2004 Johns Hopkins Women's Lacrosse Season Review

The Johns Hopkins women's lacrosse team entered the 2004 season with goals of finishing in the top 10 of the IWLC A Poll and qualifying for the NCAA Tournament.

The Blue Jays achieved both objectives for the first time in six years at the Division I level, as Hopkins finished the season ranked 10th in the IWLC A Poll and received an at-large bid to the tournament.

Along the way the Blue Jays won a school Division I record 10 straight games to open the season and defeated four ranked teams, including a 13-12 win at No. 6 Notre Dame, the highest-ranked team ever defeated by Hopkins.

JHU also tied school Division I records for most wins and fewest losses in a season, and reached the double-digit win mark for the 12th straight year, including all 11 under head coach **Janine Tucker**.

Hopkins, which was ranked 20th in the IWLC A Preseason Poll, had their season opener delayed by two days as the Blue Jays' trip to North Carolina was cancelled due to snow.

JHU instead opened at home on February 29, defeating ALC opponent Davidson, 21-5, to win its first season opener since the 1999 season. Freshman **Mary Key** began her outstanding season by scoring five goals and adding an assist, while senior **Heidi Pearce** chipped in three goals and a career-high five assists.

Sophomore **Molly Burnett** scored three goals and added an assist for her first career points while freshman **Steph Janice** scored twice as the Blue Jays out-shot the Wildcats, 48-6. Twelve different players scored a goal in the easy win.

Hopkins improved to 2-0 four days later by posting a 14-7 win at George Washington. Key recorded three goals and an assist while Pearce added three goals in the win.

The Blue Jays scored three straight goals to go up 4-1 early on, and stretched their lead to 10-5 at the half. The Colonials were within 12-7 with 6:22 remaining, but goals by Pearce and freshman **Alex Nolan** put the game away.

Hopkins continued its strong start on March 9 by hanging on to defeat Towson, 14-12. Senior **Marlena Wittelsberger** scored three goals in the win while Key added two goals and three assists.

The Blue Jays carried a slim 8-7 lead into halftime, but scored the first five goals of the second period to go up six with 23:55 remaining. The Tigers got within 13-11, but Wittelsberger scored a free position goal to put the game out of reach.

Three days later Pearce scored a game-high four goals while **Kelley Putnam** chipped in a goal and two assists as Hopkins defeated Ohio University, 12-4.

The Blue Jays led 5-2 at the break and scored the first five goals of the second half to pull away from the Bobcats.

Hopkins then defeated its first ranked opponent of the year by blasting No. 19 Ohio State, 13-5, behind five goals and two assists from Key.

After the Blue Jays took a 5-1 halftime lead the Buckeyes

pulled within 8-5, but Hopkins scored the final five goals to put the game away. With the win JHU improved to 5-0 for the first time at the Division I level.

The following day Key was named the conference player of the week and earned *Inside Lacrosse* honorable mention honors, while Hopkins moved up to 15th in the IWLC A Poll.

Pearce and Key each scored four goals on March 17 as the Blue Jays edged George Mason, 13-11. The game was tight throughout, and Hopkins led 11-10 before Pearce and junior **Anne Crisafulli** scored consecutive goals to put JHU up three.

Four days later the Blue Jays knocked off their second ranked opponent by defeating 13th-ranked Boston University, 17-10.

Pearce scored a team-high seven points against the Terriers on four goals and three assists, while sophomore **Meagan Voight** added five goals. Hopkins led by just two at 8-6 after the first half, but scored eight of the first nine goals in the second period to pull away.

After the wins over the Patriots and Terriers, Pearce was named the *Inside Lacrosse* and ALC Player of the Week, while Hopkins climbed to No. 12 in the poll.

On March 24 Hopkins wrapped up a perfect six-game homestand by defeating American, 13-7. Pearce continued to shine as she scored three goals and assisted on three others, while junior **Erin Riordan** added two goals and an assist.

On the last day of March the Blue Jays won their school-record ninth straight Division I game by holding off Pennsylvania, 10-6, on a wet, frigid night at Franklin Field.

Key tied her career-high with five goals against the Quakers, and Hopkins pulled away from a 4-4 halftime tie by scoring six of the eight second-half goals.

The Blue Jays improved to 10-0 five days later by defeating ninth-ranked Vanderbilt, 12-11, posting their first ever victory over a top 10-ranked team.

Pearce scored four goals and added an assist in the game that was broadcast live by College Sports Television, while Key posted two goals and three assists.

The Commodores led 9-7 in the second half, but goals by Riordan and Voight tied the game with 13:49 to play. After Vanderbilt took the lead back, Riordan, Key and Pearce scored consecutive goals to put Hopkins up two. Vanderbilt scored to pull within one with 6:14 left, but Hopkins won the draw control and held the ball until the final minute. The Commodores forced a turnover but quickly committed a turnover of their own, and the Blue Jays ran the clock out.

That week Key was named the *Inside Lacrosse* Player of the Week, while Pearce earned ALC Player of the Week honors and was named *Inside Lacrosse* Honorable Mention.

Hopkins had its winning streak snapped at 10 games on April 10 when the Blue Jays fell at seventh-ranked Maryland, 14-11.

The Terrapins scored eight of the first nine goals of the game and led 12-4 with 22 minutes remaining, but Hopkins did not quit, scoring seven of the game's final nine goals to pull within three. Riordan and Putnam each scored three goals, while Key added two goals and three assists in the defeat.

JHU bounced back in their final home game of the season by blasting Villanova, 18-3. Key scored five goals while Pearce added three goals and an assist.

Hopkins scored seven goals in the first 20 minutes of the game, and after the Wildcats scored, sophomore **Natalie Cooper** and Pearce scored to put the Blue Jays up 9-1 at the half. The Blue Jays scored the first five goals of the second period, taking a 14-1 lead, and cruised from there.

Hopkins then traveled to Duke in a makeup from February's postponed game and fell to the sixth-ranked Blue Devils, 10-7.

The Blue Jays took a 2-0 lead on a pair of goals by Voight, but Duke answered with five straight goals. Hopkins pulled within 8-7, but the Blue Devils scored the final two goals of the game to hang on.

Hopkins again bounced back from a loss by posting a 13-12 win at No. 6 Notre Dame, the highest ranked team ever defeated by the Blue Jays.

Key's third goal of the game with 3:24 remaining proved to be the game-winner, while Putnam led Hopkins with a career-high four goals and one assist. Key finished with three goals and two assists, while Janice was the other multi-goal scorer for the Blue Jays as she tallied twice.

The Fighting Irish had a chance to tie the game in the final minute, but Blue Jay junior **Lacey-Leigh Hentz** stripped the ball and Hopkins came up with the loose ball and ran out the clock to seal the victory.

The Blue Jays then traveled to Northwestern and fell to the 11th-ranked Wildcats, 15-8, losing their first conference game of the season.

Northwestern jumped out to a 7-2 lead, but Key and Putnam scored to cut the lead to three at the half. The Blue Jays were still within three at 11-8 with 10 minutes left after a goal by Key, but the Wildcats put the game away with four goals in a five-minute span.

The following week Hopkins had dreams of a conference title dashed as the Blue Jays fell at No. 18 Penn State, 12-9, in their regular season finale.

Key and Voight put JHU up 2-0 early, but the Nittany Lions scored six of the next eight goals to take a 6-4 halftime lead. A goal by Key, who finished with a game-high four goals, brought Hopkins within 9-7 with 17:20 left, but Penn State scored twice to pull away.

Despite the final two disappointing losses, the Blue Jays earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, the program's first bid in six years at the Division I level.

Hopkins traveled to fifth-ranked James Madison on May 13 and fell to the Dukes, 14-9.

James Madison led 5-4 at the half and extended its lead to 7-5 before Crisafulli and Pearce scored consecutive goals to tie the game. However, the Dukes answered with seven straight goals, including four by Kelly Berger and three by Gail Decker, to go up 14-7.

Pearce and Key again led Hopkins with three points apiece, while Crisafulli and Putnam each added two goals. Sophomore **Lauren Riddick** tied her career-high with 12 saves in the Blue Jay goal.

Following the season Pearce, Hentz and Key were named to the American Lacrosse Conference First Team, while Pearce was one of 20 players nominated for the Tewaaraton Award as the best player in Division I.

In June Pearce was named to the All-South Region First Team and became the first player in Hopkins history to earn Division I First Team All-America honors, while Key was a second team all-region selection and was named the womenslacrosse.com Co-Rookie of the Year.

2004 Women's Lacrosse Notes

The Coach: **Janine Tucker** is 134-50 (.732) in 11 seasons at Hopkins. Tucker is the all-time winningest coach at Homewood and has led the Blue Jays to double-digit win totals in each of her 11 seasons.

Pearce Named Division I First Team All-American: **Heidi Pearce** was named to the IWLCA/US Lacrosse All-America First Team, becoming the first Blue Jay to earn Division I First Team All-America honors. Pearce is the third Hopkins player to be selected a D-I All-American, as Danielle Maschuci was named to the third team in 2000 and Jamie Larrimore was selected to the third team in 2001.

Pearce, Key Selected All-Region: Heidi Pearce was named to the IWLCA/US Lacrosse Division I All-South Region First Team while **Mary Key** was selected to the second team.

Pearce, Key and **Lacey-Leigh Hentz** were also named to the womenslacrosse.com Division I All-America Second Team, while Key was selected to the Rookie Team and shared Rookie of the Year honors with Northwestern's Kristen Kjellman.

Three Blue Jays Earn All-ALC Honors: Heidi Pearce, Lacey-Leigh Hentz and Mary Key were named to the American Lacrosse Conference First Team on May 12.

Pearce, who was named to the all-conference first team in 2002 and to the second team last year, started all 17 games on the Blue Jay midfield this season while leading the team with 30 draw controls.

Hentz, who was named to the all-conference first team for the third straight year, started every game on the Hopkins defense while leading the team with 54 ground balls and 32 caused turnovers.

Key, who started all 17 games on attack, led the team with 52 goals, 22 assists and 74 points.

Pearce Named To Tewaaraton Nominee List: Heidi Pearce was one of 20 Division I players nominated for the Tewaaraton Award, given annually to the top women's lacrosse player in the nation.

Hopkins Finish No. 10 In IWLCA Poll: The Blue Jays received 159 points and finished in the No. 10 spot in the final IWLCA Poll.

Blue Jays Finish Third in ALC: Hopkins finished third in the American Lacrosse Conference this season with a 4-2 mark. The Blue Jays are the only team in the league to finish with a winning conference record in each of the league's first three years.

A Challenging Schedule: The Blue Jays went 4-5 in their nine games this season against teams ranked in the IWLCA Poll. Hopkins defeated No. 19 Ohio State, No. 13 Boston University, No. 9 Vanderbilt, and No. 6 Notre Dame, while falling to No. 7 Maryland, No. 6 Duke, No. 11 Northwestern, No. 18 Penn State and No. 5 James Madison.

The sixth-ranked Fighting Irish were the highest-ranked team ever defeated by Hopkins.

A Dominant Start: Hopkins won its first 10 games of the season for the first time in six years at the Division I level. The Blue Jays won their first four games during the 1999 season but dropped their season-openers in each of the next four years. The last time JHU opened the season with at least 10 wins was in 1994, when the Blue Jays started 16-0 in **Janine Tucker's** first season at Homewood.

The 10-game winning streak was also the longest since Hopkins moved to Division I. The Blue Jays won eight in a row from March 10 to April 5 in the 2000 season.

Hopkins In The NCAA: The Blue Jays ranked ninth in Division I this year with 12.59 goals scored per game and 19th with 9.29 goals allowed per game. Hopkins was also 12th with both 25.29 ground balls per game and a +3.29 scoring margin, and 13th with a .706 winning percentage.

Mary Key ranked ninth in the nation with both 4.35 points per game and 14th with 3.06 goals per game, and led all freshmen in both categories. **Lacey-Leigh Hentz** was the other Blue Jay in the rankings, as she was 15th with 3.18 ground balls per game.

Hopkins In The ALC: The Blue Jays led the conference with 25.29 ground balls per game. Hopkins also ranked second with 12.59 goals per game and with 9.29 goals allowed per game, fourth with 11.65 draw controls per game and fifth with 8.94 caused turnovers per game. Pearce On The Career Charts: Heidi Pearce ranks fifth at Hopkins with 152 career goals, seventh with 201 career points and ninth with 49 career assists. She ranks second on the Division I career goals list and is third in both career points and career assists.

Pearce is also the Hopkins Division I career leader with 230 ground balls, second with 109 caused turnovers and third with 76 draw controls.

Key Continues Impressive Season: Mary Key led the Blue Jays with 52 goals, 22 assists and 74 points this season. Key's 74 points are a Hopkins Division I single-season points mark, breaking Danielle Maschuci's previous record of 72 set during the 2000 season.

Hopkins In Division I Postseason: This year marked the fourth time in six Division I seasons that the Blue Jays participated in postseason play. Hopkins appeared in the ECAC Tournament during the 2000, 2001 and 2002 seasons, winning the title in 2001.

#0 Catherine Sawyer - Appeared in the season-opening win over Davidson, allowing two goals in the game's final nine minutes of action • gave up one goal while making two saves in 12 minutes against Villanova.

#00 Lauren Riddick - Started all 17 games in the Hopkins goal, making 123 saves while allowing 155 goals for a .442 save percentage • posted a 9.31 goals against average, second in the ALC • gave up seven goals or less in seven games this year • made a career-high 12 saves against Penn State and James Madison • stopped 11 shots in the win over Boston University • third on the JHU Division I saves list with 125.

#1 Meghan Crisafulli - Appeared in five games on the Blue Jay midfield • scored a goal in the win over Davidson in her first collegiate game • also won a draw control against the Wildcats • recorded a shot, ground ball, caused turnover and draw control versus Villanova • also saw action against Towson, Ohio University and Penn State.

#2 Erin Riordan - Started all 17 games on attack • ranked third on the team with 14 assists and 34 points, and was fourth with 20 goals • tied for 10th in the ALC with 0.82 assists per game • 14 assists are the eighth highest in a Division I single season at Hopkins • scored a career-high three goals against Maryland • posted two goals and an assist against Towson, American and Villanova • added two goals in wins over Ohio University and Vanderbilt • one of two Blue Jays (Mary Key) to score a point in every game this year • eighth on the JHU Division I career assists chart with 21.

#3 Katie Stevenson - Returned to the Hopkins defense this season after sitting out last year with a back injury • appeared in six games with four starts • collected three ground balls and caused one turnover on the season.

EVANSTON, IL -- Eight different Nittany Lions scored goals as the No. 18 Penn State women's lacrosse team used a balanced attack to defeat ninth-ranked Johns Hopkins, 12-9, in the Blue Jays' regular season finale at Jeffrey Field.

The Nittany Lions, who have now defeated the Blue Jays in each of the last three years, improved to 6-10 overall and 3-3 in the American Lacrosse Conference. Hopkins, which finishes its regular season 12-4 overall and 4-2 in the ALC,

was eliminated from contention for the conference title.

The Blue Jays took the early lead, as **Mary Key** scored an unassisted goal with 23:24 remaining in the first half and **Meagan Voight** scored off a feed from **Erin Riordan** at the 18:34 mark.

However, the Nittany Lions quickly responded with three goals to take their first lead of the game. Kristen Burke scored a free position goal with 16:45 left in the half to put Penn State on the board, and after Jamie Donahue scored to tie the game at the 12:26 mark, Jackie Sherman put the Nittany Lions ahead with an unassisted goal with 7:34 left in the half.

Heidi Pearce scored a free position goal one minute later to tie the game and scored an unassisted goal with 5:37 remaining to put Hopkins back on top 4-3, but Penn State answered with the final three goals of the period to take a 6-4 advantage at the half. Lori Havrilla tied the game with 4:41 on the clock. Donahue converted a free position shot with 1:58 remaining and Katie Jeschke found Burke for a goal with 11 seconds left to give the Nittany Lions the two-goal lead.

Kelley Putnam scored off a Riordan assist just 28 seconds into the second half to bring the Blue Jays within one, but Jeschke and Katie Hartman answered with free position goals 44 seconds apart to put Penn State up 8-5 with 24:32 remaining. Pearce scored an unassisted goal at the 22:53 mark, but Stephanie Curnoles put the Nittany Lions back up three by scoring off a feed from Shari Maslin with 21:03 to play.

Key then scored on a free position shot with 17:20 left to make it a 9-7 game, but Havrilla scored off a pass from Burke and Emily Chambers scored on a free position shot as Penn State took its largest lead of the game at 11-7 with 12:16 to play. Key kept the Blue Jays in the game by scoring off a feed from **Anne Crisafulli** with 7:33 left, but Jeschke responded with a free position goal at the 6:05 mark.

Key scored an unassisted goal with 2:09 remaining, but the Nittany Lions won the ensuing draw control and ran the clock out.

Key finished with a game-high four goals for the Blue Jays, while Pearce added three goals and five draw controls in her final regular season game. **Kate Gilland** led the Hopkins defense with four ground balls and three caused turnovers, while **Lacey-Leigh Hentz** added three ground balls and two caused turnovers and **Julia Kleene** won three draw controls.

Lauren Riddick made a career-high 12 saves in the Blue Jay goal, while Lee Tortorelli stopped 16 shots for Penn State.

HARRISONBURG, VA -- Gail Decker scored seven goals, including five in the second half, and fifth-ranked James Madison used a seven-goal run in the second half to roll past No.10 Johns Hopkins, 14-9 in the first round of the 2004 NCAA Division I women's lacrosse championships.

The Dukes ran their winning streak to 11 games and improved to 16-3 on the year while Hopkins, which was making its first-ever appearance in the NCAA Division I Tournament, finishes the season at 12-5.

The Dukes led 7-5 early in the second half before **Anne Crisafulli** and **Heidi Pearce** scored back-to-back goals in a span of just 51 seconds to tie the game at 7-7. That was the fifth and final tie of the game as Kelly Berger scored four goals and Decker added three during the 7-0 run, which was jump-started by a Decker goal 17 seconds after Pearce had tied the game and ended with back-to-back goals by Berger. Berger's final goal with 9:24 remaining gave the Dukes what proved to be an insurmountable 14-7 lead.

The first 35 minutes of the game saw the Dukes carry the play, only to have the Blue Jays hang tight with timely goal-scoring and solid goalkeeping.

The Blue Jays jumped out to an early 1-0 lead on an **Erin Riordan** goal at the 28:03 mark, only to have JMU strike for three goals in a span of less than three minutes. Decker and Berger sandwiched goals around a Jessica Brownridge tally to stake the Dukes to the 3-1 lead.

The two-goal cushion was short-lived as Pearce's first goal at the 21:31 mark trimmed the deficit to 3-2 and **Kelley Putnam's** first goal of the game tied the score less than two minutes later. Neither team would score for the next 13 minutes as the defenses settled in, but Johanna Buchholz's free position goal with 6:16 remaining in the first half broke the tie and gave JMU a 4-3 lead. **Meagan Voight** and Decker traded goals in the final five minutes of the first half as JMU carried a 5-4 lead into halftime.

Marlena Wittelsberger tied the game just 18 seconds into the second half, but Decker scored twice in a span of just 16 seconds to make it 7-5. That set the stage for Crisafulli and Pearce to tie the game for the final time before the Dukes put the game away with the 7-0 run that covered a span of just over 14 minutes. Putnam and Crisafulli added late goals to account for the final scoring.

Decker and Berger combined for 12 of JMU's 14 goals, none of which were assisted. Amy Altig made nine saves in goal for the Dukes.

Pearce and **Mary Key** led the Blue Jays with three points apiece as Pearce scored the two goals and added one assist, while Key had three assists. Key had scored at least two goals in every game this season before being held without a goal by the Dukes. Putnam and Crisafulli both added the two goals and **Lauren Riddick** made 12 saves in goal for the Blue Jays, who were outshot, 27-23 and controlled just six of 23 draws.
