CATS STRIVE FOR FOURTH STRAIGHT WIN IN GOVERNOR'S CUP BATTLE

After months of hard work on the practice field and in the weight room, the 2010 Kentucky football team will finally lace up the game shoes with hopes of retaining the Governor's Cup trophy for the fourth consecutive year.

The battle between the two in-state rivals will be each school's season opener and will feature plenty of firsts. Both schools will have first-year head coaches in Kentucky's Joker Phillips and Louisville's Charlie Strong. UK also will look to win its fourth consecutive game against the Cardinals for the first time since the annual series resumed in 1994. If UK wins the lidlifter, it will mark the first time it has won four season openers since the Wildcats won eight consecutive season openers from 1987-1994.

UK went 7-6 last season and is coming off its school-record fourth straight bowl game. UK returns 43 lettermen from last year, including quarterback Mike Hartline, tailback Derrick Locke and WR/QB Randall Cobb. UK also returns several key pieces on defense with end DeQuin Evans, linebacker Danny Trevathan returning along with cornerback Randall Burden and tackle Ricky Lumpkin.

Louisville returns 44 lettermen from last year's squad that went 4-8. On offense, the Cardinals return nine starters, including 2008 BIG EAST Rookie of the Year Victor Anderson and starting quarterback Adam Froman. U of L returns six starters on the defensive side of the ball, including two linebackers, one cornerback and three defensive ends.

QUICK NOTES

- Kentucky is in its 120th season of intercollegiate football.
- Kentucky's Joker Phillips enters his first season as head coach. Prior to being named head coach in January of 2010, Phillips served as the Cats' wide receivers coach seven seasons, including five as the offensive coordinator.
- Coach Phillips is the first African-American head football coach at UK and only the second in the history of the Southeastern Conference.
- With Joker Phillips at Kentucky and Charlie Strong at Louisville, this marks the first time in college football history that two African-American coaches at BCS schools have played in a season opener.
- Kentucky returns 11 starters (five offensive, six defensive) from a team that finished 7-6 overall and advanced to its school-record fourth consecutive bowl game last season.
- Kentucky has an all-time record of 81-33-5 (.702) in season openers, including an 8-15-1 (.354) mark in season openers played away from home.
- Kentucky is trying to win its fourth-consecutive season opener. If successful, it would be UK's longest season-opening win streak since winning eight in a row from 1987-94.
- Kentucky is trying to win its fourth-consecutive game in the Governor's Cup race. It would mark UK's longest win streak against the Cardinals since winning seven straight from 1912-1994.

SERIES HISTORY AGAINST LOUISVILLE

Kentucky and Louisville meet for the 23rd time in program history ... The teams have met annually since the renewal of the series in 1994 ... UK leads the overall series 13-9, including a 5-3 mark when the game is played in Louisville ... UK has won the last three meetings ... UK looks to keep the Governor's Cup trophy in Lexington after defeating Louisville last season at Commonwealth Stadium, 31-27 ... Kentucky's last win in Louisville came in 2008 when the Wildcats defeated the Cardinals 27-2 ... The Cats are 50-29-5 vs. members in the current alignment of the BIG EAST Conference ... UK is 0-1 vs. UofL in overtime ... The overtime game was in 2000, a 40-34 win by the Cardinals at Papa John's Stadium.

ON THIS DATE IN WILDCAT HISTORY

Saturday's matchup with Louisville marks just the third time in school history that the Wildcats have played on Sept. 4. UK has a 1-2 all-time record on games played on this date. Two of the three games played on this date have been against Louisville, including the most recent game in 2005 where the Cardinals beat the Wildcats 31-24 in Lexington. The Wildcats only win on Sept. 4 came in 1993 vs. Kent 35-0. Kentucky has never played a road game on this date

THE GOVERNOR'S CUP AND KROGER SCHOLARSHIP

The Governor's Cup was created in 1994 as the trophy for the winner of the Kentucky-Louisville game.

Donated by The Kroger Company at a cost of \$23,000, the Governor's Cup stands 33 inches tall and weighs 110 pounds. The trophy's base and upright columns are hand-milled black marble. The glass components are optic-grade crystal. All metal parts are 23-karat, gold-plated brass. The cup itself is made of pewter with a 23-karat gold-plated finish.

The cup was designed by Kendall Costner and sculpted by James Corcoran of Bruce Fox, Inc. The Kroger Company also is involved in supporting academic pursuits at the schools. Kroger is donating \$10,000 to each school for each year the game is played. Kroger's donations now total \$340,000 - \$170,000 to each school.

LAST TIME VS. LOUISVILLE

Kentucky forced two Louisville turnovers late in the game during its 31-27 fourth-quarter comeback victory in the Governor's Cup series. The win marked the Wildcats' third straight win against the Cardinals in front of 70,988 fans at Commonwealth Stadium - the fourth-largest crowd in UK history.

With just under six minutes remaining in the game and Louisville leading 27-24, UK's A.J. Nance recovered a fumble on a muffed punt return at the UofL 24-yard line. Nance's recovery set up the game-winning score when wide receiver Randall Cobb made a leaping 12-yard touchdown catch from quarterback Mike Hartline to give the Cats their final margin of victory.

Kentucky linebacker Sam Maxwell made two huge defensive plays down the stretch to secure the win. Just inside two minutes remaining, defensive tackle Corey Peters tipped a pass that Maxwell intercepted and returned 17 yards. Later, Maxwell ended the game when he broke up a final pass attempt by Louisville inside the UK 5-yard line.

UK opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 26-yard field goal from Lones Seiber. The Cardinals bounced back with a 6-yard touchdown run by Victor Anderson. On the ensuing kickoff, Derrick Locke returned the ball 100 yards for a Kentucky touchdown and a 10-7 lead. Locke became the first player in UK history to return two kickoffs for 100-yard touchdowns in a career and he set a single-game school record with 191 kickoff return yards.

Fullback John Conner's two-yard TD scamper gave UK a 17-7 lead at the half. After halftime, miscues plagued the Wildcats. UK only possessed the ball for four plays in the third quarter as three turnovers led to a pair of Louisville field goals and a touchdown pass from Justin Burke to Cameron Graham, giving the visitors a 20-17 lead.

Later in the fourth, Locke capped a 12-play, 73-yard drive with a two-yard touchdown plunge to give UK a 24-20 advantage. Louisville struck back quickly two plays later with a 66-yard touchdown pass from Burke to Trent Guy to put the Cardinals up 27-24, two minutes before Nance made his game-changing fumble recovery.

The win marked UK's 16th consecutive non-conference victory and was the 10th time in the last 34 games that the Wildcats came from behind in the fourth quarter to win the game.

KENTUCKY-LOUISVILLE TIES

- Kentucky head coach Joker Phillips and Louisville head coach Charlie Strong coached together at South Carolina in 2002. Phillips was an assistant coach in charge of wide receivers for the Gamecocks while Strong was the defensive coordinator. UL assistant head coach of the defense Brian Jean-Mary also was on the staff that year in Columbia, serving as a graduate assistant. Louisville's strength and conditioning coach Pat Moorner was the strength and conditioning coach at USC as well.



Kentucky has won three consecutive games in the Governor's Cup race, including 31-27 last season.

- Phillips also coached with Louisville offensive line coach Dave Borbely. The two spent a year together at Notre Dame in 2001 while Phillips was an assistant coach in charge of wide receivers.
- UK's wide receiver coach Tee Martin played at Tennessee in 1999 while Larry Slade was in his first season as a secondary coach for the Vols. Slade also coached on the same staff at UT as did UK's offensive coordinator Randy Sanders.
- UK's offensive line coach Mike Summers coached at Louisville for four seasons (2003-06), helping lead the Cardinals to four consecutive bowl games.
- Former Louisville assistant coach Greg Nord is now the special teams/tight end coach at Kentucky. Nord, a graduate and letterman from UK in 1980, returned to his alma mater after spending 15 seasons (1995-2009) as an assistant at U of L. He served at various times as assistant head coach, recruiting coordinator, tight ends coach and running backs coach for the Cardinals.
- Louisville tight end Nate Nord is the nephew of UK assistant coach Greg Nord.
- Kentucky has 16 players on its roster from Louisville: Ryan Tydlacka (Trinity), Dave Ulinski (Manual), Jon Thomas (St. Xavier), Luke McDermott (Trinity), Nik Brazley (Male), Matt Smith (St. Xavier), Mister Cobble (Central), Stephen Duff (Pleasure Ridge Park), Alex Dutton (Trinity), Nathan Dutton (Trinity), Jacob Lewellen (Manual), Nick Melillo (Trinity), Max Godby (Christian Academy of Louisville), Spencer Holloway (Trinity), David Noltemeyer (St. Xavier) and Ridge Wilson (Central).
- Thomas, Noltemeyer and Smith attended St. Xavier High School as did Cardinals Victor Anderson, John Clark, Nick Egart, Stephen Goodwin and John Payne.
- Louisville players Doug Beaumont, Mike Hayes and Dexter Heyman attended Louisville Male High School with Kentucky wide receiver Nik Brazley.
- Kentucky players Alex Dutton, Nathan Dutton, Nick Melillo, Ryan Tydlacka, Spencer Holloway and Luke McDermott attended Trinity High School with Louisville players Blayne Donnell, Alex Kupper, Scott Radcliff, Will Stein.
- Stephen Duff and Louisville's Brandon Dunn went to Pleasure Ridge Park together while U of L's Bo Eggers and UK's Jacob Lewellen and Dave Ulinski went to Manual. UK's Mister Cobble went to Central with the Cardinals' Stephan Robinson.
- Max Godby of UK and Daniel Weedman of UL attended Christian Academy of Louisville.
- Louisville has four players on its roster from Lexington: Marcus Bentley (Henry Clay), Justin Burke (Lexington Catholic), Pete Nocht (Tates Creek) and Roy Philon (Bryan Station).
- Wildcat punter/kicker Ryan Tydlacka is the brother of former Louisville standout punter Wade Tydlacka.

HISTORICAL COACHING MATCHUP

When Joker Phillips and Charlie Strong lead their teams on Saturday, it will mark only the third time in the history of NCAA Division I-A/Football Bowl Subdivision that African-American coaches have played each other in a season-opening game.

In 1993, Ron Dickerson of Temple took on Ron Cooper of Eastern Michigan. However, it should be noted that although it was Temple's opener, EMU had played a game already.

In 1999, Jerry Baldwin of Louisiana-Lafayette and Bob Simmons at Oklahoma State played a season opener.

This year's matchup of Phillips and Strong marks the first time that two black coaches from BCS conferences have played a season opener.

“OPERATION WIN” BEGINS

New head coach Joker Phillips calls his plan for Kentucky football “Operation Win.”

“Operation Win is definitely a process, a growing process,” Phillips said. “We have to get our kids thinking about the three things we want them to do – win in the classroom, win in the community and win on the field.

“We have to eat, sleep and breathe Operation Win. We have to ingrain it in our kids’ minds.”

While keeping the bedrock principles of hard work, personal responsibility and honest communication in place, Phillips has numerous changes and accomplishments during the first few months of Operation Win:

- A strong finish to recruiting as several well-regarded prospects committed to the Wildcats in the 48 hours leading up to the signing day in February;
- The addition of Ray “Rock” Oliver, a highly respected coach from the Cincinnati Bengals, to lead the strength and conditioning workouts. The players have responded favorably to the challenges brought by Oliver and his staff.
- Pushing the tempo of spring practice with the goal of improving the team’s practice speed and intensity.
- The team compiled a composite 2.66 grade-point average in the spring, up from 2.35 last fall.
- A strong start to the 2011 recruiting campaign.

CONTINUED SUCCESS IN 2009

Kentucky won seven games during the 2009 season and advanced to the Music City Bowl, continuing UK’s success in recent seasons.

- UK has won at least seven games in each of the last four seasons, the first time that has been accomplished in almost a century – since 1909-12.
- UK has gone to four-straight bowl games for the first time in school history.
- UK extended its school-record non-conference win streak to 18 games before a loss in the Music City Bowl.
- UK notched three SEC road wins – at Auburn, Vanderbilt and Georgia – for the first time in 32 years, since 1977.
- UK defeated Auburn for the first time in 43 years, since 1966. It was also UK’s first win at Auburn in nearly half a century, since 1961.
- UK won at Georgia for the first time in 32 years, since 1977.
- UK’s 42-0 win over Miami (Ohio) was its first shutout in 13 years.
- UK had three come-from-behind wins in the fourth quarter (vs. Louisville, Auburn, Georgia), giv-

ing the Wildcats 12 such wins over the last four seasons.

- For the third-straight year, Kentucky fans broke the school record for average attendance at 69,594 per game, with three crowds over the 70,000 mark.

COACHING STAFF CHANGES

After Joker Phillips was named head coach, there were four changes on the Kentucky coaching staff.

Tee Martin inherited Phillips' former slot as wide receivers coach. Martin, a former quarterback in the NFL and CFL, came to UK from New Mexico. He has extensive recruiting ties in Georgia, particularly in the Atlanta area, along with his native Alabama and throughout the South.

Lexington native Mike Summers was brought in to coach the offensive line. A veteran collegiate coach who also has experience in the NFL, Summers' lines have been the power plants for dynamic offenses at several schools, most recently at Arkansas.

David Turner, who was at Kentucky in 1993-94, returned to coach the Wildcat defensive line. He has been at four Southeastern Conference schools, Alabama, Vanderbilt, Mississippi State and UK.

Former UK player and assistant coach Greg Nord has returned to his alma mater as special teams coordinator and tight ends coach. Nord coached the running backs under Jerry Claiborne from 1982-89.

There was also one change among the graduate assistant coaches, as former Wildcat wide receiver Tommy Cook returned to his alma mater and will be the GA for the defensive staff.

DEFENSIVE NUMBERS IMPROVED

Kentucky's defensive yardage and points allowed have shown significant reductions during the past three seasons when Steve Brown was appointed defensive coordinator in 2007.

UK was 118th in the nation in total defense the year before Brown took over. The Wildcats had improved to 53rd in the nation by last season. UK's scoring defense improved from 99th to 43rd in the country in the same time span.

QUARTERBACK COMPETITION

Much of the attention in preseason practice has been focused on the quarterback position, which looms as a three-way competition between senior Mike Hartline, sophomore Morgan Newton and redshirt freshman Ryan Mossakowski.

Hartline started the first five games of 2009 and was enjoying arguably the best game of his career at South Carolina when he was sidelined by a knee injury. He completed 59.4 percent of his passes for 802 yards and six touchdowns.

Newton was headed for a redshirt season until Hartline's injury. He started the final eight games of the season, five of which were victories. He completed 55.6 percent for 706 yards and six TDs.

Mossakowski took a redshirt season as he continued to build strength from a shoulder injury and surgery incurred during his senior year in high school. He showed good passing accuracy and command of the offense during his redshirt season.



Commonwealth Stadium



On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

The Cats are in their 38th season at Commonwealth Stadium.

Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 235 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. UK has a 125-106-4 record (.541) in Commonwealth.

Kentucky has broken the school record for attendance each of the last three seasons, once again ranking in the nation's top 25. UK has ranked in the nation's top 25 in attendance in 10 of the last 11 seasons.

For the third-straight year, Kentucky fans broke the school record for average attendance at 69,594 per game. The previous mark was 69,434 per game in the 2008 season.

The crowd of 71,024 vs. Florida on Oct. 20, 2007 was the largest crowd in the 38-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. The previous stadium record was 71,022 for the 1999 Tennessee game.

The playing surface is named C. M. Newton Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

Facts and Figures on Commonwealth Stadium:

Seating Capacity: 67,942, including the Commonwealth Suites. With game workers, media, etc., total attendance can exceed 70,000.

Video Boards: Mitsubishi Diamond Vision, 19 x 34 feet on the west end zone (University Drive) and 16 x 28.5 feet on the east end zone (Nutter Field House).

Sound System: Coordinated by Mitsubishi as part of the video board project.

Scoreboards: Two, one in each end zone, constructed by Fairtron Scoreboards.

Game Day Experiences

The "Cat Walk": Fans are encouraged to greet the team when the Wildcats arrive for the "Cat Walk." The team buses will arrive at the Nutter Field House approximately two hours and 15 minutes before the game and the players will make the "Cat Walk" to their stadium entry point at Gate 1. Fans are encouraged to line up on the sidewalk and cheer the players as they enter the stadium.

A siren will be sounded while the team buses are on their way to the stadium. That's the fans' cue to proceed to the Cat Walk area to greet the team.

Wildcat Refuge: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Wildcat Refuge, located outside of the southwest corner (outside Gate 9) of Commonwealth Stadium. There are five giant inflatable games that are available two hours before kickoff.

UK Marching Band Will Parade Around Stadium: The UK Marching Band will parade around the stadium, beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff. The band and parade will begin at and return to Gate 4.

Hartline has been named the starter for the season opener with Newton and Mossakowski ready if needed.

BIG PLAY DEFENDERS MUST BE REPLACED

Defensive coordinator Steve Brown has a challenge to replace six starters who made the majority of big plays for that unit last season.

Tackle Corey Peters, linebackers Micah Johnson and Sam Maxwell and cornerback Trevard Lindley each earned All-Southeastern Conference honors last year and departed dependable safety Calvin Harrison had the best season of his career.

New leaders must emerge to take their place. Some of the returning playmakers include defensive end DeQuin Evans, who led the team in tackles for loss and sacks last season; linebacker Danny Trevathan, the team's second-leading tackler; and cornerback Randall Burden, who had two interceptions and eight pass breakups.

VERSATILE PLAYMAKERS BACK ON OFFENSE

Kentucky's attack will feature two of the most versatile playmakers in college football with Randall Cobb and Derrick Locke.

Cobb starts at wide receiver but doesn't stop there. He returns punts and kickoffs and perhaps his most vital role is at quarterback in the "WildCobb" formation. He led the team in receiving last season and was second in rushing as he accounted for 1,673 all-purpose yards and scored 15 touchdowns.

"You won't find a more versatile football player anywhere in the country," ESPN reporter Chris Low wrote of Cobb. Mel Kiper of ESPN called Cobb one of the best players in college football.

Locke led the Wildcats in rushing last season, is a capable pass catcher and his sub-4.3 speed makes him extremely dangerous on kickoff returns. He accounted for 1,830 all-purpose yards last season.

Perhaps the best indication of the duo's versatility is the fact Cobb and Locke, respectively, were named the first-team and second-team All-SEC all-purpose players last season by The Associated Press.

Both players have been named to the preseason watch list for the inaugural Paul Hornung Award, which will be given to the nation's most versatile player.

IT'S CATS IN THE CLOSE ONES

Much of Kentucky's success in the last four seasons came in finishing close games. In fact, Kentucky is 15-11 in the last 26 games decided by 10 or fewer points, dating back to 2006. Below is a look at Kentucky's recent success in close games:

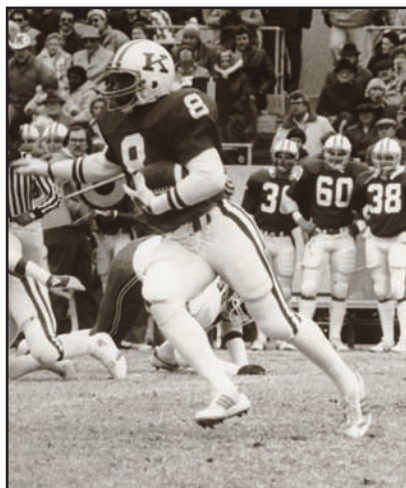

An interesting twist to the game is that the coaches are long-time friends, but will temporarily set aside their relationship for the rivalry contest.

UK begins the home schedule on Sept. 11 against Western Kentucky, the start of a four-game series in which two games will be in Lexington and two will be played at Nashville's LP Field, home of the NFL's Tennessee Titans ... UK will play a first-time opponent when the Akron Zips come to town on Sept. 18 ... Another first-time opponent, Charleston Southern, visits Lexington in November.

Six of Kentucky's eight Southeastern Conference games will be against teams that played in bowl games last season. UK opens the league slate Sept. 25 at Florida ... Ole Miss replaces Alabama as the rotating SEC opponent. The Wildcats' last game at Ole Miss was in 2005 ... UK's first SEC home game is against Auburn on Oct. 9, the first of a three-game homestand that follows with South Carolina and the Homecoming game vs. Georgia ... After an open date on Nov. 20, UK concludes the regular season at Tennessee.

COMEBACK CATS

Since mid-season 2006, a span of 44 games, Kentucky has come from behind in the fourth quarter to win 12 games.

To put it in perspective, prior to that, you have to go back 170 games in order to find 12 fourth-quarter comeback victories for the Wildcats.

In 2006, the Cats set a school record by completing three consecutive fourth-quarter comebacks to defeat Georgia, Vanderbilt and ULM in succession. In 2007, Kentucky came from behind in the final period to knock off No. 1 LSU, then-No. 9 Louisville and Arkansas.

The 2008 win over Arkansas tied the largest Kentucky fourth-quarter comeback in school history. The Wildcats trailed 20-7 in the final stanza against the Razorbacks and came back to win, 21-20. UK trailed Vanderbilt 13-0 in the fourth quarter in 2004 and came back to win, 14-13.

In 2009 against Louisville, UK trailed 27-24 with just under six minutes remaining in the game when UK's A.J. Nance recovered a fumble on a muffed punt return at the UofL 24-yard line. Nance's recovery set up the game-winning score when wide receiver Randall Cobb made a leaping 12-yard touchdown catch from quarterback Mike Hartline to give the Cats their final margin of victory.

Against Auburn, Kentucky trailed 14-7 entering the fourth quarter but rallied with touchdown runs by Will Fidler and Randall Cobb for a 21-14 victory. Cobb's game-winning score came with 3:17 left on the clock.

In the Georgia game last season, UK trailed the Bulldogs 27-20 before Derrick Locke caught a screen pass and sprinted down the left sideline for a touchdown to tie the score. UK added another touchdown to complete the comeback when Randall Cobb broke into the endzone from the 1-yard line. The Wildcat defense forced three UGA turnovers in the final quarter including two in the closing minutes of the game.

COBB'S JOBS

Kentucky sophomore Randall Cobb has proven to be a utility player for the Wildcats. He plays primarily at wide receiver this season, with occasional action at quarterback in the "WildCobb" formation, he returns punts and kickoffs and also is the holder for extra points and field goals. He ranked in the top 10 of four SEC statistical categories last season.

UK COACHES IN THEIR FIRST GAMES

After four years as a University of Kentucky player and 16 years on the football staff, Joker Phillips will be making his first appearance as head coach of the Wildcats in the Louisville game.

REBUILT OFFENSIVE LINE

Kentucky will have a rebuilt offensive line in 2010 with only one starter, guard Stuart Hines, returning from last season.

UK has five linemen who have started at least one game in their careers, including Hines (13 starts), tackle Brad Durham (seven), center Jake

In addition, left tackle Chandler Burden has started two games at defensive end but will be making his first appearance in the offensive line.

LOOKING FOR DEPTH AT WIDE RECEIVER

Kentucky returns both starting wide receivers from last season, Randall Cobb and Chris Matthews, who combined to catch 71 passes for 801 yards and seven touchdowns a year ago.

The key question is depth following the season-ending injury to junior Gene McCaskill during preseason drills. Contending for the reserve slots at wideout are senior Michael Harper, junior Matt Roark, sophomores La'Rod King, Aaron Boyd and E.J. Fields, and redshirt freshman Brian Adams. The most experienced at the position is King, who played significantly last year as a reserve and caught 10 passes for 142 yard and a touchdown.

IMPRESSIVE TALENT IN BACKFIELD

Fans are familiar with senior tailback Derrick Locke, who already ranks in the top 10 rushers in Kentucky history and whose sub-4.3 speed is a threat to go the distance as a runner, pass receiver or kickoff returner.

But there's more to the ballcarriers than Locke. Sophomore Donald Russell has a quick burst and quick moves; he has shown the ability to take it all the way with a 79-yard run last year vs. Eastern Kentucky and a 65-yard zip in the Blue-White Spring Game. There is good depth with sophomore CoShik Williams, redshirt freshman Jonathan George and freshmen Raymond Sanders and Brandon Gainer.

There are huge shoes to fill at fullback following the departure of John Conner, known at UK as "The Terminator" and now a New York Jet. Moving into the role is senior Moncell Allen, who has seen significant action as a reserve tailback and fullback during his career. Nicknamed "Turtle" for his strong, compact frame (5-7, 232 pounds), he has acquired a new nickname from Derrick Locke -- "The Turtlenator."

WHO'S THE TIGHT END

If junior Nick Melillo is unable to play at Louisville because of his sprained ankle, UK does not have another tight end on the team that has played a collegiate down. Redshirt freshmen Jordan Aumiller and Anthony Kendrick, along with freshman Tyler Robinson, have been impressive thus far in preseason work.

DEFENSE TO FEATURE NEW FACES

Only six starters return on the Wildcat defense - ends DeQuin Evans and Taylor Wyndham, tackle Ricky Lumpkin, linebacker Danny Trevathan, cornerback Randall Burden and safety Winston Guy, with Evans and Lumpkin the only seniors.

That means there will be plenty of new faces -- and inexperience -- on the defensive side of the ball for the Wildcats.

The good news in the D-Line is that most of the newcomers have some game experience, such as sophomore end Collins Ukwu, senior tackle Shane McCord and junior tackle Mark Crawford.

At linebacker, none of the newcomers have seen extensive action. Junior Ronnie Sneed and red-shirt freshman Qua Huzzie have been contending at middle linebacker, with senior Jacob Dufrene and sophomore Ridge Wilson battling at the strongside post.

In the secondary, sophomore cornerback Martavius Neloms and junior safety Taiedo Smith have

seen some game time, but the remainder of the newcomers are mostly or totally inexperienced

SPECIAL FORCES

An admirer of the United States military, Coach Joker Phillips hopes to emulate the military's discipline, teamwork and efficiency with the Wildcats, most notably on special teams, which Phillips has renamed "Special Forces."

Here are some notes about the special forces:

- Junior Ryan Tydlacka returns as the starting punter after averaging 40.0 yards per kick last year. He also could be the starter on field goals and extra points and has some experience in that area. He made 3-of-6 field goals in 2008, including a 51-yarder.
- Sophomore Craig McIntosh did an excellent job on kickoffs last season, both in distance and accuracy. He had 11 touchbacks, fourth in the SEC in that category.
- Randall Cobb is a capable punt returner, averaging 12.8 yards per return last season, including a 73-yarder for a touchdown.
- Derrick Locke is UK's all-time leader in kickoff return average at 27.4 per return, including a pair of 100-yarders in his career. Cobb also is good at it, posting a 26.5-yard average last year.
- Matt Roark has used his 6-6 height advantage to be a force on special teams. Roark has blocked five kicks during his career, including four extra points and a field goal.

It's A WILDCAT STATE

Kentucky is often referred to as a "basketball state," given the fact that UK arguably is the greatest men's basketball program in collegiate history.

However, we like to think of Kentucky as a "Wildcat state" because of the tremendous overall support for UK athletics. In 2009-10, Kentucky was one of only five schools to rank in the nation's top 25 in attendance for football, men's basketball and women's basketball.

In addition, Kentucky has ranked in the nation's top 35 in football attendance every year since Commonwealth Stadium was expanded in 1999. On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

And, over the years, one would be hard-pressed to find a school with the ups-and-downs of Kentucky football, yet has the solid bedrock of support enjoyed by the Wildcat gridders. For example, contrast Kentucky with other institutions from so-called "basketball states." Kentucky, North Carolina, Kansas, Duke, and Indiana rank 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 10th (respectively) in all-time college basketball victories. Here is the average attendance for those schools in the 2009 football season:
