The Game: Johns Hopkins (1-1) returns to action after a week off looking to build on the momentum of a 21-14 come-from-behind win at Randolph-Macon on September 9. St. Lawrence (1-1) is looking to bounce back from a 17-14 loss at home against Alfred last Saturday.

A Quick Refresher: Johns Hopkins posted an 8-3 record, won its fourth straight Centennial Conference Championship and advanced to the NCAA Playoffs for the first time in school history last season. St. Lawrence already has half as many wins this season as it did all of last year as the Saints posted a 2-7 record, including a 1-6 mark in the Liberty League, in 2005.

Title Time: From 1969-2001 the Johns Hopkins football team did not win a title of any kind. In the last four years the Blue Jays have grabbed four straight Centennial Conference titles and won three ECAC Championships (ECAC Southwest-2002, ECAC South Atlantic-2003, ECAC Southeast-2004).

Series History: This week's game between Johns Hopkins and St. Lawrence will be the first between the two schools. This is the first of two games currently contracted between the two schools with the second game scheduled to take place during the 2008 season.

About the Coaches: Jim Margraff is now in his 17th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 103-59-3 (.633) record into this week's game against St. Lawrence. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 66-39-2 (.626) record in league play.

Chris Phelps is in his seventh season as a head coach at the college level, including his sixth at St. Lawrence. A 1991 St. Lawrence graduate, Phelps sports an overall record of 13-48, which includes a 9-42 mark at St. Lawrence.

September Reign: The win over Randolph-Macon improved the Blue Jays' record to 20-3 in the month of September since the start of the 2000 season and 31-8 in the opening month since the start of the 1995 season. The Blue Jays are also 40-15-1 in September under head coach Jim Margraff.

More September: Johns Hopkins enters this week's game at St. Lawrence riding the crest of a 10-game road winning streak in the month of September. The last time the Blue Jays lost a road game in September was in 2000, when Washington & Lee posted a 32-19 win over JHU in the season-opener for both teams.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 39-12 (.765) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time. Currently, the Blue Jays have won 16 of their last 20 and 22 of their last 28 at home.

Road Warriors: The Blue Jays posted a 5-2 record away from home last season, when they played a school-record seven road games. Hopkins has currently won 11 of its last 13 and 16 of its last 19 road games since late in the 2002 season.

Streaking: The last four years have been the most successful in the history of the Johns Hopkins football program. Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 37-9 (.804) record. Taking it back further the Blue Jays are 43-12 (.782) since the start of the 2001 season and 48-17 (.738) since the beginning of the 2000 season.

Comeback Kids: The 21-14 win at Randolph-Macon was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays. JHU has nine come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The

Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who is now in his 17th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 103-59-3 (.633). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU has won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .631 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 79-35-1 (.691) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 103 wins. The 103 wins are seven more than Hopkins accumulated in the previous 25 years combined (1965-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 96 games.

Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more last year. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Seven's Heaven: For all the different numbers and statistics that can be applied to the Johns Hopkins football team, there has been one simple way to measure the success of the Blue Jays recently. Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 28-3 when scoring more than seven points and 0-4 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 62-4 (.939) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...currently, the Blue Jays have won 49 of their last 51 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 74-10-2 (.872) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less since Margraff arrived for the 1990 season...the Blue Jays have won 41 of their last 43 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

Shutouts: Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 16 seasons under head coach Jim Margraff and the two last season mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival in 1990.

Starting Streaks: Senior tackle **Phil Dixon** is scheduled to make his 33rd consecutive start in the game against St. Lawrence. Only senior wide receiver **Anthony Triplin** (35) has started more consecutive games than Dixon. Triplin is on pace to break **Matt Campbell's** (2001-04) school record for consecutive starts (40), a mark Dixon could match with 10 straight starts this season. Other returning players with active streaks of 20 or more consecutive starts include **Matt Hagel** (24) and **Alan Cody** (24).

Blue Jays Picked to Win Centennial Conference: For the third straight year the Johns Hopkins football team topped the Centennial Conference Preseason Coaches and SIDs poll as the Blue Jays grabbed 12 first-place votes and amassed 72 points to easily outdistance McDaniel (51 points) for the top spot.

It's All Academic: Senior DL **Brian Nickel** returns after earning First Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-District honors last season. The Johns Hopkins football team produced six players who earned Academic All-District honors a year ago, the most of any school in the district for the third consecutive year. In addition, the Blue Jays have earned 19 Academic All-District selections since 2003, the most of any team in the nation at any level over that period.

Star Quality: Johns Hopkins placed a league-high 14 players on the 2005 All-Centennial Football Team. The Blue Jays fashioned a school-record nine first team selections and five second team honorees. The 14 overall selections were one shy of the school record of 15 (set in 2004) and the nine first team picks were three more than JHU had ever accumulated in one season (six in 1991, 1995, 2003).

In addition to the All-Centennial selections, JHU also produced the 2005 Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year as junior wide receiver **Anthony Triplin** became the first JHU player to grab the award since the formation of the league in 1983. Player Notes of Interest - Offense

Quarterbacks

Shane Kibbe • Senior

- Made first career start and led JHU to the come-from-behind win at Randolph-Macon as he was 21-of-36 for a career-high 164 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Also rushed four times for 17 yards to account for a career-high 181 yards of total offense. Hit Evan Earnest with a 21-yard game-winning touchdown with 43 seconds remaining to seal the win.
- In two games this season is 28-of-56 for 286 yards with two touchdowns and two INTs.

Adam Waddell - Sophomore

- Got the start in the season-opener vs. Rochester and was 3-of-7 for 14 yards and rushed eight times for 42 yards before leaving with an injury. Status for this week's game against St. Lawrence is uncertain
- Saw action in five games as a reserve quarterback for the Blue Jays in 2005. He was 2-of-7 for 31 yards and rushed for 103 yards on the year.
- Split the quarterbacking duties with senior Zach Dillonno in the 14-5 win at McDaniel last season. He rushed 14 times for 26 yards (he actually rushed 12 times for 50 yards, but two sacks for a loss of 24 yards drop his totals) and was 1-of-4 for nine yards passing. He directed a nifty eight-play, 48-yard drive that produced JHU's first touchdown late in the first quarter against McDaniel. On the drive he rushed five times for 35 yards.
- Rushed seven times for 54 yards and was 1-for-2 for 22 yards with one interception against Hampden-Sydney last season.

Running Backs

Mark Nesbitt • Senior

- Accounted for 104 all-purpose yards in the win over Randolph-Macon as he had 32 yards rushing, 12 yards receiving and 60 yards on three kickoff returns.
- Rushed seven times for 21 yards, added two receptions for 13 yards and one touchdown and had one kickoff return for 18 yards against Rochester. 14-yard touchdown reception drew the Blue Jays to within 13-10 midway through the fourth quarter.
- Ran career rushing total to 621 yards and career all-purpose total to 1,100 against Randolph-Macon.

Phil Roberts • Junior

- Led the team in rushing for the second straight game with 17 carries for 50 yards and one touchdown against Randolph-Macon.
- Rushed for a career-high 157 yards on 19 carries in the loss to Rochester. 157-yard effort was nearly triple his previous career high (58 vs. Randolph-Macon-2005) and ranks as the second-highest total ever by a JHU running back in a season-opener.
- 157-yard effort vs. Rochester was more than double his total output of the 2005 season, when he rushed 23 times for 77 yards and two touchdowns.
- Ranks third in the Centennial Conference in rushing (103.5) and fourth in all-purpose yards (114.0).

Wide Receivers

Evan Earnest • Senior

- Fueled the win over Randolph-Macon with a career-high eight receptions for 60 yards and the game-winning touchdown on a diving 21-yard catch in the back of the end zone with 43 seconds remaining. Also had nine punt returns for 55 yards.
- Had three receptions for 66 yards against Rochester. 66 receiving yards are a career high and were the most by a Centennial Conference receiver in week one.
- Tied with teammate Anthony Triplin for first in the Centennial in receptions per game (5.50) and ranks second in receiving yards (63.0) and third in all-purpose yards (118.0)
- Amassed a total of 121 all-purpose yards against Rochester with the 66 receiving yards, 36 yards on kickoff returns (1) and 19 on punt returns (4) vs. UR.
- Ranks 11th on JHU's career kickoff return list (461) and eighth in school history in career punt return yards (343).

Corey Sattler • Junior

- Has not played yet this season. Status for this week's game against St. Lawrence is uncertain.
- Finished second on the team in receptions (34) and receiving yards (455) and averaged a team-high 13.4 yards per reception last season. He finished third in the Centennial Conference in receiving yards per game (41.4) and ranked sixth in receptions per game (3.09).

Anthony Triplin • Senior

- Extended streak of consecutive starts to a team-best 35 against Randolph-Macon. Had seven receptions for 67 yards in the win.
- Moved into third place on JHU's career receptions list (188) and fifth place in career receiving yards (2,113) with his seven catches and 67 yards against RMC.
- Ranks fourth on the Centennial Conference's career receptions list and 15th on the career receiving yards list.
- 2005 Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year with 77 receptions for 809 yards and three touchdowns.
- Had 11 receptions against Thiel in the first round of the 2005 NCAA Playoffs. One week earlier he had eight receptions for 105 yards in the 14-5 win at McDaniel in the regular season finale. He had four receptions for 92 yards on JHU's stunning, 99-yard touchdown drive in the fourth quarter that extended a 7-5 lead to 14-5.
- Had a team-high 13 receptions for 123 yards and one touchdown in the win over Gettysburg in 2004. The 13 receptions are tied for the second-highest single-game total in school history.

Offensive Line

Aaron Chance • Freshman

- Has started the first two games of the season at right tackle. First Blue Jay freshman offensive lineman to start a season-opener since Zack Kail in 2000.
- Helped Blue Jays roll to 206 rushing yards against Rochester. Johns Hopkins rushed for more than 200 yards just twice during the 2005 season.

Phil Dixon • Senior

- Has started the first two games of the season at left tackle to run streak of consecutive starts to 32.
- Emerged as a solid starter at left tackle as a freshman after senior Zack Kail was lost for the year to an injury. He started the last eight games and played in the last 10. Has been a fixture in the lineup since then.

John Hunter • Senior

- Has quietly emerged as a dependable starter at right guard. Did not play in the first three games of the 2005 season, but took over as the starter in the fourth game and has started all 10 games since.

Patrick Kay • Junior

- Earned first career start at center for the Blue Jays in the season-opener against Rochester, but missed the game against Randolph-Macon with an injury. This is Kay's first season on offense as he played defensive line his first two years at Homewood.
- Played in nine games last season as a reserve defensive lineman and posted 12 tackles, including 2.5 for losses. He was in on half a sack and had a fumble recovery to his credit.

Paul Markowski • Senior.

- Made 13th consecutive start at left guard in the last game against Randolph-Macon.
- Made the rare jump from first-time starter to First Team All-Centennial last season as he got the nod in all 11 games and earned a spot on the elite squad. Hopkins has produced at least one First Team All-Centennial offensive lineman every year except one (2000) since 1995.

Erik Napp • Senior

- Made the first start of his career in the win over Randolph-Macon as he got the nod at center in place of injured starter Patrick Kay.
- Saw action in four games last season and has played in 11 games in his career.

Defensive Linemen

Brian Cook • Senior • DE

- Registered six tackles, including one for a loss, in the 21-14 win at Randolph-Macon. Named to the Centennial Honor Roll for his efforts in helping JHU hold the Yellow Jackets to 137 yards of total offense.
- Posted four tackles, including one sack, against Rochester. Lone sack on the day improved career total to 21.5, which breaks the previous Johns Hopkins career record of 21.
- Earned First Team All-Centennial honors last season. He finished fifth on the team in tackles (53), led the team in sacks (8.0/59 yards) and tied for second in tackles for losses (11.0/70 yards).
- Enters this week's game with 163 tackles, 39.0 tackles for losses and 21.5 sacks in his career.
- Set a JHU single-season record with 11.5 sacks in 2004.

Alan Cody • Senior • NG

- Posted seven tackles and was in on one tackle for loss against Rochester and added two stops vs. RMC.
- Sat out last season, but led all Johns Hopkins defensive linemen with 69 tackles and added 9.5 sacks in 2004, when he earned Second Team All-Centennial honors.
- Enters this week's game with career totals of 134 tackles and 13.0 sacks.

Chris DiForte • Junior • DE

- Was in on two tackles against Rochester and Randolph-Macon to run career tackle total to 30 entering this week's game.
- Played in all 11 games last season and had season totals of 23 tackles, four tackles for losses and three sacks. He finished sixth on the team in sacks.

Brian Nickel • Senior • DE

- Named to the 2006 AFCA Good Works Team for his efforts off the playing field (see attached release for details).
- Posted six tackles, including 1.5 for losses and one sack, against Rochester and came back with three tackles against RMC. Now has 95 career tackles.
- Earned First Team District II Academic All-District honors in 2005 after garnering second team honors in 2004.
- Finished sixth on the team in tackles (52), fourth in tackles for losses (10.0/39 yards) and tied for fourth in sacks (4.0/23 yards) last year. 52 tackles in 2005 are a career high and ranked third among JHU defensive linemen.

Anthony Woodard • Senior • DT

- Totaled nine tackles, 2.0 tackles for losses and 0.5 sacks against Rochester and came back with two tackles, including one sack, in the win over Randolph-Macon. Sack against RMC came on the final drive of the game and helped seal the victory.
- Earned First Team All-Centennial honors last season.
- Finished fourth on the team - and first among defensive linemen - in tackles (56) in 2005. He also ranked second in sacks (5.5/25 yards) and tied for second in tackles for losses (11.0/35 yards).

Linebackers

Matt Hagel • Senior • OLB (SS)

- Posted eight tackles, including 1.5 for losses, against Rochester and added three tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon. Now has 211 career tackles, by far the most of any active player.
- Earned Second Team All-Centennial honors for the second straight year in 2005.
- Finished second on the team in tackles (81) and third in sacks (4.5) last season. He led the team in tackles for losses (11.5) and added two interceptions, one pass breakup, one blocked field goal and returned a blocked punt for a touchdown in a 14-0 win against Gettysburg.
- Started all 11 games in 2004 and led the team with 106 tackles. He added 16 tackles for losses, one sack, one forced fumble and one interception. He also finished tied for second on the team in pass breakups (6). His 106 tackles were the most by a Johns Hopkins player since 1993 and rank as the 13th-highest single-season total in school history (tackle stats date back to 1980).
- Named the Most Valuable Player in the 26-23 ECAC Southeast Championship Game victory over Waynesburg in 2004 as he registered a career-high 18 tackles, including 15 solos and one for a loss.

Ryan Johnstin • Junior • ILB

- Got the most extensive playing time of his career in the season-opener against Rochester and responded with eight tackles and half a sack. Came back with four tackles against Randolph-Macon and is now tied for the team-lead with 12 tackles in two games.
- Played in all 11 games last season as a reserve LB and special teams standout and had 14 tackles.
- Enters this week's game with 26 career tackles.

Scott Meyers • Junior • ILB

- Got the first start of his career and responded with four tackles against Rochester and came back with a team-high seven tackles against Randolph-Macon.
- Tied for third on the team with 11 tackles, which is already more than he had last season when he mostly saw time on special teams.
- Serving as the team's long-snapper for the second straight season.

Tom O'Neill • Sophomore • ILB

- Earned the start in the season-opener against Rochester and posted three tackles, including one sack, and came back with two tackles in the win against Randolph-Macon.
- Played in 10 games last season and led all JHU freshmen with 15 tackles on the year. Played defensive line in first year.

Zach Rosswog • Junior • OLB (SS)

- Led the team with a career-high 11 tackles and added one pass breakup against Rochester. The start against the Yellowjackets was the first of his career.
- Played in all 11 games as a reserve strong safety and special teams standout in 2005. He finished the season with 17 tackles, 1.5 tackles for losses, one sack and one interception on the year.
- Enters this week's game with 33 career tackles.

Colin Wixted • Freshman • ILB

- Saw extensive playing time in the season-opener against Rochester and responded with five tackles, including one sack. Added three tackles, including one for a loss, against Randolph-Macon.

Defensive Backs

Richard Hill • Junior • CB

- Made first career start against Rochester and posted a career-high six tackles against the Yellowjackets. Came back with two tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon.

Player Notes of Interest - Special Teams

Place-Kicker & Punter

Ben Scott • Sr.

- Further etched name in the JHU and Centennial record books with effort against Randolph-Macon. Hit 2-of-3 field goals and averaged 44.8 yards on four punts to earn Centennial Co-Special Teams Player of the Week honors. Second field goal came with just 13 seconds remaining in the second quarter and was a school-record 52-yarder. The field goal, which tied the Centennial record of 52 yards, was also the 33rd of his career, which also ties the Centennial career record. Scott also landed two of his four punts inside the RMC 20-yard line and booted a 61-yarder late in the third quarter.
- Has hit 3-of-5 field goals and both of his extra points on the year and is averaging 42.0 yards per punt.
- Earned First Team All-Centennial honors as a punter and Second Team All-CC as a place-kicker last season.
- Was 13-for-21 on field goals in 2005 and finished seventh in the nation in field goals per game (1.2). He also averaged a Centennial-best 37.5 yards per punt and dropped a school-record 21 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line. Scott's 13 field goals were one shy of his own school record of 14 (2004), while his 37.5 yards per punt was the highest average for a JHU punter since Jeff Harris averaged 37.6 yards in 1978.
- Drilled three field goals in wins over Rochester and Carnegie Mellon in 2005. Hit a game-winning 37-yarder with one second remaining against UR and drilled a 24-yarder as time expired to lift JHU past CMU. Added a school-record 75-yard punt in the win over Rochester to earn Centennial Player of the Week honors.
- Ranks second in school history in career kick scoring with 148 points.
- Holds the school record for single-season punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line (21 in 2005).

Scouting the Saints

St. Lawrence fell from the ranks of the unbeaten with a 17-13 loss at home against Alfred last Saturday. This week's game against Johns Hopkins is the third of three straight at home to open the season for the Saints, whose two games thus far have been decided by a total of just seven points. The schedule sets up well for a turnaround from last season's 2-7 finish as six of St. Lawrence's nine games this season will be played at home.

Under the guidance of sixth-year coach **Chris Phelps**, the Saints have utilized a stingy defense thus far as Norwich and Alfred have amassed a total of just 444 yards in two games. Moving the ball on the ground against St. Lawrence has been especially difficult in the early season as the opposition is averaging just 1.9 yards per attempts through two games.

Senior linebacker **Hank Anderson** and junior linebacker **Judin Pierre-Louis** lead the way as Anderson counts a team-high 19 tackles, while Pierre-Louis has 17 stops to his credit.

Offensively, St. Lawrence has used a relatively balanced attack under the direction of senior QB **Matt Bezio** in the early season. The Saints enter this week's game against Johns Hopkins averaging 192.5 passing yards per game and 125.0 rushing yards per game.

Bezio has been solid through two games as he has thrown for 385 yards and a pair of touchdowns against three interceptions. His favorite target, junior tight end **Brett Young**, has a team-high 11 receptions for 134 yards, while junior flanker **Mike O'Donnell** is the game-breaker as he is averaging 18.4 yards per reception on eight catches through two games.

One area that has to be a concern for Phelps and his staff is the kicking game. Through two games the Saints have already misfired on four field goal attempts and they allowed a kickoff return for a touchdown in the season-opening win against Norwich.

Notes of Interest: The St. Lawrence defense has seven sacks and 16 tackles for losses through two games ... On the flip side, the Saints have allowed just two sacks through two games. The Saints have allowed 21 points in the first quarter of their two games this season and a total of just nine points over the final three quarters.
