The Team: Johns Hopkins closed another successful season with an 8-3 record, the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship (fourth consecutive year JHU has claimed at least a share of the CC title) and the first-ever trip to the NCAA Division III Playoffs. The Blue Jays are the first Centennial Conference team to win the title outright since 2000.

Title Time: From 1969-2001 the Johns Hopkins football team did not win a title of any kind. In the last four years the Blue Jays have grabbed four straight Centennial Conference titles (including this year's outright title) and won three ECAC Championships (ECAC Southwest-2002, ECAC South Atlantic-2003, ECAC Southeast-2004).

Streaking: The Blue Jays are 27-6 in their last 33 games (since the start of the 2003 season), 36-8 in their last 44 (since the beginning of the 2002 season) and 42-11 in their last 53 (since the start of the 2001 season).

Seniors End Career as All-Time Winningest Class: In addition to claiming at least a share of four straight Centennial Conference Championships, the seniors on the 2005 Hopkins football team won more games (36) than any other class in school history. The previous record (34) was set last season.

November Reign: Bolstering the Blue Jays' recent success has been their ability to close strong. Johns Hopkins is 13-2 in its last 15 games in the month of November and the loss at Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs was JHU's first loss on the road in November since 1999.

Road Warriors: The Blue Jays played a school-record seven games away from Homewood Field during the 2005 season and posted a 5-2 record in those games. The Blue Jays are 18-4 in their last 22 games away from Homewood Field (dating back to the final game of the 2001 season). JHU won a school-record nine straight road games before losing at Hampden-Sydney on November 5.

Comeback Kids: The Blue Jays erased a 10-3 fourth-quarter deficit to knock off Muhlenberg, 13-10, on October 22. Johns Hopkins came from behind to win twice this season (**Ben Scott's** 37-yard field goal with just one second remaining in the fourth quarter beat Rochester in the season-opener) and JHU has eight come-from-behind wins to its credit since the start of the 2004 season.

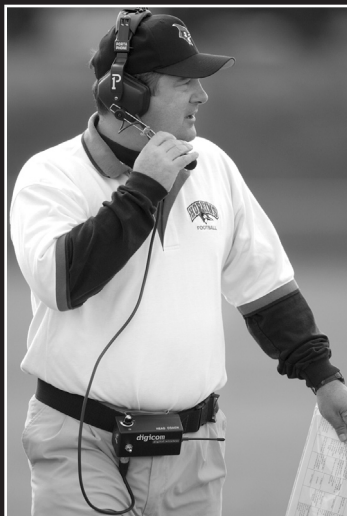
Seven's Heaven: For all the different numbers and statistics that can be applied to the Johns Hopkins football team, there has been one simple way to measure the success of the Blue Jays recently. Since the beginning of the 2003 season the Blue Jays are 27-2 when scoring more than seven points and 0-4 when they have been held to seven points or less. The loss to Ursinus actually snapped a 30-game winning streak for Johns Hopkins when it scored more than seven points.

Keys to Success: Johns Hopkins is an impressive 60-4 (.938) under head coach **Jim Margraff** when scoring 24 or more points...currently, the Blue Jays have won 47 of their last 49 when scoring 24 or more...at the same time, Hopkins is 71-10-2 (.867) when holding the opposition to 14 points or less since Margraff arrived for the 1990 season...the Blue Jays have won 35 of their last 37 games when holding the opposition to 14 points or less.

Defense Leads The Pack: A trademark of the Johns Hopkins football team is a solid defense. Despite several key injuries the Blue Jays continued that trend as they finished first in the Centennial Conference in scoring defense (13.4) and rushing defense (95.3), second in total defense (269.3) and sacks (33), third in passing yards allowed (174.1) and fourth in pass efficiency defense (104.3 rating).

Shutouts: The 14-0 shutout of Gettysburg was JHU's second of the season. Johns Hopkins has posted 14 shutouts in 16 seasons under head coach Jim Margraff and the two this season mark the fourth time in the Margraff era that JHU has posted two or more shutouts in one year (1992 (2), 1996 (2), 2003 (3), 2005 (2)). The Blue Jays posted 11 shutouts in the 20 seasons prior to Margraff's arrival in 1990.

Head Coach Jim Margraff



Johns Hopkins is coached by **Jim Margraff** (JHU '82), who recently completed his 16th season as the head coach at Homewood. Margraff is the all-time winningest coach in school history as he sports an overall record of 102-58-3 (.635) after notching career win number 100 with a 14-0 victory over Gettysburg (10-14-05). Prior to Margraff the previous record for wins by a Johns Hopkins football coach was 60 by Ray Van Orman (1920-35).

The 2005 season saw Margraff lead the Blue

Jays to several firsts, including the program's first-ever outright Centennial Conference Championship and first-ever NCAA Playoff appearance. JHU finished with an 8-3 record, marking the fourth straight season JHU has won eight or more games. Prior to this four-year run JHU had never won more than seven games in a season.

Margraff guided the Blue Jays to a then school-record-tying seven wins in 1996, 1997 and 1998 before leading the Blue Jays to their first-ever post-season appearance (and victory), first-ever Centennial Conference title and a school-record nine wins in 2002. He topped that in 2003 as JHU posted a 10-1 record with Centennial and ECAC South Atlantic Championships before leading JHU to a 9-2 record and Centennial and ECAC Southeast titles in 2004. Margraff's .635 winning percentage is second among JHU coaches who have coached 30 or more games and the Blue Jays are 78-34-1 (.695) since 1995.

Margraff's Resurrection: Since taking over as the head coach prior to the 1990 season, **Jim Margraff** has guided JHU to 12 winning seasons and 102 wins. The 102 wins are six more than Hopkins accumulated in the previous 25 years combined (1965-89). During that time, Hopkins posted 11 winning seasons and won 96 games.

Success on the Field and in the Classroom: The recent on-field success of the Johns Hopkins football team has been well documented, but the Blue Jays have been equally successful in the classroom.

Johns Hopkins placed six players on the 2005 *ESPN The Magazine* District II Academic All-America team, the most of any team in the district for the third straight year. JHU previously placed six players on the 2004 CoSIDA District II Academic All-America team after earning a school-record seven selections in 2003. Below is a list of JHU's 2005 District II Academic All-America selections:

More Success in the Classroom: In addition to placing six players on the 2005 *ESPN The Magazine* District II Academic All-America team, the Blue Jays also tied for the league-lead with eight players named to the 2005 Centennial Conference Academic Honor Roll. All-Centennial selections **Adam Luke** (LB), **Max Whitacre** (LB) and **Jim Sanders** (DB) led the eight-man contingent for the Blue Jays, who also placed **Mike Aynardi** (LB), **Mike Barrasso** (LB), **Brian Nickel** (DL), **Ryan Johnston** (LB) and **Scott Myers** (LB) on the CC's Academic Honor Roll.

Of the four players in the league (all schools) named to the All-Centennial team and the Centennial Football Academic Honor Roll, three were from Johns Hopkins.

Star Quality: Johns Hopkins placed a league-high 14 players on the 2005 All-Centennial Football Team. The Blue Jays fashioned a school-record nine first team selections and five second team honorees. The 14 overall selections were one shy of the school record of 15 (set last season) and the nine first team picks were three more than JHU had ever accumulated in one season (six in 1991, 1995, 2003).

In addition to the All-Centennial selections, JHU also produced the 2005 Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year as junior wide receiver **Anthony Triplin** became the first JHU player to grab the award since the formation of the league in 1983. Player Notes of Interest (Players Listed Alphabetically)

Noting Mike Aynardi • Senior • Linebacker (Wyomissing, PA/Wilson)

- **Mike Aynardi** finished eighth on the team in tackles (50) and added five pass breakups (tied for 2nd on the team), one tackle for loss, one fumble recovery and one interception. He closes his career with 105 tackles to his credit and his 50 this season were a career-high.
- **Mike Aynardi** had a season-high 10 tackles and one PBU in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg.
- **Mike Aynardi** played in all 11 games with six starts in 2004. He posted 26 tackles, including five for losses and 1.5 sacks, and added one pass breakup.
- **Mike Aynardi** registered a career-high 12 tackles in the loss to Dickinson last season.
- **Mike Aynardi** earned Second Team CoSIDA District II Academic All-America honors in 2003, 2004 and 2005. He was also named to the Centennial Football Academic Honor Roll in each of those years as well.

Noting JHU's All-Centennial Tradition

- This is just the fourth time JHU has had two offensive linemen earn First Team All-CC (1991, 1995, 2002).
- This is just the fourth time JHU has had two defensive linemen earn First Team All-CC (1990, 1993, 1994).
- JHU has produced a first team offensive lineman in 10 of the last 11 years.
- JHU has produced a first team defensive back in nine of the last 11 years.
- JHU has produced a first team running back five times in the last seven years.
- JHU has produced a first team wide receiver four times in the last six years.
- Ben Scott is the first punter in school history to earn First Team All-Centennial honors.

Noting Mike Barrasso • Senior • Linebacker (East Hanover, NJ/Hanover Park)

- **Mike Barrasso** finished 10th on the team in tackles this season with 40 despite missing four full games and most of another with a knee injury. He led the team with 32 tackles through four games before being injured and closes his career with 152 tackles to his credit.
- **Mike Barrasso** led the team with a career-high 14 tackles in the win over Dickinson.
- **Mike Barrasso** played in all 11 games with five starts in 2004 and finished second on the team with 77 tackles, including seven for losses. He also had one interception and three pass breakups to his credit. He was in on a then career-high 12 tackles in the 12-9 win over McDaniel that clinched a share of the Centennial title.
- **Mike Barrasso** was named to the 2003, 2004 and 2005 Centennial Conference Football Academic Honor Roll.

Noting Adam Colicchio • Senior • Cornerback (Martinsville, NJ/Immaculata)

- **Adam Colicchio** earned First Team All-Centennial honors and Second Team District II Academic All-America honors this season. He had a career-high 43 tackles and team highs of 11 pass breakups and four interceptions on the year. He ends his career with 99 tackles to his credit.
- **Adam Colicchio** had three tackles and two pass breakups in the regular-season-ending 14-5 win over McDaniel and tied his career high with 10 tackles against Hampden-Sydney.
- **Adam Colicchio** was named the Centennial Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Dickinson. Colicchio posted eight tackles, two interceptions and forced a fumble in the victory. He returned one of his interceptions 33 yards for a touchdown and his forced fumble was returned 31 yards for another score.
- **Adam Colicchio** played in all 11 games and had 10 starts in 2004. He tied for eighth on the team in tackles (41), including three for losses, and led the team in pass breakups (15) and interceptions (5). He added one forced fumble on the year as well. He finished second in the Centennial Conference in interceptions, tied for third in pass breakups and earned Second Team All-Centennial honors.
- **Adam Colicchio** posted a career-high 10 tackles, including one for a loss, and added three pass breakups in the 26-23 win over Waynesburg in the 2004 ECAC Southeast Championship game.

Noting Brian Cook • Junior • Defensive Line (New Freedom, PA/Susquehannock)

- **Brian Cook** earned First Team All-Centennial honors this season. He finished fifth on the team in tackles (53), led the team in sacks (8.0/59 yards) and tied for second in tackles for losses (11.0/70 yards).
- With one year remaining **Brian Cook** has 153 tackles and 20.5 sacks in his career.
- **Brian Cook** registered five tackles, including one sack, forced a fumble and had a pass breakup against Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs.
- **Brian Cook** was his normal disruptive self in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg as he was in on 10 tackles, including three for losses and 0.5 sacks. The 10 tackles tied his career high, which he has reached four times.
- **Brian Cook** played in all 11 games with nine starts last season. He finished fifth on the team in tackles (66) and led the team in tackles for losses (24) and sacks (11.5). He added two forced fumbles on the year and earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors.
- **Brian Cook** posted a 10-tackle effort against McDaniel last season that included two tackles for losses and one sack. He also forced a fumble that JHU recovered and ultimately led to the game-winning field goal.
- **Brian Cook's** 11.5 sacks last season are a Johns Hopkins single-season record. Jim Wilson (11 / 1996) and Jim Ryan (11 / 1984) held the previous record.

Noting Marc DeGennaro • Senior • OL (Secaucus, NJ/St. Peter's Prep)

- **Marc DeGennaro** earned First Team All-Centennial honors this season after garnering Second Team All-CC status in 2003 and 2004.
- **Marc DeGennaro** started all 11 games this season at center and all 33 games since the start of the 2003 season. He is just the third player to start at center for the Blue Jays since 1997.
- With **Marc DeGennaro** anchoring the offensive line, the Blue Jay offense averaged 16.1 points and 284.8 yards of total offense.

Noting Zach DiIunno • Junior • QB (West Caldwell, NJ/James Caldwell)

- **Zach DiIunno** earned Second Team All-Centennial honors for the second straight year. He finished the 2005 season 173-of-306 (.565) for 1,770 yards with four touchdowns and 11 interceptions. He led the Centennial Conference in completion percentage, finished second in passing yards per game (160.9) and finished fourth in total offense (157.1).
- **Zach DiIunno** finished fourth in school history in career passing yards (4,640), pass attempts (782), completions (406), and total offense (4,645) and eighth in career touchdown passes (26). His eight career 200-yard passing games also rank fifth all-time in school history.
- **Zach DiIunno** was named the Centennial Conference Co-Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Kean last season. DiIunno was 24-of-36 for a career-high 371 yards and four touchdowns in the win. The 371 yards rank as the second-highest single-game total in school history. This was the only college game DiIunno ever played in his home state of New Jersey.

- **Zach DiIonno** was 18-of-32 for 239 yards with one touchdown to lead the way in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg and 15-of-27 for 210 yards in the win over Dickinson.
- **Zach DiIonno** was 20-of-33 for 235 yards with one interception and no touchdowns vs. Rochester in the season-opener. He came back with a 23-for-35 showing for 241 yards with one interception against Randolph-Macon and followed that by going 21-of-36 for 166 yards in the win over Carnegie Mellon.
- **Zach DiIonno** played in 10 games with nine starts to his credit in 2004. He was 146-of-287 for 1,812 yards with 14 touchdowns and 10 interceptions. He had a QB rating of 113.03 and rushed for a pair of touchdowns.
- **Zach DiIonno** finished first in the Centennial Conference in passing yards per game (181.2), touchdown passes (14) and total offense (184.8) and third in pass efficiency (113.03) in 2004.
- **Zach DiIonno's** 97-yard touchdown pass to Brian Wolcott against Muhlenberg in 2002 is the third-longest pass play in the history of the Centennial Conference and the second-longest in JHU football history.
- **Zach DiIonno** is one of only two players in school history to twice throw for more than 1,750 yards in a season (2004 & 2005). In addition his 173 completions this season rank second in school history, while his 306 attempts are tied for third.

Noting Chris DiForte • Sophomore • Def. Line (Staten Island, NY/Poly Prep)

- **Chris DiForte** played in all 11 games and had season totals of 23 tackles, four tackles for losses and three sacks. He finished sixth on the team in sacks.
- **Chris DiForte** got the first start of his career in the win over Carnegie Mellon and registered a career high four tackles. He followed that with four tackles, including two for losses and one sack, against Dickinson and four more tackles against F&M.

Noting Phil Dixon • Junior • Offensive Line (Toms River, NJ/Toms River North)

- **Phil Dixon** started all 11 games this season and has started 30 straight games dating back to early in the 2003 season.
- **Phil Dixon** emerged as a solid starter at left tackle as a freshman after senior Zack Kail was lost for the year to an injury. He started the last eight games and played in the last 10.
- With **Phil Dixon** anchoring the offensive line, the Blue Jay offense averaged 16.1 points and 284.8 yards of total offense.

Noting Evan Earnest • Junior • Wide Receiver (Lancaster, PA/Hempfield)

- **Evan Earnest** missed six games with an injury, but still had nine receptions for 74 yards and returned four kickoffs for 108 yards.
- **Evan Earnest** flashed his form of late last season in the game against Ursinus as he had a career-high six receptions for 45 yards and had three kickoff returns for 92 yards. His 47-yard kickoff return early in the second quarter was the longest of his career and led to a JHU touchdown one play later (32-yard pass from Zach DiIonno to Anthony Triplin). The return was also the longest by a Hopkins player this season.
- **Evan Earnest** returned 24 punts for 267 yards (11.1) and 13 kickoffs for 317 yards (24.4) in 2004. He added 10 receptions for 149 yards and one touchdown to finish fifth on the team in receiving. He finished second in the Centennial Conference in kickoff returns and punt returns and earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors as a kick returner this season.
- **Evan Earnest** had a career-high 151 all-purpose yards in the 26-23 win over Waynesburg in the 2004 ECAC Southeast title game. He had four kickoff returns for 99 yards, two punt returns for 15 yards and three receptions for 37 yards. His nine-yard touchdown reception late in the second quarter fueled a 16-0 scoring run that turned a 21-7 deficit into a 23-21 lead.
- **Evan Earnest** broke the Johns Hopkins single-season punt return yardage record with his 267 punt return yards in 2004. The previous record of 239 yards was set by Adam Cook in 2003.

Noting Steve Eno • Senior • Wide Receiver (El Segundo, CA/El Segundo)

- **Steve Eno** enjoyed the finest season of his career as a reserve wide receiver as he had 15 receptions for 160 yards and one touchdown on the year. He finished fifth on the team in receptions and third in receiving yards.
- **Steve Eno** enjoyed two of the finest games of his career this season. He had a career-high five receptions for 53 yards in the win over Randolph-Macon and had three receptions for a personal-best 55 yards against Rochester in the season-opener. He had a career-long 27-yard reception against Randolph-Macon.

Noting Matt Hagel • Junior • Linebacker (Linwood, NJ/Mainland)

- **Matt Hagel** earned Second Team All-Centennial honors for the second straight year. He posted nine tackles in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs against Thiel to run his career total to 200, which is by far the most of any junior on the team.
- **Matt Hagel** finished second on the team in tackles (81) and third in sacks (4.5). He led the team in tackles for losses (11.5) and added two interceptions, one pass breakup, one blocked field goal and returned a blocked punt for a touchdown in a 14-0 win against Gettysburg.
- **Matt Hagel** was named the Centennial Conference Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Muhlenberg. He posted 11 tackles, including 3.0 tackles for losses and 1.5 sacks, and added an interception and a pass breakup.
- **Matt Hagel** was all over the field in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg. He posted eight tackles, including two sacks, had his first interception of the year and returned a blocked punt six yards for a touchdown late in the second quarter.

- **Patrick Kay** played in nine games this season and posted 12 tackles, including 2.5 for losses. He was in on half a sack and had a fumble recovery to his credit.
- **Patrick Kay** posted a career high four tackles in the season-opening 9-7 win at Rochester.

Noting Adam Luke • Senior • Linebacker (Teague, TX/Teague)

- **Adam Luke** earned First Team All-Centennial honors this season. He led the team in tackles (99), ranked fifth in tackles for losses (9.0/47 yards) and tied for fourth in sacks (4.0/36). He also had five pass breakups to his credit and closes his career with 228 tackles. His 99 tackles this season are a career high.
- **Adam Luke** had a team-high 10 tackles, including one sack, and an interception against Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs. The 10-tackle effort was his second straight as he had 10 stops and one pass breakup in the 14-5 win over McDaniel in the regular-season finale.

- **Adam Luke** earned Second Team All-Centennial honors in 2003 as he led the team with 71 tackles, including eight for losses and one sack.

Noting T.J. Lyons • Senior • Running Back (Paramus, NJ/Paramus)

- **T.J. Lyons** earned First Team All-Centennial and First Team District II Academic All-America honors this season. He rushed for a career-high 950 yards and nine touchdowns and ranked second in the Centennial Conference in rushing yards per game (86.4) and third in all-purpose yards per game (97.3). His 950 yards rank third in school history, while his nine rushing touchdowns rank fifth all-time.

- **T.J. Lyons** capped the regular season with 135 rushing yards and two touchdowns in the 14-5 win at McDaniel. This was his eighth career 100-yard game.
- **T.J. Lyons** enjoyed a strong showing against Ursinus as he rushed 23 times for 136 yards and one touchdown and added one reception for 13 yards.
- **T.J. Lyons** ranks fourth in school history in career rushing yards (2,525). He also ranks second in career rushing attempts (546) and sixth in career rushing touchdowns (21). He counts eight career 100-yard rushing games to his credit, which is tied for fourth in school history.
- **T.J. Lyons** led the way in the win over Franklin & Marshall as he rushed 25 times for 149 yards and one touchdown.

- **T.J. Lyons** played in all 11 games with four starts last season. He finished second on the team in rushing with 637 yards and five touchdowns and finished third on the team in receiving with 15 receptions for 166 yards and one touchdown. His 803 all-purpose yards ranked third on the team.
- **T.J. Lyons** was named the Centennial Conference Offensive Player-of-the-Week for his efforts in the win at F&M last season. He rushed 37 times for 173 yards and one touchdown and added six receptions for 83 yards and another TD. The 173 yards were one shy of his career-high, while the 37 carries, 256 all-purpose yards, six receptions and 83 receiving yards were all career highs.
- **T.J. Lyons** led the Blue Jays in rushing with 568 yards on 101 attempts as a freshman. He was the only freshman in the Centennial Conference to earn All-CC recognition in 2002 as he earned Honorable Mention All-Centennial honors.

- **Paul Markowski** enjoyed a solid season in his first year as a starter as he got the nod in all 11 games. Despite being in his first season as a regular he earned First Team All-Centennial honors this year.
- With **Paul Markowski** anchoring the offensive line, the Blue Jay offense averaged 16.1 points and 284.8 yards of total offense.

Noting Mark Nesbitt • Senior • Running Back (Gibsonia, PA/Hampton)

- **Mark Nesbitt** finished second on the team in rushing yards (222) and third in all-purpose yards (554).
- **Mark Nesbitt** is a solid pass-catching threat out of the backfield as he finished fourth on the team in receptions (16) and receiving yards (121).

Noting Brian Nickel • Junior • Defensive Line (Waupun, WI/Waupun)

- **Brian Nickel** earned First Team District II Academic All-America honors this season after garnering second team honors last year. He finished sixth on the team in tackles (52), fourth in tackles for losses (10.0/39 yards) and tied for fourth in sacks (4.0/23 yards). He now has 86 tackles in his career and his 52 this season are a career high and ranked third among JHU defensive linemen.

- **Zach Rosswog** played in all 11 games as a reserve strong safety and special teams standout. He finished the season with 17 tackles, 1.5 tackles for losses, one sack and one interception on the year.
- **Zach Rosswog** posted a career-high six tackles against Hampden-Sydney, including one for a loss.
- **Zach Rosswog** enjoyed one of the finest games of his career in the win over Carnegie Mellon as he had a personal-best four tackles and the first interception of his career in the victory. His interception inside the Blue Jay 10-yard line stopped a CMU scoring threat.

Noting Jim Sanders • Senior • Defensive Back (North Lima, OH/South Range)

- **Jim Sanders** earned Second Team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America, First Team District II *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America and Second Team All-Centennial Conference honors this season. He was a Second Team District II Academic All-American last season.
- **Jim Sanders** finished third on the team in tackles (61), tied for second in pass breakups (5) and had two tackles for losses, one interception and one forced fumble to his credit this season. He finishes his career with 115 tackles and his 61 this season are a career high.
- **Jim Sanders** owns the school record (shared with classmate T.J. Lyons) for most career games played with 44.
- **Jim Sanders** registered a career-high 10 tackles and one pass breakup against Hampden-Sydney and added five against McDaniel in the 14-5 win that sealed JHU's outright Centennial title. He added five tackles against Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs.
- **Jim Sanders** was in on six tackles, including one for a loss, forced a fumble and had a pass breakup against Ursinus.
- **Jim Sanders** was named to the 2005 AFCA Good Works Team for his volunteer activities. Below is a list of some of the activities Sanders has been involved with.

• Sanders completed an internship with the Johns Hopkins University Center for Summer Learning during the summer of 2004. In his role he designed and implemented educational enrichment activities for 30 underprivileged children. He collaborated with the staff to integrate reading and math activities into the program's daily schedule. For his efforts he received 300-hour AmeriCorps Service Award.

• After his experience during the summer of 2004 he took on the role of recruiting supervisor for the Johns Hopkins Center for Summer Learning. Beginning in January of 2005 he evaluated applications and interviewed worthy candidates for the Center's Teach Baltimore program. He had additional responsibilities with advertising and recruiting for the summer program.

• In addition to his work with the Center for Summer Learning, Sanders is an active member of his church group (Federated Orthodox Christians of America - F.O.C.A). In his role with F.O.C.A he has helped organize national conventions, national basketball and bowling tournaments, fund-raising activities and volunteer activities. Prior to enrolling at Johns Hopkins he was also a Key Club Volunteer. Among the activities he was involved with were assisting at local nursing homes and working with the Salvation Army.

Noting Corey Sattler • Sophomore • Wide Receiver (Monroeville, PA/Gateway)

- **Corey Sattler** finished second on the team in receptions (34) and receiving yards (455) and averaged a team-high 13.4 yards per reception. He finished third in the Centennial Conference in receiving yards per game (41.4) and ranked sixth in receptions per game (3.09).
- **Corey Sattler** had three receptions for a career-high 94 yards in the win over Dickinson. His acrobatic 34-yard reception at the DC one-yard line setup JHU's third touchdown. Earlier in the game he had a career-long 41-yard reception.

- **Corey Sattler** had a career-high eight receptions for a game-high 66 yards in the win over Carnegie Mellon.
- **Corey Sattler** made the first start of his career in the season-opener against Rochester and responded with solid showing. He had then career-highs of five receptions for 73 yards. He added four receptions for 42 yards against Randolph-Macon.

Noting Ben Scott • Sophomore • PK/P (Pittsburgh, PA/Shady Side Academy)

- **Ben Scott** earned First Team All-Centennial honors as a punter and Second Team All-CC as a place-kicker this season.
- **Ben Scott** was 13-for-21 on field goals this season and finished seventh in the nation in field goals per game (1.2). He also averaged a Centennial-best 37.5 yards per punt and dropped a school-record 21 punts inside the opposition's 20-yard line. Scott's 13 field goals this season are one shy of his own school record of 14 (2004), while his 37.5 yards per punt is the highest average for a JHU punter since Jeff Harris averaged 37.6 yards in 1978.
- **Ben Scott** averaged 42.1 yards on seven punts and hit a 22-yard field goal against Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs. His 22-yard field moved him into first place on JHU's career field goal list (30).
- **Ben Scott** was named the Centennial Conference Special Teams Player of the Week for his efforts in the season-opening win over Rochester. Scott tied a JHU record with three field goals, including a 37-yarder with one second remaining and a then career-long 45-yarder in the second quarter. He also averaged 40.8 yards on six punts and drilled a school-record 75-yard punt in the fourth quarter.
- **Ben Scott** tied the JHU record for field goals in a game (again) with three against Carnegie Mellon. He tied his career-best with a 45-yard field goal to give JHU a 3-0 lead, hit a career-long 46-yarder to give JHU a 6-3 lead and drilled a 24-yard shot as time expired to give JHU the 9-6 win. He also averaged 39.5 yards on eight punts and shared Centennial Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.
- **Ben Scott** earned Second Team All-Centennial honors last season as he was 29-of-31 on extra points and 14-of-20 on field goal attempts. His 71 points are the most ever by a Blue Jay kicker in one season, while his 14 field goals broke the previous JHU single-season record of 12 (Todd Bencivenni / 1996). He tied for seventh in the nation in field goals per game (1.3).
- **Ben Scott** hit two field goals in a game four times last season and had three field goals of 40 or more yards on the year.

Noting Brian Schiller • Senior • DB (Scotch Plains, NJ/Scotch Plains)

- **Brian Schiller** has played in eight games and had eight tackles, one pass breakup and one tackle for loss to his credit.
- **Brian Schiller** played in nine games with three starts to his credit last season. He started at quarterback in wins over Ursinus and 11th-ranked Hampden-Sydney and at CB against Muhlenberg and Ursinus. He became the first Johns Hopkins player since Frank Gangemi in 1990 to start a game for the Blue Jays on offense and defense when he turned the trick against Ursinus.
- **Brian Schiller** was 12-of-27 for 161 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions last year. He also rushed for 55 yards on the year and had seven tackles on defense.
- In last season's win over Ursinus, **Brian Schiller** was 10-of-20 for 143 yards with two touchdowns and two interceptions. He also rushed for 47 yards on 14 carries (he actually rushed 10 times for 68 yards, but four sacks for -21 yards come off his rushing total). He played the first two series on defense before playing only on offense the remainder of the game.
- **Brian Schiller** made his first start of the 2004 season at cornerback for the Blue Jays against Muhlenberg. He had one tackle and one interception, which he returned 38 yards to the Mule three-yard line.

Noting Anthony Triplin • Junior • Wide Receiver (Baltimore, MD/Gilman)

- **Anthony Triplin** earned Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Year honors and First Team All-Centennial status this season. He is the first JHU player to earn Centennial Offensive Player of the Year honors.
- **Anthony Triplin** had career-highs of 77 receptions for 809 yards and three touchdowns. He led the Centennial in receptions per game (7.0) and receiving yards per game (73.5). He finished tied for 19th in the nation in receptions per game and his 77 receptions were one shy of the JHU single-season record.
- **Anthony Triplin** had 11 receptions against Thiel in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs. One week earlier he had eight receptions for 105 yards in the 14-5 win at McDaniel in the regular season finale. He had four receptions for 92 yards on JHU's stunning, 99-yard drive in the fourth quarter that extended a 7-5 lead to 14-5.
- **Anthony Triplin** had eight receptions for 79 yards against Hampden-Sydney and had a team-high seven receptions for 69 yards and one touchdown in the game against Ursinus. His 32-yard touchdown reception early in the second quarter gave Hopkins a 10-7 lead.
- **Anthony Triplin** now has career totals of 177 receptions for 1,997 yards and 12 touchdowns. He ranks fourth on JHU's career receptions list, sixth on the career receiving yards list and is tied for ninth in career TD receptions. In addition, he is tied for fifth on the Centennial Conference's all-time receptions list.
- **Anthony Triplin** had four receptions for 69 yards and one touchdown in the 13-10 win over Muhlenberg. His 12-yard touchdown reception early in the fourth quarter tied the game (10-10).
- **Anthony Triplin** was named the Centennial Conference Offensive Player of the Week for his efforts in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg. He had 11 receptions for a career-high 169 yards and one touchdown in the 14-0 victory. His 80-yard touchdown reception early in the second quarter is the longest reception of his career.
- **Anthony Triplin** led the team with 56 receptions for 682 yards and four touchdowns last season en route to earning Second Team All-Centennial honors.

Noting Adam Waddell • Freshman • Quarterback (Altoona, PA/Altoona)

- **Adam Waddell** saw action in five games as a reserve quarterback for the Blue Jays this season. He was 2-of-7 for 31 yards and rushed for 103 yards on the year.
- **Adam Waddell** split the quarterbacking duties with senior Zach DiLonno in the 14-5 win at McDaniel. He rushed 14 times for 26 yards (he actually rushed 12 times for 50 yards, but two sacks for a loss of 24 yards drop his totals) and was 1-of-4 for nine yards passing.
- **Adam Waddell** directed a nifty eight-play, 48-yard drive that produced JHU's first touchdown late in the first quarter against McDaniel. On the drive he rushed five times for 35 yards.
- **Adam Waddell** got his first extensive playing time of the season at Hampden-Sydney and took the most of his opportunity. Waddell rushed seven times for 54 yards and was 1-for-2 for 22 yards with one interception against the Tigers.
- **Adam Waddell** led the Blue Jays on a three-play, 51-yard scoring drive on his first drive of the game against Hampden-Sydney as he rushed 33 yards on his first play from scrimmage to jump-start the offense. He directed another solid drive - covering 48 yards on 12 plays - before an interception in the end zone brought the drive to a close. The 99 yards Waddell helped produce on two drives was more than half the total JHU accumulated on its first 11 possessions of the game (167).

Noting Max Whitacre • Senior • Linebacker (Sugarloaf, PA/Bishop Hafey)

- **Max Whitacre** earned First Team District II Academic All-America and Second Team All-Centennial honors for the second straight season this year.
- **Max Whitacre** closed the season with 51 tackles, including 3.5 for losses and one sack, one interception, three pass breakups and four blocked kicks (3 punts / 1 field goal) on the year. He ends his career with 231 career tackles.
- **Max Whitacre** was in on a season-high nine tackles, including two for losses, and had a pair of pass breakups in the 14-5 victory at McDaniel that clinched the outright Centennial title for the Blue Jays.
- **Max Whitacre** posted six tackles and blocked a field goal attempt against Ursinus and added three tackles against Hampden-Sydney.
- **Max Whitacre** posted five tackles, including one for a loss, and blocked a pair of punts in the 14-0 win over Gettysburg. The second of his two blocked punts was returned six yards for a touchdown by Matt Hagel late in the second quarter.
