Bob Babb is entering his 24th season as head coach of the Blue Jay baseball team. During his tenure at Homewood, the Blue Jays have captured 10 Middle Atlantic Conference Southeast League titles, seven UAA titles, five Centennial Conference championships, and made a total of 10 NCAA Division III Tournament appearances.

In 1989, the Blue Jays had their most successful postseason ever, finishing with a 34-7 record and taking third place at the NCAA Division III World Series. In 1998, Babb guided the Blue Jays to a school-record 36 wins against just four losses. During the 1998 season, Hopkins was ranked as high as fourth in the nation during the regular season, won the Centennial Conference and UAA Championships, and was the top seed in the 1998 NCAA III Mid-Atlantic Regional. Last season, Babb's team earned a fifth Centennial Conference Championship and won 25 or more games for the 10th consecutive season, finishing with a 35-9 record and a trip to the NCAA Regional. He has led the Blue Jays to eight seasons with at least 30 wins, including a combined mark of 68-23 (.747) over the last two years.

In addition to ranking as the all-time winningest coach in school history (615-240-8), Babb has also left his mark on the national record books. He enters the 2003 season ranked ninth among all active NCAA Division III coaches in winning percentage and 14th among all active NCAA Division III coaches in victories. Last season, Babb became the 14th active coach in Division III to win 600 career games with a 4-1 win over Franklin & Marshall on April 6.

During his tenure, Babb has coached five first-team All-Americans, and seven of his players have gone on to play professionally. He was inducted into the Johns Hopkins Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 1996.

Babb played baseball at Hopkins for four years from 1974 to 1977. The 1976 squad participated in the first NCAA Division III Championship Tournament. The 1977 team won the Middle Atlantic Southeast title in the second year of the conference. Babb is still listed among the all-time leaders at Hopkins in doubles and stolen bases.

A 1977 graduate of Johns Hopkins, Babb then taught social studies for two years at Lansdowne Senior High School. During this time, he served as assistant baseball and football coach at Hopkins under Denny Cox. In 1980, he received his master's degree from Morgan State and also became the head baseball coach at JHU. Babb was an assistant football coach at JHU from 1977 through 1998, having coached current head coach Jim Margraff. Additionally, Babb has been the director of the Johns Hopkins University Summer Day Camp since 1982. He currently serves on the NCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional Baseball Committee. He and his wife, Gilly, live in Baltimore with their children, Gillian (13), Olivia (10), and Andrew (6).

2003 Season Preview

Coming off back-to-back Centennial Conference Championships and NCAA Tournament appearances, the Johns Hopkins baseball team enters the 2003 season with expectations of another highly successful year. After finishing the 2002 season ranked 21st with a 35-9 overall record and a 16-2 conference mark, the Blue Jays are ranked 24th in the 2003 ABCA/Collegiate Baseball Preseason Poll. Hopkins ranks 13th among Division III schools in winning percentage (.722, 375-144-1) since the start of the 1990 season and 16th in total wins. In the last two years, JHU has posted a 68-23 (.747) record, including a 29-7 (.805) mark in Centennial games.

While Hopkins loses several key performers, including four All-Centennial selections from last season's squad, head coach **Bob Babb** returns 16 position players with starting experience and six pitchers who saw action in three or more games. "This is probably the deepest 30-man roster and easily the strongest team I've ever had," Babb states. "I will end up playing a lot of people this spring and I expect a lot of players to make impacts."

Entering his 24th season at JHU, Babb ranks ninth among active NCAA Division III head coaches in winning percentage (.717) and sports a 615-240-8 career record. He earned his 600th career victory last season with a 4-1 win over Franklin & Marshall in the opening game of a doubleheader on April 6, 2002.

Under Babb, the Blue Jays have captured 10 Middle Atlantic Conference Southeast League Titles, seven UAA titles, five Centennial Conference Championships, and made 10 NCAA Division III Tournament appearances.

After setting the school record with 57 home runs and posting a combined .341 average, the offense is once again expected to be the team's strength in 2003. Babb says, "This is the most power we've had in my tenure. We hit 40 home runs during the fall season, while the most we hit in any previous year was 15." The Blue Jays return nine players who hit three or more home runs and 10 players that batted .333 or better. Last season, JHU averaged 9.09 runs per game and scored 10 or more runs in 16 games.

Leading the offense and a talented group of outfielders will be senior co-captain **Joe Urban**. Urban, who will start in right field, batted .369 in 36 games last year and totaled five home runs with 34 runs batted in. He also registered 35 runs scored, posted a .475 on-base percentage, and was fifth on the team with a .586 slugging percentage. Urban possesses tremendous power (12 career home runs), has an outstanding arm and is a solid baserunner.

Returning to start opposite Urban in left field is junior **Craig Cetta**. Cetta had a breakthrough season in 2002 as he started 37 games and led the team with 10 doubles, 47 hits and 39 RBIs. A Second-Team All-Centennial selection, he batted .356 in 132 at-bats and was third on the team with nine stolen bases. In addition to being one of the team's top run producers, Cetta is a solid defensive player with good baserunning skills.

Sophomore **Paul Winterling** is the leading candidate to start in center field. Winterling started seven games and batted .359 in 39 at-bats. He also totaled 10 runs, one home run and 12 runs batted in. Winterling has the potential to be an outstanding player with five-tool skills. He gets the best jump on the ball of all the outfielders and is one of the fastest players on the team.

Senior **Jay Cieri**, who earned Second-Team All-Centennial honors last year, is expected to get the starting nod at designated hitter. Cieri started 32 games in 2002 and batted .354 in 99 at-bats with a team-high 30 walks and a .508 on-base percentage. He also belted five home runs and was fourth on the team with 35 runs scored.

Junior **Brian Morley** could also see time in the starting outfield or the designated hitter. Morley played in 23 games making 10 starts and batted .373 with 19 hits in 51 at-bats. He hit four home runs and collected 14 runs scored and 13 runs batted in. Morley, who has improved his defensive skills, can play all three outfield positions and is slated to be the team's emergency catcher.

Joining the competition for playing time in the outfield will be senior **T.W. Bruno**, junior **Rob Morrison** and sophomores **Eric Nigro** and **Dave Montegari**.

Last season, Morrison saw the most time playing time as he played in 27 games. He scored 24 runs while adding three home runs and nine RBIs in 61 at-bats. He is a solid defensive player, adds some left-handed power and is a key pinch runner.

Bruno, Nigro, and Montegari all saw limited action a year ago, but could see their roles increased in 2003. Bruno played in just two games before suffering a shoulder injury. He may be the fastest player on the team and is one of JHU's best bunters.

Nigro played in eight games and was 4-for-15 with two runs and two runs batted in, but was the leading hitter for the Blue Jays during the fall season. He can hit for average or power and runs well.

Montegari saw time as a designated hitter and as a pitcher a year ago. He recorded a 4.50 ERA with four strikeouts in four innings on the mound, while going 3-for-9 with two home runs and four RBIs at the plate. Montegari's tremendous power will earn him more at-bats this spring. Babb says, "he possesses the best outfield arm of any player I've had at Hopkins."

The infield will be strong with the return of six significant contributors. Junior **Carl Ippolito**, a First Team All-Centennial performer in 2002, started all 36 games in which he played and batted .333 with 36 runs scored and 38 runs batted in. He belted five home runs while adding eight doubles, three triples and five stolen bases. Ippolito, who had elbow surgery in the fall, is expected to start at shortstop, but can also play second base and third base.

Coming off an exceptional freshman season, sophomore **Mike Durgala** will start at first base after playing third base a year ago. He was second on the team with a .412 average as he collected 33 hits in 80 at-bats. Durgala crushed four home runs and added six doubles while driving in 21 runs. The strongest Blue Jay in the weight room, Durgala is a nice target at first base with good hands.

Junior **Tim Casale** is expected to replace Karl Sineath at second base, while sophomore

Paul Long will take over at third base. Casale, who had an excellent fall season, has played in 64 games the last two seasons with 31 starts as a second baseman and shortstop. He batted .277 last year with 21 runs, 10 RBIs and 10 stolen bases. Casale is an excellent defensive player and has continued to improve at the plate.

Long, who is an exceptional athlete, could develop into an outstanding player for the Blue Jays. As a freshman he saw action in eight games with four starts and batted .353 with six hits in 17 at-bats. He scored five runs while adding one home run and five runs batted in.

Adding power and depth to first base are juniors **Mike Stankus** and **Sven Stafford**. Stafford, who doubles as JHU's top relief pitcher, played in 16 games in the field and batted .366 with 15 hits in 41 at-bats. He hit five home runs and totaled nine runs and 15 RBIs. Stankus saw action in 20 games and belted four home runs with seven runs batted in.

Sophomore **Mike Spiciarich** and freshman **Gary Rosenberg** will compete for playing in the infield. Spiciarich is a versatile player who could see time at second base, shortstop and third base. He was 3-for-6 in six games last year, but will see increased playing time in 2003. Spiciarich improved his strength in the offseason and is also a solid defensive player.

Rosenberg may be the best pure hitter on the team and is steady as a third baseman. Babb says, "He may have the quickest bat of any player I've ever had." Rosenberg was the only Blue Jay that did not strikeout during the fall season.

Splitting time behind the plate will be juniors **Doug Hitchner** and **Bryan Eberle**. The best defensive catcher on the team, Hitchner started 20 games and batted .364 with 24 hits in 66 at-bats last year. He hit two home runs, drove in 21 runs and did not commit an error in 101 total chances. Hitchner continues to improve as an offensive player.

Eberle, who had a breakthrough fall, possesses the strongest arm of the catchers. He has displayed good quickness and has improved his power at the plate. Eberle started seven games and collected four hits with one home run, five runs scored and two RBIs.

Sophomore **Brian Harris** will also compete for playing time behind the plate after belting five home runs this fall and improving defensively. Morley and Winterling have the ability to fill in behind the dish if needed.

The Blue Jays lost several key performers from a pitching staff that posted a 3.44 earned run average and limited opponents to a combined batting average of .228. Included among the departures are two-time All-American Yani Rosenberg and Jason Setty, who posted an 18-2 career record. Babb stated, "we will have nice pitching depth, but we lack a proven stopper like Yani Rosenberg or Scott Orlovsky." He added, "I'm hoping someone will step up and become that stopper."

Senior co-captain **Jeremy Brown** has the potential to be the dominant starter the Blue Jays need. Brown, who appears to be fully recovered from an elbow injury that shortened his sophomore season, is a fiery competitor on the mound who always wants the ball. Last season he posted a 5-1 mark with a 4.45 ERA in nine starts and 12 games overall. Brown was second on the team with 46 strikeouts in 54.2 innings and allowed an opponent's average of .238. He also registered two complete games, one save and one shutout. Brown pitched six strong innings to earn the win against Kean in the NCAA Regional Tournament last year.

Returning to join Brown in the rotation are juniors **Matt Righter** and **Russ Berger**. Righter made four starts in 14 appearances and was 3-2 with a 3.35 ERA. He recorded one complete game, one save and 21 strikeouts in 37.2 innings pitched. Righter continued to improve towards the end of the 2002 season and has the potential to be a top starter for Hopkins. Also a member of the JHU basketball team, Righter might join the team late depending on when the basketball season ends.

Berger pitched in 11 games overall and made nine starts. He went 4-2 with a 3.91 ERA while totaling 28 strikeouts in 48.1 innings. Berger possesses outstanding control with a variety of pitches and is always in control on the mound. He increased his velocity this fall and is ready to make the next step to become a great pitcher.

Three players return with experience out of the bullpen. Stafford, Montegari and sophomore **Jason Hochfelder** combined for a 3-0 record and 24 relief appearances.

Stafford, the team's closer, has outstanding velocity on his fastball and excellent control. In 12 appearances and 16.1 innings last season, he recorded a 0.55 ERA with 16 strikeouts while allowing just seven hits and a .125 combined average. Stafford, who continues to improve his strength, could also see time as a midweek starter.

Hochfelder pitched in nine games and posted a 1.35 ERA in 13.1 innings. He gave up just seven hits while striking out seven batters. Montegari made three relief appearances and allowed only one hit in four innings. He struck out four batters and registered a 4.50 ERA.

Sophomore **Ryan McConnell** and freshmen **Tim Denning**, **Jim Flannery**, **Andrew Bail** and **Jason Thayer** will get a chance to contribute immediately on the mound. McConnell, a transfer from Division II Millersville University, went 2-3 with a 4.66 ERA and 23 strikeouts in 29 innings last year.

Denning has a lot of potential, but is still rehabbing after suffering a shoulder injury during the summer. He pitched well in two appearances during the fall season.

Flannery was one of the team's best pitchers in the fall and is a tough competitor. He possesses good movement on his fastball with excellent quickness.

Bail could see time as a spot starter or out of the bullpen. He has good control, great poise, and knows how to set the hitters up. Bail and Flannery, both lefties, give Babb more moves out of the bullpen. Thayer was very impressive in the fall and will battle for a spot in the starting rotation. He was a member of Team Maryland last spring featuring the top players in the state.

In addition to a tough Centennial slate, the Blue Jays are scheduled to face five teams ranked in the 2003 ABCA/Collegiate Baseball Preseason Top 30. Hopkins opens at No. 29 Salisbury, hosts third-ranked College of New Jersey and No. 20 York College, and faces No. 19 Lakeland and No. 5 Wooster during its trip to Ft. Myers, Florida.

2002 Season Review

Blue Jays Continue Successful Tradition: The Johns Hopkins baseball team concluded another outstanding year with a 35-9 record, just one win shy of the school record, and a second straight Centennial Conference Championship with a 16-2 conference mark. The conference title was JHU's fifth overall and sent the Blue Jays to their fourth NCAA Tournament in the last six years and 11th overall.

• 30-Win Plateau: Hopkins defeated Muhlenberg, 14-3, April 27 to reach the 30-win mark for the second straight year and the eighth time in school history. JHU's 35 wins were just one shy of the school-record set by the 1998 squad, which posted a 36-4 mark. The Blue Jays also extended their streak of consecutive 25-win seasons to 11. • Babb Reaches 600 Wins: Head coach **Bob Babb** picked up his 600th and 601st career victories as JHU swept a doubleheader against Franklin & Marshall April 6. He became the 14th active Division III head coach to win 600 games and currently sports a 615-240-8 (.717) career record in 23 seasons at Hopkins. Under Babb's guidance, the Blue Jays have captured 10 Middle Atlantic Conference South-east League titles, seven UAA titles, five Centennial Conference Championships, and made 10 NCAA Division III Tournament appearances. • Strength in Numbers: A strength for Hopkins all season was its depth. In all, 25 players saw action in the field and 12 took the mound. For the season, 23 players scored a run, 22 recorded a hit, and 21 drove in at least one run. Fifteen players drove in 10 or more runs, while 13 players scored 10 or more runs. Eight pitchers started at least two games, while 11 pitchers saw action in six or more games.

• Power Surge: Sophomore **Sven Stafford** belted two home runs, his fourth and fifth of the year, in the regular season finale against York to give Hopkins a school-record 57 in 44 games. The Blue Jays averaged 1.29 home runs per game to shatter the school-record of 45 set during the 1998 season. Eighteen players hit a home run and 11 smashed three or more round-trippers. **Ben Taylor** led the team with six homers, while **Stafford**, **Joe Urban**, **Jay Cieri**, and **Carl Ippolito** each belted five home runs.

• Scoring in Bunches: The Blue Jays scored 400 runs in 44 games for an average of 9.09 runs per game. Hopkins scored 10 or more runs in 16 games and scored four or more runs in an inning 25 times. JHU scored a season-high 27 runs against Robert Morris, the most since a 30-0 win over Dickinson in 1987, and also scored 20 or more runs versus Dickinson (20-2) and Gettysburg (22-4). Last season, the Blue Jays averaged 7.02 runs per game for a total of 330 runs.

• Home Sweet Home: JHU finished the regular season with an 18-3 record at home, including a 10-0 mark against Centennial Conference teams. The Blue Jays went 12-2 at home

last year. Over the last five seasons, Hopkins has posted a 64-16 (.800) when playing on friendly turf.

• Sineath Swipes Records: Senior second baseman **Karl Sineath** led Hopkins with 45 runs scored and 20 stolen bases to become JHU's all-time leader in both categories. Sineath scored three runs against Gettysburg April 24 to break the previous mark of 163 held by John Christ and finished his career with 171. He then stole one base versus Neumann College to set the stolen base record with 98 for his career, breaking Tom Finegan's school-record of 95. Sineath is also tied for second in school history with 185 career hits.

• Rosenberg Sets Strikeout Mark: With nine strikeouts against Muhlenberg April 27, senior **Yani Rosenberg** became the school's all-time strikeout leader, breaking the mark of 241 set by Steve Hand. He finished his career with 260 strikeouts, just the third player in JHU history to strikeout over 200 hitters, and has posted three of the top eight single-season strikeout totals in school history. This season, Rosenberg totaled 72 strikeouts in 71 innings en route to a 9-1 record and a 1.52 ERA. He won 17 straight decisions, the second longest streak in JHU history, during the 2001 and 2002 seasons and ranks third at Hopkins with 28 career wins. Rosenberg also ranks third at JHU in career winning percentage (.875, 28-4).

• Setty Sets Career-High for Wins: With five strong innings against Neumann April 29, senior **Jason Setty** improved to 6-0 for the year and 18-2 (.900) for his career. He allowed just one run on four hits while striking out five batters. Setty's six wins were a career-high and he totaled a career-high 24 strikeouts against just five walks in 34.1 innings.

• Taylor Reaches 100 Runs & RBIs: Senior **Ben Taylor** totaled 27 RBIs and a career-high 41 runs in 2002 to pass the 100-mark in both categories for his career. He is the 10th player in school history to total over 100 career runs and RBIs and finishes with 106 runs and 106 RBIs for his career. Taylor also led the team with six home runs and ranks eighth at Hopkins with 16 career homers.

• Catching Duo Excels At/Behind Plate: After batting a combined .209 (26-for-124) during the 2001 season, the catching duo of senior **Tom Prevas** and sophomore **Doug Hitchner** posted a major turnaround in 2002. Prevas batted .317 (19-for-60) and Hitchner hit .364 (24-for-66) for a combined average of .341 (43-for-126). Hitchner had a team-best 13-game hitting streak during the year and was tied for second on the team with 11 two-out RBIs. Prevas and Hitchner batted a combined .357 (20-for-56) with runners in scoring position and combined for just one error in 259 total chances.

• Ippolito & Cetta Have Breakout Years: Sophomores **Carl Ippolito** and **Craig Cetta** were two of JHU's top players all year long. Ippolito started the year with a bang as he batted .442 (19-for-43) in his first 11 games with 16 runs and 17 runs batted in. He continued to play well and led the team with 12 multiple-RBI games and added 11 multi-hit games. Ippolito finished the year third on the team in hits (42), second in runs batted in (38), third in runs scored (36), while adding eight doubles and five home runs.

Cetta led the club with 39 RBIs and 47 hits, while placing sixth on the team with 33 runs scored. He also added 10 doubles, four home runs, and nine stolen bases. Cetta was second on the team with 13 multiple-hit games and second with 10 multiple-RBI contests.

• Urban Posts Another Solid Season: Junior **Joe Urban**, in his second year as a starter, had another quality campaign in right field. He hit .369 (41-for-111), was third on the team in RBIs (34), fourth in runs (35), and added nine doubles and five home runs. Urban totaled nine multiple-RBI games and nine multiple-run games, while adding 10 multiple-hit games. In 2001, Urban led the team with a .384 average

while adding 29 runs, 35 runs batted in, and seven home runs. He is a .372 hitter for his career and boasts a career slugging percentage of .607.

• Several Players Key to JHU's Depth: A number of players combined to give Hopkins quality depth and solid production throughout the 2002 season. Freshman **Mike Durgala**, who made a combined 18 starts at third base and as the designated hitter, led the Blue Jays in hitting for most of the season before finishing second on the team with a .412 average. He also added 15 runs, four home runs, and 21 runs batted in. Sophomore **Brian Morley** hit .373 (19-for-51) with 14 runs, four home runs, and 13 RBIs, while sophomore **Sven Stafford** belted five home runs and added 15 RBIs.

Sophomore **Tim Casale** made 14 starts in the infield and totaled 21 runs and 10 RBIs, while placing second on the team with 10 stolen bases. Sophomore **Rob Morrison** batted .295 (18-for-61) with 24 runs scored, three home runs, nine runs batted in, and three stolen bases.

• 2002 Centennial Champions: After posting a 16-2 Centennial record and earning the top seed in the conference tournament, the Blue Jays defeated Muhlenberg twice for JHU's second straight CC Championship and fifth overall. Hopkins also won the Centennial during the 1994, 1997, 1998, and 2001 seasons. Ursinus is next in the conference with three titles, while Franklin & Marshall has won one CC title. Overall, JHU sports a 125-36 (.776) all-time record in Centennial Conference games to rank first in the league. JHU's Centennial Championship seasons:

• All-Centennial Team: Eight Blue Jays were honored on the 2002 All-Centennial Conference baseball teams. Senior **Yani Rosenberg** highlighted the group as he was named the CC Pitcher of the Year for the second consecutive season. The Blue Jays, winners of their fifth Centennial Conference Championship, placed four players on the first team, two on the second team, and two were named honorable mention.

Rosenberg became the fourth JHU pitcher to win Pitcher of the Year honors in the Centennial Conference in the last six seasons. The last four Centennial Pitchers of the Year have won back-to-back awards, including former Hopkins pitcher Scott Orlovsky in 1997 and 1998. Rosenberg finished the regular season with a team-leading 9-1 record and a 1.52 ERA. He led the team in starts (10), complete games (4), innings pitched (71.0), and strikeouts (72). In addition, Rosenberg allowed just 43 hits and 15 walks, while holding opponents to a .169 batting average.

Joining Rosenberg on the first team were seniors **Karl Sineath** and **Mike DePalma**, and sophomore **Carl Ippolito**. Sineath earned first team honors for the second straight season after earning second team honors his sophomore season. He led the club with a career-high 45 runs scored, while also leading the team with 20 stolen bases. In the process, Sineath became JHU's all-time leader in runs scored with 171 and stolen bases with 98.

DePalma earned Centennial honors for the third time in his career after being named to the second team in 2000 and honorable mention last year. Despite missing some time due to injury, DePalma led the team in batting (.449) and totaled 40 hits and 28 runs scored. He added 19 runs batted in and reached the 90-run mark for his career. Ippolito, in his first year as a starter, excelled at shortstop as he batted .333 and was third on the team with 42 hits in 126 at-bats. He also led the squad in triples (3), was second with 38 RBIs, third in runs scored (36), and added eight doubles and five home runs.

Sophomore **Craig Cetta** and junior **Jay Cieri** both

earned Centennial honors for the first time as they were named to the second team. Cetta batted .356 and led the team with 47 hits, 39 runs batted in, and 10 doubles. He also finished sixth on the team with 33 runs scored and added four home runs and nine stolen bases. Cieri batted .354 and was fifth on the team in runs scored (35) and RBIs (24). He added a team-leading 30 walks, led the club with a .508 on-base percentage, and added nine doubles and five home runs.

Senior **John Krivonak** and sophomore **Doug Hitchner** were each named honorable mention following productive seasons. Krivonak totaled career-highs in batting average (.340), hits (34), and runs batted in (19). He added 17 runs, six doubles, and posted a .456 on-base percentage. Hitchner batted (.364) and was tied for sixth in runs batted in (21). He also totaled four home runs, two doubles, and did not commit an error in 101 chances behind the plate.

The Blue Jays, 125-36 (.776) all-time in Centennial Conference games, have had 30 first-team All-Centennial selections over the last nine seasons, including eight in the last two years.

~ Since the start of the 1990 season, Hopkins has posted a 375-144-1 (.722) record. Entering the season, the Blue Jays ranked 17th in Division III for the most wins since 1990, and 14th in winning percentage since 1990.

~ JHU drove in 128 runs with two outs compared to 62 for the opponents. Sophomore **Craig Cetta** led the club with 15 two-out RBIs, while senior **Ben Taylor** and sophomores **Carl Ippolito** and **Doug Hitchner** each totaled 11 two-out RBIs and juniors **Joe Urban** and **Jay Cieri** both added 10. Blue Jay batters combined to hit .333 (160-for-480) with two outs, while Hopkins pitchers held opponents to just a combined .217 (95-for-437) average with two men down.

~ Senior **Mike DePalma** finished the season on an eight-game hitting streak. During that stretch, he batted .548 (17-for-31) with 10 runs and six RBIs. DePalma raised his average to a team-best .449 and finishes his career with a .364 (138-for-379) average.

~ Of his team-leading 47 hits, **Craig Cetta** smacked 23 with runners in scoring position. He was 6-for-7 with the bases loaded and batted .404 (23-for-57) with runners in scoring position. He also led the team with 22 hits and 21 RBIs in Centennial games.

~ The Blue Jays outscored opponents in every inning, with the largest margins in the first (70-21), third (70-26), and sixth (76-31) innings. Hopkins outscored opponents 400-to-187 for the season, or an average of 4.84 runs per game.

~ In 21.1 career innings pitched, sophomore **Sven Stafford** has allowed just two earned runs and nine hits while striking out 21. ~ Sophomore **Matt Righter** finished the season on a high note as he allowed just one run in his last five appearances while striking out six in 8.2 innings. He pitched in 14 games, making four starts, and was fifth on the team with a 3.35 ERA. He recorded one complete game and one save while holding opponents to a combined .231 average. Righter performed better in relief as he allowed just 11 hits and posted a 0.49 ERA in 18.1 innings compared to 22 hits and a 6.06 ERA in 19.1 innings as a starter.
