## Gettysburg (1-1, 0-0 CC) at Johns Hopkins (1-1, 0-0 CC)



Friday, September 14, 2007 • 7 pm  
 Homewood Field • Baltimore, MD

**The Game:** Johns Hopkins plays the second of three straight home games as the Blue Jays host Gettysburg in the only Friday night game of the year for Hopkins. Both teams enter the game at 1-1 after season-opening victories that were followed by week two losses.

**About the Coaches:** **Jim Margraff** is now in his 18th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 108-64-3 (.626) record into this week's game against Gettysburg. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 69-42-2 (.619) record in league play.

The dean of Centennial Conference head coaches, **Barry Streeter** is now in his 29th season as the head coach at Gettysburg. Streeter sports an all-time record of 142-138-5 and ranks 13th among active Division III head coaches in victories. His 75 all-time Centennial Conference victories leave him just two shy of tying Franklin & Marshall's **Tom Gilburg** for first place in league history.

**ODAC Blues:** Johns Hopkins and Gettysburg both enter tonight's game looking to bounce back from disheartening losses against opponents from the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. The Blue Jays dropped an 18-9 decision to Randolph-Macon in one of the strangest games ever played in the 100-year history of Homewood Field. The Yellow Jackets got a safety, scored on an offensive fumble recovery in the end zone and capped the win with a 25-yard interception return for a score in the final 30 seconds. Gettysburg spotted Hampden-Sydney a 33-0 halftime lead and fell to the Tigers 54-7.

**Friday Night Lights:** A staple of the Johns Hopkins schedule is at least one Friday night game and this year only the Bullets agreed to come to Homewood to play under the lights. Actually, head coach **Barry Streeter** is the only coach who has regularly agreed to play at Homewood on Friday night as this is the seventh straight meeting between JHU and Gettysburg in Baltimore that has taken place on Friday night. The Blue Jays have compiled an all-time record of 25-12-1 (.671) since hosting Widener on September 25, 1982 in the first Friday night game in school history. The Blue Jays are 21-7-1 (.741) in home Friday night games under head coach **Jim Margraff**.

**Second of Three Straight at Home:** Tonight's game is the second of three straight games the Blue Jays will play at Homewood Field. The last time Hopkins played three straight regular-season games at home was early in the 2002 season, when JHU knocked off Rochester, Carnegie Mellon and Gettysburg in successive weeks. Prior to that, the last time JHU had played three straight at home was in 1979, when the Blue Jays ended the year with three straight at Homewood. The 1979 team was led by a sophomore quarterback named **Jim Margraff**.

**Series History:** Johns Hopkins and Gettysburg are meetings for the 35th time in a series that dates to a 5-3 Gettysburg win in 1911 and has seen both teams take turns dominating the head-to-head matchup.

The Bullets lead the all-time series, 19-13-2, but it has been all Hopkins of late as the Blue Jays have won 11 of the last 12 games against Gettysburg. In fact, prior to last season's 23-18 win by the Bullets at the Battlefield, Hopkins had won 11 straight against GC, including five straight in Gettysburg. The Blue Jays have won six straight games against Gettysburg at Homewood Field and the Bullets have scored a total of seven points at JHU in their last two visits.

Prior to Hopkins' current run the Bullets had run up a 17-1-1 mark against the Blue Jays from 1916 through 1994. The only win for the Blue Jays during that stretch was a 28-14 win on September 29, 1990. That was the first Centennial Conference victory for current Johns Hopkins head coach Jim Margraff.

# Gettysburg (1-1) at Johns Hopkins (1-1) / 2

## Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who in now in his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 108-64-3 (.626). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU has won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .626 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 84-40-1 (.676) since 1995.

**Margraff's Resurrection:** Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 108 wins. The 108 wins are five more than Hopkins accumulated in the 29 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 103 games.

**Centennial Openers:** Johns Hopkins has been one of the most successful teams in the Centennial Conference in league openers as the Blue Jays have won 14 of their last 16 Centennial openers and are 14-3 under head coach **Jim Margraff** in CC lid lifters. JHU's record in Centennial openers before Margraff took over in 1990 was 1-6 and JHU's overall record in such games (15-9) ranks as the second-best in league history. Only Franklin & Marshall, which fashions a 17-7 all-time record in Centennial-openers, sports a better record than Johns Hopkins.

**September Reign:** Despite the loss against

Randolph-Macon last Saturday, the Blue Jays still sport a 21-6 record in the month of September since the start of the 2000 season and a 32-11 mark since the start of the 1995 season.

**Home Sweet Home:** Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 43-15 (.741) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time.

**Streaking:** Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 42-14 (.750) record. Taking it back further the Blue Jays are 48-17 (.738) since the start of the 2001 season and 53-22 (.707) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 53 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already just two shy of the school record for wins in a decade (55/1990s).

**More Streaking:** The field goal (Hampden-Sydney) and safety (Randolph-Macon) the Blue Jays have allowed in the first quarter this season represent the only points JHU has allowed in the first quarter in the last 10 games dating back to the third game of the 2006 season. JHU's streak of consecutive games without allowing a touchdown in the first quarter now stands at 10.

**Comeback Kids:** The 17-16 win at Hampden-Sydney was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays. JHU has 10 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead last season was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

**Block Party:** Johns Hopkins blocked exactly three kicks in the first nine games of the 2006 season, but in the last three games (vs. McDaniel last season and against Hampden-Sydney and Randolph-Macon this season), the Blue Jays have come up with five blocked kicks. The latest of these came late in the second quarter of last week's game against Randolph-Macon, when senior **Chris DiForte** slipped through the middle of the line and blocked an extra point. Senior co-captain **Dan Requena** scooped up the loose ball and raced 85 yards for a two-point defensive extra point that gave JHU a 9-8 lead at the half.

## Hopkins Football Celebrating a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team will celebrate a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program itself will celebrate its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will be playing on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team has added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field

will be worn on the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program will be worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams will also wear them this fall.



# Gettysburg (1-1) at Johns Hopkins (1-1) / 3

## Scouting the Bullets

Gettysburg comes to Homewood Field looking to bounce back from a 54-7 loss at Hampden-Sydney last Saturday. Don't be deceived by the score ... the game was much tighter than it appears. The Bullets rolled up 364 yards of total offense, but costly turnovers did them in. Hampden-Sydney took over at the GC four-yard line after a fumble and twice the Bullets turned the ball over inside the Tiger 20. A better indicator of the Bullets' abilities was their 49-25 season-opening win against Lebanon Valley, which defeated a solid Susquehanna team last Saturday.

Scoreboard operators in the Centennial Conference will be kept busy this season by the high-octane Gettysburg offense that features the dynamic one-two punch of senior RB **Tom Sturges** and sophomore QB **Matt Flynn**.

Sturges, a First Team All-Centennial selection a year ago, has rushed for a Centennial-high 294 yards and three touchdowns in two games and became the fifth Gettysburg player to top 3,000 career rushing yards with his 74-yard effort last week at Hampden-Sydney. While he won't catch all-time leader Paul Smith (5,205), he is likely to challenge for second place and could become just the second GC player to reach 4,000.

Flynn emerged last season as a freshman and is poised to become the top passer in school history. He threw for over 1,500 yards and 14 touchdowns a year ago and has 463 yards and five scores through two games.

Senior linebacker **Harold Barton**, also a First Team All-Centennial pick a year ago, is right where he normally is - at the top of the tackle charts for GC. Barton has a team-high 22 tackles through two games and is bidding for his third straight season with 100 or more tackles. Junior defensive lineman **Conor Quinn** has nearly equaled his tackle output of a year ago as he counts 21 tackles and a team-high 3.5 TFLs to his credit. Quinn had 28 tackles in 2006.

**Shutouts:** Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 17+ seasons under head coach **Jim Margraff** and the two in 2005 mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival.

**Seven's Heaven:** For all the different numbers and statistics that can be applied to the Johns Hopkins football team, there has been one simple way to measure the success of the Blue Jays recently. Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 33-7 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

**Keys to Success:** Johns Hopkins is an impressive 64-4 (.941) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 51 of their last 53 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

**It's All Academic:** Johns Hopkins has earned 23 Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 23 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined.

## Individual Player Notes of Interest

**Chris Baldwin (Jr./RB)** - Making the move to RB this season after starting the final six games last season at safety • Had two carries for nine yards against Hampden-Sydney and two receptions for 12 yards against Randolph-Macon.

**Aaron Chance (So./OL)** - Enters second season as the starter at right tackle after starting all 10 games there as a freshman last season • Has started a team-best 12 straight games since the start of the 2006 season.

**Chris DiForte (Sr./DL)** - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Has played in all 23 games since the start of the 2005 season • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney and added three tackles and a blocked extra point against Randolph-Macon.

**Austin Ehrhart (Jr./SS)** - Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney and added one tackle and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon.

**Devin Hewlett (So./DB)** - Got the first start of his career in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Came back with a career-high six tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon • Has played in all 12 games since arriving at JHU.

**Richard Hill (Sr./DB)** - Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Three PBUs are a career high • Added three tackles against Randolph-Macon.

**Andrew Kase (So./RB)** - Rushed 11 times for 50 yards and had three receptions in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Three receptions tied his career high • Had a solid freshman year with 310 rushing yards and 10 receptions for 55 yards and one touchdown • Posted back-to-back 100-yard rushing games against Gettysburg (113) and Muhlenberg (101) last season.

**Patrick Kay (Sr./DL)** - Enjoyed a solid effort in the first defensive start of his career against Hampden-Sydney • Registered a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a potential game-winning Tiger field goal on the final play of the game • Added five tackles and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon.

**Alex Lachman (Fr./PK)** - Hit both of his extra points and nailed a 43-yard field goal in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney to earn Centennial Conference Special Teams Player of the Week honors • 43-yard field goal is the longest by a freshman in the Jim Margraff era (1990 - present).

**Scott Meyers (Sr./DL)** - Started at nose guard against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles and one tackle for a loss • Added a blocked extra point early in the fourth quarter that proved decisive in JHU's 17-16 victory.

## JHU Ranks Fifth in Scoring Defense Over Last Five Years

The success of the Johns Hopkins football team over the last several years has been due, in large part, to a defense that has ranked among the national leaders in numerous categories during that time. Most recently the Blue Jays ranked 11th in the nation in scoring defense (13.4), 19th in rushing defense (95.3) and 26th in total defense (269.4) during the 2005 season. They also finished in the top 40 in four defensive categories in 2006.

Taking a closer look reveals that the Blue Jays rank as the fifth-stingiest unit in the nation over the last five years when it comes to scoring defense as JHU has allowed an average of just 13.22 points per game over the last 54 games (since the start of the 2002 season).

**Tucker Michels (Fr./WR)** - Had a team-high eight receptions for 37 yards in the season-opener • Eight receptions are the most by a JHU freshman in a season-opener since Sam Skinner had nine in 1996 • Came back with four receptions for a team-high 58 yards against Randolph-Macon • Leads JHU in receptions (12) and receiving yards (95) • Tied for second in the Centennial Conference in receptions per game (6.0).

**Michael Murray (So./QB)** - Had career highs of 22 completions and 33 attempts for 134 yards and rushed for 25 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Came back with a 13-of-23 showing for 125 yards against Randolph-Macon • Was 59-of-103 for 713 yards with five touchdowns and five interceptions last season • Threw for a career-high 243 yards and one touchdown and had a personal-best 269 yards of total offense against Gettysburg • Spent the spring as a reserve midfielder on the 2007 NCAA Champion Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team • Appeared in two games for the Blue Jays on their way to a 13-4 record and the team's second national championship in the last three years (2005).

**Tom O'Neill (Jr./DL)** - Posted a career-high seven tackles against Hampden-Sydney after making the move from linebacker to defensive end • Added four tackles against Randolph-Macon • Finished the 2006 season with 22 tackles, two TFLs, one sack, one interception and one PBU.

**Bryan Power (Jr./WR)** - Had a career-high five receptions for a personal-best 42 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney and added four receptions for 31 yards against Randolph-Macon.

**Alex Quermorllue (So./WR)** - Made a successful debut at wide receiver with four receptions for 31 yards against Hampden-Sydney • Has six receptions for 46 yards in two games.

**Dan Requena (Sr./DB)** - Co-captain • Posted six tackles in the season-opening win against Hampden-Sydney and came back with seven tackles and one sack against Randolph-Macon • Also returned a blocked PAT for a two-point defensive extra point - the first defensive extra point return for a score in school history. Earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors last season, the only non-senior among JHU's 11 CC All-Stars a year ago.

**Phil Roberts (Sr./RB)** - Rushed 18 times for 87 yards and one touchdown in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and added 59 yards and one touchdown on 13 carries against Randolph-Macon • Paced the team with a career-high 561 yards and five touchdowns in 2006 • Finished second on the team with 591 all-purpose yards • Posted a career-high 162 yards and two TDs at St. Lawrence and had 157 yards against Rochester last season • One of just six players in school history to rush for 150 or more yards more than once in the same season (first since 1999).

**Zach Rosswog (Sr./SS)** - Co-captain • Was in on four tackles against Hampden-Sydney before posting a career-high 15 tackles against Randolph-Macon • Was in on half a sack and 2.5 tackles for losses against the Yellow Jackets and is tied for the team lead with 19 tackles. Played in all 10 games with nine starts last season and tied for second on the team in tackles (54).

**Corey Sattler (Sr./WR)** - Co-captain • Played in eight games last season and had 16 receptions for 267 yards • Average of 16.7 yards per reception was the highest on the team • Enters final season with 53 receptions for 772 yards.

**Mike Stoffel (So./OL)** - Started his sixth straight game last week against Randolph-Macon • Started the final four games of the 2006 season at guard and now playing left tackle.

**Adam Winter (Sr./LB)** - Spearheaded JHU's defensive effort against Hampden-Sydney with eight tackles and two sacks from his inside linebacker spot • Added a career-high 11 tackles, including 1.5 for losses, and one forced fumble against Randolph-Macon • First full season playing linebacker.

**Colin Wixted (So./LB)** - Picked up where he left off last season as he posted eight tackles, 4.5 tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks against Hampden-Sydney • Sack on next-to-last play of the game forced the Tigers into a long field goal attempt that was blocked • Added eight tackles, including a sack, against Randolph-Macon and ranks third on the team with 16 tackles in two games.
