Setting the Scene: Johns Hopkins plays its final regular season game of the year as the Blue Jays make the one-mile trip up Charles Street to take on Loyola. Both teams enter the game with a record of 7-5.

Looking Back: The Blue Jays won their fourth straight game with a 12-1 win over Mount St. Mary's on Monday night (4-28) at Homewood Field. Loyola had a three-game winning streak snapped as the Greyhounds dropped a 10-6 decision at Hobart.

Tourney Talk: The bracket for the 2008 NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament will be announced on Sunday, May 4 between 9 pm and 10 pm. The bracket announcement will air on ESPNU.

These are the Facts: Johns Hopkins enters the game against Loyola with an all-time record of 878-277-15 (.756). The Blue Jays own nine NCAA titles, 29 USILA titles and six ILA titles for a total of 44 national championships.

125th Anniversary: The 2008 season marks the 125th anniversary of the Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse program. The Blue Jays are wearing commemorative patches on their uniforms for the 125th anniversary of the program (it is NOT the 125th season) and the logo is being used in a variety of printed pieces to promote the anniversary.

That's 601 Games Over .500: Including the win against Mount St. Mary's, the Blue Jays' all-time record is now 878-277-15 ... that's 601 games over .500. To put this in perspective: JHU has played an average of just under 15 games per season under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. Using a 15-game season as a reference, if the Blue Jays posted a 5-10 record for 120 straight seasons, they would still be one game over .500.

Poll Position: Johns Hopkins is ranked fifth in the USILA Coaches Poll and the Nike/Inside Lacrosse Media Poll. Loyola is ranked 17th in the USILA Coaches Poll and 16th in the Nike/Inside Lacrosse Media Poll. To clarify, the Johns Hopkins Sports Information Office uses the USILA Coaches Poll to reflect JHU's official ranking at the time of a game.

Prepping for May: Johns Hopkins closed out another successful run in April with the 12-1 win over Mount St. Mary's on Monday night. Including the win over the Mount the Blue Jays are 36-4 (.900) under head coach **Dave Pietramala** in games played in April. Amazingly, the loss at Duke (Apr 5) was JHU's first road loss in the month of April since a 10-9 setback at Maryland on April 14, 2001.

May Day: The success of April has carried over into the month of May for Johns Hopkins. JHU is 23-5 (.821) in the month of May under head coach **Dave Pietramala**, including a perfect 12-0 mark at Homewood Field. In addition, the Blue Jays are 8-0 in regular season games played in the month of May under Pietramala and have not lost a regular season game in the month of May since suffering a 9-8 overtime loss at Hofstra on May 8, 1999.

State Rivalries: Without question the Blue Jays play one of the most difficult schedules in the nation and a big part of that schedule are the in-state rivalries the Blue Jays have. The game against Loyola will be the sixth of the year for Johns Hopkins against a team from the state of Maryland. JHU has won all five of its games this season against in-state rivals (UMBC, Maryland, Navy, Towson, Mount St. Mary's) and the Blue Jays are 37-2 (.949) against teams from Maryland under head coach **Dave Pietramala**.

Halftime Speech is Working: During the current four-game winning streak the Blue Jays have out-scored the opposition 18-4 in the third quarter.

Man-Down Unit Improving: One area where the Blue Jays struggled during the middle of the season was in man-down situations. The opposition converted on 9-of-15 (.600) chances in a six-game span that started against Hofstra and ended against Maryland. However, in the last three games the Blue Jays have found their way in man-down situations as Navy, Towson and Mount St. Mary's have combined to convert on just 2-of-13 (.154) extra-man chances.

Extra-Man Unit Rolls On: Johns Hopkins has been opportunistic when given extra-man opportunities as the Blue Jays rank fifth in the nation in man-up offense as they've converted on 14-of-30 (.467) chances this season. The 30 chances are the fewest of any team ranked in the top 25 in the nation in this category. JHU

converted on its only EMO opportunity against Mount St. Mary's. Senior **Paul Rabil** leads the team with five extra-man goals, while freshman **Kyle Wharton** (3) and seniors **Michael Doneger** (2) and **Kevin Huntley** (2) have also cashed in on these chances.

One-Goal Turnarounds: The three straight losses to Hofstra (8-7), Syracuse (14-13) and Virginia (13-12) are rare one-goal losses for the Blue Jays under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. Johns Hopkins is now 30-9 in one-goal games since Pietramala took over in 2001. Despite the losses, the Blue Jays have won 17 of their last 22 and 21 of their last 27 one-goal games. In the five seasons prior to Pietramala arriving (1996-2000) the Blue Jays were 5-8 in one-goal games.

More One-Goal Notes: The Blue Jays have come from behind to win 14 times during their last 17 one-goal wins. In 10 of those 14 come-from-behind one-goal wins the Blue Jays have come back from a deficit of two goals or more. The latest of these come-from-behind one-goal wins came against Notre Dame in the 2007 NCAA Tournament, when the Blue Jays erased a 4-1 second-quarter deficit.

In Case We Go Extra: The loss at Hofstra snapped a nine-game winning streak for the Blue Jays in overtime games. The Blue Jays had won nine straight overtime games dating back to a 10-9 win at Navy in 2004 before the loss to the Pride. Including the OT loss to Virginia, JHU is 13-5 all-time in overtime under Pietramala's guidance, including an impressive 6-3 in overtime games played on the road.

Players on the 2008 team who have scored game-winning goals in overtime during their career:

- Senior **Kevin Huntley** punched home the game-winner in the second OT against Duke in 2005.
- Junior **Brian Christopher** scored 1:22 into OT against Loyola on May 6, 2006.
- Senior **Paul Rabil** fired home the game-winner 56 seconds into the 2nd OT against Princeton on March 3, 2007 and tallied the game-winner 43 seconds into overtime at Maryland (4-14-07). He is the only player in school history who has scored two overtime game-winners in the same season.
- Sophomore **Michael Kimmel** became the first freshman in school history to score an overtime goal in an NCAA Tournament game when he netted the game-winner one-minute into overtime against Notre Dame last season.

More Overtime: The three consecutive overtime games for the Blue Jays against Hofstra, Syracuse and Virginia mark the first time Johns Hopkins has ever played three straight overtime games. Twice previously the Blue Jays had played two consecutive overtime games (1982 and 1988).

Comeback Kids: The Blue Jays have come from behind to win three times this season (Albany, UMBC, Towson). Johns Hopkins came from behind to win eight times last season, including six times during the season-ending nine-game winning streak. JHU trailed in its first two NCAA Tournament games, but never trailed during the Final Four.

Streaking: Johns Hopkins is 72-16 in its last 88 regular season games dating back to the end of the 2001 season and is 84-20 overall since the start of the 2002 season.

Defensive Turnaround: Johns Hopkins allowed 57 goals in consecutive losses to Syracuse, Virginia, North Carolina and Duke. However, the Blue Jay defense has rebounded nicely in the last three weeks with standout showings in wins over Maryland (10-

Scouting the Greyhounds

Loyola Quickly: Unlike many teams that enter the final weekend of the regular season with their NCAA Tournament hopes in doubt, the Greyhounds have already locked up a bid to the Tournament. Loyola won the ECAC Championship and will receive the league's automatic bid to the NCAAs. The 'Hounds carry a 7-5 record into the regular season finale against JHU and could be positioned for a home game in the first round with a win against the Blue Jays.

Koppens Leads Balanced Offense: Head coach **Charlie Toomey** and the Greyhounds feature a balanced offensive unit that is paced by senior **Shane Koppens**. Koppens counts 17 goals and a team-high 22 points to his credit and fueled an 11-9 victory over then fourth-ranked Georgetown with a five-goal masterpiece. Koppens dropped five points on JHU last season (2g, 3a).

Stopping Koppens does not ensure success as **Copper MacDonnell** (20g, 5a), **Matt Langan** (11g, 6a), **Collin Finnerty** (12g, 1a) and **Jake Willcox** (10g, 2a) contribute to an offense that has totaled 11 or more goals six times this season.

Stingy Defense Among Nation's Best: While offense often draws the attention, coaches will tell you that games are won on defense and Loyola features one of the nation's best.

Spearheaded by freshman **Jake Hagelin** in goal, the Greyhounds have held nine of 12 opponents to nine goals or less and only two teams (Duke and Syracuse) have gotten more than 10 on LC. In fact, five teams haven't scored more than five goals against Loyola and the 10 Hobart managed last week are the most the 'Hounds have allowed since SU put up 13 in late March.

Hagelin sports a 7.76 goals against average and a .583 save percentage and ranks in the top 20 in the nation in both categories.

McDermott Among National Leaders: Faceoffs are always a crucial part of a lacrosse game and Loyola features one of the top faceoff specialists in the nation in senior **Tim McDermott**. McDermott has won 102-of-171 (.596) faceoffs on the year and ranks eighth nationally in that category. As a team the Greyhounds have won 143-of-251 (.570) to rank 10th as a team.

Notes of Interest: Loyola is 6-0 when scoring 10 or more goals this season • The Greyhounds have outscored the opposition 65-44 in the first half of their games this season • Loyola's man-down defense is among the best in the nation as the opposition has converted on just 10-of-45 (.222) chances this season.

4), Navy (12-5), Towson (16-7) and Mount St. Mary's (12-1). This is the first time JHU has held four straight opponents to seven goals or less since turning the trick against Princeton (14-5), Albany (17-6), Hofstra (13-6) and Syracuse (17-5) early in the 2004 season. The 17 goals the Blue Jays have allowed in the last four games are the fewest in a four-game span since 1989, when JHU allowed just 15 in wins over Washington College (12-1), Rutgers (10-6), Princeton (11-5) and Virginia (12-3).

Defensive Notes of Interest:

- During the current four-game winning streak the opposition has scored 17 goals on 129 shots for a shooting percentage of .131.
- The one goal allowed in the 12-1 win over Mount St. Mary's is the fewest JHU has allowed since April 24, 1999 when the Blue Jays beat Navy 11-1. The Blue Jays held Mount St. Mary's scoreless for the final 49:11. This is the longest Johns Hopkins has held an opponent scoreless since March 11, 1989, when JHU held Washington College off the board for the first 50:20 in a 12-1 win.

- Johns Hopkins has held the opposition scoreless for a streak of 14 minutes or longer 14 times in 12 games this season. Since the start of the 2007 season the Blue Jays have held the opposition scoreless for a streak of 14 minutes or longer 31 times.

- Hopkins has held the opposition scoreless for 25 minutes or longer 10 times since the start of the 2007 season, including four times this season.

- The Blue Jays have held 14 of their last 18 opponents - including nine of 12 this season - scoreless for a stretch of at least 18 minutes.

- The four goals the Blue Jays allowed against Maryland are the fewest Hopkins has allowed against a team ranked in the top 10 under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. The last time JHU held a top-10 opponent to four goals or less was on April 16, 1999, when JHU beat then seventh-ranked Maryland, 13-3. Prior to the Maryland game the Blue Jays had allowed 13 or more goals in four straight games.

More Defensive Notes of Interest:

- Albany scored its first goal just 36 seconds into the game against JHU. The Great Danes scored exactly one more goal in the next 41:21.

- Princeton scored exactly one goal in the first 35:18 against JHU.

- Hofstra scored six goals in the first 13:02 against the Blue Jays. The Pride didn't score again until just 9:02 remained in the fourth quarter.

- Maryland scored exactly two goals in the first 40:24 against JHU.

- Navy scored three goals in the opening 56:46 before scoring twice in the final 3:14.

- JHU held Towson scoreless for stretches of 23:33 and 16:27 in the win over the Tigers.

- Mount St. Mary's scored with 4:48 remaining in the first quarter and then didn't score again.

Don't Forget the Offense: While the focus of any **Dave Pietramala**-coached team will always be defense, the Blue Jay offense has been effective as well this season. Consider:

- As a team the Blue Jays have scored on 31.7% of their shots through 12 games (130-of-410). JHU connected on 28.8% of its shots en route to winning the national championship a year ago. The Blue Jays' highest shooting percentage in the Pietramala era came in 2003 when they connected on 31.7% (224-of-706) of their shots.

- Although not the highest scoring team in the nation, the Blue Jays may be one of the most balanced teams on the offensive end of the field. JHU has had seven or more different goal-scorers in seven different games this season with a season-high nine different players scoring against Syracuse, Navy and Mount St. Mary's. Eight different players scored against Virginia and Towson and seven hit the back of the net against Princeton and UMBC.

- Dating back to the end of last season, JHU has scored in double figures 14 times in its last 18 games and is averaging 11.2 goals per game during that time (202 goals in 18 games).

- The 16 goals the Blue Jays scored against Towson are the most for JHU since a 17-goal out-burst at Syracuse last season.

Playing the Possession Game: JHU has won the ground ball war in nine of its 12 games this season and has a 420-377 ground ball advantage on the year (+3.6 GBs per game). Hofstra (31-29), Duke (40-38) and MSM (31-30) are the only teams to win the ground ball battle against JHU this season.

Kevin and Dave Huntley Make History: When Johns Hopkins slipped past Duke, 12-11, for the national championship last spring, there were plenty of members of the Huntley family in high spirits. After all, then junior attackman **Kevin Huntley** scored three times in the title game and punched home what proved to be the game-winning goal with 3:25 remaining in the fourth quarter. The national championship is the second for the Blue Jays since Huntley arrived in 2005.

A little research reveals that Huntley's game-winner also lifted he and his father, Dave, into the record books. **Dave Huntley** was a standout midfielder for Johns Hopkins from 1976-79 and was a member of the Blue Jays' 1978 and 1979 NCAA Championship teams.

It is believed that Dave and Kevin Huntley are the first father and son to win multiple NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Championships as players. There are sets of brothers who have won multiple titles and fathers who have coached their sons to championships, but Dave and Kevin Huntley are the only father and son in the history of the sport to each win more than one NCAA Division I title as players.

Kevin and Dave Huntley Make History, Again: When **Kevin Huntley** scored the 100th goal of his career in the win over Towson few knew that he and his dad, **Dave Huntley**, had joined such a select group.

Research indicates that Kevin (101 career goals through the Mount St. Mary's game) and Dave Huntley (100 goals at Johns Hopkins from 1976-79) join **Bill Morrill** (107 goals at Johns Hopkins from 1957-59) and **Mike Morrill** (102 goals at Johns Hopkins from 1985-88) as the only father-son combinations in Division I lacrosse history to score 100 or more goals during their careers.
