With a very youthful squad, the Greyhounds won their fifth consecutive regular season MAAC Championship and narrowly missed a third straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Greyhounds lost a heartbreaking one-goal match in the conference championship game and enter this season with a renewed hunger for another championship and postseason success.

"We were a very young team last year," says Loyola Head Coach Mark Mettrick. "We add five new players this year after losing only two seniors. Hopefully these new additions will strengthen our squad and help us return to the national tournament."

The 'Hounds lose graduated seniors Steven Coleman and John Alecci yet return a solid nucleus of talent that includes 2003 MAAC Rookie and Offensive Player of the Year Omar Alfonso. Sophomore Gabe Ortega was a second-team All-MAAC selection in his first

season with the Greyhounds while Michael Kolosvary and Danny Wheelan joined Alfonso and Ortega on the MAAC Rookie team, giving Loyola an outstanding sophomore class.

Seniors Jim Gottermeyer and Jay Joyce will captain Loyola's young talent. They will be supported by fellow seniors Chase Franklin, Kevin Nash, Brian O'Connor and Greg Peters, all of whom will assume leadership roles.

"The senior class will be instrumental in keeping the team focused on its ultimate goal," adds Mettrick. "We will need their leadership to bind this group into an effective team. We have good individual talent, we need to become a good team."

Behind the senior class is a junior group that includes John Dalziel, Mark Donnelly, Nate Lyden, Danny Mulcahy and Vinnie Piscopo. This class brings many scoring options and versatility for Mettrick to consider with four of the five playing midfield and forward positions. Other than Mulcahy, whose position is goalkeeper, this junior unit is capable of scoring goals for the 'Hounds, making the offensive well very deep this season.

The five newcomers include freshmen Ray Hassett, a standout at Saint John the Baptist High School (Long Island) who brings regional team experience and exposure on a national level. Hassett is joined by high school and club teammates Camilo Correa and Frank Spanos, two highly technical and gifted players with an abundance of soccer experience. Walk-on Michael Mallia, also a Long Island product, will compete for time while freshman Jansen Blake brings size and athleticism to the Loyola defense.

Mettrick will need contributions from all four classes to achieve Loyola's lofty expectations this season. A vastly improving MAAC conference and a brutally tough non-conference schedule will definitely have its challenges.

The Greyhounds open with Princeton at home on September 3. They host George Mason two days later before playing in the Patriots' Tournament the following weekend. Back-to-back games against 2003 Final Four participants Santa Clara and Maryland highlight the non-conference portion while tough games against Pennsylvania and William & Mary should get the 'Hounds ready for MAAC play. Santa Clara enters the year ranked No. 3 in the pre-season polls while Maryland is No. 4.

"Every year we try to build a schedule that will give us a chance at an at-large NCAA Tournament bid," says Mettrick. "I think this year's schedule is proof of that."

A lot of questions still need to be answered before this team can cement its legacy into any history book. Mettrick now has the task of fitting all the pieces into a complete championship puzzle. They know it won't be an easy road, but the goals still remain high for a Greyhound team that won't settle for anything less than a national tournament berth.

Here's a look, position-by-position, at the 2004 Loyola men's soccer team.

Forward

The strength of this team looks to be in its offense. The returning class showed its knack for creating chances and scoring goals, accounting for 109 of Loyola's 118 points last season. With a lot of depth up front, Mettrick has a wealth of options to choose from.

"I consider our offense to be a strong suite for us," says Mettrick. "We have a lot of talent and we're very deep at the forward position. I think this team can score a lot of goals."

Headlining the list of options needs to be last year's leading scorer, sophomore Omar Alfonso. A spectacular freshman campaign produced 17 goals, the most of any freshman in the nation. Alfonso led Loyola with six multiple-goal games and

was honored the MAAC's top offensive player as well as garnering Rookie of the Year honors. Fortunately for Alfonso, who has worked hard in the offseason to avoid the sophomore jinx, he developed a very successful partnership with returning senior Kevin Nash, last year's second-leading scorer and another offensive option for Loyola.

Nash is coming off his best collegiate season with seven goals and 20 points. He will fight juniors Nate Lyden and Vinnie Piscopo for his starting job as well as sophomore Mark Donnelly, a transfer from Mercer University who earned more and more playing time as last season wore on. Lyden and Piscopo each posted two goals last year and each brings a unique ability to create offense, giving the Greyhounds many different looks.

Piscopo was the team's leading scorer his freshman campaign, posting seven goals and six assists. Lyden has six goals and six assists in his first two seasons with the Greyhounds.

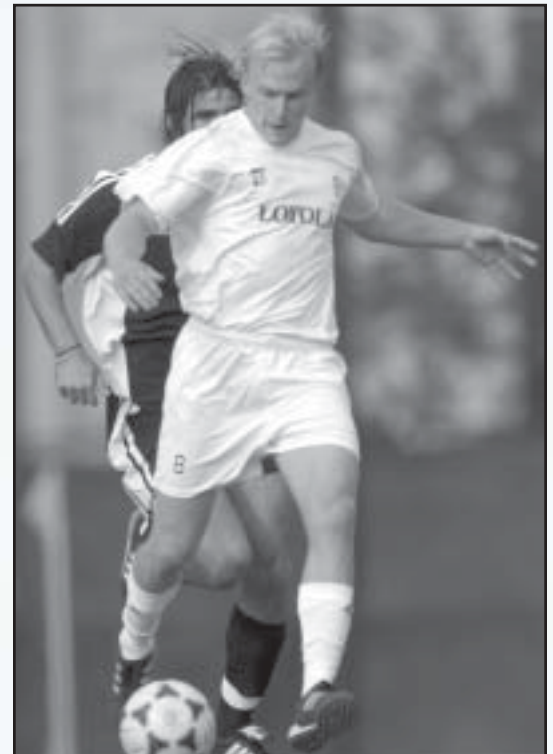
Midfield

Just like the forward position, the midfield is loaded with options. Highly technical players and pure athletes give Loyola a good mix at the position, which is anchored by senior Jay Joyce. A starter in all 21 of Loyola's game's last season, Joyce is a right midfielder with excellent speed and conditioning.

"Jay Joyce has become a legitimate impact player at Loyola," says Mettrick. "He has great competitive qualities and that's why he's been a captain the last two seasons."

Sophomore Danny Wheelan, a two-footed technical player, returns after starting 19 games his freshman season. An excellent passer, Wheelan has been hampered by a broken toe this offseason and may need some time to get back to game speed.

Junior John Dalziel started 18 games in 2003 while sophomore Rade Kokovic started six times. They will battle for a

starting role on this year's squad, but will be challenged by the likes of senior Brian O'Connor and sophomore Julian Cantillo, who have worked hard in the spring and summer and are ready to compete for significant playing time.

Add in a quartet of freshmen talent and the midfield has a surplus of depth. Camilo Correa, Ray Hassett and Frank Spanos all played at St. John's the Baptist High School and together at the club level with HBC United. Hassett is a versatile competitor who can also play the forward and defense positions while Correa is a left-sided skill player with tremendous touch. On the right side, Spanos and Michael Mallia bring even more skill to the lineup for Coach Mettrick.

"We don't have a lot of game experience at midfield," says Mettrick. "We still have a lot to prove at that position."

Defense

A lot questions also surround the defensive unit this season. Questions about who will play where and what system will best fit the talent head that list. With a plethora of possibilities, Mettrick will need to find the right mix of players with the most accommodating strategy for the Greyhounds to achieve their goals as a team.

Senior co-captain Jim Gottermeyer, who suffered a season-ending hip injury last season, leads the relatively young unit. Showing its youth, sophomore Gabe Ortega may be the most prominent and experienced defender in the Loyola backfield after his standout freshman season. Ortega earned second-team All-MAAC honors and was named to the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference All-Rookie team.

Senior Chase Franklin is back after an excellent season in which he started every game. Sophomore Michael Kolosvary, who started 11 games last year, looks to get more consistent time this season. A couple freshmen defenders will also compete for spots in the lineup and could break in as Mettrick finds the right combination.

Freshman Jansen Blake comes to Loyola after being named the high school athlete of the year in Ottawa, Canada. He captains his club team, the Ottawa Fury and played on the Quebec provincial team.

Goalkeepers

Loyola used a trio of goalkeepers last season and all three return in 2004. Sophomore Justin Chelland, who finished the year

with five shutouts and seven wins as a starter, cemented the starting role last season and will likely enter this season as the favorite for the job. He will, however, receive plenty of competition from a pair of highly qualified candidates in sophomore Danny Mulcahy and senior Greg Peters.

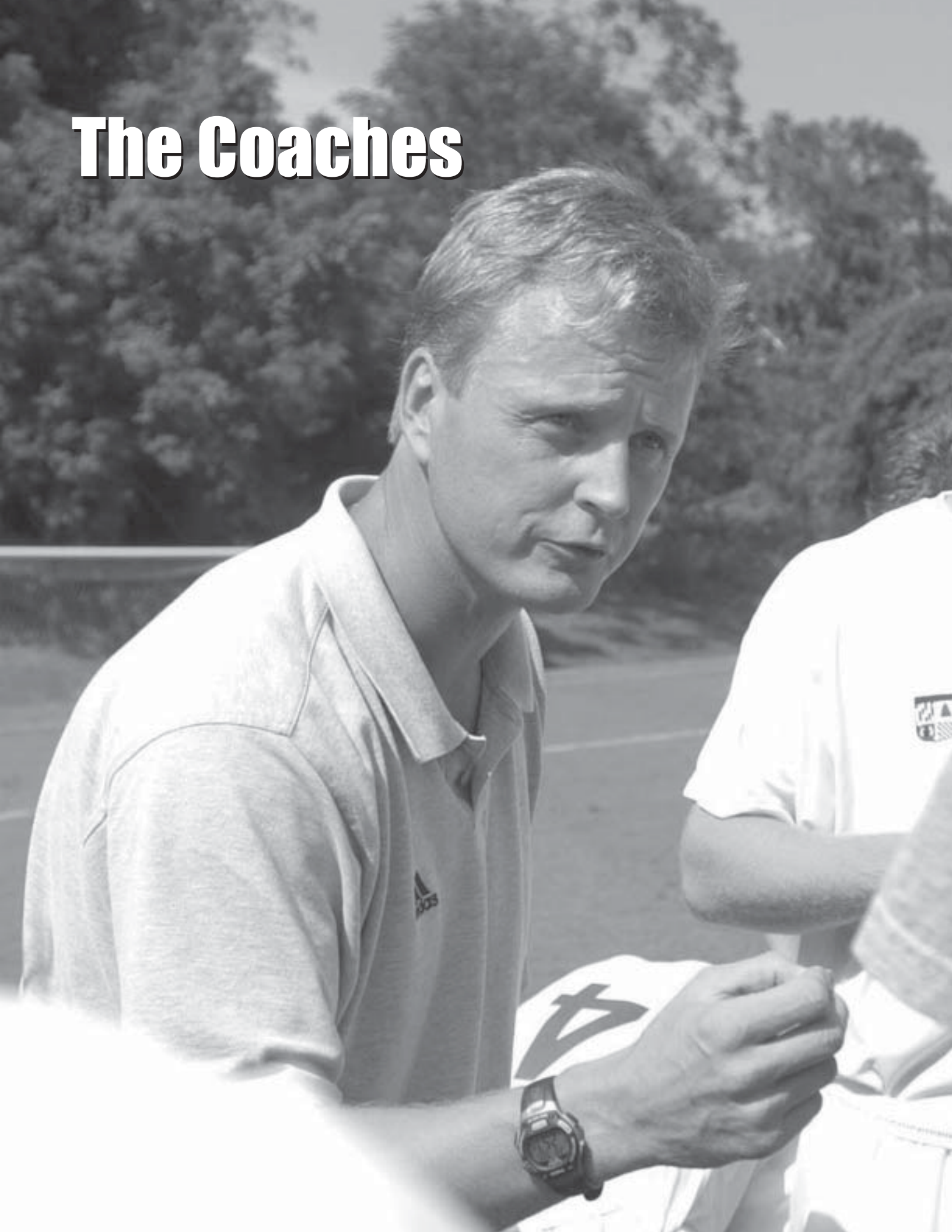
Chelland finished the year with the best numbers, posting a .869 save percentage and an 0.89 goals-against-average. Peters, however, was solid in his six outings, earning the opening-day 1-0 overtime shutout over No. 22 Syracuse. Mulcahy, who made 15 saves in four games, ended the season with a 1-1-1 overall record.

All three goalkeepers have worked extremely hard over the summer and each has a solid shot at the starting job this fall.

In his four seasons at Loyola College, Head Coach Mark Mettrick has powered the Greyhounds to four regular-season MAAC titles and two NCAA tournament berths. With an impressive 53-18-9 overall record at Evergreen, Mettrick has made success synonymous with Loyola Soccer.

Named Loyola's eight head soccer coach in January of 2000, Mettrick's hard work and dedication has given the program national respect. With the likes of 2003 Final Four participants Maryland and Santa Clara on this year's schedule, Mettrick and the 'Hounds are ready to establish themselves as an elite team

once again.

Last season ended in another regular season Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference title for Loyola. Under Mettrick's tutelage, freshman Omar Alfonso was named the MAAC's Offensive Player of the Year as well as the Rookie of the Year, while he and senior Steven Coleman landed on the first-team All-MAAC squad. The Greyhounds finished 11-7-3 overall, falling to St. Peter's in the conference championship match.

In 2001, the Greyhounds took home the regular season MAAC title and also earned a trip to the NCAA tournament after winning the conference championship match against Marist. Senior Reb Beatty was named the league's Goalkeeper of the Year for the fourth consecutive season while Niall Lepper earned MAAC Player of the Year honors under Mettrick's guidance. Both were also named to the National Soccer

Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) South Atlantic regional first-team, and the 'Hounds closed out the year with a loss to Furman in the NCAA postseason.

A deserving winner of the 2001 NSCAA South Atlantic Regional "Coach of the Year" award, Mettrick was at the helm for one of the finest seasons in program history. After losing their season opener to California on August 31, the Greyhounds went unbeaten in their next 19 games (17-0-2) before falling at second-ranked Saint Louis in the NCAA Round of 16. Mettrick also led Loyola to its first MAAC tournament championship since 1996, and the NCAA appearance for the program was its first since 1993. The 'Hounds ended the year ranked No. 10 in the final national poll.



In 2000, his first season as head coach, Mettrick led the Greyhounds to a MAAC regular-season championship and a 12-4-1 overall record. Just as in 2001, his Greyhounds ranked highly in several statistical categories nationally, finishing in the Top-10 in the country in fewest goals allowed.

Mettrick, 39, came to the Evergreen Campus after six very impressive seasons as the head coach at Mount Saint Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Md.

Named head coach at The Mount prior to the 1994 season, Mettrick shaped the Mountaineers' program into one of the finest in the Northeast Conference (NEC). He guided the school to five winning seasons and two NEC championship games, including the 1999 championship game, where the Mountaineers dropped a tough 2-1 decision to UMBC.

Known for developing a rich pool of talent at each of his coaching stops, Mettrick has coached 26 Loyola players to All-MAAC status, including two Player of the Year, a Rookie of the Year and Goalkeeper of the Year honorees. He

had five players named All-NEC following the 1999 campaign at Mount Saint Mary's, including the conference's Rookie of the Year, and an All-South Atlantic Region team member.

Also a two-time "Coach of the Year" honoree in the Northeast Conference, Mettrick first won the award in 1994, his

first season as a collegiate head coach. He led the Mountaineers to an 11-6-2 campaign, including a 2-1 upset of then 14th-ranked Maryland. He then won the award a second time in 1996 after leading the squad to the conference semifinals.

Mettrick, a native of Manchester, England, played for Manchester United's Reserve Team (English Premier Soccer League) as a youth. He is a 1988 graduate of Hartwick College in Oneonta, N.Y., where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in physics. An outstanding soccer player in his own right, Mettrick was a two-time NCAA Division I first-team All-America selection for the powerful Hawks' program in addition to being a Dean's List student.

He currently ranks among the leaders on Hartwick's all-time scoring list with 109 career points, and his 41 points as a freshman in 1984 rank him fourth on the single-season scoring list. Mettrick scored 46 career goals, tying for fourth on the all-time list, including 17 his freshman season.

Following graduation, Mettrick was a first-round draft selection of the Baltimore Blast of the Major Indoor Soccer League (MISL), going



on to star for that organization from 1988 to 1992.

During that span, he helped lead the Blast to two consecutive MISL championship game appearances and earned a nomination to the league's All-Star team in 1992.

He then moved on to serve as an assistant coach at Mount Saint Mary's in 1993 before taking over the head coaching position the following season.

In addition to his coaching duties at Loyola, Mettrick runs the highly-successful Mark Mettrick Advanced Soccer Schools in the summer months throughout the State of Maryland.

Mettrick currently resides in the Wiltondale section of Baltimore County with his wife, Jennifer, their son, Matthew and new baby Haley.

Mike Nelson is in his first season as assistant men's soccer coach at Loyola College. The former Greyhound captain and four-year starter joined his former coach (Mark Mettrick) and teammate (Niall Lepper) to complete Loyola's staff this past summer.

Nelson co-captained the Greyhounds to one of their finest seasons in Division I, leading the Green and Grey to the 2001 NCAA Round of 16. He earned first-team All-MAAC honors that year starting all 21 games at defense. That season, Nelson scored three goals, including the game-winner in Loyola's 1-0 win at Maryland. The 'Hounds finished 17-2-2 overall and posted a 53-20-7 record over Nelson's four seasons.

He finished his collegiate career with nine goals, eight assists and 26 points. After starting 16 of 19 matches his freshman season, Nelson started every game of his sophomore, junior and senior campaigns. As a sophomore, he earned all-tournament honors at Loyola's Fila Classic. His junior season, he registered seven points (fourth best on team) and helped Loyola win its second straight MAAC regular season title.

In 2001, Nelson teamed up with current Greyhound graduate assistant Niall Lepper and helped Loyola string together a 19-game unbeaten streak. The former co-captains are both new additions to Mettrick's staff.

Nelson, a Marlton, N.J. native, earned his bachelors degree in communications in the spring of 2002 and has been working as a sales representative for a local construction company. He is currently single and lives in Baltimore, where he has competed in the last two Baltimore marathons.

Niall Lepper

Niall Lepper joins Mark Mettrick's coaching staff as a graduate assistant for the 2004 season. Lepper, one of Loyola's all-time finest defensive stoppers, was a first-team All-MAAC selection each of his playing years at Loyola, earning the conference's Player of the Year award as both a junior and senior.

Lepper captained the Greyhounds to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances and led the 'Hounds to an impressive 42-11-6 record his three seasons with the program. He played under Mettrick at Mount St. Mary's as a freshman and transferred to Loyola when Mettrick came to the Evergreen Campus in 2000.

In his first season at Loyola, Lepper was named team co-MVP, leading a Greyhound defense that allowed a total of 10 goals all season. He earned first-team All-MAAC honors, scoring two goals on three shots. As a junior, Lepper anchored a defense that allowed eight goals in the team's final 19 games. He was the MAAC Player of the Year and a South Atlantic Regional All-America.

In his final season at Loyola, Lepper once again made the MAAC first-team and once again won Player of the Year honors. He led the 'Hounds to a second-straight NCAA postseason appearance and finished his career with eight goals and 22 points.

A native of Scotland, Lepper played on Scotland's Under-18 National Team. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Loyola in 2003 and is currently pursuing a masters in international business at Loyola's Sellinger School of Business and Management.
