JIMMY PATSOS enters his fifth season at the helm armed with a contract extension to go along with a roster mixed with returnees who have been part of 37 wins and a pair of MAAC Championship Semifinal appearances the last two campaigns and a list of seven players who did not take the floor for Loyola last season.

How Patsos and his staff can mesh those two elements will go a long way toward the successes of the 2008-2009 edition. If past results are any indication, Loyola should again be one of the teams to watch in the MAAC despite the losses to graduation and influx of new faces.

Patsos has led the Greyhounds to three straight winning seasons, the longest such stretch since Loyola enjoyed four straight winning campaigns two decades ago. The 19 wins last season eclipsed the mark set

the previous year for Division I wins and the back-to-back MAAC Semifinal appearances are the only time that has happened in the history of the program.

The accolades have continued for the man who has made the most of the opportunity provided to him when he was named Loyola's 20th men's basketball coach on April 1, 2004.

Taking over a team that had recorded just one win the season prior, Patsos and his staff injected immediate energy into the program and generated legions of followers through its fast-paced, pressing style of play. That first season featured the college's first three-game winning streak in five years and the snapping of a 39-game road losing streak. Patsos registered his first career coaching win over eventual MAAC regular-season and championship titlist Niagara when the Purple Eagles left Reitz Arena saddled with a 97-89 defeat.

There was plenty more to come in Season Two. A five-game winning streak to start the season ballooned into a 10-3 start with the only blemishes being losses to MAAC regular-season champion Manhattan, Virginia of the Atlantic Coast Conference and Providence of the BIG EAST. Regrouping at the end of the season, Patsos rallied the team to finish with four wins in the final five regular-season games to secure a winning record and the No. 6 seed at the MAAC Championships, where the season ended with a tough two-point loss in the opening round.

Patsos' third season saw the successes come more frequently and



the wins began to pile up. After concluding December with a three-game losing streak, the Greyhounds ran off six straight MAAC wins in January for a school-record seven straight conference victories. By mid-February, Loyola had secured a bye in the MAAC Championship for the first time since 1998 and finished tied for third in the conference standings and as the No. 3 seed in the Championship. The quarterfinal win over Fairfield gave the Greyhounds wins over all nine MAAC opponents for the first time in school history and that spot in the Championship Semifinals.

The Greyhounds backed up that success a season ago by collecting 11 home wins — the most victories in Reitz Arena since the first team to play there won 12 games in 1984-1985. Another MAAC Quarterfinal win over Fairfield vaulted Loyola back into the Semifinals where they lost to the eventual champion for the second straight season.

The turnaround is not surprising after looking at Patsos' pedigree. He was been surrounded by winners and learned from some of the best basketball minds in the nation during his rise to the helm of the Greyhounds.

Patsos came to the Loyola campus straight from the University of Maryland where as an assistant on the staff of Gary Williams for 13 seasons he helped guide the Terrapins to 11 consecutive NCAA Tournaments, including seven Sweet Sixteen appearances, consecutive trips to the Final Four (2001 and 2002) and the 2002 NCAA National Championship. In those 13 seasons, Maryland finished in the top half of the rugged ACC 10 times, won two ACC regular-season championships (1995 and 2002), captured the 2004 ACC Tournament title and posted a school-record eight straight 20-win seasons. Additionally

during his tenure with the Terrapins, 13 players who Patsos coached were drafted into the NBA, including six first-round selections with four of those being tabbed as lottery picks — Walt Williams (1992), Joe Smith (1995), Steve Francis (1999) and Chris Wilcox (2002). Former Terrapins Keith Booth (1997) and Juan Dixon (2002) round out the sextet and Patsos currently teams with Dixon to hold an annual basketball summer camp held on the Loyola campus.

While at College Park, Patsos was recognized by ESPN's Andy Katz as a "Coach on the Rise" after helping Maryland to their seventh Sweet Sixteen appearance, a fifth Top 10 ranking in the final coaches poll and a victory over No. 1 Duke in the inaugural season at the Comcast Center in 2003.

Patsos joined the Terrapins as a volunteer assistant prior to the 1991-1992 season and immediately became an integral part of Williams' staff. His numerous responsibilities included on-court coaching and the academic development of Maryland's players. His role as an academic mentor during

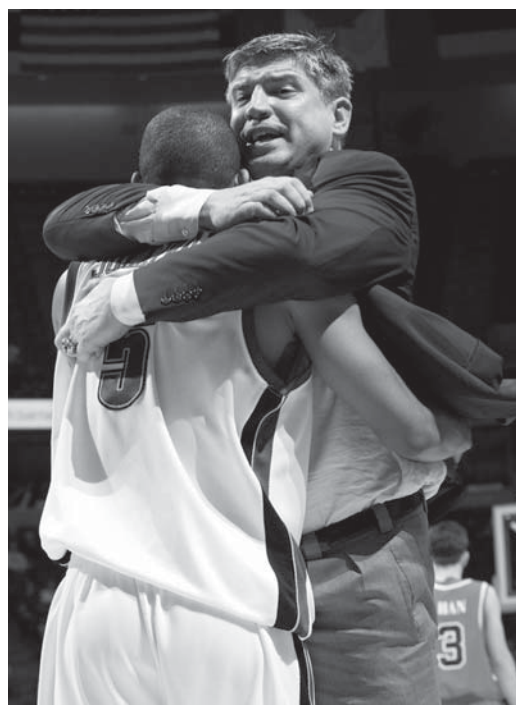

his first 10 seasons on Williams' staff proved productive, as the teams' overall academic performance improved under his guidance. As a recruiter, he helped Maryland land a 2002-2003 incoming class ranked as high as fourth in the nation and a group of Terrapins newcomers for the 2003-2004 season rated as high as second in the country by several national publications.

Prior to his appointment at Maryland, Patsos was the assistant coach at Archbishop Carroll HS in Washington, D.C. He helped Carroll to a 21-8 record and a national ranking of No. 6 during his first season before the team lost to famed DeMatha Catholic HS in the city playoffs. Patsos was involved in the maturation of Charles

Harrison (Wake Forest) and Lawrence Moten (Syracuse), both of whom became stars on the collegiate level.

A three-year varsity letter winner at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., Patsos played for the late Jack Bruen, who later led Colgate University to a pair of NCAA Division I Tournament appearances in the 1990s. The Cardinals posted a record of 51-26 during his career as a player and captured four in-season tournament championships, highlighted by a 106-99 victory over Manhattanville in the championship game of the Manhattanville Tournament as Patsos led the Cardinals with career-highs for points (17) and rebounds (14). Other top games during his senior campaign included 12 points and five rebounds against Frostburg State, 10 rebounds at Scranton, and 12 points and nine rebounds against St. Mary's (Md.).

As a junior, Patsos recorded season-highs of 14 points against Upsala and 11 rebounds against Washington (Md.) College. He scored 12 points and grabbed five rebounds to lead Catholic to the championship of the Alfred University Charity Cage Classic with a 90-88 victory over the host Saxons. The Cardinals were 18-8 during both his junior and senior years, then school records for victories in a single season.

A native of Boston, Mass., Patsos grew up attending games at the Boston Garden. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in History from Catholic in 1989. His brother Chris captained the Florida Southern baseball team to the 1981 NCAA Division II World Series championship and his father Charles received a Tony in 1987 for Best Revival as a member of the producing team for "All My Sons".

MATT KOVARIK

ASSISTANT COACH • UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND '98
EIGHTH SEASON COACHING • FIFTH AT LOYOLA

MATT KOVARIK returns for his fifth season as an assistant after coming to Loyola following time as both a student-athlete and coach in the Maryland Terrapins program.

Kovarik was in his third season as an assistant alongside Jimmy Patsos at Maryland when he decided to follow him to Loyola after Patsos' appointment in April 2004. During those three seasons in College Park (2001-2004), Kovarik helped guide the Terrapins to a 73-26 record, three NCAA Tournament berths, an ACC regular-season championship (2002), an ACC Tournament Championship (2004) and the 2002 NCAA Championship.

The first player in Maryland history to play on five straight teams that finished in the top half of the ACC, Kovarik appeared in 129 games during his career (1993-1998) and all five teams participated in the NCAA Tournament, including three Sweet 16 appearances. The Terrapins were 103-55 during that span and the 1995 team was co-regular season champions of the ACC. His game total ranks among the top 10 in Maryland history, trailing elite company such as Juan Dixon, Steve Blake, Lonny Baxter and Len Bias in the record books.

An honorable mention selection for the 1994 ACC all-freshman team, Kovarik was named to the conference's all-academic team following the 1996-1997 season. He was a three-time recipient of the Maryland men's basketball scholar-athlete award.

During his tenure as a Terrapins player and coach, he was surrounded by future NBA players. A roommate of Joe Smith, the 1995 NBA Draft No. 1 overall selection by the Golden State Warriors, he also played with Keith Booth, Sarunas Jasikevicius, Laron Profit, Obinna Ekezie and Terence Morris. While assisting Williams, he coached future NBA players Dixon, Blake, Baxter, Chris Wilcox and D.J. Strawberry.

Following commencement, Kovarik worked for the Xerox Corporation in New York City for two years, before attending the University of Maryland School of Law in Baltimore. He continued those studies at Maryland's Law School in Baltimore while at Loyola and completed his requirements to receive his law degree in June 2007.

The Greensboro, N.C., native attended Grimsley HS where he was a three-year starter at shooting guard and backcourt teammate of former Loyola Greyhounds guard Milt Williams. Matt is married to the former Thea Crosby-Levine, a registered nurse at Shady Grove Hospital.

ORLANDO "G.G." SMITH brings with him a wealth of experience as a player and an assistant coach as he commences his second season on Jimmy Patsos' staff. Smith will focus on recruiting and player development while assisting with administrative duties for the program.

Prior to Loyola, Smith spent the 2006-2007 season as an assistant at nearby Johns Hopkins University, helping the Blue Jays to a 24-5 final record and an appearance in the NCAA Division III Men's Basketball Tournament.

A 1999 graduate of the University of Georgia, Smith was a three-year starter and four-time letter winner for the Bulldogs. Playing his first two seasons for Tubby Smith, Georgia advanced to the NCAA Tournament in both years and upset West top-seed Purdue to advance to the Sweet 16 in 1996. The Bulldogs advanced to the

NIT in each of Smith's final two seasons playing for Ron Jirsa, finishing third in the 1998 event. He was named to the NIT All-Tournament team and participated with the NIT All-Stars European Tour later that summer after being named All-SEC Third Team following his junior season.

After a year as an assistant at Lexington (Ky.) Catholic HS following graduation, Smith rejoined Coach Smith as a graduate assistant on the staff at University of Kentucky for two seasons (2000-2002). The Wildcats reached the NCAA Sweet Sixteen each year and captured the 2001 SEC Tournament.

Having received his Masters of Education in Sports Management from Kentucky, Smith moved on as an assistant to Tennessee Tech University for one season, helping the Golden Eagles to a 21-10 final record and an appearance in the 2003 Ohio Valley Championship game.

Following a year away from college coaching, Smith returned for two seasons as an assistant at Armstrong Atlantic State University (2004-2006). The Pirates reached the championship game of the 2006 Peach Belt Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Division II Tournament, finishing 23-8.

The son of current University of Minnesota head coach Tubby Smith, Smith has two younger brothers – Saul, an assistant at Minnesota, and Brian, who completed his playing career at the University of Mississippi last season. G.G. is married to the former Lorie Benton, a pediatric nephrology fellow at Johns Hopkins University.

GREG MANNING is new to the coaching staff, but he is no stranger to the Greyhounds' program as the 2008 Loyola College graduate sheds the uniform for a suit and tie on the Greyhounds' sideline. In addition to recruiting, he will assist with scouting and administrative duties.

Manning was the first player to join the program upon the hiring of Jimmy Patsos in April 2004 and he donned the Green and Grey for four years. During those four seasons, Manning was an integral part of the current revival of Loyola basketball and helped the Greyhounds to 58 wins during his career, the highest total since members of the Class of '87 registered 63 wins between 1983-1987.

"I feel extremely privileged to be joining Jimmy Patsos and his staff here at Loyola College," Manning stated upon his appointment to the staff in August. "Having played here the last four years has given me an understanding of the dedication that it takes to build a program and I'm looking forward to being a part of that each and every day from the coaching side. Working under such an accomplished coach like Jimmy, who has been to the top winning a National Championship as an assistant at Maryland, is going to allow me to learn from someone who knows what it takes to be successful in this business."

A native of Alpharetta, Ga., Manning appeared in 92 games during his career, earning starts during his freshman and senior years. A three-point shooter, he knocked down 32 shots from beyond the arc and tallied 177 total points. He produced two of

the highlights of the season during his senior campaign – scoring 10 points in 11 minutes at National Champion Kansas and coming off the bench cold at Siena to tie the game with a three-pointer with eight seconds remaining, finishing with five points in 14 seconds in the Greyhounds' overtime victory.

He was graduated in May with a bachelor's degree in Communications-Public Relations. He spent his summer attending camps across the country, including the Eastern Invitational in New Jersey and the camps at the University of Maryland and West Virginia University.

COLLEEN CAMPBELL is in her sixth year at Loyola. After three years as Coordinator, she was promoted to Director of Academic Affairs for Varsity Athletics. The office of Academic Affairs for Varsity Athletics has an Academic Enrichment Program which focuses on all incoming freshmen, first semester transfers and any student-athlete below a 2.5 GPA. It also provides academic support, advising and other services to all varsity student-athletes.

Campbell recently completed a two-year position as Region I Director on the Board of Directors for the National Association of Academic Advisors for Student-Athletes (N4A) and prior to that she was in a two-year position as the National Secretary of the N4A. She was voted into these positions by her peer members in the organization. She is currently a workshop presenter for the NCAA/N4A partnership, whose charge is to educate University officials on how to increase their APR scores. This past year, she was honored to be one of two people nominated to run for President of the N4A.

Before coming to the Evergreen Campus, Campbell was an Academic Coordinator in the Athletic Department at Temple University from 2000-2002. She worked with five varsity teams, as well as coordinated the Career Development aspect of the NCAA CHAMPS Lifeskills program with all of the student-athletes.

Campbell received her Bachelor's Degree in Health Education from Purdue University, where she was a varsity swimmer. While attending graduate school at Villanova University, she earned a Master's Degree in
