Blue Jays-Orange for a Trip to the NCAA Semifinals: Fourth-seeded Johns Hopkins (9-4) travels to Stony Brook, New York to take on fifth-seeded Syracuse (9-4) in the NCAA Quarterfinals. The Blue Jays and Orange are meeting for the 11th time in the NCAA Tournament and the 43rd time overall.

And the Winner Gets: The winner of the Johns Hopkins-Syracuse game will meet the winner of the Virginia-Georgetown game in the NCAA Semifinals on Saturday, March 27 at Philadelphia's Lincoln Financial Field.

These are the Facts: Johns Hopkins enters this week's game with an all-time record of 858-267-15 (.759). The Blue Jays own eight NCAA Championships, 29 USILA titles and six ILA titles for a total of 43 national championships.

A Quick Refresher: Johns Hopkins posted a 16-0 record and won its eighth NCAA title last season. Syracuse posted a 7-6 record and lost to Massachusetts, 16-15, in the first round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament.

35 in a Row: This year's tournament bid is the 35th straight for Johns Hopkins, which missed the inaugural NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament in 1971, but has qualified for every one since (see page 7 sidebar for more information).

10 in a Row: The Blue Jays drew the number four seed in this year's NCAA Tournament. This is the 10th consecutive year Johns Hopkins has been seeded in the top four in the tournament. By comparison, only two other schools (Syracuse & Georgetown) have even qualified for the tournament in each of the last 10 years.

- ✓ Johns Hopkins is making its 35th straight appearance in the NCAA Men's Lacrosse Tournament. **This is the longest streak of qualifying for any Division I team championship.**
- ✓ Johns Hopkins is 18-4 in the month of May under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. **JHU is 11-4 in the NCAA's under Pietramala.**
- ✓ **A win over Syracuse would move JHU into the NCAA Semifinals for the 27th time.** Only three other teams have even qualified for the tournament 27 times (Maryland/Virginia/Syracuse).
- ✓ **Brian Christopher** has scored a goal in 10 straight games, the longest such streak for a JHU freshman midfielder in the last 25 years.
- ✓ Junior goalie **Jesse Schwartzman** has started six career NCAA Tournament games. The Blue Jays have won all six and Schwartzman boasts a 6.17 goals against average and a .615 save percentage in those six games.

Scouting the Orange

The Orange Quickly: Syracuse has rebounded from a 1-4 start to move into the NCAA Quarterfinals. The Orange will carry an eight-game winning streak into Saturday's game against Johns Hopkins after picking up a not-as-close-as-it-looks 11-4 win over Harvard in the first round.

Head Coach John Desko: Now in his seventh season as the head coach at Syracuse, John Desko has enjoyed a remarkable run of success, even by the standards of the Syracuse faithful. Desko boasts a 96-29 (.768) record and the Orange won NCAA Championships in 2000, 2002 and 2004 under his guidance.

Syracuse has played in five NCAA Championship games in Desko's tenure and won 15 games during each of its three title seasons.

Defense Fuels Turnaround: While the Syracuse offense is kicking into its normal late-season gear, the Orange defense has been remarkable during the eight-game winning streak.

Syracuse allowed an average of 12.6 goals per game during its 1-4 start, but that average has dropped to 8.3 during the eight-game winning streak.

Fueling the run has been the play of redshirt freshman **Peter Coluccini**, who has played all but about 45 minutes in goal for the Orange this season. Coluccini fashions a 9.56 goals against average and a .568 save percentage, but his overall goals against average has dropped nearly four goals per game and he boasts a solid .595 save percentage since The Blue Jays and Orange met in March.

Lethal Weapon Three: With all due respect to the Danny Glover/Mel Gibson movie series, the Syracuse lacrosse team may actually feature the true "Lethal Weapon Three" in attackmen **Brett Bucktooth**, **Mike LeVeille** and **Joe Yevoli**. The trio has combined for 81 goals and 48 assists and has accounted for 15 of the team's 20 extra man goals.

Bucktooth has emerged as a First Team All-America candidate as he has a team and career-high 33 goals and 17 assists for 50 points. To put that in perspective, he entered the 2006 season with 56 points in three seasons.

LeVeille, who has eight goals and one assist in two career games against Johns Hopkins, counts 27 goals and a team-high 18 assists to his credit, while Yevoli is making the most of his only season at Syracuse as he has 21 goals and 13 assists on the year.

Notes of Interest:

- A win would give Syracuse a trip to the NCAA Semifinals for the 23rd time in 24 years.
- Syracuse has struggled on faceoffs this season as the Orange have won 160-of-327 (.489) on the year.
- The highly-touted freshman trio of **Pat Perritt**, **Dan Hardy** and **Kenny Nims** has combined for 31 goals and 14 assists on the year. Perritt counts 16 goals and three assists to his credit.
- Syracuse has outscored its opponents in every quarter this season with its biggest advantage coming in the third period (42-26).

34-of-35: With the 13-3 win over Penn in the first round of the NCAA Tournament, Johns Hopkins has moved into the quarterfinal round of the NCAAs for the 34th time in 35 trips to the tournament.

May Madness: Johns Hopkins improved to **18-4 all-time under head coach Dave Pietramala in games played in the month of May** with the win over Penn. The Blue Jays have won seven straight, 11 of their last 12 and 15 of their last 17 games in the month of May under Pietramala.

Fresh Faces: A year ago the Blue Jays had three seniors start every game and another started all but one. In addition, six other seniors played in at least 11 games. There are just two seniors in the tentative starting lineup for this week's game and only one other senior is on the depth chart (see chart below). Among the top 17 players on the depth chart, six are freshmen, three are sophomores and five are juniors.

Youth Gone Wild: Johns Hopkins has amassed a total of 126 goals and 64 assists through 13 games. Of those totals, 115 of the 126 goals (91.3%) have been scored by non-seniors and 52 of the 64 assists (81.3%) belong to players who will return in 2007 as well. Greg Peyser (11g, 12a) is the only senior who has registered a point for the Blue Jays through 13 games. Below is a breakdown of the Blue Jays' scoring by class:

Seniors Rank Third in All-Time Wins: The eight senior members of the Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team became just the eighth class in school history to amass 50 or more wins when JHU knocked off Towson and have improved their all-time record as a class to 52-8 with two wins since. There are just two classes that have compiled more victories than the class of 2006 (see chart to right for complete breakdown).

Pietramala Stands Alone: Johns Hopkins head coach **Dave Pietramala** is the only person in lacrosse history who has won an NCAA Division I Championship as a player (1987) and a head coach (2005). He is also the only person who has been named the national player of the year and the national coach of the year. He fashions a 72-14 (.837) record in six seasons as the head coach at Hopkins and a 95-31 (.754) record in nine seasons overall.

Homecoming: This week's game against Syracuse at Stony Brook will be a homecoming of sorts for seven Johns Hopkins players who hail from Long Island. Below is a list of the seven who will be "heading home" for the NCAA Quarterfinals:

More Homecoming: Johns Hopkins head coach **Dave Pietramala** and associate head coach **Seth Tierney** are also making a trip "home" for this week's game. Pietramala is a native of Hicksville, New York and attended St. Mary's High School. Tierney was raised in Wantagh, New York and attended MacArthur High School.

Streaking: Johns Hopkins is 56-7 in its last 63 regular season games dating back to the end of the 2001 season and 64-10 overall since the start of the 2002 season.

One-Goal Turnarounds: JHU is 24-4 in one-goal games under head coach **Dave Pietramala** and the Blue Jays have won 11 straight and 15 of their last 16 one-goal games. In its previous 28 one-goal games (covering a span from a 14-13 win over Syracuse in 1989 through 2000), Hopkins was 15-13.

More One-Goal Notes: The Blue Jays have come from behind to win 10 times during their current 11-game winning streak in one-goal games. In seven of those 10 come-from-behind one-goal wins the Blue Jays have come back from a deficit of two goals or more.

There's a First Time for Everything: The season-ending wins over Navy (9-8), Towson (11-10) and Loyola (7-6/OT) mark the first time in school history that Johns Hopkins has won three consecutive games by one goal.

Overtime Notes: Including the victory over Loyola, the Blue Jays are 10-2 in overtime under head coach **Dave Pietramala** and have currently won six straight overtime games. There are three active players who have scored game-winning goals in overtime for the Blue Jays. Senior **Greg Peyser** notched the decisive goal in OT against Syracuse in 2005, while sophomore **Kevin Huntley** punched home the game-winner in the second overtime against Duke in 2005. Freshman **Brian Christopher** scored 1:22 into overtime against Loyola in the regular-season finale on May 6.

Extra-Man Offense Among Nation's Best: The Johns Hopkins extra-man unit is 16-of-40 (.400) on the year after holding the ball without taking a shot in its lone attempt against Penn (opportunity came in the final minute of the game). Sophomores **Kevin Huntley** and **Michael Doneger** share the team lead with four extra-man goals, while classmate **Paul Rabil** has three EMO goals to his credit. **The Blue Jays rank eighth in the nation in extra-man offense.**

Faceoffs A Key: While there is never just one reason a team wins a game, the recent success of the Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team can be traced, at least somewhat, to its success on faceoffs. **The Blue Jays won 13-of-21 (.613) faceoffs against Navy, 14-of-24 (.583) against Towson and 11-of-17 (.647) against Loyola. Johns Hopkins now ranks sixth in the nation in faceoff winning percentage (.596) through games of May 14 as JHU has won 162-of-272 on the year.** Johns Hopkins has finished among the top seven in the nation in faceoff winning percentage in each of the last four years.

NCAA Tourney Rematches: This week's game against Syracuse will mark the 55th time the Blue Jays face a team in the NCAA Tournament that they played during the regular season. Hopkins won the regular season game in 37 of those instances and came back to complete the sweep 24 times. There have been 13 occasions where JHU won in the regular season, but lost in the NCAA Tournament.

NCAA Tournament Games in New York: Amazingly this will be just the fourth NCAA Tournament game the Blue Jays play in the state of New York. Hopkins is 2-1 all-time in NCAA Tournament games in New York with the most recent game an 11-7 victory at Hofstra in the 1999 NCAA Quarterfinals.

JHU Sets Victories Record: The 16 wins the Blue Jays amassed in 2005 are the most in school history. Hopkins had previously won 14 games in a season three times in its history (1980, 1984, 2003).

Rare Feat: Johns Hopkins became the 11th team since the NCAA began sanctioning the men's lacrosse championship (1971) to win the national championship with an undefeated record when the Blue Jays turned the trick last season. Prior to 2005 the last was Princeton in 1997 (15-0).

More Rare: Johns Hopkins became just the third team to post a perfect 16-0 record and win the NCAA title when the Blue Jays turned the trick last season. Cornell was the first in 1976 and North Carolina matched the mark in 1991.

- Key member of Johns Hopkins' second midfield. Scored goals in wins over North Carolina and Mount St. Mary's to push season totals to three goals and one assist for four points. Added a career-high three ground balls against Mount St. Mary's.

Noting Jake Byrne • Junior • Attack (Potomac, MD/Landon)

- Scored one goal in last week's win over Penn and now ranks third on the team in goals (16), assists (10) and points (26). Now has career totals of 46 goals and 30 assists for 76 points.
- Has registered at least one point in 34 of last 38 games dating back to 2004.
- Has registered at least one point in every NCAA Tournament game in his career.

Junior attackman **Jake Byrne** is quietly putting together a nice collection of goals that will be hard to forget. Among his top moments:

- Game-tying goal against Virginia with 1.4 seconds remaining in regulation to force overtime in the 2005 NCAA Semifinals. Blue Jays went on to win in OT and the goal was replayed dozens of times on ESPN's Sports Center.
- Game-winning goal in the 2005 NCAA Championship game against Duke. Spun inside a defender and beat Duke goalie Aaron Fenton with a bouncer just inside the far post early in the fourth quarter.
- Spinning, behind-the-back goal from six yards out to ignite a 4-1 game-ending run that lifted the Blue Jays to a stunning 9-8 win over Navy on April 22, 2006. Byrne's goal with 13:45 remaining in the fourth quarter cut a 7-5 deficit to 7-6. Goal was number two on ESPN's Top 10 Plays of the Day.

#5 Syracuse (9-4) vs. #4 Johns Hopkins (9-4)

- Scored the goal that kept the Blue Jays' dream alive as he forced overtime with a stunning goal with 1.4 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter of the NCAA Semifinal victory over Virginia. Virginia had taken an 8-7 lead on a goal with 12.9 seconds remaining.

Noting Matt Pinto • Senior • Defense (Baltimore, MD/Loyola)

- Started 44th consecutive game on close defense against Penn. Honorable Mention STX/USILA All-American in 2005.
- Scooped up 26 ground balls last season to surpass his previous two-year total of 19. Now has 60 career ground balls, including 15 this season.
- Helped anchor a Blue Jay defense that finished second in the nation in scoring defense (6.94) last season and held 14 of 16 opponents to less than 10 goals and 10 opponents to seven goals or less.
- Johns Hopkins has allowed more than nine goals just seven times in his 44 starts.

Noting Paul Rabil • Sophomore • Midfield (Gaithersburg, MD/DeMatha)

- One of the final 25 nominees for the 2006 Tewaaraton Award.
- Ignited JHU's 13-3 win over Penn last week with two goals, two assists and four ground balls. Scored twice in the first half to help JHU build a 4-2 halftime lead and assisted on JHU's first two goals of the second half to extend the lead to 6-2. Penn was never closer than four the rest of the way. **Two-goal effort against Penn marked the 15th multi-goal game of his career.**
- Scored two goals and added one assist in the win over Loyola.
- Scored two goals and added two assists and three ground balls in the win over Towson. Both goals were extra-man goals and came - along with one of his assists - during a 7-3 Hopkins run that turned a 4-4 tie into an 11-7 lead.
- Now ranks second on the team in goals (21) and points (33) and is tied for the team lead with 12 assists.
- Scored one goal and added one assist in the win over Navy. Unassisted goal midway through the fourth quarter gave JHU its first lead (8-7) and later assisted on Kevin Huntley's game-winner with 5:07 remaining.
- Scored one goal and added two assists against North Carolina and came back with three goals and one assist against Mount St. Mary's.
- Scored one goal and had one assist against Virginia a week after matching career high with a four-goal effort in the win over Syracuse. Scored three goals in the first quarter to help JHU to an early 8-1 lead.

- Scored two goals in the 2005 NCAA Championship game against Duke. Opened the scoring just 33 seconds into the game and later jump-started a 3-0 game-ending run with another unassisted goal with 5:56 remaining in the third quarter.
- Dished out three assists in the 2005 NCAA Semifinal victory against Virginia, including one on Benson Erwin's game-winning goal in overtime.
- Scored two goals and added a career-high four assists for a team and career high six points in the win over Marist in the first round of the 2005 NCAA Tournament.
- Enjoyed what proved to be his breakout game in the win over Syracuse last season. Scored a career-high four goals, including three straight at one point to trim a 7-1 deficit to 7-4. Added the game-tying goal with just 1:42 remaining in the fourth quarter to force overtime.

- Fashions a 7.77 GAA and a .579 save percentage through 13 games. Moved into ninth place on JHU's career saves list in last week's win over Penn as he posted 10 saves and allowed just three goals against the Quakers. Now has 336 saves in his career.
- Is 6-0 with a 6.17 goals against average and a .615 save percentage in six career starts in the NCAA Tournament (see chart below for breakdown).
- Tied season high with 14 saves in the overtime win at Loyola.
- Posted 10 saves, including several of the highlight-reel variety, in the 9-8 win over Navy.
- Posted 13 saves against Virginia, including eight in the first quarter, and came back with 12 saves while allowing just five goals against North Carolina.
- Enjoyed a spectacular showing against Princeton as he posted 14 saves, including several from point-blank range, and allowed just six goals in the loss to the Tigers.
- Honorable Mention STX/USILA All-American in 2005.
- Most Outstanding Player in the 2005 NCAA Tournament as he posted 12 saves and allowed just eight goals against Duke in the NCAA Championship game and had 12 saves and allowed just eight goals against Virginia in the NCAA Semifinals.
- Helped hold Duke - the highest scoring team in the nation - scoreless for the final 27:43 of the 2005 NCAA championship game with seven second-half saves.
- Started all 16 games last season and posted a 6.68 goals against average and a .625 save percentage. Led the nation in GAA and finished third in save %. 6.68 goals against average is the lowest single-season average in school history (since 1995 when minutes played are first available for goalies at JHU), while .625 save percentage is tied for the seventh-best in school history.

- Johns Hopkins and Syracuse are meeting for the 43rd time with Johns Hopkins holding a 25-16-1 advantage. Johns Hopkins has won four of the last five and six of the last eight in the series.
- One-goal games have been the norm in the series of late. Four of the last eight, five of the last 10 and eight of the last 15 have been decided by one goal. Both teams have won four of the last eight one-goal games in the series.
- The last six meetings at the Carrier Dome have all been decided by one goal.
- 10 of the last 15 games between JHU and SU have been decided by two goals or less.
- The teams have met 10 times in the NCAA Tournament with Syracuse winning six of the 10.
- One of the two teams has been ranked number one in the nation 17 times since the meeting in the 1983 NCAA title game.
- Johns Hopkins is 5-2 all-time against Syracuse when entering the game as the top-ranked or top-seeded team in the nation. SU has never beaten JHU during the regular season when the Blue Jays have been ranked number one.
- Johns Hopkins and Syracuse met in the NCAA Tournament seven times between 1980 and 1992 with SU winning 4-of-7. The teams didn't meet again in the NCAAs until 2000 and this will be the fourth meeting between the two teams in the NCAA Tournament in the last seven years.
- Since 1980, there have been 18 instances where both teams entered the game ranked in the top five in the nation. Nine meetings during that time have seen both teams ranked in the top three.
