Game 1

#1 Johns Hopkins-10, Albany-8
February 25, 2006
Homewood Field

BALTIMORE, MD – Sophomore attackman **Kevin Huntley** scored three goals in a span of less than two minutes early in the first quarter to stake the top-ranked Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team to an early 4-1 lead and the Blue Jays held off a late Albany rally to secure a 10-8 victory at Homewood Field Saturday afternoon. The win is the 37th straight at home for the Blue Jays, who tie the NCAA Division I record for most consecutive home victories with the win. Syracuse won 37 straight at home from 1982 through 1987.

A **Paul Rabil** goal just 29 seconds into the game gave the Blue Jays a 1-0 lead and Huntley followed with back-to-back goals in a span of just 13 seconds three minutes later to make it 3-0. A **Merrick Thomson** goal at the 10:56 mark got the Danes on the board, but Huntley answered 31 seconds later with his third goal and a **Brian Christopher** tally with just over two minutes remaining in the first quarter pushed the lead to 5-1. Neither team scored over the final 17 minutes of the first half or the first five minutes of the third quarter before a 12-goal barrage in the final 23 minutes accounted for the 10-8 final.

The Danes trimmed the deficit to 7-5 by early in the fourth quarter as **Corey Small** and **Brett Queener** third quarter goals were matched by **Jake Byrne** and Rabil before Thomson and **Jordan Levine** scored in the first five minutes of the final period to make it a two-goal game. Senior **Greg Peyser's** extra-man goal for the Blue Jays with 9:14 remaining made it 8-5 before Resetarits scored off a scramble in front to make it 8-6. Byrne and Rabil then scored in a span of 12 seconds shortly after the Resetarits goal to push the lead to 10-6. That lead held until the final minute, when Thomson punched up his third goal of the game and **Derek Dale** scored with the extra man with 22 seconds left to account for the final scoring.

Hopkins, which posted its 17th straight overall victory dating back to the start of the 2005 season and won for the 19th straight time in the regular season dating back to the middle of the 2004 season, got the three goals and two assists from Huntley, who matched his career high with the five points. Rabil added three goals, Peyser added a goal and two assists and Byrne tallied twice for the Blue Jays, who held a 46-25 advantage in shots, won the ground ball war, 39-36, and grabbed 12-of-21 faceoffs. The Blue Jay defense, which held its ninth straight opponent to nine goals or less dating back to last season, was led by junior goalie **Jesse Schwartzman**, who posted 12 saves, including eight in the first half.

Thomson, who led the nation in goals per game last season, had the three goals and added one assist, while Resetarits scored the one goal and added three assists. Queener, who became the first goalie in Albany's Division I history to score a goal, settled down nicely after the first quarter and ended the game with 14 saves in his first career start.

Game 2

BALTIMORE, MD – Junior attackman **Peter Trombino** scored back-to-back goals in a span of less than two minutes late in the third quarter to ignite a game-turning 4-0 run that lifted the 10th-ranked Princeton men's lacrosse team to a 6-4 win over top-ranked Johns Hopkins at blustery Homewood Field Saturday afternoon. The win improves Princeton's record to 2-0, while the Blue Jays fall to 1-1. The loss also snaps Hopkins' school-record 37-game home winning streak, 17-game overall winning streak and 19-game regular-season winning streak.

The Blue Jays took their only lead of the game (3-2) on a **Paul Rabil** goal with 9:28 remaining in the third quarter, only to have Trombino's tallies give the Tigers a 4-3 lead they would never relinquish. Both goals were nearly identical as **Whitney Hayes** assisted on the first and **Mark Kovler** got the helper on the second with Trombino beating Blue Jay goalie Jesse Schwartzman from 12 yards out both times.

A **Trip Cowin** goal with 1:19 remaining in the third quarter pushed the lead to 5-3 and Josh Lesko closed the scoring for the Tigers with a goal in transition just 1:22 into the fourth quarter. Cowin worked from behind the goal and beat Schwartzman up high, while an **Alex Hewit** save at one end was quickly worked to the other and Lesko took a feed from Trombino and fired it home to give Princeton the three-goal lead.

The Blue Jays pulled within 6-4 on a **Greg Peyser** extra-man goal with 11:22 remaining and had several good scoring chances late in the game and an extra-man opportunity in the final two minutes, but Hewit picked up four of his seven saves in the game in the fourth quarter and the Tigers held on to pick up their first win against the Blue Jays since the 2002 NCAA Semifinals.

A tight first half was controlled by Princeton and Schwartzman as the Tigers outshot the Blue Jays, 20-10, in the opening 30 minutes only to be deadlocked at halftime (2-2). Kovler opened the scoring just 47 seconds into the game after a loose-ball scramble behind the goal gave the Tigers the ball in an unsettled situation. Kovler took a pass 12 yards in front of the goal and made a quick move and shot to give Princeton just its second lead against Hopkins since 2003.

Junior **Drew Dabrowski's** first career goal and a tally by classmate **Jake Byrne** were sandwiched around a **Mike Gaudio** goal for Princeton to account for all the scoring in the first half, but the damage could have been much worse if not for the play of Schwartzman, who made nine of his 14 saves before intermission, including several of the point-blank variety. He added a pair of point-blank saves in the second half to keep the Blue Jays alive, but the four-goal run was more than Hopkins could handle.

Trombino's two goals and one assist led the Tigers, while Kovler added the one goal and one assist. Hewit made seven saves, including six in the second half for the Tigers, who outshot the Blue Jays, 38-32, but lost the ground ball (35-26) and faceoff battles (JHU won 8-of-13).

Peyser, Dabrowski and Byrne all had a goal and an assist for the Blue Jays, while Schwartzman's 14 saves highlighted the defensive effort.

Game 3

BALTIMORE, MD – Sophomore attackman **Kevin Huntley** scored four of his career-high five goals and added an assist during a 9-2 run that covered the final 20 minutes of the game as seventh-ranked Johns Hopkins rallied past 17th-ranked UMBC, 12-7, at Homewood Field Tuesday night. The Blue Jays, who avoided losing back-to-back games for the first time since the 2000 season, improve to 2-1, while the Retrievers slip to 2-1.

UMBC held a 5-3 lead when **James Hyland** scored the third of his four goals with 7:51 remaining in the third quarter, but the Blue Jays reeled off five straight goals to take an 8-5 lead early in the fourth quarter. Sophomore **Michael Doneger's** first goal of the season with 4:11 remaining in the third quarter drew the Blue Jays to within 5-4 and Hopkins needed just 40 seconds of the fourth quarter to take the lead for good.

Huntley's extra-man goal with 14:31 remaining tied the game and the Blue Jays struck again just 11 seconds later when sophomore longstick **Ben O'Neill** scooped up a loose ball in front of the goal off the ensuing faceoff and fired into an open net for his first career goal. Senior **Greg Peyser's** 12-yard blast from the top of the box just under a minute later made it 7-5 and Huntley found junior **Drew Dabrowski** alone on the side of the net and Dabrowski beat UMBC goalie **Jeremy Blevins** in close to give Hopkins what appeared to be a comfortable 8-5 lead.

UMBC had one final run left as back-to-back extra-man goals by **Andy Gallagher** and Hyland in a span of just 37 seconds midway through the quarter pulled the Retrievers to within one at 8-7 with over nine minutes remaining.

A scoreless four minutes followed the six-goals-in-six-minutes to open the fourth quarter before Johns Hopkins freshman **Michael Evans** jump-started the play that helped Hopkins to its final run. Evans forced a turnover at the top of the box in the Hopkins defensive end and raced the length of the field before flipping the ball to junior attackman **Jake Byrne**, who wasted little time beating Blevins for his second goal of the game. Huntley added three goals in the final 5:07, including one just eight seconds after Byrne's goal, to account for the final scoring.

A defensive first half saw the Retrievers carry a 3-2 lead into halftime. After Huntley opened the scoring with 8:25 remaining in the first quarter the Retrievers took a 2-1 lead with back-to-back goals by **Evan Kay** and Hyland. Byrne and Hyland then traded goals in a span of less than a minute late in the second quarter to account for the 3-2 halftime score.

UMBC's **Terry Kimener**, who had picked up a pair of assists in the first half, notched his second goal of the season less than two minutes into the third quarter before Hopkins' midfielder **Paul Rabil** and Hyland traded goals midway through the period. Hyland's goal gave UMBC the short-lived 5-3 lead that Hopkins erased with its 9-2 game-ending run.

Huntley's five goals and six points are career-highs, while Byrne added two goals and two assists. Rabil scored the one goal and added two assists and the Blue Jays held advantages in shots (38-25) and ground balls (37-34).

Hyland's four goals are a career-high, while Kimener matched his four-point effort with one goal and three assists. Blevins registered 12 saves for the Retrievers, who grabbed 12-of-22 faceoffs.

Game 4

#15 Hofstra-11, #7 Johns Hopkins-6
March 11, 2006
Shuart Stadium

HEMPSTEAD, NY -- Tom Dooley scored three goals and Athan Iannucci and Tim Treubig each scored twice as the 15th-ranked Hofstra men's lacrosse team rolled past seventh-ranked Johns Hopkins, 11-6, Saturday afternoon at Shuart Stadium. The win is the first for Hofstra against Johns Hopkins since 1999 and improves the Pride to 2-1, while the Blue Jays slip to 2-2.

Hofstra wasted little time jumping on the Blue Jays as Treubig, Chris Unterstein and John Keysor all scored in the first nine minutes to give the Pride a 3-0 lead they would never relinquish. A Kevin Huntley goal with 3:01 remaining in the first quarter got the Blue Jays on the board, but Ryan Lucas scored with 1:27 remaining in the period on a 15-yard laser to build the lead back to 4-1.

Dooley and Treubig extended the lead to 6-1 with back-to-back goals in a span of less than a minute midway through the second quarter and a smothering Hofstra defense kept the Blue Jays off the board for the rest of the half. The Pride defense forced nine first-half turnovers and goalie Matt Southard was forced to make just two saves.

A Dooley goal midway through the third quarter made it 7-1 before Huntley and freshman Mark Bryan cut the deficit to 7-3 by early in the fourth quarter. The Blue Jays had several opportunities to cut further into the lead, but Dooley ignited a 4-0 run for the Pride that pushed the lead to 11-3 with just over three minutes remaining. Iannucci capped the run with back-to-back goals in a span of 70 seconds as the Pride secured their third all-time win against the Blue Jays.

Late goals by freshman Brian Christopher, Jamison Koesterer and Huntley accounted for the final scoring for the Blue Jays, who won 17-of-21 faceoffs, matched the Pride in shots (31-31) and held a slight advantage in ground balls (28-25). Junior Jesse Schwartzman allowed all 11 goals and made 10 saves before giving way to sophomore Graydon Locey late in the fourth quarter.

Game 5

BALTIMORE, MD -- Sophomore attackman Kevin Huntley tied his career highs with five goals and six points and sophomore midfielder Paul Rabil matched his personal best with four goals as the 13th-ranked Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team knocked off 10th-ranked Syracuse, 14-9, at Homewood Field. The Blue Jays, who won for the sixth time in their last eight games against the Orange, improve to 3-2 with the victory while the Orange fall to 1-3.

The Blue Jays wasted little time jumping on the Orange as Rabil and Huntley sandwiched goals around a Jake Byrne tally before the game was four minutes old to give JHU a quick 3-0 lead. Rabil and Huntley's goals were both unassisted, while Huntley assisted on Byrne's tally, which came just 17 seconds after Rabil had staked the Blue Jays to a 1-0 lead.

The first of Mike Leveille's three goals temporarily stopped the run, but Rabil and Huntley added two more goals apiece in a seven-minute span before the first quarter was over to give the Blue Jays a 7-1 lead at the end of the first period. The seven goals were just one less than the Blue Jays had scored in the first quarter of their first four games combined.

The Blue Jays led 8-1 after a Brian Christopher goal midway through the second quarter before the Orange began their inevitable rally with back-to-back goals by Dan Hardy and Brett Bucktooth late in the second quarter to make it 8-3 at the half. Byrne punched home his second of the game off an assist from junior Drew Dabrowski just 2:10 into the third quarter and Dabrowski scored on a rebound four minutes later to give the Blue Jays a 10-3 lead.

Syracuse, as it has so many times in the past, rallied quickly and pulled within 10-7 with a four-goal flurry late in the third quarter. Back-to-back goals by Leveille -- both of which were assisted by Joe Yevoli -- made it 10-5 before an extra-man goal by Bucktooth and an unassisted goal by Yevoli in a span of 70 seconds trimmed the lead to three.

The Blue Jays finally halted the run with a goal off a successful ride late in the third period. Under heavy pressure, Syracuse goalie Peter Coluccini turned the ball over in front of his own goal, where Huntley scooped up the loose ball and fired into an open net to push the lead to 11-7. A Brian Crockett goal trimmed the lead to 11-8 before senior Greg Peyser and Huntley scored to push the lead back to five at 13-8. Peyser's side-armed 12-yarder into the top far corner was assisted by Christopher, while Huntley drove to the goal from the side and beat Coluccini to the near post. Another Yevoli goal was matched by Rabil's fourth goal of the game with less than two minutes to play as the Blue Jays reached a season-high for goals.

Huntley, who has notched five goals in two of his last three games, pushed his team-leading totals to 16 goals and six assists, while Rabil matched his four-goal effort of a year ago today in a 12-11 overtime victory at Syracuse. In addition to the one goal, Peyser won 12 of 16 faceoffs and grabbed a team-high eight ground balls. The Blue Jays won 18-of-26 faceoffs on the day and junior goalie Jesse Schwartzman posted nine saves for the Blue Jays.

Leveille led the Orange with three goals and one assist, while Yevoli matched Leveille's four point showing with two goals and two assists. Bucktooth added two goals and one assist, while Coluccini added 11 saves in goal for Syracuse.

Game 6

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA -- Led by a standout defensive effort and an efficient offense, top-ranked Virginia posted a 12-6 win over ninth-ranked Johns Hopkins Saturday afternoon before a Klöckner Stadium record crowd of 7440. With the win, Virginia also received the inaugural Doyle Smith Cup, which will be presented annually to the winner of this game.

The Cavaliers extended the nation's longest home winning streak to a record 17 games as they remain undefeated with a 9-0 record. Johns Hopkins evened its record at 3-3.

Virginia got balanced offense as 10 different players scored goals; Ben Rubeor and freshman Danny Glading led the way with two goals apiece. Sophomore Michael Doneger led Johns Hopkins with a career-high three goals.

The teams traded goals in the first quarter with Rubeor scoring an extra-man goal off the right pipe to give Virginia an early lead. Kevin Huntley, the Blue Jays' leading scorer coming in, answered Rubeor with his only goal of the contest at the 6:57 mark. Kyle Dixon scored his ninth of the season at 4:52, but Paul Rabil scored off the ensuing faceoff 12 seconds later to knot the score at two.

When Matt Poskay, the nation's leading scoring midfielder, tallied his only goal of the game with 20 seconds remaining in the first quarter, he started the Cavaliers on a five-goal run that pushed the UVa lead to 7-2 entering the fourth quarter. Drew Thompson scored early and Glading late for the only scores of the second quarter.

The Cavalier defense was outstanding during the run and held the visiting Blue Jays scoreless for nearly 40 minutes after Rabil's goal. Clinging to a 5-2 lead just before halftime, a one-minute penalty on Dixon gave the Blue Jays an opportunity to draw closer, but Hopkins was unable to solve the Virginia defense and never drew closer than three again.

Defenseman Michael Culver scored the first goal of the second half as his shot, following a full field run, glanced off the stick of goalie Jesse Schwartzman and into the goal. His goal, at the 6:10 mark of the third quarter, gave the Cavaliers a 6-2 lead. Rubeor closed the third quarter with a remarkable backhand shot with his back to the goal with 41 seconds in the quarter for a 7-2 advantage.

Doneger ended the run with an extra-man goal three minutes and 20 seconds into the final quarter to cut Virginia's lead to 7-3, but it was as close as Hopkins would get. Jack Riley, Matt Ward, Glading and Jared Little scored in succession as the UVa lead grew to 11-3. The Blue Jays scored three of the game's final four goals, including two by Doneger.

Senior Charlie Glazer was exceptional in the faceoff X for Virginia, winning 10 of 17 draws. He finished with a game-high seven ground balls as the Cavaliers had a 40-22 advantage on the ground.

Game 7

#10 Johns Hopkins-11, North Carolina-5
April 1, 2006
Homewood Field

BALTIMORE, MD – Johns Hopkins ripped off a string of six unanswered goals, including four in the third quarter to polish off North Carolina, 11-5, in men's college lacrosse at Homewood Field on Saturday afternoon.

The 23rd straight April win for the 10th-ranked Blue Jays brings their record to 4-3 this season. The Tar Heels dropped their eighth in a row and fall to 2-8.

With the Hopkins lead narrowed to 4-3 late in the second quarter the Blue Jays answered with the first of six goals when a pass from junior **Jake Byrne** off of a faceoff found sophomore **Kevin Huntley**, who flipped a behind-the-back shot past Carolina freshman goalkeeper **Grant Zimmerman** to give the Blue Jays a 5-3 lead with 1:46 remaining in the first half.

In the third, the Blue Jays poured it on as senior **Greg Peyser** scored the first of his three goals on the afternoon to open up the second half scoring, getting past the Carolina defense and nailing a top-shelf shot to give the Blue Jays a 6-3 advantage. Hopkins was scoreless for the next 7:10 until junior **Drew Dabrowski** picked up a ground ball on an extra-man opportunity and fired off a pass to Byrne, who deposited a shot in top of the net for a 7-3 lead. Freshman **Bryan Christopher's** unassisted tally, the second of his two goals, with 3:38 remaining in the period pushed the margin to 8-3. Peyser finished off the period with his second of the day with a shot on the Carolina cage with six seconds remaining that was initially stopped but found its way past the goal line for a six-goal margin entering the fourth.

Peyser completed the hat trick 1:19 into the fourth quarter, as he took a pass from **Paul Rabil** and delivered a low shot to Zimmerman's right for a 10-3 Hopkins lead. Peyser also tallied an assist on sophomore **Michael Doneger's** late goal to give him a career-high four points.

The game got off to a fast start, with both teams getting on the board less than 90 seconds in. UNC struck first, as freshman **Shane Walterhofer** found classmate **Bart Wagner**, whose top corner shot found the twine for a 1-0 Tar Heel advantage just 57 seconds in. On the ensuing faceoff the Blue Jays got one back as Rabil, who finished the afternoon with three points, picked up a ground ball and streaked down the field, connecting on a deep shot to tie the score.

North Carolina closed the gap to 4-3 in the second quarter, before Hopkins reeled off its decisive run. Only six seconds after Wagner gave Carolina his second goal of the day, Walterhofer went untouched down the field on the ensuing faceoff and scored his first career goal, narrowing the margin to one.

For the Blue Jays, junior **Jamison Koesterer** was 9-for-13 on faceoff tries while adding six ground balls. Junior goalkeeper **Jesse Schwartzman** posted 12 saves, including four in the first and fourth quarters. Hopkins was 1-for-2 on EMO.

UNC collected 39 ground balls to the Blue Jays' 36 and converted on 21-of-25 clear opportunities. Zimmerman gave the Tar Heels 11 saves between the pipes.

BALTIMORE, MD – Sophomore midfielder **Paul Rabil** and freshman attackman **Tom Duerr** both scored three goals and added one assist and the seventh-ranked Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team had 11 different players score in a 19-6 win over visiting Mount St. Mary's at rain-soaked Homewood Field Monday night.

The win is the second straight for the Blue Jays, who improve to 5-3 with the victory, while the Mountaineers dropped their second straight and fall to 1-7. The Blue Jays have also won 24 straight games in the month of April and are 50-1 in their last 51 games in April since the start of the 1997 season.

The Blue Jays wasted little time jumping on the Mountaineers as six different players scored in a 7-0 run that covered the first 20 minutes of the game. BALTIMORE, MD – Maryland senior attackman **Joe Walters** matched his career-high with six goals and posted a personal-best eight points to lead the sixth-ranked Maryland men's lacrosse team to a convincing 11-4 win over eighth-ranked Johns Hopkins before 9,778 at Homewood Field Saturday night. The win is the first for Maryland against Johns Hopkins since 2001 and improves the Terps' record to 7-3, while Hopkins had a modest two-game winning streak snapped and falls to 5-4.

Maryland jumped to 2-0 lead at the end of the first quarter on a **Travis Holmes** goal at the 9:44 mark and an extra-man goal by Walters seven minutes later. Walters assisted on Holmes' goal as he had a hand in the first five Maryland goals. An extra-man goal by Johns Hopkins freshman **Tom Duerr** less than two minutes into the second quarter pulled the Blue Jays to within 2-1, but Maryland reeled off the next three goals to take a 5-1 lead and JHU was never closer than three the rest of the way.

Walters sandwiched a pair of goals around a **Xander Ritz** goal to ignite the 3-0 run. Walters slipped past his defender and came from behind the goal to beat Blue Jay goalie **Jesse Schwartzman** to make it 3-1 before feeding Ritz with a slick side-arm pass from the side of the goal for the fourth goal. Walters' extra-man goal exactly one minute later pushed the lead to 5-1 before Hopkins freshman **Brian Christopher** answered with an unassisted goal four minutes later. Christopher came from behind the goal and beat Maryland goalie **Harry Alford** up high to the near post for his eighth goal of the year.

Senior midfielder **Bill McGlone** erased any hopes of a Blue Jay comeback as he scored back-to-back goals to push the lead to 7-2 early in the third quarter. He tallied with just 15 seconds remaining in the first half to make it 6-2 at intermission and opened the second-half scoring with a goal just 64 seconds into the third period to push the lead to five.

Hopkins' **Stephen Peyser**, playing in his first game of the season after missing the first eight games with a broken jaw, gave the Blue Jays life with an unassisted goal with 11:04 remaining in the period, but after winning the ensuing faceoff the Blue Jays turned the ball over and never seriously threatened again.

The first of Walters' three second-half goals eight minutes later ignited a 4-0 Maryland run that pushed the lead to 11-3 before an unassisted goal by Hopkins' **Jake Byrne** closed out the scoring late in the fourth quarter. A **Brendan Healy** goal with 13:09 remaining was followed by the fifth and sixth goals of the night for Walters, who inched to within seven goals of Maryland's all-time record of 149.

McGlone was the only other multi-goal scorer for Maryland, which also got two-assist showings from **Drew Evans** and **Michael Phipps**. Alford was solid in goal for the Terps as he registered nine saves before exiting the game with just over two minutes remaining.

Byrne had one goal and one assist and was the only Johns Hopkins player to pick up more than one point. Schwartzman registered 11 saves and Peyser won 4-of-5 faceoffs to go with his goal on the night.

BALTIMORE, MD – The streak would come to an end, that much was certain. The fourth-ranked Navy men's lacrosse team led 12th-ranked Johns Hopkins 7-5 at the end of the third quarter and the Mids held commanding leads in virtually every category on the stat sheet. Navy, looking to snap a 31-game losing streak against the Blue Jays, had a partisan crowd of 13,857 on its side and 15 minutes was all that separated the Midshipmen from their first win over Johns Hopkins since 1974.

Fortunately for the Blue Jays, games aren't decided on a stat sheet and Hopkins is used to playing in front of large crowds. Sparked by two goals in the first 90 seconds of the final period, an exceptional effort by junior goalie **Jesse Schwartzman** and inspired play on faceoffs by junior **Jamison Koesterer** down the stretch the Blue Jays pulled off a 9-8 upset by outscoring the Midshipmen 4-1 in the fourth quarter to improve to 6-4 on the year. Navy had a modest two-game losing streak snapped and falls to 9-3. The one-goal win is the third straight for Hopkins against Navy and its fifth consecutive one-goal win at Navy's Marine Corps Stadium. The Blue Jays also improved to 22-4 in one-goal games under head coach Dave Pietramala.

Navy sprung to its third and final two-goal lead of the game with back-to-back goals in the third quarter to take the 7-5 lead. Senior **Jon Birsner** beat Schwartzman from a tough angle on a move from behind the goal and found sophomore **Nick Mirabito** cutting to the goal seven minutes later to give Navy the two-goal cushion.

That lead held, though just barely as Navy's **Billy Looney** hit the post as the third quarter expired, until a three-goal Hopkins run early in the fourth quarter gave JHU an 8-7 lead. Junior **Jake Byrne**'s spinning, highlight-reel behind-the-back shot from six yards beat Navy goalie **Matt Russell** to the near post just 15 seconds into the fourth quarter and freshman **Tom Duerr** scored from 10 yards out just eight seconds later after coming up with a ground ball off a scramble on the faceoff after Byrne's goal.

Sophomore midfielder **Paul Rabil** gave the Blue Jays their first lead of the game four minutes later when he dodged from the top and beat Russell with a knee-high left-handed shot just inside the far post. Mirabito and Birsner hooked up again just over three minutes later when Birsner found Mirabito cutting down the middle and Mirabito beat Schwartzman one-on-one on the doorstep to force the fifth and final tie of the game.

It took just 69 seconds for the Blue Jays to take the lead for good as Rabil found **Kevin Huntley** five yards above the goal line to Russell's left and Huntley handled the low pass and dribbled one past Russell for his 23rd goal of the season.

Schwartzman, who posted 10 saves for the Blue Jays, including several of the point-blank variety, came up with the only fourth-quarter save he needed a short time later when he stopped **Geoff Leone's** uncontested 10-yard shot in transition. Navy went offense on the ensuing clear attempt and the Blue Jays ran off over two minutes of clock time before Navy finally forced a clock stoppage with 1:07 remaining. Hopkins killed all but the last 34 seconds before turning the ball over and Navy got off just one shot after that – a 12-yarder from the top by Looney that sailed wide with 10 seconds. Birsner tried to force a pass into attackman **Ian Dingman** on the restart, but the pass was knocked down and kicked to the sideline and the clock expired before either team could gain possession.

Navy, which had picked up dramatic one-goal wins over rivals Maryland and Army in the previous two weeks, struck quickly as Looney staked the Mids to a 1-0 lead just 43 seconds into the game as he beat Schwartzman to the near post with a left-handed shot on the run. Byrne tied the score at the 10:45 mark when he dodged in from the side of the goal and beat Russell up high under heavy pressure. The remainder of the first quarter was scoreless with Schwartzman making the first of his point-blank saves on a five-yard shot by Mirabito with 5:20 remaining in the period.

Navy took the first of its three, two-goal leads on back-to-back goals by **Taylor Harris** early in the second quarter. Birsner notched the assist on both as he fed him for an extra-man goal with 13:21 remaining in the period and again three minutes later. A **Greg Peyser** goal less than a minute after Harris' second goal made it 3-2 and Huntley scored his first goal of the game just over four minutes later on a roll dodge from Russell's left.

Birsner and **Matt Bitter** both scored late in the second quarter and the Mids appeared well on their way to carrying the 5-3 lead into halftime, but **Stephen Peyser** sprinted hard from the top and beat Russell low to the far post with a 10-yard left-handed shot just 16 seconds before intermission to make it 5-4 Navy at the half. Freshman **Brian Christopher** ran his goal-scoring streak to a team-best seven games with an unassisted goal just 92 seconds into the third quarter to knot the game at 5-5 to set the stage for a thrilling finish in front of the largest regular season lacrosse crowd to see any game this season.

Huntley and Byrne both finished with two goals and Rabil added one goal and one assist to lead the Blue Jays. Koesterer won 9-of-11 faceoffs, including all six of his attempts in the second half. Schwartzman's 10 saves improve his career total to 303 and he becomes just the 12th goalie in school history to amass 300 or more career saves.

Birsner had two goals and four assists to lead the way for Navy, which also got two goals and one assist from Mirabito and the two goals from Harris. Russell posted six saves and Navy held advantages in shots (49-28) and ground balls (27-21).

Johns Hopkins will host Towson next Saturday (2:00 pm), while Navy will participate in the Patriot League Tournament. The site of the tournament will be determined by the outcome of the Colgate-Bucknell game on Sunday.

BALTIMORE, MD – Sophomore attackman Kevin Huntley scored three goals, sophomore midfielder Paul Rabil scored two goals and added two assists and the sixth-ranked Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team held off a furious late-game rally by 12th-ranked Towson as the Blue Jays picked up an 11-10 win in front of 4,826 at Homewood Field. The win is the 11th straight for Hopkins over Towson and improves the Blue Jays' record to 7-4. Towson had a four-game winning streak snapped and falls to 8-5.

The Blue Jays led 6-5 at the half before opening the third quarter with three straight goals to take a 9-5 lead. Huntley ignited the run with his third goal of the game with 11:29 remaining in the period. Sophomore Jake Byrne and junior Drew Dabrowski scored in a span of less than three minutes midway through the quarter to give the Blue Jays the first of two, four-goal leads. Byrne beat Towson goalie Mark DeGroat from 10 yards out after senior Greg Peyser drew a double team and found him all alone, while Dabrowski's goal came after a quick clear by the Blue Jays as Rabil found him cutting from behind the goal to DeGroat's right and he wasted little time punching home his sixth goal of the year.

The Tigers got back in the game with two goals in the final 77 seconds of the third quarter as Oliver Bacon dodged from behind the goal and beat Jesse Schwartzman down low to make it 9-6. Bacon then fed Phil Grillo with just 25 seconds left in the quarter and Grillo picked the far post to make it 9-7 entering the final quarter.

The Blue Jays got off to a quick start as Huntley and Peyser scored back-to-back goals in a span of just over three minutes midway through the first quarter to give Hopkins a 2-0 lead. A Vetter extra-man goal with 4:42 remaining in the period was answered by Peyser's second goal of the game to make it 3-1 after the first quarter.

Towson's Bobby Griebie scored three of the first four goals of the second quarter – a spree that was answered only by a Michael Doneger extra-man goal for the Blue Jays – to account for the only tie of the game (4-4), a tie that lasted exactly eight seconds. Stephen Peyser won the faceoff after Griebie's third goal and found Byrne on the wing, where he zipped a pass to Huntley on the doorstep and he beat DeGroat in tight to give the Blue Jays the lead for good at 5-4. The first of Rabil's two unassisted extra-man goals with 1:38 remaining in the first half was answered by Eckerl to account for the 6-5 halftime score.

Huntley's three goals improve his team-leading total to 26, while Rabil ran his season totals to 17 goals and nine assists with his two goals and two assists. Greg Peyser had the two goals and one assist, while Stephen Peyser won 13-of-16 faceoffs and grabbed eight ground balls.

Griebie scored his three goals on just four shots, while Eckerl and Vetter added the two goals apiece. DeGroat registered eight saves for the Tigers, who held a 35-31 advantage in shots, but lost the ground ball (35-29) and faceoff battles (14-10).

Senior short stick defensive midfielder **Matt Feild** stripped **Corey Cauffman** of the ball near the top of the box and worked the ball down the field, where the Blue Jays called timeout. Out of the timeout sophomore midfielder **Paul Rabil** found a seam and sprinted towards the goal, only to have the ball checked loose by Loyola's **Dave Moore**. Christopher, who had initiated the play from the top after the timeout, caught the loose ball out of the air and quickly turned and fired a shot past Loyola goalie **Michael Fretwell** to seal the Blue Jays' sixth straight win in an overtime game.

In a tight game that saw five ties and three lead changes, the Blue Jays opened the scoring with 7:35 remaining in the first quarter when junior **Jake Byrne** finished off a pretty passing sequence off a loose ball situation with an eight-yard shot off an assist from Rabil. Loyola responded and took its first lead of the game with back-to-back goals in the final 5:33 of the first period. Junior **Greg Leonard** got the 'Hounds on the board with an unassisted goal at the 5:33 mark and **Ryan Ravidou** flipped a shot past Hopkins goalie **Jesse Schwartzman** after grabbing a loose ball in front of the goal.

Loyola, which held the ball for long stretches in the game, maintained possession for the first 6:30 of the second quarter, but it was the Blue Jays who would score twice in the quarter to take a 3-2 halftime lead. Rabil dodged from the top and beat Fretwell with a left-handed laser with 8:05 remaining and junior **Jamison Koesterer** punched home his second goal of the year on a strong drive to the goal with just under two minutes remaining before intermission.

Hopkins' hopes of drawing Loyola out of its game-long stall appeared to get a spark when Rabil added another unassisted goal just 42 seconds into the third quarter and the Blue Jays killed off a Greyhound extra-man opportunity less than a minute later, but a failed clearing attempt led directly to a goal by Loyola's **C.J. BALTIMORE, MD – The fourth-seeded Johns Hopkins men's lacrosse team outscored visiting Penn 10-1 over the final 31 minutes of the game as the Blue Jays advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals with a 13-3 victory over the Quakers in the first round of the 2006 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Championships. Hopkins, which has won a season-best four straight games, improves to 9-4 and will face the winner of tomorrow's Syracuse-Harvard first round game in the quarterfinals next Saturday at Stony Brook. Penn finishes its season at 10-4.

Hopkins led just 3-2 in the closing seconds of the first half before a **Kevin Huntley** goal with nine seconds remaining in the second quarter jump-started the Blue Jays on their game-ending run. The Blue Jays needed just eight seconds of the third quarter to increase the lead to 5-2 as junior **Drew Dabrowski** scored off an assist from sophomore **Paul Rabil**, who came up with the ground ball on the opening faceoff of the second half and found Dabrowski to the right of Penn goalie **Greg Klossner** and Dabrowski faked high and shot low for his eighth goal of the season.

Johns Hopkins freshman **Tom Duerr** and Penn's **D.J. Andrzejewski** traded goals in the middle of the third quarter and neither team scored in the final six minutes of the period as the Blue Jays carried a 7-3 lead into the final quarter. Any hopes of a Penn comeback were dashed in the first three minutes of the fourth quarter as junior **Jake Byrne** scored off an assist from **Greg Peyser** just nine seconds into the final period and Duerr added his second goal of the game just over two minutes later to push the lead to 9-3.

Duerr, **Michael Doneger**, **Stephen Peyser** and **Garrett Stanwick** added goals in the final 7:36 to account for the 10-goal margin, the Blue Jays' second-largest margin of victory this season.

"We are excited to be representing Johns Hopkins University in the NCAA Quarterfinals," Blue Jay coach **Dave Pietramala** noted in the post-game press conference. "This (JHU) is a team that has struggled at times this year and I thought we showed a lot of character by not taking a very talented Penn team lightly."

An evenly played first half saw the Blue Jays lead 3-2 before Huntley's late second-quarter goal. Freshman midfielder **Brian Christopher** opened the scoring just 41 seconds into the game when he swept across the field and fired a left-handed shot past Klossner to extend his goal-scoring streak to a team-best 10 games. The 1-0 lead held until late in the second quarter when Rabil used a stutter-step dodge from the top to free himself from a defender and go in alone on Klossner, who he beat from five yards out.

The Quakers finally broke through early in the second quarter when senior midfielder **Pat Rogers** drove down the side to the left of Johns Hopkins goalie **Jesse Schwartzman** and beat him with a side-arm shot from eight yards just 37 seconds into the period. Rabil added his second goal of the game less than a minute later and Andrzejewski took a nifty pass in traffic from his brother, **Craig Andrzejewski**, on the crease and quickly fired past Schwartzman. Despite a first half that saw 33 shots taken, the Blue Jays' 3-2 lead held until the final moments of the period, when Greg Peyser found Huntley six yards in front of the goal and threaded a pass through traffic to the sophomore attackman, who turned and fired past Klossner. That set the stage for a second-half that saw the Blue Jays score nine goals on just 24 shots.

"Johns Hopkins did a good job of controlling faceoffs and ground balls in the second half," noted Penn coach **Brian Voelker**, who played at Johns Hopkins with Pietramala. "When you get in the playoffs you run into some very good teams and that's what happened today. They are starting to put it together at the right time."

D.J. Andrzejewski accounted for two of Penn's three goals and Craig Andrzejewski assisted on both of his brother's tallies. Klossner posted nine saves in goal for the Quakers, including six in the second and third quarters combined to keep the Quakers in the game. Penn's **Alan Eberstein** won 8-of-15 faceoffs to help the Quakers to an 11-9 advantage for the game.
