2007 Season Review (4-6, 3-5 Centennial)



Records Fall as Youth-Filled Roster Sets the Stage for 2008

The Team: Johns Hopkins won two of its final three games and three of its final five to finish the 2007 season with a 4-6 overall record, including a 3-5 mark in the Centennial Conference. Five of JHU's six losses were by nine points or less.

Streiking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 45-19 (.703) record. Taking it back farther the Blue Jays are 51-22 (.699) since the start of the 2001 season and 56-27 (.675) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 56 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already the most wins in a decade in school history. The previous record of 55 wins came in the 1990s.

Strength of Schedule: The 10 teams the Blue Jays played this season boasted a combined record of 61-44 (.581) and seven of the 10 won six games or more. Hopkins' first seven opponents of the 2007 season combined for a staggering record of 55-20 (.733).

Road Warriors: Johns Hopkins is 16-6 in its last 22 road games dating back to a 17-3 win at McDaniel in the final road game of the 2003 season. All four of Hopkins' wins in 2007 came on the road (Hampden-Sydney, Dickinson, Juniata, McDaniel). The seniors on the 2007 Blue Jay football team compiled a 15-6 record away from Homewood Field during their career. The 15 road victories are rank second among all classes in school history.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 44-19 (.698) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time.

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Jim Margraff (JHU '82) recently completed his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 111-69-3 (.615). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue

Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .615 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 87-45-1 (.658) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 111 wins. The 111 wins are three more than Hopkins accumulated in the 30 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 108 games.

November Reign: The month of November has been kind to the Blue Jays of late as they are 16-3 in November since 2001 and 28-15-1 under head coach Jim Margraff.

In the Zone: Johns Hopkins was by far the most effective offensive team in the Centennial Conference in the red zone during the 2007 season. The Blue Jays scored two touchdowns and added a field goal on three trips to the red zone in the season-finale at McDaniel and finish the year 25-of-27 (92.6%) on the year with 17 touchdowns and eight field goals to their credit. In Centennial Conference games the Blue Jays were a stunning 22-of-23 (.957) on trips inside the zone with 14 touchdowns and eight field goals. No other team in the Centennial Conference converted on even 80% of its overall red zone chances.

Rushing and Points Go Hand-in-Hand: The Blue Jays have always presented a balanced attack that keeps the opposition off balance and a close look at this year's statistics reveals that Hopkins averaged just over 145 yards on the ground and just under 165 yards through the air.

However, the team's scoring success was clearly tied more closely to the success of the running game. In the six games the Blue Jays rushed for 129 or more yards they averaged 28.7 points per game. In the four games they were held under 129 yards on the ground they averaged 10.0 points per game.

Comeback Kids: The 20-17 win at Dickinson was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays, who trailed 7-0 early in the first quarter. JHU has 11 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead in 2006 was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Seven's Heaven: Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 36-12 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 66-6 (.917) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 53 of their last 56 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 79-10-2 (.879) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 46 of their last 48 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Johns Hopkins has earned 26 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 26 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined (22). Taking it back even farther, Johns Hopkins has earned 52 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 1991. During that time the other CC football-playing schools have combined for exactly 52 selections as well.

Hopkins Football Celebrates a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team celebrated a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program celebrated its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will played on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the

100th anniversary of Homewood Field was worn on the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program was worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams also wore them this fall.

Individual Player Notes of Interest

A.J. Albert (Fr/LB) - Played in all 10 games with starts in the last six at linebacker • Finished fifth on the team, (and first among all freshmen) in tackles (53) and added 3.0 tackles for losses and 2.0 sacks • Also had two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and one pass breakup • Posted eight tackles, including one sack, against F&M • ECAC Southwest and Centennial Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win at Dickinson when he registered a career-high 11 tackles, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble.

Chris Baldwin (Jr/RB) - First year as a running back at JHU after two years at safety • Emerged as a dependable backup to starter Andrew Kase as he rushed 40 times for 190 yards and tied for third on the team in receptions with 23 for 152 yards • Added seven kickoff returns for 152 yards for a team-best 21.7 yards per return and finished third on the team with 494 all-purpose yards • Had two receptions for 43 yards, including a career-long 44-yard reception to set up a fourth-quarter touchdown, against F&M • Also had two kickoff returns for 62 yards against the Diplomats • Had 11 carries for 56 yards at Juniata and a career-high seven receptions for 33 yards against Ursinus • Rushed seven times for 27 yards and five receptions for 31 yards in the win at Dickinson • Enjoyed breakout game against Moravian with 14 carries for 75 yards and one reception for 14 yards • 41-yard rush against the Greyhounds was the longest by a JHU player in the first four games of the season.

Aaron Chance (So/OL) - Started all 10 games at right tackle to run consecutive games started streak to a team-best 20 • One of the five offensive line starters slated to return next season.

Greg Chimera (Jr/FB) - JHU's starting fullback (played in all 10 games with seven starts) • Totaled 13 carries for 39 yards and five receptions for 51 yards and two touchdowns on the year • Had two receptions for 20 yards, including a five-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter, against F&M • Had four carries for 22 yards against Dickinson • Had just one reception against Muhlenberg, but it went for a 25-yard touchdown.

Devin Collins (Fr/DL) - Emerged as a solid young defensive lineman for the Blue Jays as he played in nine games with two starts at nose guard • Totaled 20 tackles, including one sack, on the year • Registered a career-high seven tackles against Randolph-Macon.

Chris DiForte (Sr/DL) - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Played in all 31 games since the start of the 2005 season and started all 10 games in 2007 • Finished 10th on the team in tackles (22), third in tackles for losses (6.0) and sixth in sacks (1.5) • Notched three tackles, including one for loss, against F&M • Matched career high with four tackles against Gettysburg and added four tackles, including 1.5 for losses and one sack, against Muhlenberg • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney and added three tackles and a blocked extra point against Randolph-Macon.

Austin Ehrhart (Jr/SS) - Played in seven games with three starts • Finished the season with five tackles and one interception to his credit • Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney and added one tackle and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon • Missed three games and part of another with an injury.

Scott Goldsmith (Jr/OL) - Started nine games at left guard during the 2007 season • Started the first seven games of the season for the first seven starts of his career • "Senior" member of the offensive line as the other four starters included three sophomores and a freshman • Played defensive line in goal-line situations.

Eric Gormeley (Fr/C) - Played in all 10 games and started the final nine at center • Took over as the starting center in the second game of the year against Randolph-Macon.

Devin Hewlett (So/DB) - Started all 10 games at safety • Finished sixth on the team in tackles (49) and added one fumble recovery and one pass breakup • Posted a career-high eight tackles against Ursinus after a five-tackle effort at Dickinson • Got the first start of his career at safety in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Came back with a career-high six tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon and matched the six-tackle effort in each of the next three games • Has played in all 20 games since arriving at JHU.

Sean Hennessey (So./WR) - Played in six games as a reserve wide receiver and totaled five receptions for 54 yards and one touchdown • Fueled JHU's 20-17 upset of then undefeated Dickinson with two receptions for 49 yards, including a 41-yard touchdown catch that tied the game at 7-7 late in the first quarter.

Richard Hill (Sr./DB) - First Team All-Centennial selection • Started all 10 games at cornerback and finished fourth on the team in tackles with a career-high 60 • Added 2.5 tackles for losses, a team-high eight pass breakups, one forced fumble and one blocked extra point • Made the final game of his career one to remember as he returned the opening kickoff 90 yards for a touchdown to jump-start the 31-3 win at McDaniel • The kickoff return is the fourth-longest in school history and was the first return for a touchdown by a Johns Hopkins player since Harrison Bernstein took one back 95 yards for a touchdown against King's Point in 1999 • Added six tackles and one pass breakup against McDaniel and posted six tackles and three pass breakups at Juniata • Tied career high with 10 tackles against Ursinus • Registered seven tackles at Dickinson • Posted a career-high 10 tackles against Gettysburg • Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Added six tackles against Moravian and four tackles and a blocked extra point against Muhlenberg.

Brian Hopkins (Fr./TE) - Played in all 10 games and had five receptions for 14 yards, but three of the receptions went for touchdowns • Three TDs were tied for second on the team • Touchdown receptions came against Moravian, Muhlenberg and Juniata.

Max Islinger (Fr./QB-P) - Played in all 10 games with one start • Majority of action came as JHU's punter, but did see action in four games at quarterback and earned first start at QB in the season-finale at McDaniel • Was 25-of-54 for 316 yards with three touchdowns and two interceptions on the year • Managed the 31-3 win at McDaniel with an 8-of-20 showing for 118 yards with one touchdown and one interception • Played a majority of the game against F&M at quarterback and was 8-of-18 for 79 yards with one touchdown • Also rushed twice for 13 yards against the Diplomats • Came off the bench at Juniata and was 4-of-9 for 56 yards with one touchdown • Saw the first time of his career at QB against Gettysburg and was 5-of-7 for 63 yards • Averaged 31.4 yards on 61 punts and dropped 14 of the 61 inside the opposition's 20-yard line.

Ryan Johnstin (Sr./LB) - Reserve linebacker and special teams performer • Saw action in seven games and totaled two tackles and an interception on the year • Interception, which he returned 11 yards, came on the next-to-last series of his career in the 31-3 season-ending win at McDaniel.

Andrew Kase (So./RB) - Second Team All-Centennial and a Second Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District Selection • Enjoyed one of the finest seasons in school history as he rushed 194 times for 1,009 yards and five touchdowns and added 23 receptions for 212 yards and four more TDs • 1,009 rushing yards is the second-highest single-season total in school history, while his 1,221 all-purpose yards ranks seventh • Tied school record with six 100-yard rushing games (record had stood alone since 1959) and his 112.1 yards per game is the fourth-best average in JHU history • Averaged 134.1 yards over the final seven games of the season • Totaled just 70 yards on 19 carries in the first two games before missing the third game of the year with an injury • Jump-started a run of three straight 100-yard games with a 163-yard, one-touchdown effort against Moravian, when he also added four receptions for 67 yards for a personal-best 230 all-purpose yards • Rushed 24 times for 140 yards and one touchdown and added three receptions for 32 yards against Muhlenberg a week later • 140 yards were just 11 less than Muhlenberg had allowed in its first three games combined • Fueled a stunning 20-17 win at Dickinson with 103 rushing yards and 32 yards receiving and a touchdown reception • A 156-yard, two-touchdown effort at Juniata ignited a season-ending three-game run that ranks among the best in school history • Added 111 yards on 28 carries against Franklin & Marshall and capped the season with a 227-yard effort against McDaniel that ranks as the fourth-best performance in school history • Already tied for 16th in school history in rushing yards (1,319) and tied for fourth in 100-yard rushing games with eight.

James Medaglio (Jr./WR) - Named to the Centennial Conference Academic Honor Roll • Played in nine games with one start at nose guard • Posted 17 tackles on the year, including 3.0 for losses and one sack • Was in on a career-high four tackles against Gettysburg and Muhlenberg and had two tackles, including one sack, in the 31-3 season-ending win at McDaniel.
