Setting the Scene: Johns Hopkins and Towson meet for the 35th time in a series that dates to a 15-8 Johns Hopkins win in 1976.

Looking Back: Johns Hopkins improved to 6-4 with its second straight win - a 10-9 verdict last Saturday against Navy. Towson secured the top seed in the upcoming CAA Tournament with a 9-8 win at Drexel in a battle between the league's last two unbeaten teams.

Poll Position: Johns Hopkins is ranked fifth in this week's USILA Coaches Poll and fifth in this week's Nike/Inside Lacrosse Media Poll. Towson enters this week's game ranked 15th by the coaches and 15th by the media. The Johns Hopkins Sports Information Office uses the USILA Poll to reflect JHU's official ranking at the time of a game.

These are the Facts: Johns Hopkins enters the game against Towson with an all-time record of 864-272-15 (.757). The Blue Jays own eight NCAA titles, 29 USILA titles and six ILA titles for a total of 43 championships.

Pietramala Stands Alone: Johns Hopkins head coach **Dave Pietramala** is the only person in lacrosse history who has won an NCAA Division I Championship as a player (1987) and a head coach (2005). He is also the only person who has been named the national player of the year and the national coach of the year.

Petro Slides Into Third Place on Career Coaching Victories List at JHU: One week after Johns Hopkins head coach **Dave Pietramala** earned career coaching victory number 100 with an 8-7 win at Maryland, he moved into third place on the all-time coaching victories list at Johns Hopkins with his 78th win at Homewood (the 10-9 win against Navy). Pietramala entered last week's game against the Midshipmen tied for third with Tony Seaman, who won 77 games at Johns Hopkins from 1991-98.

Pietramala now sports an overall record of 101-36, including a 78-19 mark since arriving at Johns Hopkins prior to the 2001 season.

Only Hall of Famers **Bob Scott** and **Henry Ciccarone** have won more games as the head coach at Johns Hopkins than Pietramala.

Streiking: Johns Hopkins is 62-11 in its last 73 regular season games dating back to the end of the 2001 season and 70-15 overall since the start of the 2002 season.

One-Goal Turnarounds: Last week's 10-9 win against Navy improved Hopkins' recent run of success in one-goal games as JHU is 28-6 in one-goal games under head coach **Dave Pietramala**. The Blue Jays have won 15 of their last 17 and 19 of their last 22 one-goal games. In the five seasons prior to Pietramala arriving (1996-2000) the Blue Jays were 5-8 in one-goal games.

More One-Goal Notes: The Blue Jays have come from behind to win 13 times during their last 15 one-goal wins. In nine of those 13 come-from-behind one-goal wins the Blue Jays have come back from a deficit of two goals or more. The latest of these come-from-behind one-goal wins came last week against Navy, when the Blue Jays erased deficits of 3-1 and 5-4 to win 10-9.

Blue Jays Continue Overtime Roll: Johns Hopkins continued an amazing run of success in overtime games with the win at Maryland. The Blue Jays improved to 12-2 in overtime under head coach **Dave Pietramala** and have currently won eight straight games that have gone to extra time. More impressively, the Blue Jays are 6-1 in road games that have gone to overtime under Pietramala.

In addition, junior **Paul Rabil** became the first player in school history to score two game-winning goals in overtime in one season as he had previously netted the deciding goal in the second overtime of a 7-6 win against Princeton earlier this season before nailing the winner against the Terps.

Records indicate that Johns Hopkins played its first overtime game in the 1973 NCAA Championship game ... a 10-9 double overtime loss to Maryland. Hopkins boasts an overall record of 21-13 in 34 all-time overtime games.

Players on the 2007 team who have scored game-winning goals in overtime:

- Junior **Kevin Huntley** punched home the game-winner in the second OT against Duke in 2005.
- Sophomore **Brian Christopher** scored 1:22 into OT against Loyola on May 6, 2006.
- Junior **Paul Rabil** fired home the game-winner 56 seconds into the 2nd OT against Princeton on March 3 and tallied the game-winner 43 seconds into overtime in at Maryland (4-14-07).

April Reign: Flipping the calendar from March to April usually means good things for the Blue Jays, who are 30-3 in the month of April under head coach **Dave Pietramala** and 54-3 in April since the start of the 1997 season.

What's Back: The Blue Jays were one of the youngest teams in the nation last season, but still fought their way to within one goal of reaching the final four. The Blue Jays return players who accounted for 125 of their 138 (90.6%) goals last season and 55 of 69 (79.7%) assists they accumulated a year ago.

Class Act: The Blue Jays continue to get balanced offensive production from members of each class. In the win over Maryland it was the juniors (4g, 3a) and sophomores (3g) leading the way, while the juniors (4g) and freshmen (3g, 1a) led the way in the win over against Navy.

Class Notes of Interest:

- Freshmen **Steven Boyle** and **Michael Kimmel** have combined for at least three points in eight of 10 games thus far.

- Only three seniors have accumulated points through 10 games as **Jake Byrne** (16g, 5a), **Drew Dabrowski** (2g, 1a) and **Jamison Koesterer** (1g, 1a) account for all 26 points the senior class has combined for.

- The junior class accounts for more goals, assists and points than any class on the team with **Paul Rabil** (15g, 10a), **Kevin Huntley** (10g, 3a) and **Stephen Peyser** (6g, 7a) leading the way.

Balanced Extra-Man Scoring: The Blue Jays were successful on 2-of-4 extra-man opportunities in the win over Maryland and have converted 9-of-29 (.310) EMO chances this season. The Blue Jays currently rank 23rd in the nation in extra-man offense.

All six players on JHU's extra-man unit have registered at least one point with **Michael Kimmel's** five points (2g, 3a) leading the way. **Kevin Huntley** scored both of JHU's extra-man goals against Maryland and now counts a team-high four EMO goals to his credit.

Johns Hopkins has finished in the top 10 in the nation in extra-man offense four times in the last five years (2002-T4th, 2003-1st, 2004-5th, 2006-9th).

A Game of Runs: Several years ago the Blue Jays were well known for putting together some devastating scoring runs that weighed heavily in the outcome of their games. During the 2003 and 2004 seasons Johns Hopkins had more than 15 game-turning runs where the Blue Jays out-scored their opponents by three or more goals.

Through 10 games this season the Blue Jays have demonstrated an ability to do the same thing as they have had at least one significant run in each of their first 10 games. Below is a look at JHU runs of three goals or more thus far this season.

Scouting the Tigers

Towson Quickly: The Tigers enter this week's game against Charles Street rival Johns Hopkins looking to build off last week's 9-8 win at Drexel in a showdown of CAA unbeatens. Towson has won three of its last four and carries an 8-4 record into the game against the Blue Jays.

Tigers Earn Top Seed: Towson has won three of the four all-time CAA Championships and the road to the title will go through Unitas Stadium again this year as the Tigers grabbed the top seed in the tournament with last week's win at Drexel. Towson grabbed the first three CAA titles (2003, 2004, 2005) before Hofstra won the championship last season. The CAA Champion receives an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Dynamic Duo: Towson head coach **Tony Seaman** trots out a lineup that is deep and talented on offense as nine different players have scored seven or more goals and eight different players have 11 or more points through 12 games.

Attackman **Bobby Griebe** makes the engine fire for the Tigers as he ranks second on the team in goals (16) and has a team-high 17 assists as well. Griebe ranks 17th in school history in career points (119), a list that is headed by his dad, Bobby Griebe, totaled 221 points for the Tigers from 1972-75.

Linemate **Jonathan Engelke** sat out the 2006 season, but has regained the form that helped him earn CAA Rookie-of-the-Year in 2004 as he has a team-high 20 goals on the year. He enters this week's game against JHU with career totals of 75 goals and 21 assists for 96 points and has been lethal in extra-man situations as he has six of Towson's 17 EMO goals on the year.

Antol Solid in Goal: Junior **Matt Antol** has emerged as a solid starter in goal this season as he anchors an underrated defense. Antol, who had played just over 200 minutes in his first two seasons, sports an 8.54 goals against average and a .565 save percentage on the year.

Towson has held all but two of its opponents to nine goals or less and only high-scoring Virginia has scored more than 11 goals against the Tigers.

Faceoffs a Concern: Like Hopkins, the Tigers have struggled a little on faceoffs as they have won 126-of-264 (.477) on the year. A nagging injury to **Matt Eckerl** has hurt as Eckerl entered the year having won nearly 60% of his career faceoffs, but has been held to just 51.5% (70-of-136) this season. As Eckerl continues to get healthy this will turn into a team strength as the playoffs near.

Not to Be Outdone: While the scoring runs the Blue Jays have enjoyed on offense have grabbed the attention, the defense has been equally effective at the other end of the field. Hopkins has held the opposition scoreless for at least an 11-minute span in each of its 10 games this season. The Blue Jays held Princeton scoreless for at least 11 minutes three times during their game with the Tigers and matched that effort at Maryland. Below is a look at JHU's top streaks of holding the opposition scoreless this season.

35 in a Row: Last year's NCAA Tournament bid was the 35th straight for Johns Hopkins, which missed the inaugural NCAA Division I Men's Lacrosse Tournament in 1971, but has qualified for every one since. This is the longest streak of qualifying for the NCAA Tournament in any Division I Team sport.

10 in a Row: The Blue Jays drew the number four seed in last year's NCAA Tournament. **This marked the 10th consecutive year Johns Hopkins has been seeded in the top four in the tournament.** By comparison, only two other schools (Syracuse & Georgetown) have even qualified for the tournament in each of the last 10 years.

Rabil Wins Race to 100: Senior attackman **Jake Byrne** and junior midfielder **Paul Rabil** entered the 2007 season in a race to see which of the two would get to the 100 career point mark first.

Both entered last week's game against Navy tied with 97 career points, but Rabil scored three goals to reach the century mark first as he now counts 63 goals and 37 assists to his credit. He has been on a particularly hot streak of late as he has four consecutive games with three points and 20 points over his last six games (11g, 9a). He currently leads the team in scoring with 15 goals and 10 assists.

Byrne scored two goals in the win over Navy to run his season totals to 16 goals and five assists for 21 points. He now boasts career totals of 64 goals and 35 assists for 99 points.

One of Two: Junior midfielder **Paul Rabil** is one of just two Division I men's lacrosse players returning this season who earned First Team STX/USILA All-America honors (he joins Princeton goalie Alex Hewitt).

Rabil became the first Johns Hopkins sophomore since A.J. Haugen in 1998 to earn First Team All-America when he took top honors a year ago. He led the Blue Jays in scoring last season with 25 goals and 13 assists for 38 points.

- Johns Hopkins leads the all-time series, 31-3, and has currently won 11 straight against the Tigers. All three Towson wins in the series have come by a single goal (9-8 in 1989, 14-13 in 1992, and 13-12 in 1996).
- There seems to be no middle ground in the matchup as games are either decided by one or two goals or are blowouts. Dating back to 1988, the teams have met 22 times. 11 of the 22 games have been decided by three goals or less and six have been decided by seven goals or more.
- The two teams have combined for at least 25 goals in nine of the last 14 meetings and 30 or more goals in five of the last 14 games.
- Johns Hopkins has scored at least 13 goals against Towson in eight of the last 11 meetings.
- Johns Hopkins has won 14 of the 16 games between the two teams at Homewood Field.
- There have been 11 games between JHU and Towson when the Blue Jays were ranked number one. Towson's first-ever win over JHU came in 1989 when 15th-ranked Towson upset top-ranked Johns Hopkins, 9-8 in overtime.
- This will be the seventh consecutive meeting when both teams are ranked in the top 15. This will be the 22nd meeting between the two teams when both teams have been ranked in the top 15.
- Johns Hopkins has been ranked in the top four in the nation 25 times in 34 all-time meetings with the Tigers.
- Only twice has Towson entered the game against JHU ranked higher than the Blue Jays (1990 regular season / 1992 NCAA Quarterfinals).
