The Team: The 2004 Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team posted a 13-2 record and advanced to the Final Four for the third consecutive season. The Blue Jays ended the regular season ranked number one and earned the top seed in the NCAA Tournament for the third consecutive year. JHU lost to fourth-seeded Syracuse, 15-9 in the semifinals.

Head Coach Dave Pietramala: Dave Pietramala recently completed his fourth season as the head coach of the Blue Jays. The 2002 USILA National Coach of the Year, he sports an overall record of 70-27 (.722), including a 47-10 (.825) record at Johns Hopkins.

Pietramala spent three years as the head coach at Cornell (1998-2000) before returning to his alma mater prior to the 2001 season. He is the only person in the history of college lacrosse who has earned NCAA Division I National Player of the Year honors (1989) and NCAA Division I National Coach of the Year honors (2000 & 2002).

Pietramala has guided the Blue Jays to the NCAA Tournament in each of his four seasons as the head coach at Homewood and has made five straight trips as a head coach as his final team at Cornell also qualified for the NAAs.

Pietramala was selected for induction into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame on June 23, 2004 and will be part of a 10-member class that will be inducted on November 20, 2004.

These Are The Facts: Johns Hopkins will enter the 2005 season with an all-time record of 833-263-15 (.757) in 116 seasons of play. The Blue Jays own seven NCAA titles, 29 USILA titles and 6 ILA titles for a total of 42 national championships.

Captain My Captain: Senior attackman **Conor Ford** (Timonium, MD/St. Paul's), senior midfielder **Kevin Boland** (Jessup, MD/Gilman), senior LSM **Corey Harned** (Holbrook, NY/Sachem), senior defenseman **Greg Raymond** (Corning, NY/Corning East) and junior defenseman **Chris Watson** (Yorktown, NY/Yorktown) served as team captains for Johns Hopkins this season.

All In the Family: For the fourth consecutive season, the Johns Hopkins coaching staff consisted entirely of Johns Hopkins' graduates. Head coach Dave Pietramala and assistant coaches Seth Tierney (class of 1991), Bill Dwan (1991) and Pat Miller (2001) all earned their degree at JHU. Prior to the 2001 season when Pietramala, Tierney, Dwan and Howard Offit comprised the Blue Jay coaching staff, the last time the entire coaching staff was made up of JHU graduates was 1984, when the Blue Jays were coached by Don Zimmerman (1976), who was assisted by Jerry Pfeifer (1966), Joe Devlin (1978), Fred Smith (1950), Joe Cowan (1969), and Dennis Townsend (1966).

Pulling Rank: Johns Hopkins ended the regular season ranked number one for the third consecutive season. The Blue Jays were ranked number one for nine weeks this season (out of 11), including the last five. Since the beginning of the 2002 season, Johns Hopkins has spent 21 of 31 weeks ranked number one. From 1996-2001 the Blue Jays were ranked number one for a total of one week.

The Johns Hopkins Sports Information Office use the GEICO STX/USILA Poll as the official poll when listing a team's ranking.

Tough: Johns Hopkins once again played arguably the most difficult schedule in the nation. The Blue Jays played five of the other seven NCAA Quarterfinal teams during the regular season (Princeton/Syracuse/North Carolina/

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Streaking- Part I: Johns Hopkins made its record 33rs straight trip to the NCAA Tournament in 2004, a streak which is by far the longest in the nation. Hopkins has competed in every NCAA Tournament since 1972, having missed only the first tournament in 1971. Below is a list of the longest active streaks of qualifying for the NCAA Division I Lacrosse Tournament.

Streaking- Part II: In addition to boasting the longest active streak of qualifying for the NCAA Lacrosse Tournament, the JHU men's lacrosse team also boasts the longest active streak of qualifying for the NCAA Tournament in any Division I team sport.

Below are the longest active streaks in each of the five major team sports in which the NCAA sponsors championships. Bowl games for Division I-A football are not included since they are not directly sponsored by the NCAA. Also, finishes at national championships in individual sports (wrestling/swimming/track) are not included.

Leading the Pack: In addition to the above streaks, the Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team holds the record for the most overall appearances in the NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament (33). Maryland/Navy) and the other three teams that advanced to the Final Four (Syracuse/Princeton/Navy). Johns Hopkins was the only team in the nation that played the other three teams that advanced to the Final Four during the regular season.

More Tough: The game against Towson on May 1 was the Blue Jays' eighth straight against a team ranked in the top 20 in the nation at the time of the game and the ninth overall against a team in the top 20. Overall, JHU played 11 games against top 20 teams this season.

A Final Tough: Six of Johns Hopkins' 15 games this season were played against teams ranked in the top five in the nation at the time of the game. The Blue Jays were 5-1 in those six games.

OK, One More: Johns Hopkins played 11 games against teams that qualified for the 2004 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championships (including the three games in the NCAA Tournament). JHU was 10-1 in those 11 games.

Brother Act: The Blue Jays had six players on this year's team whose brother previously played for Hopkins. Senior LSM **Corey Harned** (Chris), junior attackman **Peter LeSueur** (Paul), sophomore middle **Greg Peyser** (Mike), sophomore attackman **Joe Benson** (Bobby), sophomore goalie **Scott Smith** (Todd) and sophomore defenseman **Andrew DiConza** (P.J.) all followed older brothers to Johns Hopkins.

Home Sweet Home: Johns Hopkins has won 27 straight games at Homewood Field and is 28-1 at home under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. The Blue Jays' only home loss under Pietramala was a 9-8 loss in four overtimes to Virginia during the 2001 season. **The current 27-game home winning streak is the longest for Johns Hopkins since the Blue Jays won 31 straight home games from 1982-85.**

More Home: In eight home games this season the Blue Jays outscored their opponents, 110-55 (13.75 - 6.88). In the last two years (15 games), JHU has outscored the opposition, 236-96 (15.7-6.4)

Anytime, Anywhere: Including the NCAA Semifinal game against Syracuse, 35 of the last 37 games Johns Hopkins has played away from Homewood Field have been against teams ranked in the top 20.

Regular-Season Roll: Johns Hopkins is 36-3 (.923) in its last 39 regular season games. This is the best 39-game regular season run for Johns Hopkins since JHU won 36-of-39 regular season games covering a span from 1982-86.

More Rolls: Dating back to the 2002 season, Johns Hopkins is 36-5 (.878) in its last 41 games (including the NCAA playoffs). Hopkins' five losses during that time have come by a total of 12 goals.

One-Goal Turnarounds: JHU is 16-4 in one-goal games under head coach Dave Pietramala (since the start of the 2001 season) and the Blue Jays won 4-of-5 one-goal games this season. From the final game of the 1994 season through the 2000 season Johns Hopkins was 11-9 in one-goal games.

Overtime Notes: Johns Hopkins improved to 1-1 in overtime games this season with the 10-9 overtime victory over Navy. The Blue Jays are 5-2 in overtime under head coach Dave Pietramala.

Younger Than You Think: Despite fielding a team that boasted starting experience at virtually every position, the Blue Jays were still not what you would consider a senior-laden team. In fact, of the players listed on the starting attack, the first two midfielders, the starting defense, the top two goalies and the defensive midfield, only three were seniors.

I'm Honored: Johns Hopkins placed seven players on the 2004 STX/USILA All-America Team, which was announced at halftime of the NCAA Division I Championship Game. Junior midfielder **Kyle Harrison** garnered First Team AA status, while senior attackman **Conor Ford**, senior midfielder **Kevin Boland**, junior attackman **Kyle Barrie** and junior defenseman **Tom Garvey** all garnered Second Team honors. Junior midfielder **Matt Rewkowski** (Third Team) and senior LSM **Corey Harned** (Honorable Mention) rounded out JHU's seven selections.

More Honors: Junior **Kyle Harrison** was awarded the 2004 Lt. Donald McLaughlin Award as the nation's outstanding midfielder. He is the first Hopkins middle to earn the award since Del Dressel (1984 & 1985) and he is just the fourth Blue Jay to ever win the award (Dave Huntley - 1979, Brendan Schneck - 1981).

Quick Starts: For the second consecutive year the Blue Jays parlayed quick starts into victories. Hopkins outscored the opposition, 48-27 in the first quarter this season and 102-52 in the first half.

A Pesky Bunch: Johns Hopkins, which finished ninth nationally in scoring defense (7.67 goals/game), had its consecutive games streak of holding the opposition to less than 10 goals snapped at 18 when Maryland's Bill McGlone scored with 26 seconds remaining in the 14-10 win over the Terps. Prior to Maryland, the last team to score 10 goals against the Blue Jays was North Carolina (3-29-03).

More Pesky: Syracuse scored 15 goals against the Blue Jays in the NCAA Semifinals to snap a streak of 26 consecutive games where the Blue Jays didn't allow more than 10 goals in a game. Prior to this Syracuse was also the last team to score more than 10 goals against Johns Hopkins (in a 15-14 victory over the Blue Jays on March 15, 2003).

A Game of Runs: Johns Hopkins used a balanced scoring attack, strong play on faceoffs and a stingy defense to put together some game-turning scoring runs in 2003. The Blue Jays had 10 runs of 7-1 or better in 2003 and had eight this season. Below is a look at some of Hopkins' most impressive scoring runs of the 2004 season:

Player Notes of Interest (Players listed alphabetically)

Noting Kyle Barrie - Junior • Attack (Narberth, PA/Haverford School)

• Kyle Barrie earned Second Team STX/USILA All-America honors this season as he tied for third on the team in scoring with 26 goals and 11 assists for 37 points. His 26 goals were tied for second on the team, while his 11 assists ranked third.

• Kyle Barrie scored three goals and added one assist in the win over Providence in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. Prior to being held scoreless by North Carolina and Syracuse he had registered at least two points in all seven NCAA Tournament games he had played in during his career. Through his first nine career NCAA Tournament games he has 19 goals and four assists for 23 points. His 19 goals scored in the NCAA Tournament are already just six shy of the JHU record of 25 and ties him for seventh on JHU's career NCAA list.

• Kyle Barrie recorded the 100th point of his career in the win over Albany. He now has career totals of 86 goals and 39 assists for 125 points. He is tied with Matt Panetta (1988-91) for 20th on JHU's career goal-scoring list.

• Kyle Barrie's 86 goals are the sixth-highest total ever by a JHU player at the end of his junior year.

• Kyle Barrie scored a team-high four goals in the win over Hofstra and added three in the win over Syracuse.

• Kyle Barrie had his point-scoring streak snapped at 31 games when UVa held him scoreless. He had posted two or more points in 27 of the 31 games during his scoring streak, which was the longest active scoring streak on the team. Prior to that game the last time Barrie was held without a point was by Syracuse on March 16, 2002 in a 9-8 Hopkins win at Homewood Field. He has registered at least one point in 40 of the 44 games he has played in during his career.

• Kyle Barrie broke out of a mini-slump with a three-goal, one assist effort in the win over Maryland. He scored the first two JHU goals (in the first 1:29 of the game) and scored two of JHU's three extra-man goals in the win. He added one goal against Navy, two goals and one assist against Towson and two goals against Loyola.

• Kyle Barrie earned First Team All-America honors and earned a spot on the NCAA All-Tournament Team in 2003. He led the Blue Jays in scoring with 37 goals and 20 assists for 57 points despite missing a game-and-a-half with an injury. He was the only sophomore to earn First Team All-America honors.

• Kyle Barrie scored four goals and added one assist in the NCAA Semifinals against Syracuse and added one goal and one assist against Virginia in the championship game in 2003.

• Kyle Barrie scored a career-high nine points in the 17-3 win over Navy last season. He tied his career high with five goals and added a personal best four assists as well. He had four goals and three assists in the first half.

• **Kyle Barrie** scored a team-high 10 extra-man goals last season. He finished third on the team with five extra-man goals this season.

Noting Kevin Boland - Senior • Midfield (Jessup, MD/Gilman)

• **Kevin Boland** earned Second Team STX/USILA All-America honors this season as he scored 13 goals and added a team-high 32 assists for 45 points. He had four goals and seven assists in JHU's three NCAA Tournament games. His 45 points ranked second on the team. Prior to this season he earned Third Team All-America honors as a sophomore and junior.

• **Kevin Boland** broke the school record for career assists by a midfielder with his 76th and 77th in the win over Providence in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. He broke the record of 75, which was set by four-time First Team All-American Del Dressel (1983-86). Boland finished 10th on JHU's career assist list with 82 to his credit.

• **Kevin Boland** had eight goals and 29 assists in games played in the month of May in the last two seasons (2003 & 2004). He registered at least four points in seven of the 10 games, including three of five this season.

• **Kevin Boland** was the leading scorer in the NCAA Tournament in 2003 as he scored three goals and added 12 assists for 15 points in the four games. His three-assist showing against Syracuse pushed his career NCAA Tournament totals to eight goals and 21 assists for 29 points. Boland ended his career as JHU's career NCAA Tournament assist leader with his 21 helpers in the playoffs.

• **Kevin Boland** scored one goal and added four assists in the 10-9 win over Navy. He assisted on each of Conor Ford's first four goals in the win. He followed that with a four-assist effort in the win over Towson and a three-assist showing vs. Loyola.

He ranked first among JHU's freshmen in scoring and was the only freshman on JHU's extra-man unit. • **Conor Ford** earned All-America honors for the first time in his career this season as he garnered Second Team STX/USILA All-America status.

• **Conor Ford** scored 23 goals and added two assists in the last six games. He closed the regular season with a three-goal, one-assist effort against Loyola and added three goals and one assist against Providence in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. He finished the season with a team and career-high 44 goals and nine assists for a team-best 53 points. His 53 points this season are a career high.

• **Conor Ford's** 44 goals this season are the 10th-highest single-season total in school history.

• **Conor Ford** had 26 goals and 11 assists in the 10 games Johns Hopkins played in the month of May in the last two years (2003 and 2004).

• **Conor Ford** scored five goals in the NCAA Quarterfinal victory over North Carolina. He scored five straight Johns Hopkins goals to turn a 4-3 second quarter lead into a 9-4 advantage early in the third quarter. He actually scored his five goals on five consecutive shots. He added two goals in the NCAA Semifinals against Syracuse.

• **Conor Ford** scored five goals in a game exactly once in his first 51 career games. He hit that mark in back-to-back games as he tallied five in the win over Navy, including the game-winner with three seconds remaining in overtime, and five in the win over Towson. - **Conor Ford** started on Hopkins' first midfield during the 2002 and 2003 seasons after playing attack as a freshman. He made the move back to attack this season, where he thrived. In 21 career starts on attack (four as a freshman, two as a junior, 15 this season), he had 62 goals and 18 assists for 80 points (2.95 gpg. & 3.81 ppg.). He registered at least three points in 16 of the 21 games.

- **Conor Ford's** extra-man goal with 8:57 remaining in the third quarter against Towson in the 2003 NCAA Quarterfinals was the 100th point of his career.

- **Conor Ford** scored 10 goals and added one assist in JHU's three NCAA Tournament games this season. His 10 goals in NCAA play were a team-high, while his 11 points tied him with Kevin Boland for the team-lead.

- **Conor Ford** is just the eighth player in school history to score 10 or more goals in one NCAA Tournament. His 10 goals are tied for the fourth-highest single-tournament total in school history.

- **Conor Ford** registered two or more points 41 times in his career. Johns Hopkins was 37-4 (.902) in those 41 games.

Noting Tom Garvey - Junior • Defense (Garden City, NY/Garden City)

- **Tom Garvey** earned Second Team STX/USILA All-America honors this season. This was the first time he was honored as an All-American.

- **Tom Garvey** started all 15 games on close defense for the Blue Jays this season and has started 31 straight games overall. He had 24 ground balls to his credit this season.

- **Tom Garvey** and the Johns Hopkins defense allowed just 7.67 goals per game and killed off 38-of-52 man-down opportunities (.731). JHU finished ninth in the nation in scoring defense.

- **Tom Garvey** and the Johns Hopkins defense held 26 consecutive opponents to 10 goals or less prior to the NCAA Semifinals against Syracuse. 24 of the 26 were held to nine goals or less.

- **Tom Garvey** earned a spot on the 2003 NCAA All-Tournament Team after helping the Blue Jays to the NCAA Championship game. He helped limit standout Syracuse attackman Mike Powell to just two assists in the NCAA Semifinals and Virginia's starting attack unit combined for just four points in the championship game.

- With **Tom Garvey** helping lead the way, Johns Hopkins finished third in the nation in scoring defense (6.94) in 2003. Hopkins held 14 of its 16 opponents to nine goals or less and seven of the last 10 to six goals or less.

- **Tom Garvey** and the Johns Hopkins defense finished second in the nation in man-down defense in 2003. The Blue Jays killed off 40-of-47 (.851) on the year.

Noting Corey Harned - Junior • LSM (Holbrook, NY/Sachem)

- **Corey Harned** earned Honorable Mention STX/USILA All-America honors this season. This was the first time he was named an All-American in his career.

- **Corey Harned** completed his third season as Hopkins' top long-stick defensive middle and finished third on the team with 52 ground balls to his credit. He tallied his first goal of the season in the win over Hofstra and added an assist in the win over Duke.

- **Corey Harned** and the Johns Hopkins defense allowed just 7.67 goals per game and killed off 38-of-52 man-down opportunities (.731). JHU finished seventh in the nation in scoring defense.

- **Corey Harned** and the Johns Hopkins defense held 26 consecutive opponents to 10 goals or less prior to the NCAA Semifinals against Syracuse. 24 of the 26 were held to nine goals or less.

- A former high school attackman, **Corey Harned** entered the 2003 Final Four with career totals of one goal and three assists for four points. He had two goals and two assists in the Final Four, including a one-goal, two assist, five ground ball showing in the win over Syracuse in the semifinals. His goal against Virginia trimmed the Cavaliers' lead to two (they had been up 5-0).

- **Corey Harned** finished second on the team with a career-high 67 ground balls last season. As demonstrated in the Final Four, he is adept at jump-starting the Hopkins transition game.

- With **Corey Harned** helping lead the way, Johns Hopkins finished third in the nation in scoring defense (6.94) last season. Hopkins held 14 of its 16 opponents to nine goals or less and seven of the last 10 to six goals or less.

- **Corey Harned** and the Johns Hopkins defense finished second in the nation in man-down defense in 2003. The Blue Jays killed off 40-of-47 (.851) on the year.

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Johns Hopkins NCAA Tournament Notes of Interest

- Johns Hopkins' win over North Carolina in the NCAA Quarterfinals was the 52nd all-time NCAA Tournament victory for JHU. By comparison, only three other schools (Syracuse/Virginia/Maryland) have even played 52 NCAA Tournament games.
- Johns Hopkins has played 78 all-time NCAA Tournament games. No other school has played more than 65 NCAA Tournament games.
- This was Johns Hopkins' 25th trip to the NCAA Semifinals. Only two other schools (Virginia/Maryland) have even been in the tournament 25 times.
- JHU is 15-10 all-time in the NCAA Semifinals and holds the record for most consecutive victories in the NCAA Semifinals (nine from 1977-85). No other team has won more than four consecutive NCAA Semifinal games.
- Johns Hopkins' 15 all-time appearances in the NCAA Championship game are the most in tournament history.
- In an 18-year span from 1972-89, Johns Hopkins appeared in the NCAA Championship game 14 times.
- Johns Hopkins is 37-3 (.925) all-time in the NCAA Tournament when holding the opposition to 10 goals or less. Currently, JHU has won 13 of its last 14 NCAA Tournament games when holding the opposition to 10 goals or less.
- Johns Hopkins has knocked the defending national champion out of the NCAA Tournament six times in its history (1973 / 1974 / 1978 / 1983 / 1984 / 1987). No other school has eliminated the defending national champion more than four times (Syracuse). In all, JHU has played the defending NCAA Champion the following year in the NCAA Tournament 12 times and has posted a 6-6 record in those 12 games.

Noting Kyle Harrison - Junior • Midfield (Baltimore, MD/Friends)

- **Kyle Harrison** earned First Team STX/USILA All-America honors and was presented the McLaughlin Award as the nation's top midfielder this season. He was also a Tewaaraton Finalist for the second consecutive year.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored 26 goals and added seven assists for 33 points this season. His 26 goals are a career-high. He had three game-winning goals and two man-down goal on the year as well.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored three goals and added one assist in the 15-9 win over North Carolina in the NCAA Quarterfinals and added two goals in the semifinals vs. Syracuse. The four points vs. UNC are a career playoff high for Harrison. He scored JHU's 10th goal, which stopped a three-goal run by UNC that had trimmed a 9-4 deficit to 9-7. He later added a short-handed goal that gave JHU a 13-8 lead.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored two goals, won 5-of-6 faceoffs and had four ground balls to his credit in the win over Providence in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored two goals and added one assist in the 11-7 win over Loyola. His second goal in the win over Loyola was the 50th of his career.
- **Kyle Harrison** registered his fourth consecutive multi-goal game with a three-goal effort in the win over Navy. His goal with 4:42 to play drew the Blue Jays to within 9-8. He scored two or more goals in eight of his last nine games.
- **Kyle Harrison** fueled JHU's win over Maryland with a two-goal performance. He also won 3-of-7 faceoffs and had four ground balls in the 14-10 victory.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored Johns Hopkins' second man-down goal of the season in the win over Duke and it proved to be the game-winner in the 6-5 victory. He had two goals against both North Carolina and Duke.
- **Kyle Harrison** helped Johns Hopkins dominate the possession battle in the win over Syracuse as he won 10-of-11 faceoffs and had 14 ground balls. He added one goal in the 17-5 victory as well.
- **Kyle Harrison** won 6-of-9 faceoffs and added one goal and one assist in the game at 17th-ranked Virginia.
- In addition to ranking among JHU's scoring leaders, **Kyle Harrison** also finished first on the team in ground balls (69) and won 60-of-109 (.550) faceoffs on the year as well.
- **Kyle Harrison** scored a career-high four goals and added one assist in the win over 5th-ranked Princeton. He had one goal and one assist, a team-high nine ground balls and won 6-of-8 faceoffs against Albany.
- After scoring nine goals and adding four assists as a freshman, **Kyle Harrison** exploded in 2003 as he finished sixth on the team in scoring with 22 goals and 14 assists for 36 points. He now has career totals of 57 goals and 25 assists for 82 points.
- **Kyle Harrison** finished eighth in the nation in faceoff winning percentage last season as he won 109-of-174 (.626). He also led the team with 83 ground balls. In his career he has won 289-of-473 (.611) faceoffs and has 237 ground balls.
- In nine career NCAA Tournament games, **Kyle Harrison** has won 65-of-110 (.591) faceoffs and has 50 ground balls. He also has 13 goals and five assists to his credit.

Noting Jamison Koesterer - Freshman • Midfield (Cazenovia, NY/Cazenovia)

- **Jamison Koesterer** was a member of Hopkins' third midfield this season. He played in 12 games on the year.
- **Jamison Koesterer** scored one goal and added one assist on the year. He also won 9-of-16 (.562) faceoffs and had five ground balls to his credit. He scored his lone goal in the win over Albany and added an assist in the win over Towson.

Noting Peter LeSueur - Junior • Attack (Garden City, NY/Garden City)

- **Peter LeSueur** finished sixth on the team in scoring with 10 goals and 15 assists for 25 points. His 15 assists ranked second on the team.
