2007 LAFAYETTE FOOTBALL SPRING STORYLINES

- Each of Lafayette's six Patriot League championship teams have featured a proven returning starter at either quarterback or tailback, but if the Leopards are to join Lehigh as the only school in league history to claim four straight league titles, they'll have to buck that trend. QB Brad Maurer and TB Jonathan Hurt helped Lafayette to PL championships and NCAA Playoff appearances in each of the last three years but will graduate in May, leaving both positions open for competition.
- Jr. TB **Maurice White** has the inside track on the starting job after averaging 6.3 yards per carry while backing up Hurt, the PL Offensive Player of the Year. Sr. **Mike DiPaola**, So. **Rob Curley** and So. **Josh Jones** are the only three quarterbacks in camp this spring and will have the opportunity to distance themselves in the race for the starting nod. Lafayette signed three quarterbacks in its class of 30 recruits that will join the team in August.
- The Leopards return three starters on the offensive line, including All-PL selections **Greg Lippert** (LG) and **Jesse Padilla** (RT). Jr. FB **Joe Russo**, Jr. WR **Shaun Adair** and Jr. TE **Michael Conte** are also back, while a host of upperclassmen will battle for the other wide receiver spot vacated by first team All-PL honoree Joe Ort.
- Lafayette also returns six starters on defense, led by an all-league choice at each level in Sr. DT **Kyle Sprenkle**, Jr. LB **Andy Romans** and Sr. CB **Adrian Lawson**. The return of Sr. DE **Keith Bloom** with a medical redshirt bolsters a unit that lost All-PL members Marvin Snipes (DE) and Dan Lisenio (DT).
- Sr. LB **Mark Plumby** is a returning starter, and So. LB **Mark Leggiero** was the program's Rookie of the Year in 2006. The secondary is also well-stocked, as Jr. CB **Marvin Cleidor** and Sr. SS **Marcel Quarterman** were inserted as starters for the PL title run, and Jr. FS **Nigel Bryant** received valuable experience as the nickel back.
- For the first time since 2003 there will be an open competition for the kicking spot, as Rick Ziska graduates after finishing his career just outside the top 10 in PL history in points scored by a kicker. In the return game, **Shaun Adair** averaged 25.5 yards per kick return and 13.3 yards per punt return as a sophomore.

2007 Season Outlook

Since coming to College Hill in the fall of 2004, Lafayette's senior class has known nothing but winning.

The Class of 2008 has helped the Leopards claim a share of three straight Patriot League championships, and has been a part of the first three postseason appearances in school history. They have also beaten Lehigh all three seasons, and have the opportunity to become the first class to leave Lafayette without a loss to their archrivals since the Class of 1950, which won four straight from 1946-49.

A victory over Lehigh could also help secure a fourth straight league title, and make Lafayette only the second school in the 21-year existence of the Patriot League to achieve that feat.

In their quest to make history, the 2007 Leopards will have to overcome some less-than-promising recent history. In each of its six Patriot League championship seasons (1988, 1992, 1994, 2004, 2005 and 2006), Lafayette has returned at least one starter at either quarterback or tailback, and in two years - including 2006 - the Leopards brought back starters at both positions. **Frank Tavani**, entering his eighth season as head coach and 21st year at Lafayette overall, won't have that luxury this season following the graduation of Brad Maurer and Jonathan Hurt.

The co-MVP's of Lafayette's 49-27 win over Lehigh, Maurer and Hurt have left their imprint on the school record books. As many as six quarterbacks will compete for the starting spot vacated by Maurer, while junior **Maurice White** appears to be the leading candidate at tailback after backing up Hurt, the 2006 Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year.

The Leopards return six starters on both sides of the ball, including three All-Patriot League selections on defense, so there is reason for optimism among the Lafayette football faithful. Replacing the two primary ballhandlers in the league's top offense from a year ago will go a long way towards turning the dreams of a fourth straight championship into reality in 2007.

ON OFFENSE

The quarterback situation entering spring practice is similar to the one that played out in 2004, following the graduation of Marko Glavic, the Patriot League's all-time leading passer. Pat Davis had attempted the only pass by a quarterback on the roster, and while Maurer eventually emerged as the starter, Tavani didn't hesitate to play both signal callers through the first half of the season. That combination led Lafayette to league crowns in 2004 and 2005, while Maurer took every meaningful snap for the Leopards in 2006.

Senior **Mike DiPaola** is the only player on the roster who has lined up under center, seeing spot action in each of his first three years, but that doesn't mean Tavani is

lacking for options at the position. The three quarterbacks in spring camp - DiPaola and sophomores **Rob Curley** and **Josh Jones** - will receive a long, hard look over Lafayette's 15 practices. Each quarterback will have ample time to work with the passing game and protection packages, and will have the opportunity to emerge as the frontrunner before Lafayette reconvenes for preseason practice in August.

When the Leopards get back together, the coaching staff will get its first look at freshmen **Patrick Carey**, **Marc Quilling** and **Peter Raymond**. Tavani has proven that he is willing to play a freshman quarterback, inserting Glavic as the starter three games into his career.

"We're in the fortunate position to have six excellent quarterbacks who are ready to compete for the position," Tavani said. "We've done it both ways (playing with one or two quarterbacks), so it will be exciting to see one or several players emerge, and we'll make the decision from that point."

The tailback position is a little less fluid, as White's sophomore campaign set him apart from the three other upperclassmen in camp. White ran for 254 yards and four touchdowns in the six Patriot League games and averaged 6.3 yards per carry for the season. At 5-8 and 205 pounds, White is able to hide behind Lafayette's massive offensive line, then use his quickness and lower body strength to burst through the hole and get into the secondary.

Senior **Anthony D'Urso**, who has 327 career rushing yards on 90 carries, is the top backup. Senior **Brandon Mitchell** and sophomore **DeAndre' Morrow**, the offensive scout team co-MVP, will also see work at tailback this spring.

Junior **Joe Russo**, a potential impact player at the fullback position, returns after running for 134 yards and five touchdowns while averaging 5.0 yards per carry last season. Russo had a pair of multi-touchdown games on the ground in 2006, and also scored on a four-yard pass against Lehigh. He will be joined at the position by sophomore **Jeff Cumming** and junior **Jeff Mylet**.

2007 Season Outlook

Junior **Shaun Adair**, who caught 33 passes for 501 yards and four touchdowns as a sophomore, headlines a group of six upperclassmen at wide receiver. Adair is averaging 16.3 yards per catch through his first two years and will take an even more prominent role in the offense following the graduation of Joe Ort (50 catches, 814 yards), a first team All-Patriot League selection as a senior. Also one of the top return men in the league, Adair averaged 138.8 all-purpose yards per game over the final four outings last season.

Duano Dorsey, one of four seniors at wide receiver, is the projected starter alongside Adair. Dorsey caught three passes for 50 yards, including a 28-yard touchdown, in Lafayette's NCAA Playoff game at Massachusetts after Ort left early in the contest with back spasms. **James Dixon**, **Kevin Logan** and **Kyle Roeder** will also line up at wide receiver, along with junior **Tim Watson**, who is making the move from tailback to take advantage of his speed. This fall, the Leopards will supplement the core group of receivers with three freshmen (**Mitchell Bennett**, **Mark Layton** and **Nathan Padia**), who comprise what Tavani says is the top class of wide receivers Lafayette has recruited in his 21 years on College Hill.

At tight end, junior **Michael Conte** started eight of the first nine games a year ago, while sophomore **Adam Gill** earned his first career start at Harvard. Junior **Brendan Willard** has received extensive playing time in his first two seasons.

A pair of seniors who were second team All-Patriot League members last season return to anchor the offensive line. Left guard **Greg Lippert** and right tackle **Jesse Padilla** started all 12 games at their respective positions and helped Lafayette lead the conference in scoring (35.2 ppg) and total offense (416.8 ypg) in league games.

Junior **D.J. Brown** started the final five games at right guard, which coincided with the start of the Leopards' four-game winning streak to close the regular season. Lafayette

averaged 201 yards rushing over those four games, and also threw for more than 200 yards against Georgetown and Lehigh.

Junior **Joe Moore** and sophomore **Michael Wojcik** enter the spring as the projected starters at left tackle and center, respectively. Moore replaces Mike Saint Germain, who was named to All-America teams by the AFCA, the *Associated Press* and the *Football Gazette* as a senior. Wojcik steps in for Ryan Nase, a two-year starter who moved to center last year.

Among those adding depth to the offensive line are senior tackle **Jack Thomson** and junior guard **Leo Plenski**, both of whom have starting experience - Thomson at right tackle in 2005, and Plenski at right guard in 2006. Sophomores **Ryan Hart-Predmore** (guard) and **Roy Wotring** (tackle) begin the spring on the two-deep on the left side of the line, while junior **Andrew Oppenheimer** is listed as the backup center.

ON DEFENSE

While Lafayette must replace five starters on defense, including three All-Patriot League selections, a talented nucleus of starters return for defensive coordinator John Loose's unit. Senior defensive tackle **Kyle Sprenkle**, junior linebacker **Andy Romans** and senior cornerback **Adrian Lawson** give the Leopards an all-league player at each level of the defense, and the defense brings back at least two players with starting experience on the line, at linebacker and in the secondary.

Up front, Sprenkle was one of the most productive defensive linemen in the Patriot League in 2006. He was second in the league with 13.5 tackles for a loss as a junior, including four sacks, and is Lafayette's third-leading returning tackler after making 61 stops (30 solo). Sprenkle had two sacks and forced a fumble in the first half against Lehigh last season.

2007 Season Outlook

The return of defensive end **Keith Bloom** with a fifth-year medical redshirt stabilizes a unit that lost two-time All-Patriot League first team selection Marvin Snipes and 2006 Defensive MVP Dan Liseno. Bloom led the Leopards with five sacks and made 10.5 tackles for a loss while starting all 12 games last season. He missed his junior season due to medical issues but started four games in 2004, alternating between end and tackle.

Juniors **Kody Babcock** and **Jerrell Robinson** will contend for the second starting spot at defensive tackle and are the veterans of a very young group that will play alongside Bloom and Sprenkle. Sophomore **Kenneth McLeon**, a defensive scout team co-MVP, is listed as the other starter at defensive end, while classmates **Ian Dell**, **Chris Parker** and **Allen Whitesell** also make the two-deep on the line this spring.

Freshman defensive end **Jeff Katz** will also participate in spring practice after three years away from football. Katz, who will turn 21 in April, was drafted by the Atlanta Braves in the ninth round of the 2004 Major League Baseball draft and was a pitcher in their minor league system.

At linebacker, Romans was third in the Patriot League with 109 tackles (9.9 per game) in 2006, and was in the top 10 in the nation in tackles late in the season. The only sophomore in the conference named to the all-league team a year ago, Romans made 10 or more tackles in seven games, including 18 against Holy Cross.

Mark Plumby, the starting strong side linebacker, enters his senior season ranked second among returning players with 69 tackles. Sophomore **Mark Leggiro** was the Leopards' Rookie of the Year and will fill the middle linebacker position. Leggiro made 25 tackles as a freshman.

Junior **Chris Bacon** has the most experience among the remaining linebackers in spring camp and has been a key performer on special teams in his first two years. Three sophomores, **Spencer Brown**, **Anthony Caljean** and **Evan Nardone**, will look to impress the coaching staff at outside linebacker and as potential special teams contributors.

The secondary should be the most improved unit for Lafayette in 2007 with the return of Lawson and junior **Marvin Cleidor** as the starting cornerbacks. The Leopards gave up nearly 200 yards per game through the air a year ago while breaking in two new starters at corner and dealing with injuries to their three senior safeties. While Torian Johnson (first team All-PL), Bryan Kazimierowski and Trey Martell have graduated, senior **Marcel Quarterman** and junior **Nigel Bryant** gained valuable experience in 2006.

Quarterman has been biding his time to step in as a full-time starter since he was named the program's Rookie of the Year in 2004. He finally got his chance midway through the season and made nine solo tackles in the win at Colgate, including a fourth-down stop on Colgate's first drive. He also intercepted passes against Georgetown and Lehigh, the latter of which he returned 30 yards to set up Lafayette's fourth touchdown of the first half. Bryant also had an interception against Lehigh, the first of his career, and was the Leopards' nickel back through the majority of the Patriot League schedule.

Lawson made 37 tackles (5.0 TFL) and broke up six passes in his first year as a starter in 2006, while Cleidor had a pair of sacks and an interception after he was inserted into the starting lineup for the final seven games. Senior **Ryan Williams**, who started the season opener at Sacred Heart, and sophomore **Phillip Vincent** are also in the two-deep at corner. Sophomores **Eric McGovern** and **Nick Oliver** both showed promise as freshmen and are listed as the backup safeties.

ON SPECIAL TEAMS

In the last 20 years, Lafayette has used just six kickers, including four who were four-year starters. A leg injury that he suffered just two games into his freshman season prevented Rick Ziska from becoming the fifth straight, but he still managed to accumulate 178 points (24 field goals,

2007 Season Outlook

106 extra points) in his career. Ziska capped his career with second team All-Patriot League honors.

Into the fray step four kickers who will angle for the position this spring. Sophomore **Chris Cosgrove**, freshman **Davis Rodriguez** and seniors **Matthew Korn** and **Jordan Cullinane**, a former Lafayette soccer player, will be placed in competitive situations to give Tavani a chance to evaluate his options heading into fall camp. Rodriguez is a member of the current recruiting class but enrolled at Lafayette for the spring semester after a semester at the University of South Florida.

The punting situation won't be resolved until August, when Big 33 Game participant **Tom Kondash** joins senior **David Yankovich** to compete for the starting job. Yankovich shared punting duties with Ziska over the past two seasons and is averaging 36.3 yard per punt in his career. Plenski returns as the long snapper in both facets of the kicking game.

In the return game, Adair was inserted as the punt returner in week four and as the kick returner following the loss to Holy Cross, and developed into one of the most dangerous return men in the league. He averaged 13.3 yards on 16 punt returns, and 25.5 yards on 13 kick returns, including a 90-yard runback for a touchdown against Georgetown. Adair also had a key 52-yard punt return to set up a short touchdown drive in the Leopards' win at Colgate.

THE SCHEDULE

The first three night games in school history highlight Lafayette's 2007 schedule, which will open on the earliest date in the program's 126 seasons.

The three-time defending Patriot League champion Leopards will kick off their the 81st year at Fisher Stadium under the lights at 6 p.m. on Sept. 1 against Marist. Home games against Ivy League champion Princeton (Sept. 22) and Columbia (Oct. 6) will also be played at 6 p.m. The final three games of the six-game home slate will start at 1 p.m.

The rest of the non-conference schedule includes trips to Penn (Sept. 15) and Harvard (Oct. 13). Game times for road contests will be announced as they become available.

The installation of lights was one of the key facets of Lafayette's \$23 million transformation to Fisher Stadium prior to the 2006 season. The project also included new spectator seating, a state-of-the-art FieldTurf playing surface, a press box, and a 19-by-35 foot video matrix board.

Additionally, the completion of the Bourger Varsity Football House will enclose Lafayette's football facility and move all football operations to College Hill, including locker rooms, strength and conditioning and sports medicine areas, coaches offices and team meeting rooms.

Lafayette will open its Patriot League championship defense on Sept. 8 at Georgetown, and resume conference play on Oct. 20 against Fordham in the first of three straight home league contests. The Leopards will also host Colgate on Oct. 27 and Bucknell on Nov. 3.

A trip to Holy Cross on Nov. 10 precedes the 143rd meeting between Lafayette and Lehigh, which will be played on Nov. 17 in Bethlehem. That game has decided at least a share of the Patriot League championship in each of the last three years, with Lafayette claiming its third straight championship by virtue of its 49-27 win over the Mountain Hawks last season.

Head Coach Frank Tavani



On Dec. 11, 1999, just moments after being named the 27th head football coach at Lafayette College, Frank Tavani vowed to return the program back to a championship level.

Mission accomplished.

After leading Lafayette to its third straight Patriot League championship, Tavani and the Leopards are no longer an unknown commodity in the world of I-AA football (now formally known as the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision).

One of the top motivators at any level in the country, Tavani has changed the expectations of a program that was at the bottom of the Patriot League when he took control.

Seven years later, Lafayette has made the first three postseason appearances in school history, laying claim to the Patriot League's automatic bid to the playoffs in 2004 and 2006, and earning the program's first at-large bid in 2005.

Nearly as important to the College's alumni, the road to the championship has gone through Lehigh every year. The Leopards have won three straight games and four of the last five meetings of the most-played rivalry in college football after their 49-27 victory on Nov. 18, which punched their latest ticket to the playoffs.

Tavani's ability to get the most out of his team when its back is against the wall is unmatched. Over the last three years, the Leopards are 15-3 in Patriot League play - and a perfect 8-0 after suffering their first league setback. Lafayette's near upsets of defending national champion Delaware in 2004 and eventual national champion Appalachian State in 2005, both in enemy territory, only cement Tavani's reputation for getting his team ready for must-win games.

In 2004, Tavani was named Patriot League Coach of the Year after leading the Leopards to their first championship in a decade, despite being picked no higher than fifth in the preseason poll of the league's coaches. He was a finalist for the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award for his efforts, and signed a five-year contract extension following the season. Tavani added two more years to his contract after last year's successful title defense, and will patrol the sidelines at Fisher Field at Fisher Stadium through at least 2012.

Tavani has been a part of six Patriot League championship teams in his 20 years at Lafayette. He came to College Hill in 1987, and the Leopards captured their first league crown the next year. He was also the running backs coach on the 1992 and 1994 championship teams, and has secured each of the last three titles as the head coach.

Jonathan Hurt, the 2006 Patriot League Offensive Player of the Year, enters the postseason with 1,124 rushing yards, giving Tavani a 1,000-yard rusher in 10 of his 20 seasons on the Leopards' coaching staff. He has recruited and coached the top four rushers in Lafayette history and has mentored four different tailbacks to Offensive Player of the Year honors. Erik Marsh '95, the Patriot League's all-time leading rusher, was recognized in 1992 and 1993, while Joe McCourt '05 took the honors in 2004 and Tom Costello '92 was the recipient in 1989.

While Lafayette won when outside expectations were low in 2004 and defended its championship with an experienced senior class last season, the difficulties of an anticipated "three-peat" may have made the Leopards' 2006 performance Tavani's best coaching job. The Leopards broke into the top 25 early in the season, only to drop the next four against an extremely challenging Ivy League slate, and the losing streak was extended to five by Holy Cross.

Lafayette went to Colgate on Oct. 28 facing a 10-game losing streak to the Raiders, a perennial Patriot League power, but a convincing 27-10 victory in Hamilton, N.Y. resurrected the Leopards' season and provided the impetus for the stretch run.

Head Coach Frank Tavani

After wins over Fordham and Georgetown, Lafayette entered the 142nd game with Lehigh in a familiar situation - win and you're in. Tavani went back to the black jerseys that the Leopards wore for the 2004 game, which resulted in a 24-10 win over the Mountain Hawks. While the sartorial switch wasn't the reason for Lafayette's 49-27 triumph this time around, it allowed Tavani and the Leopards to claim their third straight championship in style.

The Leopards' postseason performances have been just as impressive against a trio of teams that have competed for the national championship. Last season, Lafayette trailed No. 3 seed Massachusetts 21-14 late in the third quarter before the Minutemen shook the Leopards with a pair of late scores for a 35-14 victory, and UMass went on to play Appalachian State in the national championship game.

In 2005, Lafayette traveled to Appalachian State, the No. 2 seed in the field. The Leopards led 17-10 at the half and entered the fourth quarter tied at 20-all before the Mountaineers emerged with a 34-23 victory, and went on to win the first of their two straight national titles. The previous season, Tavani took his team to defending national champion Delaware and gave the Blue Hens all they could handle. A long touchdown drive capped by a one-yard run by McCourt gave the Leopards a one-point lead in the fourth quarter, before an 87-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the final three minutes turned the tide for Delaware in a 28-14 victory.

Tavani resurrected the program with the second-best turnaround in I-AA football during the 2002 season. Lafayette improved upon a 2-8 season in 2001 with a 7-5 overall record and 5-2 league mark, which included a 14-7 win vs. Lehigh for the first victory over the Mountain Hawks in seven seasons. Although the Leopards finished 5-6 in 2003, the still proved the turnaround was no fluke. Four of those losses were by a touchdown or less, including two against Top 25 opponents.

Tavani's Leopards are also getting the job done in the classroom, with 23 CoSIDA Academic All-District honorees in his seven seasons as head coach, and a total of 38 Lafayette players have earned the distinction since 1995. Lafayette has also claimed each of the last three Patriot League Football Scholar-Athletes of the Year.

A staple of Tavani-led football programs has been an explosive offense. McCourt finished his career in 2004 as the all-time school and Patriot League-leader with 50 rushing touchdowns and is second in Lafayette annals with 4,474 yards on the ground. Marko Glavic and John Weyrauch concluded their careers in 2003 after rewriting the Lafayette record book. Glavic owns nearly every school passing record as well as Patriot League records for passing yards (9,819) and total offense (10,064 yards) while Weyrauch is Lafayette's all-time leader in both receptions (162) and receiving yards (2,406).

The year before coming to Lafayette, Tavani served as the defensive coordinator at Lebanon Valley College, his alma mater. During that time, he was also Lebanon Valley's director of alumni services and parents' programs, activating 15 alumni chapters. From 1976-85, Tavani was the offensive coordinator at Franklin and Marshall College, helping guide the Diplomats to a 10-year record of 67-23-1.

As an undergraduate at Lebanon Valley, Tavani was an outstanding running back, earning the team's Most Valuable Player honors twice in his career. As a senior, he became the school's first player to rush for more than 1,000 yards in a single season. An Associated Press All-American as a senior, he was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in the fall of 1988. Tavani was inducted into the Lebanon Catholic High School Hall of Fame in its inaugural class in March 2004 and joined the Central Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in November 2006.

Tavani earned a bachelor of arts degree in Psychology from Lebanon Valley in 1975, and has completed postgraduate work in Counselor Education.

Tavani and his wife, Agnes, reside on College Hill with their dog Rocky, and are the parents of four children. Liam and Meghan are graduates of Lafayette, earning their degrees in 2003 and 2006, respectively. Daniel is a junior and a member of the football team at Wofford College, and Bridget attends high school at Notre Dame Green Pond.



2006 Game-By-Game Recaps

LAFAYETTE 25
 SACRED HEART 14

FAIRFIELD, Conn. (Sept. 2, 2006) - **Jonathan Hurt** ran for 141 yards and two touchdowns, and **Brad Maurer** ran for one score and threw for another in the second half to lead Lafayette to a 25-14 win at Sacred Heart in the season opener.

The Leopards kept the ball on the ground for all but one of their first 15 plays to take a 13-0 lead. The key play in the first scoring drive was a 23-yard run by Hurt to move the ball inside the 20, and he finished it off with a two-yard run over center. The extra point by **Rick Ziska** made the score 7-0 just over four minutes into the contest.

Marvin Snipes sacked SHU quarterback Tyler Arciaga on the Pioneers' first play from scrimmage and forced a fumble, which junior **Kyle Sprenkle** (10 tackles) recovered at the 29-yard line. Hurt capitalized with another two-yard touchdown run, but the PAT was no good after a low snap from center.

SHU got on the board on a four-yard touchdown pass from Arciaga to Alvin Franklin early in the second quarter. Jason Payne covered 44 of the Pioneers' 69 yards on the drive on a sprint up the middle on third-and-one just inside midfield.

Lafayette forced a punt on SHU's next possession, but a personal foul for roughing the punter set the Pioneers up at the 41-yard line. Payne struck quickly with a long touchdown run on the next play, and Nick Passalacqua made the extra point to give SHU a 14-13 lead with 5:03 left in the second quarter.

Sacred Heart's opening drive of the second half stalled at the 19-yard line and Joe Schroeder's 37-yard field goal attempt fell short to end the 13-play march.

The Leopards gained all 81 yards on the ground on their way to the go-ahead touchdown on their ensuing possession. A seven-yard run by Hurt on fourth-and-two from the SHU 31 was the key play, and Maurer capped the drive with an 11-yard run to give Lafayette a 19-14 advantage with seven seconds left in the third.

The Lafayette defense didn't allow Sacred Heart to run a play inside midfield in the fourth quarter. Sprenkle came up with the biggest play, dropping Payne on fourth-and-one to turn the ball over to the offense at the 22-yard line with 4:33 left.

A 21-yard toss from Maurer to **Shaun Adair** closed the scoring for the Leopards with 2:36 to play and sealed the win.

Linebackers **Andy Romans** and **Justin Stovall** had 11 and nine tackles, respectively.

(Sept. 9, 2006) - No. 25 Lafayette scored on its first four possessions and rolled up 475 yards of total offense while holding Bucknell's spread option attack, which led the nation in rushing last week, in check to win its Patriot League opener 31-0 at Christy Mathewson Memorial Stadium.

Brad Maurer set a career-high with 325 yards of total offense and completed 12-of-19 passes for 252 yards for the Leopards. He also scored on a 72-yard run, the longest of his career, on Lafayette's second offensive series. **Jonathan Hurt** carried 19 times for 99 yards and scored a pair of touchdowns for the second straight week, and sophomore wide receiver **Shaun Adair** caught four passes for 112 yards.

The shutout is Lafayette's first in a Patriot League game since holding Towson scoreless in a 38-0 win in 1997.

The Bison ran for 386 yards in a 31-28 overtime victory over Duquesne last week, but were never able to get anything going against Lafayette's 3-4 set as they ran 41 times for 149 yards and fumbled five times.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (Oct. 14, 2006) - Harvard tailback Clifton Dawson accumulated 200 all-purpose yards, 144 rushing and 56 receiving, and tied the Ivy League career record for rushing touchdowns as the undefeated Crimson sent Lafayette to its fourth straight defeat at Harvard Stadium.

HAMILTON, N.Y. (Oct. 28, 2006) - **Jonathan Hurt** had 233 all-purpose yards and scored three touchdowns, two on career-long plays from scrimmage, to lead Lafayette to a 27-10 win over Colgate at Andy Kerr Stadium.

BRONX, N.Y. (Nov. 4, 2006) - **Joe Ort** caught two touchdown passes from **Brad Maurer** and **Joe Russo** ran for two more scores to lead Lafayette to a 31-24 Patriot League win at Jack Coffey Field.

Maurice White and **Anthony D'Urso** combined for 84 rushing yards for the Leopards after **Jonathan Hurt** (6-33) left with a mild concussion in the first quarter, and Lafayette ran for 163 yards in the game.

Lafayette scored on its opening drive for the third time in four PL games as Maurer threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Ort six minutes into the contest, and **Rick Ziska's** extra point made the score 7-0.

Fordham tied the game at 7-all after Marcus Taylor recovered a fumbled snap at the Lafayette 28, and John Skelton connected with Sylvester Clarke for a 16-yard touchdown. Micah Clukey added the extra point.

Russo scored the first of his two touchdowns on a nine-yard run, and after a three-and-out, Russo scored on a 32-yard burst to give Lafayette a 21-7 lead with 3:27 on the clock.

Lafayette knocked Skelton out of the game on Fordham's final possession of the half, and backup T.J. Jordan led the Rams to a 24-yard field goal by Clukey that cut the lead to 21-10 with four seconds left.

Taylor swung the momentum for the Rams on the fourth play of the second half, as he sacked Maurer at the 42, forced a fumble, scooped the ball at the 30 and returned it for a touchdown that pulled Fordham within 21-17.

The Leopards held a four-point lead for the remainder of the period, and Ziska extended the margin to 24-17 with a 35-yard field goal with 12:17 remaining.

Fordham responded with its longest sustained drive of the game, marching 64 yards on 11 plays, but the Rams came up empty, as Clukey missed a 24-yard field goal.

EASTON, Pa. (Nov. 11, 2006) - Fifth-year senior **Joe Ort** set Lafayette's single-game record with 274 receiving yards to set up four touchdown runs by **Jonathan Hurt** as the Leopards defeated Georgetown 45-14 for their first victory at Fisher Field at Fisher Stadium.

Lafayette's win, combined with Colgate's 29-28 win over Holy Cross, guarantees that the Patriot League championship will be on the line in the Lafayette-Lehigh game for the third straight year.

Senior **Brad Maurer** had his first career 300-yard passing game, going 12-of-19 for 305 yards. Ort caught 10 passes, with **Shaun Adair** hauling in the other two for 31 yards. Adair also scored his first career special teams touchdown, returning a kickoff 90 yards for a score after the Hoyas had tied the game at 7-all midway through the first quarter.

Ort had at least 50 yards receiving in every quarter - catching seven passes for 154 yards in the first half alone - and set the school record on a 66-yard catch-and-run with eight minutes left in the fourth quarter. All but one of his receptions went for at least 16 yards. The single-game performance is tied for second in Patriot League history. The previous school record was set by Jeremy Burkes, who had 234 yards vs. Columbia in 2003.

Hurt finished with 135 yards on 22 carries and had the first four-touchdown day of his career, moving him into third in school history with 31 rushing touchdowns.

Lafayette rolled up 511 yards of total offense (305 passing, 206 rushing) and averaged 9.3 yards per play, the most in the **Frank Tavani** era.

Georgetown kept the game close early, with Erik Carter scoring from three yards out to tie the game at 7-7 with 6:25 left in the first quarter, but Adair responded with his kickoff return for a touchdown.

Freshman Charlie Houghton went 81 yards with a screen pass to pull Georgetown within 21-14 early in the second quarter.

An interception by Nnamdi Obiako at the Lafayette 20 in the final two minutes of the half gave Georgetown a chance, but **Marcel Quarterman** thwarted the threat with an interception at the goal line.

Defensively, **Andy Romans** led with 12 tackles, and **Dan Liseno** had the first interception of his career and his first sack of the year.

(Nov. 18, 2006) - Brad Maurer was 20-of-24 for 243 yards and three touchdowns and **Jonathan Hurt** ran 30 times for 165 yards and two scores as the Leopards won a share of their third straight Patriot League championship with a 49-27 victory at Fisher Stadium. The seniors were the first teammates to be named co-MVP's of the game since 1960.

Lehigh made the score 28-21 at the half with a pair of touchdowns after Lafayette miscues, and the Mountain Hawks scored coming out of the half after forcing the only punt of the day, but Jason Leo's extra point hit the upright to maintain the 28-27 lead.

Lafayette scored on its final three possessions while holding the ball for more than five minutes on each drive, and Lehigh netted only 14 yards on its two drives.

Maurer's four-yard touchdown pass to **Joe Russo** pushed the lead to 35-27 late in the third quarter. White extended it to 15 with a two-yard run, and Lafayette sealed the championship as Maurer connected with Adair for 18 yards on fourth-and-four, and Hurt plunged in from two yards out.

Lafayette scored twice late in the quarter to pull within a touchdown at halftime. An interception and 18-yard return by **Torian Johnson** gave Lafayette the ball at the 34 with 3:08 left before the half, and **Brad Maurer** hit **Shaun Adair** for a 26-yard touchdown.

Adrian Lawson forced a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and Adair recovered at the 43-yard line. Maurer hooked up with **Duaeno Dorsey** for a 31-yard scoring pass with 28 seconds remaining before the half.

Both defenses locked down after halftime, forcing punts on the first three possessions, before the Minutemen capitalized on a short field following a fumble recovery and Coen tossed a seven-yard touchdown pass to Ian Jorgensen to go ahead 28-14 with 2:01 left.

A 59-yard interception return by James Ihedigbo set up an 18-yard scoring pass from Coen to Brandon London with 5:26 left to establish the final margin. Massachusetts advanced to play New Hampshire, which won 41-38 at Hampton.
