Head Coach Joe Mallia



Joe Mallia, now in his seventh season as the Greyhound head coach and 11th season overall with the Loyola women's soccer team, has solidified his program as one of the best in the region and himself as one of the top young coaches in the nation.

Mallia has compiled an impressive 73-41-9 (.631) record in his six seasons as Loyola's mentor, leading the Greyhounds to four

consecutive Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference (MAAC) championships and to three NCAA College Cup appearances.

The program's first full-time head coach, Mallia was an assistant coach for the Greyhounds under Dave Gerrity for four seasons before taking over the head job following the 1997 season. His outstanding recruiting efforts both as a head coach and as an assistant have helped attract outstanding classes throughout the last decade, including the impressive 2002 class that was ranked 34th nationally by Soccer Buzz Magazine. Four different Loyola players (Annie DiPalo, Aurda Garucio, Kathleen Shields and Amy Goetzing) have earned freshman All-America honors, and the Greyhounds have also broken into the NSCAA Mid-Atlantic regional rankings five times in the last eight years. Most recently, Mallia has recruited two



MAAC Rookie of the Year winners (Carolyn Kennington and Ashley Kramer).

In 2003, Mallia challenged his team with a tough schedule facing national power houses Florida Atlantic, Miami, Maryland, William & Mary, Rutgers, Penn and Villanova as a part of their non-conference schedule. The young Greyhound squad started the year 1-6 but Mallia was positive that his talented team would

come together and learn from the competitive teams they faced. And he was right, with a 1-0 win over regional No. 1 selection, Rutgers, Loyola came together winning 10 of their next 13 meetings. Loyola finished their conference schedule undefeated at 8-0-1. Freshman Carolyn Kennington gave Loyola their second MAAC Rookie of the Year in as many seasons and junior Lindsay Tracey was named the Co-Defensive Player of the Year. Mallia went on to lead his squad to their fourth MAAC championship with a 4-2 win over Rider, the fourth seed and a 2-0 shutout of Niagara, the No. 2 seed in the tournament. With the tournament trophy in hand, Loyola earned an automatic bid to the NCAA College Cup to face sixth seeded West Virginia for the second year in a row. The Greyhounds stuck with the Mountaineers but ultimately fell 4-2 in Morgantown, WV.

Mallia continued his winning ways in 2002, leading Loyola to a 12-6-2 record and yet another MAAC Tournament Championship. The Greyhounds finished the regular season second in the MAAC at 7-0-2 and went on to defeat Rider in the championships game by a final score of 3-0. Loyola visited their second consecutive NCAA Tournament under Mallia's tutelage, falling to fifth-ranked West Virginia, 3-0.

The Greyhounds saved their best for last in 2001, defeating Niagara, Rider and then top-seeded Marist in the MAAC Championship game at the Disney Wide World of Sports Complex to earn the conference's automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. The Greyhounds fell to nationally-ranked Princeton, 3-1, in the first-round game, finishing the season with a

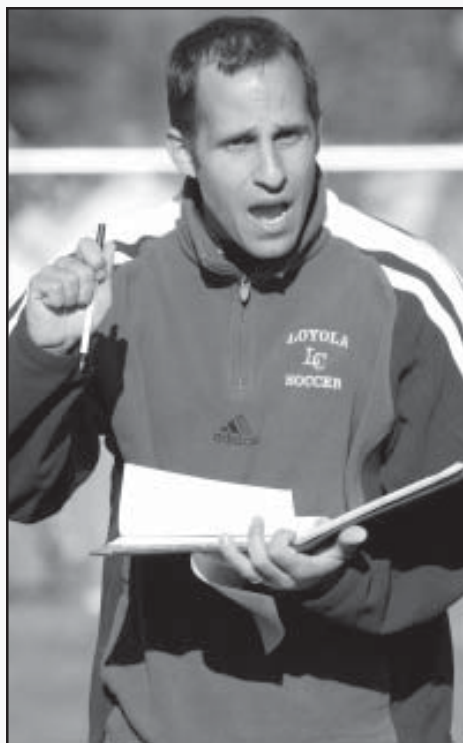
respectable 9–9–2 overall record and a 7–2 MAAC regular season mark.

In 2000, Mallia earned the conference's Coach of the Year honors as he guided the Greyhounds to the best season in program history and a 15–5 overall record. Loyola defeated Fairfield in overtime to win the MAAC championship, earning an NCAA play-in berth, and set a team record for victories in a season. The Greyhounds dominated the competition all season long, finishing with a perfect 9–0 record in MAAC play and outscoring the conference opponents 24–0. Loyola also finished second in the nation in shutout percentage, not allowing a goal in 14 of 20 games.

In the 1999 season, the Greyhounds tied a then-team record of 13 victories and earned the program's first ever victory over Top 25 opponents with a win at Tennessee. Loyola finished 13–4–2 overall and 8–0–1 in conference play to earn a share of the MAAC's regular season championship, and the Greyhounds also finished the season ranked sixth nationally in goals allowed per game (0.59).

In 1998, Mallia's first season as head coach, the Greyhounds finished a solid 10–8–3 against a schedule that featured national powerhouses such as Connecticut and UCLA. Loyola also reached the MAAC Championship game for the seventh time in the history of the program.

A 1992 graduate of Old Dominion University in Norfolk, VA., Mallia spent six seasons as a goalkeeper for various professional soccer teams before concluding his playing career in 1997. He played locally for three seasons with the Baltimore Spirit of the National Professional Soccer League (NPSL), earning the teams Mike Reynolds Unsung Hero Award during the 1994–95 season after



posting an outstanding 12–5 record.

Mallia, who recorded a club-record 38 saves in a game at St. Louis during the 1994–95 campaign, solidified himself as the team's top goalkeeper in 1995–96 before a severe ankle injury sidelined him late in the year. He returned in 1996–97 to take over the starting duties late in the season and to lead the Spirit

to a first-round playoff victory.

As a member of the Spirit, Mallia was also active in the team's community relations efforts, working in the Spirit's front office, appearing in local television commercials and at various events throughout the Baltimore area. He also played outdoors for the Delaware Wizards of the United State Interregional Soccer League and ran his own goalkeepers camp.

Before joining the Spirit in October, 1994, Mallia was a key member of both the Harrisburg Heat (1991–93) and the Dayton Dynamo (1993–94) of the NPSL. He was named to the NPSL's All-Rookie first team in 1992, finishing 19–10 overall that season, and recorded the league's first ever shutout with the new, larger size goal with a 14–0 victory over Wichita on January 14, 1993.

A native of Syosset, N.Y., Mallia was also an all-conference performer on the men's soccer team at Old Dominion from 1987–91, earning a bachelor's degree in sports medicine. He was named the Monarchs' Most Valuable Player in 1990 and was a two-time All-Sun Belt Conference selection. In 1991, Mallia received the Alumni Association/Old Dominion Male Athlete-of-the-Year award, and he graduated as the Monarchs' career leader in saves (206) and shutouts (20).

Mallia was the team's leader in goals-against average each year from 1998-90, posting a career-best 0.68 GAA in 1998. He currently ranks among the top players in NCAA history in career-goals against average. For his accomplishments, he was also inducted into the Old Dominion University Sports Hall of Fame in April 1998.

Before matriculating to ODU, Mallia, 33, earned Parade high school All-America honors as a goalkeeper at Syosset High School in Long Island. He also was a member of the United States Under-20 National Team from 1985-87.

Mallia and his wife, Amy, a 1996 Loyola graduate, have two daughters, Kaitlyn (3) and Reagan. The Mallia family resides in Ruxton.

John Byford



John Byford is in his second season as an assistant on the Loyola College women's soccer staff.

Byford came to the Evergreen Campus with several years of successful coaching experience under his belt, including a two-year stint as the head women's soccer coach at St. Joseph's University in Philadelphia.

After his work at St. Joe's, Byford worked as the Director of Coaching and Player Development for the Mandeville Soccer Club in Mandeville, La. There he was responsible for coaching education of recreational level and travel team coaches. He also set curriculums for different age and ability levels of players, wrote articles for the club newsletter and evaluated the players and coaches involved in the Mandeville Club.

Byford also worked as a head coach for the Region 1 ODP U-13 Girls team from 2000-02. He was an assistant coach of the squad in previous year to earning the head position. He also worked as a staff coach for the Region 1 girls ODP squad for the seven years as well as the Eastern Pennsylvania Girls ODP from 1996-2001. His team won the ODP national championship in 2002 and the regional championship in 1998 and 2001.

Byford began his coaching career at Villa Joseph Marie High School in Holland, Pa. where he was the assistant coach of the 1993 state championship team. In 1994, Byford was named the head coach at Delaware Valley College in the first year of the programs history as a varsity sport. Byford moved on to Villanova University from 1995-97 where he was an assistant women's coach and to Kutztown University from 1997-98 to work with the men's program. Byford then went on to lead the Downingtown High School girl's soccer team to the league and district championship and to the state playoffs for the first time in school history in 1998.

Byford is currently working with the Maryland ODP program. He and his wife, Allison reside in Forrest Hill, Md.

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Mellanie Nai



Mellanie Nai is in her first season as a women's soccer coach at Loyola College. She is no stranger to the Loyola program or the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, having played for Marist from 1999-2002. As a four-year starting goalkeeper for the Red Foxes, Nai was named the 2001 MAAC Goalkeeper of the Year, first-team all-conference as well as to the all-academic squad. In 2001, she ranked third in the country in saves per game and set a school record for single season save percentage with .860. Nai holds two more school records at Marist. With seven shutouts in 2000, Nai ranks at the top of the Red Foxes' list for shutouts in a season and as a freshman she made a school record 29 saves in a single game.

Most recently Nai worked at the University of Maryland Baltimore County as the goalkeepers coach. The Retrievers finished 2003 season with a 7-8-1 record and 4-4-1 in the America East Conference. There she helped the UMBC keepers to a 1.48 goals against average.

"We feel Mellanie is a great addition to our staff at Loyola," Mallia said. "She's a bright, young coach and I've gained a lot of respect for her on and off the field in the years we competed against her in the MAAC. The great thing she brings to the table is her knowledge and respect of our program and her understanding of where we are trying to go."

Nai will primarily work with the Greyhound goalkeepers.

2004 Outlook



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To look forward to the 2004 season of Loyola College women's soccer, you must look back upon the last four years. In the past four seasons the Greyhounds have hoisted the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Tournament Championship and made the coveted trip to the NCAA tournament only to lose in the first round.

"It is not our goal to just get into the national tournament, we want to and need to be successful in the tournament," head coach **Joe Mallia** said. "If we set our sights on just getting in we wouldn't set up the difficult non-conference schedule that we do year in and year out. That part of our schedule prepares us for the environment we will see in the tournament"

As they do set their sights on the 2004 campaign there is reason to believe things are on the verge of changing.

"Our staff believes that the difference makers for us need to be mentality and personnel," Mallia said. "The mentality is continuing to grow and that will be felt as our players mature. As for personnel, this fall will showcase the strongest group of talent the program has ever seen. We need to be able to pull all of this together"

Here's a look at the 2004 squad, position-by-position:

Forward

This season, the Greyhounds post great numbers, talent and depth in the forward spot. With the return of leading scorer **Carolyn Kennington** and the addition of Maryland transfer **Ali Andrzejewski** as well as a battery of other options up front, the Greyhounds should have no trouble scoring goals.

"In the past we've been notorious for our ability as a defensive team but our attack has become stronger in the past few years," Mallia said. "This season, our strength could be the front line."

Kennington, the squads leading scorer as a freshman in 2003 with a school-record 11 goals, will be looked upon to continue her work on the Loyola

frontline. Kennington, the 2003 MAAC Rookie of the Year, is not only a threat to her opponents on offense but is typically used on the defensive end as well.

Andrzejewski will be looked to for an immediate impact on the field for the 'Hounds. At Maryland, she led the Terrapins in scoring as a freshman and ranked third on the squad in 2003. She comes to the Evergreen with a stacked resume, having competed in the US National Pool for the past four years, being named to the Atlantic Coast Conference All-Rookie team in 2002 and just the highlight of her impressive high school career is having been named the Maryland State Player of the Year twice.

Senior **Jeannetta McGettigan** will be an instrumental leader of the attacking group, as the only senior at that position. McGettigan, No. 2 in scoring last season with four goals, will look to finish her career on a high note. McGettigan currently ranks 10th in Loyola history in all-time scoring with 34 points and with a strong senior campaign, could easily move much higher up the ranks.

Another true forward returning to the ranks will be sophomore **Katelyn Woods** who according to Mallia is "hands down the most improved player from 2003". Woods appeared in 12 games last season and although she did not tally any goals, gained valuable experience and portrayed tremendous growth in her ability as the season progressed.

Freshman **Tyhira Glenn** has the ability to make an immediate impact as a rookie. At Moorestown High School (N.J.), she was an all-state, all-region, all-county and all-area performer.

Midfield

In the past, the Greyhound midfield has been a young, inexperienced group of players. The work put in by those players will pay off in 2004.

"As a staff, we are excited by our midfield this fall," Mallia said. "This group has been young for the last two years but have now become what should be the core of our team for two more."

Junior **Ashley Kramer**, after being named the Rookie of the Year in 2002, completed a successful

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sophomore campaign. Kramer is one of many threats the Greyhounds pose to the goal as well as a physical player at midfield who possess excellent strength at winning 50/50 balls.

After starting in nearly every game as a freshman, sophomore **Courtney Arikian**, has the ability to take on a leadership role early in her career.

Arikian finished fourth in overall scoring in 2003 with two goals and five assists including two goals in the first round of the MAAC tournament. She has the uncanny ability and timing to find and feed her teammates in a position to score as well as take the ball in herself. After being named to the all-rookie and second-team all-conference squad as a freshman, Arikian will continue to gain recognition throughout her tenure at Loyola.

Sophomore **Kaitlin Klar** after playing defense in 2003, will be moved up to the midfield unit in 2004. She started 21 games in her freshman season and tallied two goals while being named to the all-rookie squad and second-team all-MAAC. After an impressive spring season at midfield, Klar will surely add to those numbers in the fall.

Junior **Naomi Daniels**, possibly the most gifted technical player for Loyola, will also be key to a successful midfield. Daniels has experience, having played in every contest since she arrived at the Evergreen and scoring a total of seven goals and seven assists to date.

Adding leadership and a great deal of experience to the midfield group will be senior **Leigh Ann Mastrini**. Mastrini, a captain, is instrumental in the Greyhounds success as a leader on and off the field.

Incoming freshman **Brittany Marano, Johanna Larkin** and **Sarah Orscheln** will add depth at midfield.

Defense

The core of Loyola's success in the past has relied on its tough defensive unit. That will continue in 2004. Captains **Lindsay Tracey** and **Lisa Jaffa** are the cornerstones of that success.

Tracey, a three-year starter, is a solid defender who also has the ability to score. She has tallied five goals and four assists in her career. Tracey is a true student of the game and the Greyhounds field commander.

Jaffa, a junior, has started for the past two seasons and continues to come into her own on the field. She is arguably one of the best one-on-one defenders on the team and possess terrific speed to win balls.

Sophomore **Caitilin McCusker**, a versatile player who will play in the back, is a terrific athlete who appeared in 20 of 22 games and earned a start in the MAAC Championship game. She proved herself worthy of it with the first goal in that game for a 2-0 win.

Senior **Ellen Sroka** will also contribute and bring added leadership to the defense. She has appeared in 57 games in her career, nabbing starts in 29 of those contests. Sroka has tallied six goals (two every season) for the Greyhounds and added two assists in her career.

Sophomore **Allie Hartrick** will add depth for the Greyhounds on defense.

"The thing that excites me most about this group of defenders is the speed and athleticism they possess," Mallia said. "We spent the spring trying to pull them together tactically and built a great foundation for the fall."

Goal

Just as they did in 2003, the Greyhounds return two talented keepers to goal, both experienced and capable for the job.

Senior **Erica Niemann** played every game of her sophomore season posting an impressive 0.72 goals against average. Last season, she earned the start in 10 games while sharing time with sophomore **Kate Gilfillan**. Gilfillan took a red-shirt as a freshman in 2002 but earned the starting spot in 12 games last season.
