The Game: Johns Hopkins returns to Homewood Field for its home-opener after picking up a 17-16 victory at Hampden-Sydney last Saturday. Randolph-Macon is playing its second straight game away from Day Field. The Yellow Jackets breezed to a 42-16 victory at Denison last week.

About the Coaches: **Jim Margraff** is now in his 18th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 108-63-3 (.629) record into this week's game against Randolph-Macon. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 69-42-2 (.619) record in league play.

Pedro Arruza is in his fourth season as the head coach at Randolph-Macon and sports an 8-23 overall record since taking over in 2004.

JHU Wins Earliest Opener in School History: The September 1st season-opening game last week at Hampden-Sydney was the earliest game ever played in the history of the Johns Hopkins football program.

For Openers: Johns Hopkins has now won nine of its last 11 season openers and the Blue Jays are 10-7-1 in season-openers under head coach **Jim Margraff**. The Blue Jays are 53-62-8 (.463) on opening day since the inception of the program in 1882.

More Openers: Johns Hopkins has won its first home game of the season seven times in the last eight years. The Blue Jays are also 12-4-1 in 17 home-opening games under head coach **Jim Margraff**.

A Final Opener: The win at Hampden-Sydney was JHU's seventh straight in the first road game of the year. Hopkins, which last lost its road opener in 2000, is 10-8 all-time in its first road game of the season under head coach **Jim Margraff**.

September Reign: Part of the reason for the recent success of the Blue Jay football program has been the team's ability to get off to a quick start. Including last week's win at Hampden-Sydney, Johns Hopkins is 21-5 in the month of September since the start of the 2000 season and 32-10 since the start of the 1995 season.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 43-14 (.754) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time. Currently, the Blue Jays have won 19 of their last 24 and 27 of their last 34 at home.

Series History: Johns Hopkins and Randolph-Macon are meeting for the 31st time in a series that dates back to 1904, when JHU picked up a 6-0 victory. The Blue Jays lead the series 15-14-1 and Johns Hopkins has won three of the four meetings since the series resumed in 2002 after a 34-year break. The Blue Jays have posted back-to-back shutouts by identical 24-0 scores in the last two meetings (2003, 2005) at Homewood Field.

The series has been marked by dominant stretches for both teams as Johns Hopkins won the first nine meetings before the Yellow Jackets responded by going 14-3-1 against JHU in the next 18. Those 18 games spanned 1936-2002 with the 34-year break immediately preceding a 17-12 RMC win in 2002.

Entering this week's game, Randolph-Macon was the last team to score a first-quarter touchdown against the Blue Jays as the 'Jackets jumped out to 14-0 lead before the game was 10 minutes old.

Randolph-Macon (1-0) at Johns Hopkins (1-0) / 2

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who in now in his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 108-63-3 (.629). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU has won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .627 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 84-39-1 (.681) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 108 wins. The 108 wins are five more than Hopkins accumulated in the 29 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 103 games.

Against the ODAC: Since starting a series against Bridgewater in 1996, the Blue Jays have played 21 games against teams from the Old Dominion Athletic Conference. The Blue Jays are 15-6 in those 21 games. Prior to beginning the series with Bridgewater in 1996, the Blue Jays had not played a game against a school from the ODAC since 1970, when they finished a series with Hampden-Sydney. This does not include a three-game series against Catholic from 1988-1990 (currently a member of the ODAC, but were not at the time of the three games against JHU).

Streaking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 42-13 (.763) record. Taking it back further the Blue Jays are 48-16 (.750) since the start of the 2001 season and 53-21 (.716) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 53 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already just two shy of the school record for wins in a decade (55/1990s).

More Streaking: The field goal Hampden-Sydney kicked in the first quarter last week snapped an eight-game first-quarter shutout streak for the Blue Jays that dated back to Randolph-Macon game last season. JHU did not allow a point in the first quarter of any of its final eight games in 2006 and the two touchdowns JHU surrendered at RMC last season are the only two first-quarter touchdowns allowed by the Blue Jays since the beginning of the 2006 season.

Comeback Kids: The 17-16 win at Hampden-Sydney was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays. JHU has 10 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead last season was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Block Party: Johns Hopkins blocked exactly three kicks in the first nine games of the 2006 season. In the last two games (vs. McDaniel last season and Hampden-Sydney last week), the Blue Jays have come up with four blocked kicks with the two last week against the Tigers essentially sealing the victory. Senior **Scott Meyers** got through the middle and blocked an extra point early in the fourth quarter and classmate **Patrick Kay** snuffed the potential game-winning field goal as time expired.

Shutouts: Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 17+ seasons under head coach **Jim Margraff** and the two in 2005 mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival in 1990.

Seven's Heaven: For all the different numbers and statistics that can be applied to the Johns Hopkins football team, there has been one simple way to measure the success of the Blue Jays recently. Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 33-6 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Hopkins Football Celebrating a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team will celebrate a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program itself will celebrate its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will be playing on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team has added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field

will be worn on the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program will be worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams will also wear them this fall.

Scouting the Yellow Jackets

Randolph-Macon comes to Homewood Field after an impressive 42-16 victory at Denison. The Yellow Jackets dominated both sides of the ball in knocking off Denison for the second straight year. The 42-point outburst is the highest for RMC since a 43-point showing against Denison in 2001.

Sophomore quarterback **Brandon Braner** ran head coach **Pedro Arruza's** offense to perfection as he was 15-of-31 for 223 yards and three touchdowns before leaving with the 'Jackets comfortably ahead in the fourth quarter.

Junior **Rod Nelson** enjoyed an exceptional day and was on the back end of seven Braner completions for 115 yards and three touchdowns. His 29-yard touchdown reception with one second remaining in the first half gave RMC an 18-9 halftime lead. Junior tight end **Stuart May** added four receptions for 57 yards to complement Nelson and six different players had at least one reception for RMC.

While the passing yards grab everyone's attention, it was the efforts of sophomore **Zak Thornton** that helped the 'Jackets roll up a six-minute advantage in time of possession. Thornton rushed 36 times for 162 yards and one touchdown to fuel a ground game that churned out 199 yards on the day.

Denison struggled all day to get its offense going against a Randolph-Macon defense that allowed just 176 total yards and nine points (DU got a kickoff return for one of its two touchdowns).

Kyle Wiggins posted a team-high nine tackles, including two for losses, and **Eric Dardozi** and **Nate Shook** added seven tackles apiece. Shook also sacked Big Red quarterback **Tom Simeone** in the end zone for a first-half safety.

Randolph-Macon forced Denison into long yardage situations all day as RMC came up with 11 tackles for losses and the Big Red were able to convert on just 4-of-13 third down opportunities.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 64-4 (.941) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 51 of their last 53 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Now graduated WR **Evan Earnest** earned First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America honors last season. He is the 10th player in school history to earn Academic All-America honors. He was joined by senior DL **Brian Nickel** as First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District honorees, while senior DL **Anthony Woodard** and senior OL **Paul Markowski** earned second team status. **The Blue Jays have earned 23 Academic All-District selections since 2003.**

Individual Player Notes of Interest

Chris Baldwin (Jr./RB) - Making the move to RB this season after starting the final six games last season at safety • Finished with 39 tackles, three pass breakups and one interception last season • Had two carries for nine yards against Hampden-Sydney.

Aaron Chance (So./OL) - Enters second season as the starter at right tackle after starting all 10 games there as a freshman last season • Has started a team-best 11 straight games since the start of the 2006 season.

Chris DiForte (Sr./DL) - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Has played in all 22 games since the start of the 2005 season • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney.

Austin Ehrhart (Jr./SS) - Played in seven games last season and posted four tackles • Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney.

Devin Hewlett (So./DB) - Got the first start of his career in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Has played in all 11 games since arriving at JHU.

Richard Hill (Sr./DB) - Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Three PBUs are a career high.

Andrew Kase (So./RB) - Rushed 11 times for 50 yards and had three receptions in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Three receptions tied his career high • Had a solid freshman year with 310 rushing yards and 10 receptions for 55 yards and one touchdown • Posted back-to-back 100-yard rushing games against Gettysburg (113) and Muhlenberg (101) last season.

Patrick Kay (Sr./DL) - Enjoyed a solid effort in the first defensive start of his career against Hampden-Sydney • Registered a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a potential game-winning Tiger field goal on the final play of the game.

Alex Lachman (Fr./PK) - Hit both of his extra points and nailed a 43-yard field goal in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney to earn Centennial Conference Special Teams Player of the Week honors • 43-yard field goal is the longest by a freshman in the Jim Margraff era (1990 - present).

Scott Meyers (Sr./DL) - Started at nose guard against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles and one tackle for a loss • Added a blocked extra point early in the fourth quarter that proved decisive in JHU's 17-16 victory.

Tim Miller (So./OL) - Started at right guard in the season-opener • Start was his seventh straight dating back to last season.

Tucker Michels (Fr./WR) - Had a team-high eight receptions for 37 yards in the season-opener • Eight receptions are the most by a JHU freshman in a season-opener since Sam Skinner had nine in 1996.

JHU Ranks Fifth in Scoring Defense Over Last Five Years

The success of the Johns Hopkins football team over the last several years has been due, in large part, to a defense that has ranked among the national leaders in numerous categories during that time. Most recently the Blue Jays ranked 11th in the nation in scoring defense (13.4), 19th in rushing defense (95.3) and 26th in total defense (269.4) during the 2005 season. They also finished in the top 40 in four defensive categories in 2006.

Taking a closer look reveals that the Blue Jays rank as the fifth-stingiest unit in the nation over the last five years when it comes to scoring defense as JHU has allowed an average of just 13.22 points per game over the last 54 games (since the start of the 2002 season).

Michael Murray (So./QB) - Had career highs of 22 completions and 33 attempts for 134 yards and rushed for 25 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Was 59-of-103 for 713 yards with five touchdowns and five interceptions last season • Threw for a career-high 243 yards and one touchdown and had a personal-best 269 yards of total offense against Gettysburg • Spent the spring as a reserve midfielder on the 2007 NCAA Champion Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team • Appeared in two games for the Blue Jays on their way to a 13-4 record and the team's second national championship in the last three years (2005).

Tom O'Neill (Jr./DL) - Posted a career-high seven tackles against Hampden-Sydney after making the move from linebacker to defensive end • Finished the 2006 season with 22 tackles, two TFLs, one sack, one interception and one PBU.

Bryan Power (Jr./WR) - Had a career-high five receptions for a personal-best 42 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney.

Alex Quermorllue (So./WR) - Made a successful debut at wide receiver with four receptions for 31 yards against Hampden-Sydney • 16-yard reception in the second quarter came one play before JHU's first touchdown and was the longest reception on the day for the Blue Jays.

Dan Requena (Sr./DB) - Co-captain • Posted six tackles in the season-opening win against Hampden-Sydney • Earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors last season, the only non-senior among JHU's 11 CC All-Stars a year ago • Posted 22 tackles, a team-high six pass breakups, two interceptions and one forced fumble in 2006.

Phil Roberts (Sr./RB) - Rushed 18 times for 87 yards and one touchdown in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney • Paced the team with a career-high 561 yards and five touchdowns in 2006 • Finished second on the team with 591 all-purpose yards • Posted a career-high 162 yards and two TDs at St. Lawrence and had 157 yards against Rochester last season • One of just six players in school history to rush for 150 or more yards more than once in the same season (first since 1999).

Mike Stoffel (So./OL) - Started his fifth straight game in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney • Started the final four games of the 2006 season at guard and now playing left tackle.

Adam Winter (Sr./LB) - Spearheaded JHU's defensive effort against Hampden-Sydney with eight tackles and two sacks from his inside linebacker spot • First full season playing linebacker.

Colin Wixted (So./LB) - Picked up where he left off last season as he spotted eight tackles, 4.5 tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks against Hampden-Sydney • Sack on next-to-last play of the game forced the Tigers into a long field goal attempt that was blocked.

Blue Jays Picked Second in Preseason Centennial Poll

The Johns Hopkins football team, which has grabbed at least a share of four Centennial Conference Championships in the last five years and sports a 41-13 overall record since the start of the 2002 season, was picked second in the 2007 Centennial Conference Preseason Poll of coaches and SIDs.

The Blue Jays picked up four first-place votes and totaled 105 points in the poll of league coaches and sports information directors. Ursinus compiled 112 points on the strength of seven first-place votes and grabbed the top spot in the poll for the first time since 1997.
