## **BAC Mission Statement**

At Long Beach State, the mission of the Department of Athletics extends beyond the desire to collect more victories on the field of competition. Philosophically, the concept upon which the 49er athletic program is built provides a well-rounded experience for each student-athlete.

The Bickerstaff Academic Center (BAC) is geared to maximize student-athletes' chances for classroom success through a developmental advisement program integrating academic, student, and athletic assistance. Additionally, the BAC sponsors programs throughout the year which focus on student-athletes' educational, career, and personal goals.

With that in mind, the mission of the BAC is to assist students in planning their academic programs and to provide academic support services in order to enable them to achieve their educational goals, pursuit towards graduation, and meet NCAA eligibility requirements. Based on this mission statement, the BAC has developed the following goals:



## **Goal I:**

To serve as the central source of CSULB academic requirements and NCAA eligibility information for student-athletes.

Advising situations addressed by the BAC staff include:

1. Total program planning
2. Assistance in identification and clarification of educational and vocational goals
3. Assistance in interpretation of NCAA rules of eligibility
4. Overall assistance with university regulations and requirements leading toward graduation
5. Interpretation of Degree Audits, Graduation Evaluations and other University documents

## **Goal II:**

To provide, coordinate, and develop programs and services for student-athletes with other service units on campus.

BAC utilizes unique academic assistance programs geared to foster personal empowerment and enhance classroom success. Freshmen student-athletes participate in transitional support programs designed to capitalize on the student-athletes' athletic skills, while learning to transfer those skills to classroom success. The BAC staff closely coordinates with essential academic support services throughout the University including:

1. Learning Assistance Center
  - Learning Skills
  - Tutorial Services
  - ESL Tutorial Services
  - Supplemental Instruction
2. Writer's Resource Lab
3. Career Development Center
4. Counseling and Psychological Services
5. Student Orientation Advising and Registration (SOAR)

In addition, BAC has developed support programs directed at student-athlete welfare that include: Freshmen Transition mentoring program, as well as the Student-Athlete Success Program (SASP) for specialized academic support. All of these programs will be discussed more fully in this report.

## Goal III:

To provide a coordinated recruit visit program for prospective student-athletes. The staff of the BAC has developed a two-prong approach in order to deliver information appropriate to prospective student-athletes. Pertinent academic information including General Education, courses in majors, and testing requirements are reviewed. Also highlighted are university-wide academic support services as well as special programs developed specifically for the student-athlete.



## Student-Athlete Eligibility and Graduation Checklist

Our pledge to you is to dedicate our efforts toward helping you accomplish all of your dreams. **As a student-athlete at Long Beach State, you have a responsibility to:**

- Maintain a minimum 2.0 GPA for each semester.
- Complete the EPT/ELM testing requirement (if applicable) before attending the summer orientation program (SOAR).
- Be enrolled in at least 12 applicable units every semester to maintain eligibility.
- Complete university foundation courses (GE categories A + B2) within the first 36 units with a grade of "C" or better.
- Earn a minimum of 24 applicable units each year. (No more than 6 of those units can be earned during summer school.)
- Earn 48 units or more of a degree program before your 5<sup>th</sup> semester.
- Declare an academic major by the 5<sup>th</sup> semester.
- Earn 72 units or more of a degree program before your 7<sup>th</sup> semester.
- Earn 96 units or more of a degree program before your 9<sup>th</sup> semester.
- Attempt the WPE during or before the semester in which you have completed 65 units.
- File a graduation petition one year before your expected graduation date and after earning at least 90 units and attempting the WPE.

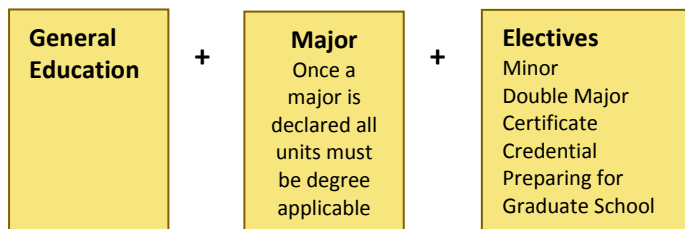
### Electives

Elective units are those which are not used for General Education or major requirements but are needed to meet the full unit requirements for graduation, **120** or higher depending upon the declared major. Electives can be used toward a minor consisting of 18-21 units, a certificate indicating a specialized study, a double major, or for any courses not required for other reasons. All student-athletes must meet with an advisor prior to taking any elective units.

The English Placement Test (**EPT**) and the Entry Level Math Test (**ELM**) must be taken **prior to the first semester of attendance**. Contact Testing Services or BAC to check for exemptions from this requirement and submit the necessary documentation.

**NOTE: Enrollment in classes will be prevented until tests have been taken.**

Graduation Writing Assessment Requirement (**GWAR**) – This requirement can be met by taking the Writing Proficiency Exam (**WPE**).

- The WPE must be attempted before filing a request to graduate.
- Certain majors require completing the GWAR before you can be accepted into the program.
- **Failure to attempt the WPE prior to earning 65 units will result in a registration block which will prevent all enrollment actions.**

### Freshmen Student-Athlete Transition Program

This program is offered each semester to support freshmen student-athletes' adjustment to demands of both university academics and intercollegiate athletics. The program brings together first-year student-athletes and student-athlete peer mentors to discuss balancing the roles of student and athlete with basic overall strategies for being successful in and surviving the first year.

### Transition program goals are to:

- Support and assist freshmen student-athletes with developing awareness, relationships, and strategies as well as accessing resources to succeed with balancing the roles of student and athletes through the academic, social, athletic and personal transitions as a NCAA DI student-athlete.
- Provide freshmen student-athletes with a support group of peers.

- Validate both freshman student-athletes and student-athlete peer mentors so that each feels that they matter and belong as an integral part of the student-athlete community.

## Faculty/Athlete Connections Program

This program facilitates meaningful mentoring relationships between student-athletes and faculty members. Interaction with faculty members can have a positive influence on academic performance, intellectual and personal assistance, major advertisement, and career networking.



## Faculty/Athlete Connection Goals:

- To proactively assist with the success, retention and graduation of student-athletes.
- To facilitate student-athletes success in balancing their academic career and NCAA athletic competition.
- To connect student-athletes with faculty mentors for intellectual and personal development.

## Online Academic Management System

The BAC provides all student-athletes with accounts for our online management system for student-athlete academics, *GradesFirst*. This system can be accessed by student-athletes from any computer with internet access. Features of the system include:

- Real time monitoring of required study hall hours completed
- Access to reports from faculty on their academic progress in each course
- Online calendar with e-mail and text reminders of academic appointments for advising, tutoring and mentoring
- Ability to track class assignments



## Student Orientation, Advising, and Registration (SOAR)

All incoming students are required to attend a SOAR workshop to register first semester classes and receive orientation to the university, including university policies.

Please follow the pointers below when coming in for the first semester as a student-athlete.

- After receiving an acceptance letter to CSULB, accept your admission through [myCSULB](#).
- Complete Soar registration requirements and confirm date with coach and BAC.
- Prior to your orientation date you will receive a SOAR confirmation mailer. It will include a parking permit and instruction for check-in.
- A representative from the BAC will be at SOAR check-in to meet you.
- Note: there is also a Parent Orientation Program (POP) available.

## APPLICATIONS AND DEADLINES

At Long Beach State, the Financial Aid office administers a variety of programs including grants, scholarships and loans. To apply for all programs available, the FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA) must be completed.



Each year, the FAFSA application must be **submitted between January 1 and March 2** to be considered "first priority." This deadline must be met to be considered for all aid programs and also so that the financial aid is received in time to pay for registration and books. If the March 2 filing deadline is not met, you may not be considered for Cal Grants, EOP Grant, Federal SEOG Grant, Federal Perkins Loan and Federal Work Study. In addition, financial aid may be late causing registration and book payment to come out of your personal account in order to meet school deadlines.

**Note:** All athletic scholarships are handled through coaches and the athletic department.

## FINANCIAL AID—SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS

Federal regulations state that all student-athletes must demonstrate satisfactory academic progress to be eligible to receive financial aid. A copy of the complete satisfactory academic progress policy is provided to all Long Beach State financial aid applicants and is contained in the "Guide to Your Financial Aid" booklet provided in the award notification packet.

In general, satisfactory academic progress has two components:

1. Earning credit for courses attempted:
  - a. Grades of A, B, C, D, CR, SP receive credit.
  - b. Grades of F, NC, U, I, W, RD, AU do not receive credit.

2. Completing your degree within a reasonable time frame:
  - a. Undergrads are allowed a total of 150 units.
  - b. Graduates are allowed 50 total units.

**If credit is not earned for courses attempted or if the maximum total units are exceeded before the degree is complete, you may be disqualified from receiving financial aid. If there are any questions, contact the Office of Financial Aid for assistance.**

## Career Development Center Services

The four components of the Career Development Center are:

- **Career Planning:** Assist students in defining their career objectives based on understanding of what they like and do well, plus factual information from the world of work.
- **Cooperative Education and Volunteer Services:** Provide students with planned on-the-job experiences as part-time or full-time internships that are related to the students' academic major or career goals.
- **Student Employment:** Develop and provide work experience as part of an occupational orientation plus provide financial assistance for students that will enhance and continue enrollment in the academic programs at CSULB.
- **Career Placement:** Assist students in implementing a well-focused job search campaign that will lead to post graduate employment.

## GPA Calculation

Grades have point value:

- A = 4 points
- B = 3 points
- C = 2 points
- D = 1 point
- F or U = 0 points

Courses are designated a specific number of units:

- SPAN 101A = 4 units
- HIST 173 = 3 units
- ET 260 = 2 units
- KIN 265 = 1 unit

To Calculate your GPA use the following example:

Grade		Units		Grade Points
A = 4	X	3	=	12
B = 3	X	2	=	6
C = 2	X	3	=	6
D = 1	X	4	=	1
F = 0	X	1	=	0
<b>Total</b>		<b>13</b>		<b>28</b>

28 divided by 13 = 2.15 GPA

## University Honors Program

All high school graduates with a GPA of 3.5 or higher and strong SAT scores are encouraged to apply for the University Honors Program at CSULB. Full time CSULB students with a GPA of 3.5 or higher are also invited to apply, as well as students transferring from other colleges to CSULB who meet the 3.5 GPA minimum and who still need nine General Education units.

The University Honors Program at California State University, Long Beach challenges and enriches the educational experience of motivated students. Distinguished professors facilitate and encourage students to explore ideas and concepts thoroughly in intimate, discussion-oriented classes.

## Academic Honor Lists

### President's List

Students will be placed on the President's List to honor them for academic achievement each semester in which they complete 12 or more graded course units with a semester GPA of 3.75 and above. A certificate will be issued for each semester in which the student receives this honor.

### Dean's List

Students will be placed on the Dean's List to honor them for academic achievement each semester in which they complete 12 units or more graded course units with a semester GPA of 3.5 – 3.74. A certificate will be issued for each semester in which the student receives this honor.

## Academic All-Star

Students will be placed on the Academic All-Star List in the Bickerstaff Academic Center to honor them for academic achievement each semester I which they complete 12 or more baccalaureate units with a semester GPA of 3.0 or above. Student-athletes will be honored at the Academic Awards Luncheon held in the spring.

## Academic Probation

The University expects all undergraduate students to maintain at least a 2.0 grade point average (GPA) in all classes taken at CSULB and in all transferable courses from other colleges and universities. Academic probation at CSULB results when students' grades fall below the 2.0 GPA in either CSULB cumulative GPA (all courses at CSULB), or in the overall cumulative GPA (all transferable college courses, including CSULB work). Students are subject to academic disqualification at the end of the first semester on academic probation if they have GPAs below the four (4) minimum cumulative (CUM) GPAs as follows:

Freshman (fewer than 30 units completed)	1.5 GPA
Sophomore (30 - 59 units completed)	1.7 GPA
Junior (60 - 89 units completed)	1.85 GPA
Senior (90 + units completed)	1.95 GPA

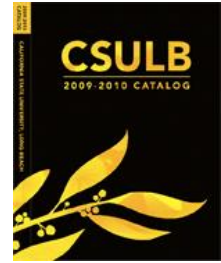

## Glossary

For all information about courses, programs, degrees, and services refer to the University Catalog. The Catalog also serves as a resource for all rules, regulations, and requirements of the University.



**Baccalaureate** - degree accomplished by completing college level courses (numbered as 100-499); includes three inter-related areas: General Education (breadth component), Major (depth component), and Electives (personal enhancement and development component).

**Certificate** - specialized study in a program or subject area which requires more units than a minor but less than a major.

**Chair** - a faculty member who supervises a department's activities.

**Curriculum** - the courses offered by the University.

**Co-curricular** - the activities which are outside the regular curriculum of the University. For example, participation in NCAA athletics is a co-curricular activity.

**Co-requisite** - course that is required in order to be able to register in another course during the same semester.

**Dean** - an administrative official who supervises a school or college of the University.

**Degree** - the title of accomplishment and proficiency awarded after fulfilling all requirements prescribed for graduation.

**Degree Audit (Grad Check)** - an application made by senior students who expect to receive degrees and/or credentials or certificates.

**Department** - an administrative office within a school or college which offers courses in a particular area of study. For example, the English Department is within the college of Liberal Arts.

**Discipline** - a particular area of knowledge, skill or art. For example, history is a discipline.

**Double Counted Course** - a course which can satisfy both general education and major requirements. No course taught by your major department can be used for general education (see list for exceptions).

**Electives** - the courses which are not required for a major or for General Education and which satisfy your own personal interest or needs.

**Full-Time Student** - students who take 12 units or more of course work in a semester.

**General Education (GE)** - a broad range of prescribed courses listed each semester in the Schedule of Classes.

**Grade Points** - numerical point values (A=4.0, B=3.0, etc.) that are multiplied by the number of course units to determine grade points earned. For example, a three-unit class in which an A is earned carries 12 grade points.

**Interdisciplinary Courses (IC)** - courses which involve two or more academic, scientific or artistic disciplines.

**Lower Division** - lower division units are numbered 100-299. Lower division students are those who have earned fewer than 60 units of college credit (freshman/sophomore).

**Major** - a focus in an area of study acquired by taking a prescribed number of courses. A major is declared in writing and filed with Enrollment Services.

**Minor** - a specialized study in a program or subject which consists of 18 units (nine units must be upper division).

**Part-Time Student** - students who take fewer than 12 units of course work in a semester are considered part-time.

**Prebaccalaureate** - course (numbered 0-99) which does not go towards baccalaureate degree, but which provides foundation for required baccalaureate courses.

**Prerequisite** - course which provides a foundation for more advanced courses.

**School/College** - an administrative office which coordinates the activities of several academic departments.

**Semester** - one of the two 16-week periods of instruction into which an academic year is divided.

**Transcript** - a record of courses taken at the University and the grades earned in them; an official copy is sealed by the University.

**Undeclared Major** - a student who is undecided upon what degree to pursue or who is unable at present to declare a major in an impacted program.

**Units** - are usually equivalent to the number of hours per week of classroom time. Most courses carry three units of credit and meet three hours per week.

**Upper Division** - upper division units are numbered 300-499. Upper division students have earned more than 60 units of college credit (juniors/seniors).
