Franklin & Marshall (2-6, 2-4 CC) at Johns Hopkins (3-5, 2-4 CC)

The Game: Johns Hopkins closes out the home portion of its 2007 schedule as the Blue Jays welcome Franklin & Marshall to Homewood Field. Both teams are coming off road victories as Johns Hopkins improved to 3-5 overall and 2-4 in the Centennial Conference with a 42-21 victory at Juniata, while the Diplomats slipped past McDaniel, 24-17, in overtime. The Diplomats carry a 2-6 overall record and a 2-4 Centennial mark into the game.

About the Coaches: **Jim Margraff** is now in his 18th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 110-68-3 (.616) record into this week's game against Franklin & Marshall. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 71-46-2 (.605) record in league play.

John Troxell is in his second season as the head coach at Franklin & Marshall and carries a 5-13 record into the game against the Blue Jays. Despite being in just his second year as the leader of the Diplomat program, he is very familiar with the Centennial Conference. Troxell spent four seasons (1997-2000) as an assistant coach at Muhlenberg before a five-year stint as an assistant coach at Lafayette.

Seniors Playing Final Home Game: Today's game against Franklin & Marshall is the final home game in the careers of the 12 seniors on the 2007 Johns Hopkins football team. The senior class has helped the program to some of its highest points since arriving. Johns Hopkins has compiled a 25-15 (.625) record since this group arrived in 2004 and the Blue Jays earned a share of the 2004 Centennial Conference title and grabbed the program's first-ever outright Centennial Championship in 2005. In addition, the Blue Jays made the program's first appearance in the NCAA Playoffs in 2005 and won the ECAC Southeast Championship in 2004.

November Reign: The month of November has been kind to the Blue Jays of late as they are 15-2 in November since 2001 and 27-14-1 under head coach Jim Margraff.

Road Warriors: Johns Hopkins is 15-6 in its last 21 road games dating back to a 17-3 win at McDaniel in the final road game of the 2003 season. All three of Hopkins' wins this season have come on the road (Hampden-Sydney, Dickinson, Juniata).

Series History: Johns Hopkins and Franklin & Marshall are meeting for the 59th time in a series that dates to a 10-7 F&M win on October 19, 1912. The Diplomats lead the all-time series, 33-23-2, but it's been all Hopkins in the last decade as JHU has won 10 straight.

The Blue Jays' 10-game winning streak is the latest in a long line of dominant runs in the series. F&M went 7-0-1 against JHU from 1950 through 1957, only to have the Blue Jay turn the tables and go 8-4-1 in the series from 1958 through 1970. The Blue Jays' 21-10 win on October 3, 1970 would be their last against the Diplomats until a 14-7 win under first-year head coach **Jim Margraff** on November 3, 1990.

Hopkins recent run against F&M has seen every type of game imagineable as the Blue Jays count four of the 10 wins by seven points or less and five wins by 14 points or more.

The largest come-from-behind win in the Margraff era was orchestrated against F&M in 1999 as JHU erased a 27-10 third quarter deficit on the strength of a 177-yard, three-touchdown rushing performance by freshman **Kevin Johnson**.

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who in now in his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 110-68-3 (.616). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .616 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 86-44-1 (.660) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 110 wins. The 110 wins are two more than Hopkins accumulated in the 30 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 108 games.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 44-18 (.705) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time.

Strength of Schedule: The eight teams the Blue Jays have played this season currently boast a combined record of 45-20 (.692). Hopkins' first seven opponents of the season are currently a combined 45-12 (.789).

Streaking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 44-18 (.710) record. Taking it back farther the Blue Jays are 50-21 (.704) since the start of the 2001 season and 55-26 (.679) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 55 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade matches the school record for wins in a decade (55/1990s).

In the Zone: Johns Hopkins continues to be the most effective offensive team in the Centennial Conference in the red zone. The Blue Jays scored four touchdowns on five trips to the red zone at Juniata and are now 21-of-23 (91.3%) on the year with 14 touchdowns and seven field goals to their credit. In Centennial Conference games the Blue Jays are 18-of-19 (94.7%) on trips inside the zone with 11 touchdowns and seven field goals.

Rushing and Points Go Hand-in-Hand: The Blue Jays have always tried to present a balanced attack that keeps the opposition off balance and a close look at this year's statistics reveals that Hopkins is averaging just under 140 yards on the ground and just under 180 yards through the air.

However, the team's scoring success seems to be tied more closely to the success of the running game. In the five games the Blue Jays have rushed for 129 or more yards they are averaging 28.2 points per game. In the three games they've been held under 129 yards on the ground they have averaged 9.7 points per game.

Comeback Kids: The 20-17 win at Dickinson was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays, who trailed 7-0 early in the first quarter. JHU has 11 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead last season was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Shutouts: Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 17+ seasons under head coach **Jim Margraff** and the two in 2005 mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival.

Seven's Heaven: Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 35-11 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Hopkins Football Celebrating a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team will celebrate a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program itself will celebrate its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will be playing on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team has added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field will be worn on

the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program will be worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams will also wear them this fall.

Scouting the Diplomats

Like Johns Hopkins, Franklin & Marshall is much better than its record would indicate. The Diplomats dropped a heart-breaker to Catholic and fell by just seven (28-21) to Dickinson early in the season. Similar to the Blue Jays, a break here or there and F&M is battling for a 6-4 record.

Second-year coach **John Troxell's** offense is built around the talents of senior quarterback **Kyle Turner**, who has already thrown for 1,715 yards and 14 touchdowns this season. A Second Team All-Centennial pick a year ago, Turner ranks fifth in school history in passing yards (4,285) and has thrown 30 touchdown passes in his last 17 games.

Turner's effectiveness is due in large part to a talented group of wide receivers as three players have 25 or more receptions on the year.

Sophomore **George Eager**, a Lancaster County native and a transfer from Millersville, leads the Diplomats in receptions (53), receiving yards (535) and touchdown receptions (7). He is complemented by fellow receivers **Jay Ridinger** (28-339-2) and **Paul Sousa** (25-354-1).

Troxell may have found the running game he needed to take pressure off Turner in last week's 24-17 overtime victory at McDaniel.

Sophomore **Ryan Murray** rushed for 215 yards, the fifth-highest single-game total in F&M history, and currently leads the team in rushing with 438 yards on the year. He has two of F&M's three rushing touchdowns on the year and his continued development would make the Diplomats a difficult matchup.

James Gregory and **Zach Romash** lead the defense from their linebacker spots as Gregory paces the team with 70 tackles with Romash just behind (68). F&M is allowing an average of 25.6 points per game and seven of eight opponents have scored 17 or more points. The Diplomats are allowing an average of 155 yards on the ground and 197 through the air.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 65-6 (.915) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 52 of their last 55 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Johns Hopkins has earned 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 23 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined. Taking it back even farther, Johns Hopkins has earned 49 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 1991. During that time the other CC football-playing schools have combined for 44 selections.

Individual Player Notes of Interest

A.J. Albert (Fr/LB) - Has played in all eight games with starts in the last four at linebacker • ECAC Southwest and Centennial Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win at Dickinson when he registered a career-high 11 tackles, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble • Added six tackles in last outing against Ursinus • Ranks sixth on the team in tackles (42) and has two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Chris Baldwin (Jr/RB) - First year as a running back at JHU after two years at safety • Had 11 carries for 56 yards at Juniata and a career-high seven receptions for 33 yards against Ursinus • Rushed seven times for 27 yards and had a career-high five receptions for 31 yards in the win at Dickinson • Enjoyed breakout game against Moravian with 14 carries for 75 yards and one reception for 14 yards • 41-yard rush against the Greyhounds was the longest by a JHU player in the first four games of the season • Ranks third on the team in rushing (37-186) and fourth in receiving (21-109).

Aaron Chance (So./OL) - Second season as the starter at right tackle after starting all 10 games there as a freshman last season • Has started a team-best 18 straight games since the start of the 2006 season.

Greg Chimera (Jr/FB) - JHU's starting fullback • Had four carries for 22 yards against Dickinson • Had just one reception against Muhlenberg, but it went for a 25-yard touchdown • Has 13 carries for 39 yards and one TD and two receptions for 29 yards and one TD on the year.

Chris DiForte (Sr/DL) - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Has played in all 29 games since the start of the 2005 season • Matched career high with four tackles against Gettysburg and added four tackles, including 1.5 for losses and one sack, against Muhlenberg • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney and added three tackles and a blocked extra point against Randolph-Macon • Counts 19 tackles, 5.0 tackles for losses, two fumble recoveries and 1.5 sacks on the year • 5.0 TFLs rank third on the team.

Austin Ehrhart (Jr/SS) - Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney and added one tackle and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon • Missed three games and part of another with an injury • Has four tackles and the one interception on the year.

Scott Goldsmith (Jr/OL) - Started the first seven games of the season at left guard for the first seven starts of his career • "Senior" member of the offensive line as the other four starters include three sophomores and a freshman • Plays defensive line in goal-line situations.

Eric Gormeley (Fr/C) - Took over as the starting center against Randolph-Macon • Has played in all eight games and has started the last seven.

Devin Hewlett (So/DB) - Posted a career-high eight tackles against Ursinus after a five-tackle effort at Dickinson • Got the first start of his career at safety in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Came back with a career-high six tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon and matched the six-tackle effort in each of the next three games • Has played in all 18 games since arriving at JHU and ranks fifth on the team with 43 tackles on the year.

Richard Hill (Sr/DB) - Currently ranked third on the team in tackles (51) after posting six tackles and three pass breakups at Juniata • Tied career high with 10 tackles against Ursinus • Registered seven tackles at Dickinson • Posted a career-high 10 tackles against Gettysburg • Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Added six tackles against Moravian and four tackles and a blocked extra point against Muhlenberg.

Brian Hopkins (Fr/TE) - Continued knack for finding the end zone with a four-yard touchdown reception last week at Juniata • Now has five receptions for 14 yards on the year, but three of his five receptions have gone for touchdowns.

Max Islinger (Fr/QB-P) - Came off the bench at Juniata and was 4-of-9 for 56 yards with one touchdown • Saw the first time of his career at QB against Gettysburg and was 5-of-7 for 63 yards • Averaging 31.1 yards on 49 punts and has dropped 10 of the 42 inside the opposition's 20-yard line.

Andrew Kase (So./RB) - Posted fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season last week at Juniata with 156 yards and two touchdowns • Added two receptions for 29 yards and another touchdown against the Eagles • Leads the team and ranks fourth in the Centennial Conference in rushing as he is averaging 95.9 yards per game • Has rushed for 671 yards and has 880 all-purpose yards on the year • Registered third straight 100-yard rushing game with a 24-carry, 103-yard effort against Dickinson, when he also had five receptions for 32 yards and one touchdown • First JHU player to post three straight 100-yard rushing games since Adam Cook in 2003 • Rushed 24 times for 140 yards and one touchdown and added three receptions for 32 yards against Muhlenberg • 140 yards were just 11 less than Muhlenberg had allowed in its first three games combined • Effort against the Mules came one week after he punched up a career-high 163 yards and one touchdown against Moravian • Added four receptions for 67 yards, including a 59-yard TD reception, against the 'Hounds for a personal-best 230 all-purpose yards • Has six career 100-yard rushing games, the most ever by a JHU player before the end of his sophomore year • Bidding to become just the sixth player in school history to average over 100 yards rushing per game in a season.

Patrick Kay (Sr./DL) - Fueled win at Dickinson with five tackles and came back with three tackles against Ursinus • Added two tackles, including a sack, at Juniata • Ranks ninth on the team with 31 tackles through eight games • Enjoyed a solid effort in the first defensive start of his career against Hampden-Sydney • Registered a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a potential game-winning Tiger field goal on the final play of the game • Added five tackles and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon and four tackles and a PBU against Gettysburg.

Scott Meyers (Sr./DL) - Posted three tackles, including one sack, last week at Juniata to run season totals to 14 tackles, two TFLs, one sack, one PBU and one blocked XP • Started at nose guard against Hampden-Sydney in the season-opener and posted three tackles and one tackle for a loss • Added a blocked extra point early in the fourth quarter that proved decisive in JHU's 17-16 victory • Missed three games with an injury before returning against Muhlenberg • Posted two tackles against the Mules and three against Dickinson and Ursinus.
