KELVIN SAMPSON

SECOND YEAR AT INDIANA

(21-11 RECORD AT IU)

25TH YEAR AS A HEAD COACH

(476-268 OVERALL)

Two-time National Coach of the Year Kelvin Sampson was named the 26th head coach in Indiana University history on March 29, 2006, and since that day he has worked tirelessly to reposition the Hoosiers among college basketball's elite programs. If the first year is any indication of how the merger of one of the NCAA's most tradition-rich basketball programs with a coach who has notched 16 20-plus win seasons, then Hoosier fans should be excited about things to come.

What Indiana fans respect most about Sampson is his energy, intensity, and his commitment to building a program an entire state can call its own. Entering his 25th season as a head coach, Sampson is 476-268 (.640). In his first year with the Cream and Crimson, Sampson's squad finished 21-11 and tied a school record by going 15-0 at Assembly Hall. The Hoosiers earned their 34th NCAA Tournament bid, advanced to the second round of the West Regional after defeating Gonzaga, 70-57, in the first round, and were ranked as high as 19th in the country during the regular season.

"I liked the way we developed individually and as a team," Sampson said. "From our first day of practice until the end, I just saw constant improvement."

As a team, the Hoosiers led the Big Ten in three-point field goal percentage (38.1) and three-point defense (31.0). Individually, junior D.J. White earned second-team All-Big Ten honors and senior Roderick Wilmont was a third-team All-League pick. In addition, Sampson's first IU recruiting class was consistently ranked among the nation's best by several noted experts.

"I came to Indiana for one reason," Sampson said. "I think we can win championships."

THE BEST IN THE BIG XII

Sampson came to IU after a 12-year run at Oklahoma which saw him post a 279-109 record overall and a 128-60 mark combined in the Big 8 and Big XII. His 111 regular season Big XII victories when he left OU were the most in league history at the time. He was 111-49 (.694) in conference play since the league formed in 1996-97 and his 128 triumphs combined in regular season and league tournament play also were conference standards. In addition, he was 239-87 during that 10-year span which also was

the most wins by a single coach overall in that conference over that period.

With a 20-9 record in 2005-06, Sampson coached OU to its ninth consecutive 20-win season. Sampson's club was productive on the court and in the classroom. The squad posted a 3.14 grade point average (GPA) for the 2005 fall semester, setting a single-semester record for the 12-year Sampson era. Eight of the 12 team members recorded a GPA of 3.0 or higher. Under Sampson's leadership, Oklahoma enjoyed one of the most successful three-year runs in school history from 2000-03. The Sooners were 84-19 (.816), won three-straight Big 12 Tournament titles and advanced to the 2002 NCAA Final Four (before losing to Indiana in the national semifinals) and the 2003 NCAA Elite Eight.

SAMPSON IN THE PAC-10

Sampson left quite a mark in his seven-year stint at Washington State. One of only four men to win 20 or more games in a single season in Washington State history, Sampson directed the 22-11 Cougars to the 1992 National Invitation Tournament (NIT), and earned Pac-10 Coach of the Year honors in the process. Sampson concluded his stay in Pullman by leading Washington State to a 20-11 mark and the 1994 NCAA Tournament, the Cougars' first NCAA Tournament appearance in 11 years. Sampson served as an assistant coach at WSU from 1985-87.

AT MONTANA TECH

He began his head coaching career at the helm of the Montana Tech program from 1981-85. After spending the 1981-82 campaign as the interim head coach, Sampson led the Orediggers to a 73-45 mark in his final four years. Montana Tech had won just 17 games in the three years combined prior to Sampson's arrival. He closed his Montana Tech tenure with three-straight Frontier League titles.

USA BASKETBALL INVOLVEMENT

Sampson also boasts an extensive background with USA Basketball. He was the head coach of the 2004 USA Basketball World Championship for Young Men qualifying team that posted a 5-0 record and earned a gold medal in Halifax, Nova Scotia. That 2004 squad featured former Hoosier standout Bracey Wright and captured the United States' first gold medal in the event since 1996. Sampson, San Antonio Spurs coach Gregg

Popovich and former Golden State Warriors coach Mike Montgomery were assistant coaches to George Karl on the 2002 USA Men's World Championship team in Indianapolis. That squad included current NBA stars Paul Pierce, Michael Finley, Elton Brand and Baron Davis.

In the summer of 1995, Sampson served as head coach of the USA Men's Junior World Championship team that played in Larissa and Athens, Greece. That team featured current NBA players Vince Carter and Stephon Marbury. Sampson was an assistant coach to George Raveling on the 1994 USA Goodwill Games team that competed in St. Petersburg, Russia. Damon Stoudemire, Shawn Respert, Finley and Tim Duncan led that club to the bronze medal. Sampson began his USA Basketball tenure as the head coach of the 1993 Olympic Festival West team in San Antonio, Texas. Jerod Haase, Charles O'Bannon and Jerald Honeycutt helped that club to the silver medal.

WORKING FOR THOSE WHO SERVE OUR COUNTRY

One of the first things you notice on the front page of the Web site for Camouflage Kids is the quote at the top of the page. It comes for Indiana men's basketball coach Kelvin Sampson and reads, "There's not a thing I wouldn't do for our Army. They're my heroes."

Sampson is a member of the Board of Directors of the organization founded by New York Knicks Director of Scouting Jeff Nix and retired businessman and U.S. Army veteran Ray Stults. The group raises money to purchase tickets for families of servicemen and servicewomen who are abroad. This year, the mission grows to include the children of the Indiana National Guard and Indiana Marine Corps who will attend Hoosier games this season.

In 2005 and 2006, Sampson was among the nation's top college coaches participating in "Operation Hardwood - Hoops with the Troops," an eight-team U.S. Army troops' basketball tournament in Kuwait. In August 2005, Sampson joined Michigan State's Tom Izzo, Alabama's Mark Gottfried, South Carolina's Dave Odom, Charlotte's Bobby Lutz, College of Charleston coach Bobby Cremins, former St. John's coach Mike Jarvis and ESPN analyst Jay Bilas for the debut event. A year later, Sampson, returned to Kuwait and directed his team to the tournament title, but the reward went well beyond the trophy.

"I met 12-15 soldiers from the state of Indiana. When you greet them, you can just feel that kinship. They just want to stop and talk to you and ask questions about the team and how things are going. They were telling me the Indy 500 was that particular weekend, and were asking if I had ever been to the race. Even though they are racing fans, you can tell they are passionate about IU Basketball, which was great to see.

"There is such a sense of gratification when you go to bed at night, and a sense of excitement when you wake up in the morning. Last year's experience was amazing, but this one tops it. You just feel so good about what you are doing, and what you have been able to give back to these young men and women."

IN THE COMMUNITY

Sampson-coached basketball teams are known for their competitiveness, discipline and unselfishness on the court as well as their strong presence in the local community. Not only do IU coaches and players make weekly appearances at local elementary schools to emphasize the value of reading and education, but they also spend an hour each Friday serving lunch at the Shalom Community Center, a daytime resource center for those experiencing poverty and homelessness.

Sampson said that the outreach activities are just one component of the Hoosiers' broad-based program.

"Indiana fans have such a passion for Hoosier basketball, which is why it is so important that we touch every base of the community," Sampson said. "It warms our players' and coaches' hearts to see the reception that they get from the elementary school students or how happy the visitors at the Shalom Center are to see us at lunch."

PERSONAL

Sampson was born on Oct. 5, 1955, in Laurinburg, N.C. He was raised in Pembroke, N.C., and was an all-league three-sport star (football, basketball and baseball) at Pembroke High School. He captained his high school basketball team for two years, coached by his father, John W. "Ned" Sampson. Sampson enrolled at Pembroke State University (now UNC Pembroke) where he earned four letters in basketball and three in baseball. He was a Dean's List student and received the Gregory Lowe Memorial Award as the school's outstanding physical education major as a senior.

Sampson received bachelor's degrees in health and physical education and political science in 1978 and his master's degree in coaching and administration from Michigan State in 1980. During his stay in East Lansing, he served as a graduate assistant to Jud Heathcote. Sampson, who was inducted into the Montana Tech Hall of Fame in 1996 and the Pembroke State Hall of Fame in 1998, is married to the former Karen Lowery. They have one daughter, Lauren, and one son, Kellen. Lauren is in pharmaceutical sales for AstraZeneca in Bloomington, while Kellen, who recently graduated from Oklahoma after playing four years of basketball for the Sooners, is a graduate manager for the Hoosiers.

RAY McCALLUM

ASSISTANT COACH

Ray McCallum returned to his home roots in the state of Indiana and begins his second year as an assistant coach on the Hoosiers' staff. The Ball State graduate has more than 20 years of coaching experience, including two stints as a head coach at the Division I level. Additionally, McCallum is in his fourth year alongside Kelvin Sampson, after spending two years as an assistant coach at Oklahoma.

Alongside Sampson, McCallum has helped IU and OU to a combined 66-28 record and three NCAA Tournament appearances and has helped land top-10 recruiting classes at both schools. Prior to going to OU, McCallum was the head coach at Houston from 2000-04.

In 2001-02, he led the Cougars to an 18-15 mark and a berth in the NIT, Houston's first postseason tournament appearance since the 1992-93 season. Houston finished 9-7 in Conference USA's National Division that year, and advanced to the league's tournament semifinal for the first time.

During his stay in UH, McCallum played an integral role in the development of Andre Owens, who is currently with the Indiana Pacers. Overall, he has coached eight NBA players during their collegiate career.

McCallum made his head coaching debut at Ball State, where the Cardinals posted a 126-76 record from 1993-00. McCallum directed Ball State to two NCAA Tournament appearances and an NIT berth and became the first coach in Ball State history to post seven consecutive winning seasons.

In 1999-2000, McCallum directed the Cardinals to a 22-9 record and the Mid-American Conference's (MAC) Western Division championship. Ball State captured the MAC Tournament title that year to earn an automatic NCAA Tournament bid. When he left BSU, his .624 winning percentage rated as fourth-best in the 53-year history of the MAC.

During his head coaching career at Ball State, McCallum re-

cruited and coached Bonzi Wells, who has had a long NBA career. McCallum briefly joined the coaching staff at Michigan in 1993 before accepting the Ball State head coaching job.

McCallum started his full-time coaching career as an assistant at Wisconsin in 1984. The Badgers had won only 63 games the six seasons before McCallum joined the program. He helped reverse the trend when the Badgers were selected to play in the 1989 NIT – Wisconsin's first postseason tournament showing since the 1947 NCAA Tournament.

One of the most illustrious players in Ball State history, McCallum graduated as the MAC's all-time scoring leader and became the first BSU athlete to have his jersey retired in any sport. McCallum led his team in scoring all four years.

In 1979-80, he garnered MAC Freshman of the Year recognition and earned second-team all-conference honors. He picked up All-MAC First Team and MAC All-Tournament Team accolades in each of the 1980-81, 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons, and was tabbed the 1981 MAC Tournament MVP and the 1982-83 MAC Player of the Year.

McCallum also earned the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award as the nation's most outstanding collegiate senior 6-foot or under in 1983. Later that year, he was selected by the Indiana Pacers in the NBA Draft.

Born in West Memphis, Ark., and raised in Muncie, Ind., McCallum won Indiana state titles at Muncie Central High School in 1978 and '79 before earning his Ball State degree in industrial technology, and his wife, Wendy, are the parents of a daughter, Brittany, and a son, Ray Michael.

JEFF MEYER

ASSISTANT COACH

Jeff Meyer is in his second season at Indiana University and offers nearly 30 years of coaching experience to the Hoosier program.

The Reynolds, Ind., native works with the Hoosier guards and is known as an outstanding recruiter and game strategist. His ties in Indiana were essential in helping IU register a top-10 recruiting class last year.

Meyer has had experience on every level and has developed expertise in every aspect of what it takes to run a top-flight program. From augmenting relationships in recruiting to speaking with the media, Meyer has the knowledge and experience to get the job done.

Prior to his arrival at Indiana, Meyer spent two seasons at the University of Missouri under former head coach Quin Snyder. He has been a winner at every level throughout his career, as Meyer's squads have registered a 505-331 (.609) overall record and have qualified for postseason play 11 times, including seven NCAA Tournament (one Final Four and one Sweet 16) and four National Invitation Tournament appearances.

The 1976 graduate of Taylor University went to Mizzou following three seasons at Butler University in Indianapolis. During Meyer's time at Butler, the Bulldogs were Horizon League Champions in both 2002 and 2003, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Sweet 16 in 2003. Butler registered a 69-26 mark during his three seasons on the staff and 12 of the program's 13 student-athletes who exhausted the eligibility at BU went on to earn their degrees.

Meyer spearheaded the recruiting efforts at BU and played a vital role in the Bulldog's player-skill development program, game preparation and strategy.

Prior to his time at Butler, Meyer helped the Winthrop Eagles win three straight Big South Conference championships and make three consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament from 1999-2001 as associate head coach. He also helped foster an outstanding commitment to academics at Winthrop, as eight of nine student-athletes who matriculated through the program earned their degree.

Meyer also brings experience as a head coach to the table. In 16 years at Liberty University, he registered a 259-206 mark and led the Flames to the 1994 Big South Conference Tournament championship and a bid to the NCAA Tournament. He guided Liberty to a 23-9 record and a first-place tie for the Big South regular season championship in 1996-97 and became instrumental in helping Liberty make the transition from NAIA to NCAA Division I.

In addition to his outstanding efforts as a head coach on the floor, Meyer's program also produced successful individuals in the classroom where it registered a 90-percent graduation rate (45 of 50 student-athletes) from 1981 to 1997. Meyer is Liberty's all-time winningest coach.

Meyer began his career as an assistant to Lee Rose at Purdue University from 1978-80, where he earned his master's degree. During his time in West Lafayette, Ind., he helped the Boilermakers reach the NCAA Final Four in 1980 following a Big Ten regular-season co-championship and NIT final appearance in 1979. Meyer then joined Rose at the University of South Florida during the 1980-81 season, helping the Bulls to an appearance in the NIT.

Meyer and his wife Karen are the parents of two daughters, Holli Torrie and Sarah, and a son, Josh.

DAN DAKICH

ASSISTANT COACH

Long-time Hoosier Dan Dakich returns to campus to serve as an assistant coach. He rejoined the Hoosiers in June 2007 as Director of Basketball Operations.

The Indiana native began a 16-year association with the IU program in the fall of 1981 after graduating from Andean High School in Merrillville.

"My family and I are thrilled to be back at Indiana University," Dakich said. "It has been an extremely important place in our lives. I thank Coach Sampson for giving me this tremendous opportunity and I look forward to joining his staff in our quest for National and Big Ten Championships."

He played for the Hoosiers and Coach Bob Knight from 1982-85 and was a team captain during his junior and senior seasons as the Hoosiers finished with an 84-39 record during his career. As a player, he helped Indiana win one Big Ten title, earn three NCAA Tournament berths and finish as the NIT runner-up his senior season. As a junior, he was named All-Tournament at the Indiana Classic and as a senior he earned similar accolades at the Hoosier Classic. He is best remembered for his excellent defensive effort against Michael Jordan in Indiana's upset of North Carolina in the 1984 NCAA East Regional.

Dakich also spent 12 seasons on the IU coaching staff under Coach Knight from 1985-97. Dakich helped the Indiana program win 73.7 percent (283-101) of its games over the 12 years he served as an assistant coach while the Hoosiers were winning over 70 percent of their Big Ten contests. He was a graduate assistant from 1985-87 before being named full-time prior to the 1987-88 campaign.

The Hoosiers won a national title in 1987 and earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament in each of his 12 seasons on the staff. IU also captured four Big Ten titles while finishing third or better in nine of his 12 years.

He also coached six All-Americans and three national Player of the Year candidates, including 1993 Player of the Year Calbert Cheaney, worked with three Big Ten MVPs, and academically, graduated every four-year player to go through the program (Dakich was the academic monitor on the IU basketball staff his last seven years).

He also coached 10 players at IU who have played in the NBA.

Dakich returns to Bloomington after spending the last 10 years as the men's basketball coach at Bowling Green. At BGSU, he tied for third all-time in victories among Falcon coaches with 156 and also was just one of three coaches in school history to post four 18-plus win seasons or more in men's basketball. He saw 22 of 25 seniors complete their degree requirements and had 12 former players sign professional contracts, including current Indiana Pacers guard Keith McLeod. In addition, he had two players earn MAC Player of the Year and three lead the league in scoring during his tenure.

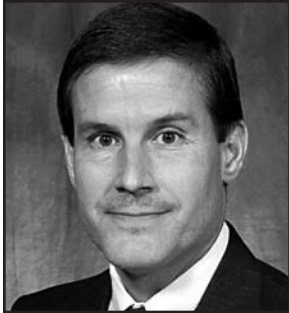
His 2000 squad won the regular season MAC title and played in the NIT and in 2002 his team advanced to the MAC Tournament title game and also played in the NIT. Dakich also was heavily involved in community activities. He ran the Junior Falcons basketball program, a league for children ages 7 thru 14. He also was involved with the United Way, Cherry Street Mission and Make-A-Wish program.

Dakich, who was one of 16 former prep players chosen for the 2006 Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame High School Silver Anniversary team, is a 1985 graduate of IU with a degree in telecommunications. He and his wife, Jackie, have a son, Andrew (13), and a daughter, Laura (10).

TIM GARL

ATHLETIC TRAINER

Tim Garl is in his 27th year as Indiana's men's basketball trainer.

Garl is a regular speaker at both national and international sports medicine programs, including numerous presentations in Asia, South America, Europe and most recently at the European Basketball Championships in Spain.

Garl has served on the United States Olympic Committee's Sports Medicine Committee since 1988. He is the longest serving member of this group. He was recently reappointed and will serve through the Beijing Olympics. As a result of the appointment, he travels to sporting events where the USOC sponsors teams and reviews and advises in various areas of Sports Medicine quality of care issues.

He has recently traveled to events in Palma De Mallorca, Spain, Beijing, Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic and Izmir, Turkey. Garl was on the road again this summer attending the Pan American Games in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil and the World University Games in Bangkok, Thailand.

He has also published several articles about sports medicine issues and basketball injuries. He, along with team physician Larry Rink, M.D., and Bloomington physician Tom Hrisomalos, M.D., authored the U.S. Olympic Committee's position paper on Blood Born Pathogens and Sports Participation. This was the first widely accepted position paper dealing with the subject. A native of Elkhart, Ind., he served as a student athletic trainer (1975-78) for legendary football coach Paul "Bear" Bryant while completing an undergraduate degree at Alabama. In 1978, Garl was hired at Mississippi, where he served as assistant athletic trainer for all of the Rebels' men's sports. He also completed a master's degree in administration at Ole Miss and completed an MPA degree in health systems management at Indiana in 1989.

Garl has worked with numerous United States basketball teams in international competition, including the 1984 gold medal men's Olympic team and the 1986 FIBA World Championship team.

During the summer of 1996, Garl was appointed chairman of the USOC's Olympic Sports Medicine Society, the alumni group of the USOC Medical Division, becoming the first non-physician to lead that organization. He also serves as a consultant to the U.S. Antidoping Agency.

Certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association and licensed by the state of Indiana,

Garl was also recently selected to the board of directors for the College Athletic Trainers Society. Garl and his wife, Jennifer, have three daughters (Emily, Meg and Haley).
