- While the Georgetown offense has been garnering attention this season, the Hoya defense that has been solid as well.
- The Hoyas rank No. 12 in the country in goals-against average (0.55) and are tied for No. 5 in the country with 17 shutouts.
- When Villanova scored in a 5-1 GU win on Oct. 12, it broke a streak of 748 minutes, dating back to the first half of a 3-2 win over then-No. 3 Virginia on Sept. 11, in which the Hoyas had not surrendered a goal.

on Aug. 19 and did not lose until Oct. 23.

- The Hoyas are in the midst of a five-game win streak and an eight-game unbeaten streak.

About the Hoyas

- Junior midfielder Rachel Corboz, who was named to the All-BIG EAST First Team for the second-straight year and a MAC Hermann Trophy Semifinalist, leads the team in scoring with 38 points.
- She is second on the team in goals scored (11) and leads the team in assists (16) ... Corboz leads the country with 16 assists, is tied for No. 12 in the country in total points (38) and No. 31 in points per game (1.58).
- Senior forward Grace Damaska, an All-BIG EAST Second Team selection, is second on the team with 33 points, including a team-leading 14 goals.
- Damaska ranks tied for No. 20 in the country in goals scored and is tied for No. 34 in the country in total points (33) ... Her 14 goals scored are the second-most in a single season at Georgetown.
- Redshirt freshman forward Amanda Carolan, who was named the BIG EAST Freshman of the Year, is third on the team in scoring with 10 goals and three assists for 23 points, while graduate student forward Crystal Thomas, a two-time All-BIG

EAST Second Team pick, is fourth on the team in scoring with 23 points (11 goals, one assist).

- Seven other Georgetown players have scored at least one goal – including sophomore forward Caitlin Farrell, who has three goals and is second on the team with nine assists – and 10 other players have at least one point.
- Sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman, an All-BIG EAST Second Team selection, carries a 20-2-3 record this season with a 0.54 GAA ... Schechtman was named the BIG EAST Goalkeeper of the Week after posting her 11th shutout of the season in a win over Creighton on Oct. 31 ... It was the second time this season she earned that award, the first coming on Sept. 19 after the team's win over No. 1 West Virginia.

Quick Hits

- The Georgetown University women's soccer team will play Southern California in the second of two national semifinals at Avaya Stadium on Friday, Dec. 2 in the NCAA College Cup in San Jose, Calif. ... The first match features West Virginia and North Carolina.
- The Hoyas, seeded No. 2 in their region in the NCAA Tournament, advanced to the quarterfinals for the second time in program history with wins over St. Francis (Pa. (2-0), Rutgers (2-0) and Virginia (2-0) and reached the College Cup for the first time in program history with a 1-0 win over Santa Clara last Saturday at Georgetown's Shaw Field.
- The win last Saturday against Santa Clara improved Georgetown's record this season to 20-2-3.
- The Hoyas, ranked No. 5 in the country by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) and by Soccer America, won the program's first-ever BIG EAST Tournament Championship, have set a school record for wins (20) and for shutouts (17).
- The Hoyas went from an unranked team in the preseason to stand among the top-10 teams in the country, propelled by four wins against ranked teams during the regular season, including a 3-2 win over then-No. 3 Virginia, a 2-1 win at then-No. 12 Rutgers and a 1-0 overtime win against No. 1 West Virginia.
- GU posted a 14-game unbeaten streak after dropping a game at home to then-No. 3 Stanford

Rachel Corboz Named Semifinalist for MAC Hermann Trophy

- Georgetown University women's soccer player Rachel Corboz was among 15 Division I women's soccer players selected as a semifinalist for the Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy, recognizing the top player in the country on Nov. 29.
- The MAC Hermann Trophy is the highest individual intercollegiate award administered by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA), and presented annually at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis ... Three men's finalists and three women's finalists will be named on December 14 at the conclusion of voting by NCAA Division I soccer coaches ... The 2016 MAC Hermann Trophy banquet will be held at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis on Jan. 6, 2017 to formally announce this year's winners.
- An All-BIG EAST First Team selection, Corboz leads the team in scoring with 38 points ... She is second on the team in goals scored (11) and leads the nation in assists with 16.
- Her 11 goals this season are tied for the sixth-most in a single season at Georgetown, while her 18 assists are the second-most in a season.
- Corboz was an NSCAA Third Team All-American as a sophomore in 2015, when she was named the BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year and was a first team all-league pick. As a freshman in 2014, she was earned second team All-BIG EAST honors and an All-Rookie selection.
- For her career, she ranks third all-time in points scored (82), seventh all-time in goals scored (25) and third all-time in assists (32).

Georgetown MAC Hermann Trophy Semifinalists

- Rachel Corboz being named a MAC Hermann Trophy semifinalist was a first for the junior, but not for a Georgetown player and not for someone named Corboz.
- This is the fourth time in the last five years that Georgetown has had a player selected as a MAC Hermann Trophy Semifinalist, as Emily Menges (C'14) was recognized in 2013.
- Rachel's older sister, Daphne Corboz, the program's all-time leading scorer, was recognized in 2012 and 2014.

Georgetown Coaching Staff Recognized

- The Georgetown University women's soccer coaching staff was recognized by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) as the Northeast Regional Staff of the Year in a vote of the region's coaches, announced on Nov. 25.
- The Georgetown staff – led by Head Coach Dave Nolan – will now be placed onto the National Staff of the Year ballot ... The National Staff of the Year will be announced on Dec. 20 and presented at the NSCAA Convention, which will be held in Los Angeles from Jan. 11-15, 2017.
- Nolan is in his 13th year as the head coach at Georgetown ... He has been joined on his staff by second year assistant coaches Lyndse Hokanson and Kristen Meier, as well as athletic trainer Tori Lycett and strength and conditioning coach Ben Hoffman.

Record-Breaking Season

- Georgetown has set several new program records this season, highlighted by a team record 20 wins ... The team has also set new program records for most goals scored with 61, breaking the record of 58 set in 2013 ... The Hoyas have also registered a school record 17 shutouts, breaking the mark of 13 set in 2012.

The Series with USC, Pac-12

- This will be the first-ever meeting between Georgetown and Southern California.
- The Hoyas have played only one team in the Pac-12 Conference ... GU has an 0-4 record against Stanford.

Carolan Named Freshman of the Year; Seven Hoyas Named All-BIG EAST

Redshirt freshman Amanda Carolan was named the BIG EAST Conference Freshman of the Year and six other Hoyas were selected to All-BIG EAST teams, including three on the first team, when the league announced its award winners on Nov. 1 ...

First Team honorees:

Under Head Coach Dave Nolan, Georgetown has had 10 different players earn 19 All-BIG EAST First Team honors, 17 different players earn 24 All-BIG EAST Second Team nods and 17 players earn all-rookie (freshman) accolades. ... Nolan has also had five players earn Player of the Year awards on 10 occasions.

High-Powered Offense

- That Georgetown has a high-powered offense is known to many people ... The Hoyas top four scorers – Rachel Corboz, Grace Damaska, Crystal Thomas and Amanda Carolan – have combined for 117 of the team's 166 points, more than 70 percent (70.5%) of the team's offense ...
- They have each scored at least 20 points, the first time the team has had four players with at least 20 in program history.

Defensive Minded

- While the Georgetown offense has been garnering attention this season, the Hoya defense that has been solid as well.
- The Hoyas rank No. 12 in the country in goals-against average (0.57) and are tied for No. 5 in the country with 17 shutouts.
- When Villanova scored in a 5-1 GU win on Oct. 12, it broke a streak of 748 minutes, dating back to the first half of a 3-2 win over then-No. 3 Virginia on Sept. 11, in which the Hoyas had not surrendered a goal.
- Currently, the Hoyas have posted five-straight shutouts and have not allowed a goal since DePaul scored in the first half of the BIG EAST Tournament semifinals ... GU has a streak of 542:35 without allowing a goal entering the College Cup.

GU Garners NSCAA Team Academic Award

- The Georgetown University women's soccer team was selected as a recipient of the College Team Academic Award by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) ... The Hoyas were one of more than 500 women's programs at all division levels recognized for posting a team grade-point average of 3.0 or higher during the 2014-15 academic year.
- Georgetown was one of 208 schools to have both their men's and women's teams honored.
- This is the 10th-straight year that the Georgetown women's team has been recognized by the NSCAA with the College Team Academic Award and the 13th time overall.



California Dreaming

- When the Hoyas beat Santa Clara in the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals, the win advanced the Hoyas to the NCAA College Cup for the first time in program history and prompted Head Coach Dave Nolan, in his talk to the team after the game, to sing a line from the song "Do You Know the Way to San Jose."
- Several members of the team – four to be exact – are familiar with San Jose, as they are natives of California
- Graduate student defender Marina Paul, sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman, sophomore midfielder Meghan Shaver and freshman defender Sarah Trissel are all California natives.

Damaska Moves Up All-Time Scoring Charts

- Senior forward Grace Damaska's 14 goals this season rank among the best for a single season at Georgetown ... Her 14 tallies, a career-high, rank second all-time for a single season on the Hilltop.
- The senior, who named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week on Aug. 29, has 28 career goals and is fourth all-time in goals scored at Georgetown ... She has 71 career points, which ranks sixth all-time.

Wenger Helps to Lead Defensive Unit

- Junior defender Elizabeth Wenger has been a key figure on the back line for the Hoyas this season, helping guide the team to 17 shutouts ... She was named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week on Aug. 29.
- Her older brother Andrew, a former Hermann Trophy winner at Duke, currently plays in Major League Soccer for the Houston Dynamo.

Beating the Ranked

- The Hoyas went from an unranked team in the preseason to stand among the top-10 teams in the country, propelled by three wins against ranked teams during the regular season.
- Georgetown posted a 3-2 win over then-No. 3 Virginia on Sept. 11 and then had a 2-1 win at then-No. 12 Rutgers.
- That was followed by a 1-0 overtime win against then-No. 1 West Virginia.
- GU posted wins in the NCAA Tournament over Rutgers, Virginia and Santa Clara, giving the Blue & Gray six wins over ranked teams.

Cornered

- Georgetown has been very successful off its set pieces and getting in those situations has been a key The Hoyas have taken 203 corner kicks in 25 games this season, an average of 8.12 per game.
- Leading the way has been junior midfielder Rachel Corboz, who has taken 157 corner kicks this season.
- In her three-year career on the Hilltop, Corboz has taken 323 corner kicks.

Pac-12 Connection

- Georgetown sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman is in her first full season at Georgetown after transferring from UCLA.
- In 2014 at UCLA, she made three starts in five appearances ... Schechtman recorded two shutouts, blanking Pepperdine and Oregon ... Made 10 saves in the shutout win over Oregon and also had 10 saves in the next game at Washington ... She was named the Pac-12 Goalkeeper of the Week after her 10-save shutout against Oregon.

Corboz Earns Third Offensive Player of the Week Honor

- Rachel Corboz was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week on Sept. 12 ... This was the second-straight week that Corboz has been named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week and the third time this season, including after the opening weekend of the season (Aug. 22) ...
- The junior is second on the team in scoring with 25 points, scoring eight goals while registering a team-high nine assists.

WHAT'S A HOYA

Many years ago, when all Georgetown students were required to study Greek and Latin, the University's teams were nicknamed "The Stone-walls." It is suggested that a student, using Greek and Latin terms, started the cheer "Hoya Saxa!", which translates into "What Rocks!" The name proved popular and the term "Hoyas" was eventually adopted for all Georgetown teams.

- She ranks seventh all-time in scoring at Georgetown with 69 points ... Her 22 goals are tied for ninth all-time, while her 25 career assists ranks fifth all-time.
- Rachel's older sister, Daphne, is the program's all-time leader in points (131), goals (47) and is second all-time in assists (37) ... The elder Corboz is currently playing with the Manchester City women's team in England.

Carolan Named Offensive Player of the Week

- Georgetown University sophomore women's soccer player Amanda Carolan was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week on Oct. 17 ... She was one of three players to earn weekly honors as graduate student defender Marina Paul and sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman were selected to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll ... Carolan, who was named to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll on Oct. 10, earned Player of the Week honors for the first time after scoring both goals in Georgetown's 2-0 win over Marquette on Oct. 16 ... She scored in the 28th minute and added her second five minutes into the second half.
- Paul anchored a back line which surrendered just one goal over two games, including a 5-1 win over Villanova at home on Wednesday ... GU held Villanova to just six total shots and one corner kick and the goal scored by the Wildcats ended a streak of 748 minutes without yielding a goal by the Hoyas.

Schechtman Earns League, National Honors

- Arielle Schechtman was named the BIG EAST Conference Goalkeeper of the Week on Sept. 19 ... Schechtman earned the win after posting back-to-back shutouts, first a 1-0 win at George Washington and then a 1-0 double overtime win at then-No. 2/1 West Virginia ... Schechtman was a key figure in the win over the Mountaineers, who were ranked No. 2 in the country by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and No. 1 in the country by Soccer America ... She made eight saves, helped to defend nine corner kicks and 23 shots by the Mountaineers, who led the nation in shots per game ... The sophomore made one save in the win over GW
- She was also selected to the Weekly Honor Roll on Oct. 17 ... Schechtman made seven saves in a shutout at Marquette and was in net for 71 minutes during the team's 5-1 win over Villanova, making three saves while not allowing a goal.

Professional Sports Ties

- Several members of the Hoyas have ties to professional sports, ... Rachel Corboz's sister Daphne plays for the Manchester City Women in England, and her brother Mael plays second division in Germany ... Elizabeth Wenger's brother, Andrew, plays for the Houston Dynamo in the MLS ... The ties aren't just to soccer as Marina Paul's brother, Chris, plays baseball in the Minnesota Twins organization

HEAD COACH DAVE NOLAN

Dave Nolan is in his 13th season as the head coach of the Georgetown University women's soccer team and his 18th season on the staff of a program that he has seen grow from its infancy to the present, where it is among the top teams in the country.

Since his arrival at Georgetown as an assistant coach in 1999 – the program's seventh year of existence after being established in 1993 – Nolan helped guide the team to become not only one of the top in the BIG EAST Conference, but also to a legitimate NCAA Tournament threat, with four-straight appearances in the postseason tournament.

In the past nine seasons, the team has set records for most wins twice (16 in 2012 and 2013), most regular season wins (15 in 2013), most BIG EAST wins (8 in 2008 and 2011), highest BIG EAST finish (1st, winning the National Division in 2012), most shutouts (13), and a program-best start of 7-0-0 in 2010 after starting the 2008 season with an 8-0-2 record.

Over that span, the Blue & Gray have made six appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including the last four seasons and five of the last six overall. In 2010, the Hoyas advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

In 2015, the Hoyas were an at-large selection to the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-straight year after finishing the regular season with an 11-5-3 overall record and a 6-1-2 mark in the BIG EAST, earned the No. 2 seed in the league's tournament. Seven different players were recognized as All-BIG EAST selections, led by Second Team NSCAA All-American selection Rachel Corboz, who was also named the BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year.

During the 2014 campaign, Georgetown reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the third-straight year, reached the championship game of the BIG EAST Tournament for the second time in program history and finished the season with an 11-5-6 overall record and a 6-1-2 mark in league play. The Hoyas completed the season ranked No. 24 in the country by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA). Six different players earned All-BIG EAST honors, led by Second Team NSCAA All-America selection Daphne Corboz, who became Georgetown's all-time leading scorer and was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year and the BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year.

In 2013, the Hoyas reached the NCAA Tournament for the second-straight year, tying the school record for wins in a season and finished with a 16-3-2 record, including a 10-0-2 mark at Shaw Field. The Hoyas finished in second place in the BIG EAST Conference with a 7-1-1 record. GU hosted its first ever NCAA Tournament game, beating LaSalle, 2-0, and fell in the second round, 1-0, to No. 1-ranked Virginia. Six players earned All-BIG EAST honors, including Emily Menges, who was named BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year, and Corboz, who was tabbed the league's midfielder of the year. In addition, Menges was named a First Team All-America by the NSCAA and Corboz earned second team honors.

The 2012 season was one of the most successful seasons in program history, as the Hoyas set a school record with 16 wins. Nolan was named the BIG EAST Coach of the Year after leading the Blue & Gray to a 16-4-3 record and the National Division title with an 8-1-1 league record. Georgetown advanced to the BIG EAST Tournament Championship for the first time in program history and then reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Corboz was named the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year and earned First Team All-America honors from the NSCAA.

In 2011, the Hoyas finished the season with a 15-6-0 overall record and an 8-3-0 mark in the BIG EAST, finishing in second place in the National Division and earning a first-round bye in the BIG EAST Tournament. GU posted a 3-1 win over Syracuse in the quarterfinals and advanced to the BIG EAST Tournament Semifinals for the second time in program history. Three of Nolan's players were named All-BIG EAST First Team, including Ingrid Wells, who was named the BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year and a First Team All-American for the third time in her career.

In 2010, the Hoyas were selected to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in program history and advanced to the Elite Eight after wins over Siena, Maryland and Minnesota, posting the best record in school history at 15-7-2. Georgetown started the year with a 7-0-0 record and finished the regular season with a 13-6-1 mark, reaching the BIG EAST Championship Tournament for the sixth time in the last seven seasons with a first round bye. Led by BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year and First Team All-American Wells, the Hoyas boasted an offense that ranked second in the league in goals per

game (2.04) and ranked among the top 30 in the country. Five players earned All-BIG EAST honors as the Hoyas advanced to the NCAA Tournament and beat Siena in the first round (5-1) before toppling No. 1 seed Maryland in the second round in penalty kicks. A thrilling 1-0 win at Minnesota in the third round advanced the Blue & Gray to the Elite Eight, where the season would end with a 2-0 loss at Ohio State. The Hoyas ended the 2010 season ranked No. 18 in the country in the NSCAA poll.

In 2009, Georgetown reached the BIG EAST Championship Tournament for the fifth time in six seasons behind one of the top offenses in the nation. The Blue & Gray averaged 2.25 goals per contest and were led by BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year Sara Jordan and fellow First Team All-BIG EAST member Wells. The duo combined for 15 goals and 18 assists in leading the Hoyas to their third-consecutive season of 10 wins or more.

In 2008, a high-powered offense (2.54 goals per game) was complemented by a talented defense (0.59 goals-against per game) that led to the Hoyas finishing the regular season with a 13-3-2 record and hosted the BIG EAST Tournament Quarterfinals for the first time in program history.

Nolan led the program to one of the best turnarounds in the country in 2007, as the Hoyas rebounded from a 5-9-5 record the year before to finish the regular season with a 13-6-0 mark. Georgetown advanced to the BIG EAST Tournament Semifinals for the first time in program history after beating No. 23 Connecticut on the road in the quarterfinals on Nov. 4.

This success earned Georgetown its first NSCAA/adidas No. 1 Regional Ranking and a series of first National Top 20 rankings by the NSCAA/adidas (No. 17), Soccer America (No. 16), SoccerBuzz Magazine (No. 19), and TopDrawerSoccer.com (No. 20) in addition to a number of national, regional, and BIG EAST individual honors, highlighted by two All-Americans and the 2007 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year (Wells).

While a Hoya assistant, Nolan coordinated recruiting, developed goalkeepers and worked closely with Head Coach Diane Drake in all aspects of preparing the team. He brings a wide range of coaching experience to the Hilltop, having played and coached at various national and international levels.

Nolan came to Georgetown in 1999 after spending the 1998 season on the Seton Hall women's soccer staff, serving as the goalkeeper coach. Prior to his coaching stint at Seton Hall, Nolan was an assistant coach at Farleigh Dickinson University during the 1997 fall season.

A member of the National Team Pool in Ireland at the youth level, Nolan came to the United States and played soccer at Seton Hall. A four-year starter, he led the Pirates to four-consecutive NCAA tournament berths and two BIG EAST Conference championships. Selected to the 1987 BIG EAST Conference Tournament team, Nolan was named the BIG EAST Conference Student-Athlete of the Year in 1991. He earned his bachelor's degree in finance in 1991 and later earned a master of business administration in 1993, also from Seton Hall.

Nolan holds a premier national license from the NSCAA and a United States Soccer Federation "A" license.

Fall Sports Preview | Feature: Marina Paul Exemplifies Resilience

For the second time in 10 months, graduate student defender Marina Paul lay down on the field, upset and uncertain.

“I still remember that moment,” Paul said. “I still have replays of that moment in my head. ... I felt like everything that I had worked for in college was shattered in that moment.”

It was a practice in early September 2015, and Paul had reinjured her knee, the same right knee that she had torn up in the 12th minute of the previous season’s Big East championship game. Except this time, she was a senior. And her season was over.

But Paul’s competitive spirit would not let her quit. And now, the three-time captain is back, intent on taking a fifth shot at an elusive title.

Four years ago, Paul arrived at an up-and-coming Georgetown program, one that had seen a dream run to the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament just two years prior and a pattern of relative success under Head Coach Dave Nolan. That same year, Paul found herself on then-North Kehoe Field a bit nervous, the only true freshman in the starting lineup taking on local rival The George Washington University on a hot mid-August opening day.

Georgetown needed to win and probably deserved to, outshooting GWU 18-5 that day. But a 1-0 Hoya lead felt tenuous until Paul latched onto a cross from forward Colleen Dinn and slotted the team’s second goal past the keeper with her left foot. Just 65 minutes into her Georgetown career, Paul had scored.

And she kept going. Paul played in every game her freshman year on the way to a Big East All-Rookie Team award, and the team reached the Big East tournament final before losing 1-0 to Marquette on a goal fewer than three minutes from the end of regulation. That game was the closest Paul would get in four years to lifting a trophy.

Georgetown women’s soccer continued to experience success, vaulting into constant competition for the top 25 rankings week in and week out as it reached two Big East semifinals and one final in the following three seasons. For the first time ever in program history, the team earned four straight bids to the NCAA Tournament.

Paul became the team’s leader as co-captain in 2014 with Daphne Corboz and as the lone captain in the two years since.

But without a Big East postseason title, the feeling lingered that Georgetown was still somehow almost there, but not quite. For the incredibly competitive Marina, a trophy would be a dream realized.

Paul talks to her brother, Chris, who plays for the Fort Myers Miracle in the Minnesota Twins farm system, almost every day. When he played for California, she watched all of his games on GameTracker.

“He’s one of the most supportive people in my life, with anything,” Paul said. “Obviously I look up to him because he’s older, but also because he’s one of the best guys I know, just in terms of his character on and off the field. He sets a really great example for me.”

Sports run in the Paul family. Mara was almost a tennis player in college and continues to run marathons. Ron was almost a soccer player. Both decided to live and go to school on the beach instead. After her injury, Paul recalls a moment of clarity when talking about the difficult decision: to stay and play another year, or to move on with her parents. She remembers realizing that she only had so many opportunities to be a college athlete.

“When am I going to have a chance later in life to be this competitive again? I have the opportunity right now,” Paul said.

The first time, Paul chose Georgetown the way many Hoyas do: She wanted to get away from home — Aliso Vieja, Calif. — wanted a big sport to cheer for — men’s basketball — and upon visiting she fell in love with the campus.

Since then, she has experienced D.C.’s character for herself. One summer, she had to take the bus everywhere she went and found herself loving her interactions with the locals. She also works at men’s basketball games with Georgetown Sports Information. The second time around, despite her love for D.C., the decision did not come easily.

“I definitely wrestled with it,” Paul said. “It’s your senior year, and all the girls you’ve grown up playing with, all the girls in my year, they’ll all be gone in the real world. I see them all go, see my friends go, and it’s hard.”

Ultimately, though, as captain, she understood her commitment to the team to push through tough times and to lead.

“I don’t think Dave would have selected me as a captain if I couldn’t get through things like this,” Paul said. “And showing younger girls on the team that when hardship hits, it sucks, but you can get through it.”

When asked about her future after Georgetown, Paul reacts as would many an undergraduate senior — that is, awkwardly at first, then with a growing smile, by confidently describing the dream.

Her program studying Integrated Marketing Communications at the School of Continuing Studies, taking downtown classes, ends next fall. From there, taking inspiration from Daphne Corboz at Manchester City and Sarah Adams at FF Lugano, she hopes to travel and continue competing.

“I would love to play abroad,” Paul said. “God willing, my body holds up. But I would love to do something abroad, and to have international experience would be incredible. Just to see the world, and be able to play with different players from around the world, would be a really great experience.”

The initial injury was not easy for Paul, as she had to watch Depaul defeat Georgetown for the 2014 Big East title from the sidelines. The second injury may have been even tougher.

“I took it extremely personally. I was like, ‘Oh my gosh, I’m not athletic anymore if I tore my ACL again ...’ I had some big goals set for myself. And just knowing that I wouldn’t be able to complete those was pretty defeating,” Paul said.

Paul’s identity was soccer, and in a single moment soccer had been taken away, at least for a while. She decided to intern at Bluemercury, a cosmetics company, to discover what else she was good at and to potentially pursue other passions.

In deciding to come back and setting soccer goals again, Paul has lived up to the captain position. Her big-game experience, as well as vocal leadership on the field, provide an invaluable boost to the team.

“She manages to connect with all the girls on the team in a positive way,” Nolan said. “Not every person can lead all varieties and connect with all players.”

Junior defender Liz Wenger, who partners with Paul in central defense, always goes to Paul for makeup and skin care advice and more.

“She is a lot of fun. She’s been there when I’ve needed her,” Wenger said. “Through that relationship with her freshman year, rooming with her on away trips, we’ve gotten really close. And when you need her she’s definitely there for you.”

Due to injury, it has been 20 months since Paul has played regularly, and through five games in 2016 she has not yet started. Of course, this does not sit well with such a competitive athlete. Nevertheless, she has found a way to lead.

“I always expect things to go the way I want them to,” Paul said. “And they have and they haven’t this year, and the maturity that I can bring knowing that there are higher goals, higher team goals, we want to achieve.”

Given an opportunity in the Hoyas’ overtime win over then-No. 12 Rutgers, Paul impressed with her ability in the air and gave Nolan a tough personnel decision to make heading into an important weekend.

“She’s a good example for the other kids, because as she’s tried to overcome her hurdles to get back, she’s had to accept that she has a responsibility to show others how to overcome their hurdles, whether they be injury or lack of playing time or whatever they may be,” Nolan said. “And she’s managed to do that well.”

Sometimes Paul will surprise you. Sometimes she will strike a thunderous 25-yard volley into the top corner, as she did against Delaware. But the rest of the time, as is her responsibility, she will be the rock of the defense, the ever-competitive leader, and the captain, striving one more time for the Big East title.

Women's Soccer | Hoyas Trump Top-Ranked Cavaliers

The Georgetown women's soccer team (6-1) delivered a shocking performance, upsetting No. 3 Virginia (7-1) in a thrilling 3-2 contest.

Down 2-0 after nine minutes to a team that had not conceded a goal in 976 minutes stretching back to last season, the Hoyas looked on the ropes. However, a stunning 25-yard laser strike off a poor UVA clearance by junior midfielder Taylor Pak sparked the shocking Georgetown comeback, and the defense held firm in the second half to seal the victory.

Head Coach Dave Nolan knew his team would have the ability to counterattack against the Cavaliers, and once one goal went in, the Hoyas had all the momentum.

"It was a huge win for this team, and it was a huge win for the program," Nolan said. "You're going against perennially one of the national championship contenders, and we knew it wasn't going to be easy. ... Whenever you have personnel that can score goals you've always got a chance."

Twelve minutes after Pak's rocket, junior midfielder Chloe Knott threaded a through ball into the path of sophomore forward Amanda Carolan, who dispatched the ball past the keeper for her first career goal, knotting the game at two.

Junior midfielder Rachel Corboz, who entered the game tied for third in the country in points, drew confidence from a Georgetown offense scoring at a clip of 3.20 goals per game, seventh in the nation.

"We always knew from the start that if we do get scored on, we do have the potential to score again," Corboz said. "We have been scoring a lot of goals this season. It was good we didn't put our heads down and just kept fighting through."

The third and decisive goal came in the 38th minute, when Corboz lined up a 30-yard free kick and deposited it in over the UVA keeper.

A massive comeback became necessary after an opening 10-minute period saw UVA win nearly every 50-50 ball and completely dominate the game to the tune of two goals and a seemingly commanding lead.

"Coach Wiese just said to me that the first 10 minutes was probably the best 10 minutes of soccer anybody has played on this field this year," Nolan said. "And at one point I was coming down the line and I was thinking, 'How can I get out down the tunnel and get down to my car?'"

Though disappointed UVA scored off a corner, Nolan admitted he left freshman defender Sarah Trissel in too long despite her not feeling well; Trissel's replacement at right back after 21 minutes, freshman defender Meaghan Nally, stood in impressively.

"Credit to Meaghan Nally who came in and did a great job for us," Nolan said. "She gave us loads of energy and defended heroically."

After an incredibly lively first half filled with end-to-end action, the second half failed to provide the same level of excitement.

"The first half was way too open, and we probably played it too open," Nolan said. "We should have maybe tried to sit back in a bit and limit them, which we did in the second half. And we kept everything from them in the second half."

In the 54th minute, junior defender Liz Wenger, who started at center back, brought a UVA player down right on the line of the 18-yard box, and the referee initially appeared to award a penalty.

Eventually, however, he decided to award a free kick to the Cavaliers on the edge of the box, from which they were unable to convert.

Then, in the 78th minute, a Virginia player went down again at the edge of the box in prime free kick location, and the referee looked to be giving Wenger a yellow card; instead, he called the Cavalier for a dive and sent the free kick the other way.

Pak, who initiated the comeback, recognized the importance of remaining composed under the waves of Virginia attack over the final 10 minutes.

“In the last minutes of the game, the only way that a team will come back is off one of our mistakes,” Pak said. “And so the only choice we had was to stay calm, especially against a team like that who’s so technically sophisticated and is able to run at us with the ball and put us under so much pressure.”

In the second half, the Hoyas were certainly pinned back at times but won the 50-50 balls they had been losing early in the first half.

“At halftime coming back out, I [told them], ‘This second half is really going to be a matter of who wants it most,’” Nolan said.

The Hoyas next travel to local rival George Washington University (6-1) on Thursday at 3 p.m.

Women's Soccer | Late Goal Stuns Top-Ranked WVU

Senior forward Grace Damaska's goal in double overtime lifted the No. 18 Georgetown women's soccer team (8-1) to another program-defining victory, a 1-0 result in Morgantown, W.Va., over No. 2 West Virginia (7-1-1). The game's lone goal came off a counterattack in the 102nd minute, with Damaska running half the field while being hounded by two WVU defenders and finishing off the crossbar from a tight angle over the goalkeeper. The Mountaineers had previously gone 30 home matches without a loss, the 11th-longest streak in NCAA history. With the win, the Hoyas rounded off an impressive nonconference slate that also included wins over then-No. 12 Rutgers (6-1-1, 1-0-0 Big 10) and then-No. 3 Virginia (8-1-0, 1-0-0 ACC), which earned the team the No. 3 spot in RPI entering conference play.

The strategy entering the game against such a physically formidable opponent differed from the normal possession style Head Coach Dave Nolan prefers to play.

In order to minimize the number of crosses coming in from wide areas, an emphasis on defensive shape and spacing would prevent the Mountaineers from overloading the Hoyas with speed and numbers on the outside to get balls in.

"This particular West Virginia version is probably the most athletic team we've ever played," Nolan said. "So we knew they were going to give us some trouble with what they do, and we had to try to minimize that. So we changed our game plan a little bit. We did the rope-and-dope, and tried to sit back and invite them on, and tried to pick off passes."

The crosses West Virginia did manage to get into the box were almost always either claimed by sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman or headed clear by graduate student defender Marina Paul.

"They ran out of ideas of how to break us down," Nolan said. "If they couldn't have success out wide, they would start to get impatient, and they started shooting from everywhere. And they had a lot of shots from distance, none of which really troubled us."

Though the team found itself slightly short on forwards, with sophomore forward Amanda Carolan picking up a knock in practice, freshman defenders Meaghan Nally and Vashti Williams stepped in and gave Damaska and sophomore forward Caitlin Farrell much-needed breaks. Graduate student forward Crystal Thomas started in Carolan's place.

"It was exhausting," Damaska said. "I don't know how the defenders did what they did; they played amazing. But I really think the team we have this season, we work for each other no matter what the circumstances. And that's been what's differentiated us from our opponents. We haven't stopped working."

Once the Mountaineers started playing through the middle of the field, the Hoyas could pick passes off in the midfield and counterattack. Despite the team's exhaustion, this strategy came to fruition when junior midfielder Rachel Corboz and junior defender Taylor Pak pressured the ball, allowing Pak to send it to Damaska for her game-winning run.

The attacking midfielders were all for the change in game plan for an athletic West Virginia side, and they were confident at halftime that they should continue sitting back and counterattacking in the second half, despite Mountaineer pressure.

"I was talking to Marina about it, and we mentioned to the rest of the team, that's where we were with the Stanford game our opening weekend," Damaska said. "It was 0-0 at half, and we had shortened the game

against a team that had a lot of dangerous parts of their offense. So we made sure to keep that in mind, but we'd also got a few chances on them."

The NCAA coaches' poll slotted the Hoyas in at No. 18 last week, but the team is sure to jump several spots in today's poll. TopDrawerSoccer.com now rates Georgetown at No. 10, and West Virginia dropped from No. 1 to No. 4 as they suffered their first home loss since August 2014 against Duke.

"West Virginia were selling themselves as the number one team in the country, so we just went up and beat the number one team in the country, which we haven't done before," Nolan said.

"Coming off a week where we had a tough game against a local rival, George Washington, in the superclasico, and then also coming off a tough game against Virginia last Saturday, this sustained run of form indicates to me that this could very well be our most successful team."

Confident from a strong start to the season, the Hoyas now turn to conference play on Sunday with one goal in mind.

"We had set a goal for ourselves to be 6-3 coming out of nonconference, and the fact that we came out 8-1," Damaska said. "It's just a testament to how well this team is working together, how dedicated we are to reaching our goals for this season, and it makes us more excited to go into the Big East and go win a championship."

It was only after travelling halfway around the world from New Zealand to play for the Georgetown women's soccer team, that junior midfielder Chloe Knott — then a freshman — realized her homesickness.

"It was really cool. It was a lot," Knott said about her first few days in the United States "I was just taking it all in, so excited about everything."

Knott had made the decision without hesitation to leave New Zealand with the support of friends and family in fall 2014, diving headfirst into a foreign culture with foreign teammates, far from home.

In the first days of preseason freshman year, she found herself caught up in a whirlwind of getting gear and experiencing new culture and learning names. She loved it. And at Georgetown, she has thrived.

Moving from England to New Zealand at age 13 provided Knott with a real opportunity to play soccer at a higher level.

"I didn't think I would ever go far with soccer in England, because so many people were trying to do the same thing, and it was such a big thing. Like, you grew up playing football in England, from age 3," Knott said. "But then when I came to New Zealand, not many girls were playing, and I was already ahead of most of them."

Knott seized her chance, captaining her high school, Rangitoto College, for four years. She also earned spots in New Zealand national team squads at various levels, though was unable to play in competitive matches under FIFA rules concerning time lived in a country. Still, Knott stands proudly on the sideline in exhibition games for the New Zealand national anthem, an anthem that represents the home she quickly came to love.

The decision to leave New Zealand proved surprisingly easy.

"One of my best friends at the time came to America, went to UNC, and she came back twice a year," Knott said. "Every time she came back, she was like, 'It's the best thing I've ever done, I don't want to come home. ... Chloe, you have to do it.' So I wanted to at least try to do it."

With a lack of high-level women's professional soccer in New Zealand, the pursuit of a professional soccer career required a move abroad; seeing the success her friends were enjoying only solidified her intentions.

Knott enjoyed full support from her parents in her decision to leave home.

"My dad watches every single game at home," Knott said. "He definitely missed me; he wants footage all the time. I think he wants me to go back to New Zealand instead of staying here, and I really want to stay here for a bit longer. But my mom was like, 'You have to, you have to go. This is something you can't turn down.'"

Knott knew little of American colleges, and only opened her search for a school towards the end of her senior year of high school. She nearly chose Colorado College, but was ultimately swayed by Georgetown's urban setting and academic prestige.

"I think anywhere, I would have been happy. I like to think that if I'd come over here I would've been happy anywhere," Knott said.

Just as she did when she first moved to New Zealand, Knott has again fully seized her opportunity in entirely new surroundings.

“I’m going to be honest, she’s far different than what I expected,” Head Coach Dave Nolan said. “Typically what happens with international kids, is they’re super technical and have the athleticism of a manatee. Chloe’s actually the opposite; she’s probably our fittest kid, covers the most ground and runs more than anybody.”

Earning a team award for most improved player at the end of her sophomore season, Knott has refined her technical ability and fits in well with junior midfielder Taylor Pak and junior midfielder Rachel Corboz in a starting midfield lineup that could rival any in the nation.

Knott, Pak and Corboz constitute part of a junior class that contributes nine players to the team, including five starters, which as a result forms the core personality of the squad off the field.

“It was more sophomore year, when we actually started playing together, that we actually spent more time together and became close friends,” Knott said. “There’s nine of us, and we’re all just best friends. It’s like a family. ... I feel like the whole team is as well, this year is like a family.”

That chemistry has translated into success on the field. For the second straight season, Knott has started every game in defensive midfield alongside Pak, both proving vital cogs in a Georgetown team that has risen towards the top of national rankings thanks to major upsets over No. 7 Virginia (8-2-2, 1-1-2 ACC) and No. 2 West Virginia (10-1-1, 2-0-0 Big 12).

The team now stands as an unexpected contender for a deep run into the postseason. If a conference title or NCAA tournament success comes to Shaw Field this year, it will be with the help of Knott, a midfielder who has truly covered more ground on her journey to college soccer than any other Hoya.

FEATURE: Wenger Looks to Carry Family Legacy

Andrew Wenger could tell his sister was tough from an early age.

“One time she was playing goalie when she was younger, very young, and she turned and the ball went out of bounds and she banged into the post,” Andrew Wenger, brother to women’s soccer junior defender Liz Wenger, said. “She ended up needing to go get stitches, but she got up and was ready to play again. She was concerned the ball went in the net.”

Another story that Andrew Wenger, who now plays for Houston Dynamo in the MLS, recalls involves his sister initially just shaking off a broken elbow after a failed jump off the swings.

But in meeting the junior defender, the most immediately noticeable thing is not her toughness, but her personality: She is quick to show a wide, boundless smile, a touch of self-deprecation and constant encouragement to teammates.

The Wenger family history of athleticism reads like a laundry list. The Wengers’ mother played field hockey at Duke, and their dad was a three-sport high school athlete who only gave up sports to study landscape architecture at Penn State. Another brother, Jonathan, played soccer at Elon, and Andrew Wenger won the 2011 Hermann Trophy at Duke before the Montreal Impact selected him as the No. 1 overall pick in the 2012 MLS SuperDraft.

A veritable renaissance woman before arriving on the Hilltop, Liz Wenger danced tap, jazz and ballet through middle school and earned her Gold Award in Girl Scouts her senior year at Warwick High School in Lititz, Pa.

“All three of us [siblings] were all doing different things,” Liz Wenger said. “Andrew was very involved in soccer nationally with his club. Jonathan and I tended to do more different activities. We were both involved in Scouts, he played lacrosse for a while and I danced, did gymnastics at one point, did field hockey and swam.”

When the Eastern Pennsylvania high school soccer season moved to the fall in conflict with the field hockey season, Liz Wenger chose to captain her Warwick High School field hockey team for her junior and senior seasons and only play soccer with her local club team, PA Classics.

“Soccer was always my number one, my first love,” Liz Wenger said. “With field hockey, I think the environment at my high school, the coach I had, the teammates I had, fed into my decision to keep playing field hockey. But if we’re talking sport to sport, soccer was definitely number one for me.”

From freshman year on, Liz Wenger played under Coach Mark Pulisic, father of USMNT breakout star Christian Pulisic, on PA Classics.

“His coaching style and [Georgetown Head Coach] Dave [Nolan]’s coaching style are very similar, so the transition here coaching-wise wasn’t too extreme,” Liz Wenger said. “It’s very much possession. ... They were focused on playing good soccer, fostering good technique. Playing under Mark was always fun. He always had a joke to crack, always making fun of someone but in a lighthearted manner that you couldn’t take too seriously.”

Wegner's path to Georgetown began in 2012 when PA Classics took on a Bethesda team coached by Nolan, who noticed the tall blonde defender stopping his team's every attack and whom college coaches had not yet discovered.

Cancelling a December trip to Alabama to see the Georgetown men's team take on Maryland in the final four of the College Cup, Nolan instead braved the York, Penn. cold to watch Liz Wenger dominate a local tournament, what Nolan called the Early Amish Classic.

"It's miserable, it's freezing, there's snow coming in sideways," Nolan said. "And I'm the only college coach there. And I'm thinking, either I'm an idiot, that everyone else has seen nothing in this kid, or I'm a genius, I've seen something in this kid and no one else has. And she did really well."

Liz Wenger has started nearly every game since the beginning of her freshman year as a Hoya, earning All-Big East Rookie and Second Team selections over the past two seasons as part of a defense that recorded 11, five and nine shutouts so far this season.

Nolan considers her partnership with graduate student defender Marina Paul in central defense the best he has overseen since arriving at Georgetown in 1999, as Paul's aerial ability and experience mesh well with Wenger's pace and tackling ability.

"[Liz Wenger] is probably the fastest defender in the conference, and certainly my own opinion is that she's the best defender in the conference," Nolan said. "So that helps a lot when you have that kind of pace. ... But she's more than pace. She reads the game really well, she's a great one-on-one defender and she's very dogged in the tackle."

Early in the season, with Paul not in the lineup, Liz Wenger found herself needing to step in as the vocal leader of the defense; Andrew Wenger has seen a similar transformation taking place off the field.

"Personally, my sister has grown up and found her voice a little bit," Andrew Wenger said. "Growing up I'd say my brother and I were always a bit louder and more assertive, but now she's both sticking up for what she believes in and making that belief known, which is pretty fantastic."

After graduation in 2018, Liz Wenger can see herself following in the path of recent graduates Daphne Corboz and Sarah Adams in playing abroad; she does not want to limit her job search to whatever falls under the umbrella of her management major and is looking at any and every option.

"Before I came to Georgetown, I never really considered playing professionally," Liz Wenger said. "I'm definitely going to keep that option open, I'm open to it. I think for me it just depends on what shakes out in the next year, professionally. God willing I'm healthy coming out of next season and I really do have a chance to look abroad."

Women's Soccer | Hoyas Capture First Big East Title in Dominating Fashion

From the moment the ball left senior forward Grace Damaska's foot, the outcome of Sunday's Big East championship final was no longer in doubt.

In the 22nd minute, Damaska unleashed a rocket from 25 yards out that slammed off the underside of the bar and ricocheted into the net. The goal stood up to give the No. 7 Georgetown women's soccer team (16-2-3, 6-1-2 Big East) its first ever Big East championship trophy, defeating top-seeded Marquette (12-7-2, 7-2 Big East) by a 2-0 scoreline.

The Hoyas outshot the Golden Eagles 16-1 over the 90 minutes, and the midfield successfully stifled any hope of a Marquette comeback.

"This was too good a team not to win a Big East championship, regular season or conference," Head Coach Dave Nolan said. "And I knew from when they left the team room this morning, if we didn't win it wouldn't have been because we weren't ready."

For Damaska, playing in her last Big East game, the previous tournament losses made this victory all the sweeter.

"I'm going to try not to cry," Damaska said. "It feels surreal. To be at home, to do it in front of my parents and my aunt, it's just unbelievable. You can't beat this. It's amazing."

Georgetown's tournament history before this weekend had not been an enjoyable one, with four semifinal trips in the last four seasons all coming to naught. Four years ago the Hoyas lost to the Golden Eagles 1-0 in the final on an 87th-minute goal, and two years later they fell 2-0 to the DePaul Blue Demons (10-6-3, 7-2-0 Big East) in the final.

But on Sunday, it was all smiles at Shaw Field.

"It's been a monkey on our back now for a few years," Nolan said. "But it's not easy to win, it's a great conference. Every year there's always one or two really good teams, and we've usually been one of the two and we've just come up a little bit short on occasion. So today was our day."

Up 1-0 at halftime, the Hoyas did not let up in the second frame.

In the 52nd minute, junior midfielder Chloe Knott won a tackle, played give-and-go with sophomore forward Amanda Carola before hitting the ball off the inside of the post. However, junior midfielder Rachel Corboz was there off the rebound to strike the back of the net for the proverbial nail in the coffin.

Knott said this game and its result is why the Hoyas put such an effort in practice, long lifts, improving skills — in short, why they sweat.

"Friday was a different game," Knott said, referring to the Big East semifinal against DePaul (10-6-3, 7-2 Big East). "Friday was very scrappy. Today we were so determined. Everything we knew we had to win, this was the 90 minutes that mattered most from the whole season."

Friday's semifinal had proven a much tenser affair, with Georgetown leveling in the 66th minute thanks to a finish by graduate student Marina Paul. The game headed to double overtime and beyond, as the Hoyas inched past the Blue Demons 5-4 in the penalty shootout.

After the final, Nolan praised Knott, comparing her to Chelsea's N'Golo Kante with her work rate and ability to make the crucial tackle to cut out chances in defensive midfield. In addition, Nolan praised the character of the team.

"They're a great bunch of kids," Nolan said. "I'm blessed, we've had so many great teams over the years, and so many wonderful kids. But this group, last year and this year, have been a lot of fun. They just come every day and work hard, and they never give you an ounce of concern."

Thanks to her stunning finish, Damaska took home the award for Most Outstanding Offensive Player of the tournament. On the goal, she was surprised to find herself in such a large amount of space near the box.

"I noticed they weren't really defending me, they were stepping off of me. I don't really know why they were doing that," Damaska said. "But if they're going to step off me, I'm going to shoot the ball. And it went in."

Paul won the Most Outstanding Defensive Player of the tournament, and Corboz, along with junior midfielder Taylor Pak and junior defender Liz Wenger, were named with Damaska to the All-Tournament Team.

The win gives the Hoyas 16 on the season, which ties the team record for wins in a year. Georgetown will look to break that record in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, for which the Big East Championship victory automatically qualified the Hoyas.

Georgetown will be seeded second in its bracket and will play St. Francis of Pennsylvania (10-11, 6-2 Northeast Conference) at Shaw Field on Sunday at 12 p.m. in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

Georgetown Hoyas advance to quarterfinals of NCAA women's soccer tournament

When Dave Nolan checked Facebook on Sunday morning, he was reminded through the memories feature that six years ago his Georgetown women's soccer team had advanced to the NCAA tournament quarterfinals for the first time.

In the pregame meeting, he told his players, "This is a little bit of destiny. I have a feeling, girls, I have a feeling."

The Hoyas created new memories Sunday at wind-whipped Shaw Field, defeating Virginia, 2-0, to earn a home quarterfinal at noon Saturday against Santa Clara (12-6-4).

Junior Rachel Corboz, an elite midfielder, played a role on the go-ahead own goal less than two minutes into the second half and scored on a sensational free kick in the 77th minute. The Hoyas (19-2-3) defeated the Cavaliers (15-5-2) for the second time this season and prevented the perennial powers from reaching the quarterfinals for a fourth consecutive autumn. Georgetown, which has never gone to the College Cup semifinals, recorded its fourth consecutive shutout and sixth in seven matches.

Amid wicked gusts at the hilltop venue, neither team could muster the types of forays and combinations that had thrust both of them into the top 10 in the nation in scoring.

But after an uneventful first half, the Hoyas went ahead in the 47th minute. With the wind wreaking havoc on aerial service, Corboz, the national leader in assists, played a short corner kick to Chloe Knott.

Virginia was slow to react. Knott seized on the space, taking a couple touches near the end line before whipping the ball to the edge of the six-yard box. Under pressure from Georgetown's Marina Paul, Virginia defender Veronica Latsko inadvertently headed the ball into the net.

The Cavaliers' best chance for an equalizer — and best opportunity of the match against the defensively tidy Hoyas — came in the 67th minute when Alissa Gorzak beat two defenders and broke into the clear before hitting the left post from 12 yards.

Corboz — the younger sister of a former Georgetown women's star and a Maryland men's standout — was on target 10 minutes later. With the wind at her back from 22 yards, she tagged a free kick that cleared the defensive wall and bent into the near side, beyond goalkeeper Morgan Stearns's reach, for her 11th goal of the year.

"I saw the goalie cheat a little," Corboz said.

The opportunity to regroup — and take advantage of the wind — worked in Georgetown's favor after Virginia had set the terms in the first half. "At halftime, we got in at 0-0 and I felt like we could get something off a set piece or a moment of brilliance," Nolan said. "We got a bit of luck on the corner kick and then a bit of brilliance by Rachel."

The Cavaliers were out of ideas and the outcome all but settled. Georgetown, which is averaging 2.5 goals per game, recorded its 16th shutout overall and became only the third team to blank the Cavaliers. Ariell Schechtman made two routine saves.

“We were playing our best soccer,” Cavaliers Coach Steve Swanson said, “and it’s hard to play soccer on a day like today. ... We played some good soccer in spite of the conditions in the second half, but we just didn’t do enough overall to generate enough.”

In the other quarterfinals, South Carolina will host North Carolina and Auburn will visit Southern California on Friday, and West Virginia will welcome Duke on Saturday.

Women's Soccer | Elite Eight Awaits As Hoyas Down Cavaliers

For the second time in program history, the No. 5 Georgetown women's soccer team advanced the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament, after beating No. 15 Virginia (15-5-2, 6-2-2 ACC) by a 2-0 score Sunday afternoon in the third round.

Despite the severe wind affecting the quality of play, the Hoyas (19-2-3, 6-1-2 Big East) used the conditions to their advantage, tallying an own goal less than two minutes into the second half and adding a late free kick goal from junior midfielder Rachel Corboz.

The wind was an omnipresent factor and stopped some goal kicks mid-air and extended others nearly the length of the field. The gusts also prevented both teams from getting into any offensive rhythm, rendering the match a scrappy midfield battle with few chances at either end.

"It was crazy," Head Coach Dave Nolan said. "In all my years of playing and coaching, even coming from Ireland, I don't think I can ever remember a game in winds so strong. I mean, it really screwed up the game with regards to being a spectacle. Which is a shame, because you've got two very good soccer-playing teams. I felt we did a much better job of dealing with it than they did."

The Cavaliers in the first half, despite the wind being at their backs, managed to create few opportunities, but Georgetown took immediate advantage in the second frame. Corboz took a short corner in the forty-seventh minute, junior midfielder Chloe Knott took a few dribbles towards the box, and her cross ricocheted off a Virginia defender into the net.

"In the second half, it was going to come down to either a bit of good fortune or a moment of brilliance, which would separate the two teams," Nolan said. "And we got both. Obviously we got lucky with the corner kick, but you know when you drive a ball in there with that kind of pace, stuff can happen. And then, you know, Rachel does what Rachel does, which is brilliance."

Corboz sealed the victory in the seventy-seventh minute with a free-kick goal from twenty-five yards out, her eleventh goal of the season, second on the team behind senior forward Grace Damaska. Corboz also leads the nation in assists with fourteen.

Georgetown goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman, who is tied for fifth in the country in shutouts with 12, put up her fourth in a row with the string of 2-0 playoff wins. Corboz also had high praise for the defensive unit.

"Our defense has been amazing throughout the whole year," Corboz said.

Georgetown's Elite Eight appearance is the second in program history, with the team only having reached this point in the tournament in 2010, when after upsetting top-seeded Maryland the team fell to Ohio State 2-0.

The Hoyas play at Shaw Field on Saturday at noon against Santa Clara (12-6-4, 6-2-1 WCC).

Georgetown has achieved much already this season, but they remain motivated to keep going.

"Oh, it's amazing. We've worked so hard," Corboz said. "We told ourselves that we had a really good chance, and we want to win another game. We want to go to the Final Four, we want to make more history."

Georgetown women's soccer advances to College Cup for first time

For the last two minutes of a tense NCAA women's soccer quarterfinal Saturday, Santa Clara stormed the north goal at wind-whipped Shaw Field in a frantic hunt for an elusive equalizer.

When time expired, it was Georgetown's turn to raid the penalty area, players streaming from the sideline in blue jackets to reunite with joyous teammates.

In the 18-by-44-yard box, Georgetown jubilation superseded Santa Clara desperation as the fifth-ranked Hoyas advanced to the College Cup semifinals for the first time with a 1-0 victory.

They swarmed sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schectman, who had made a critical save with 30 seconds left, and hugged graduate student Crystal Thomas, whose sensational goal in the 76th minute had shattered the deadlock.

Most of all, after a fifth consecutive shutout victory and eighth straight match without a defeat, they reveled together for a mass celebration 23 years in the making.

"It's a fantastic feeling for us," said Dave Nolan, an Irishman in his 13th season as head coach and 18th on the staff. "We've obviously never been in a situation like this before, so we are going to celebrate today, we're going to enjoy today, and then tomorrow we start worrying about the rest of the season."

The rest of the season continues Friday at Avaya Stadium in San Jose with the Hoyas (20-2-3) playing seventh-ranked Southern California (17-4-2). In the other semifinal, sixth-ranked North Carolina (17-3-4) will face No. 1 West Virginia (22-1-2). The final is next Sunday.

Georgetown has enjoyed 10 straight winning seasons and made its only previous quarterfinal appearance six years ago, playing in the shadows of the men's team, which gained national prominence in 2012 with its first College Cup berth.

After laboring to break down Santa Clara's defense, the Hoyas went ahead deep into the tense match on Thomas's 11th goal of the season.

With possession beyond the left side of the penalty area, the Notre Dame transfer pulled the ball back and stung a rising, right-footed shot that beat goalkeeper Melissa Lowder to the upper near corner.

"The defenders backed off, so I was able to get a clear shot on goal," Thomas said. "I knew it was pretty windy and went near post. I think it had some bend on it, and that really helped."

Unable to implement their graceful style of soccer against a rigid opponent, the Hoyas found the answer by striking from distance.

“When you are playing against a team as talented as they are,” Thomas said, “you definitely have to seek out opportunities.”

Neither side generated any quality opportunities in the first 45 minutes, though as the half transpired, the Hoyas began to find their way. The Broncos (12-7-4) created the first genuine chance when Jenna Roering ruptured Georgetown’s defense in the 57th minute. Schectman made a sterling save reacting to her right and Roering sent the rebound wide of an open net.

The Hoyas, averaging 2.5 goals per game, had not gone scoreless since a 0-0 draw at St. John’s on Oct. 6. Their persistence was rewarded when Thomas cracked the deadlock.

In the closing moments, Santa Clara’s Julie Vass missed high on an open bid from 15 yards and Schectman saved Kellie Peay’s shot off a corner kick before time expired.

“We knew this was a special team,” Schectman said. “We’ve surprised everybody along the road and now people are finally putting our name down and watching out for us. It’s just an incredible feeling.”

After the celebration, Nolan gathered his players on the far side of the field, out of earshot of friends, family and fans. Suddenly, a burst of laughter arose from the huddled circle.

Nolan had told the players they needed to learn the lyrics from the 1968 hit, “Do You Know the Way to San Jose,” and belted out a verse.

“I’m not a particularly good singer,” he said. “I think they nearly collapsed with laughter.”

Said Schectman: “I’d never heard that song before, but he told us all to learn it, and I am planning to learn it.”

Women's Soccer | Hoyas Advance to First Final Four in School History

For the first time in program history, the No. 2/5 Georgetown women's soccer team reached the final four of the NCAA soccer tournament, the College Cup, with a 1-0 victory over the Santa Clara Broncos on Sunday.

The Hoyas (20-2-3, 6-1-2 Big East), who have conceded one goal in the last month and have outscored opponents 7-0 to this point in the tournament, scored their goal on a late, long-range low-angle effort from graduate student forward Crystal Thomas, her 11th of the season.

The first half saw both offenses stagnate, resulting in three total shots, but the game later gave way to a second period that saw the Broncos (12-7-4, 6-2-1 Big East) earn chances to score. Sophomore goalkeeper Arielle Schechtman posted four saves en route to her fifth straight shutout and fifteenth overall, good for second in the country.

Head Coach Dave Nolan said Georgetown's offense, which has posted the second-most goals in the country with 61, has engendered a common reaction.

"Teams coming in to play us have realized that they have to shrink the game in time, try and stay in the game, and hope they can nick it," Nolan said. "They almost did, if they had scored that chance, it would have been a perfect game plan for them."

In the 57th minute, a Santa Clara player found herself in a one-on-one situation against Schechtman, who came up with the game's most important stop.

"I saw her breaking free," Schechtman said. "When she cut inside, I knew I had to step, and she took a shot and I was able to get a touch on it. She got the rebound but thankfully she hit it wide. In one-on-ones as a goalie, you just have to make yourself as big as you possibly can and try to get a reaction save on it."

Thomas' goal came from a very tight angle 25 yards out, and the ball bent and flew in high at the near post.

Thomas credited the midfielders for their efforts winning balls in the air and setting up opportunities for offensive players.

"It had some bend on it, and that helped," Thomas said. "But it comes down to how we fought the whole game, and we were able to get ourselves in those kinds of positions."

After Thomas' finish, the Broncos brought pressure on the Georgetown goal with two corners and a goal-line scramble in the final 40 seconds.

"It was very nervy; I had to change my underwear twice," Nolan said. "Santa Clara is a good team, and you have to give them a lot of credit. ... We probably made it a little bit more difficult for ourselves in the last few minutes, but emotion kicks in, nerves kick in, and everything gets frantic."

The hunger to pressure the ball in strong team defense, starting with the forwards, has allowed the Hoyas to excel on the counterattack all season; a national semifinal appearance is the result of Georgetown's pace and defensive cohesiveness.

"You look at the kids, and you look at how excited they are, and that's what it's all about," Nolan said. "It's about these guys making their mark, playing some good soccer along the way, and leaving their year and leaving their college days with some special memories. It's a fantastic feeling for us."

Georgetown, seeded second in its region, will advance to take on No. 7/3 USC (17-4-2, 8-2-1 Pac-12) on Friday in San Jose, Calif. In the postgame huddle, Nolan added to the moment.

“I told them they need to learn the lyrics for the song, ‘Do You Know the Way to San Jose,’” Nolan said. “And I’m not a particularly good singer, so I sang a verse and I think they nearly collapsed with laughter.”

Schechtman said while she had not previously heard of the song, she would learn it before leaving Wednesday for the West Coast.

Junior midfielder Rachel Corboz led the team with three shots. Her older sister, Daphne Corboz (COL '15), who now plays for Manchester City, attended the quarterfinal game at Shaw Field, and Nolan took a moment to give credit to past generations of Hoyas.

“She’s been a huge part of our program, and she’s a big reason why we’re here today,” Nolan said about Daphne Corboz. “She wanted to celebrate with her sister, and she’s very excited for the program.”

USC looks to pose new difficulties for the Hoyas on Friday, but for now, the team will celebrate its victory, and its ascension from an unranked preseason position to second in Top Drawer Soccer’s most recent rankings.

“It’s amazing,” Schechtman said. “We knew this was a special team starting in preseason. We’ve surprised everybody along the road, and now people are finally putting our name down and watching out for us.”

Two games away from a national championship, the Hoyas will play against USC at Avaya Stadium in San Jose on Friday at 4:30 p.m. PST, 7:30 p.m. EST, in the second semifinal. The winner will play the winner of No. 6/7 North Carolina (17-3-4, 6-2-2 ACC) and No. 1 West Virginia (22-1-2, 8-0 Big XII) on Sunday at 6 p.m. PST (3 p.m. EST). ESPN will televise all games.

“We’ve worked really hard for this,” Thomas said. “It’s come down to every single person working hard in practice, and that’s why we’re able to compete on the field. It started even before August. Last spring we were all ready, and this is what we wanted to do, and now we need to go and take it.”
