SETTING THE SCENE

Closing out the road portion of its schedule, the Indiana football team (4-6, 1-5 Big Ten) heads to University Park, Pa., to battle No. 19/17/18 Penn State (8-2, 4-2 Big Ten). The Hoosiers and Nittany Lions will meet at Beaver Stadium (107,282) on Saturday, Nov. 14. Kickoff is set for noon EST and the game will be televised on the Big Ten Network.

Last weekend, IU dropped its third conference game by three points or less, as No. 24/22/21 Wisconsin pulled out a 31-28 victory in Bloomington. PSU fell for just the second time this season to No. 15/12/16 Ohio State, 24-7, in Happy Valley.

THE PENN STATE SERIES

Indiana has never defeated Penn State. The Nittany Lions have won all 12 meetings, including six in Happy Valley, five in Bloomington and one at the RCA Dome in Indianapolis. Five of the 12 matchups and two of the last three contests have been decided by seven points or less. Prior to last year's 34-7 PSU victory at Beaver Stadium, the Hoosiers dropped a 36-31 decision to the Nittany Lions at Memorial Stadium on Oct. 20, 2007.

PENN STATE TIE

Hoosier true freshman defensive end **Javon Cornley** is quite familiar with Penn State University. His brother, Jamelle, played forward at PSU from 2006-09. Jamelle is the program's fourth all-time scorer (1,579) and rebounder (755).

Javon, who is expected to redshirt this season, has earned scout team player of the week honors following the Western Michigan and Akron victories.

PENNSYLVANIA CONNECTION

Colin Rodkey is the lone player on the Hoosier roster from the state of Pennsylvania. The true freshman offensive lineman attended Gateway High School and hails from Monroeville. Rodkey is expected to redshirt this season, but he has earned four scout team player of the week honors.

SCOUTING PENN STATE

Penn State enters Saturday at 8-2 overall and 4-2 in the Big Ten, which is good for a share of third place with Wisconsin. The Nittany Lions are ranked 19th in the AP Poll, 17th in the Coaches' Poll and 18th in the BCS Standings.

PSU sits in the top 15 nationally in several major defensive statistical categories. The Nittany Lions are third in scoring (10.8), ninth in pass defense (166.1), 14th in rush defense (98.5) and eighth in total defense (264.6). Their 3.20 sacks per game rank eighth and 8.70 tackles for loss each time out are second.

Penn State's linebackers rank 1-2-3 on the team in tackles. Senior Josh Hull ranks fourth in the conference with 95 tackles in addition to his two sacks, 8.5 TFLs and two interceptions. Senior Sean Lee has 63 stops, two sacks and 9.5 tackles for loss, while junior Navorro Bowman owns 62 tackles, one sack, 10 TFLs, one pick and two fumble recoveries.

Senior tackle Jared Odrick leads the team with six sacks and shares second with 10 tackles for loss, and sophomore end Jack Crawford has 5.5 sacks and a team-best 13.5 TFLs.

Penn State is scoring 28.3 points, rushing for 171.4 yards, passing for 234.9 yards and accumulating 406.3 total yards per game. Junior Evan Royster is second in the Big Ten with 89.5 rushing yards each time out. Royster has rushed for 895 yards with a 5.7 average and five scores.

Daryll Clark averages 228.3 yards per game, has completed 61.2 percent of his passes and has thrown 18 touchdowns and eight interceptions. The senior also has scored six times on the ground and rushed for 168 yards. Clark's top target, sophomore Derek Moyer, has 39 catches for 648 yards and five TDs.

Senior punter Jeremy Boone is second in the Big Ten and 13th in the country averaging 44.1 yards per punt. He has placed 14 of his 39 punts inside the 20 and kicked 11 over 50 yards.

Joe Paterno is in his 44th season as head coach at Penn State. Paterno is the all-time winningest coach in NCAA Division I history and holds a 391-129-3 overall record.

GOING TO THE CHAPPELL

Junior **Ben Chappell** took over the reigns at quarterback in the spring and has not looked back. The school's all-time completion percentage leader (59.9) joined Kellen Lewis (four) and Steve Bradley (three) as the only QBs in school history to throw for 300 yards three times in their careers (all this season for Chappell) when he posted 323 yards vs. Wisconsin. Chappell completed 25-of-35 to go along with three scores, his fifth multi-TD game this season and in his career and his second three-score game.

The Bloomington South High School graduate is in IU's career top 10 in passing yards (3,392; 10th) and completions (294; 9th) and sits in the school's single season top 10 in passing yards (2,377; 5th), passing touchdowns (13; T-6th), completions (213; 3rd), attempts (338; 8th) and completion percentage (63.0; 1st). Chappell ranks second in the Big Ten with 237.7 passing yards per game, third in completion percentage (63.0) and fourth in total offense (235.1). He is 213-of-338 on the season and has 13 touchdown tosses and two rush scores.

He shared Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors after IU's win over Illinois and became the 10th Hoosier to reach the 3,350-yard passing mark in his career and the fifth to eclipse 2,350 yards in a single season vs. Wisconsin. Against the Fighting Illini, Chappell set career highs with 333 yards and three touchdowns and did not throw an interception. He also matched a then-career high with 38 attempts to go along with a 160.2 passing efficiency mark.

Chappell posted 326 yards, going 27-for-36 with one touchdown in the season opener against Eastern Kentucky. He became the 15th player in school history to pass for 300 yards and the first Hoosier to eclipse 300 yards since Lewis (354) did so against Ball State on Nov. 3, 2007. Chappell completed 18-of-28 for

185 yards with one rushing score and no turnovers vs. Western Michigan, threw a pair of TDs at Akron, threw for 270 yards in IU's near miss at Michigan and became the first QB to reach the 200-yard mark (210) to go along with two touchdowns vs. Ohio State. An accounting major with a 3.7 grade point average, Chappell carries those smarts onto the field. He has 15 touchdowns, four rushing scores, 12 interceptions, a 61.0 completion percentage and an average of 222.6 yards per game in 13 career starts.

LEADING BY EXAMPLE

Two of the most respected upperclassmen on the team delivered timely performances as the Hoosiers nearly rallied to upset No. 21 (BCS) Wisconsin last weekend. Junior wideout **Terrance Turner** pulled in his elusive first career touchdown in the fourth quarter and finished with career highs in receptions (six) and yards (68). Turner had two end zone reviews go against him at Iowa and last season vs. Michigan State, a 97-yard TD grab was wiped out by a holding penalty in the end zone.

Fifth-year senior running back **Bryan Payton** filled in more than admirably for **Darius Willis**, who left the game with an injury in the third quarter. Payton rushed seven times for 43 yards on the team's two fourth-quarter touchdown drives and finished the contest with 48 yards on eight carries.

Payton, a three-time game captain and special teams contributor, has rushed for 118 yards and one score with a 4.2 average this season. Turner, a two-time game captain and the elder statesman of a talented wideout group, has 35 catches for 335 yards this season, both of which rank third on the team.

THE BIG RIG

Adam Replogle has made quite the impact as a true freshman. He is the only true freshman to play in 2009 and he has seen action in all 10 games with nine straight starts at defensive tackle. Replogle has 24 tackles, three sacks and four TFLs this year.

He has started those nine games with his brother, Tyler, who is the team's strong-side linebacker. They became the first brothers to start together at IU since Antwaan (QB) and Curtis (DB) Randle El started 14 games together during the 1998 and 1999 seasons.

Against Wisconsin he showed just how versatile he is, lining up as a lead blocker three times inside the UW 5-yard line in the fourth quarter. Replogle, who also played fullback at Centerville High School, paved the way as **Trea Burgess** powered into the end zone from two yards out on fourth-and-goal. The Hoosiers even sent Replogle out into the flat on third down, but the intended pass for him was incomplete.

GETTING OVER THE HUMP

Indiana will play its fifth ranked team of the season and its third straight when it travels to Penn State on Saturday. The Hoosiers are 0-4 in those games, but have put up a valiant effort. IU lost by three points in Ann Arbor against Michigan and at home last weekend vs. Wisconsin, and it held a 10-point fourth-quarter edge against the Hawkeyes in Iowa City before falling short.

In each of their three Big Ten road games against Michigan, Northwestern and Iowa, the Hoosiers have held leads at the end of the first half and at the end of the third quarter. It marks the first time that Indiana has held a halftime lead in three conference road games since 1994.

COMING INTO HIS OWN

Tandon Doss has worked his way into the conversation as one of the top wide receivers in the country. Doss has led the team in receptions in nine games and receiving yards eight times, and he paces the team with 843 yards, 65 receptions, four touchdowns, 84.3 yards per game, a 13.0 average per catch and 300 yards after the catch (35.6 percent of his yardage).

The sophomore is third in the Big Ten and 25th nationally in yards per game and is third in the league and tied for 22nd nationally in catches per game (6.50). His 843 yards share 15th in the country and are

the second most for an underclassman. Doss is third on IU's single-season receptions list and is seventh in the school's single-season yardage rankings.

Along with his three 100-yard games this season (four career), Doss has taken on two additional roles with an injury to kick and punt returner **Ray Fisher**. He owns 369 kick return yards, sits ninth in the conference with a 20.5 kick return average, has 92 rushing yards, 27 punt return yards and leads the conference with 133.1 all-purpose yards per contest. He has surpassed 100 all-purpose yards in six of the last seven games and seven times this season, including a season-best 208 against Wisconsin. The 6-3, Indianapolis product posted 92 receiving, 88 kick return and 27 punt return yards vs. the Badgers. Doss finished with six receptions, including TDs of 11 and 46 yards in the first half for his first career two-score game. He became the first Hoosier receiver with two touchdown grabs in a game since James Hardy had a pair at Northwestern on Oct. 10, 2007. The 46-yarder is his longest career touchdown.

If he did not catch everyone's attention following the Michigan game, the Ben Davis High School product surely should have gotten it after his effort vs. Ohio State. Doss caught six passes for 96 yards with one touchdown, ran the ball twice for 16 yards and returned a kickoff for 29 yards. On the team's first scoring drive, Doss accounted for 62 of the 80 yards, including 46 receiving and 16 rushing. He hauled in a one-handed grab to set up his 7-yard score, where he split three Buckeye defenders to reach the end zone.

Not to be outdone, he set a career-high with 130 yards on seven catches, including a 44-yard touchdown, in the team's victory over Illinois. The previous week, Doss set a career high with nine receptions and led the Hoosiers with 76 yards at Virginia. He also returned three kicks for 47 yards to finish with 121 all-purpose yards.

In addition to his second 100-yard receiving game of the season, Doss collected a career-high 193 all-purpose yards at Michigan. The sophomore wideout caught five balls for 104 yards and a career-long 56-yarder, ran the ball three times for 41 yards, including rushing the pitch on an option toss from **Mitchell Evans** 25 yards for his first ground score, and returned two kicks for 48 yards.

A SECOND NO. 1

Tandon Doss is not the only Hoosier wide receiver making a mark in the Big Ten. **Damarlo Belcher** is second on the team to Doss with 48 catches, 611 yards, three touchdowns, a 12.7 average and 61.1 yards per game. He has also joined Doss in the Big Ten's top 10 in receptions per game (4.80, seventh) and yards per game (10th), and he is just six catches shy of entering IU's single-season top 10.

Belcher has led the team in yards two of the last three games and has reached at least five catches and 60 yards in each of the last four contests. In those four ballgames, he has averaged 5.5 receptions, 80.8 yards (tops on the team), 14.7 yards per catch and has scored twice. Belcher posted 91 yards on six catches with one TD against Illinois, added five grabs for 60 yards at Northwestern, matched his career high for the third time this season with six receptions to go along with 89 yards and a score at Iowa and finished with five catches for 83 yards vs. Wisconsin.

The 6-5, Fort Wayne native kicked off the season with a career-high 97 yards and six grabs against Eastern Kentucky. Belcher has at least five receptions in seven of IU's 10 games and owns six 20-plus yard receptions, two of which have resulted in six points.

TWO OF THE BIG TEN'S BEST

Combined, the sophomore duo of **Tandon Doss** and **Damarlo Belcher** is producing 11.3 catches and 145.4 receiving yards per game. The last time two Hoosier wideouts collected 600-plus yards and 45-plus receptions in a season came back in 2002, when current New Orleans Saints standout Courtney Roby (1,039 and 59) and Glenn Johnson (837 and 53) accomplished the feat.

Belcher and Doss flashed moments of brilliance as true freshmen last season and after the 2009 opener, it became clear more was on the way. Doss matched a then-career high with eight receptions against Eastern Kentucky and set a then-career best with 125 receiving yards. Belcher matched his career best with six receptions and racked up a career-high 97 receiving yards.

With their 222 combined yards, the duo eclipsed its combined high from last season of 189, which set an Indiana true freshmen record, in the team's win over No. 22 (BCS) Northwestern.

Doss broke that career high with 130 yards on seven catches, including a 44-yard TD catch vs. Illinois. Belcher matched his career receptions mark and added 91 yards and a 29-yard score as the duo accounted for 221 receiving yards.

In 2008, Doss played in eight games and caught 14 passes for 186 yards, averaging 13.3 yards per reception, and added one touchdown. Doss hauled in eight passes for a team season-high 107 yards and a TD vs. Northwestern. He became the first true freshman since O.J. Conner in 1997 to go over 100 receiving yards, just the third true freshman (fourth time) in IU history to record a 100-yard receiving game (Ernie Jones, twice; Conner) and the fifth freshman (10th time) to reach the 100-yard mark (James Hardy, five times; Jones, twice; Levron Williams; Conner).

Belcher, a 6-5, Fort Wayne native, played in all 12 games and finished the 2008 season fourth on the team with 25 receptions, third with 337 yards, tied for second with two touchdowns, and third with 13.5 yards per catch and 28.1 yards per game. His 337 yards and 25 grabs rank third in IU history among true freshmen.

Their 523 combined yards in 2008 rank second and their 39 combined receptions rank third all-time by a true freshman duo in IU lore.

TRIO EARNS ACADEMIC HONORS

Junior quarterback **Ben Chappell**, senior long snapper **Brandon Bugg** and junior running back **Trea Burgess** earned a spot on the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District V team. Chappell is an accounting major with a 3.7 grade point average, Bugg holds a 3.60 GPA in the Kelley School of Business MBA program, and Burgess is a telecommunications major with a 3.47 grade point average.

Indiana was one of just four schools with three first team members in District V, joining Northwestern, Southern Illinois and Butler. To be eligible for the award, a player must be in at least his second year of athletic eligibility, be a first team or key performer and carry a cumulative 3.30 grade point average.

The trio will now be placed on the ballot for *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America consideration.

TAYLOR MADE

With starting nickelback **Chris Adkins** suffering an elbow injury leading into the Illinois game, fifth-year senior **Collin Taylor** replaced him as the team's third safety in the nickel package and earned starts against IU and at Northwestern. He also started at Iowa for the injured **Nick Polk** at free safety.

Taylor made his biggest impact in Iowa City as he collected the first two interceptions of his career, which he returned 39 yards, to go along with a critical forced fumble at the end of the first half that resulted in seven points and a 21-7 Hoosier lead. He also finished with a career-best seven tackles, six solo.

The next week against Wisconsin, Taylor had his hand in another opponent turnover. The Carmel, Ind., native recovered a muffed punt at the Badger 11-yard line to set up IU's first touchdown.

A former walk-on who earned a scholarship prior to the start of the 2009 season, Taylor moved from wide receiver to safety the final three weeks of the 2008 campaign. The Hoosiers played a nickel package the majority of his first two starts, and Taylor finished with five solo tackles as Illinois could muster just two TDs and five stops, three solo, at NU. He has 20 tackles overall, 16 solo, and has earned IU special teams player of the week honors nine times.

PICK OR TREAT

After matching a school record for fewest interceptions in a season with six in 2008, twice the Hoosiers have almost matched that mark in a single game this year. Indiana collected five interceptions at Iowa, the second-most in a single game in school history. IU picked off six passes at Minnesota on Nov. 10, 1945, and last had five picks against Kentucky on Sept. 20, 1969. Senior safety **Collin Taylor** recorded the first two interceptions of his career, and sophomore cornerback **Donnell Jones**, senior strong safety **Austin Thomas** and senior linebacker **Matt Mayberry** each corralled one INT in the contest.

Earlier in the season at Akron, the Indiana defense forced Matt Rodgers into four interceptions with Thomas picking off two and junior linebacker **Tyler Replogle** and sophomore defensive back **Andre LaGrone** collecting their first career INTs.

Redshirt freshman defensive tackle **Nicholas Sliger** and sophomore defensive back **Chris Adkins** picked off their first career passes at Michigan and vs. Ohio State, respectively, and the Hoosiers blew past last year's total with three second-half picks at Northwestern. Mayberry snagged his first career INT, Thomas added another, and senior safety **Nick Polk** corralled his first pick of the season.

IU ranks third in the Big Ten and shares seventh in the country with 14 interceptions. Interestingly enough, 13 of the 14 have come on the road.

NEED SOME TO'S, BABY!

IU has forced at least three turnovers in three of the last four games, highlighted by a six-turnover, five interception effort from the defense at Iowa. The six turnovers were the most by an Indiana opponent since Oregon committed seven on Sept. 11, 2004.

The streak began when the Hoosiers recovered three fumbles in their victory over Illinois en route to winning the turnover battle, 3-1. Indiana last recorded

three takeaways via fumble against Wisconsin on Nov. 8, 2008, when it forced five and recovered three. The Hoosiers collected three interceptions and did not commit one turnover at Northwestern.

In the three games, IU charted a plus-8 advantage in turnover margin. Overall, Indiana has forced 25 turnovers and committed 17 for a plus-8 edge in turnover margin, which is second in the league and 18th nationally. The Hoosiers share the conference lead with 11 fumble recoveries (tied for 14th nationally) and sit third in the Big Ten with 14 interceptions (shares seventh nationally).

IU has forced three or more turnovers five times this season, four TOs on two occasions and five miscues twice. Additionally, Indiana has forced a turnover in nine of its 10 games on the season.

TAKEAWAY THOMAS

Fifth-year senior safety **Austin Thomas** missed seven games due to injury last year (ankle and ACL), but he has not shown any lingering effects from the injuries in 2009, starting all 10 games at strong safety. He recorded his eighth double-digit tackle game in his career with 10, nine solo, vs. Illinois. Thomas also forced a fumble and added a tackle for loss. The following week at Northwestern, he posted nine tackles and snared the fourth pick of his career against the Wildcats, which he returned 38 yards.

The Woodstock, Ga., native continued his inspired play with his team-leading fourth interception of the season, the seventh of his career and his second in as many weeks at Iowa. Thomas shares third in the Big Ten and 33rd in the nation with his four INTs. He also ranks third on the team with 57 tackles, 39 solo.

Earlier this season at Akron, he garnered his second two-interception game of his career. Following a Hoosier fumble at the Zips 31, Thomas collected his first INT and raced 31 yards to the UA 18. Five plays later the Hoosiers scored to make it 24-14. He struck again with his second pick at the IU 35, and he ran it back to the Akron 19-yard line. Indiana scored a TD four plays later to put the game away.

Thomas had two interceptions against Northwestern a season ago, but tore his ACL following his second INT and missed the final four games of the year. He leads all active Hoosiers with 258 tackles and is second to **Will Patterson** (167) with 160 solos since the start of the 2006 season.

MAN IN THE MIDDLE

Senior **Matt Mayberry** has started 22 straight games at middle linebacker since the 2008 opener and paces the Hoosiers with 84 tackles and 51 solo stops in 2009. He has moved into sixth in the Big Ten in tackles after back-to-back 10-tackle efforts at Michigan and vs. Ohio State, eight stops at Virginia, a career-best 14-tackles and 12 solos in the win over Illinois, 13 stops at Northwestern and nine tackles at Iowa. Mayberry now has eight career double-digit tackle games, at least 10 stops in seven of the last nine conference contests and sits third in league games only with 10.0 tackles per game.

In addition to his game-high 13 stops at Northwestern, Mayberry made a brilliant diving interception - the first of his career - and added two tackles for loss. He corralled another diving pick the following weekend vs. the Hawkeyes and added one sack and one QB hurry. Over the last seven games, he has led the team in tackles five times and sits atop

the Hoosiers with 68 tackles, 41 solo, to go along with two sacks (tied for third), 6.5 tackles for loss (second), one fumble recovery and two INTs (shares first). Overall, Mayberry is second on the club with nine tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks, shares second with his two interceptions, owns the one fumble recovery and has paced the team in tackles six times.

In his first year as a starter patrolling the middle, he led the team and finished 10th in the Big Ten with 89 tackles. He became the first member of the front seven to lead IU in tackles since 2005 (Kyle Killion). Mayberry finished second with five sacks and shared second with 8.5 tackles for loss.

INSIDE AND OUT

The linebackers were touted as one of the team's strongest units entering the season and they have not disappointed. Along with middle linebacker **Matt Mayberry**, junior strong-side linebacker **Tyler Replogle** and senior weak-side linebacker **Will Patterson** ranked 1-2-3 on the team in tackles before Patterson suffered a hand injury that forced him to miss nearly the entire Illinois game and the Northwestern ballgame. Each member of the trio sits in the top 30 in the Big Ten in tackles, with Mayberry in sixth, Replogle in 12th and Patterson in 29th.

Replogle has posted double-digit tackles twice this season, the second and third of his career, and is averaging 7.5 stops per game. After collecting 10 stops at Virginia, he matched that total and added a TFL in the team's win vs. Illinois. Replogle narrowly missed making it three straight with nine stops, eight solo, and a tackle for loss at Northwestern, contributed seven tackles and a half-sack, which he shared with his brother and defensive tackle, Adam, at Iowa, and flirted with double digits once again vs. Wisconsin with nine tackles, seven solo. He is second on the team with 75 tackles and 48 solos. The Centerville, Ohio, native also has two sacks, 6.5 TFLs and one interception.

Since the Akron game (eight contests), Replogle has 66 tackles, 41 solo, six tackles for loss, his two sacks and his first career interception, which he returned 30 yards at Akron. Replogle, who is tied for ninth in Big Ten games only with 8.2 tackles per game, is second to Mayberry with those 66 tackles and 41 solos and is second in tackles for loss.

Patterson, who posted five stops in his return at Iowa, finished with a game-high 10 tackles, eight solo, vs. Wisconsin. He has now led the team in tackles four times this season, has two double-figure tackle games in 2009 and eight in his career. Patterson joined Mayberry with a team-high 10 tackles against Ohio State to go along with eight solo stops, a half-sack and 1.5 tackles for loss. Despite his injury, he is fourth on the club with 55 tackles, 40 solo.

Playing on the weak-side, Patterson leads all active Hoosier players with 167 career solo stops and is second to **Austin Thomas** (259) with 255 tackles. His first sack of the season (1.5 overall) resulted in a safety and the Hoosiers' first points this year, and he has three tackles for loss.

END GAME

The Hoosiers own two of the nation's top defensive ends in **Jammie Kirlew** and **Greg Middleton**. The All-America candidates have 45 career combined sacks (Middleton-23, Kirlew-22), the highest total for any tandem in the country. Middleton ranks third in

IU lore and is tied for 11th on the NCAA active career sacks list. Kirlew shares fourth on the Hoosiers' all-time sacks chart, is 15th on the active NCAA list, and is second to Adewale Ogunleye (64) with 50.5 career tackles for loss, which is third among all active NCAA players. Only South Florida's George Selvie (67.5) and South Carolina's Eric Norwood (54.0) own more.

Both players appeared on the Watch List for the 2009 Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award. Kirlew, one of six finalists for the honor in 2008, and Middleton, one of eight finalists for the award in 2007, are two of 30 candidates. The two were one of only a pair of teammates from the same university on the list, joining Oklahoma ends Jeremy Beal and Auston English.

Kirlew was also selected to the Chuck Bednarik Award Watch List and the Rotary Lombardi Award Watch List in addition to being named a first team All-Big Ten selection by *Lindy's* preseason magazine and *Sporting News* and preseason All-Big Ten by *Athlon Sports*. *Lindy's* also rated Kirlew the eighth-best defensive end in the country.

The Orlando native earned first team All-Big Ten from the conference media and second team by the league's coaches and collected honorable mention *SI.com* All-American honors last season. He also secured second team *Rivals.com* All-Big Ten and received the team's Anthony Thompson MVP Award, outstanding defensive lineman award and defensive player of the year honors. Kirlew finished the 2008 campaign with 10.5 sacks and 19.5 tackles for loss, both ranked fourth on Indiana's single-season list. Additionally, he was second in the Big Ten and tied for 14th nationally in sacks and third in the league and sixth nationally in tackles for loss.

Middleton, a 2007 All-American, became the first IU defensive lineman since Adewale Ogunleye in 1997 to earn first team All-Big Ten honors that same season. He set a new single-season school record with 16 sacks, which also led the nation.

DOMINANT IN 2009

Jammie Kirlew appears in the top 10 in the Big Ten in four major statistical categories. The senior defensive end is tied for fifth in the league and 20th nationally with 13.5 tackles for loss, shares seventh in the conference with 5.5 sacks, is tied for the conference lead and second nationally with five forced fumbles and is second in the Big Ten and 21st nationally with two fumble recoveries.

He has at least one sack in five games and at least one TFL in eight contests this season. In Big Ten games only, Kirlew is second with four forced fumbles and tied for second with two fumble recoveries. He is also fifth on the team with 52 tackles, which ranks second among all Big Ten defensive linemen.

Kirlew forced two fumbles in the team's victory over Illinois, his first career contest with two forced fumbles. The first forced fumble ended an Illini drive at the IU 6-yard line with the Hoosiers holding a 13-7 lead. Both fumbles resulted in Indiana touchdowns and effectively sealed the victory. Kirlew also matched a career best with nine solo tackles and recorded a sack in the game. He added eight tackles, all solo, with one tackle for loss and two quarterback hurries the following week at Northwestern.

Kirlew and his partner on the other end of the line, **Greg Middleton**, spent a lot of time in the Michigan backfield, as Middleton posted two sacks, 2.5 tackles

for loss and six tackles, and Kirlew collected two tackles for loss, forced and recovered a fumble on the same play and added seven tackles. Kirlew posted five tackles, one sack and forced a fumble the following Saturday against Ohio State.

Kirlew recovered a key fourth quarter fumble in the opener and made three tackles for loss and 1.5 sacks against Western Michigan and 2.5 TFLs and one sack at Akron. He has three career games with three-or-more tackles for loss, 15 multi-TFL contests and five multi-sack games.

Middleton forced a fumble at the IU 8-yard line that Justin Carrington recovered with 1:20 left to preserve the victory vs. Western Michigan. He finished the game with two tackles for loss and was all over at Akron, collecting six tackles, one sack, one tackle for loss and one pass breakup. The Indianapolis native now has seven multi-sack ballgames and nine multi-tackle for loss contests in his career.

WHERE THERE'S A WILLIS

In just his third career game on one of the grandest stages in college football, redshirt freshman **Darius Willis** collected the most yards for a Hoosier back since 2005 (Chris Taylor, 176 vs. Kentucky) and led Indiana to its second-highest rushing total in 60 all-time games vs. Michigan (197). Willis, who grew up watching film of and idolizing Walter Payton, finished with 154 yards on 16 carries, a 9.5 average, with two scores at Michigan Stadium. His second touchdown run went for 85 yards and put the Hoosiers ahead 33-29 with 8:57 remaining. It was the third-longest rush in IU history and the longest allowed by a Michigan defense since 1987.

The Indianapolis native added his second 100-yard game, his second two-touchdown contest and his second 70-plus yard rushing score at Northwestern. Willis got the corner and rumbled 70 yards on IU's first play, the first time since Nov. 6, 2004, the Hoosiers scored on their first play from scrimmage. He added a 3-yard touchdown in the second quarter and finished the contest with 103 yards on 14 carries (7.4 average).

With his sixth score of the year, Willis put Indiana up 7-0 on Iowa and currently ranks sixth in the Big Ten among position players with 4.5 points per game. He finished the game with 54 rushing yards and added career highs with four receptions and 34 yards.

On the season, Willis leads the team with 465 yards, six touchdowns and 104 attempts and is second with a 4.5 average. He sits sixth in the Big Ten with 58.1 yards per game and is third in league games only with 66.0 yards each time out. He also provides strong pass protection and has 10 grabs for 88 yards.

Willis, who has played in eight games with five starts, became the eighth freshman in Hoosier lore to break the 150-yard mark and the first since BenJarvus Green-Ellis (vs. Purdue, 2003), the first since De'Wayne Hogan (at Wisconsin, 1997) to break 100 yards in his Big Ten debut and the first freshman to go over 100 yards since Green-Ellis.

After redshirting last year, Willis received three carries in the opener and missed the Western Michigan game with an ankle injury. Willis returned at Akron and led the team with 66 yards on 15 carries (4.4 average) and reached the end zone for the first time. The 2008 co-offensive scout team player rushed for 1,728 yards (6.0 average) and 28 scores and was

runner-up for Indiana Mr. Football his senior campaign at Franklin Central High School in Indianapolis. He collected all-state, All-Marion County and all-conference honors.

BIG PLAY GUNSLINGER

When **Ben Chappell** hit **Damarlo Belcher** with a 33-yard TD strike against Eastern Kentucky, it marked his fifth career TD pass. Chappell's first five touchdowns came from 30-plus yards (33, 43, 43, 64, 77) before he connected on a 10-yarder to **Mitchell Evans** and a 3-yarder to **Max Dedmond** at Akron.

The Hoosiers recorded a season-high seven 20-plus passing plays against Wisconsin to push their season total to 28. Chappell and **Tandon Doss** connected on a 46-yard scoring strike. That score coupled with a Chappell to Belcher 29-yarder vs. Illinois means eight of Chappell's 18 career scoring strikes have come from 29-plus yards, including four in 2009.

Doss leads all IU receivers with 12 20-plus yard receptions this season (two TDs), while Belcher is second with six (two TDs).

CHAPPELL EARNS BIG TEN HONOR

Junior quarterback **Ben Chappell** shared Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week honors with Michigan State wide receiver Blair White, the conference announced on Oct. 18. The accolade was the first of Chappell's career and the first for a Hoosier since Kellen Lewis (Sept. 1, 2008).

Chappell set career highs with 333 yards and three touchdowns and did not throw an interception in IU's 27-14 victory over Illinois. It marked his second career 300-yard game, and he also matched a career high with 38 attempts to go along with a 160.2 passing efficiency. The Bloomington, Ind., native connected on a 29-yarder to **Damarlo Belcher**, a 44-yarder to **Tandon Doss** and a 13-yarder to **Troy Wagner**.

MITCHELL ON THE MOVE

After dabbling at quarterback last season, **Mitchell Evans** has been a mainstay in the Wildcat formation since the Western Michigan game this season. He has taken 68 snaps in the formation, including a season-high 12 in IU's win over Illinois and at Northwestern. Against the Fighting Illini, Evans turned in his best rushing performance, carrying the ball nine times for 84 yards. He also threw two passes and kicked a pooch punt, which hit an Illinois player and was recovered by the Hoosiers.

The junior wideout rushed six times for 35 yards and threw one pass in 11 snaps behind center vs. WMU. To see a breakdown of Evans in the Wildcat, *please visit page 12*.

Overall, Evans has 33 rushes for 131 yards and a 4.0 average. He has completed three passes in seven attempts for 21 yards.

Evans made his biggest mark at wideout against the Zips. He pulled in four catches for 43 yards, including his first career TD, a 10-yarder right before half to put the Hoosiers in front for good. Evans added his second score at Iowa, a 16-yard strike from **Ben Chappell**, and he has caught 21 balls for 220 yards on the season, both rank fourth on the team, and he owns seven tackles on special teams.

The West Milton, Ohio, native arrived at Indiana as a true freshman quarterback during 2007 preseason camp. Evans moved to safety and played the entire

2007 season at the position. He played quarterback during 2008 spring practice and opened preseason camp there before moving to his current position of wide receiver. Evans saw action at wideout most of 2008, but he also played quarterback against Central Michigan, Wisconsin and Penn State.

He has been a special teams stalwart since playing as a true freshman. Following each of the first three games, Evans was named one of the team's special teams players of the week after earning the honor six times in 2008.

INTERIOR PRESENCE

The prowess of the Hoosier defensive ends is evident, but the maturation of the interior linemen has been a huge success. Redshirt freshman **Larry Black, Jr.**, has started all 10 games this season and he has been joined the last nine by true freshman **Adam Replogle**. The duo combined for one sack against Illinois and Black recovered a fumble forced by **Jammie Kirlaw**. Black ranks third on the team with 7.5 tackles for loss to go along with 22 tackles, 1.5 sacks and the fumble recovery. Replogle vaulted ahead of Black with a career-high seven tackles, 1.5 sacks and 2.5 tackles for loss at Iowa and has 24 tackles, three sacks and four TFLs overall.

Along with the starters, redshirt freshmen **Nicholas Sliger** and **Mick Mentzer** have both appeared in all 10 games. Mentzer has 11 tackles and a half-tackle for loss, while Sliger has one TFL and recorded the first INT by a Hoosier defensive lineman since Kenny Kendal (Oct. 29, 2005) at Michigan. Junior **Jarrod Smith**, a reserve offensive lineman his first two seasons who transferred to the defense in the spring, started the season opener and has appeared in five games.

QUICK RETURNS

Ray Fisher became the second kick returner in IU history (Marcus Thippen, three in 2006) to race back two kickoffs in one season when he scampered 93 yards to paydirt at Northwestern. He also returned the opening kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown at Akron, the first by an Indiana player since James Bailey returned one 91 yards at Northwestern in 2007. It was the first time in school history that a Hoosier returned the opening kickoff for a score and it was the first of Fisher's career.

Fisher, who suffered an injury on the opening kick at Iowa and missed the Wisconsin game, leads the Big Ten and ranks second nationally averaging 37.4 yards per kick return with 635 yards on 17 returns. He is on pace to break Thippen's school mark for season average of 30.1 (2006).

The Cleveland native has at least one 40-yard return in five of the last six full games he has played and has averaged 39.2 yards on 15 returns since his TD return at Akron. Fisher added eight yards on the final return at Northwestern to move into sixth on IU's single-season top 10 list and he is just eight yards shy of fifth place. He also collected a career-long 35-yard punt return vs. the Wildcats, which set up a touchdown. To view Fisher's game-by-game performance, *please view page 11*.

SWITCH TO LOCKDOWN

Of the six position changes made during spring practice, none carried more importance than senior **Ray Fisher's** move to cornerback. Before leaving

the Iowa game with an injury on the opening kickoff and missing the Wisconsin game, Fisher had posted 40 tackles, 38 solos, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery, which he returned 26 yards against Illinois, two pass breakups and two passes defended.

In his defensive debut against Eastern Kentucky, Fisher made an instant impact. With 11:49 remaining and the Hoosiers holding a 19-13 advantage, Fisher forced a fumble by Eastern Kentucky quarterback Cody Watts at the IU 5-yard line. Senior defensive end **Jammie Kirlaw** recovered and the Hoosiers earned a season-opening victory. The Cleveland native also closed out the game with a team-best five solo tackles. He followed that performance with eight tackles, seven solo, and a pass breakup against Western Michigan, and he posted seven tackles, all solo, at Virginia.

Fisher is one of 14 Hoosiers with 100 career receptions and 1,000 career receiving yards, but he showed during preseason camp and early on in 2009 he is comfortable at the position he manned as a two-way player at Glenville High School. He has the speed and now weighs 185 pounds, up 13 pounds from last year's playing weight of 172.

NICK OF TIME

Of all the injuries the Hoosiers suffered last season, the Indiana secondary was hit the hardest. Three-quarters of the unit, including safeties **Austin Thomas** and **Nick Polk**, sustained season-ending ACL injuries. Thomas missed seven starts due to injuries (ankle and ACL), while Polk missed five starts (knee, ACL). Thomas has started all 10 games this season, while Polk has started nine of the team's 10 contests (Iowa - ankle).

Polk has a knack for always being around the ball and that proved to be the case at Northwestern, where he grabbed his first interception of the season. In his two-plus seasons with the defense (receiver as a freshman), Polk has forced four fumbles, recovered two and picked off four passes. Polk also has three double-digit tackle games in his career.

The Milwaukee native has posted 43 tackles, including nine solos vs. Wisconsin to push his season total to 36, two tackles for loss, three breakups, three passes defended and the one pick in 2009.

LOCK AND LOAD

The Hoosiers installed the Pistol formation to the offense this spring after visiting with the Nevada coaching staff in the offseason. With **Ben Chappell** at quarterback, an improved and veteran offensive line and five running backs capable of receiving meaningful playing time, head coach **Bill Lynch** wanted to become more of a "downhill" running team with a more multiple offensive attack.

In the Hoosier Pistol offense, the quarterback lines up four yards behind the center and the running back lines up three-to-four yards behind the quarterback. The running back receives the ball deeper in the backfield, enabling him to run "downhill" and allowing the offense to use more play-action pass.

HEALTHY GAINS

The Hoosiers used seven different starting lineups and nine total offensive linemen, including three players receiving their first career action, in 2008. Everyone being pressed into action has paid dividends for Indiana in 2009. The Hoosiers have nine

linemen with at least three years of experience and seven with at least four years.

Indiana's projected starting five has missed just three games due to injury and three of the linemen have started all 10 games, led by senior left tackle **Rodger Saffold**, junior right tackle **James Brewer** and redshirt freshman center **Will Matte**. Left guard **Justin Pagán** missed the opener due to injury but returned against Western Michigan and has not missed a game since. Senior right guard **Pete Saxon** started the first six games and eight of the 10 this season (missed Illinois and Northwestern).

The Hoosiers have allowed just 11 sacks on the season, which sits atop the Big Ten and ranks 17th in the country.

STABLE OF BACKS

Darius Willis took his turn to lead the rushing attack at Akron and at Michigan after **Demetrius McCray** rushed for a career-high 134 yards on 17 attempts (7.9 average) with a 59-yard TD jaunt vs. Western Michigan. His 134 yards were the most by an IU running back since Marcus Thigpen ran for 140 against Purdue in the 2007 Old Oaken Bucket Game. It was also the most by a Hoosier since Kellen Lewis ran for 148 against Ball State in 2008. His 59-yarder was the longest rush of his career. It marked the Hoosiers' longest play from scrimmage since a **Ben Chappell** 64-yard scoring strike to **Ray Fisher** against Central Michigan (Nov. 1, 20008) and the longest run since a Thigpen 77-yard scamper in the same game.

The Brandon, Fla., native led the way with 13 carries for 47 yards at Virginia and is second on the team with 284 yards and 58 attempts (4.9 average). He tops all backs with 956 career yards on 227 rushes, good for a 4.2 average, and has scored five times.

Trea Burgess showed the Hoosiers have more than two capable backs with his performance at Akron. Burgess rushed for a career-high 59 yards with one touchdown and a 4.5 average. A junior out of Jeffersonville, Ind., Burgess has rushed for 113 yards this season to go along with three scores, including a fourth-and-two plunge vs. Wisconsin.

He moved to linebacker to start spring practice before returning to his original position. Burgess impressed the remainder of the spring, leading the team with 92 yards on 10 carries with two touchdown scampers of 30-or-more yards in the spring game.

Fifth-year senior running back **Bryan Payton**, nicknamed "Pops" - he turned 24 on Sept. 21 - finished third on the team with 339 yards and a 4.3 average with two scores in 2008. Payton rushed six times for 32 yards with a 12-yard TD at Virginia, and he led the Hoosiers with 48 yards on eight carries against Wisconsin. In his career, Payton owns 874 yards, 212 attempts, a 4.1 average and seven touchdowns.

Sophomore **Zach Davis-Walker** received his first playing time of the season at Virginia. Davis-Walker ran the ball on six occasions for 17 yards. He received 23 carries for 106 yards (4.6 average) with one touchdown in 2008.

NEW STADIUM, NEW EXPERIENCE

After two years of construction, the North End Zone Student-Athlete Development Center is complete. The 138,000-square-foot facility opened in August for football and administrative personnel. At the heart of the new structure is the largest strength and conditioning center in the country.

The 25,000-square-foot area is located at field level and provides student-athletes in every varsity sport with access to brand new weight training and cardio equipment.

The Hoosier Football program enjoys spacious new offices, position and staff meeting rooms and a team auditorium, all equipped with state-of-the-art technology. Indiana's Henke Hall of Champions celebrates Hoosier greats from all sports and is located on the top level of the North End Zone Student-Athlete Development Center. It features museum-quality displays and a large banquet area where Hoosier fans can gather to celebrate the past, present and future of IU Athletics.

In the seating bowl directly in front of the Henke Hall of Champions, the 425-seat club section is sold out for the 2009 season. Fans can enjoy the chairback seating and food, beverage and all the amenities the Henke Hall of Champions has to offer. For more on the new and improved gameday experience please visit page 14.

IN GOOD HANDS

Jammie Kirlew is also one of the most talented Hoosiers off the field. A 3.25 SPEA management and public financial double major, Kirlew is a member of the 11-player Allstate AFCA Good Works Team, one of 10 finalists for the ARA Sportsmanship Award and he was a candidate for the Lowe's Senior CLASS award (achievements in the classroom, character, community and competition).

The fifth-year senior defensive end out of Orlando, studied abroad in Italy during the 2007 summer, volunteered for President Barack Obama's presidential campaign and directed, produced and wrote a film for the Campus MovieFest competition this spring. Junior wideout **Terrance Turner** and junior running back **Trea Burgess** starred in the film titled *Spring Break-up*.

Kirlew is one of several notable Hoosiers to excel in extracurricular activities off the field. Turner is a theatre and drama major. He has starred in two campus plays - *An American Ma(u)l* and *The America Play*. Teammate and junior cornerback **Adrian Burks** also performed in *An American Ma(u)l*.

Fifth-year senior running back **Bryan Payton** wrote for IU's student paper, the *Indiana Daily Student*, last year and interned with his hometown paper, the *Fort Wayne Journal Gazette*, this summer.

Two Kelley School of Business student-athletes took advantage of the school's internship program this summer. Long snapper **Brandon Bugg** traveled to Hong Kong working for KPMG, while quarterback **Ben Chappell** stayed in Bloomington and interned with BKD CPAs & Advisors.

NEW SEASON, NEW LEADERSHIP

Following the 2008 season, the senior class immediately took it upon themselves to make sure there would not be a repeat performance in 2009. The 19 scholarship seniors, all of whom have contributed significantly this season, brought a new intensity, beginning with 6 a.m. winter workouts, and held themselves and their teammates accountable.

Coupled with the 18 scholarship juniors, the Hoosiers have 35-plus scholarship upperclassmen for the first time since 2001 (36). The upperclassmen made it a point to keep the players around this summer, as nearly the entire team stayed in Bloomington.

That attitude carried over into camp, as observers and the coaching staff noted a different feel around this team. The extra work and perseverance continued with the most physical camp during their IU tenures.

It has also carried over into the regular season. Seniors **Ray Fisher** and **Greg Middleton** forced game-saving fumbles inside the IU 10-yard line that were recovered by seniors **Jammie Kirlew** and **Justin Carrington** in games one and two, respectively. After going 1-4 in contests where the score was within one possession in the fourth quarter a season ago, the Hoosiers are 3-4 in 2009.

IU matched last year's win total and improved to 3-0 for the 14th time in school history with their first road victory since Sept. 29, 2007, at Akron and nearly made it two in a row with a 36-33 loss at Michigan Stadium, a venue Indiana has not won in since 1967.

Following a 47-7 defeat to Virginia, the Hoosiers endured their most physical week of practice this season and responded with a 27-14 victory over Illinois, a team that beat IU, 55-13, in 2008.

KICKING FREE

In search of a place-kicker for the first time in three seasons, **Nick Freeland** grabbed the opportunity in training camp and has not looked back. The redshirt freshman is sixth in the Big Ten with 12 field goals in 20 attempts and is tied for seventh in the conference in scoring, accounting for 6.5 points per game. Freeland's 12 field goals also share ninth on Indiana's single-season field goals list.

The Indianapolis native became the fourth Hoosier kicker (sixth time) to collect four field goals in a game, tying a school record, at Michigan. Freeland hit on field goals from 24, 20, 30 and 32 in addition to hitting all three extra points.

In the Hoosiers' win over Illinois, Freeland missed his first two field goals before making kicks of 35 and 37 yards, the second closing out the first half and giving IU a 13-7 lead heading into the break.

He has connected on all 29 of his extra-point chances. Freeland also handles kickoffs, where he is averaging 63.1 on 49 kicks with seven touchbacks.

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

Sophomore **Max Dedmond** caught his first career TD pass in the third quarter at Akron. It was the first touchdown by a Hoosier tight end since Nick Sexton caught a 1-yard pass from Blake Powers against Illinois on Oct. 8, 2005. Dedmond has 17 catches for 132 yards this season.

Troy Wagner became the second Hoosier tight end to reach the end zone this season vs. Illinois. The fifth-year senior hauled in a 13-yard scoring strike, the first of his career, in the fourth quarter. Wagner owns six catches for 76 yards in 2009.

IN CONTROL

Last season, the Hoosiers finished in the basement of the Big Ten with a time of possession of 26:50. In 2009, that figure has increased to 29:31, which ranks seventh in the conference. IU has had 19 drives of 10-plus plays (15 last year) and 11 drives of five-plus minutes (four last year). All 11 of the five-plus minute drives have taken at least 10 plays.

GETTING AHEAD

Indiana jumped in front for the fourth straight game when it scored a touchdown on the opening

drive at Michigan. IU received the ball first for the fourth consecutive contest and marched 80 yards in 11 plays and 5:45. In the first four games, the Hoosiers averaged 10.8 plays, 67.3 yards, 4.5 first downs and 5:06 on their game-opening drives. Indiana had seven first downs all year on their opening drives in 2008, a total it surpassed in week two this year.

Entering the Ohio State game, IU had outscored its opponents, 36-28, in the first quarter en route to a 76-52 first-half advantage. The Hoosiers held the ball for 11:14 vs. Eastern Kentucky, 11:20 against Western Michigan, 11:09 at Akron and 10:52 at Michigan in the opening stanza, an average of 11:09.

Against Illinois, Indiana once again dominated the time of possession and improved to 4-0 when holding the ball for 11-plus minutes in the first stanza. The Hoosiers ate up 11:24 in the quarter, including 4:38 on the opening drive which went 57 yards in 11 plays.

At Iowa, the Hoosiers took the first drive of the game 69 yards on 11 plays, using 5:01. Five times after receiving the opening kick this year, Indiana has posted a 10-plus play drive. On four occasions, that drive has lasted more than five minutes. IU is 4-3 when leading in time of possession and 4-4 when scoring first in 2009.

FOR STARTERS

When **Darius Willis** rumbled 70 yards on IU's first play, it marked the first time that the Hoosiers have scored on the first play from scrimmage since Nov. 6, 2004, when Matt LoVecchio found Jahkeen Gilmore for an 80-yard TD at Illinois.

Earlier this season at Akron, **Ray Fisher** returned the opening kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown, the first time in school history a Hoosier returned the opening kickoff for a score.

Indiana has scored first in seven of the nine games this season and hold a 4-3 record in those contests.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE

Indiana avenged two ugly defeats with its victory over Illinois. The Hoosiers were coming off a 47-7 loss at Virginia and a 55-13 shortcoming in Champaign, Ill., in 2008. The 55-point swing against the Fighting Illini is the second-biggest differential in the 67-game series. IU lost 47-0 in 1902 before whitewashing the Illini, 17-0, in 1903.

In last season's game, Indiana allowed 563 total yards and eight touchdowns and gained 313 yards, including 172 passing. On Saturday, the Hoosiers surrendered 443 yards and two touchdowns while collecting 482 total yards and 333 passing yards.

CLOSE CALL AT THE BIG HOUSE

Indiana fell 2:29 short of defeating Michigan for the first time since 1987 and for the first time in Ann Arbor since 1967. The Hoosiers posted new highs in the 60-game series against the Wolverines in total yards (467) and points scored (33). IU's 197 yards rushing marked the second-highest total in the all-time series - the Hoosiers ran for 200 yards in 1998.

OPENING MIGHT

Indiana opened 2009 3-0 for the 14th time in school history and the second time in head coach **Bill Lynch's** three seasons. In 2007, the Hoosiers raced out of the gates with three straight wins, finished the regular season 7-5 and earned a postseason trip to the Insight Bowl. Lynch has been a part of five of the 3-0 starts - the two as a head coach and three as an assistant (1993, 1994 and 2005).

THE LYNCH SHOWS

New for the 2009 season, *The Bill Lynch Show*, will air weekly on the Big Ten Network. The show premiered at 5 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 2. Each week following the opener, the show will broadcast at 5 p.m. on Thursdays. Director of Broadcast Services for IU Athletics, Jeremy Gray, will host the show.

Coach Lynch's radio show, *Inside IU Football with Bill Lynch*, will be held Tuesday evening at 7 p.m. the next two weeks on the IU Radio Network. The Crowne Plaza Hotel in Bloomington will host the show, which debuted August 31 and runs through November 17. The Voice of the Hoosiers, Don Fischer, hosts the call-in show.

NEW STADIUM, NEW EXPERIENCE

The Indiana University Department of Athletics has developed several new experiences and promotions designed to enhance the gameday experience at Memorial Stadium for home football games. New experiences at Memorial Stadium include:

Knothole Park: Knothole Park is a brand new recreation area behind the south end zone at Memorial Stadium. The park features a Field-Turf replica of the playing field at Memorial Stadium and children ages 13 and under will get to play with Nerf footballs, hang out with IU student-athletes from a variety of sports and chalk the driveway behind the field that has been appropriately renamed Knothole Road.

Kicks-for-Keeps: The large nets behind the two goalposts are gone and much like going to a baseball game, field goals and extra points will head into the stands. If a fan catches or retrieves a ball kicked by the Hoosiers, they will be allowed to exchange the ball for an official IU adidas game ball that will feature an embossed IU logo on the ball. If a spectator catches or retrieves a ball kicked by the opposing team, they are encouraged to throw it back onto the field. By doing so, the spectator will receive a free T-Shirt acknowledging that they threw the ball back at Memorial Stadium.

Red Light Specials: Once every game, a special IU vehicle will drive down Knothole Road with a red siren on top of the vehicle. An announcement will then be made about what concession item will be that game's Red Light Special. As long as the red light is on, the noted concession item will cost just one dollar. Concession items and the time of the Red Light Special will change each week.

Shorter Lines: To cut down on the long lines before kickoff, Indiana Athletics has purchased more scanners and hired additional staff to expedite the process of getting fans into Memorial Stadium.

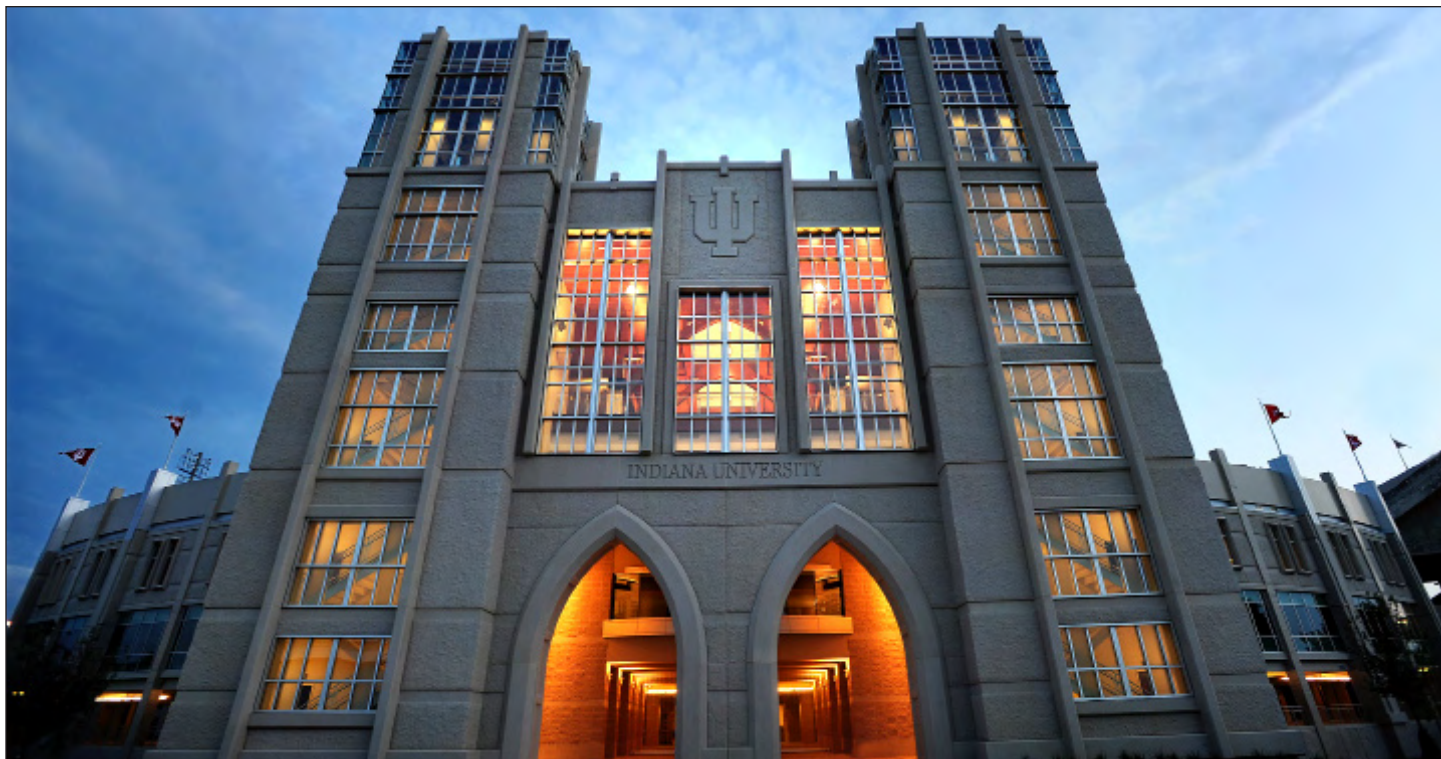
"Little 5 Feel": By purchasing a certain number of tickets, residence halls, fraternities, sororities and other student organizations can have painted bed sheets, flags, and part of Knothole Road painted with their letters, logo or organization name.

Hoosier Helpers and 'Ask Me' Buttons: To enhance everyone's gameday experience, Indiana Athletics has enlisted volunteers to serve as Hoosier Helpers. Hoosier Helpers will be on hand to answer questions and help with emergencies and uncomfortable situations. Ushers will be wearing 'Ask Me' buttons to encourage spectators to approach them with questions that they might have.

'Greening' Memorial Stadium: In an effort to mix red with green, there will be prominently labeled recycling bins located around all the concourses of Memorial Stadium.

Crimson Club: A rewards system to thank students for attending IU athletic events. Every time an IU student attends an IU sporting event, they will be awarded points. By accruing points over the year, they will be eligible to win valuable prizes like iPods and TVs.

Game Day T-Shirt: Hoosier students are encouraged to wear their IU Game Day T-shirt. The shirt was designed by a student and won in an online vote against nine other designs.



INSIDE THE NUMBERS

138,000 square footage of the North End Zone Student-Athlete Development Center. The two-year project, which was completed in July, features bowl seating with an outdoor club seating area that encloses the North end of Memorial Stadium. A new weight room, staff offices, position meeting rooms, administration offices and Hall of Champions highlight the interior of the structure and addresses several critical needs for not only the football program, but the entire Department of Athletics.

25,000 square footage of the new strength and conditioning center in the facility. It is the largest weight room in the nation. The center is located on the bottom level of the new facility with glass windows looking out to the field. It is nearly five times the size of the previous weight room and all Hoosier varsity sports will have access to the center.

22,000 square footage of the new academic center in the football complex. Previously located in a 3,000 square foot area in Assembly Hall, the new center is located on the East side of Memorial Stadium. The academic center adds state-of-the-art technology and equipment as well as nearly 20,000 square feet.

2,003 the Hoosiers rushed for 2,003 yards (sixth in the Big Ten) last season. IU broke the 2,000-yard rushing barrier for the second straight year, the first time since 2000 and 2001 an Indiana team has accomplished the feat. The Hoosiers averaged 4.5 yards per carry and carded 19 rushing scores, their best numbers since 2001 (5.5, 33). The team rushed for over 250 yards four times with a season-best 297 yards in its season-opening win over Western Kentucky.

523 total receiving yards for true freshmen **Tandon Doss** and **Damarlo Belcher** in 2008, the second-highest total for a true freshmen pair in school history. The duo of O.J. Conner and Tyrone Browning combined for 887 yards in 1997. Doss and Belcher's 39 receptions rank third among true freshmen pairings behind Conner and Browning (52) and John Pannozzo and Tyke Spencer (43 in 2002).

337 receiving yards for **Damarlo Belcher** in 2008. That total ranks third in IU history among true freshmen. He also caught 25 passes.

189 combined receiving yards for true freshmen **Tandon Doss** and **Damarlo Belcher** in the Hoosiers' win over No. 22 (BCS) Northwestern. They set an Indiana true freshmen record with the yardage. Doss also became the first IU true freshman since O.J. Conner in 1997 and just the third true freshman (fourth time) in Hoosier history to reach the century mark, as he hauled in a career-high eight receptions for 107 yards and a touchdown.

125 years of IU Football. The program began its 125th season when it opened the campaign against Eastern Kentucky on Sept. 3. The players will wear a commemorative patch on their uniforms and held a former player reunion against Western Michigan on Sept. 12.

95 career wins for Indiana head coach **Bill Lynch** in his 17th season as a head coach. Lynch owns a 95-88-3 (.519) overall record. He is in his third year as Hoosier head coach and has 31 years of coaching experience in the state of Indiana. In his first two seasons, the Hoosiers reached the postseason and won seven games in a season for the first time since 1993, won the Old Oaken Bucket for the first time since 2001 and won 10 games in his two years - the most for one head coach since 1993-94. IU also has boasted three All-Americans, two second-round NFL Draft picks, six All-Big Ten selections, one Academic All-American and a school-record 22 Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2008.

89 tackles by middle linebacker **Matt Mayberry** last season. Mayberry led the team and became the first Hoosier from the front seven to lead the team in tackles since Kyle Killion in 2005. The Darien, Ill., native finished 10th in the Big Ten with 7.4 tackles per game and 10th in league games only with 7.8 stops each time out.

84 Indiana owns one of the most experienced lines in the country with 84 returning offensive line starts (entering the season). Fourth-year starters **Rodger Saffold** (29) and **Pete Saxon** (28) lead the way for the Hoosiers followed by juniors **Cody Faulkner** (11) and **Alex Perry** (5), sophomore **Justin Pagán** (5), fifth-year senior **Mike Reiter** (4) and sophomore **Andrew McDonald** (2). In addition, IU has nine linemen with at least three years of experience and seven with at least four years.

73 sacks the Indiana defense recorded during the 2007 and 2008 seasons - the best two-year total in school history. After posting a school-record 42 sacks in 2007, tied for eighth in the country, the Hoosiers added 31 in 2008, the fourth-best mark in IU history.

73 public appearances head coach **Bill Lynch** made during the offseason. Lynch toured the state of Indiana and hit students especially hard, as he visited 19 Greek houses in April.

45 career sacks between senior defensive ends **Jammie Kirlew** and **Greg Middleton**. No duo in the country owns a higher total. Middleton ranks third on the Indiana career list with 23, while Kirlew is tied for fourth place with 22. Kirlew is also second all-time with 50.5 career tackles for loss.

42.4 **Chris Hagerup's** punt average last season. It ranked seventh on IU's single-season list, third in the Big Ten, third among freshman punters in the nation and 22nd nationally. Hagerup received honorable mention All-Big Ten recognition from the conference media and was a *Sporting News*, *Rivals.com* and *Phil Steele Magazine* Freshman All-American second team selection.

41 starting games lost to 17 starters due to injuries last season. Indiana lost three-quarters of its secondary to ACL injuries - CB Christopher Phillips (9), SS **Austin Thomas** (7) and FS **Nick Polk** (5). Six offensive linemen combined to miss seven games due to injuries.

37 scholarship upperclassmen on the Hoosier roster, the first time since 2001 (36) IU has 35-plus scholarship upperclassmen. Nineteen scholarship seniors and 18 scholarship juniors appear on the roster. Thirty-four of the players are listed on the depth chart or figure to provide significant contributions during the 2009 season.

22 rank of Northwestern in the BCS when the Hoosiers dropped the Wildcats, 21-19, last season. **Ben Chappell**, who started and played the entire game, had 219 yards passing and a touchdown and rushed for another score. Strong safety **Austin Thomas** had a pair of interceptions, halting NU drives at the IU 11- and 32-yard lines.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS

22 Hoosiers earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2008, a school record. Twenty-eight Hoosiers, accounting for 26 percent of the roster, recorded grade point averages of 3.0 or higher last fall and 28 players (27 percent) finished 2008 with cumulative GPAs of 3.0 or higher.

19.5 **Jammie Kirlew's** tackles for loss in 2008, which ranks fourth for a single season in Hoosier lore. Kirlew's total finished third in the conference and sixth in the country. He was one of six finalists for the Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award and was voted first team All-Big Ten by the conference media and second team by the league's coaches.

19 student-athletes signed National Letters of Intent to continue their playing careers at Indiana University on Feb. 4. Head coach **Bill Lynch's** second recruiting class featured one four-star recruit and 12 three-star recruits in the *Rivals.com* and *Scout.com* rankings. Eight players in the class reside from Indiana, five from Ohio, two each from Illinois and Michigan, and one from Pennsylvania and California. The Hoosiers bolstered their depth on the offensive line, signing a quintet of linemen. Indiana added two quarterbacks, two wide receivers, two defensive linemen, two linebackers and two defensive backs. The Hoosiers also welcomed one running back, one tight end, one kicker and one fullback/linebacker for the incoming class of 2009.

16 starters returning in 2009. On the defensive side of the ball, nine starters return, eight of whom are upperclassmen and seven of whom are seniors. The offense returns six starters, including five upperclassmen and three seniors. Indiana returns 48 letterwinners overall.

10.5 **Jammie Kirlew's** sack total from one season ago, which is fourth on IU's single-season list. The Orlando native finished second in the Big Ten and tied for 14th nationally with his sack total. Kirlew has been selected a first team All-Big Ten defensive lineman by *Athlon Sports*, *Lindy's* and *Sporting News* pre-season magazines heading into 2009. He is rated the eighth best defensive end in the country by *Lindy's*.

9/3 Indiana opened the 2009 season on Sept. 3 against Eastern Kentucky. It marked the first Thursday night game at Memorial Stadium in school history.

8 different starting lineups used on the offensive line in 2008, including seven different lineups over the final seven weeks.

8 Hoosiers currently on NFL rosters. Victor Adeyanju (St. Louis Rams), Kris Dielman (San Diego Chargers), Gibran Hamdan (Buffalo Bills), James Hardy (Buffalo Bills), Adewale Ogunleye (Chicago Bears), Tracy Porter (New Orleans Saints), Antwaan Randle El (Washington Redskins) and Courtney Roby (Saints) appear on NFL teams.

6 players changed positions this spring. Most notably, senior **Ray Fisher** switched from wide receiver to cornerback. Two other wideouts - **Shane Covington** and **Kyle Dietrick** - joined Fisher in the defensive backfield at safety. **Jarrod Smith** and **Milton Owens** made the switch over from the offensive line to defensive tackle, while **Darius Johnson** moved from linebacker to defensive end. **Trea Burgess** opened the spring at linebacker before he returned to running back early on in spring practice.

6 home games on the Hoosiers schedule in 2009. Indiana welcomes Eastern Kentucky (Sept. 3), Western Michigan (Sept. 12), Ohio State (Oct. 3), Illinois for Homecoming (Oct. 17), Wisconsin (Nov. 7) and Purdue (Nov. 21).

5 games where the score was within one possession in the fourth quarter last season. Indiana finished 1-4 in those five games, with its lone victory coming over No. 22 (BCS) Northwestern, 21-19. In its four losses, IU trailed Ball State, 28-20, Michigan State, 36-29, Minnesota, 13-7, and led Central Michigan, 34-31, in the final stanza.

4 starting quarterback **Ben Chappell** dons the same number as his favorite player, Brett Favre. The Bloomington South High School product took over the reigns at quarterback during spring practice after playing in 11 contests with three starts. He threw for 1,001 yards with four TDs and three interceptions. Chappell completed 52.3 percent of his passes (80-of-153) and carded a 111.95 efficiency rating while recording starts at Illinois, and against Northwestern and Wisconsin. In the team's victory over No. 22 (BCS) Northwestern, Chappell threw a 43-yard touchdown, rushed for another and went 21-of-34 (61.8) for a career-high 219 yards. An accounting major with a 3.7 grade point average, Chappell is also a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

4 different quarterbacks played for the Hoosiers during the 2008 campaign. **Ben Chappell**, Kellen Lewis, **Mitchell Evans** and **Teddy Schell** each took snaps under center last year.

3 **Mitchell Evans** has played three positions in his brief Hoosier career. He arrived to Indiana as a true freshman quarterback during 2007 preseason camp. Evans moved to safety and played the entire 2007 season at the position. He played quarterback during 2008 spring practice and opened preseason camp there before moving to his current position of wide receiver. Evans saw action at wideout most of 2008, but he also played quarterback against Central Michigan, Wisconsin and Penn State.

3 primetime games on the Hoosiers' schedule. Indiana opened the season with the first Thursday night game in Memorial Stadium history against Eastern Kentucky at 8 p.m. on Sept. 3. IU hosted Ohio State at 7 p.m. on Oct. 3 and welcomed Illinois for Homecoming at 7 p.m. on Oct. 17. All three games were televised by the Big Ten Network.

3 true freshmen played for the Hoosiers in 2008. Wide receivers **Damarlo Belcher** and **Tandon Doss** joined offensive lineman **Justin Pagán**. Belcher finished the season fourth on the team with 25 receptions and third with 337 yards to go along with two touchdowns, while Doss caught 14 passes for 186 yards and one score. Pagán started the final five games of the season and started seven overall. He played both tackle and guard positions.

2 teams returning to the Indiana ledger. Michigan and Ohio State replace Minnesota and Michigan State on the schedule for the next two seasons. IU had not faced the Wolverines or Buckeyes since 2006. The Hoosiers dropped a 36-33 heartbreaker to Michigan in Ann Arbor, Mich., on Sept. 26, and dropped a 33-14 decision to OSU on Oct. 3.

1 the Hoosiers faced Eastern Kentucky and Virginia for the first time in program history. Indiana opened the season with the first Thursday night game in Memorial Stadium history against ECU on Sept. 3. IU traveled to Charlottesville, Va., to face the Cavaliers on Oct. 10.

IU RADIO NETWORK

Indiana University's football program receives some of the most extensive media coverage in the country. Learfield Communications holds the exclusive rights as IU's official radio outlet.

DON FISCHER

This marks the 37th year that Don Fischer has been the radio play-by-play "voice" of Indiana University football and men's basketball games. The past 22 years, Fischer has worked as an independent contractor and is currently serving the IU Radio Network owned by Learfield Communications out of Jefferson City, Mo.

In addition to broadcasting the games, Fischer hosts the weekly coaches radio talk shows for both football and basketball and has a daily show, Monday through Friday, from September through March. The daily show is called "IU Sports Today" and is syndicated throughout the state of Indiana. Fischer also offers stations a weekly talk show about IU football and basketball that airs in several markets around the state during the school year.

Fischer does freelance sportscasting, which for the past 15 years has included being the television voice of the Indianapolis Colts. He broadcasts preseason games on WTTV-Channel 4 in Indianapolis.

During his 36 years of work with IU, Fischer has been named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year 23 times by two different organizations, the last time coming in 2006. The National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association has awarded him 19 times, while the Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association has named him its honoree four times.

He has won several awards for best play-by-play performance, and he has been honored by Indiana University with the J.W. Bill Orwig Medal, that goes to non-alumni for distinguished service to the University. He also has been named an Honorary "I" Man.

The Indiana Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association inducted Fischer into the ISSA Hall of Fame in April 2004.

Fischer has broadcast more than 1,500 Indiana University games a total that includes eight bowl games, four NCAA basketball championship games and two N.I.T. championship games. From 1973 through 1987, he worked for ABC Radio, Canada's CBC and several additional major market radio stations, including WIRE in Indianapolis, as their source for reports during the month of May coverage of the Indianapolis 500. During that 15-year period, Fischer also served WIRE and Network Indiana, a statewide news network, as their sports director.

A native of Mendota and Rochelle, Ill., Fischer has been in the radio business for 41 years. His previous broadcast experience includes stops in Butte, Mont., Ottawa, Ill., Springfield, Ill., and Terre Haute, Ind.

Fischer has four sons and eight grandchildren. Don and his wife, Susy, reside in Greenwood, Ind.

PETE COMPISE

Former Indiana University assistant football coach Pete Compise is in his fifth year with the IU Radio Network as the color analyst for Hoosier Football. He previously spent 11 years in the same capacity at the University of Louisville.

A 1969 University of Louisville graduate and former full-back and place-kicker on the Cardinal football team, Compise served as team captain in 1968 and earned the Senior Leadership Award in his final campaign. He converted 76-of-88 extra-point attempts and scored 136 points in his collegiate football career, and he also was a three-year letterwinner in baseball.

Compise began his college coaching career as an assistant coach to Lee Corso at Louisville in 1972. The Cardinals posted a 9-1 mark and finished 14th in the nation that season.

He then followed Corso to Bloomington, where he served on the Hoosiers staff from 1973 through 1976, and earned his master's while at IU. Compise left Indiana in February 1977, to become the head football coach at Hanover College. He led Hanover to the 1979 and 1980 Hoosier Buckeye Conference Championships and was a three-time conference Coach of the Year honoree.

Compise left Hanover in June 1982 to enter the restaurant business. He owned and operated Alexander's Restaurant in the Louisville Galleria from 1982-87 and The Terrace Restaurant at Kaden Tower from 1987-97. During this time, Compise also worked as a color analyst for Louisville Cardinals Football telecasts on WDRB-Fox 41 TV in Louisville and on WHAS-840 AM for radio broadcasts.

Since 1997, Compise has worked in human resources and management for Maker's Mark Distillery and Thornton Oil

Corporation in Louisville, and he is currently a senior executive recruiter for Executive Leadership Solutions, an executive search firm specializing in the retail industry.

Pete and his wife, Rhonda, reside in Henryville, Ind.

JOE SMITH

Joe Smith is in his 27th year with the IU Radio Network. He has handled pre-game, halftime, and post-game duties for Indiana football and men's basketball since 1983.

Smith, the sports director of WGCL-AM 1370 in Bloomington, is in his 40th year of radio broadcasting in Bloomington. He began his broadcasting career in 1969 at WAIK Radio in Galesburg, Ill. From 1973-89, Joe worked on "RFD-4 Agri-Business Show" on WTTV-4 with the late Bob Cook. In 1998, Smith was named Indiana Sportscaster of the Year and in April 2003, he was inducted into the Indiana Sportswriters/Sportscasters Hall of Fame. Joe handled the IU TV Warmup Shows from 1978-82 and hosted several IU Coaches Shows from 1983-96 and again from 2002-04.

In June 2004, Smith received the J.W. Bill Orwig Medal that goes to non-alumni for distinguished service to the University.

Joe has two children, both of whom are Indiana University graduates. Jeff and his wife, Kristen, currently reside in Indianapolis. Jeff is a 2002 graduate with a bachelor's degree in sport communications. Joe's daughter, Jamie, earned her bachelor's degree from Indiana University in kinesiology in 2005, and her master's in sports management at the University of Tennessee in August 2006.

HEAD COACH BILL LYNCH



A native and lifelong Hoosier with 31 years coaching experience in the state, Bill Lynch is in his third year at the helm of the Indiana football program. In his two seasons, the Hoosiers reached the postseason and won seven games in a season for the first time since 1993, won

the Old Oaken Bucket for the first time since 2001 and won 10 games in his two years - the most for one head coach since 1993-94. IU also has boasted three All-Americans, two second-round NFL Draft picks, six All-Big Ten selections, one Academic All-American and a school-record 22 Academic All-Big Ten honorees in 2008.

Lynch completed his first season as Indiana head coach in 2007, leading the Hoosiers to a 7-6 record and a trip to the Insight Bowl. He is the only head coach in Hoosier history to guide a team to a bowl game in his debut season and just the fourth coach in IU lore to patrol the sidelines for a postseason contest. The team's seven victories were the second most for a first-year Indiana head coach, behind only James M. Sheldon, who went 8-1-1 in 1905.

Two of Lynch's 2007 charges were selected on the first day of the NFL Draft. The New Orleans Saints picked cornerback Tracy Porter with the 40th selection, while the Buffalo Bills took wide receiver James Hardy in the 41st slot. Indiana and Michigan were the only Big Ten teams with multiple selections on day one. It also marked the first time IU had two players selected on day one since 1988.

Porter, Hardy, kicker Austin Starr, quarterback Kellen Lewis and defensive end Greg Middleton each collected All-Big Ten honors. Hardy and Middleton snared first team honors from both the conference coaches and media, while Starr and Porter added first team accolades from the media. The four first-teamers shared second most in the league with Penn State, trailing only Ohio State's six. Lewis was a second team selection by both the conference coaches and media, while Porter and Starr joined him on the coaches' ballots.

Hardy, Starr and Middleton also received All-America recognition. Hardy and Middleton both collected second team honors from the Walter Camp Football Foundation and third team laurels from the Associated Press, while Starr captured second team status from the AP. Starr was a Lou Groza Award finalist, Middleton was a Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award finalist and Hardy was a Biletnikoff Award semifinalist.

IU knocked off No. 22 (BCS) Northwestern last year behind the play of team most valuable player and All-Big Ten honoree Jammie Kirlaw. The junior,

who earned first team All-Big Ten honors from the conference media and second team recognition from the conference coaches, was also one of six finalists for the Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award.

In addition to success on the field, Lynch stresses the importance of earning a degree from one of the top academic institutions in the country. Last year, a school-record 22 Hoosiers earned Academic All-Big Ten honors, over 25 percent of the roster recorded a grade point average of 3.0 or higher for the second straight campaign, and Starr earned ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District V honors for the third straight season.

Forty-one Hoosiers completed the 2007-08 academic year with cumulative grade point averages of 3.0 or higher. Starr became the sixth IU player to be named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America First Team, while fullback Josiah Sears joined Starr on the Academic All-District V team. Kicker Kevin Trulock received the inaugural Wayne Duke Postgraduate Award, presented by the Indianapolis Big Ten Community Partnership.

Lynch signed an agreement on November 26, 2007, to remain Indiana head coach through July 1, 2012. He was named IU's 27th head coach on June 15, 2007. Lynch has compiled a 95-88-3 (.519) career record with stops in Bloomington, at Butler, Ball State and DePauw. He has won or shared six conference or divisional titles in his 16 seasons. Lynch has 32 overall years of coaching experience, spending 31 of those seasons in the state of Indiana.

A 2005 inductee into the Indiana Football Hall of Fame, Lynch served as interim head coach for two games in 2006 and led the Hoosiers during 2007 spring practice. During his first two seasons in Bloomington, he was the assistant head coach, offensive coordinator and tight ends coach.

The veteran coach returned to Bloomington after directing DePauw to an 8-2 record en route to Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) co-coach of the Year honors in 2004. Lynch was the first coach in SCAC history to earn the award in his debut campaign. DePauw finished 5-1 in league play.

Lynch was head coach at Ball State from 1995-02. During his tenure, the Cardinals won at least six games three times, including a 7-4 mark in 1995 and an 8-4 record the following season. The 1995 team posted a 6-2 conference record and tied for third in the Mid-American Conference (MAC), while Lynch's 1996 team captured the MAC championship at 7-1 and earned a trip to the Las Vegas Bowl. Ball State also staked claim to the 2001 MAC West title after third-place finishes in 1997 and 2000.

A 1977 Butler graduate and four-year letterwinner in both football and basketball, Lynch quarterbacked the Bulldogs to a 28-12 overall record and three conference championships. He earned Indiana Collegiate Conference (ICC) Most Valuable Player honors in each of his final three seasons. Lynch led the nation in pass completion percentage in 1975 and captained both sports his senior campaign.

He returned to his alma mater as head coach in 1985 and compiled a 36-12-3 (.735) record over

five seasons. Butler won four Heartland Collegiate Conference titles, and he won conference Coach of the Year honors three times. Four of Lynch's five squads were ranked among the top 20 in NCAA Division II, and Lynch twice earned AFCA Regional Coach of the Year laurels.

Lynch moved on to Ball State as the Cardinals' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 1990-92.

Bill and his wife, Linda, have four children - Billy (Carla), Kelly (Lucas Manor), Joey (Danielle) and Kevin - and nine grandchildren - Lindsey (3), Max (2) and Ryan (1) Lynch (Billy and Carla - parents); Joe Jr. (2) and Danny (infant) Lynch (Joey and Danielle - parents); and Lexie (9), Maggie (7), Jonny (4) and Kate (2) Manor (Kelly and Lucas - parents). Billy is the Hoosiers' wide receivers coach, while Joey, who played quarterback at Ball State (2003-06), returned to his alma mater as wide receivers coach this offseason. Kevin will serve as offensive quality control for the Hoosiers this season. He graduated from Franklin (Ind.) College in the spring of 2009 with a bachelor's degree in recreation.

- With an attendance of 36,759, the Hoosiers posted their highest attendance for a home opener since 1997 (vs. Ball State, 38,006).

- Quarterback Ben Chappell posted a career-high 326 yards passing in the game, going 27-for-36 in the process. He became the 15th player in school history to pass for 300 yards in a game. He was the first Hoosier to throw for 300 since Kellen Lewis threw for 354 against Ball State on Nov. 3, 2007.

- Tandon Doss matched a career high with eight receptions in the game and set a new career best with 125 receiving yards. Terrance Turner matched his career high with five grabs and posted a career-high 57 yards. Damarlo Belcher matched his career best with six receptions and racked up a career-high 97 receiving yards.

- Will Patterson's sack of Cody Watts on EKU's first drive resulted in the first safety for the Hoosiers since Jerimy Finch blocked a Michigan State punt on Sept. 27, 2008. Patterson now has 5.5 career sacks.

- Redshirt freshman Larry Black, Jr., and sophomore Darius Johnson each made their first career sack in the second quarter for the Hoosiers. Matt Mayberry had his sixth career sack in the first quarter. Will Patterson added a sack of his own, moving his career total to 5.5. The four sacks for the Hoosiers were for a combined loss of 45 yards.

- Trea Burgess' 1-yard TD plunge in the first quarter was his second career TD, joining a score against Indiana State in the 2007 season opener. Damarlo Belcher's 33-yard TD catch in the second quarter was his third career touchdown reception.

- Ray Fisher forced his first career fumble in the fourth quarter to thwart an EKU drive at the 5-yard line. Jammie Kirlaw recovered the fumble, his fourth career fumble recovery. In Fisher's debut as a defensive player, he also posted five solo tackles to lead the Hoosiers.

- Redshirt freshman kicker Nick Freeland made his first career appearance for the Hoosiers and he made it count, connecting on a 38-yard field goal try at the 13:04 mark in the second quarter. Freeland also hit both extra points he attempted.

- Sophomore Tandon Doss and senior Nick Polk each recorded their first career kick returns. Doss took the opening kickoff 32 yards and Polk's return went 29. Combined with his 125 yards receiving, Doss accounted for 157 all-purpose yards for the Hoosiers.

- The Hoosiers recorded seven tackles for loss in the win, led by senior Matt Mayberry and redshirt freshman Larry Black, Jr., who each tallied two on the night.

- Several Hoosiers made their first career starts in the game. Redshirt freshmen Larry Black (defensive tackle), Will Matte (center) and Marc Damisch (left guard) joined sophomore Tandon Doss (wide receiver), junior James Brewer (right tackle) and senior Brian Zematis (tight end). Jarrod Smith (defensive tackle) made his first career start on defense, though he started at offensive guard against Penn State last year.

- Black, Matte and Damisch all made their first career appearances in an IU uniform in addition to starting. Other Hoosiers who made their Hoosier debuts were redshirt freshmen Darius Willis, Shane Covington, Nicholas Sliger, Chad Sherer, Mick Mentzer and Nick Freeland and true freshman Adam Replogle.

- The game captains for the Hoosiers were Ben Chappell and Rodger Saffold on offense and Will Patterson and Jammie Kirlaw on defense.

- Earlier this week, head coach Bill Lynch announced that seniors Collin Taylor and Matt Kurz have been awarded scholarships, meaning that the Hoosiers now have 19 scholarship seniors and 18 scholarship juniors on the team.

POSTGAME NOTES

- For the second straight week, IU forced a crucial fumble inside the 10-yard line in the waning moments of the game. Senior defensive end Greg Middleton forced his third career fumble on the play and senior linebacker Justin Carrington collected his first fumble recovery to give the Hoosiers the ball at their own 24-yard line.
- With 3.0 tackles for loss, senior defensive end Jammie Kirlew moved past Greg Farrall (1988-91) to third on the IU career list with 41.0 TFL in his career. He also had 1.5 sacks to move into fifth on that career list with 18.0. He is now just two sacks behind teammate Greg Middleton for fourth on the Hoosier list.
- Fifth-year senior Demetrius McCray's 59-yard touchdown run in the second quarter was his fifth career rushing score and the longest rush of his career. It marked the Hoosiers longest play from scrimmage since a Ben Chappell 64-yard scoring strike to Ray Fisher against Central Michigan (Nov. 1, 2008) and the longest run since a Marcus Thigpen 77-yard scamper in the same game.
- McCray's 134 rushing yards are the most by an IU running back since Thigpen ran for 140 against Purdue in the 2007 Old Oaken Bucket Game. It is also the most by an IU player since Kellen Lewis ran for 148 against Ball State in 2008. The 134 yards were a career high for the Brandon, Fla., native, and his first career 100-yard game.
- Indiana starts the year at 2-0 for the sixth consecutive year. Bill Lynch is the first coach in IU history to start his career with three straight 2-0 beginnings.
- Indiana's game-opening 12-play drive was the longest opening drive for the Hoosiers since a 13-play drive against Purdue on Nov. 17, 2007.
- The Hoosiers held the ball for 11:20 in the first quarter, IU's largest time of possession edge in a quarter since it held the ball for 12:21 in the fourth quarter against Murray State on Sept. 6, 2008.
- Indiana held WMU to just 22 yards on the ground on 29 carries, the fewest rushing yards for an IU opponent since William & Mary finished with -32 yards on the ground on Aug. 31, 2002. It marked the second straight game that Indiana held a MAC opponent under 50 yards on the ground, as CMU had 37 yards rushing in the 2008 contest between the two teams.
- Led by McCray, the Hoosier rushing attack rumbled for 187 yards, the most since running for 272 against CMU in 2008.
- Junior Mitchell Evans showed his versatility in the game, lining up under center several times for the Hoosiers. He was 0-for-1 passing and picked up 35 yards on six rushes while lined up at QB. As a receiver, he caught two balls for 31 yards as well. To round off his game even more, Evans picked up a pair of tackles on special teams.
- Redshirt freshman Nick Freeland hit his first three field goals before Western blocked his third attempt. He is now 4-for-5 in his career on field goals. He also hit both of his extra points and averaged 67 yards on his six kickoffs, including his first career touchback.
- Junior Jeremy Finch recovered his first career fumble, diving on a bad snap on a Western Michigan punt in the fourth quarter to give the Hoosiers the ball inside the red zone with less than 10 minutes to play. He picked up his second career fumble recovery on the final play of the game.
- Senior linebacker Matt Mayberry split a first-quarter sack with Kirlew to give him 1.5 on the season and 6.5 in his career. IU sacked Tim Hiller twice to give the Hoosiers six sacks on the season.
- For the second time in as many games, Indiana won the toss and elected to receive.
- The Hoosiers improved to 33-6-1 against the Mid-American Conference with the win. IU also moved to 5-0 all-time against Western Michigan.
- True freshman defensive tackle Adam Replogle made his first career start in the game, lining up at defensive tackle. He and his brother, Tyler (linebacker), became the first brothers to start in the same game for IU since Antwaan and Curtis Randle El started 14 games together in 1998-99.
- Indiana celebrated its 125th anniversary with a reunion for former players, coaches and managers. Over 400 people attended the event from all IU eras.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Indiana's Ray Fisher returned the opening kickoff 91 yards for a touchdown, the first by an IU player since James Bailey returned one 91 yards against Northwestern in 2007. It is the first time in school history that a Hoosier has returned the opening kickoff for a score.

- The Hoosiers went 10-for-15 on third downs, including a perfect 5-for-5 on third-and-1, 2-for-2 on third-and-2 and 2-for-2 on third-and-medium (4-7).

- Mitchell Evans' 10-yard TD reception just before halftime was the first receiving TD in the junior's career. It also marked the first passing TD of less than 30 yards in Ben Chappell's career.

- Tight end Max Dedmond picked up his first career TD reception in the third quarter on a three-yard pass. It was the first score by an Indiana tight end since Nick Sexton scored against Illinois in 2005.

- Austin Thomas' third-quarter interception was his first against any team other than Northwestern. Thomas added a second interception in the quarter for his second-career game with two picks. He snared two against Northwestern last year.

- Tyler Replogle also picked off a pass in the third, the first of the junior linebacker's career. Andre LaGrone had his first career interception in the fourth quarter. It marked the first time that IU had four interceptions as a team since Nov. 18, 2006, against Purdue.

- Indiana scored on all five of its trips inside the red zone, including four touchdowns. Two of the scores came on the ground and two came via Ben Chappell TD passes.

- Indiana had three sacks and eight tackles for loss in the game, including 2.5 TFL and one sack by Jammie Kirlaw. Kirlaw also forced a fumble in the game, the fifth of his career. Greg Middleton had six solo tackles, including his 21st career sack. Middleton is now one sack shy of third on IU's career list with Kirlaw just two sacks behind him in fifth on the list.

- Trea Burgess rushed for a career-high 59 yards in the game. He also ran in his third career rushing TD early in the fourth quarter. Darius Willis also had a career best on the ground, running for 66 yards and his first career touchdown in his second collegiate game.

- The Hoosiers' opening drive spanned 13 plays and 61 yards, taking up 5:03 and resulting in a 25-yard field goal by Nick Freeland. This comes after last week's game-opening 12-play, 76-yard drive that ate 6:07. On the season, Indiana has averaged 10.7 plays, 63 yards and 4.3 first downs on its game-opening drives. The Hoosiers had just seven first downs all season on their opening drives in 2008.

- Indiana held the ball for 11:09 in the opening quarter, the third time in as many games that the Hoosiers have maintained possession for at least 11 minutes in the first quarter this season.

- With the victory, Indiana starts the season 3-0 for the 14th time in school history and the second time in the last three seasons.

- Indiana improved to 2-0 all-time against Akron. The Hoosiers are now 34-6-1 against the Mid-American conference in school history.

- For the first time this season, the Hoosiers did not win the coin toss. Akron elected to defer, so the Hoosiers received the opening kickoff for the third time in as many games.

- Indiana's captains for the game were seniors Brian Zematis and Pete Saxon and juniors Mitchell Evans and Terrance Turner.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Indiana posted a new high against Michigan in total yards (467). The 33 points scored by the Hoosiers were also the most in the IU-Michigan all-time series. IU's 197 yards rushing on the day marks the second-highest total for the Hoosiers in the all-time series with the Wolverines. The Hoosiers ran for 200 yards in 1998.

- Darius Willis's 85-yard touchdown run tied for the third longest in school history and was the longest given up by a Michigan defense since 1987.

- Willis finished with 154 yards on 16 carries, good for a 9.5 yard average. The rushing total is the most for a Hoosier running back since Chris Taylor ran for 176 yards against Kentucky in 2005 and more than doubles his career-high from last week at Akron of 69 yards. Adding in his 11-yard TD earlier in the game, Willis posted his first multi-TD game in his career. He has three career scores, all in the last two weeks.

- Indiana posted another long opening drive after receiving the opening kick, moving the ball 80 yards on 11 plays and eating up 5:45 of the clock. So far this season, IU is averaging 10.8 first downs, 67.3 yards and 4.5 first downs on their opening drives.

- With his second-quarter sack of Tate Forcier, Greg Middleton claimed his 22nd career sack, tying Greg Farrall for third on the Hoosiers' career list. He added a second sack later on the next play to gain sole possession of third place. It is Middleton's seventh multi-sack game in his career. He matched a career high with 2.5 tackles for loss in the game.

- Jammie Kirlaw's strip of Denard Robinson in the second quarter marked his second forced fumble and second fumble recovery of the season. It was his fifth-career forced fumble and his fourth-career fumble recovery.

- Kirlaw had two tackles for loss in the game to move into second place on IU's career list with 45.5 TFL, passing Van Waiters. He is now 18.5 TFL behind current Chicago Bear Adewale Ogunleye for the school record.

- Indiana had two sacks on the game, both by senior Greg Middleton, and the Hoosiers racked up nine tackles for loss in the contest, getting two from Jammie Kirlaw, 1.5 from Larry Black Jr. and 2.5 from Middleton.

- Tandon Doss' 25-yard touchdown run was his second career rush and his first-career rushing touchdown. He also caught a 56-yard pass in the opening quarter, his longest career reception.

- Doss finished the game with 104 yards receiving, his second 100-yard game of the season and the third of his career.

- Coupling Doss' numbers with Willis' 152 yards on the ground, they became the first tandem to break the 100-yard mark rushing and receiving since Kellen Lewis (148) and Andrew Means (103) against Ball State in 2008. They became the first running back/receiver combo to accomplish the feat since Chris Taylor (132) and James Hardy (118) against Illinois in 2005.

- Nicholas Sliger's second-quarter interception was the first pick of the redshirt freshman's career. It was the first interception by an IU defensive lineman since Kenny Kendal picked off a pass on Oct. 29, 2005, against Michigan State.

- Nick Freeland matched the school record and set a new career high with four field goals. The redshirt freshman hit field goals of 24, 20, 30 and 32 yards.

- For the second straight week, Indiana lost the opening coin toss, but received the ball for the fourth time in as many games when Michigan elected to defer.

- Indiana's game captains were seniors Greg Middleton, Nick Polk and Mike Reiter along with junior Jarrod Smith.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Matt Mayberry and Will Patterson tied for the team lead in tackles with 10 apiece. Patterson had eight solo stops and each linebacker had 1.5 tackles for loss. Mayberry and Patterson have each led the team in tackles twice this year.

- The Hoosiers recorded three sacks in the game, one apiece for Jammie Kirlaw and Matt Mayberry and a half sack for both Will Patterson and Tyler Replogle. Kirlaw now has 20 sacks and 46.5 tackles for loss in his career.

- Kirlaw forced a Terrelle Pryor fumble in the fourth quarter for his sixth career forced fumble and his third of the season. Matt Mayberry recovered a fumble in the final quarter, his third career recovery and his first of the season.

- The Hoosiers had seven tackles for loss and three sacks in the game, doubling the Buckeyes' sack total on the season. Three different teams registered one sack against OSU this year. IU now has 14 sacks (2.8 average) and 38 tackles for loss (7.6) on the year.

- Senior Ray Fisher had 129 yards in the kick return game, including a 43-yard return in the second half. Fisher, who came into the game sixth in the country with a 35.8 average, averaged 32.3 per return on the game.

- During IU's first scoring drive, Tandon Doss had three catches for 46 yards and a TD and he added two rushes for 16 yards. The TD catch was Doss' first of the season. The sophomore leads the Hoosiers with 32 grabs and 470 yards on the year.

- Doss finished the game with 96 yards through the air and added 29 yards on a kick return for 141 all-purpose yards in the game. Doss is averaging 131.4 all-purpose yards so far this season.

- In the game, quarterback Ben Chappell surpassed the 2,000 passing yard mark in his career and the 1,000-yard mark for the season. He now has 2,169 passing yards in his career and 1,154 on the season. Chappell completed passes to seven targets on the game, and six Hoosiers recorded more than one grab.

- Chris Adkins registered his first career interception in the third quarter. The pick was the sixth of the year for the Hoosiers, matching the team's total from last season.

- Redshirt sophomore Matt Ernest scored his first career touchdown as time expired, hauling in a six-yard touchdown pass from Ben Chappell. The final drive put the Hoosiers up to 210 yards passing in the game, marking the first time this season a team has eclipsed the 200-yard mark against the Ohio State defense.

- 51,500 people attended the game, the largest crowd since Oct. 22, 2005, against Ohio State.

- Redshirt freshman running back Darius Willis made his first career start for the Hoosiers. Sophomore wide receiver Damarlo Belcher posted his first start of the season and the third of his career as the Hoosiers started four wide receivers for the first time in 2009.

- Middle linebacker Matt Mayberry has now registered 17 straight starts on the defensive side of the ball, while teammate Jammie Kirlaw made his 10th straight start on the defensive line for the Hoosiers.

- Indiana's game captains for the contest were Rodger Saffold, Ben Chappell, Jammie Kirlaw and Will Patterson.

- Indiana won the toss for the third time this season and elected to defer. The Hoosiers have won all three coin tosses at home. It is the first time this year that IU has not received the opening kick.

- For the first time this season, the Hoosiers did not score first after receiving the opening kickoff.

- Indiana won the toss for the fourth time this year and elected to receive. The Hoosiers have elected to receive three of the four times that they have won the toss and have received the opening kickoff five times in six games.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Ben Chappell set career highs with 333 yards and three touchdowns in the game. His 333 passing yards are the most since Kellen Lewis threw for 354 against Ball State in 2007. It marked his second career 300-yard game, and he also set a career high with 38 attempts in the contest.

- Jammie Kirlaw forced two fumbles in the game, his first career contest with two forced fumbles. He now has five forced fumbles on the season. Kirlaw also recorded nine solo tackles and a sack in the game. One of his forced fumbles was recorded a sack, giving him 5.5 on the year and 22.0 for his career. He is tied with Greg Farrall (1988-91) for fourth on the career list.

- Tandon Doss set a career high with 130 receiving yards in the game, including a 40-yard TD catch from Ben Chappell. Doss finished the game with seven catches. He has led the team in catches and receiving yards in every game this year. He has 48 catches for 676 yards and two touchdowns on the season.

- Doss added 10 yards rushing and 25 yards in the return game, putting his total all-purpose yards at 165. The total marks the fourth straight game that Doss has eclipsed 100 all-purpose yards, and it is the fifth time on the season he has hit triple figures.

- Damarlo Belcher matched a career best with six grabs in the game, totaling 91 yards and scoring on a 29-yard catch-and-run at the end of the first half. It was his second touchdown of the season and the fourth of his career.

- The Hoosiers bounced back from a pair of lopsided losses with Saturday's 27-14 victory. The Fighting Illini won the 2008 meeting 55-13 and Virginia bounced the Hoosiers 47-7 last week in Charlottesville.

- Ben Chappell's 333 yards passing, combined with the 149 yards the Hoosiers earned on the ground, put Indiana at a total of 482 yards, the most since the Central Michigan (Nov. 1) game in 2008.

- Matt Mayberry led the team with a career-high 14 tackles. He was one of three Hoosiers to tally double-digit tackles, as Austin Thomas and Tyler Replogle each had 10.

- Indiana's three forced fumbles and three takeaways on fumbles were the most since the Hoosiers forced five and recovered three against Wisconsin in 2008. Max Dedmond, Larry Black, Jr., and Ray Fisher each recorded their first career fumble recovery.

- Senior tight end Troy Wagner is known more for his run blocking abilities, but he showed he can work on the receiving end too. The O'Fallon, Ill., native caught two passes for a career-high 37 yards, including a diving, 13-yard TD to put the Hoosiers up 27-7. It was the first career TD for Wagner, who entered the game with just three career catches.

- Seven Hoosier players recorded a total of six tackles for loss in the game. Indiana now has 51 TFLs on the season. IU also had two sacks, meaning that the Hoosiers have had at least two sacks and six tackles for loss in every game this year.

- Indiana held Illinois to just one red zone score on four tries. The Hoosiers stopped a fourth quarter drive when Jammie Kirlaw forced a Juice Williams fumble on the Indiana 6-yard line.

- True freshman Adam Replogle and redshirt freshman Larry Black, Jr., shared a sack halting an Illinois drive late in the second quarter. Both defensive tackles now have 1.5 sacks on the season.

- Mitchell Evans took 11 snaps at quarterback for the Hoosiers. The junior ran the ball nine times for 88 yards out of the Wildcat formation, a career high in both categories. He took three other snaps at QB, throwing two incompletions and kicking a pooch punt. The punt resulted in an Illinois fumble and gave Indiana the ball inside the 20.

- Indiana held the ball for 11:24 in the opening quarter, the fifth time this year that the Hoosiers have totaled 10:52 or more time of possession in the first.

- Both of the Hoosiers' first two drives were over 10 plays, with the second drive of the game taking 7:02. IU has 14 drives of 10 plays or more and nine drives that have eaten up five minutes of clock or more.

- Fifth-year senior Collin Taylor made his first career start for the Hoosiers, lining up as a nickel back. Taylor finished the game with a career-high five tackles, all solos.

- Indiana lost the opening toss for the third time this season and the first time at home. The Fighting Illini elected to defer, meaning that the Hoosiers have received the opening kickoff in six of the seven games this year.

POSTGAME NOTES

- This marks the sixth straight game in the IU-NU series that has come down to a single score. The last six games against the Wildcats have been decided by a total of 23 points.
- Ray Fisher's 93-yard kickoff return for a TD in the second quarter was the senior's second KOR for a touchdown this year, joining a 91-yarder at Akron. It was the longest kickoff return by a Hoosier since Marcus Thigpen ran one back 98 yards against Illinois in 2006.
- Fisher is also the second Hoosier, joining Thigpen (three in 2006), to have more than one kickoff return for a score in a single season.
- With the 93-yard return and an 8-yarder just before the end of the game, Fisher moved into IU's top 10 in single-season kick return yards in school history. He now has 610 kick return yards on the season, placing him sixth on the Hoosiers' single-season list.
- When Darius Willis rumbled 70 yards on IU's first play, it marked the first time that the Hoosiers have scored on the first play from scrimmage since Nov. 6, 2004, when Matt LoVecchio found Jahkeen Gilmore for an 80-yard TD at Illinois.
- Willis' 70-yard run was his second TD run of 70 yards or more this season, joining an 85-yard run at Michigan. He is the second Hoosier in as many years to accomplish that feat, as Marcus Thigpen had TD runs of 78 and 77 yards in 2008.
- The redshirt freshman finished with 103 yards on 14 carries for his second career 100-yard game (152 vs. Michigan). The Indianapolis native added two touchdowns for his second career two-score contest. He now has five rushing touchdowns on the year.
- Fisher also posted a 35-yard punt return in the first quarter, the longest of the senior's career. Fisher's return gave IU the ball at the Northwestern 28, setting up a six-play touchdown drive that resulted in a 1-yard plunge for Chappell, his fifth career TD run and second of the year.
- Ironically, Willis' quick strike run damaged Indiana's first quarter possession numbers this year. The Hoosiers had held the ball in the first quarter for 10:52 or more five times this season, and partially as a result of Willis' run, IU only had the ball for 9:22 in the opening stanza. Indiana has averaged 53.1 yards on the first drive on its six games.
- Matt Mayberry had his seventh straight conference game with 10-plus tackles, finishing with 13 tackles against NU. He added two tackles for loss and also recorded his first career interception in the third quarter, picking off a Mike Kafka pass.
- Austin Thomas added an interception later in the frame for his third interception of the season and the sixth of his career. Four of his six career picks have come against Northwestern, as he had two in last year's 21-19 win at Memorial Stadium and one at Northwestern in 2007. Thomas has 115 interception return yards on his three picks.
- The Hoosiers finished with three picks in the game as Nick Polk added his first interception of the season and fourth of his career. IU now has nine interceptions on the year and 18 takeaways on the season.
- With 16 completions in the game, Ben Chappell moved into ninth place on the Hoosiers' single-season list with 165.
- The 28 points scored in the first half is the most by the Hoosiers since they put up 31 at Western Michigan on Sept. 8, 2007.
- On the final play of the third quarter, Chappell rumbled for a 22-yard run, the longest of his career.
- Tandon Doss hauled in six passes in the game to move his season total to 54, which ties him for eighth on the IU single-season list. He has led the Hoosiers in receptions in each game this year. His 40 receiving yards marked his fewest in a game this year.
- Troy Wagner had two receptions for 23 yards in the game to match his career high - set last week against Illinois - in receptions.
- Mitchell Evans took 12 snaps at quarterback - seven were rushes, one was a pass and four times he handed the ball off.
- Indiana lost the coin toss for the fourth time this season and the third time on the road. Northwestern elected to defer, though, giving the Hoosiers the opening kickoff for the seventh time in eight games this year.
- Indiana's game captains were Ben Chappell, Matt Mayberry, Austin Thomas and Mitchell Evans.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Indiana's five interceptions are the second-most in a single game in school history. The Hoosiers picked off six passes at Minnesota on Nov. 10, 1945. IU last had five picks against Kentucky on Sept. 20, 1969.

- The Hoosiers forced six turnovers in the game, the most since forcing seven at Oregon on Sept. 11, 2004. The Hoosiers have forced three or more turnovers five times this season, four TOs on two occasions and five miscues twice. Indiana has forced a turnover in eight of its nine games on the season.

- IU has three multi-INT games this year, including at least three picks in back-to-back contests (three at Northwestern). Indiana also picked off four passes at Akron.

- Indiana has held the lead at the end of the first half and at the end of the third quarter in all three Big Ten road games this season. It marks the first time that the Hoosiers have held a halftime lead in three conference road games since 1994.

- Indiana lost the coin toss for the fifth time this season and the fourth time on the road. Iowa elected to defer, though, giving the Hoosiers the opening kickoff for the eighth time in nine games this year. The Hoosiers capitalized, as the first drive of the game for Indiana went 69 yards on 11 plays, using 5:01. Five times after receiving the opening kick this year, the Hoosiers have posted a 10-plus play drive. On four occasions, that drive has lasted more than five minutes.

- Overall, Indiana has 16 drives of 10-plus plays on the season, bettering the team's 2008 total of 15. The Hoosiers also have 11 drives of five-plus minutes, far surpassing the total of four such drives in 2008. All 11 of the five-plus minute drives have taken at least 10 plays.

- Senior safety Collin Taylor had a career day, recording his first two career interceptions in the game. The former walk-on added a forced fumble on a Hawkeye punt return to set up Indiana's third score. He also had a career-best seven tackles in the game.

- Redshirt freshman Darius Willis scored his sixth career touchdown at the 9:59 mark in the first quarter, capping a drive in which he ran 35 yards on six carries. Indiana's second score of the game, a 16-yard touchdown pass from junior Ben Chappell to junior Mitchell Evans, was the second touchdown catch of Evans' career.

- Adam Replogle had a career day at Iowa, posting a career-best seven tackles, 2.5 TFLs and 1.5 sacks in the game. His brother, Tyler, also had seven tackles and a half-sack.

- Sophomore Damarlo Belcher collected his third touchdown of the season with nine seconds remaining in the second quarter to push the Hoosiers' lead to 21-7. It marked Ben Chappell's fourth two-touchdown game this season. Belcher matched his career high with six catches and had 89 yards receiving.

- Chappell finished with 227 yards passing, his fifth 200-yard game of the season. Chappell now has 3,069 passing yards in his career and 2,054 on the season. He is the 12th player in school history with more than 3,000 career passing yards and the 12th player with over 2,000 yards in a single season. His 41 attempts at Iowa marked a career high.

- Austin Thomas picked off Ricky Stanzi with 12:11 to go in the third quarter. It was the senior safety's second INT in two weeks, his team-leading fourth pick of the season and the seventh of his career. Sophomore cornerback Donnell Jones snared his second career interception and his first this season in the third quarter, while senior Matt Mayberry added his second career INT and his second in as many weeks later in the same stanza.

- With his five receptions, Tandon Doss now has 59 on the season, tied with Courtney Roby (2002) for fourth on the school's all-time list. Doss leads the team with 751 yards on the year.

- The Hoosiers recorded three sacks on the game and the team now has 21 on the season. Indiana has at least two sacks in eight contests and at least three sacks in four ballgames this season. Matt Mayberry recorded a sack late in the first quarter, moving his season total to 3.5 and his career total to 8.5. Larry Black, Jr., had a tackle for loss for the Hoosiers and posted two QB hurries as well.

- Senior defensive end Jammie Kirlaw recovered the fumble Collin Taylor forced at the end of the first half. He now has three fumble recoveries on the season and six in his career.

- Redshirt freshman kicker Nick Freeland hit a 37-yarder with 2:05 left in the third quarter to put the Hoosiers in front 24-14. He now has 12 field goals on the season and moved into a share of ninth place on IU's single-season list.

- A pair of Hoosiers recorded other firsts in the game. Senior Charlie Klingensmith recorded his first career punt in the second quarter, and the boot that carried inside the 10 resulted in an Iowa fumble that gave the Hoosiers deep in Hawkeye territory. Junior cornerback Adrian Burks made his first career start, making three tackles in the game.

- Linebacker Matt Mayberry, safety Austin Thomas, defensive end Jammie Kirlaw and left tackle Rodger Saffold served as Indiana's game captains. Mayberry and Thomas are captains for the second straight week and the fourth and third times this year, respectively. Kirlaw earned his fourth honor and Saffold his third accolade in 2009.

POSTGAME NOTES

- Tandon Doss caught TDs of 11 and 46 yards in the first half for his first career two-score game. He now has four scores on the year and five in his career. He is the first Hoosier receiver with two TD grabs in a game since James Hardy had two scores at Northwestern on Oct. 10, 2007. The 46-yarder was the longest TD grab of the sophomore's career.

- Doss filled in for the injured Ray Fisher on kickoff and punt returns in the game and had career-long returns in both. His 33-yard KR in the second quarter and 21-yard PR in the third were both bests for the sophomore. He added 92 receiving yards for a career-best 207 all-purpose yards. It is the seventh time this season and the sixth time in the last seven games that he has surpassed 100 APY. It is the first time in his career that Doss has eclipsed 200 APY.

- Doss finished with six receptions for 92 yards, and moved into 3rd place on the Hoosiers' single-season receptions list with 65. He now has 843 receiving yards on the year to move into seventh place on that list as well.

- Chappell's three touchdown passes give him 13 on the season and marked his fifth multi-TD game this season. He had three TD tosses one other time this year, against Illinois on Oct. 17.

- The junior went 25-for-35 for 323 yards in the contest. He has 213 completions (third), 338 attempts (eighth) and 2377 yards (fifth) to go along with his 13 TDs (T-sixth). He is in the Hoosiers' top 10 on the single-season list in every category. He also moved into 10th place on the school's career passing yards list, as his 3,392 yards are 10th in IU history.

- His 323 yards marked his third 300-yard game of the season and the third of his career. He joins Kellen Lewis (four) and Steve Bradley (three) as the only QBs in school history to throw for 300 yards three times in their career. He now has six 200-yard games on the year and seven in his career.

- Chappell hit eight different receivers in the game, with five targets catching more than one ball. Doss, Terrance Turner and Damarlo Belcher all had five or more catches in the game.

- Trea Burgess scored his third touchdown of the season at the 4:01 mark in the fourth quarter. It was his first trip into the end zone since he scored at Akron on Sept. 19.

- Terrance Turner had a career day for the Hoosiers, as the redshirt junior grabbed his first career touchdown in the fourth quarter. Turner finished with career highs in receptions (six) and yards (68).

- The Hoosiers went for it on fourth down three times in the game, converting on each attempt. The third attempt resulted in a Trea Burgess 2-yard touchdown plunge.

- IU had three drives of 10 plays after halftime, giving them 19 drives of 10 plays or more this season.

- Will Patterson led the Hoosiers in tackles on the day with 10, including a tackle for loss. Nick Polk and Tyler Replogle each had nine stops, with Polk recording nine solo hits.

- With Wisconsin's muffed punt in the first quarter, the Hoosiers have now recorded a takeaway in four straight weeks and in nine of the 10 games this year. Collin Taylor recovered the fumble for his first career fumble recovery. Taylor has been a part of four turnovers in the last two games, as he had two interceptions and a forced fumble against Iowa.

- The 386 yards of offense accrued by IU in the game marked the third most given up by the Badgers this year and the fourth-highest total for the Hoosiers on the season.

- The Hoosiers were penalized just four times on the day for a season-low 27 yards.

- Adam Replogle made his first career appearance on the offensive side of the ball, lining up at fullback three times late in the game. He served as lead blocker for two Trea Burgess carries, including the junior's two-yard TD run in the fourth quarter.

- Bryan Payton made the most of his opportunities, as the fifth-year senior ran for 48 yards on eight carries after Willis suffered an injury.

- Nick Freeland hit all four of his extra-point attempts in the game, improving to 29-for-29 on the season. He is just two PATs away from entering this school's top 10 in a single season.

- Indiana scored first for the eighth time in 10 games this season. It marked the first time that the Hoosiers have opened the scoring when their opponents started with the ball.

- Indiana won the opening toss for the fifth time this season and the fourth time at home. The Hoosiers elected to defer for just the second time this year, giving the Badgers the ball to start the game.

- Indiana's game captains were seniors Rodger Saffold, Matt Mayberry and Collin Taylor as well as junior Ben Chappell. Mayberry has been a captain five times, while Saffold and Chappell have been captain four times each. Taylor was captain for the first time. Mayberry is a captain for the third straight week, while it is the second straight captaincy for Saffold.
