Johns Hopkins (1-4, 0-3 CC) at Dickinson (5-0, 3-0 CC)

The Game: Johns Hopkins makes its second straight trip to Pennsylvania as the Blue Jays travel to Carlisle to take on Centennial-leader Dickinson. The Blue Jays slipped to 1-4 overall and 0-3 in the Centennial with a tough 28-21 loss at Muhlenberg. Dickinson ran its season-opening winning streak to five games as the Red Devils slipped past Moravian, 24-23, on a last-second field goal.

About the Coaches: Jim Margraff is now in his 18th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 108-67-3 (.615) record into this week's game against Dickinson. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 69-45-2 (.603) record in league play.

Darwin Breaux is in his 15th season as the head coach at Dickinson and ranks as the all-time winningest coach in school history with a 92-56-1 record. He has guided the Devils to four Centennial Conference Championships (1993, 1994, 2004, 2006), including last season's outright title that landed Dickinson an NCAA berth.

A Brutal Stretch: This week's game at Dickinson is the third straight for the Blue Jays against a team that entered the game undefeated (Moravian - Muhlenberg - Dickinson). Including next week's game against Ursinus, the Blue Jays are in the midst of a four-game stretch against teams that are currently a combined 16-2.

Breaking Down the Brutality: Breaking down the Blue Jays' schedule into games before their bye week (October 20) and after their bye week reveals two entirely different levels of success. JHU's first seven opponents are currently a combined 27-6 (.818), while the final three teams on the schedule are a combined 2-11 (.154).

Road Warriors: Johns Hopkins is 13-6 in its last 19 road games dating back to a 17-3 win at McDaniel in the final road game of the 2003 season.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 43-17 (.717) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time.

Streaking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 42-17 (.712) record. Taking it back farther the Blue Jays are 48-20 (.706) since the start of the 2001 season and 53-25 (.679) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 53 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already just two shy of the school record for wins in a decade (55/1990s).

Series History: Johns Hopkins and Dickinson are meeting for the 61st time in a series that dates to a 52-0 Dickinson win on October 24, 1891. The teams met just four times between the inaugural meeting and 1948, but then met every year from 1948 through 1977. After a three-year hiatus, the series was renewed in 1981 and the teams have met every year since.

Dickinson holds a 15-8-1 advantage since the formation of the Centennial Conference in 1983. The Devils built that bulge with a 13-1-1 mark against the Blue Jays from 1987 through 2001. Since then the series has evened out with Johns Hopkins winning three of the last five.

Hopkins has won its last two games at Dickinson as a 30-0 victory fueled JHU's run to a 10-1 record in 2003 and a 35-14 victory in 2005 was a springboard to JHU's first outright Centennial Conference Championship.

The visiting team has had the better of the head-to-head matchups of late as the road team has won four straight in the series. JHU's 17-10 win in 2002 marks the last time the home team has held serve.

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who in now in his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 108-67-3 (.615). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .615 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 84-43-1 (.660) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 108 wins. The 108 wins are five more than Hopkins accumulated in the 29 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 103 games.

Red Zone Success: Johns Hopkins continues to lead the Centennial Conference in red zone offense as the Blue Jays have scored on 13-of-14 trips to the zone (92.9%). The Blue Jays count eight touchdowns and five field goals to their credit in red zone opportunities. Only one other team in the Centennial (Moravian - 84.6%) has converted on even 75% of its chances in the red zone.

Comeback Kids: The 17-16 win at Hampden-Sydney was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays. JHU has 10 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead last season was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Shutouts: Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 17+ seasons under head coach **Jim Margraff** and the two in 2005 mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival.

Seven's Heaven: Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 33-10 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 64-6 (.914) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 51 of their last 54 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Johns Hopkins has earned 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 23 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined. Taking it back even farther, Johns Hopkins has earned 49 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 1991. During that time the other CC football-playing schools have combined for 44 selections.

Individual Player Notes of Interest

Chris Baldwin (Jr./RB) - First year as a running back at JHU after two years at safety • Had a breakout game against Moravian with 14 carries for 75 yards and one reception for 14 yards • 41-yard rush against the Greyhounds was the longest by a JHU in the first four games • Ranks third on the team in rushing (18-103).

Eric Callocchia (So./QB) - Backup quarterback who saw the most extensive playing time of his career against Gettysburg • Was 9-of-17 for 83 yards with a TD and two INTs • Also rushed eight times for 18 yards.

Aaron Chance (So./OL) - Second season as the starter at right tackle after starting all 10 games there as a freshman last season • Has started a team-best 15 straight games since the start of the 2006 season.

Greg Chimera (Jr./FB) - JHU's starting fullback • Had just one reception, but it went for a 25-yard touchdown, against Muhlenberg last Saturday • Has six carries for 10 yards and one TD and two receptions for 29 yards and one TD on the year.

Hopkins Football Celebrating a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team will celebrate a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program itself will celebrate its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will be playing on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team has added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field

will be worn on the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program will be worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams will also wear them this fall.

Scouting the Red Devils

Johns Hopkins runs into yet another undefeated opponent as the Blue Jays travel to Carlisle, Pennsylvania to take on league-leading Dickinson. The formula for success is slightly different than it has been at times for the Red Devils, but the bottom line is wins and DC is 5-0.

Sophomore QB **Ian Mitchell** has stepped in for 2006 CC Offensive Player of the Year **Matt Torchia** and the Red Devils haven't missed a beat as he is directing an offense that is averaging 27.2 points and 328.2 yards per game.

Mitchell has completed a Centennial-high 62.7% of his passing attempts for 713 yards with just one interception in 110 pass attempts. Mitchell has also proven to be a dangerous threat in the running game as he is averaging a team-high 68.4 yards per game on the ground.

Mitchell can look to a talented core of play-makers at wide receiver, but senior **Chris McInerney** is his favorite target as he has a team-high 35 receptions for 335 yards and one TD reception. Sophomore **Pat O'Conner** (20-279-3) is also among the top 10 in the Centennial Conference in receptions and receiving yards per game.

A trademark of the Dickinson team has always been a rugged run defense and this year is no different as the Devils rank second in the league in rushing defense (98.4) and have held three of their five opponents to 77 yards or less on the ground.

Everything on defense starts with senior linebacker **Eric Dube**, who counts a league-high 71 tackles to his credit through five games. Dube was named the Centennial Defensive Player of the Year last season when he paced the league with 17.5 tackles for losses and four forced fumbles.

While the Devils have allowed a Centennial-high 1,210 passing yards on the year, they also specialize in forcing turnovers. Dickinson counts a league-high nine interceptions and has forced 13 turnovers in five games.

Senior **Ryan Heinig** headlines the secondary as he leads the Centennial in pass breakups (10), while **Michael Maxwell** and **Mike O'Donnell** have combined for five of DC's nine interceptions.

Chris DiForte (Sr./DL) - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Has played in all 26 games since the start of the 2005 season • Matched career high with four tackles against Gettysburg and added four tackles, including 1.5 for losses and one sack, against Muhlenberg • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney and added three tackles and a blocked extra point against Randolph-Macon • Counts 14 tackles, four tackles for losses, two fumble recoveries and one sack on the year.

Austin Ehrhart (Jr./SS) - Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney and added one tackle and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon.

Scott Goldsmith (Jr./OL) - Has started the first five games of the season at left guard for the first five starts of his career • "Senior" member of the offensive line as the other four starters include three sophomores and a freshman • Plays defensive line in goal-line situations.

Eric Gormeley (Fr./C) - Took over as the starting center against Randolph-Macon • Has played in all five games and has started the last four.

Devin Hewlett (So./DB) - Got the first start of his career at safety in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Came back with a career-high six tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon and has matched the six-tackle effort in each of the last three games • Has played in all 15 games since arriving at JHU and ranks sixth on the team with 27 tackles on the year.

Richard Hill (Sr./DB) - Posted a career-high 10 tackles against Gettysburg and leads all DBs with 28 tackles on the year • Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Three PBUs are a career high • Added three tackles against Randolph-Macon, six against Moravian and four tackles and a blocked extra point against Muhlenberg.

Max Islinger (Fr./QB-P) - Saw the first time of his career at QB against Gettysburg and was 5-of-7 for 63 yards • Averaging 31.6 yards on 29 punts and has dropped eight of the 29 inside the opposition's 20-yard line.

Andrew Kase (So./RB) - Enjoyed his second straight 100-yard game as he rushed 24 times for 140 yards and one touchdown and added three receptions for 32 yards last week against Muhlenberg • 140 yards were just 11 less than Muhlenberg had allowed in its first three games combined • Effort against the Mules came one week after he punched up a career-high 163 yards and one touchdown against Moravian • Added four receptions for 67 yards, including a 59-yard TD reception, against the 'Hounds for a personal-best 230 all-purpose yards • Leads the team in rushing yards (373), rushing yards per game (93.2) and all-purpose yards (490) • Ranks third in the Centennial in rushing and fifth in all-purpose yards (122.5) • Had a solid freshman year with 310 rushing yards and 10 receptions for 55 yards and one touchdown • Posted back-to-back 100-yard rushing games against Gettysburg (113) and Muhlenberg (101) last season.

Patrick Kay (Sr./DL) - Enjoyed a solid effort in the first defensive start of his career against Hampden-Sydney • Registered a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a potential game-winning Tiger field goal on the final play of the game • Added five tackles and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon and four tackles and a PBU against Gettysburg • Ranks ninth on the team with 21 tackles on the year.

Alex Lachman (Fr./PK) - Earned Centennial Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time with his effort against Moravian • Tied a school record with four field goals (43, 28, 30, 37) and hit all three of his extra points to set a school record for points by a kicker in a game (15) • Tied for 26th in the nation in field goals per game (1.2) and tied for the national lead among freshmen with his six overall FGs • Ranks second in the CC in field goals, field goals per game and kick-scoring (5.6) • Hit both of his extra points and nailed a 43-yard field goal in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney to earn Centennial Conference Special Teams Player of the Week honors • 43-yard field goal is the longest by a freshman in the Jim Margraff era (1990 - present) • Is now 6-of-6 on field goals and 10-of-10 on extra points this season.

Scott Meyers (Sr./DL) - Started at nose guard against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles and one tackle for a loss • Added a blocked extra point early in the fourth quarter that proved decisive in JHU's 17-16 victory • Missed three games with an injury before returning for last week's game at Muhlenberg • Posted two tackles against the Mules.

Tim Miller (So./OL) - Has started all five games this season at right guard and has started 11 straight games dating back to last season.

Tucker Michels (Fr./WR) - Had two receptions for 15 yards, including a 10-yard TD reception with 1:27 remaining to tie the game against Moravian • Ranks second on the team in receiving with 16 receptions for 126 yards and the one TD • Had a team-high eight receptions for 37 yards in the season-opener • Eight receptions are the most by a JHU freshman in a season-opener since Sam Skinner had nine in 1996 • Came back with four receptions for a team-high 58 yards against Randolph-Macon • Tied for eighth in the Centennial in receptions per game (3.75) and leads all CC freshmen with his 15 receptions.

completions for 134 yards and rushed for 25 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Came back with a 13-of-23 showing for 125 yards against Randolph-Macon • Now 77-of-137 for 709 yards with five TDs and nine INTs in five games • Threw for a career-high 243 yards and one touchdown and had a personal-best 269 yards of total offense against Gettysburg last season • Spent the spring as a reserve midfielder on the 2007 NCAA Champion Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team • Appeared in two games for the Blue Jays as the team won its second national championship in the last three years (2005).

Tom O'Neill (Jr./DL) - Was in on five tackles, including one for a loss, last week at Muhlenberg before suffering a season-ending injury • Ranked third on the team and first among defensive linemen with 32 tackles at the time of his injury.

Bryan Power (Jr./WR) - Posted two receptions for 20 yards last week at Muhlenberg with both receptions coming on a third-quarter touchdown drive • Had a career-high five receptions for a personal-best 42 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney and added four receptions for 31 yards against Randolph-Macon • Tied for third on the team with 11 receptions for 93 yards on the year.

Alex Quermorllue (So./WR) - Grabbed the first TD reception of his career with a nine-yard catch against Gettysburg and came back with four receptions for 35 yards against Moravian • Made a successful debut at wide receiver with four receptions for 31 yards against Hampden-Sydney • Tied for third on the team with 11 receptions for 90 yards and one TD on the year.

Dan Requena (Sr./DB) - Co-captain • Ranks seventh on the team with 25 tackles • Posted five tackles, including one for a loss, and an interception against Muhlenberg one week after registering three tackles, one forced fumble (which led to a JHU touchdown), one fumble recovery (which led to another JHU touchdown) and one PBU against Moravian • Posted six tackles in the season-opening win against Hampden-Sydney and came back with seven tackles and one sack against Randolph-Macon • Also returned a blocked PAT for a two-point defensive extra point - the first defensive extra point return for a score in school history - against Randolph-Macon • Earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors last season, the only non-senior among JHU's 11 CC All-Stars a year ago.

Phil Roberts (Sr./RB) - Will miss the remainder of the season after suffering a knee injury in practice prior to the game against Moravian • Had rushed for 210 yards and two touchdowns in three games.

Zach Rosswog (Sr./SS) - Co-captain • Ranks second on the team in tackles (39) and third in tackles for losses (4.0) after back-to-back seven-tackle efforts against Gettysburg and Moravian and a six-tackle showing against Muhlenberg • 114 career tackles is the most of any active player • Posted a career-high 15 tackles against Randolph-Macon • Was in on half a sack and 2.5 tackles for losses against the Yellow Jackets • Played in all 10 games last season and tied for second on the team in tackles (54).

Corey Sattler (Sr./WR) - Co-captain • Enjoyed the finest game of his career against Muhlenberg with seven receptions for a career-high 119 yards • Became the 15th player in school history to top 1,000 career receiving yards with his effort against Muhlenberg (1,045) • Now ranks 14th in JHU history in receptions (73) and receiving yards • Leads the team in receptions (20) and receiving yards (273) despite missing the first two games of the season • Paced JHU with eight receptions for 98 yards against Moravian • Saw first action of the season against Gettysburg and responded with five receptions for 56 yards • Ranks second in the Centennial in receiving yards per game (91.0) and fourth in receptions per game (6.67).

Mike Stoffel (So./OL) - Started his ninth straight game last week against Muhlenberg • Started the final four games of the 2006 season at guard and now playing left tackle.

Mike Todisco (Fr./DB) - Emerging as a steady kickoff return specialist • Had five returns for 83 yards against Gettysburg and two for 45 yards against Muhlenberg • Has eight returns for 139 yards (17.4) on the year to go along with three tackles.

Adam Winter (Sr./LB) - Ranks third on the team in tackles (32), second in tackle for losses (5.5) and is tied for the team-lead with 2.5 sacks • Was in on five tackles, including one for a loss, and had one pass breakup against Moravian and followed that with four tackles against Muhlenberg • Spearheaded JHU's defensive effort against Hampden-Sydney with eight tackles and two sacks from his inside linebacker spot • Added a career-high 11 tackles, including 1.5 for losses, and one forced fumble against Randolph-Macon.

Colin Wixted (So./LB) - Continues to lead the team in tackles (42), tackles for losses (9.5) and sacks (2.5) • Ranks first in the Centennial Conference in tackles for losses and 10th in tackles per game (8.4) • Registered five tackles, including two for losses, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery against Moravian and came back with seven tackles, including one for a loss, against Muhlenberg • Posted a career-high 14 tackles, including one for a loss, against Gettysburg • Registered eight tackles, 4.5 tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks against Hampden-Sydney • Sack on next-to-last play of the game forced the Tigers into a long field goal attempt that was blocked • Added eight tackles, including a sack, against Randolph-Macon.
