Johns Hopkins (3-0, 1-0 CC) at Moravian (3-0, 1-0 CC)

Saturday, September 27, 2008 • 1 pm

The Game: Johns Hopkins (3-0, 1-0 CC) hits the road for the third of three straight road games as the Blue Jays travel to Moravian (3-0, 1-0 CC). Johns Hopkins and Moravian are the only two teams in the league that are 3-0.

A Look Back: Johns Hopkins erupted for a season-high 49 points and 497 yards of total offense in knocking off host Gettysburg, 49-37, last Saturday. Moravian kept its perfect season alive as the Greyhounds slipped past a pesky Lebanon Valley team, 23-16.

The Coaches: Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** '82, who is in his 19th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is JHU's all-time leader in games won (114) and coached (186) and he enters this week's game with a career record of 114-69-3 (.621). More information about Jim Margraff can be found on the second page of this week's game notes.

Scott Dapp is the all-time winningest football coach in Moravian history as he carries a 130-88-1 record into this week's game against Johns Hopkins. He has guided the Greyhounds to an impressive 9-4 overall mark since joining the Centennial Conference last season and Moravian has posted a winning record 16 times in his 21 seasons at the helm.

Captain, My Captain: In a vote of his teammates, junior running back **Andrew Kase** was selected to serve as the team captain for the Blue Jays this season. According to records in the Johns Hopkins Sports Information Office, he is the first player to serve as a solo captain for the Blue Jay football team since 1983 (**Francis Mullan**).

On This Date: Johns Hopkins has played seven previous games on September 27 and sports a 4-2-1 record in those seven games. The Blue Jays have won three of their last four games played on this date and have averaged 25.6 points per game in the seven games played all-time on September 27.

Road Warriors: Last week's win at Gettysburg was JHU's fifth straight win away from Homewood Field and improved the Blue Jays' record to 6-1 in road games since the start of the 2007 season. JHU's only loss on the road since the start of last season was a tough 28-21 setback at eventual league champion Muhlenberg last September. JHU is 28-10 on the road since the start of the 2001 season and 16-6 in away league games since the start of the '01 season.

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Jim Margraff (JHU '82) is now in his 19th season as the head coach at Homewood and ranks as the all-time winningest coach in school history with an overall record of 114-69-3 (.621). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .621 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 90-45-1 (.665) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 114 wins. The 114 wins are six more than Hopkins accumulated in the 30 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 108 games.

That's a Blue Jay First Down: In rolling up 497 yards of total offense against Gettysburg the Blue Jays also set a school record for first downs in a game. JHU's 31 first downs against the Bullets topped the previous record of 30 set against then third-ranked Bridgewater in 2001.

September Reign: Johns Hopkins is 24-9 in the month of Septmeber since the start of the 2000 season and 35-14 since the start of the 1995 season.

Streaking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 48-19 (.716) record. Taking it back farther the Blue Jays are 54-22 (.711) since the start of the 2001 season and 59-27 (.686) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 59 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already the most wins in a decade in school history. The previous record of 55 wins came in the 1990s.

Working Overtime: The 39-31 triple overtime win at Randolph-Macon was JHU's first overtime game since a 21-14 win at Washington & Lee in the 2002 season-opener (one overtime period). The Blue Jays are now 2-2 all-time in overtime and all four extra-session games the Blue Jays have played in their history have been on the road.

Centennial Openers: Last week's 49-37 win over Gettysburg gave Johns Hopkins an all-time record of 16-10 (.615) in Centennial lid-lifters.

Johns Hopkins has been one of the most successful teams in the Centennial Conference in league openers as the Blue Jays have won 15 of their last 18 Centennial openers and are 15-4 under head coach **Jim Margraff** in CC openers. Only Franklin & Marshall, which fashions a 17-9 all-time record in Centennial-openers, sports a better record than Johns Hopkins.

In the Zone: Johns Hopkins was by far the most effective offensive team in the Centennial Conference in the red zone during the 2007 season. The Blue Jays finished the year 25-of-27 (92.6%) on the year with 17 touchdowns and eight field goals to their credit. The Blue Jays are 10-of-11 on trips to the red zone through three games and are now 35-of-38 (.921) since the start of the 2007 season.

34+ - Part I: Johns Hopkins has scored 34 or more points in three straight games for the first time since early in the 2000 season, when the Blue Jays turned the trick against Swarthmore (35), Kings Point (42) and Gettysburg (54). The last time JHU scored 34 or more points in four straight games was 1968.

34+ - Part II: Johns Hopkins has scored 34 or more points in each of its first three games this season. This is the first time since 1915 that Hopkins has scored 34 or more points in the first three games of a season.

Series History: Johns Hopkins and Moravian are meeting for the 10th time in a series that dates to a 40-20 Greyhound victory in 1975. Moravian has won 6-of-9 in the all-time series, including two straight.

Moravian won the first three games by lopsided margins before the Blue Jays repounded with wins in three of the next four. The Greyhounds' 44-41 win last season was the first meeting between JHU and Moravian as Centennial Conference opponents and the 41 points JHU scored are the most ever in a loss for the Blue Jays.

Spearheading the Blue Jays in their three wins was current JHU head coach, **Jim Margraff**, who was the starting quarterback at Homewood from 1978-81 and was at the helm for each of JHU's three wins over the Greyhounds. Margraff's 328-yard effort in a 34-20 victory in 1978 was the first 300-yard passing game in school history and remains tied for the fourth-highest single-game total in school history.

Early Surge: The 122 points Johns Hopkins has scored are the most in the first three games of a season since 1915, when JHU scored 152 points in its first three games.

Seven's Heaven: Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 39-12 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Defense Means Offense: Johns Hopkins has scored four defensive touchdowns in three games this season as senior **Chris Baldwin** has taken back two interceptions and one fumble for a score (all against St. Lawrence) and freshman **Tyler Brown** returned a fumble 22 yards for a score at Randolph-Macon.

While all seven of the Blue Jays' touchdowns against Gettysburg were scored by the offense, two of them came after turnovers as JHU turned an interception and a fumble recovery into touchdowns.

Youth Shall be Served: Johns Hopkins may field one of the youngest starting lineups in the nation as 10 of last week's 22 starters were freshmen or sophomores and eight more were juniors. **Below is a breakdown of JHU's starters by game broken down by class:**

Statistical Youth: Johns Hopkins ran the ball 55 times and had 19 receptions in last week's win at Gettysburg. All 74 offensive touches were by non-seniors.

Another Statistical Youth: Through three games the Blue Jays have rushed the ball 130 times and have 44 receptions. Of the 174 offensive touches, exactly one (a three-yard reception) has been by a senior.

Lachman Earns Preseason Honors: Johns Hopkins sophomore place kicker **Alex Lachman** was named a Second Team Preseason All-American by *Lindy's* after establishing himself as one of the top young kickers in the nation a year ago.

In addition to earning First Team All-Centennial last season, Lachman garnered Third Team All-America honors from d3football.com.

Lachman hit 34-of-35 kicks last season as he was good on all 23 of his extra-point attempts and nailed 11-of-12 field goal attempts. His 91.7% accuracy rate on field goals tied for the national lead among players with 10 or more attempts.

It's All Academic: Johns Hopkins has earned 26 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 26 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined (22). Taking it back even farther, Johns Hopkins has earned 52 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 1991. During that time the other CC football-playing schools have combined for exactly 52 selections as well.

Johns Hopkins has had at least three players earn CoSIDA Academic All-District honors every year since 2001.

I'm Honored: Johns Hopkins placed eight players on the 2007 All-Centennial Team, four of which are back for the 2008 season. JHU's returning All-Centennial selections include:

Baldwin's Record Day ...

Johns Hopkins senior safety **Chris Baldwin** came to Johns Hopkins as a defensive back and played there as a freshman and sophomore. He then switched to running back last season and enjoyed a solid campaign with 40 carries for 190 yards, 23 receptions for 152 yards and seven kickoff returns for 152 yards.

Still, nothing he had ever done prepared those in attendance at the season-opening Johns Hopkins-St. Lawrence game for the show he put on.

Baldwin returned two interceptions (45 yards, 28 yards) and one fumble (32 yards) for touchdowns to set a Johns Hopkins single-game record for defensive touchdowns. He also tied his career-high with 10 tackles and forced a fumble as well. The three defensive touchdowns are also a Centennial Conference record.

Amazingly, Baldwin touched the ball 70 times as an offensive player last season and did not score a touchdown. He touched the ball three times as a defensive player against St. Lawrence and cashed them all in for scores.

Player Notes of Interest

A.J. Albert (So/LB) - Has 12 tackles, including two for losses, and one pass breakup in three games this season • Had nine tackles, including one for a loss, at Gettysburg • Played in all 10 games with starts in the last six at linebacker last season • Finished fifth on the team (and first among all freshmen) in tackles (53) and added 3.0 tackles for losses and 2.0 sacks.

Chris Baldwin (Sr/DB) - Leads the team in tackles (31), interceptions (3 - 106 yards) and forced fumbles (2) • Made an immediate splash in his first game back on defense after playing running back last season • Set a school record with three defensive touchdowns (2 INTs (45 and 28 yards) and one fumble return (32 yards)) in the win over St. Lawrence • Also tied career high with 10 tackles and forced a fumble to solidify his selection as the Centennial Conference and ECAC Southwest Defensive Player of the Week • As a running back last season, had 70 touches (40 rushes, 23 receptions, seven KOR) and did not score a touchdown • Posted a career-high 12 tackles, one forced fumble and one pass breakup in the win at Randolph-Macon and added nine tackles, one interception (which he returned 33 yards to set up a JHU touchdown) and a pass breakup in the win at Gettysburg.

Tyler Brown (Fr/SS) - Has played in all three games • Saw significant action at Randolph-Macon and had five tackles, including a sack, and forced a fumble that he recovered and returned 22 yards for a touchdown late in the third quarter • Continued to be active near the ball against Gettysburg as he had three tackles and recovered a fumble.

Greg Chimera (Sr/FB) - Prototypical fullback • Totaled 13 carries for 39 yards and five receptions for 51 yards and two touchdowns last season.

Devin Collins (So/DL) - Has five tackles in three games • Emerged as a solid young defensive lineman for the Blue Jays as he played in nine games with two starts at nose guard last season • Totaled 20 tackles, including one sack, on the year • Registered a career-high seven tackles against Randolph-Macon last season.

Dan Crowley (So/WR) - Made the switch to wide receiver late in camp (from QB) and played in his first game at Randolph-Macon • Has four receptions for 89 yards (22.2 ypr. - leads the Centennial Conference) on the year • Had one reception for 22 yards - which converted a second-and-22 and led to a JHU touchdown early in the third quarter at Randolph-Macon • Added three receptions for 67 yards at Gettysburg and also threw a 26-yard touchdown pass on a trick play midway through the second quarter.

Sam Eagleson (Fr/DB) - Has played in all three games and got the first start of his career at Randolph-Macon • Had two tackles against the Yellow Jackets and came back with 12 tackles, including 1.5 for losses, and a pass breakup in the end zone against Gettysburg.

Austin Ehrhart (Sr/SS) - Has started two games (missed Randolph-Macon game with an injury) and has seven tackles on the year • Had a career-high five tackles in the win against Gettysburg • Played in seven games with three starts a year ago • Finished the season with five tackles and one interception to his credit.

Nick Fazio (Fr/RB) - Ranks second on the team in rushing with 22 carries for 68 yards and has one reception for 26 yards (a TD) • Also leads the team and ranks eighth in the Centennial Conference in kickoff return average (18.6 / 8 KOR for 149 yards) • Got the start at running back in the season-opener and rushed nine times for 20 yards • Totaled a personal-best 115 all-purpose yards and a touchdown in the win at Gettysburg as he rushed four times for 14 yards, had a 26-yard touchdown reception that gave JHU the lead for good in the second quarter and added five kickoff returns for 75 yards.

Paul Fields (Sr/CB) - Enjoyed the finest game of his career in the season-opener against St. Lawrence • Posted five tackles and had one interception and a blocked field goal • Has not played in the last two games.

Scott Goldsmith (Sr/OL) - Has started 12 of 13 games at left guard since the start of the 2007 season • Played defensive line in goal line situations last season.

D.J. Hartigan (So/WR) - Has played in all three games and got the first start of his career in last week's win at Gettysburg • Ranks second on the team in receiving with seven receptions for 74 yards • Had a career-high five receptions for a personal-best 53 yards in the win over Gettysburg.

Sean Hennessey (Jr/WR) - Has played in all three games and has three receptions for 35 yards and one touchdown • Caught all three passes in the win over Randolph-Macon - his 25-yard touchdown reception tied the game early in the third quarter.

Brian Hopkins (So/TE) - Has six career receptions ... four of which have resulted in touchdowns • Key player in JHU's 39-31 triple-overtime win at Randolph-Macon as he caught a three-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter and grabbed the two-point conversion pass in the third overtime • Played in all 10 games last season and had five receptions for 14 yards with three of the receptions going for touchdowns • Three TDs were tied for second on the team.

Andrew Kase (Jr/RB) - Ranks 13th in school history with 1,653 yards rushing and fourth in 100-yard rushing games with nine • Leads the Blue Jays in rushing with 79 carries for 334 yards and six touchdowns • Ranks fourth in the Centennial Conference in rushing (111.3 ypg.), seventh in all-purpose yards (115.3 ypg.) and tied for second in touchdowns (6) and points per game (12.0) • Had 24 carries for 95 yards and the game-winning touchdowns in the third overtime of the 39-31 win at Randolph-Macon • Did not start season-opener vs. St. Lawrence, but led the team with 66 yards and one touchdown on 17 carries • Rolled up 181 all-purpose yards (4th-highest total of his career) in the win at Gettysburg as he rushed 38 times for 173 yards (2nd-highest total of his career) and a school-

Scouting the Greyhounds

Moravian Quickly: The Greyhounds welcome Johns Hopkins to Rocco Calvo Field after playing their last two games on the road. Moravian has defeated Susquehanna, McDaniel and Lebanon Valley to run its record to 7-1 in the month of September since the start of the 2007 season. Moravian (3-0) is one of three Centennial teams listed as receiving votes in this week's AFCA Poll (F&M, Dickinson). Muhlenberg is ranked seventh in the nation this week.

'Hounds Lead CC in Rushing Offense: Moravian's quick start can be traced to a pair of the fundamentals off football: an effective running game and a stingy defense.

Moravian's rushing attack has totaled 235 or more yards in each of the first three games of the season and punched up 388 yards in a 42-3 win at McDaniel.

Senior **Tyler McCambridge** is the leader of a three-headed monster as running back as he is averaged 115.0 yards per game and a gaudy 6.6 yards per carry. He rushed for 119 yards and two touchdowns in last week's win at Lebanon Valley.

Tyler deRouen (99.3 ypg.) and **Morgan deRouen** (45.3) team with McCambridge to give the 'Hounds the deepest core of running backs in the Centennial.

Defense Among CC's Stingiest: While Moravian's offense may steal the headlines, the defense quietly ranks among the best in the Centennial Conference. The Greyhounds lead the league in scoring defense (11.0) and rank second in total defense (226.0) and passin defense (134.7). The 'Hounds have also forced 11 turnovers in three games and have allowed just 42 first downs in three games.

Senior linebacker **Kevin McGorry** leads the team with 25 tackles, while senior **Doug Bocchino** leads the league in sacks (4.5) and tackles for losses (6.0). Moravian leads the Centennial Conference with 12 sacks thus far.

Reckenbeil Provides the Edge: Just like Johns Hopkins, Moravian features one of the top place-kickers in the Centennial Conference in senior **Brian Reckenbeil**. Reckenbeil has made all 10 of his extra points this season to extend his streak to 39 straight. Reckenbeil earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors a year ago after hitting all 29 of his extra points and 11 field goals.
