### FIRST PITCH

With a series victory over Michigan last weekend, Indiana improved to 20-21 overall and 10-4 in conference play. By taking the series from the Wolverines, Indiana extended its streak to nine straight conference series without a loss. IU is the only team in the conference that has not lost a Big Ten series this year. The Hoosiers are just half a game behind first-place Illinois and Ohio State, who sit at 11-4 in Big Ten play. With midweek games against Miami and Western Illinois, IU is looking to move over .500 for the first time since being 3-2 early in 2009. Non-conference affairs have not been kind to Indiana this season, as the Hoosiers are just 10-17 in those contests. Coach Smith will square off against his alma mater and former team in Miami, as the Hoosier skipper spent nine years in Oxford before taking the helm in Bloomington.

### THE LAST TIME...

Indiana faced the Redhawks for a pair of games played last season. The two split the season series, with IU taking the first game 5-2 and Miami capturing the second 11-4. Hoosier pitching was the storyline in the first contest as the trio of Doug Fleenor, Joe Vicini and Chris Squires limited the Redhawks to two hits. IU last faced Western Illinois over a decade ago when the Hoosiers defeated the Leathernecks, 10-8, in 1995. Steve Smella and Mike Crotty led Indiana's offense, amassing six hits and six runs scored in the game. Willy Graeber was also a perfect 4-for-4 at the plate for the Hoosiers.

### THE COACHES

Indiana is in its fourth year under the direction of Tracy Smith. In his time at the helm of the Hoosiers, IU is 92-122. Smith is now 409-340-1 (.546) in his 13th season as a head coach. The 2008 season was a significant upward turn for the Hoosiers, as Indiana made its first Big Ten Tournament appearance since 2004 by rallying for a sixth-place finish in the regular season. IU then eliminated Ohio State, Illinois and Penn State at the conference tournament before falling in the semifinals to Purdue. With a 31-30 record on the season, IU had its finest season in Smith's tenure.

Dan Simonds, who served as an assistant to Smith at Miami, is in his fourth year as head coach for the RedHawks. In his first three years, Simonds has led MU to two MAC Tournament berths. Western Illinois is in its eighth season under the leadership of Stan Hyman. Hyman has guided the Leathernecks to six consecutive Summit League tournaments and led Western to two victories over top-10 teams last season.

**EA IS IN THE GAME**

Junior Eric Arnett has emerged as one of the top arms in the Big Ten in 2009 as he is among the conference leaders in every category. The junior was also recently named the ninth-best junior nationally and the fifth-best junior pitcher by *Perfect Game Crosschecker*.

Against Michigan over the weekend, Arnett had by far his toughest outing of the season, as a late-inning surge by the Wolverines saw six earned runs cross in 6 1/3 innings. Arnett was solid on both sides of a one-hour rain delay, allowing just five hits, three walks and two earned runs over the first six innings before a four-run seventh derailed his day.

The win improved him to 9-1 on the season and 5-0 in the Big Ten. He is already tied for third on IU's single-season list with his nine victories and his five conference wins have already matched the school record. He now has a 2.49 overall ERA, third in the Big Ten, and a 2.41 conference mark. Arnett has allowed just 28 hits and 14 walks in his 41 Big Ten innings this season.

Over his previous five starts, Arnett kept the opposition to two runs or fewer each time, as he put up a 5-0 record with a 1.30 ERA and a .168 batting average against (24 hits in 41 2/3 innings).

Arnett delivered his third straight complete game at Iowa, hurling a two-hitter with a career-best 11 strikeouts. He earned Big Ten co-Pitcher of the Week honors for his performance. It is the junior's first weekly honor from the conference.

After an impressive Big Ten opener against Minnesota, Arnett somehow outdid himself against Illinois. Arnett became the first Hoosier ever to pitch 10 innings in a game when he picked up his sixth win of the season with a 1-2-3 10th.

Arnett did not have a typical offseason, as he tried out for the basketball team and earned a roster spot. He served as a key post player during practice for the first 2 1/2 months of the season. Due to scholarship limitations, he could not play in a game, but practiced with the team until early January.

**SPLIT OR BETTER**

By taking two of three from Michigan, the Hoosiers extended their streak of splitting or winning conference series to nine weekends. IU is the only Big Ten team this year that has yet to lose a conference set. At 10-4, Indiana is off to its best conference start since the 1991 team opened 10-3-1.

Indiana's string of nine series without a loss is more than twice as long as the second longest in the Big Ten. Over the last nine conference series, the Hoosiers have a 21-9 record (.700), the best of any Big Ten team.

It is also the longest stretch that Indiana has gone without a series loss since the conference went to series play. Indiana earned a split or better in all seven series in 1996, the only team to go a season without losing a Big Ten series. The 1996 team, which featured IU skipper Tracy Smith as an assistant coach, finished second in the Big Ten and won the Big Ten Tournament for IU's only NCAA appearance.

**IT MAY SOUND CLICHÉ**

We have all heard the old adage that "pitching and defense wins championships." And while that sounds like a line out of the Coach's cliché handbook, it has certainly shown it has some truth when you look at the Hoosiers in 2009.

Indiana has hit better than any other Big Ten team in non-conference affairs (.343), but Indiana is just 10-17 in those contests. On the contrary, IU is 10-4 in conference play, but the offense has hit just .288, which is the fourth best mark in the Big Ten.

On the other hand, on the mound and in the field, the Hoosiers have been very solid in conference affairs, as IU is first in the Big Ten in earned run average and fourth in fielding percentage. Indiana's 3.53 ERA is more than half a run better than the closest competition (Michigan State, 4.17) and the .243 batting average against by Hoosier hurlers leads the Big Ten as well.

The defensive improvement has been even more stark, as IU's .970 fielding percentage in conference games is fourth in the league, but Indiana has just a .953 fielding percentage in non-conference affairs. Third baseman Vince Gonzalez is yet to make an error in conference play, and second baseman Tyler Rogers made his first Big Ten error against Michigan. Rogers has made 10 errors in non-conference games.

**Q HIM UP**

After a tough first inning of 2009, Chris "Q" Squires has been very strong. The Ft. Wayne native has come on as of late out of the pen (2.21 ERA as a reliever) to emerge as a solid closer for IU.

Squires allowed two runs against Louisville, breaking a string of eight appearances without allowing a run. But he bounced back in a big way against Michigan. Squires closed out both of Indiana's victories on the weekend, earning a pair of saves to push his season total to five. The Wolverines got the tying run on base in both the eighth and ninth, but Squires slammed the door in both innings, striking out Chris Berset to end the game.

On Sunday, Squires came on with two runners on and two out in a 3-1 game and got Kevin Cislo on a flyout to left to end the eighth. Michigan got the tying run to the plate in the ninth in the form of leading hitter Ryan LaMarre, but Squires caught him looking at strike three to end the contest. Squires has four saves and a 0.82 ERA in conference action.

A key to his improvement this year has been a downturn in the free passes he has allowed. After walking 17 in 21 1/3 a year ago, Squires has allowed just 15 bases on balls in 41 2/3 innings. He collected saves against Iowa and Penn State earlier this season, striking out the side in the ninth against PSU.

**RIGHT WHERE HE LEFT OFF**

After a stellar 2008 season, Josh Phegley entered 2009 with high expectations. Though it has been an up-and-down season for the Preseason All-American, his numbers are still among the best in the conference.

Phegley enters the week among the league's top 10 in average (sixth, .383), slugging (second, .688) on-base percentage (second, .485), home runs (tied for first, 21), RBI (second, 49), runs (tied for fourth, 42) and walks (tied for third, 29).

Against the Wolverines, Phegley had a big series both at the dish and behind it. The junior went 6-for-11 with a pair of solo home runs on the weekend. The second bomb, in the eighth inning of Sunday's contest, shifted the momentum back in Indiana's favor after the Hoosiers surrendered a run in the bottom of the seventh in a tight ballgame. The catcher also threw out four of seven Wolverines trying to steal off of him.

Phegley posted his fourth career five-hit game against Morehead State on March 10, hitting three home runs and adding a double and single for six RBI. The huge game vaulted Phegley to his second career Big Ten Player of the Week mention and he was named to the College Baseball Foundation's National All-Star Lineup for Week Four.

Phegley, who was a unanimous first team Preseason All-American at catcher this season, has played all over the field this year. The majority of his time has been spent behind the dish, but he has also appeared at third base and in both left and right field for the Hoosiers.

Following IU's spring trip, Phegley offered his services to Coach Smith as a closer as well. The Terre Haute native was a pitcher in high school and made his debut on the mound against Cincinnati, striking out one in a perfect ninth.

**ALEX THE GREAT**

While Josh Phegley is the most feared hitter in the Indiana lineup, freshman Alex Dickerson has begun to establish himself as one of the conference's top power hitters.

Dickerson is a staple among the league's top 10, as he is tied for fourth in the league with 11 home runs and his 109 total bases lead the conference. His .373 average (eighth), .657 slugging percentage (fourth), 42 RBI (sixth) and 62 hits (second) are all among the conference's top 10.

Dickerson has already dented Indiana's freshman record books in his debut campaign, as his 11 bombs have matched IU's previous record, set by Mike Sabo in 1985. He is only 16 RBI shy of Phil Dauphin's (1988) mark of 58 as well. IU has never had a player named Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

The Poway, Calif., native has also developed a penchant for hitting key home runs. In the opening weekend against Minnesota, he drilled a go-ahead, two-run homer in Indiana's 3-2 victory. Then in the second game against Illinois, he hit his eighth homer of the year in the top of the 10th to give IU a 2-1 victory. He added a two-run shot in the series finale and was named co-Big Ten Player of the Week.

**BACK TO BASHICS**

After a slow start to the 2009 season, preseason Big Ten Pitcher of the Year Matt Bashore has rebounded since the beginning of conference play. The Tipp City, Ohio, native is 4-0 with a 2.18 ERA and 34 strikeouts in 33 innings pitched over his last five starts. Perhaps just as impressive is the fact that he has allowed opponents to hit just .223 and has surrendered just nine walks – an average of 2.5 walks per nine innings. That also works out to a ratio of 3.8 strikeouts for every walk.

Prior to his recent surge, Bashore had a 7.24 ERA and the Hoosiers were 0-6 in his starts. He had been allowing the opposition to post a .331 average against him and was walking opposing batsmen at a rate of 4.3 per nine innings.

Bashore has delivered impressive outings in three straight contests, although his last two have been starkly different. Against Michigan and Penn State, the strikeout artist who normally gets deep into counts has come right after his opponents, inducing many more ground balls. He has allowed 23 groundouts to just seven flyouts and 11 strikeouts. Against Penn State, Bashore was throwing first-pitch strikes all day, as he allowed just one three-ball count and delivered first-pitch strikes to 20 out of 27 batters (74.1 percent).

Against Iowa, he matched a career high by throwing 8 1/3 innings, reaching double digits in punchouts for the first time in 2009 with 10 Ks. Bashore allowed just three hits over the first eight innings before running into trouble in the ninth. He punched out at least one Hawkeye in each of the first eight innings. He retired Iowa 1-2-3 four different times in the contest.

**THE 400 CLUB**

With a 14-4 win over Illinois, head coach Tracy Smith picked up his 400th career victory as a collegiate skipper. Smith is now 409-340-1 (.546) in his 13th season at the helm of a college program. The Kentland, Ind., native has improved his record with the Hoosiers to 92-122 in his fourth season at the head of the program.

The 2008 season was a significant upward turn for the Hoosiers, as Indiana made its first Big Ten Tournament appearance since 2004 by rallying for a sixth-place finish in the regular season. IU then eliminated Ohio State, Illinois and Penn State at the conference tournament before falling in the semifinals to Purdue.

Smith amassed a 317-220-1 (.590) record with Miami and a MAC regular-season mark of 152-95 (.615). He led the RedHawks to eight straight 30-win seasons, marking only the second time the program had accomplished that feat, and he finished his career in Oxford ranked third on MU's all-time wins list.

**JUMP STARTS**

Junior captain Josh Phegley has often stated the importance of a quick start to Indiana's success and the numbers show that Phegley is right on the money. IU has outscored opponents 44-35 in the first inning and 121-76 in the first three, but in wins those numbers jump all the way to 37-9 in the first and 85-24 in the opening third of the game.

**QUIETLY EXCELLENT**

Jerrud Sabourin had a stellar freshman year, picking up Freshman All-America honors from several publications after hitting .383 and leading all conference frosh with 53 RBI. The first baseman has followed up on that by showing strong in 2009, as he is among the league leaders with a .353 average and is third with 61 hits.

Sabourin was on fire early in the season, as his average got all the way up to a conference-leading .538 early in the Spring Trip. He started the season with hits in each of the first 13 games, but has fallen back to the stratosphere since then. Still, he has 12 doubles on the year and has recorded 21 multi-hit games so far this season. He matched his career high when he had a four-hit game against Le Moyne on March 8.

The San Diego native began the year hitting fifth, but has hit second in the order since early March. He has scored 28 runs since moving into the two-hole. Eleven of his 12 doubles and all three of his homers have come while hitting second for IU.

**WEB GEM**

Senior Chris Hervey and junior Michael Earley were chosen this season to represent IU as bloggers for national websites. Hervey is part of the blogging crew at *Ping!Baseball*, as the site has selected players and coaches from across the nation to give an insider's look at college baseball. Earley is spinning his tales on *College Baseball Insider*.

**SWEEP EMOTION**

By taking all three games from Iowa, Indiana earned its first series sweep of 2009. It marked the second time in a span of four Big Ten series (at Michigan State, 5/15-5/17, 2008) that Indiana has earned a road sweep. That sweep was IU's first since a 1999 sweep of Northwestern, meaning that the Hoosiers swept two series out of four after going 71 series without a sweep in the Big Ten.

Interestingly enough, each of the three aforementioned sweeps came on the road. The Hoosiers have not swept a home weekend series since 1998, when IU took all four games from Northwestern at Sembower Field (4/17-4/19).

**ROGER THAT**

Junior Tyler Rogers was a solid performer in Indiana's lineup last season and has continued his good work in the batter's box in 2009. Rogers is fifth on the Hoosiers with his .338 average and has walked 17 times for a .419 on-base percentage.

He has also scored 34 runs on the year to find himself second on the team. Despite a somewhat small stature at the plate, Rogers has established himself as a power threat to all fields, and his 14 doubles on the year are best on the squad. Last Wednesday, he had his first career multi-homer game, going deep twice against Indiana State.

Rogers has been significantly better defensively, as he has made just one error in conference play on 77 chances. He has also taken part in eight of IU's 10 groundball double plays in conference action. He has upped his fielding percentage to a season-high .946 with the strong stretch.

**GONZO PERFORMANCE**

Freshman infielder Vince Gonzalez started his Hoosier career 0-for-10, but once he got his first career hit, they came in bunches. The Mission Viejo, Calif., native had multi-hit games in three of Indiana's last four games on the Spring Trip. He went 7-for-15 on the trip to lead the team with a .467 average.

With the injuries to Cody Webber and Ethan Wilson, Gonzalez has become a key player for Indiana both defensively at third base and in the IU lineup. He has a .289 average and nine RBI at the plate and has made just two errors at third – none since he tallied his first hit on March 18.

**GET IT DUNNING**

Junior college transfer Jake Dunning came to the Hoosiers pegged as the team's starting shortstop and showed his value in that position in last Saturday's doubleheader against Penn State.

In the first of the two games, Dunning hit his second and third home runs in an IU uniform, posting a three-hit game for the third time this season. In game two, it was the glove that showed off, as he made a pair of scintillating plays deep in the hole with his backhand and in both cases gunned down the runner at first. He also started two double plays on the day.

Dunning is third on the Hoosiers with 27 RBI, partly due to a .354 average with runners on base and a .353 mark with runners in scoring position.

**THIRD ACE**

Matt Bashore and Eric Arnett came into the preseason as IU's top two starters, but with the emergence of Friday starter Blake Monar, those two have been dropped down in the rotation.

Monar, a High School All-American and a 26th-round selection of the New York Yankees, has been incredibly strong. His first start was a solid debut against USF in the Big Ten/BIG EAST Challenge, and his second – against Le Moyne – was even more impressive, Monar scattered four hits, striking out six, in seven innings against the Dolphins.

Monar struggled in his conference debut, but he upped his game on Friday against Illinois, picking up his third win of the season with seven strong innings. He allowed just four hits over his final four innings of work and struck out a career-high seven.

He followed that up by increasing his career highs in both innings and strikeouts at Iowa. The freshman punched out nine Hawkeyes in his first career complete game, allowing just two runs on 10 hits and two walks. The southpaw bore down in tight situations, forcing Iowa to strand 10 baserunners in the contest. In his last outing at Michigan, poor defense and tough luck victimized him, as he allowed just five hits (two infield singles and a looping popup included) in six innings and only one of the six runs against him was earned.

**EVAN ALMIGHTY**

Junior Evan Crawford has put together another excellent season in Bloomington, and has established himself as one of the best stolen base threats in the conference. He is 21-for-25 on steals, with his only four times being caught coming on two pitchouts, a failed suicide squeeze and a caught stealing at home plate against Michigan. Crawford had a big day at the dish last Saturday, going 3-for-5 with a career-best five RBI and two steals in the first game against PSU. Over the last 20 games, he has posted a .377 average and swiped 15 bags.

**BACK IN BUSINESS**

It certainly has been an eventful 2008-09 for outfielder Kipp Schutz. After a solid fall season, he went with his teammates to a three-point contest against the Indiana basketball team. His performance earned him a tryout the next day and he joined the team immediately. He went on to play in six regular-season games for the Hoosiers on the court, and was the first man off the bench in IU's contest against nationally-ranked Wake Forest.

When January rolled around, Schutz was sidelined for nearly three weeks due to illness. Now back in the starting lineup, Schutz hasn't missed a beat, hitting .348 so far on the year. The redshirt sophomore is tied for fourth on Indiana with his three longballs.

**HONORING A LEGEND**

Indiana Baseball will pay tribute to one of its legends this season, as IU Hall of Famer Ernie Andres will be honored on every player's cap during the 2009 season. IU caps will feature the emblem "EA 5" on the back to honor the legend who passed away in September at the age of 90.

Andres was a recipient of the Balfour Award twice in his time at Indiana. He was an All-Big Ten and All-America selection in basketball in both 1938 and 1939 and is the lone Hoosier to ever crack the professional ranks in two sports. He was a member of the 1983 Hall of Fame class, the second group so honored by IU Athletics.

As a coach, Andres led the IU baseball program from 1948-73 where he accumulated 402 career victories. He led the team to the Big Ten regular season title in 1949. As an assistant coach to Branch McCracken, Andres helped IU to the 1953 NCAA Championship and four Big Ten titles on the basketball court.

Tracy Smith is in his fourth season as Indiana baseball's head coach. In his three years at the helm of the Hoosiers, IU is 92-122. In 11 years as a head coach, Smith has a career record of 409-340-1 (.546).

The 2008 season was a significant upward turn for the Hoosiers, as Indiana made its first Big Ten Tournament appearance since 2004 by rallying for a sixth-place finish in the regular season. IU then eliminated Ohio State, Illinois and Penn State at the conference tournament before falling in the semifinals to Purdue.

The Hoosiers went 11-4 over their final 15 conference games, including a series split with first-place Michigan and three wins over third-place Purdue. IU was the only Big Ten team to defeat the Wolverines more than once during the 2008 season and the only conference foe to knock off the Boilers three times.

Indiana's surge was capped off by a four-game sweep at Michigan State to eliminate the Spartans and Northwestern from the playoff hunt. It marked IU's first sweep of a Big Ten series since a four-game set against the Wildcats in 1999. The Hoosiers finished 8-8 on the road in conference action, a 6 1/2 game improvement over the 2007 squad.

Indiana had a stellar season individually in 2008 as well. Josh Phegley became one of the most lauded players in school history, as he was a unanimous First Team All-Big Ten selection and garnered second team All-America honors. Phegley finished second in the country with his .438 average, 19th with his 98 hits and 15th with his 80 RBI.

Phegley was one of three Hoosiers to earn first team All-Big Ten honors during the 2008 campaign. Sophomore hurler Matt Bashore struck out 86 batters and had a 7-3 record to go along with his 3.59 ERA. Andrew Means earned his second straight All-Big Ten mention, being anointed to the first team with a .357 average and 33 stolen bases. Additionally, first baseman Jerrud Sabourin earned Freshman All-America honors after hitting .383 with five homers and 53 RBI.

Following the season, juniors Means and Tyler Tufts were selected in the MLB First-Year Player Draft, with Means going in the 11th round to the Reds and Tufts in the 32nd to the Rangers. They became the 22nd and 23rd players to be drafted under Smith over the last eight seasons. Nine of those players were drafted in the top 10 rounds, including one second-round pick, two third-round picks, three fifth-round selections, and one each in the sixth, eighth and ninth rounds.

Smith has not shied away from recruiting top talent to Bloomington, as six players that have signed on to join the Hoosiers in his tenure have been drafted by the majors out of high school. Four current Hoosiers - Kipp Schutz (26th round, Baltimore), Kyle Leiendecker (25th, Cleveland), Blake Monar (26th, New York Yankees) and Alex Dickerson (48th, Washington) - were drafted by MLB teams out of high school before electing to come to Bloomington.

In 2007, Smith led one of the youngest teams in the country, with 19 freshmen and six sophomores, to a 19-win season. The Hoosiers scored a 7-9 record at home in Big Ten play, including series splits with two of the conference's top three teams, Penn State and Minnesota. IU finished the year by taking back-to-back contests from the Golden Gophers, who earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Smith posted a 22-34 record in his first season in Bloomington. After a slow start, Indiana came on strong toward the end of the season in 2006. IU won 11 of its final 18 non-conference games and garnered its best conference record in three seasons.

Smith has not shied away from facing top competition as a head coach. In the 2007 and 2008 seasons, the Hoosiers scheduled 28 games against 10 NCAA Tournament teams. During non-league play in 2004 and 2005, Smith's final two years at Miami, the RedHawks played a total of eight NCAA Tournament teams, including taking two of three games from nationally ranked Alabama in Tuscaloosa, Ala., in 2005.

## HEAD COACH TRACY SMITH

Smith was no stranger to Bloomington as he spent two seasons (1995-96) as pitching coach at IU. In Smith's final season, the Hoosiers boasted the lowest ERA in the Big Ten, won the Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the 1996 NCAA Midwest Regional, where they picked up their first-ever win in an NCAA Tournament game. All four of Indiana's primary starters saw significant drops in their ERA from 1995 to 1996, and three of the four saw their ERAs drop more than two runs. Three of Smith's pitchers were chosen in the Major League Draft in 1996.

Prior to returning to Bloomington, Smith completely changed the fortunes of Miami University after inheriting a 12-40 ballclub. The RedHawks reached the Mid-American Conference (MAC) Tournament nine times, including six championship game appearances and the 2000 and 2005 titles.

Smith amassed a 317-220-1 (.590) record with Miami and a MAC regular-season mark of 152-95 (.615). He led the RedHawks to eight straight 30-win seasons, marking only the second time the program had accomplished that feat, and he finished his career in Oxford ranked third on the school's all-time wins list.

Smith led the RedHawks to a 45-18 (.714) mark in 2005, his second 40-win season (40 wins in 2000), and matched the school record for victories in a season. Miami's .714 mark was the 12th-best winning percentage in the nation. The RedHawks captured the MAC regular season and tournament championships

and advanced to the NCAA Tournament, their second trip to the postseason under Smith's tutelage, where it set an NCAA Regional record with 35 runs in a 35-8 victory over Quinnipiac.

In 2005, the RedHawks ranked among the nation's top 20 in ERA (16th, 3.33), triples per game (19th, 0.38) and stolen bases per game (16th, 2.08). In addition, two-sport athlete and current Carolina Panther Ryne Robinson ranked among the top 20 in the nation in triples and stolen bases. Miami finished the season with a 16-6 mark on the road, the fifth-best record away from home in the NCAA.

Smith also played an instrumental part in Miami's facility fundraising effort. In 2002, the RedHawks opened a new chapter in their tradition-rich history with the debut of Stanley G. McKie Field at Joseph P. Hayden Jr. Park. McKie Field boasts a fully operational press box, a 12-seat luxury suite, two heated dugouts with bathrooms, the Smokey Alston luxury room, two separate bullpens from the field, year-round lights and an indoor hitting facility in left-field foul territory.

After capturing the program's first outright regular-season title in 22 years, Miami notched a program-record eight players on the 2005 all-conference teams, breaking the record six RedHawks that were honored in 2003. Smith added 2005 MAC Coach of the Year honors to his impressive resume. During Smith's era, Miami players picked up 16 All-MAC first team honors and five All-America nods. In addition, 19 student-athletes secured Academic All-MAC

honors, including 2000 & 2001 Verizon Academic All-Americans Tom Yost and Luke Reinhart.

The 2000 Ohio College Coach of the Year, Smith directed that season's squad to its first MAC Tournament Championship since 1983. The RedHawks also went on to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1983, playing in the Arizona State Regional, where they notched a victory over Creighton.

A four-year letterwinner from 1985 through 1988, Smith was a shortstop, third baseman and pitcher for the RedHawks. In 1988, Smith captained the team to a 37-22 mark, the sixth-highest single-season win total in Miami baseball history.

After graduation, Smith spent three seasons as a minor league pitcher and infielder in the Chicago Cubs' organization from 1988-1990.

Smith began his coaching career in 1990 as head coach at the Miami University-Middletown campus. In the fall of 1992, Smith participated in the Major League Scouting Bureau's Professional Scout School as a representative of the Chicago Cubs.

Smith, a native of Kentland, Ind., earned his bachelor's degree in education from Miami in 1989 and completed a master's degree in sport organization from Miami in 1992.

Tracy and his wife, Jaime, reside in Bloomington with their three sons, Casey, Ty and Jack.
