Wildcats Notes



Brooks Hires Impressive Staff

New head coach Rich Brooks put together an impressive staff to assist him in coaching the Wildcats.

Look at the coordinators, for example. Offensive coordinator Ron Hudson has been the director of the high-scoring attack at Kansas State the last several seasons; defensive coordinator Mike Archer spent the last seven years as linebackers coach for one of the National Football League's best defenses, the Pittsburgh Steelers; special teams coordinator Steve Ortmyer has 17 years of NFL experience in that role, including two Super Bowl championships; and recruiting coordinator Joker Phillips is a former Kentucky player and coach who is well-known and respected in the Commonwealth.

All totaled, the staff has 243 years of professional coaching/playing/administrative and collegiate coaching experience. Eight of the 10 coaches have played and/or coached in the NFL or been a college head coach or coordinator. (See inside the front cover and pages 16-17 for more details on the staff.)

"I'm extremely pleased with the staff we've assembled here. Frankly, it even surpassed the expectations I had when I began," Brooks said. "I mentioned before that this

staff would cover a lot of areas in age, region and race. I think this staff certainly typifies that. We have some younger coaches and some older coaches. We have some coaches from this conference, from the midwest and from the west. The most important thing to me is that we have coaches that are not only outstanding teachers, but they're good people and they care about the young men they're going to coach. That was the primary concern I had in hiring a staff."

Base Sets

Offensive coordinator Ron Hudson will install an offense that uses multiple sets while defensive coordinator Mike Archer plans to use a 3-4-4 scheme.

Hudson plans to mold a balanced run-pass system around the available talent. His system showed such flexibility at Kansas State, with quarterbacks who set conference touchdown passing records and other QBs who directed ground-eating rushing attacks.

Archer is an admirer of the 3-4 system that he worked with in Pittsburgh, with four linebackers making it harder for the quarterback to read defenses and anticipate blitzes.

UK to Feature Veteran O-Line

have the luxury of working with five players who have been full-time or part-time starters during their careers.

Left tackle Matt Huff (11 career starts), left guard Jason Rollins (18), center Nick Seitze (18), right guard Sylvester Miller (5), and right tackle Antonio Hall (34) have 86 career starts between them.

And, there's no guarantee that those five will be the starters. Two other returning lettermen and five redshirts -- including former junior college All-American Yancey Reynolds -- will provide intense competition during the spring.

Big Shoes to Fill

Every team has to find replacements for departed starters and Kentucky is no different this spring.

Key holes on offense are at running back and tight end. Sophomores Alexis Bwenge and Arliss Beach and redshirt freshman Monquanta Gibson vie to replace Artose Pinner, the SEC's leading rusher in 2002. Senior

Win Gaffron and sophomore Jeremiah Drobney are the top contenders to replace hard-nosed Chase Harp at tight end.

There will be at least seven new starters on defense. The biggest question marks are at linebacker, where no starters return. The top contenders at the inside linebackers are lettermen Justin Haydock, Dustin Williams, Kamaal Ahmad, and Chad Anderson. Converted defensive ends Deion Holts and Raymond Fontaine will get looks at the outside linebackers, along with two true freshmen who entered UK in January, Durrell White and Travis Day.

Injury Report

As of Feb. 27, here is the list of Wildcats who are subject to practice limitations during the spring.

CB Kevin Deatherage (knee) is expected to have limited participation at the start of spring practice, with full participation possible by the end of the spring.

OG Sylvester Miller (shoulder) is expected to have limited participation at the start of spring practice, with full participation possible by the end of the spring.

CB Claude Sagaille (shoulder) will participate in non-contact drills.

LB Durrell White (knee) hopes to have full participation depending on the completion of his rehabilitation.

CB Warren Wilson (knee) will participate in non-contact drills.

2003 Schedule Notes

For the second consecutive year, Kentucky will play a 12-game regular-season schedule, including seven home games and five away contests ... Kentucky will open against in-state rival Louisville for the 10th consecutive season. For the second year in a row, this game has been moved to Sunday night to accommodate an espn2 telecast ... Kentucky will take on another in-state foe, Murray State, in the second game. It will be the first time in school history that the teams have played. Although Murray State is in Division I-AA, Kentucky can count the game toward the bowl-game minimum if the Wildcats are victorious. Murray State won the Ohio Valley Conference championship last season and played in the I-AA playoffs ... UK plays Alabama for the first time since 1997, when Wildcat fans tore down the Commonwealth Stadium goalposts after the

40-34 upset win in overtime ... Kentucky will play host to Ohio in the annual Homecoming game. The Wildcats and Bobcats last tangled in 1987 ... Six of Kentucky's first seven opponents will feature new starting quarterbacks in 2003 ... Two opponents will have new coaches, Bobby Petrino at Louisville and Mike Price at Alabama.

Robertson Declares Early for NFL Draft

Kentucky will miss the services of defensive tackle Dewayne Robertson, who gave up his final season of eligibility to enter the 2003 NFL draft.

Robertson was a first-team All-Southeastern Conference selection last season by the *Mobile Register* and second-team All-SEC by The Associated Press and league coaches.

Robertson is the fifth player in school history to declare early for the NFL, following in the footsteps of running back Moe Williams, quarterback Tim Couch, defensive end Dennis Johnson, and tight end Derek Smith, all of whom are still in the NFL.

2003 Spring Outlook

For Rich Brooks, assessing his 2003 Kentucky football team is like trying to buy a new car.

They all look good in the showroom, but you really don't know until you take a test drive.

Brooks has seen his team on film and has watched the Wildcats go through strength and agility drills. He likes what he's seen so far and is eager to begin the test run at the start of spring practice on March 29.

"I've been impressed with how the players have handled the transition so far," Brooks said. "I'm the third head coach that the senior class has had, and that's a tough thing to go through. I think they're past the stage of trying to figure out what we're about. They've settled in and decided that they're going to roll up their sleeves and work hard to get better and move forward."

Brooks already has begun tinkering under the hood of his football machine, installing a stringent off-season strength and conditioning program and investing time in teaching the x's and o's of new offensive and defensive systems.

"We're trying to get them in shape and introduce what we're doing offensively and defensively as much as we can," Brooks said. "You have eight hours a week (in the off-season) of conditioning and/or meeting time.

"In the spring we need to introduce and get implemented as much of the offense and defense as possible in the 15-day practice period. We need to address the losses by graduation as far as who is going to step up and replace them.

"We need to get a good look at everybody and evaluate their talents because, as a new staff, I told them that all the jobs are open. It's conceivable that someone who started last year won't start this year if they don't continue to get better. We have to sort out our starters, our backups, the guys we can count on. Some of those questions won't be answered until next fall but we'll get a pretty good idea about many of them this spring."

Theoretically, the job should be easier on

offense, where seven starters return. It's tougher on defense, with only four returning starters, and in the special teams, a new punter and long snapper must be chosen. All totaled, 61 lettermen return from the team that exceeded expectations in posting a 7-5 record a year ago.

On offense, coordinator Ron Hudson hopes to duplicate the success he enjoyed at Kansas State, where his unit led the nation in scoring in 1998 and was second nationally in 2002. Hudson plans to tailor his system around the talent available.

Returning at quarterback is fifth-year senior Jared Lorenzen. Lorenzen showed maturity as a field general last season, completing 183 of 327 passes for 2,267 yards, with 24 touchdowns against only five inter-

ceptions. He was a semifinalist for the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award and was chosen second-team All-SEC.

Challenging Lorenzen is junior Shane Boyd, who completed 10 of 19 passes for 99 yards last season and also ran for 124 yards and one touchdown. A fast, bullish runner, Boyd fits the mold of the pass/run quarterbacks Hudson utilized at Kansas State.

Whoever wins the quarterback job should have the benefit of a veteran offensive line. Five returnees have a total of 86 career starts between them - junior left tackle Matt Huff (11 career starts), senior left guard Sylvester Miller (5), senior center Nick Seitze (18), junior right guard Jason Rollins (18), and senior right tackle Antonio Hall (34). Hall was a first-team All-Southeastern Conference selection last season.

Unlike past years, however, the line isn't set in stone. For the first time in recent memory, Kentucky appears to have quality depth in the O-Line. Returning lettermen Daniel Burnett and Jared

McGowan, along with five redshirts, including former junior college All-American Yancey Reynolds, should engender fierce competition in the spring.

Kentucky has to rebuild its running game in the absence of Artose Pinner, who led the SEC in rushing last season. Immediate contenders include sophomores Alexis Bwenge (81 yards last season) and Arliss Beach (111), along with redshirt freshman Monquantae Gibson.

Another key hole to fill is at tight end, where last year's reserves, senior Win Gaffron and sophomore Jeremiah Drobney, compete to replace departed Chase Harp.

Four seasoned wide receivers are available, including senior Derek Abney (40 catches for 569 yards and four touchdowns last season), junior Tommy Cook (22-276, two TDs), senior Chris Bernard (14-197, 1 TD), and sophomore Glenn Holt (4-31, 1 TD). The coaches would like to develop addition-

al depth during the spring.

New defensive coordinator Mike Archer plans to install a 3-4-4 defense in the spring. He became an admirer of that scheme while using it during his seven-year term on the staff of the Pittsburgh Steelers.

The Wildcats look strong up front with the return of senior Jeremy Caudill and juniors Ellery Moore and Vincent "Sweet Pea" Burns.

Caudill made 39 tackles last season, including four for loss, and harassed the passer with two quarterback sacks, 16 QB hurries, and four pass breakups. A tackle throughout his career, he will receive a trial at end in the new defensive system.

Moore moves into the nose tackle spot. He had 28 tackles last season, including five TFL and three sacks. At defensive end, Burns was a second-team All-SEC pick in 2002. He is the team's leading returning tackler with 65 stops, including a team-high 14.5 tackles for loss and three sacks. He tied for the team lead in fumbles caused and recovered with two in each category.

Also vying for playing time in the line are promising sophomore end Trey Mielsch (nine tackles, two sacks), junior end Jacob Steuber (two tackles), and senior end Nate VanSickel (three tackles). Redshirt freshman nose tackle Lamar Mills, redshirt freshman end Kareem Reid, and junior nose tackle Bennie Mills, now eligible after his transfer from Florida a year ago, provide more competition.

The big question mark is at linebacker, where no starters return. Four lettermen are available at the inside linebacker posts, including junior Justin Haydock (25 tackles last season), sophomore Dustin Williams (35 tackles, two TFL), junior Kamaal Ahmad (five tackles), and soph Chad Anderson, who made one tackle last season before being sidelined by injury.

New outside linebackers must be developed. Getting a trial at those spots will be converted sophomore defensive ends Deion Holts and Raymond Fontaine. Holts made 30 tackles a year ago, including 3.5 for loss, and was named to the SEC All-

Freshman team. Fontaine made nine tackles and also made significant contributions on the special teams. True freshmen Durrell White and Travis Day, who enrolled in January, also will get strong looks at outside linebacker.

Eleven lettermen are back in the secondary. At cornerback, senior Leonard Burress (18 tackles, 10 pass breakups) is back, along with junior Claude Sagaille (39 tackles, one interception), and sophomores Antoine Huffman (16 tackles, nine PBU) and Bo Smith (13 tackles, two PBU). Talented soph Warren Wilson missed last season with a knee injury and will take part in non-contact drills in the spring.

Junior strong safety Mike Williams started every game last season and made 53 tackles, five for loss, had two interceptions, and broke up five passes. Sophomore Muhammad Abdullah (13 tackles) gives the team good depth.

An earnest battle should ensue at free safety with junior Earven Flowers (22 tackles, one interception, four PBU), junior Travis Atwell (21 tackles, one interception),

senior Tim Funderburk (two tackles), and junior Eric Ogletree.

In the kicking game, All-America punter Glenn Pakulak, the long snapper, and placekick holder must be replaced. Sophomore Taylor Begley is the returning regular at placekicker. He made 9 of 14 field goals last season and was chosen for the SEC All-Freshman team. Junior Clint Ruth has handled kickoffs for two seasons.

A potential strong suit is the return game, where Derek Abney returned a total of six kicks for touchdowns last season, four punts and two kickoffs, more than any player in one season in the history of college football. Abney was named first-team All-America by several organizations.

As spring practice approaches, the prospects are exciting for Rich Brooks, but he's had enough of kicking the tires and looking at sales brochures. He's ready to get behind the wheel.

Head Coach

Rich Brooks

Rich Brooks, the 1994 National Coach of the Year at the University of Oregon and a former head coach in the National Football League, is the new head coach of the Kentucky Wildcats.

Since his appointment on Dec. 30, 2002, Brooks has calmly directed a whirlwind of activity that put his stamp on the Wildcat football program.

Taking over just five weeks before national signing day, Brooks moved quickly to solidify his recruiting class while assembling a coaching staff. He garnered excellent success on both fronts, adding several more recruits to an already solid class while hiring a staff rich with experience on both the professional and collegiate level.

Brooks also has made himself available to the media and made numerous public appearances in order to begin meeting fans and alumni.

These have been comfortable roles for Brooks, who has 27 years of coaching experience on the collegiate level -- including a groundbreaking 18-year term as head coach at Oregon -- and is a 10-year National Football League coaching veteran.

His most recent coaching assignment was the assistant head coach and defensive coordinator position for the Atlanta Falcons from 1997-2000. The 1998 campaign was the most successful in Falcons' history. With Brooks' defense generating a league-leading 44 takeaways, Atlanta advanced to its only Super Bowl appearance in franchise history.

Late in the '98 season, Brooks took over the team when head coach Dan Reeves developed health problems. Brooks was the interim head coach for the final two games of the regular season, and the Falcons' two wins clinched the division championship and home field advantage in the divisional round of the playoffs. Reeves returned to the sidelines during the playoff games.

Brooks was head coach of the St. Louis Rams in 1995-96. The Rams had a 13-19 record in those two seasons, the team's best two-year stretch since 1989-90. The Rams won only nine games in the two years prior to his arrival and won just nine games in the two years following his departure.

As head coach at the University of Oregon from 1977-94, Brooks won more games than any coach in school history. After taking over a down-trodden program in '77, the milestones came steadily:

- the Ducks' 6-5 record in 1979 was the first winning mark since the 1970 season and Brooks was named Pacific-10 Conference Coach of the

Year and the District IX Coach of the Year by the American Football Coaches Association; the school also set a record for average home attendance, the first of four times that mark was shattered under Brooks' leadership;

- back-to-back winning seasons in 1979-80 was the first time that feat had been accomplished in 16 years;



- Oregon reached the national rankings during the 1987 season for the first time in 17 years;
- Oregon defeated Tulsa in the 1989 Independence Bowl, the Ducks' first bowl berth and eight-win season in 26 years;
- Oregon followed with a bid to the 1990 Freedom Bowl, the first back-to-back bowl berths in school history;
- Oregon returned to the Independence Bowl in 1992;
- the 1994 season was Brooks' best; the Ducks captured nine wins, the most since 1948; won the Pacific-10 championship and played in the Rose Bowl for the first time in 37 seasons; Brooks won the Bear Bryant Award as the National Coach of the Year by the Football Writers Association of

America, was chosen the Pac-10 Coach of the Year, and became the first coach in school history to take the Ducks to four bowl games.

Additional achievements at Oregon included Brooks' sterling 14-3-1 record against arch-rival Oregon State in the annual game known as the "Civil War." Oregon also broke various attendance records in six consecutive years from 1987-92, including marks for total home attendance, average home attendance, and single-game attendance. His final 18-year record was 91-109-4, including 39-32 and four bowls in the last six seasons.

Brooks coached many of the top players in school history. When he left the school after the '94 season, he had coached the top three passers in school history, including future NFL performers Chris Miller and Bill Musgrave, and also produced the school's all-time leading rusher. Brooks' Oregon teams featured five first-team All-Americans, 32 first-team all-conference performers, two first-team Academic All-Americans, two winners of the Morris Award (emblematic of the top lineman in the Pacific-10), and 39 NFL draft choices.

Brooks also had strong coaching staffs at Oregon. Three former assistants, Mike Bellotti, Bob Toledo, and Bill Maskill, went on to head coaching positions on the collegiate level and several of Brooks' assistants went on to jobs in the NFL ranks.

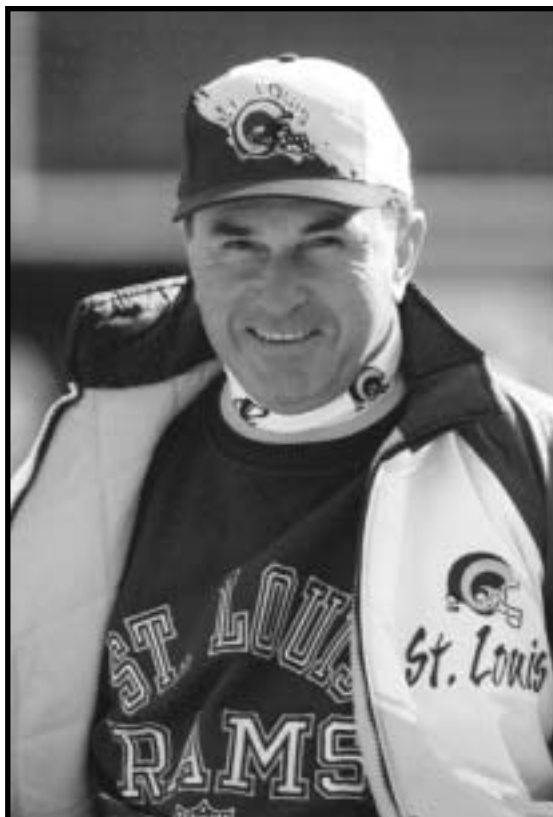
In addition to his guidance of the Ducks, Brooks served as a head coach and/or assistant coach in several post-season all-star games, including the East-West Shrine Game, the Blue-Gray Classic, the Senior Bowl, the Hula Bowl, and the Japan Bowl.

Brooks' combination of administrative skills and coaching acumen prompted the University to offer him the dual role of director of athletics and head football coach, which he performed from 1992-94. In recognition of his numerous contributions to the school, Oregon named its football field "Brooks Field" in his honor in 1995.

Born in Forest, Calif., Brooks competed in football, basketball, track, and boxing at Nevada Union High School in Grass Valley, Calif.

He began his collegiate career at Oregon State from 1959-62 under Coach Tommy Prothro, considered one of the top offensive strategists in the history of football and the man Brooks credits as having the greatest influence on his coaching philosophy.

Brooks was a single-wing tailback on the freshman team, then played defensive back for three

and help coach the OSU freshman team. After completing his master's, Brooks became an assistant coach in 1964 at Norte Del Rio High School in Sacramento, Calif.

In 1965, he returned to his alma mater as an assistant coach. He guided the defensive ends and later the defensive line for a total of five seasons. During that span, OSU had two final rankings in the nation's top 15, finished second in the Pac-8, and Brooks coached All-Americans Jess Lewis and John Sandstrom.

Brooks rejoined Prothro in 1970 as linebackers coach at UCLA, then moved with Prothro to the NFL's Los Angeles Rams in 1971-72 as special teams and fundamentals coach. Brooks returned to Oregon State as defensive coordinator in 1973, then went back to the NFL in 1974-75 as defensive

years on the varsity. He was a part-time starter as a defensive back as a sophomore, then became a regular starting DB the next two seasons. As a senior, he nabbed five interceptions for a team that went 9-2 and won the Liberty Bowl. He also was a reserve quarterback in addition to playing in the secondary.

He completed his bachelor's degree in 1963 and stayed in Corvallis to work on his master's degree

backs and special teams coach for the San Francisco 49ers. He coached linebackers at UCLA in 1976, helping the Bruins to a top-20 final ranking, before accepting the head coaching position at Oregon shortly after the season.

Brooks, 61, and his wife, Karen, have four adult children - daughters Kasey and Kerri and sons Denny and Brady - and four grandchildren.
