Ursinus (4-1, 2-1 CC) at Johns Hopkins (2-4, 1-3 CC)

The Game: Johns Hopkins and Ursinus enters Saturday's game at Homewood Field fresh off impressive Centennial Conference victories. The Blue Jays (2-4, 1-3 CC) grabbed a 20-17 victory at league-leading Dickinson last Saturday, while Ursinus (4-1, 2-1 CC) rebounded from its only loss of the season with a 31-10 win against Franklin & Marshall.

About the Coaches: **Jim Margraff** is now in his 18th season as the head coach at Johns Hopkins and carries a 109-67-3 (.617) record into this week's game against Ursinus. The all-time winningest coach in school history, Margraff has guided the Blue Jays to four Centennial Conference Championships, three ECAC titles and one appearance in the NCAA Playoffs. In addition to his overall totals, he also ranks among the all-time winningest coaches in the history of the Centennial Conference as he sports a 70-45-2 (.607) record in league play.

Peter Gallagher is in his seventh season as the head coach at Ursinus and carries a 28-38 (.424) record into this week's game against Johns Hopkins. After several years of implementing his own system and recruiting his own players, Gallagher has turned the UC program into a contender for the Centennial title. The Bears sport a 12-4 record since the beginning of the 2006 season and were the only team in the league to beat eventual conference champion Dickinson last season.

A Brutal Stretch: Breaking down the Blue Jays' schedule into games before their bye week (October 20) and after their bye week reveals two entirely different levels of success. JHU's first seven opponents are currently a combined 31-9 (.775), while the final three teams on the schedule are a combined 2-13 (.133).

Road Warriors: Johns Hopkins is 14-6 in its last 20 road games dating back to a 17-3 win at McDaniel in the final road game of the 2003 season.

Home Sweet Home: Since the beginning of the 1996 season Johns Hopkins is 43-17 (.717) at home and has twice enjoyed 10-game winning streaks at Homewood Field during that time.

Streiking: Since the start of the 2002 season the Blue Jays sport a 43-17 (.717) record. Taking it back farther the Blue Jays are 49-20 (.710) since the start of the 2001 season and 54-25 (.684) since the beginning of the 2000 season. The 54 wins the Blue Jays have amassed this decade are already just one shy of the school record for wins in a decade (55/1990s).

In the Zone: Johns Hopkins continues to be the most effective offensive team in the Centennial Conference in the red zone. The Blue Jays got a touchdown and a field goal on their two trips to the zone against Dickinson and are now 15-of-16 (93.8%) on the year with nine touchdowns and six field goals to their credit.

Comeback Kids: The 20-17 win at Dickinson was the latest in a long line of comebacks for the Blue Jays, who trailed 7-0

Series History: Johns Hopkins and Ursinus are meeting for the 50th time in a series that dates to a 12-0 Johns Hopkins victory on October 11, 1958. The Blue Jays lead the all-time series 28-17-4 and have won four of the last six and six of the last 10. Ursinus has won the last two meetings. Neither team has had a dominant run in the series as JHU's longest winning streak is four games and Ursinus' best run is three games.

Johns Hopkins holds a slight advantage in the 24 games played since the formation of the Centennial Conference (13-10-1) and those 24 games have either been very tight (12 decided by six points or less) or blowouts (eight decided by 14 points or more). Three of the last four games at Homewood Field have been decided by six points or less.

Surprisingly, the 50 straight years Johns Hopkins and Ursinus have met (including this year) is the longest active run of games against a current JHU opponent (JHU and McDaniel have been scheduled to play every year since 1947, but the 1963 game was canceled after President Kennedy was assassinated).

Ursinus (4-1) at Johns Hopkins (2-4) / 2

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who in now in his 18th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 109-67-3 (.617). He picked up career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .617 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 85-43-1 (.663) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 109 wins. The 109 wins are six more than Hopkins accumulated in the 29 previous years combined (1961-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 103 games.

early in the first quarter. JHU has 11 come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season. The Blue Jays posted an amazing six come-from-behind wins in 2004 and two more in 2005. Randolph-Macon's 14-0 lead last season was the largest overcome by the Blue Jays since JHU came back from a 14-0 deficit to knock off Ursinus, 20-14, on October 30, 2004.

Shutouts: Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 17+ seasons under head coach **Jim Margraff** and the two in 2005 mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival.

Seven's Heaven: Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 34-10 when scoring more than seven points and 0-5 when they have been held to seven points or less.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 64-6 (.914) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...the Blue Jays have won 51 of their last 54 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 78-10-2 (.878) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less under Margraff...the Blue Jays have won 45 of their last 47 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

It's All Academic: Johns Hopkins has earned 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 2003. JHU's 23 selections in that time are more than the other CC football-playing schools combined. Taking it back even farther, Johns Hopkins has earned 49 CoSIDA Academic All-District selections since 1991. During that time the other CC football-playing schools have combined for 44 selections.

Individual Player Notes of Interest

A.J. Albert (Fr/LB) - Has played in all six games with starts in the last two at linebacker • CC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in last week's win at Dickinson when he registered a career-high 11 tackles, two fumble recoveries and one forced fumble • Ranks fifth on the team in tackles (33) and has two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Chris Baldwin (Jr/RB) - First year as a running back at JHU after two years at safety • Rushed seven times for 27 yards and had a career-high five receptions for 31 yards in the win at Dickinson • Enjoyed breakout game against Moravian with 14 carries for 75 yards and one reception for 14 yards • 41-yard rush against the Greyhounds was the longest by a JHU player in the first four games of the season • Ranks third on the team in rushing (25-130) and fourth in receiving (14-76).

Eric Callocchia (So/QB) - Backup quarterback who saw the most extensive playing time of his career against Gettysburg • Was 9-of-17 for 83 yards with a TD and two INTs • Also rushed eight times for 18 yards.

Aaron Chance (So/OL) - Second season as the starter at right tackle after starting all 10 games there as a freshman last season • Has started a team-best 16 straight games since the start of the 2006 season.

Greg Chimera (Jr/FB) - JHU's starting fullback • Had four carries for 22 yards against Dickinson • Had just one reception against Muhlenberg, but it went for a 25-yard touchdown • Has 10 carries for 32 yards and one TD and two receptions for 29 yards and one TD on the year.

Hopkins Football Celebrating a Pair of Anniversaries

The Johns Hopkins football team will celebrate a pair of anniversaries during the 2007 season. The program itself will celebrate its 125th anniversary as the program was originally founded and played its first game in 1882.

In addition, the Blue Jays will be playing on Homewood Field for the 100th year as the historic facility played host to its first game in 1907.

To celebrate these two anniversaries the team has added a patch and a sticker to its uniforms for the 2007 season. A commemorative patch celebrating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field

will be worn on the team's home uniforms, while a special sticker commemorating the 125th anniversary of the program will be worn on the team's helmets.

The Johns Hopkins men's and women's lacrosse teams wore the patch commemorating the 100th anniversary of Homewood Field last spring, while the men's and women's soccer and field hockey teams will also wear them this fall.



Scouting the Bears

Centennial Conference preseason favorite Ursinus enters this week's game at Johns Hopkins needing a win to keep pace with current league-leader Muhlenberg. The Bears and Mules will meet in Collegeville on November 3, but head coach **Pete Gallagher** knows there is a lot of football to be played before then. Starting today the Bears play three of their final five games away from home.

Gallagher has put together a plan that breeds success - a powerful running game coupled with a rugged defense - and the plan has been working to perfection since the start of the 2006 season. Among CC teams, only Dickinson (13-4) has a better record than Ursinus (12-4) in that time.

Sophomore **Aaron Harper** fuels the Ursinus engine from his running back spot as he is averaging 106.8 yards per game and carried 40 times for 183 yards in last week's 31-10 win against F&M. With Harper leading the way, the Bears rank second in the league in rushing offense (195.8).

Junior **Nick Dye** has started all five games at quarterback for UC and has thrown for 727 yards and seven touchdowns while completing just under 56% of his attempts. Senior **Mike Weyrauch** (15-192-2) and sophomore **Shea Wisler** (13-23-102) are his favorite targets and Harper (13-106-0) is a threat out of the backfield.

Senior **Brian Hrynczyszyn** and junior **DeVohn Butler** headline a defense that is allowing just 260.8 yards per game and has held three opponents to 175 yards or less. Both were First Team All-Centennial picks a year ago.

Hrynczyszyn counts 31 tackles and three tackles for losses from his linebacker spot, while Butler spearheads the secondary from his free safety spot and has 24 tackles on the year.

The Bears don't give up many long drives as the opposition has moved into the red zone just 12 times in five games and UC is allowing just 3.1 yards per rushing attempt on the year.

Chris DiForte (Sr/DL) - JHU's most experienced defensive lineman • Has played in all 27 games since the start of the 2005 season • Matched career high with four tackles against Gettysburg and added four tackles, including 1.5 for losses and one sack, against Muhlenberg • Posted three tackles, including one for a loss, against Hampden-Sydney and added three tackles and a blocked extra point against Randolph-Macon • Counts 15 tackles, four tackles for losses, two fumble recoveries and one sack on the year.

Austin Ehrhart (Jr/SS) - Posted a career-high three tackles and half a sack against Hampden-Sydney and added one tackle and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon.

Scott Goldsmith (Jr/OL) - Has started the first six games of the season at left guard for the first six starts of his career • "Senior" member of the offensive line as the other four starters include three sophomores and a freshman • Plays defensive line in goal-line situations.

Eric Gormeley (Fr/C) - Took over as the starting center against Randolph-Macon • Has played in all six games and has started the last five.

Devin Hewlett (So/DB) - Posted five tackles last week at Dickinson • Got the first start of his career at safety in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles • Came back with a career-high six tackles and one pass breakup against Randolph-Macon and matched the six-tackle effort in each of the next three games • Has played in all 16 games since arriving at JHU and ranks sixth on the team with 32 tackles on the year.

Richard Hill (Sr/DB) - Currently ranked third on the team in tackles (35) after a seven-tackle showing last week at Dickinson • Posted a career-high 10 tackles against Gettysburg • Enjoyed a solid outing in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney as he posted five tackles, three pass breakups and one tackle for loss • Three PBUs are a career high • Added six tackles against Moravian and four tackles and a blocked extra point against Muhlenberg.

Max Islinger (Fr/QB-P) - Saw the first time of his career at QB against Gettysburg and was 5-of-7 for 63 yards • Averaging 31.8 yards on 33 punts and has dropped nine of the 33 inside the opposition's 20-yard line.

Andrew Kase (So/RB) - Registered third straight 100-yard rushing game with a 24-carry, 103-yard effort against Dickinson, when he also had five receptions for 32 yards and one touchdown • First JHU player to post three straight 100-yard rushing games since Adam Cook in 2003 • Rushed 24 times for 140 yards and one touchdown and added three receptions for 32 yards against Muhlenberg • 140 yards were just 11 less than Muhlenberg had allowed in its first three games combined • Effort against the Mules came one week after he punched up a career-high 163 yards and one touchdown against Moravian • Added four receptions for 67 yards, including a 59-yard TD reception, against the 'Hounds for a personal-best 230 all-purpose yards • Leads the team in rushing yards (476), rushing yards per game (95.2) and all-purpose yards (625) • Ranks fourth in the Centennial in rushing and sixth in all-purpose yards (125.0) • Has five career 100-yard rushing games, the most ever by a JHU player before the end of his sophomore year.

Patrick Kay (Sr/DL) - Fueled win at Dickinson with five tackles and ranks ninth on the team with 26 tackles through six games • Enjoyed a solid effort in the first defensive start of his career against Hampden-Sydney • Registered a career-high seven tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a potential game-winning Tiger field goal on the final play of the game • Added five tackles and his first career interception against Randolph-Macon and four tackles and a PBU against Gettysburg.

Alex Lachman (Fr/PK) - Garnered third Centennial Special Teams Player of the Week award after hitting a 40-yard game-winning field goal as time expired against Dickinson • Hit both of his extra points and was 2-for-3 on field goals in the win • Now 12-of-12 on extra points and 8-of-9 on field goals on the year • Eight field goals are already a school single-season record for a freshman and are tied for the fifth-highest overall total • Earned CC Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time with his effort against Moravian • Tied a school record with four field goals (43, 28, 30, 37) and hit all three of his extra points to set a school record for points by a kicker in a game (15) • Tied for 10th in the nation in field goals per game (1.33) and leads all freshmen in the nation with his eight FGs • Ranks second in the CC in field goals, field goals per game and kick-scoring (6.0) • Hit both of his extra points and nailed a 43-yard field goal in the season-opener against Hampden-Sydney to earn Centennial Conference Special Teams Player of the Week honors • 43-yard field goal is the longest by a freshman in the Jim Margraff era (1990 - present).

Scott Meyers (Sr/DL) - Started at nose guard against Hampden-Sydney and posted three tackles and one tackle for a loss • Added a blocked extra point early in the fourth quarter that proved decisive in JHU's 17-16 victory • Missed three games with an injury before returning against Muhlenberg • Posted two tackles against the Mules and three against Dickinson.

Tucker Michels (Fr/WR) - Ranks second on the team in receiving with 18 receptions for 162 yards and one touchdown on the year after coming up with two receptions for 36 yards at Dickinson, including a career-long 31-yarder • Had two receptions for 15 yards, including a 10-yard TD reception with 1:27 remaining to tie the game against Moravian • Had a team-high eight receptions for 37 yards in the season-opener • Eight receptions are the most by a JHU freshman in a season-opener since Sam Skinner had nine in 1996 • Came back with four receptions for a team-high 58 yards against Randolph-Macon.

Tim Miller (So/OL) - Has started all six games this season at right guard and has started 12 straight games dating back to last season.

Michael Murray (So./QB) - Rang up third straight 200-yard passing game against Dickinson as he was 20-of-34 for 223 yards with two touchdowns and two INTs • First JHU quarterback to throw for over 200 yards in three straight games since Rob Heleniak turned the trick in four straight in 2001 • Was 19-of-33 for 213 yards with two touchdowns and four INTs against Muhlenberg • Enjoyed a solid outing against Moravian as he was 21-of-37 for 233 yards and a career-high three TDs • 233 yards is the second-highest total of his career • Had a career-high 22 completions for 134 yards and rushed for 25 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney • Now 97-of-171 for 932 yards with seven TDs and 11 INTs in six games • Threw for a career-high 243 yards and one touchdown and had a personal-best 269 yards of total offense against Gettysburg last season • Spent the spring as a reserve midfielder on the 2007 NCAA Champion Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team.

Bryan Power (Jr./WR) - Posted two receptions for 20 yards at Muhlenberg with both receptions coming on a third-quarter touchdown drive • Had a career-high five receptions for a personal-best 42 yards in the season-opener at Hampden-Sydney and added four receptions for 31 yards against Randolph-Macon • Ranks fifth on the team in receiving with 12 receptions for 99 yards.

Alex Quermorllue (So./WR) - Grabbed the first TD reception of his career with a nine-yard catch against Gettysburg and came back with four receptions for 35 yards against Moravian • Made a successful debut at wide receiver with four receptions for 31 yards against Hampden-Sydney • Ranks sixth on the team with 11 receptions for 90 yards and one TD on the year.

Dan Requena (Sr./DB) - Co-captain • Had three tackles, one pass breakup and forced a fumble in last week's upset at Dickinson • Ranks eighth on the team with 28 tackles • Posted five tackles, including one for a loss, and an interception against Muhlenberg one week after registering three tackles, one forced fumble (which led to a JHU touchdown), one fumble recovery (which led to another JHU touchdown) and one PBU against Moravian • Posted six tackles in the season-opening win against Hampden-Sydney and came back with seven tackles and one sack against Randolph-Macon • Also returned a blocked PAT for a two-point defensive extra point - the first defensive extra point return for a score in school history - against Randolph-Macon • Earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors last season, the only non-senior among JHU's 11 CC All-Stars a year ago.

Zach Rosswog (Sr./SS) - Co-captain • Ranks second on the team in tackles (42) and third in tackles for losses (4.0) • Had back-to-back seven-tackle efforts against Gettysburg and Moravian and a six-tackle showing against Muhlenberg • 117 career tackles is the most of any active player • Posted a career-high 15 tackles against Randolph-Macon • Was in on half a sack and 2.5 tackles for losses against the Yellow Jackets • Played in all 10 games last season and tied for second on the team in tackles (54).

Corey Sattler (Sr./WR) - Co-captain • Paced JHU with four receptions for 64 yards against Dickinson one week after enjoying the finest game of his career against Muhlenberg with seven receptions for a career-high 119 yards • Became the 15th player in school history to top 1,000 career receiving yards with his effort against Muhlenberg and now ranks 13th in JHU history in receptions (77) and receiving yards (1,109) • Leads the team in receptions (24) and receiving yards (337) despite missing the first two games of the season • Paced JHU with eight receptions for 98 yards against Moravian • Saw first action of the season against Gettysburg and responded with five receptions for 56 yards • Ranks second in the Centennial in receiving yards per game (84.2) and fourth in receptions per game (6.00).

Mike Stoffel (So./OL) - Started his 10th straight game last week against Dickinson • Started the final four games of the 2006 season at guard and now playing left tackle.

Mike Todisco (Fr./DB) - Kickoff return specialist and a reserve DB • Had five returns for 83 yards against Gettysburg and two for 45 yards against Muhlenberg • Has nine returns for 154 yards (17.1) on the year to go along with three tackles.

Adam Winter (Sr./LB) - Ranks third on the team in tackles (34), second in tackle for losses (5.5) and is tied for the team-lead with 2.5 sacks • Was in on five tackles, including one for a loss, and had one pass breakup against Moravian and followed that with four tackles against Muhlenberg • Spearheaded JHU's defensive effort against Hampden-Sydney with eight tackles and two sacks from his inside linebacker spot • Added a career-high 11 tackles, including 1.5 for losses, and one forced fumble against Randolph-Macon.

Colin Wixted (So./LB) - Continues to lead the team in tackles (51), tackles for losses (9.5) and sacks (2.5) after posting nine tackles in last week's win at Dickinson • Enters this week's game against Ursinus needing nine tackles to reach 100 for his career • Ranks second in the Centennial Conference in tackles for losses and tied for 10th in tackles per game (8.5) • Registered five tackles, including two for losses, one forced fumble and one fumble recovery against Moravian and came back with seven tackles, including one for a loss, against Muhlenberg • Posted a career-high 14 tackles, including one for a loss, against Gettysburg • Registered eight tackles, 4.5 tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks against Hampden-Sydney • Sack on next-to-last play of the game forced the Tigers into a long field goal attempt that was blocked • Added eight tackles, including a sack, against Randolph-Macon.
