

2005 Johns Hopkins Women's Lacrosse Season Review



Season In Review

The 2005 Johns Hopkins women's lacrosse team proved it could compete with the best and is on the right track to becoming a national championship contender, finishing 11-6 and earning its second straight NCAA tournament berth. The season was just the seventh for Hopkins at the Division I level, but the Blue Jays were ranked in the top 12 throughout the year among the most storied women's lacrosse programs of all time.

With 12th-year head coach **Janine Tucker** and senior captains **Lacey-Leigh Hentz** and **Anne Crisafulli** guiding an otherwise young squad, the year's highlights included the first shut out win in six years, an upset of sixth-ranked Georgetown in the final regular-season game, and an at-large berth in the NCAA tournament.



The Blue Jays began the year ranked sixth in the IWLCA preseason poll and picked to finish second behind Northwestern in the American Lacrosse Conference (ALC). Following a 15-4 Blue Jay rout of Davidson, their highest ranking in history was put to the test as it visited #2 Princeton in just their second game of the year. **Mary Key**, who led the Blue Jays with a then-career-high six goals and two assists against Davidson, paced the offense again at Princeton with two goals and two assists. Hopkins led 5-4 at halftime but Princeton's All-American Lindsey Biles recorded all four of her goals in the second half, when the Tigers outscored the Blue Jays 5-1.

Despite the 9-6 loss, Johns Hopkins won the statistical battle with a 23-18 advantage on ground balls and 9-8 edge on draw controls – the Blue Jays were neck and neck with the second-ranked team in the country and the defending national runner-up.

Hopkins learned an early lesson one week later when it carried its confidence from the Princeton game to a conference matchup at Ohio State. Against a team that Hopkins defeated 13-5 last year, the Blue Jays struggled from the start and the Buckeyes jumped to a 2-0 lead. Key put the Jays on the board with her ninth goal in three games before Ohio State answered to take a 5-1

lead. Senior **Erin Riordan** and sophomore **Sarah Walsh**, who redshirted last season, helped Johns Hopkins rally with a goal and an assist apiece to tie the game 6-6 at the half, but the Buckeyes ended the game as strongly as they started it. ALC Rookie of the Year Kelly Kremer finished with six goals while K.C. Carter added four for Ohio State in the 12-9 win. Key led Hopkins in scoring for the third straight game with two goals and three assists.

Learning quickly not to take any game lightly, and on a two-game losing skid, Hopkins took its frustration out on Ohio University two days later. Key and freshman **Kadie Stamper** each scored four goals, freshman **Sarah Gallion** picked up five ground balls on defense, and the Blue Jays outshot the Bobcats 27-8 in the 14-0 win, which was Hopkins' first shut out win in six years. The Jays had once before held a Division I opponent scoreless, defeating California 13-0 in 1999.

Even after JHU's shut out win, the unexpected loss to Ohio State dropped Hopkins from #6 to #12 in the IWLCA poll and remained in the Blue Jays' memories as they moved forward.

Next on the schedule was another plane trip, this time to Nashville to face #16 Vanderbilt. Freshman **Lauren Schwarzmann**, who averaged one goal in her first four games, scored the first three goals of the game and added an assist to lead the Jays to the 13-6 win. Her classmate, Stamper, won seven draw controls as Hopkins dominated the draws, 17-4. Key and Walsh each added two goals and one assist in the win, which improved the Blue Jays to 3-2 overall and 3-1 in the ALC.

With two straight wins under their belts, the Jays continued their winning streak with four more victories in the next two weeks. They trailed at George Mason – 3-2 at the half and 4-2 in the second period – before Key scored all four of her points in an eight-minute span to help Hopkins survive. Stamper and Riordan also scored during the 6-0 Blue Jay run, while Hentz and redshirt freshman **Cherie Michaud** shut down the Patriot defense with three caused turnovers apiece.

Two days later, Johns Hopkins returned to Baltimore to face George Washington for its first home game in a month. Key and junior **Meagan**

Voight connected for the first two goals but the Colonials outplayed the Jays the rest of the half and led 6-5 at the break.

For the second straight game, Hopkins used a second-half scoring run to take the lead for good, as freshman **Annie Wagner** substituted in and scored twice, and four other Blue Jays added goals in the period. Michaud, who had a season-high four caused turnovers and three ground balls, and Hentz once again did their parts on defense, allowing just three Colonialists to score. Junior goalie **Lauren Riddick** made nine saves in the 11-8 win.

Key was selected the ALC Player of the Week and to the womenslacrosse.com Honor Roll after totaling five goals, four assists, and seven draw

controls in the wins over George Mason and George Washington.

Holding strong at the #12 spot, the Blue Jays then faced #13 Penn in the second game of a three-game homestand at Homewood Field. Hopkins led 6-2 at the half and never let up in the 13-4 win, their fifth straight win of the year and fourth consecutive over the Quakers. Key recorded her second straight hat trick and added two assists for a game-high six points, while Walsh finished with three goals and an assist. Wagner scored two goals in the final eight minutes.

The Blue Jays ended their homestand against UMBC in the first meeting between the two Maryland teams since 1999. Johns Hopkins dominated every facet of the game, including an 18-6 advantage on draws, and Key had five goals and three assists in the 16-6 win.

Voight added three goals and eight other Blue Jays scored, including season-first goals from sophomore **Alex Nolan** and freshmen **Kelly Gonzalez** and **Katie Dumais**. Hentz, proving she could play on both ends of the field, recorded her second goal in as many games and added four draw controls and four caused turnovers. Her fellow senior captain, Crisafulli, added a goal and an assist.

A tougher local challenge met Hopkins three days later, when the Blue Jays traveled to College Park to face #9 Maryland. Hopkins had lost all six of its previous meetings with the Terrapins, but each year the Jays came closer to earning their first win.

This season, Hopkins took the field without fear and battled the Terps to a 4-4 tie at halftime. Senior **Kristen Miller** earned her first start of the year and sparked Hopkins on the draw, on ground balls, and on defense, while Maryland double-teamed Key throughout the game and forced Hopkins' other scoring weapons to trigger. Walsh tied a career-high with five goals, Stamper added two, and Riddick anchored the defense with 10 saves, but the Terps proved too strong. Senior Acacia Walker tallied five goals for Mary-

land, which won 17 of 24 draw controls and converted six free-position goals in the 12-10 win. The two-goal loss to the Terps was the best outcome for the Jays in the seven-game series history of the rivalry.

The lacrosse world recognized Hopkins' talent displayed at Maryland's Ludwig Field, and the IWLC A bumped the Jays up to #11 in the next national poll. Hopkins proved itself further with two more wins in the next week, defeating American and Towson on the road.

Key and Walsh continued to lead the Blue Jay offense with six points apiece at American, where Hopkins tied its season-high scoring performance in the 16-10 win. Stamper had another complete game with two goals, four draw controls, two

ground balls, and two caused turnovers, while Crisafulli chipped in four caused turnovers and three ground balls and her younger sister, **Meghan Crisafulli**, added a ground ball, won one draw, and forced one turnover.

A week later at Towson's Johnny Unitas Stadium, Key scored a career-high seven goals and added three assists to tie the Johns Hopkins Division I record for points in a game (10). Six of Key's seven goals were unassisted, as she matched Heidi Pearce's and Danielle Mascuchi's single-game record and led Hopkins to the 15-10 win. Freshman **Kirby Houck** sparked the Blue Jays with two first-half goals, leading Hopkins to a 6-5 lead at the break, before Stamper added two goals in a 5-0 second-half run.

The challenge of the season came next for Hopkins, as top-ranked Northwestern visited Homewood on April 22. The Wildcats, in just their fourth varsity season, were leading the nation in scoring with 16.0 goals per game and in defense with 6.07 goals allowed per game, and they boasted the first and third top scorers in all of Division I.

Hentz shut out their top scorer, Lindsey Munday, but Northwestern proved to the Homewood crowd it was worthy of the #1 ranking, defeating the Blue Jays 12-3. Hopkins trailed just 5-3 at halftime before the Wildcat defense held the Jays scoreless and outshot them 15-7 in the second period. Sarah Albrecht led all scorers with four goals, while Key, Schwarzmann, and sophomore **Steph Janice** scored Hopkins' only goals. It was the first and only game of the year that Key would score less than three points.

With three regular-season games remaining and a NCAA at-large berth at stake, Johns Hopkins quickly got back into the win column with a 10-9 victory over Notre Dame two days later at Homewood. The Blue Jays trailed 5-4 at halftime but, for the third time in that predicament this year, they rallied late in the second.

The Irish had their largest lead, 9-6, with just over five minutes remaining before goals from Key and Schwarzmann brought the Blue Jays



within one. Key then assisted junior **Kelley Putnam's** third goal of the year, tying the game at nine with 28 seconds remaining. Hopkins won the ensuing draw and got the ball to Key, who went hard to goal and drew a free-position attempt. Although the Blue Jays were just 1 for 6 on free-position shots to that point of the game, Key fired her shot past goalie Carol Dixon for the game-winning goal.

After the game, #11 Johns Hopkins had five days to mend its loose edges and prepare for a conference matchup with #10 Penn State, which was second in the ALC standings behind Northwestern and ahead of Hopkins. Since the Wildcats clinched the conference's automatic NCAA berth, the outcome of the Hopkins vs. Penn State game would help determine which team would, or if both teams could, earn an at-large spot. The game, which was the second Hopkins women's game to be televised this season (Princeton was the other), lived up to its hype with five ties before the 9-8 Nittany Lion win.

Both teams stalled throughout the game, but it was Penn State who took an early lead, scoring the first two goals and bringing a 4-3 advantage into halftime. Hopkins never led until midway through the second half, when Key scored her second goal and then assisted Voight for a 7-6 edge. The teams traded goals again, but after Wagner scored to put Hopkins ahead 8-7, Penn State scored two straight goals to earn its fourth win in four meetings with the Blue Jays.

Hopkins managed a free-position attempt with two seconds remaining, but All-American goalkeeper Lee Tortorelli made the save to preserve the Penn State win. Key led the Jays' offense again with two goals and two assists, bringing her season total to a school-record 76 points, while Riddick tied a career-high with 12 saves.

With the loss, the Blue Jays dropped to 10-5 and slipped another notch away from NCAA tournament selection. But they had one last chance to secure a spot – their regular-season finale at #6 Georgetown one day before the selection show.

The highest ranked team defeated by Hopkins this year was #13 Penn, and the highest ranked team defeated all-time was #6 Notre Dame; a win over Georgetown would certainly go down as the biggest win in Hopkins women's lacrosse history.

The Blue Jays showed up to play. Walsh and Putnam scored the first two goals of the game and, after the Hoyas got on the board, Key and Wagner combined for two more for a 4-1 lead midway through the first half. Georgetown fought back to tie the game at six before Houck came off the sidelines and put in the go-ahead goal for a 7-6 Hopkins lead.

Each team's offensive star dominated the second period, when All-American and Tewaaron candidates Key and Coco Stanwick each scored three goals. But it was Key and company who had the better teamwork, as three other Blue Jays added goals but only one other Hoya scored. Key and Walsh each scored once while Stanwick tallied twice in the first five minutes for a 9-8 Blue Jay edge before Hopkins scored three straight to take its biggest lead.

Key led the run with two goals following a free-position goal from Hentz for the 12-8 lead with 16:13 on the clock. Georgetown scored twice in the next 10 minutes but Stamper put in two goals in the final stretch to seal the win for Hopkins. Key finished with a game-high six points off five goals and an assist, while Walsh added three goals and an assist.

Key's clutch performance earned her the ALC, Inside Lacrosse, and womenslacrosse.com Player of the Week awards, while Stamper was named the womenslacrosse.com Rookie of the Week for her seven draw controls, two goals, and three ground balls.

The following night, the NCAA championship bracket was released and Johns Hopkins earned its second straight – and second all-time – Division I tournament berth. The Blue Jays would face sixth-seeded Virginia, the defending national champion and a team never faced by Hopkins in the history of women's lacrosse.

On Thursday, May 12, the first day of the NCAA tournament, Hopkins took an early 3-0 lead against the defending national champion, trailed by one at halftime, and led 8-7 with under four minutes to play. Voight scored a game-high four goals, and Key finished with two goals and three assists, but Virginia's Kate Breslin had more timely points, scoring two of her team-high three goals in the final 3:45.

Behind Breslin, the Cavaliers came from one goal down and scored three straight to finish with the 10-8 win over the Blue Jays and advance to the NCAA quarterfinals. Virginia won two more tournament games before losing to Northwestern, 13-10, in the championship game. Hopkins ended its season with an 11-6 record and several postseason individual honors.

Key and Hentz were both named Inside Lacrosse, womenslacrosse.com, and IWLCA/US Lacrosse All-Americans, and were first-team selections to the All-ALC Team and the IWLCA/US Lacrosse All-South Regional Team.

Schwarzmann was named to the All-ALC second team, and Stamper was a third-team Inside Lacrosse All-American and a womenslacrosse.com All-Rookie pick. Seniors Crisafulli, Hentz, and Riordan were all selected to play in the IWLCA North-South senior game.

2005 Johns Hopkins Season Notebook

Ending Note: The Blue Jays finished the year 11-6, ranked 10th in the final IWLCA poll, and with a 10-8 loss to runner-up Virginia in the first round of the NCAA tournament. It was the second straight year that Johns Hopkins finished with a 10th-place ranking and in the first round of the tournament.

Back-To-Back: This year's NCAA Division I tournament berth was the second straight and second all-time for Johns Hopkins. Both tournament selections were at-large, as Northwestern clinched the automatic berth this season and Vanderbilt earned it last year.

Perfect 10: Hopkins finished with double-digit wins for the 13th straight year since the 1993 Blue Jays went 9-5. Janine Tucker has led her team to at least 10 wins every year at Hopkins, and she boasts a .721 winning percentage in 12 seasons.

Placings and Standings: Johns Hopkins placed third in the American Lacrosse Conference (ALC) behind Northwestern and Penn State, and was ranked third in every team statistical category – team defense, team offense, ground balls, caused turnovers, and draw controls.

National Numbers: The Blue Jays were 10th in the nation in team defense, allowing 8.06 goals per game. They also ranked 18th in scoring margin (+3.06). Northwestern was first in both categories.

Tough Competition: For the second straight year, Johns Hopkins went 4-5 against teams ranked in the IWLCA poll. The Jays defeated Vanderbilt, Penn, Towson, and Georgetown, and lost to Princeton, Maryland, Northwestern, Penn State, and Virginia.

Lucky Number Six: Sixth-ranked Georgetown was the highest ranked team defeated by Hopkins not only this year but also in school history. The 2004 Blue Jays also defeated a sixth-ranked team, Notre Dame.

Second Shutout: Hopkins recorded a shut out win this year, defeating Ohio 14-0. It was the seventh shutout in school history and the second shutout for the Blue Jays at the Division I level. The 1999 team defeated California 13-0.

Teamwork: The Blue Jays tallied 94 assists, setting the school Division I record for assists in a season. The previous mark was 82 assists in the 2002 season. The 283 points this year is the third highest total for Johns Hopkins at the Division I level.

The First Time: Hopkins faced four teams this year for the first time at the Division I level. The Blue Jays defeated UMBC and lost to Princeton, Georgetown, and Virginia in the teams' first meetings.

Moving On Up: Johns Hopkins entered the season ranked #6 and held that spot until the third IWLCA poll. The #6 ranking is the highest in school Division I history, topping the previous high of #9 for four weeks in 2004.

Top Two: Mary Key and Lacey-Leigh Hentz were both named IWLCA/US Lacrosse All-Americans, marking the first time since Hopkins moved to Division I that more than one Blue Jay were named All-American.

The Nation's Best: Key ended the year as the conference and national leading scorer, averaging 5.12 points per game. She was first in the ALC and ninth in the nation in goals per game (3.24), and second in the conference and sixth in the nation in assists per game (1.88).

The Key Offense: Key broke several school Division I records this season, including the single-season records for points (87) and assists (32). Her 87 points eclipsed the previous mark of 74 points, which she set in 2004 as a rookie. Key also tied the school record for single-game points with 10 (seven goals, three assists) against Towson. Heidi Pearce ('04) and Danielle Maschuci ('00) each scored 10 points once in their careers.

More Records: Key holds the second longest point-scoring streak, scoring in every game of her career at Hopkins (34). She scored at least three points in all but one game this year (Northwestern).

Sharing The Wealth: Although Key finished with 49 more points than any of her teammates did, 18 different Blue Jays scored at least one point this season and five finished with more than 20 points.

- Sophomore Sarah Walsh, who red-shirted last year, was second in scoring with 26 goals, 12 assists, and 38 points.
- Freshman Lauren Schwarzmann was third in points with 28 off 17 goals and 11 assists.
- Junior Meagan Voight added 18 goals, seven assists, and 25 points.
- Freshman Kadie Stamper had 19 goals, three assists, and 22 points.

Five of '05: Seniors Hentz, Anne Crisafulli, Erin Riordan, Kristen Miller, and Sandra Lebo ended their collegiate careers, with many of them in the Hopkins Division I record book. Hentz is the all-time leader in caused turnovers (146) and is fifth in both ground balls (174) and draw controls (59). Crisafulli is tied for 12th in draw controls (43); Riordan is tied for 10th in goals (40), is sixth in assists (28), and is eighth in points (68); and Miller is fourth in draw controls (72).

Defense, Defense: Junior goalie Lauren Riddick played every minute in goal and finished with an 8.06 goals against average, good for second in the ALC and 12th in the nation. Her .473 save percentage was the third best in the conference. Riddick's career goals against average of 8.64 is the best mark in Hopkins Division I history.

On The Draw: Stamper was third in the conference and ninth in the nation in draw controls per game (3.29). Her season total of 56 draws is the second best mark in the Johns Hopkins Division I record book.

Ruling Rookies: Along with Key and Hentz, two other Blue Jays received postseason honors and both were members of the highly touted freshman class. Schwarzmann earned second-team All-ALC honors, while Stamper was named to the Inside Lacrosse All-America Third Team and to the womenslacrosse.com All-Rookie Team.

Proving Them Right: Inside Lacrosse ranked this year's Blue Jay rookie class the second best recruiting class behind Duke. By the end of the year, four true freshman were in the starting lineup and two others were key substitutes. Sarah Gallion started every game at defense, while the rookie class scored 57 goals.

Back At It: Johns Hopkins lost five players to graduation, including four-year starter Hentz, but it returns 10 starters and its top six goal scorers. With Coach Tucker leading the team again, the Blue Jays should expect even more success in 2006.

Johns Hopkins 15, Davidson 4 Feb. 26, 2005

BALTIMORE, MD - Sophomore Mary Key scored a career-high six goals and added two assists to lead the Johns Hopkins women's lacrosse team to a 15-4 victory over visiting Davidson at Homewood Field Saturday evening. The Blue Jays have now won all seven meetings against the Wildcats by at least eight goals.

Key wasted little time getting the Blue Jays started as she opened the scoring just 19 seconds into the game, assisted on a Steph Janice goal 10 seconds later and added her second goal of the game at the 24:44 mark to stake Hopkins to a quick 3-0 lead. Freshman Lauren Schwarzmann's first career goal five minutes later was followed by Key's third goal as the Blue Jays built a 5-0 lead less than 13 minutes into the game.

Davidson's Whitney Diefendorf temporarily halted the barrage with her first goal of the season off an assist from Lindsay Frank at the 12:38 mark, but Sarah Walsh, Meagan Voight, Key, and Schwarzmann all scored in a span of less than seven minutes to push the lead to 9-1 late in the first half. Frank fed Eloise Grose for Davidson's second goal with just under two minutes remaining in the first half, but that would be as close as the Wildcats would get.

Key sandwiched her fifth and six goals around Walsh's second goal of the game and freshman Kirby Houck's first career goal in the first 14 minutes of the second half and senior Anne Crisafulli tallied twice to give Hopkins its biggest lead of the game, 15-2. Davidson's Kiften Stephens and Missy Gilbert both scored in the final three minutes to account for the final scoring.

Key had scored five goals in a single game four times as a freshman last season. Her eight points were also one better than her previous career high of seven, which she posted in a 13-5 win over Ohio State last year. Crisafulli matched her career-high with the two goals and added an assist for a personal-best three points. Walsh and Schwarzmann both finished with two goals, and Voight chipped in with one goal and one assist to account for the Blue Jays' multi-point performers.

Stephens had one goal and one assist and Frank added two assists to lead the way for the Wildcats, who were outshot 36-9 and controlled just 12 of 32 draws.

PRINCETON, NJ - Senior Lindsey Biles scored all four of her goals in the second half to lead the second-ranked Princeton women's lacrosse team past sixth-ranked Johns Hopkins 9-6 at the Class of 1952 Stadium. The Blue Jays (1-1) led 5-4 at the break before the Tigers (1-0) outscored them 5-1 in the second half.

The game was the season opener for Princeton, which won two of the last three NCAA Championships and was runner-up in 2004. The Blue Jays and Tigers never met in women's lacrosse before tonight, as Hopkins looked for its first win over a team ranked higher than sixth.

Defense dominated the early game when both teams went over 10 minutes without a goal. Princeton sophomore Kathleen Miller opened the scoring on an unassisted goal with 18:22 on the clock and then assisted a Mary Minshall goal a minute later for a 2-0 Tiger lead.

The Blue Jays quickly answered as sophomore Mary Key scored her seventh goal in two games on a free-position shot, and senior Anne Crisafulli scored on a feed from freshman Lauren Schwarzmann to tie the score 2-2 with 15:49 remaining in the first.

Miller scored her second goal of the night to regain the Princeton lead before back-to-back goals from junior Meagan Voight put Johns Hopkins ahead for the first time, 4-3, with 4:22 to play.

Freshman Katie Lewis-Lamonica scored her first career goal to give Princeton the 6-5 lead before Biles nailed three straight to put the game away. She scored two unassisted goals, using her speed to beat defenders one-on-one, and one free-position shot with Riddick removed from the goal on a foul.

At the end of Biles' scoring spree, the Blue Jays trailed 9-5 with 3:25 to play. Key scored her second goal with 2:03 remaining in a final attempt to catch the Tigers, breaking a span of nearly 30 scoreless minutes.

Princeton outshot Hopkins 14-11 and won 4 of 7 draw controls in the second half, but the Blue Jays won the ground ball battle 11-9. Hopkins finished with a 23-18 advantage on ground balls and a 9-8 edge on draw controls. Shots were also near even, as Princeton led 24-23. Kolodner finished with 14 saves for Princeton, and Riddick had six for Hopkins.

Biles' four goals were a game-high, while Key and Voight paced Johns Hopkins with two apiece. Key added two assists for a team-high four points.

COLUMBUS, OHIO - Freshman Kelly Kremer scored a career-high six goals and the Buckeyes outscored the Blue Jays 6-3 in the second half as Ohio State (2-1, 1-0 ALC) upset sixth-ranked Johns Hopkins (1-2, 1-1 ALC) 12-9. The game was tied 6-6 at halftime and 8-8 with 11 minutes remaining before Ohio State scored four straight.

The game began at 6 p.m. as scheduled at Jesse Owens Memorial Stadium, but with 8:39 remaining in the first half, the officials halted the game due to snow. Play resumed 45 minutes later indoors on the turf of the Woody Hayes Athletic Complex.

Ohio State jumped to a 2-0 lead behind consecutive goals from junior KC Carter. Carter scored off an assist from freshman Kristen Slahor 1:28 into the game, and tallied her second goal five minutes later on a free-position shot.

Three minutes later, Kadie Stamper set up Voight, who shot over her defender's shoulder for the 2-0 Hopkins lead. Stamper then scored a goal of her own off an assist from Key in the next possession, making it 3-0 with 23:11 on the clock.

On the other end, Hopkins goalie Lauren Riddick stopped three shots before Amy Appelt dodged through the middle and scored the first Cavalier goal. The Blue Jays led 3-1 with 21:15 remaining.

Two minutes later, Nikki Lieb made it a one-point game with an unassisted bounce shot, but Stamper responded with her second goal of the game, rolling across the crease and shooting high to give the Jays a 4-2 lead with 18 minutes to play.

After Stamper's goal, Virginia won the ensuing draw and scored immediately, as Cary Chasney put in her first goal with 17:49 on the clock. Chasney then tied the game at four with a free-position goal, which came just seconds after Riddick made a point-blank save on Virginia's first free-position attempt.

Defense dominated the latter part of the half, as neither team scored again until Appelt set up Lieb's second goal with eight seconds remaining. Virginia led 5-4 at the break.

In the second period, Virginia recorded its fourth straight goal to take its largest lead yet, 6-4, before the Blue Jays finally ended their 28-minute-long scoring drought. Key set up Voight for two straight goals to tie the game at six with 17:46 to play.

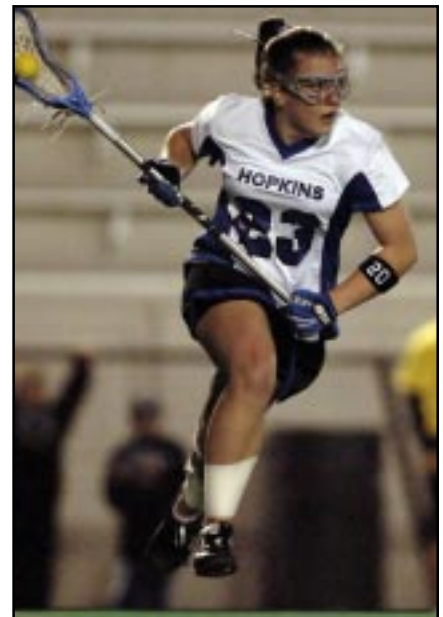
Breslin briefly regained the lead for Virginia with a goal 46 seconds later, but Key answered with an unassisted point, tying the game at seven midway through the period.

The Blue Jays then took their first lead since the first half, and last lead of the game, when Voight scored her fourth goal off an assist from Sarah Gallion with 7:46 remaining. Hopkins held the 8-7 edge for four minutes before Breslin rose to the occasion, scoring her second goal to tie the game at eight and putting in her third goal of the half 47 seconds later for a 9-8 Virginia lead at the three-minute mark.

Virginia gained possession off the draw and Meredith Lazarus scored the Cavaliers' third goal in two minutes for a 10-8 lead, while the Virginia defense limited Hopkins to just one final shot and held on for the win.
