss (77) and CSU Bakersfield (76). TCU was No. 67, and Tech, at No. 106, was the lowest-ranked team in the NIT final four.

- **Tech won 20 games for the second straight year and for the 16th time in program history.** Only six of those have come in the last 20 years. Tech has not had back-to-back 20-win seasons since 2003-04 and 2004-05.

- **Tech's 21 wins with head coach Josh Pastner** represented the most for a first-year head coach in Tech history. The previous high was 17 under Paul Hewitt in 2000-01 and Roy Mundorff in 1926-27.

- **Tech had the sixth most efficient defense in the country** according to KenPom.com, giving up 91.0 points per 100 possessions. The Yellow Jackets were the highest-ranked team in the nation in that category not playing in the NCAA Tournament. Tech ranked 13th nationally in field goal percentage defense, 51st in scoring defense and No. 4 in blocked shots per game. The Jackets ranked No. 1 in the ACC in field goal percentage defense (39.8 pct.), and No. 4 in scoring defense (66.8 ppg).

- **Tech set a program season record for blocked shots with 221**, led by Ben Lammers' 122. That beat the previous mark of 209 set by the 1997-98 team, which was led by Alvin Jones' school-record 141.

- **Tech managed to win eight ACC games and reach the post-season** despite ranking 14th in the ACC in scoring, 15th in field goal percentage and three-point percentage, and 14th in free throw percentage. The Jackets ranked No. 267 in adjusted offensive efficiency according to KenPom.com.

- **Tech averaged 70.4 points, shot 45 percent from the floor and 34.6 percent from three-point range in its five NIT games.** The Jackets also recorded an 89-to-56 assist/turnover ratio and held their opponents to 39.7-percent shooting from the floor.

- **Freshman Josh Okogie paced the Yellow Jackets in the NIT**, averaging 19.8 points per game (26 vs. Ole Miss, 22 vs. CSU Bakersfield) while hitting 46.5 percent of his shots from the floor and 28-of-37 from the free throw line.

- **Ben Lammers' +10.6 per game scoring average increase** over the 2015-16 season was the third-best in the ACC, behind John Collins of Wake Forest and Matt Farrell of Notre Dame. Tadic Jackson (+7.4), Quinton Stephens (+5.4) and Josh Heath (+2.6) more than doubled their scoring outputs over last season.

- **Three keys for Tech to win** - The Jackets were 21-3 when they shot a better percentage from the floor than their opponent, were 17-0 when scoring 70 points and 20-4 when attempting more free throws than the opponent.

- **Georgia Tech was 4-4 against teams in the top 25 of CBSports.com's RPI rankings**, and defeated 10 top-100 teams.

- **With its first two NIT victories at home**, the Yellow Jackets established a new program record for home wins in a season (17-4). The 2006-07 team went 16-1 at home.

- **Georgia Tech defeated three AP top-25 teams in Pastner's first season** (No. 9 North Carolina, No. 6 Florida State, No. 14 Notre Dame), the most in one season for the program since the Yellow Jackets went 4-3 vs. top-25 teams in 2003-04. Tech had beaten as many as three top-25 teams in one season six times prior to 2016-17.

- **Tech beat two AP top-10 teams** - No. 9 North Carolina and No. 6 Florida State - the first time the Yellow Jackets had defeated multiple top-10 teams in the same season since 2004-05 (No. 5 Wake Forest in the regular season and No. 2 North Carolina in the ACC Tournament). It was the first time since 2003-04 that the Jackets have beaten multiple top-10 teams in the regular season (No. 1 Connecticut, No. 10 Wake

Forest, No. 3 Duke). It is the 18th time in program history that Tech has defeated multiple top-10 teams in the same season.

- Tech was one of two teams to finish the regular season with a winning record (3-2) against the top four seeds in the ACC Tournament (Virginia was the other).

### Tech's NIT History

Georgia Tech has an 14-9 record all-time in nine appearances in the National Invitation Tournament, reaching the finals twice (1971, 2017) and the quarterfinals four other times. The Yellow Jackets are 6-1 in post-season NIT games at home, 2-5 on the road, 5-3 at Madison Square Garden.

- Tech reached the final four of the NIT in 2017, defeating Indiana and Belmont at home before eliminating Mississippi on the road in the quarterfinals. In New York, the Yellow Jackets beat CSY Bakersfield before falling to TCU in the title game.

- It was Tech's first run to the NIT final four since 1971, when, behind its all-time leading scorer, Rich Yunkus, the Jackets defeated LaSalle, Michigan and St. Bonaventure (in double-overtime) before losing to North Carolina in the championship game. The entire tournament was played at Madison Square Garden in those days, and only conference champions made the NCAA Tournament field.

- Tech reached the quarterfinals three times in its last four NIT appearances before 2017, coming up one win short of playing in New York. In 2016, the Yellow Jackets reached the quarterfinals by defeating Houston at home, 81-62, and South Carolina on the road, 83-66, before falling to San Diego State on the road, 72-56.

- The Jackets' 2002-03 team, when current NBA stars Chris Bosh and Jarrett Jack were freshmen on a team that also included B.J. Elder, Tech's 12th all-time leading scorer and Marvin Lewis, No. 21 on the all-time scoring list, defeated Ohio State at home and Iowa on the road before an 80-72 loss to a Bob Knight-coached Texas Tech team in Lubbock.

- Tech also made the quarterfinals in 1998 with a team led by No. 2 all-time leading scorer Matt Harpring, defeating Seton Hall and Georgetown before losing to Penn State, 75-70. All three games were played at home.

### Tech at Madison Square Garden

Georgia Tech made its 11th trip to Madison Square Garden, which included two previous appearances in the (post-season) National Invitation Tournament in 1970 and 1971. The Yellow Jackets are 15-8 all-time in the "World's Most Famous Arena."

Tech has also played in three Pre-Season NIT tournaments (1991, 1995, 2003), four Holiday Festivals (1986, 1993, 1996, 1998), and a single game against Iona in 1989.

On Tech's last trip to the Garden in November of 2003, the Yellow Jackets knocked off top-ranked Connecticut and No. 25 Texas Tech to win the Pre-Season NIT, helping propel Tech to a 12-0 start and an eventual berth in the national championship game against UConn.

- Against TCU in the final game, Tech started Josh Heath, Corey Heyward, Ben Lammers, Josh Okogie and Quinton Stephens for the 19th time this season, and for the 18th time in Tech's last 19 games. Tadic Jackson started Tech's game against Pitt in the ACC Tournament in place of Heyward. Three Yellow Jackets – Lammers, Okogie and Stephens – started every game this season.

- Tech played its last 15 games without backup forward Abdoulaye Gueye (fractured wrist).

- **Pastner meter 1 (assists to made field goals):** Tech assisted on 89 of 126 field goals in its five NIT games combined (70.6 percent). Tech finished the season at 62.6 percent (63.2 percent in ACC games).

- **Pastner meter 2 (free throws made to opponents' attempts):** Tech made 10-of-17 free throws to TCU's 13-of-16

(goal of making more than opponent tries not accomplished). Tech was 73-of-105 (69.5 percent) in five NIT games, compared to 48-of-61 for its opponents.

### Player Updates

- **Josh Okogie** scored 12 points in the NIT championship game, his 32nd double-digit game of the year. Okogie reached double figures in Tech's last 16 straight games, last failing to do so vs. Notre Dame on Jan. 28. He averaged a team-high 16.1 points per game, and was Tech's highest-scoring freshman since Dion Glover (18.4 ppg) in 2002-03. Only six times in Tech history has a freshman led the Jackets in scoring.

- **Okogie** was named to the NIT All-Tournament team after scoring 34 points in the two games in New York. In five NIT games, Okogie averaged a team-high 19.8 points, 46.5 percent from the floor and 75.7 percent from the foul line. He also averaged 7.4 rebounds and had 14 assists against six turnovers.

- **Okogie** surpassed 500 points for the season against Indiana, and finished the season with 596. The only other freshmen in Tech history to score more points were Kenny Anderson (721 in 35 games) and Stephon Marbury (679 in 36 games).

- **Ben Lammers** scored eight points with seven rebounds against TCU, missing double digits for just the sixth time all season. Lammers hit 1-of-11 shots from the floor, finishing the season at 51.6 percent (fifth in the ACC).

- **Lammers** blocked three shots against TCU, finishing the season with 125 blocks, the second-highest season total ever for a Tech player. Alvin Jones holds the Tech season record with 141 in 1997-98. Lammers averaged 3.38 blocks per game, which ranked No. 3 nationally and led the ACC. He also holds fifth place at Tech in career blocks with 176.

- **Lammers** averaged 13.6 points and 8.6 rebounds in NIT games, and hit 25-of-47 from the floor (53.2 percent).

- **Quinton Stephens** averaged 13.4 points in the NIT, connecting on 26-of-53 shots from the floor (49.1 percent), 12-of-31 on threes (39.1 percent), and 7.8 rebounds per game. He finished the season at 10.4 points per game and 7.6 rebounds (ninth in the ACC).

- **Stephens** played in the 135th game of his career against TCU, a Tech record, and further distanced himself from the previous mark of 130, shared by Malcolm Mackey (1990-93), Marvin Lewis (2001-04), Anthony McHenry (2002-05) and Marcus Georges-Hunt (2013-16). Stephens broke the mark when he set foot on the floor for the Indiana game.

- **Tadic Jackson** scored 19 points (8-of-14 from the floor) against TCU, his 13th double-digit effort in Tech's last 17 games. The junior guard finished the season as Tech's third leading scorer (12.1 ppg), the fourth reserve in Tech history to average in double figures.

- **Jackson** was named to the All-NIT team after scoring 31 points in the two games at Madison Square Garden (14.0 points in five NIT games).

- Reserve post man **Sylvester Ogbonda** scored six points on 3-of-3 shooting in eight minutes off the bench against TCU, his biggest production since Feb. 4 at Wake Forest.

- **Corey Heyward** played 19 turnover-free minutes, and committed just five turnovers in 309 minutes over his last 18 games. He played 25 turnover-free games this season.

### Pastner, Lammers, Okogie Capture ACC Honors

Georgia Tech's first-year head coach Josh Pastner was named Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year, and the Yellow Jackets captured their biggest haul of ACC honors in recent memory as junior center Ben Lammers was named second-team All-ACC and conference Defensive Player of the Year, while first-year player Josh Okogie was named to the ACC's All-Freshman Team.

It was the first time since 2013 since Tech has had

honorees in multiple categories, and also the first time since 2013 that Tech has had more than one individual honored.

Pastner, in his first year on the Flats, earned 24 of the 53 votes cast, three times that of the second-place coach. He becomes the third different Tech head man to be named ACC Coach of the Year, joining Bobby Cremins (1983, 1985, 1996) and Paul Hewitt, who captured the honor in his first season of 2000-01.

Lammers, a 6-10 junior center, was the fourth Tech center to earn All-ACC honors in program history, joining John Salley (1986), Alvin Jones (2001) and Daniel Miller (2014) and gave the Yellow Jackets a second-team all-conference player for the second year in a row. He received the eighth-most votes overall in all-conference balloting. Lammers was the leading vote-getter for the ACC's All-Defensive team and is the fifth Tech player to make that team, but the first to be named ACC Defensive Player of the Year, for which he received 37 of the 53 votes. Lammers came in second to Wake Forest's John Collins in voting for the ACC's Most Improved Player.

Okogie, the 15th Yellow Jacket to make the ACC All-Freshman team, was the fourth-leading vote-getter for that team, but only two votes shy of leader Dennis Smith, who received 36 of the 53 votes for ACC Freshman of the Year.

Tadric Jackson, a 6-2 junior guard, received four votes for the ACC's Sixth Man of the Year award (second-most), which went to Virginia Tech's Seth Allen in a landslide (43 of 53 votes).

### Pastner Reaps More Honors

First-year Georgia Tech coach Josh Pastner picked up a couple more honors after being named ACC Coach of the Year. He was named **District 2 Coach of the Year by the National Association of Basketball Coaches** (District 2 covers the ACC footprint and its member institutions), and also was named the **John "Whack" Hyder Georgia College Coach of the Year by the Atlanta Tipoff Club**. The Tipoff Club award is named for Whack Hyder, who led Tech's program from 1952-73.

After the season, *Sports Illustrated* honored Pastner as "**Best At Beating SI's Projections, Major Conference,**" saying, "Last fall, a certain member of the punditry made the now-infamous claim that Pastner was presiding over one of the worst major-conference rosters ever. SI's projection system wasn't that harsh, but it didn't love the Yellow Jackets, ranking them 204th in the preseason. Pastner proceeded to build the nation's No. 6-ranked defense around rim-protector Ben Lammers. That helped Tech upset North Carolina, Notre Dame, Florida State and Syracuse in the regular season, finish as the NIT runner-up and rank 77th in efficiency."

### StraitJackets

Due to its ability to play different defenses and keep opponents off balance, Georgia Tech held most of its ACC opponents below, significantly below in several cases, their scoring averages and field goal shooting percentages in conference play, even in several of its losses.

Only Duke (Jan. 4) and Syracuse (second meeting on March 4) were able to have significant success against the Yellow Jackets' array of defenses.

**Tech continued its mastery of high-powered offenses in its NIT** by holding Indiana (80.2 ppg, 48.2 pct. FG, 38.3 pct. on 3s) to 63 points, 37.9 percent from the floor and 26.3 percent from three-point range. The Jackets held Belmont (77.4 ppg, 47.4 pct. FG, 34.3 on 3s) to 57 points, 33.3 percent from the floor, 33.3 percent from three-point range. Tech held Ole Miss 12 points under its season average of 78.3 points per game, three percentage points (39.7 pct.) under its season norm of 42.4 percent, and to 6-of-28 from three-point range (35.2 pct. for the season). The Jackets limited CSU Bakersfield 10 points below its season norm of 71.5 points per game.

• **Tech ranked No. 6 nationally in adjusted defensive efficiency** according to KenPom.com (91.0 points allowed per

100 possessions), and eight ACC teams, as well as Tech's first-round NIT foe, Indiana, ranked among the nation's top 30 most efficient offensive teams.

• Tech had not ranked that high in KenPom's adjusted defensive efficiency since 2005 (5th). The Yellow Jackets' 2004 NCAA runner-up team ranked No. 4.

• Tech also ranked 20th nationally according to KenPom.com in effective defensive field goal percentage, and 27th in fewest free throw attempts as a percentage of field goals attempted. The Jackets also ranked 14th nationally in lowest two-point field goal percentage yield (43.9 pct.).

• Tech accomplished this while ranking 23rd in fewest personal fouls per game.

• Tech ranked fourth in the conference in scoring defense (66.8 ppg) and No. 1 in field goal percentage defense (39.8 pct.). The Jackets also ranked No. 2 in the ACC in defensive rebounds per game.

they've got Lammers in the back that blocks shots. They change defenses on you, and they're really hard to score against." - Notre Dame's Mike Brey on Feb. 23

"They do some things out of their man-to-man and zones that make it challenging to make adjustments. Your players don't want to overreact every time they make a change. You need to have an overall plan for how you're going to play them." - Miami head coach Jim Larranaga

"They change defenses really well, so you don't get into a really good rhythm. They take away the rim so effectively, it puts some pressure on those guys outside to make shots. He makes up for a lot of mistakes." - Boston College head coach Jim Christian

## Tech's Block Party

Ben Lammers, with 125 blocked shots in 37 games (No. 3 in the nation), was not alone in his ability to defend the rim for Georgia Tech. The Yellow Jackets swatted away a school-record 221 shots, a 5.97 average which led the ACC and ranked No. 4 in the nation.

Tech surpassed the 1997-98 Tech team, led by Alvin Jones' Tech record 141 blocks, which rejected 209 shots.

Freshman Josh Okogie and Quinton Stephens each had 27 blocked shots, and Abdoulaye Gueye had 12.

It may signal a trend for the Yellow Jackets. Only one of Josh Pastner's Memphis teams ranked lower than 21st nationally in blocked shots in seven years, and two of them ranked fourth (6.4 per game each).

Tech blocked a program-record 16 shots against Southern, and blocked 10 each against NC State and Virginia Tech for its high in an ACC game.

## Tech Picks Up the Scoring Pace

Georgia Tech managed to win eight ACC games this year and reach the post-season despite ranking 14th in the ACC in scoring, 15th in field goal percentage and three-point percentage, and 14th in free throw percentage. The Jackets finished the season No. 267 in adjusted offensive efficiency according to KenPom.com.

Maybe indicating that unfamiliarity breeds success, Tech averaged 70.4 points, shot 45 percent from the floor and 34.6 percent from three-point range in its five NIT games. The Jackets also assisted on 89 of their 126 made field goals (70.6 percent) and turned the ball over just 11 times per game.

Tech also got to the free throw line more frequently, scoring 14.6 points per game there (compared to 13.7 for the season overall), and connected on 69.5 percent of its attempts (68.3 percent season).

Said Ole Miss coach Andy Kennedy, "We allowed them to have 21 assists on 27 made field goals, which would tell you their ball movement was excellent." Ole Miss coach Andy Kennedy said, "and at the end of that ball movement, they were making shots."

## Assisted Living

Georgia Tech coach Josh Pastner preached and prodded his Yellow Jackets on ball and player movement from the first time he got his team on the practice court in April. His primary measuring stick on how well the Jackets perform is their ratio of assists to made field goals.

The results this season were remarkable. The Yellow Jackets ranked 13th nationally, according to KenPom.com,

in highest percentage of assists to made field goals at 62.6 percent, the team's highest rate since the 2000-01 season. Tech's number was 63.2 percent in ACC games.

The national average for that statistic is 52.4 percent. Only in five games did Tech not meet or exceed that figure.

Since assist statistics have been kept at Georgia Tech (dating back to 1964-65), only seven Tech teams have posted a better season rate.

## Extended Mileage

Pre-season research by one ESPN writer that Georgia Tech was the least experienced team in the nation. According to KenPom, Tech ranked No. 310 in the nation in minutes continuity, a percentage of a team's minutes that are played by the same player from last season to this season (33 percent for Tech).

Playing time for these five returning letterwinners has drastically escalated to fill the void created by the loss of five seniors from last year's team.

Some of those numbers figure have risen in ACC play. Ben Lammers and Quinton Stephens have averaged 36-plus minutes in ACC games, each playing 40 minutes in seven games combined.

Tech played its reserves an average of just 46 minutes in conference games (22.9 percent of total minutes) and just 41.6 average minutes in the NIT (20.8 percent).

## The Final Countdown

In its Atlantic Coast Conference wins, Georgia Tech proved adept maintaining control of the game once the Yellow Jackets have gained the upper hand.

- **In its upset of No. 9 North Carolina on Dec. 31**, Tech moved ahead at the 11:59 mark on a pair of Josh Okogie free throws and never again surrendered the lead in a 75-63 victory.

- **Against Clemson on Jan. 12**, the Yellow Jackets took the lead for good on a Tadric Jackson three-pointer at the 12:52 mark and methodically built the lead to a final 75-63 score.

- **At NC State**, Jackson broke a tie with a jumper at the 16:11 mark, hit another after NC State closed to two at 10:55, and Tech built a 14-point lead before eventually winning 86-76.

- **Against No. 6 Florida State**, Tech raced out to a 38-11 lead with a 19-0 run in the first half and never let up, leading 41-15 at the half and maintaining most of that margin through the 78-56 final. When the Seminoles crept within 18 at the 8:36 mark, Tech responded with a 7-2 burst and the lead was at least 20 the rest of the way.

- **Against No. 14 Notre Dame**, Tech gained the lead with 12:57 left and led by five with 5:15 left. Notre Dame rallied to tie, but never regained the lead and missed three shots in its final three possessions.

- **Against Boston College**, Tech trailed by as many as 15 points in the first half, seven at intermission and by eight early

in the second half. But the Yellow Jackets went on a 14-4 run and took the lead at 12:28 on a Justin Moore three-pointer. Tech expanded its lead to as many as 15 before finishing with a 65-54 victory.

- **Against Syracuse**, Tech trailed by nine points in the first half, closed the gap to three by intermission, then opened the second half with a 20-5 spurt to take a lead it would not relinquish.

- **Against Pittsburgh**, Tech trailed by five early in the second half, rallied to take the lead at the 15:35 mark, then after three ties and four lead changes over the next 10 minutes, took the lead for good at the 4:53 mark and scored on its last seven possessions to pull away.

- **Tech performed similarly in putting away Indiana in its NIT opener.** After Indiana rallied from a 34-27 halftime deficit to lead on three occasions early in the second half, the Yellow Jackets battled back and took the lead for good at the 12:54 mark (45-44) on a Tadic Jackson layup. Tech methodically expanded its lead after that, growing it to as many as 15 with less than two minutes to play.

- Tech outrebounded them 19.1 to 15.8.
- Tech compiled a 83/51 assist/turnover ratio in the second half of its ACC wins.
- Tech assisted on 76.1 percent of its made field goals (83 assists, 109 field goals).

### Third Time Not the Charm

Georgia Tech's first-round victory over Indiana kept intact a distinction for head coach Josh Pastner that is a personal point of pride, and a measure of consistent success. Pastner has never lost three straight games in eight seasons as a head coach, never in seven years at Memphis and not in his first season at Georgia Tech.

Only one other power conference head coach and program can make that claim over the last eight seasons, and that is John Calipari and Kentucky.

Seven ACC teams have lost three in a row this season. Tom Izzo and Michigan State lost three straight this season. Roy Williams and North Carolina lost three straight in 2013-14. Kansas and Villanova lost three in a row in 2012-13.

That Tech has been able to avoid a three-game skid this season is remarkable; the Yellow Jackets have lost two in a row on six occasions.

The most improbable victories that stopped those streaks from continuing were a win Dec. 7 at VCU on Dec. 7, the Rams' only home loss this season, Jan. 25 at home vs. No. 6-ranked Florida State, a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament, and Tuesday's win over Indiana, a No. 3 seed in the NIT.

## The Laminator is Everywhere

Ben Lammers came a long way from being a dependable reserve post player for Georgia Tech, his role as a sophomore, to being one of the best big men in the country in 2016-17, one who exerted a major influence on both ends of the floor in every game.

He became only the fourth Tech center to earn All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors when he was named second-team All-ACC, and he was also voted the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year.

After playing all 36 games 2015-16 in relief of seniors Charles Mitchell and Nick Jacobs, the 6-10 junior flourished in the Yellow Jackets' four-out, one-in system, piling up 16 double-

doubles and 31 double-digit scoring efforts in 2016-17. He came up short of double digits in points just six times.

He posted a double-double in six of Tech's eight ACC wins and recorded three in the NIT.

He scored 20 or more points in five ACC games, four of them were Tech wins.

Lammers finished the season as the nation's No. 3 shot blocker, averaging 3.38 per game. He also was the ACC's fourth-leading rebounder (9.2 per game), ranked 22nd in the ACC in scoring average (14.2 points per game) and No. 5 in field goal percentage (51.6 pct.).

His jump of 10.6 points per game in his scoring average over last season was the third-best in the ACC behind John Collins of Wake Forest and Matt Farrell of Notre Dame (11.7). But he also tripled his career rebound average entering the season, tripled his average minutes played and doubled his career number in blocked shots.

A triple threat, Lammers also passes the ball very well, accumulating more than two assists per game (78 assists to 64 turnovers).

The player who averaged less than 15 minutes per game last year averaged 35.4 overall, 36.6 minutes in ACC games, including five 40-minute games. He ranked No. 4 in the ACC in that category.

**Assistant coach Eric Reveno on Lammers** - *"He's a deceiving athlete: long, moves well, runs the floor well. From a coaching perspective, the thing that you see right away from Ben is that he's got a very good feel for the game. You see it in his passes, finding open guys ... and he's got a very good shooting touch. Those two things might be the hardest to teach. He's good at those things. From a coaching perspective, you get excited right away."*

## Media Guidelines

Georgia Tech's practices are generally closed to the public and the media, but coaches and players are available during the half-hour prior to practices most non-game days. Notices will be distributed weekly to confirm the schedule.

TV stations are allowed to shoot B-roll during the first 15 minutes of those practices.

Media are asked to notify Mike Stamus *the day before* of their need to attend and to make specific player requests.

Interview requests with players that need to be conducted at other times must be made through the Georgia Tech communications office at least 24 hours in advance. These interviews will be conducted at a time and place convenient to the players' availability and class schedule.

Media are asked not to contact players directly either by phone, e-mail, text or social media. They are instructed not to respond. Every effort will be made to make players available.

## Interviewing Coach Pastner

Media wishing to speak with Coach Pastner either before a practice or at other times must notify Mike Stamus in the communications office in advance to make or confirm arrangements. He also is available each Monday on the ACC Teleconference (10:40 a.m.) beginning January 9.

## Post-Game Protocol

Both head coaches will hold a post-game press conference in the designated interview room (Shah Media Room at McCamish Pavilion).

Players requested by the media will be brought to the interview room following the coaches press conferences, when the team is at home, outside the team's locker room when the team is on the road.

## Josh Pastner Radio Show

Head coach Josh Pastner's weekly radio show airs each Monday from 7-8 p.m. live on "680 the Fan" and 93.7 FM, beginning Dec. 5.

## ACC Coaches Weekly Teleconference

The 15 ACC head basketball coaches will be featured on nine Monday teleconferences during the 2016-17 season, beginning on Monday, January 9, 2017, and continuing through February 27. Each coach will have 10 minutes to make an opening statement and answer questions. There will be an instant replay of each teleconference on the Conference's internet site TheACC.com each Monday afternoon.

**Georgia Tech head coach Josh Pastner will be on the teleconference at 10:40 a.m. each week.**

Coaches that play on Monday in January and February are not required to participate in that day's call. The teleconference schedule for each Monday will adjust somewhat for the head coaches whose teams do not play that Monday night.

## Josh 1.0

Freshman Josh Okogie put together the kind of season that rivaled some of the best freshmen in Georgia Tech history (see list on page 7).

The 6-4 guard became the seventh Tech freshman in program history to lead the Yellow Jackets in scoring, posting the sixth-best scoring average (16.1 ppg) for a freshman in program history, and the highest since Dion Glover (18.4 ppg) in 1998.

Okogie accumulated 596 points over 37 games. Only two other freshmen in Tech history - Kenny Anderson (722), Stephon Marbury (679) scored more. He passed Mark Price (568 in 1982-83) against CSU Bakersfield.

The Snellville, Ga., product won ACC Rookie of the Week honors four times, including three times in ACC play - after scoring 26 points to lead Tech over No. 9 North Carolina, after scoring 27 in a victory at NC State, and again after he rang up 35 with 14 rebounds in the Jackets' victory over No. 6 Florida State.

He also earned the honor after 38-point outburst Nov. 26 against Tulane, which was a record for a Tech freshman.

In the last 20 years, only two other Georgia Tech players have tossed up a 35-point game (B.J. Elder 36 vs. Clemson in 2004, Will Bynum 35 vs. North Carolina in 2005).

He posted five games of 20-plus in ACC action (also 23 at Wake Forest and 25 in the Jackets' second meeting vs. NC State). He reached double figures in every ACC game but one.

Okogie ranked 11th in the conference in scoring average vs. ACC teams (17.1 ppg) during regular-season play, and he connected on 48.1 percent of his shots from the floor, 42.9 percent from three-point range and 74.0 percent from the foul line. He averaged 5.8 rebounds in ACC games.

He got to the free throw line a team-high 241 times, tied for the second-most in Tech history, and his 180 free throws made tied for third-most. He ranked third in the ACC in free throw attempts per game at 6.5, and got to the line an average of 6.8 times in ACC games.

- Okogie's 35 points were two shy of Tech's record of 37 in an ACC game by Dennis Scott vs. North Carolina in 1990. It was the most points for a Tech player in an ACC game since Will Bynum racked up 35 against the same Tar Heels in a 2005 ACC Tournament game.

- Okogie became the third Georgia Tech freshman to score 30 or more points in multiple games. Mark Price did it

twice in 1982-83, and Kenny Anderson did it four times in 1989-90.

- Okogie became the first ACC player with 30 points, 10 rebounds and five assists in a game since A.D. Vassallo (Virginia Tech - March, 2009)

- Okogie was the first player to deliver 35 points and 14 rebounds in a game vs. Division I competition this season. He is only the second ACC player to do it since the start of 2010-11 (Brice Johnson 39 and 23 at FSU on 1/4/2016).

## Okogie Goes for 38 vs. Tulane

Josh Okogie set a Georgia Tech freshman record for points in a game with his 38 on Nov. 26 against Tulane. He hit 12 of 20 shots from the floor and 13 of 18 from the free throw line (more than Tulane's entire team, 12-of-17). It is the most points scored by an ACC player in a game this season.

- He eclipsed the previous Tech freshman mark of 33 by Mark Price against Virginia on March 12, 1983 (ACC Tournament) and Dion Glover against Seton Hall on March 11, 1998 (NIT).

- It was the fourth-most points scored by a freshman in ACC history and the most since the 2013 ACC Tournament, when Boston College's Olivier Hanlan scored 41 (the ACC freshman record) against Georgia Tech. There have been two other 40-point games by freshmen in ACC history - Harrison Barnes of North Carolina in 2011 and Tyler Hansbrough of North Carolina in 2006.

- Okogie's 38 points were the most by any Tech player since Kenny Anderson scored 42 vs. Howard on Jan. 2, 1991, and tied for the seventh-highest single-game scoring total in

- Okogie became the fifth different Tech freshman to score 30 points in a game (Kenry Anderson did it four times, Mark Price did it twice, Dion Glover and Thaddeus Young did it once each).

- Okogie scored 14 straight points for Tech bridging intermission, including the last six points of the first half and the first eight of the second half. His spree helped Tech extend its lead from 31-30 to 45-32.

**Pastner on Okogie's 38-point night** - *"He didn't take plays off. Beforehand, he was having the tendency to take plays off. Now I say that, you look at his numbers as a freshman has been pretty darn good. He's just going to continue to get better. The reason he scored offensively was because he was at his best defensively as he's been all year long. It translated to him being really locked in offensively. When he is not locked in defensively, he is not as effective offensively. Tonight he was his best defensively and it triggered and translated into him being great offensively."*

## Higher Q

Quinton Stephens spent three years working to become a more consistent outside shooter, but as a senior in Georgia Tech's new system under head coach Josh Pastner, the 6-9 forward transformed himself into Tech's most complete and versatile player, doing whatever was necessary to help the Yellow Jackets win.

Stephens, playing a stretch-4 position rather than his wing forward of the past, filled up most every column on the stat sheet in a nightly basis. He more than doubled his career scoring (10.4 ppg) and rebounding averages (7.6, 9th in the ACC), scoring in double figures 22 times and rebounding in double digits 10 times.

Stephens averaged 13.4 points and 7.8 rebounds in the NIT while hitting 49.1 percent of his shots from the floor and 12-for-31 from three-point range.

The 6-9 senior put together the best stretch of his career over an eight-game ACC stretch before injuring his ankle against Boston College on Feb. 11 (played just five minutes), averaging 13.1 points and 9.4 rebounds while re-discovering his three-point stroke (22-for-55, 40 percent).

In that stretch, he recorded two of his seven double-doubles (18/13 at Virginia Tech, 14/11 at Wake Forest), matched his career scoring high with 22 at NC State, and three times hit his career high in rebounds (13).

He posted his sixth double-double of the season Feb. 21 against NC State (11 points, 10 rebounds) and his seventh against Pittsburgh in the ACC Tournament (16 and 10).

He finished third on the team in assists (2.2 per game) and, in keeping with Pastner's attack-on-offense mandate, got to the free throw line more frequently. He has connected on 68.8 percent of 93 attempts, 76.5 percent in ACC games. He more than doubled the career totals with which he began the season.

Stephens already had set career highs for a season in every column of the stat sheet by the time Tech had played 24 games.

**Pastner on Stephens** - *"Quinton has totally changed his game. You see Quinton on the glass, the way he's flying all over the place. He's doing things he has never done. He has totally changed his game for the better."*

## Action Jackson

When Tadic Jackson is healthy and playing well, he makes a difference for the Georgia Tech with his ability to penetrate, handle the ball and score in traffic. In Tech's offensive schemes, Jackson has been a scoring threat as a shooter, as a driver and by posting up inside.

The 6-2 junior became one of the top reserves in program history, averaging 12.1 points while connecting on 44.6 percent of his shots from the floor, and 32.5 percent from three-point range, both well above his career norms of 32.2 percent overall and 21.9 percent from distance.

He became the fourth reserve in Tech history to average in double figures, and posted the highest scoring average by a Tech reserve since Glen Rice, Jr. (13.0 ppg) in 2011-12.

Jackson scored 20 or more points four times in Tech's last 16 games of the season, three of them victories. He set career highs twice with 25 points against Notre Dame and 29 against Boston College, then hit for 20 against Syracuse and Tech's second meeting vs. Notre Dame.

He authored two of the top six bench performances by ACC players.

- **In Tech's NIT opener against Indiana**, Jackson scored 13 of his 19 points in the second half, hitting 5-of-10 shots from the floor while registering all three of his assists and steals to help Tech pull away after Indiana had rallied to lead in three occasions early in the second period.

- **Against Notre Dame**, seven of his points came in a 15-2 first-half run that brought the Yellow Jackets back from a 10-point deficit. He grabbed two rebounds and three assists, including the rebound of Notre Dame's last-possession miss and the throw-ahead to Josh Okogie for his game-winning layup.

- **Against Boston College**, he finished off a 7-0 run to end the first half with a pair of layups, then scored 20 of his 29 in the second half as the Yellow Jackets erased an eight-point deficit to win by 11.

- **Against Syracuse**, he scored 15 of his 20 in the second half on 6-of-9 shooting, helping Tech rally from a three-point deficit to a 13-point lead. He drained a long three-pointer at the first-half horn and scored Tech's first bucket of the second half, scoring seven points in a 20-5 spurt.

- **In Tech's first meeting with Clemson**, made two key threes, grabbed four rebounds and scored 10 points as Tech pulled away in the second half. He was on the floor for the final 17 minutes at NC State, scoring eight points in a run that broke a 47-all tie and put the Jackets ahead by 11 with under nine

minutes remaining.

- Jackson scored 16 of his 24 points in the second half of Tech's win at VCU and buried a big three-pointer in overtime. He finished 9-of-18 from the floor, hit a pair of threes and did not turn the ball over in 31 minutes.

- In Tech's final non-conference game against North Carolina A&T, he scored 11 of his 12 points in the second half, including seven of the nine straight points Tech scored to erase a 45-41 deficit in the final 4:44.

**Pastner on Jackson** - "I've been hard on him, but I've been hard on him knowing his upside and his potential. I've pushed him hard, and I've held him accountable, but Tadic is a fine, young man and he's got a chance to be a really good player. He just has to stay aggressive, he's got to stay in attack mentality. His offense has to come through his defense and rebounding. That's where you get your energy. He's got to continue to take great pride in that."

**Boston College coach Jim Christian** - "He's a very strong guard. We knew he was going to drive it. Towards the end of the first half, he really started driving the ball. That's what we talked about at halftime. He's going to drive the ball, he's going to get the ball on the wing and he's going to power drive it to the middle of the floor. And he started the second half doing that, I think two or three times. Got him going. He's a good post-up guard, so in that area he's a little bit of a matchup problem for us, a big guard like that. But he played really well."

## Heath Becomes Steady Hand for Tech

In Georgia Tech's short playing rotation, every player's performance is critical, but senior point guard Josh Heath has made himself more indispensable as the ACC season has moved on and provided the Yellow Jackets with a steady hand.

In Tech's ACC victories this season, Heath averaged 7.5 points and 6.4 assists per game, compared to 5.4 and 3.7 in the Jackets' losses. Even those numbers exceed his career averages of 3.3 points and 2.9 assists entering this season.

Always a sure-handed player, Heath carried a 51-to-24 (2.42-1) assist/turnover ratio in those ACC wins. He has shot 51.2 percent from the floor, 5-of-12 on threes and 72.2 percent from the foul line, and had a team-high 12 steals while averaging 35.2 minutes.

## Matt Harpring - ACC Legend

Matt Harpring, the No. 2 all-time scoring leader in Georgia Tech history, is among fourteen former standout players and an inspirational national championship coach named to this year's class of Atlantic Coast Conference Basketball Legends presented by New York Life.

This year's ACC Legends class includes two individual that were integral parts of NCAA Championship teams, two National Players of the Year, one National Defensive Player of the Year, four conference Players of the Year and two ACC Tournament MVPs.

Harpring joins Mark Price as the only two Georgia Tech players to be named to the All-ACC first team three times during his career from 1994-98. He was named to All-America teams by seven different organizations as a senior, as well as a finalist for both the Naismith and Wooden Awards. His number "15" was retired by the school during the final home game of his senior year. Harpring finished his career as the second leading scorer (2,225 points) and third leading rebounder (997) in Georgia Tech annals, and he is widely considered one of the hardest working players in college basketball history. He remains the Yellow Jackets' all-time leader in free throws made and attempted. Harpring was named Academic All-America twice and earned NCAA and ACC postgraduate scholarships. Harpring was selected by the Orlando Magic in the first round (15th pick) of the 1998 NBA draft. Named to the 1998-99 NBA All-Rookie first team, Harpring went on to play 11 years in the NBA and scored more than 12,000 career points.

Today, Harpring and his family live in Atlanta, and he works as a color analyst for the Utah Jazz television broadcasts. He was inducted into the Georgia State Sports Hall of Fame on Feb. 25.

## Jackets Excel in Classroom in the Fall

Ten Yellow Jackets earned a grade-point average of 3.0 or better during the fall semester, and Tech's cumulative fall GPA of 2.85 is the highest on record for the team. All four seniors are among the group with 3.0+ GPAs, including Josh Heath, Corey Heyward (fifth-year because of an injury red-shirt in 2012-13), Rand Rowland and Quinton Stephens. Rowland graduated last Saturday, and the other three are scheduled to graduate in May.

## New Era Begins for Tech Basketball

Georgia Tech begins its 102nd season of basketball in 2016-17 under new head coach Josh Pastner, the 14th head coach in program history.

Pastner, 39, compiled a 167-73 record over seven seasons as the head coach at Memphis, where the Tigers earned bids to the NCAA Tournament four times. He is tied for the 10th most wins for a head coach in his first seven seasons in Division I basketball history, and is the second winningest active coach under the age of 40 in NCAA Division I.

Despite his young age, Pastner has been involved in basketball at the Division I level for 20 years, as a player and an assistant coach at Arizona, and as an assistant coach and the head coach at Memphis. He has been a part of teams that have won 490 games, played in 17 NCAA Tournaments and 18 total post-season events. Teams he has been involved with have won 12 conference tournament or regular-season championships, advanced to seven Sweet Sixteens, five Elite Eights, two Final Fours and two NCAA championship games.

## Pastner on How Tech Should Play

*"I don't want to call a play every time down. I don't want to, I don't like doing that. I want our guys to be able to play with freedom within structure and be able to be a basketball player and make plays. With that comes a lot of responsibility, they've got to understand how to play the right way, how to play with freedom, how to play in attack mode and how to play with pace. Part of this year is going to be ups and downs and growing pains to be able to understand that is what we've got to do."*

## Jackets At-A-Glance

The Yellow Jackets returned seven letterwinners from a team that won 21 games and advanced to the third round of the National Invitation Tournament last spring, including senior forward Quinton Stephens (6-9, Atlanta, Ga.), senior guards Josh Heath (6-2, Tampa, Fla.) and Corey Heyward (6-1, Duluth, Ga.) and junior guard Tadic Jackson (6-2, Tifton, Ga.), who have started 76 games between them in their careers, and junior center Ben Lammers (6-10, San Antonio, Texas).

Tech lost its top four players in scoring, starts and minutes played from a year ago, including Marcus Georges-Hunt, now in the NBA D-League after averaging 16.7 points per game last year, and Adam Smith, a 41-percent three-point shooter now playing in Europe.

But Pastner's first Tech team has some veteran presence. Stephens, who started the last 11 games of the 2015-16 season, had 26 career starts in the last three years and had missed only one game in his career. Heath started 21 games last season and had 29 starts overall in his career. Heyward started 15 games as a freshman and has 18 career starts. Jackson had seven career starts and missed only one game in two seasons. Graduate transfers Kellen McCormick (Western Michigan) and Jordan Price (Eastern Michigan) had 12 starts and 166 games played between them.

Stephens was Tech's top returning scorer at 5.0 points per game, while Jackson was sixth on the scoring chart at 4.7 points per game.

Tech does not have the size it enjoyed with post-players Charles Mitchell and Nick Jacobs last year, and none of Tech's returning frontcourt players had started a game in college. But Lammers played in all 36 games last season, averaging 14.5 minutes per game and leading the team in blocked shots (47). That group includes 6-9 sophomore Abdoulaye Gueye (Dakar, Senegal) and 6-10 freshman Sylvester Ogbonda (Port Harcourt, Nigeria), both of whom redshirted last season.

## Tech Adds Solid Freshman Class

Tech's freshman class includes a trio of three-star perimeter players in 6-5 Christian Matthews from Clinton, Md., 6-4 Justin Moore from San Diego, Calif., and 6-4 Josh Okogie from Snellville, Ga. Matthews, a high-scoring wing from National

Christian Academy, and Okogie, a first-team all-state choice from Shiloh High School, signed in the early period last November, while Moore, an all-state point guard in California, came on board in June after initially signing with Tulane.

## Two Grad Transfers Complete Roster

Kellen McCormick, a sharp-shooting forward from Western Michigan, and Jordan Price, a solid wing from Eastern Michigan, enrolled at Georgia Tech during the summer term to give the Yellow Jackets additional veteran presence on the roster. McCormick, the son of former Michigan center and current ESPN basketball analyst Tim McCormick, made 42 percent of his three-point tries over three seasons at Western Michigan. Price, from Indianapolis, Ind., initially enrolled at DePaul and played two years at Eastern Michigan (28 percent on his threes) before landing at Tech.

## Transition Points

- According to ESPN.com's John Gasaway, Tech began the 2016-17 season as the least experienced team in Division I, returning only 25 percent of its possession-minutes from 2015-16. Gasaway measures experience by calculating a team's "returning possession minutes," the percentage of minutes that a player recorded last season, multiplied by the percentage of the team's possessions that he used (as listed at kenpom.com).

- Georgia Tech played a program-record 31 regular-season games, assisted by participating in an exempt four-game, multi-team event to begin the season. Tech also filled its bye spot in the ACC schedule on Feb. 7 with Tusculum.

- Tech also played a program-record 19 regular-season home games in 2016-17, nine in the ACC and 10 non-conference, and played 21 overall with two NOT games at home. The previous high was 18 last season.

- Tech lost 78 percent of its scoring and 67 percent of its minutes from last year's team, which went 21-15 and reached the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament.

- Tech's roster included 12 scholarship players and three walk-ons. Of the 12 scholarship players, five were seniors.

- Tech returned two players who made more than 10 starts last season - Quinton Stephens (14) and Josh Heath (11).

- Career collegiate starts by 2016-17 players entering the season - Corey Heyward (18), Tadic Jackson (7), Kellen McCormick (2), Jordan Price (10), Quinton Stephens (26).

- Sophomore forward Abdoulaye Gueye and freshman center Sylvester Ogbonda sat out the 2015-16 season as redshirts.

- Tech's top four scorers from a year ago, all seniors, accounted for 71.4 percent of the Yellow Jackets' points, 68.7 percent of the shots taken and 55.2 percent of the minutes.

## Pastner's Winning Staff

- Head coach Josh Pastner and all three assistant coaches played major conference Division I basketball - Eric Reveno at Stanford (1985-89), Tavaras Hardy at Northwestern (1998-2002), Darryl LaBarrie at Georgia Tech and Pastner at Arizona (1993-97).

- Tech's coaching staff has participated in 32 NCAA Tournaments collectively - Reveno has been involved in eight NCAA Tournaments as a coach and one as a player; Hardy in three as a coach; LaBarrie in two as a coach and one as a player; and Pastner in 13 as a coach and four as a player.

- Pastner hired two former Georgia Tech players - assistant coach LaBarrie, who played three years under Bobby Cremins and Paul Hewitt (1998-2001) and was an assistant coach for two years under Hewitt (2009-11), and director of player personnel Mario West, a non-scholarship player under Hewitt (2003-07) who played two years in the NBA.

- Only two members of Pastner's staff at Memphis, director of operations Julian Swartz and video coordinator Tyler Benson, followed him to Georgia Tech. All three assistant coaches are new to Pastner's staff.



## Rand Rowland Named to Allstate NABC Good Works Team®

Senior forward Rand Rowland was named to the 2017 Allstate NABC Good Works Team® by the Allstate Insurance Company® and the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), the organizations announced on Feb. 7.

Of the 181 nominees from colleges and universities across the country, Rowland is among 10 remarkable student-athletes named to the team for the positive impact he's had on the community and the lives of others. In addition to dedicating countless hours to their studies and athletics, the members of this year's team have spent their limited free time bettering communities all over the world and demonstrating a strong commitment to improving the lives of others.

Since 2013, members of the Allstate NABC Good Works Team® have given back to the host cities of the NCAA® Final Fours® through a community service initiative and monetary donation. This year, members of the Allstate NABC Good Works Team® will be invited by Allstate to be recognized at the 2017 NABC Convention and 2017 NCAA Men's Final Four® and will participate in a community service project to benefit Phoenix.

Rowland is a 6-7 senior forward from Cleveland, Ga., who joined the Yellow Jacket program as a non-scholarship player in the fall of 2014 and was put on scholarship this season. During his time at Tech, he has added value not only to his team, but to the bigger student-athlete population at Georgia Tech through his volunteer efforts.

## Jackets Sign Three in 2017 Class

Georgia Tech has signed three high school prospects out of the class of 2017 - 6-foot point guard **Jose Alvarado** from Brooklyn, N.Y., 6-6 wing **Curtis Haywood II** of Yukon, Okla., and 6-8 forward **Moses Wright** of Raleigh, N.C.

Successfully recruiting the New York area for the first time since the late 1990s, Tech signed **Alvarado** during the November signing period. The 2016 New York City Catholic League player of the year, the 6-foot point guard led Christ the King High School in Middle Village, N.Y., the No. 19 team in the nation entering the 2016-17 season, to the New York City title twice and his AAU team, the New York Rens, to the Peach Jam quarterfinals in 2016. He follows a pair of legendary New York point guards into the Tech program - Kenny Anderson (1989-91) and Stephon Marbury (1995-96). Alvarado, a three-star prospect, is ranked the No. 9 player in the state of New York and No. 33 in the nation at his position by ESPN.

A consensus 3-star prospect at Brewster Academy in New Hampshire, **Haywood** was ranked among the state's top 10 players according to 247Sports.com. He led the Bobcats to a 33-0 record, a NEPSAC (New England Prep School Athletic Council) AAA championship, and the program's fifth national championship in the last eight seasons. The versatile wing and co-captain averaged 12.0 points, 4.5 assists, 4.5 rebounds and

a team-best 2.1 steals in route to second team All-NEPSAC honors.

**Wright**, a rapidly growing forward, earned all-conference and all-region honors his senior season William G. Enloe High School in Raleigh, N.C. Described as a "late-bloomer," Wright grew four inches and added 40 pounds since his sophomore year with the Eagles. Under head coach Patrick Paye, Wright employed a deft inside-out offensive attack while his 7-foot-2 wingspan allowed him to wreak havoc on the glass. In his senior season, the forward led his team in scoring (22.0 ppg), rebounding (11.0 rpg), blocks (2.0 bpg) and three-point shooting (41.0 pct.).

## Tech to Open 2017-18 Season in China

Georgia Tech has been invited to play UCLA in the 2017 Pac-12 China Game presented by the Alibaba Group, the Pac-12 Conference announced Friday. Longtime Pac-12 partner Federation of University Sports of China (FUSC), which operates under China's Ministry of Education, will serve as the co-host for the game.

The 2017 Pac-12 China Game between UCLA and Georgia Tech will tip off the 2017-18 basketball season with specific U.S. and China broadcast information to be finalized at a later date. The game is part of Pac-12 Global, an unprecedented effort to promote goodwill for the Conference and its member institutions through sport, and to provide student-athletes with a transformative cultural exchange experience.

The UCLA game in China will be the second time in program history that Georgia Tech will travel to East Asia for a regular-season men's basketball game. The Yellow Jackets played Boston College and SMU in the 1986 Suntory Ball event in Tokyo, Japan, winning both games.

Other regular-season trips outside the 50 states for Tech in its basketball history include the 1997 Puerto Rico Shootout (Bayamon, P.R.), the 2007 Paradise Jam (St. Thomas, U.S. Virgin Islands) and the 2010 Puerto Rico Tip-Off (San Juan, P.R.). Tech also played four regular-season games in Cuba during the 1925-26 season.

Tech and UCLA will be meeting for the fifth time. The Bruins have won three of the previous four contests, most recently in the championship game of the 2006 Maui Invitational.

## Four Tech Alumni on NBA Rosters

Four former Georgia Tech basketball stars were on NBA rosters when the season began, and all four of them reached the playoffs with their teams. A fifth, 2016 graduate Marcus Georges-Hunt, was signed to a 10-day contract by Miami after the all-star break and then was signed by Orlando late in the season and played four games with the Magic.

Iman Shumpert, a five-year NBA veteran, played his second full season in Cleveland after helping the Cavaliers win the NBA championship in 2016.

Thaddeus Young, in his 10th season, was traded to the Indiana Pacers during the off-season after two years in Brooklyn.

Derrick Favors has emerged as a key figure in his sixth season in Utah.

Anthony Morrow, a nine-year NBA veteran after catching on with Golden State as a free agent in 2009, began his third season in Oklahoma City but was traded to Chicago at the trade deadline.

Jarrett Jack, a 12-year NBA veteran who suffered a knee injury last January while with Brooklyn, was signed by the Atlanta Hawks during the off-season but then was cut by the team in the last week of training camp while continuing his recovery.

Chris Bosh, who spent the first seven years of his NBA career in Toronto, played his sixth season in Miami in 2015-16, but saw his season cut short by a heart condition for the second year in a row. He remains under contract to the Heat but did not play.

## Arts and Letters

Beginning with Moe Miller and Lance Storrs in the summer of 2011, every four-year senior in the Georgia Tech program has graduated.

Derek Craig and Nick Foreman received their Tech degrees in 2012, as did the 2013 senior class of Mfon Udofia, who finished his business administration degree work in the summer, and Pierre Jordan, who completed his Masters degree requirements in building construction in the spring. Brandon Reed graduated in the summer with his management degree before transferring back to Arkansas State to play his final year of basketball.

All three of Tech's four-year seniors in 2013-14 - Kammeon Holsey, Daniel Miller and Jason Morris - graduated that spring. Robert Sampson, the Jackets' only undergraduate scholarship senior in 2014-15, graduated in the spring.

From the 2015-16 squad, Marcus Georges-Hunt walked the stage at commencement in May, accomplishing the rare feat of graduating in four years. Point guard Travis Jorgenson, who elected not to use his final year of eligibility, will receive his degree in December.

From the 2016-17 team, Josh Heath, Corey Heyward (fifth-year because of an injury red-shirt in 2012-13) and Quinton Stephens all graduated in May of 2017, while Rand Rowland finished his requirements and received his degree in December of 2016.

Georges-Hunt and current junior Tadic Jackson have made the Academic All-ACC team twice, and the Yellow Jackets have had at least one player named to that team since it was instituted for the 2010-11 season.

Tech's men's basketball team has recored the highest Academic Progress Report scores the last four years since the NCAA began tracking academic performance in 2004-05. The Jackets scored a perfect team single year APR score of 1000 three straight years from 2011-13.

## Welcome to The Hank

Georgia Tech has played five seasons in McCamish Pavilion, which was for all intents and purposes, brand new when it opened for the 2012-13 season. The only physical elements of McCamish Pavilion that remain from the venerable Alexander Memorial Coliseum are the roof, which was re-covered, and the 32 steel ribs that support it.

The capacity of McCamish Pavilion is 8,600, including 1,665 seats in the new balcony level and 6,935 seats in the lower seating bowl. There are no suites, but there is a premium club area that seats 500. Alexander Memorial Coliseum seated 9,191 spectators in its final configuration.

The most impressive features of McCamish Pavilion are its grand entrance, which fronts 10th and Fowler Streets, the ability for patrons to view the court from the main concourse all the way around, and the theatrical lighting system, which concentrates light on the court while leaving the seating areas dark, modeled after the Staples Center in Los Angeles and Madison Square Garden in New York.

Tech played 55 seasons in Alexander Memorial Coliseum, compiling a record of 556-194 (.741). Miami was the last team to play Tech in Alexander Memorial Coliseum, a game Tech won, and was the first ACC team to play in McCamish Pavilion on Jan. 5, which Miami won. For the 2011-12 season, Tech played its home games at Philips Arena and the Arena at Gwinnett.

## Tech's NCAA Tournament History

Georgia Tech played in the NCAA Tournament five times in 11 seasons under head coach Paul Hewitt and has played in the event 16 times in its history. Fifteen of those appearances have occurred from 1985 to the present.

Tech has a record of 23-16 in NCAA Tournament play, highlighted by its 2004 trip to the NCAA title game as well as a Final Four berth in 1990. The Yellow Jackets have reached the NCAA Sweet 16 seven times (1960, 1985, 1986, 1990,

1992, 1996, 2004).

The 2004 and 2005 appearances were the Yellow Jackets' first back-to-back appearances since Bobby Cremins led the Institute to the Big Dance nine straight years from 1985-93.

Georgia Tech has won at least one game in 11 of its 16 NCAA Tournament appearances.

## Tech's ACC Tournament History

Georgia Tech has played in 38 ACC Tournaments, and has a 26-35 all-time record in the event. The Yellow Jackets have won three championships, in 1985 (Atlanta), 1990 (Charlotte) and 1993 (Charlotte).

Tech has been a runner-up four times (1986, 1996, 2005, 2010). The 1986, 1996 and 2010 runs to the finals occurred in Greensboro. Tech also made the finals in 2005 at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C.

Tech was 0-2 in the ACC Tournament under coach Dwane Morrison, 15-16 under Bobby Cremins (including all three titles), 9-11 under Paul Hewitt (runner-up in 2005 and 2010), 2-5 under Brian Gregory, and 0-1 under Josh Pastner.

## Head Coach Josh Pastner • 1st season

Josh Pastner, who guided Memphis to five post-season berths in seven seasons as the Tigers' head coach, became Georgia Tech's 14th head basketball coach on April 8, 2016.

In his first season at the helm, his Yellow Jacket team has defied all pre-season expectations by winning 19 games, including two in the NIT, posting an 8-10 ACC record, which included victories over No. 9 North Carolina, No. 6 Florida State and No. 14 Notre Dame, who all finished among the top four in the ACC regular season. He was named Coach of the Year in the ACC and in NABC District 2.

Pastner, 39, compiled a 167-73 record over seven seasons as the head coach at Memphis, where the Tigers earned bids to the NCAA Tournament four times. He is tied for the 10th most wins for a head coach in his first seven seasons in Division I basketball history, and is the second winningest active coach under the age of 40 in NCAA Division I.

Despite his young age, Pastner has been involved in basketball at the Division I level for 20 years, as a player and an assistant coach at Arizona, and as an assistant coach and the head coach at Memphis. He has been a part of teams that have won 490 games, played in 17 NCAA Tournaments and 18 total post-season events. Teams he has been involved with have won 12 conference tournament or regular-season championships, advanced to seven Sweet Sixteens, five Elite Eights, two Final Fours and two NCAA championship games.

As an NCAA head or assistant coach and an AAU head coach, he has coached nearly 25 NBA draft selections.

Pastner's Memphis teams averaged 23.9 wins per season and compiled a conference regular-season record of 82-36, including a conference winning streak of 28 games. The Tigers went 11-4 in Conference USA and American Athletic Conference tournaments, including three championships.

He guided Memphis to five post-season berths, the NIT in 2010 and the NCAA Tournament in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014. He became one of three head coaches in Tigers history to earn postseason berths in five of his first seven seasons (Larry Finch, John Calipari are the others), one of two to lead the program to four NCAA Tournaments in his first seven seasons (Dana Kirk is the other) and one of three head coaches in program history to lead the Tigers to four straight NCAA Tournament appearances (2011-14; joins Dana Kirk 1982-85, John Calipari 2006-09).

Pastner twice won Conference USA Coach of the Year honors (2010, 2013) by various organizations and news media. Known as a tireless recruiter, he signed five straight nationally-ranked recruiting classes, including the nation's No. 1 class in 2010 and No. 2 class in 2013.

A native of Kingwood, Texas, Pastner was born in Glen Dale, W.Va. He earned his bachelor's degree in family studies in December of 1998, in just two and a half years, from Arizona and his master's degree in teaching and teacher education from Arizona in December of 1999, all while lettering four years in basketball for the Wildcats under head coach Lute Olson.

He married the former Kerri Lamas of Sierra Vista, Ariz., in 2009. He has a stepson (Ethan) and three daughters, Payten, Kamryn and Harper.

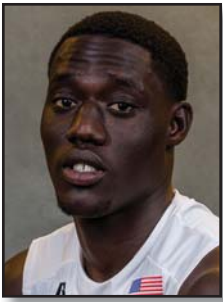

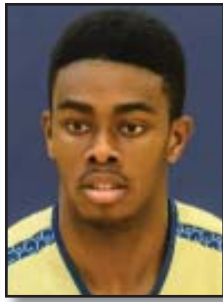
