The Team: Johns Hopkins won its final two games to close the 2006 season with an overall record of 5-5. The Blue Jays tied for third place in the Centennial Conference with a league mark of 3-3.

Seniors Bid Farewell: A 48-7 win over McDaniel in the final game of the season brought a close to the careers of the 21 seniors on the 2006 Johns Hopkins football team. This group was instrumental in the success the Blue Jays have enjoyed over the last four years and count the following accomplishments: three Centennial Conference titles, two ECAC Championships, the program's first-ever NCAA Playoff berth and a record of 32-11. The class of 2006 ends its career as the third-winningest class in school history and just the fourth class to amass 30 or more victories.

Lucky Seven: The 48-7 win over McDaniel kept alive JHU's streak of consecutive seasons finishing with a .500 record or better as the Blue Jays have now finished with at least a .500 record in each of the last seven seasons, which ties the school record for the longest such streak. Prior to the current streak, the last time Johns Hopkins posted a .500 record or better for seven straight seasons was from 1967-1973. Since the formation of the football program at Johns Hopkins in 1882 the Blue Jays have never posted a .500 record or better in more than seven consecutive seasons. JHU's current streak of seven straight seasons with a record of .500 or better is the longest in the Centennial Conference. In fact, no other team in the league has finished with a .500 record in even the last two years.

Cardiac Kids: Attending a Johns Hopkins football game was worth the price of admission this season as eight of the team's 10 games were decided in the final three minutes. Below is a look at the eight Johns Hopkins games that were decided in the final moments with key play (s) noted.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 42-13 (.764) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time. Currently, the Blue Jays have won 19 of their last 24 and 25 of their last 32 at home.

November Reign: The victory over McDaniel in the season-finale pushed Johns Hopkins' home winning streak in the month of November to 10 games. During the 10-game winning streak the Blue Jays have outscored the op-

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who is now in his 17th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 107-63-3 (.627). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU has won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .627 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 83-39-1 (.679) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 107 wins. position 323-103. The last team to beat the Blue Jays at home in the month of November was then Western Maryland (41-7) in the regular-season finale in 2000.

Streking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport 41-13 (.759) record. Taking it back further the Blue Jays are 47-16 (.746) since the start of the 2001 season and 52-21 (.712) since the beginning of the 2000 season.

History Lesson: How much more successful have the Blue Jays been in this decade than they were in any other? The 52 wins Hopkins has accumulated in the seven years of this decade are already the second-highest total of any decade in school history and just three behind the record of 55, which was set in the 1990s (55-42-3/.565).

Comeback Kids: The 21-14 win at Randolph-Macon was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays. JHU has nine come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more last year. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Seven's Heaven: For all the different numbers and statistics that can be applied to the Johns Hopkins football team, there has been one simple way to measure the success of the Blue Jays recently. Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 32-6 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 64-4 (.941) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...currently, the Blue Jays have won 51 of their last 53 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less since Margraff arrived for the 1990 season...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Senior WR **Evan Earnest** earned First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America honors. He is the 10th player in school history to earn Academic All-America honors and the fifth fifth to garner first team status. He was joined by senior DL **Brian Nickel** as First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District honorees, while senior DL **Anthony Woodard** and senior OL **Paul Markowski** earned Second Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District status. The Blue Jays have earned 23 Academic All-District selections since 2003.

Star Quality: Johns Hopkins placed 11 players on the 2006 All-Centennial Team, including senior **Ben Scott**, who grabbed first team honors as a punter and place-kicker. The Blue Jays counted a league-high five unanimous first team picks and the seven first team selections the Blue Jays earned are the second-highest total in school history. Repeating as first team selections were Scott (punter), senior DL **Brian Cook**, senior WR **Anthony Triplin** and senior OL **Paul Markowski**.

Player Notes of Interest - Offense

Quarterbacks

Shane Kibbe • Senior

- Played in seven games with four starts. Was 70-of-134 for 695 yards with six touchdowns and three interceptions.
- Closed career with the finest effort of his career as he was 13-of-22 for 177 yards and three touchdowns in the 48-7 season-ending win over McDaniel. Also rushed for 28 yards to account for a career-high 205 yards of total offense.
- Punched up then career-highs of 186 yards of total offense and 167 yards passing at St. Lawrence. Was 22-of-41 for 167 yards and also rushed for a two-yard touchdown.
- Made first career start and led JHU to the come-from-behind win at Randolph-Macon as he was 21-of-36 for 164 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Also rushed four times for 17 yards. Hit Evan Earnest with a 21-yard game-winning touchdown with 43 seconds remaining.

Michael Murray • Freshman

- Played in six games with three starts and was 59-of-103 for 713 yards with five touchdowns and five interceptions. 713 yards passing led the team and are the most by a Hopkins freshman since Scott Cade threw for 945 yards in 1990.
- Efficiently managed the win over Hampden-Sydney as he was 11-of-23 for 150 yards with two touchdowns and one INT. It was the first two-touchdown game of his career.
- Came off the bench at Gettysburg and was 16-of-25 for a career-high 243 yards and one touchdown and also rushed for 26 yards for a personal-best 269 yards of total offense. 243-yard effort is the fifth-best by a JHU freshman and just the seventh 200-yard passing game by a Blue Jay freshman (Jim Margraff-4, Muarry-2, Scott Cade-1)
- Saw the first action of his career against Dickinson as he replaced Shane Kibbe after JHU's first series. Enjoyed a solid debut as he was 15-of-25 for 205 yards with one touchdown and one INT. Hit senior Anthony Triplin on a 63-yard touchdown pass to highlight his effort. 205-yard showing was the first 200-yard passing game by a JHU freshman since 1990.

Adam Waddell - Sophomore

- Played in five games with three starts and was 22-of-42 for 155 yards with one TD and one INT. Also rushed 28 times for 86 yards.
- Returned to action against F&M after missing three games and fueled the win over the Diplomats. Was 14-of-24 for 132 yards with one touchdown and one INT. Also rushed nine times for 33 yards. Completions, attempts and passing yards were career highs and the TD pass was the first of his career.

Running Backs

Greg Chimera • Sophomore

- Played in all 10 games with four starts at fullback. Primarily used as a blocking fullback and had two carries for 10 yards on the year.

Andrew Kase • Freshman

- Played in nine games with four starts and finished second on the team in rushing yards (310). Added 10 receptions for 55 yards and one touchdown and finished fifth on the team with 365 all-purpose yards.
- Scored JHU's lone touchdowns - the first of his career - on a 26-yard reception early in the fourth quarter against Ursinus. Came back with 41 yards on 11 carries in the win over Hampden-Sydney.
- Made it back-to-back 100-yard games with 101 yards on 21 carries and added three receptions for 21 yards in the win over Muhlenberg. Second straight 100-yard game marked the first time in school history a freshman has rushed for more than 100 yards in two straight games.
- Got the first start of his career at Gettysburg and responded by rushing for 113 yards on 25 carries. Named to the Centennial Conference Honor Roll for his efforts.
- Is the eighth freshman to rush for more than 100 yards in a game since Jim Margraff took over in 1990 (the eight players have

combined to do it 12 times). Joins **Hari Lymon** (1992), **Don Zajick** (1994) and **Adam Cook** (2001) as the only freshmen in the Margraff era to rush for more than 100 yards twice.

Mark Nesbitt • Senior

- Played in all 10 games with three starts. Finished third on the team in rushing yards (185) and added 11 receptions for 67 yards and one touchdown. Led the team in kickoff returns (11-207/18.8) and finished fourth on the team with 459 all-purpose yards.
- Rushed five times for 14 yards and scored the game-sealing touchdown on an 11-yard run late in the fourth quarter of the win over Hampden-Sydney.
- Accounted for 104 all-purpose yards in the win over Randolph-Macon as he had 32 yards rushing, 12 yards receiving and 60 yards on three kickoff returns.
- Rushed seven times for 21 yards, added two receptions for 13 yards and one touchdown and had one kickoff return for 18 yards against Rochester. 14-yard touchdown reception drew the Blue Jays to within 13-10 midway through the fourth quarter.
- Ends career with 753 yards rushing and 1,403 all-purpose yards.

Phil Roberts • Junior

- Led the team in rushing with 102 carries for 561 yards and five touchdowns. Added five receptions for 14 yards and finished second on the team with 591 all-purpose yards. Five overall touchdowns were also a team-high.
- Had 62 yards rushing on just two carries in the season-ending win against McDaniel. 59-yard touchdown run late in the third quarter pushed JHU's lead to 41-7 and is the longest run of his career.
- Posted a career-high 162 yards on 25 carries with two TDs against St. Lawrence.
- Rushed for a then career-high 157 yards on 19 carries in the loss to Rochester. 157-yard effort was nearly triple his previous career high (58 vs. Randolph-Macon-2005) and ranks as the second-highest total ever by a JHU running back in a season-opener.
- Just the sixth player in school history (and the first since 1999) to rush for 150 or more yards twice in one season.

Zach Rupert • Senior

- Played in all 10 games as a reserve running back and special teams standout. Rushed seven times for 31 yards and one touchdown in the season-finale against McDaniel. Added five special teams tackles on he year.

Jake Wittenberg • Senior

- Played in eight games with five starts at fullback. Primarily used as a blocking fullback and had one carry for two yards.

Wide Receivers

Evan Earnest • Senior

- First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-American and a Second Team All-Centennial selection. First JHU player to earn First Team Academic All-America honors since Chris Baugh in 1998.
- Enjoyed the finest season of his career with 43 receptions for 470 yards and four touchdowns. Also led the team in punt returns (31-180) and all-purpose yards (849) and had eight kickoff returns for 202 yards (25.2).
- Closed career in spectacular fashion as he totaled 142 all-purpose yards in the 48-7 win over McDaniel. Had three receptions for 90 yards, including a career-long 44-yard touchdown catch. Added a 46-yard kickoff return to highlight his efforts.
- Had seven receptions for a then career-high 69 yards and one touchdown and totaled 38 yards on two kickoff returns at Gettysburg and had four receptions for 30 yards and five punt returns for 35 yards against Muhlenberg.
- Finished fourth in the Centennial Conference in receptions per game (4.3), fifth in all-purpose yards (84.9), sixth in receiving yards (47.0) and sixth in punt return average (5.8).

- Fueled the win over Randolph-Macon with a career-high eight receptions for 60 yards and the game-winning touchdown on a diving 21-yard catch in the back of the end zone with 43 seconds remaining. Also had nine punt returns for 55 yards vs. RMC.
- Ranks third in school history in punt return yards (449) and ninth in kickoff return yards (627). Ends career with 1,794 all-purpose yards.

Corey Sattler • Junior

- Missed two games with an injury, but still finished third on the team in receiving with 16 receptions for 267 yards. Led the team with an average of 16.7 yards per reception.
- Posted third straight game with four receptions and totaled a career-high 101 receiving yards against Gettysburg. Had receptions of 23, 34 and 39 yards - all on scoring drives.
- Continued to make an impact after missing all or part of the first three games with an injury. Had four receptions for 63 yards against F&M and set up JHU's second TD with a 33-yard catch and run to the F&M three-yard line.
- Saw first significant time this season against Dickinson and responded with four receptions for 51 yards.

Anthony Triplin • Senior

- First Team All-Centennial. Led the team in receiving with 52 receptions for 557 yards and four touchdowns. Led the Centennial Conference in receptions per game (5.2) and finished third in receiving yards per game (55.7).
- Ends career with totals of 229 receptions for 2,554 yards and 16 TDs. Second player in school history and third in Centennial history to reach 200 career receptions. Ranks 2nd in JHU history in receptions, 3rd in receiving yards and tied for 6th in TD receptions.
- Finishes career ranked third on the Centennial Conference's career receptions list and seventh on the career receiving yards list.
- Established a school record with 43 consecutive starts (every game of his career). No other player in school history has started more than 40 games, either overall or consecutively.
- Had five receptions for 56 yards and one touchdown in the season-ending win against McDaniel. This came one week after totalling five receptions for 77 yards and two touchdowns in a 24-10 win over Hampden-Sydney. Scored both touchdowns in the first half as JHU built a 14-3 halftime lead.
- Broke out against Dickinson with six receptions for 113 yards and one touchdown - a 63-yard reception in the second quarter.
- Had season-high 10 receptions for 78 yards against St. Lawrence and seven receptions for 67 yards against RMC.

Offensive Line

Aaron Chance • Freshman • Tackle

- Started all 10 games of the season at right tackle. First Blue Jay freshman offensive lineman to start a season-opener since Zack Kail in 2000.
- Helped the Blue Jays average 125 yards rushing, 157 yards passing and 18.5 points per game this season.
- One of three freshmen to start on the offensive line in the last four games.

Phil Dixon • Senior • Tackle

- Second Team All-Centennial selection.
- Started all 10 games at left tackle to run streak of consecutive starts to 40. Just the third player in school history to start 40 consecutive games (first offensive lineman).
- Helped the Blue Jays average 125 yards rushing, 157 yards passing and 18.5 points per game this season.
- Emerged as a solid starter at left tackle as a freshman after senior Zack Kail was lost for the year to an injury. Started the last eight games and played in the last 10 and was a fixture for the rest of his career.

Player Notes of Interest - Defense

Paul Markowski • Senior • Guard/Center

- First Team All-Centennial selection in 2005 and 2006.
- Second Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District selection in 2006.
- Started all 21 games as a junior and senior. Slid over to center for the last five games of the year to offset injuries on the offensive line.
- Helped the Blue Jays average 125 yards rushing, 157 yards passing and 18.5 points per game this season.
- Made the rare jump from first-time starter to First Team All-Centennial last season as he got the nod in all 11 games and earned a spot on the elite squad. Hopkins has produced at least one First Team All-Centennial offensive lineman every year except one (2000) since 1995.

Tim Miller • Freshman • Guard

- Made the first start of his career at right guard against Franklin & Marshall and started the final six games of the year.
