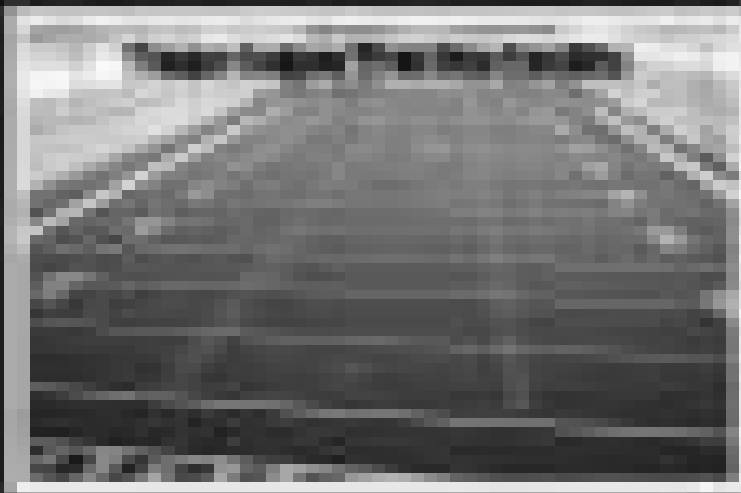
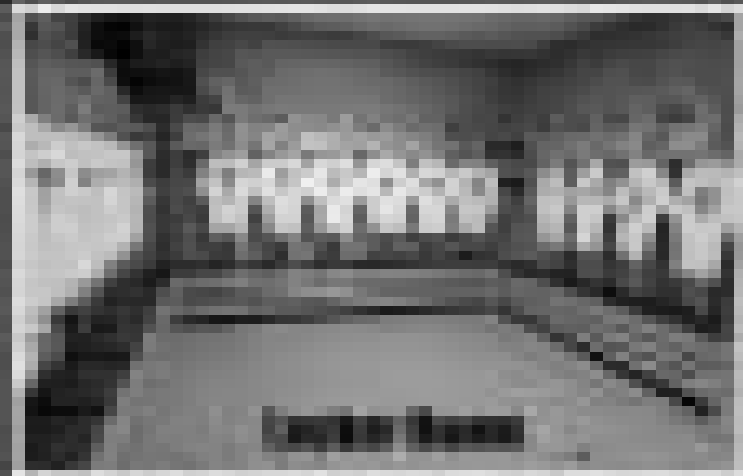
Top Soccer

Season Outlook



THE CARDINALS ARE READY TO BUILD A WINNING TRADITION

After setting a foundation last season the Cardinals are ready to build a winning tradition in 2007. The Cardinals made a dramatic improvement throughout the season last year and continued to make progress in the spring.

"We are very excited about the 2007 season," said head coach Ken Lolla. "We have high expectations because of the significant progress we have made over the past year. By the end of last season we felt we were playing our best soccer, gaining very good results in three of our final four matches while qualifying for our first BIG EAST Tournament."

"We carried that momentum into the spring and built on the successes of 2006. The spring was significant in defining ourselves and making a stronger commitment to being successful in all areas. That growth within the team and the addition of a very talented and competitive class creates an expectancy of success this season."

All the pieces are in place for the Cardinals to have a successful season. The biggest piece to the puzzle has been depth and the Cardinals will be very deep in every position this season. Along with that depth, the Cards have experience and talent to make some noise in the BIG EAST.

"We will be much deeper as a team than a year ago," said Lolla. "Having lost only two starters, we have added a large and deep class that have the talent to make an immediate impact. There will be more competition for playing time which will make us a much better team. Our strength will be in the balance and unity of the team rather than in the talent of individual players. The team has grown closer as a group and the benefit has shown on the field."

"We have a number of young players that have already experienced significant minutes against the best teams in the country. That experience will be very valuable this season. We also have added players with college and national team duty which will only increase our maturity as a team."

In Goal

The Cardinals are very deep in goal this season. Sophomore David Simolike returns after starting in 16 games last season. Senior Trae Manny returns after seeing action in two games last season. Adding depth in goal will be freshmen Jordan Kadlec and Andre Boudreaux.

"David Simolike logged most of the minutes in goal and gained tremendous experience in his first year," said Lolla. "He made tremendous strides throughout the

year and was very good down the stretch."

Simolike finished the year with a 4-9-3 record. He finished with a 1.28 goals against average and three shutouts.

"Trae Manny also saw some time last year and perhaps has grown the most under Jeremy Proud's guidance," Lolla said. "He is a good leader and is determined to reach his potential."

Manny saw action in two games, including one start last season. He finished with a 1-1 record and a 1.33 goals against average.

"We are also very excited about Jordan Kadlec who joined us in the spring after graduating high school early," Lolla said. "Although Jordan rehabbed his injury throughout most of the spring, the transition to college will have major benefits this fall. Jordan started for the Region II ODP team and is among the top young keepers in the country. He has shown the signs to have an immediate impact and will also push for time right away."

"We have also added highly regarded Andre Boudreaux," said Lolla. "He has a great work ethic and commitment to succeed and will round out a very strong unit in goal."

The Back Line

The Louisville back line returns a lot of

experience from last season. John Jonke and Dustin Dawes started every game for the Cardinals in 2006 while Joey Watson, Ryan McDonald and Chase Kreger also saw time in the lineup. The core of experience combined with a talented group of newcomers create a Cardinal defense that could be the best in school history.

"We have become a better unit in the back and that was indicative as we progressed through the fall," said Lolla. "We will be athletic, strong and good in the air with a strong commitment to limit chances. We have a number of players that played meaningful minutes last season in defense. Dustin Dawes and John Jonke return the most experience."

Dawes started every game for the Cardinals as a freshman, making him one of the Cardinals' best defenders. Jonke has been a starter for the Cardinals the last two seasons.

"Dustin played in the center throughout the season and as a freshmen saw as much time as anyone on the team," said Lolla. "He has continued to grow throughout the spring and should factor into the backline. John is versatile enough to play anywhere in the back. His athleticism and ability to go forward makes him a tremendous asset."

Watson, a senior, has seen significant time as a starter in the backfield the last three seasons. McDonald moved from the midfield to the back field last season and saw a lot of success on defense. Like McDonald, Kreger also moved to defense last season.

"Joey Watson also saw significant minutes at right back and had a great spring," Lolla said. "His leadership and work ethic will add value to the team both on and off the

field. Ryan McDonald made a surge into the lineup midway through the season and had an impact at right back. His ability in the air makes him a threat on any deadball situation. Chase Kreger made a successful transition to the back in the spring and will push for time this season."

Joining the returnees is a talent stable of newcomers. Highlighting the newcomers is Saint Louis transfer Simeon Steward and New Zealand national team player Phil Edginton.

"Simeon Steward joined us in the spring from St. Louis University and will expect to add depth at the outside back position," said Lolla. "In addition we have added Phil Edginton, who will be coming off a summer stint with the New Zealand U.20 National Team at the World Championships in Canada. Phil is very good in the air, athletic and competitive. He will be a very good addition to our back line."

"Austin Berry is cut from the same mold as Edginton but hails from Cincinnati, Ohio. Austin is a person of great character and leadership ability and will add to the value of the team immediately. Luis Pacheco will add depth as a left sided player. He has a very good mind for the game and the fight and determination to succeed."

The Midfield

Last season the midfield was the most improved position on the team. While the Cardinals lost All-BIG EAST performer David Guzman they return a talented core of players that played significant minutes last season.

"The midfield will be talented and deep," said Lolla. "We return many young players

that have seen significant action in the very competitive BIG EAST. Deep in the midfield we return O.T. Yanez, Nate Gerstle and Zach Hernan."

Senior Nate Gerstle had probably the best season of his career last year. He will be counted on to provide leadership in the middle.

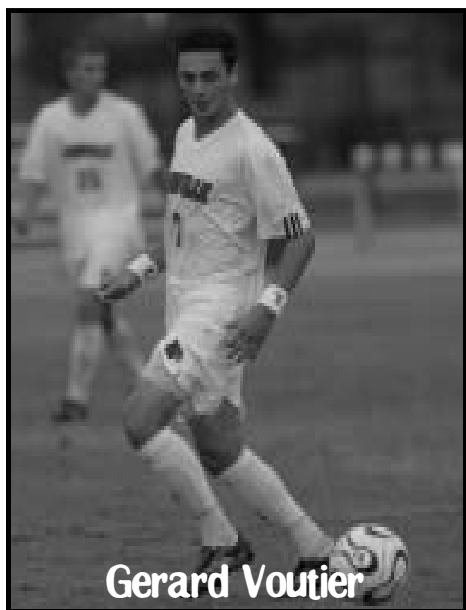
"Nate is a person of high integrity and has a great work ethic," Lolla said. "His will to win and desire to succeed makes him a great asset to the team. He played a major role in our success at the end of 2006 and will be expected to hold down the midfield this season."

Sophomores Yanez and Hernan saw a lot of time in the midfield as freshmen. Yanez had an impressive freshman season, after missing the beginning of the year with an injury. He led all the freshmen in scoring last season with two goals and one assist. Hernan saw action in 16 games last season.

"O.T. is perhaps our most talented returning player," said Lolla. "He has the versatility to play in many different spots and have an impact. Zach had an excellent spring and will certainly factor into the midfield. His confidence has grown. His tireless workrate allows him to be effective on both sides of the ball."

Freshman Kenney Walker could be an impact player for the Cardinals. He is a three time NSCAA adidas All-American.

"Along with the possibility of Zach, Nate and OT at the deep midfield spots we have added Kenney Walker," Lolla said. "Kenney played with the U.15 and U.17 National Team and was a NSCAA High School All-American. He is a gifted player that has excellent feet

and a great feel for the game. We expect Kenney to have an immediate impact on the team."

The dangerous junior Gerard Voutier returns as the second leading scorer this season. He will lead the attack in the midfield. Also contributing to the attack will be sophomores Bryan Kanu, Freddie Braun, and Steve Sloan along with senior Anthony Celebre.

"In the attacking roles we return Gerard Voutier, Steve Sloan, Bryan Kanu, Anthony Celebre and Freddie Braun," said Lolla. "Gerard has grown into the attacking midfield role and has become more dangerous. He serves a great ball on restarts that will make our ability in the air that much more effective. Freddie is also creative and very versatile. He can play in many spots in the midfield and the back. His tireless workrate allows him to be effective on both sides of the ball."

"Steve and Bryan have grown tremendously throughout the first year. Both have made gains this spring in the physical aspect of the game as well as in confidence. We expect both of them to be even more effective this season. Anthony will add experience and grit to a young group of midfielders."

The newcomers this season will challenge the veterans for playing time this season. The Cardinals will be very deep with the new additions to the lineup. Highlighting that group are transfers Aaron Clapham and Gerardo Chavez. Clapham who recently competed for the New Zealand U.20 National Team this summer. Chavez was a top scorer at Lindenwood his freshman season.

"We have made some significant additions to this group of midfielders in

experience and talent," Lolla said. "Aaron Clapham, a transfer from St. Francis University, joins us. He was a two year starter at St. Francis and was their leading scorer in 2006. Aaron also represented New Zealand U.20's in Canada this summer as a teammate of Phil Edginton. His experience and passing ability will certainly make us more dangerous in the attack. Gerardo Chavez also brings talent and experience. He transferred from Lindenwood College where he had a stellar freshman season. Gerardo has tremendous speed and ability to break defenders down. He will be very exciting to watch."

"As freshmen, we add JT Murray and Nolan Chandler. Both are talented and athletic with an ability to create and score goals. Both are versatile players and can have an impact in a number of spots."

The Attack

The Cardinal attack will be anchored by the senior duet of Frank Jonke and Marco Terminesi. Kanu, a sophomore, could split time between the midfield and the frontline.

Jonke led the team in scoring last year and earned second team All-BIG EAST honors. Jonke led the team in goals with seven and in assist with four on the year.

"Frank Jonke returns as our most dangerous attacking player," said Lolla. "As an All-Big East performer a year ago, Frank is ready for a great season. His size and strength coupled with his rugged determination makes him one of the conference's most dangerous players. He will certainly play a major role in our success."

Terminesi returns for his senior season after nursing injuries the last two years. Kanu will also add depth up front for the Cardinals.

"Joining Frank will be Marco Terminesi," Lolla said. "Marco has recovered from an injury from the fall to have a very good spring. Frank and Marco will combine to be a force on the attack. Bryan Kanu also saw minutes as a forward a year ago and likewise has the strength and speed to be a force in the final third."

Schedule

Once again the Cardinals will be battle tested in league play. Highlighting the nonconference slate is Final Four participant Wake Forest and the Indiana Hoosiers.

"We will again have one of the toughest schedules in the country," said Lolla. "We welcome the opportunity to measure ourselves against the best. It is only in that environment that we will grow to our potential and reach our goals. Our out of conference schedule features some of the best teams in the country highlighted by a match on FSC against 2006 College Cup participants Wake Forest. We also feature home matches against Indiana and Ohio State."

"The BIG EAST conference schedule is long and tough. We must stay tuned into each and every match and its significance to winning the BIG EAST."

The one thing that could hold the Cardinals back from success this season is the schedule. How well they focus night in and night out against the best competition in the nation will determine their success.

"We are excited about the opportunity the schedule provides and look forward to the challenges of the season," said Lolla.

Ken Lolla



When it comes to building a soccer program into a national power, head coach Ken Lolla has the midas touch. When the University of Louisville moved into the BIG EAST Conference in 2005, they needed to find a coach that could take a program with no winning tradition and make it into a contender in the toughest league in the nation.

Lolla came to Louisville with an impressive 16 year coaching resume. In his previous 16 seasons, Lolla had never had a losing season. In his first head coaching job, Lolla guided Belmont Abbey to a No. 6 national ranking in three years. He guided Akron to national prominence in his 13 seasons with the Zips.

In his first season with the Cardinals, Lolla doubled Louisville's BIG EAST win total from the previous season to finish with a 4-5-1 record. The Cardinals also qualified for the BIG EAST Tournament, making its first league tournament appearance in three seasons.

The Cardinals made a dramatic improvement at the end of the season. Lolla's first squad finished their last three league games with a perfect record of 1-0-2.

Lolla came to Louisville after guiding Akron

to its most successful season in school history with an impressive 18-1-4 record in the 2005 season. Lolla guided the Zips to a final ranking of fifth in the nation by the NSCAA/adidas poll and at one point in the season the Zips were ranked at the top of the polls.

Lolla guided the Zips to their eighth Mid-American Conference Regular Season title and their fourth MAC Tournament title. He was named MAC Coach of the Year for the fourth time. The Zips advanced to the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight and tied eventual national champion Maryland but in the final outcome fell 4-1 in penalty kicks. Akron also became the only school with two players named first team NSCAA All-Americans and a third player named to the second team.

Lolla spent the last 13 seasons at the University of Akron. During his tenure at Akron he compiled a 160-68-25 record along with eight MAC Championships and a school record, five straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

In 2004 Lolla directed the Zips to the

MAC Tournament title and a then school record fourth-consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. The Zips finished the season with a record of 13-5-3, making Lolla the all-time winningest coach in the program's storied 50-year history.

In 2003 Lolla's Zips finished 15-5-2 and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament. Akron also became the first-ever MAC school to earn a tournament seeding, claiming the No. 15 spot and a first-round bye.

During the 2002 season the Zips made their second-consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament and won their second MAC Tournament championship.

That came after a 2001 season which was marked by several milestones for Lolla and his team. He notched his 100th coaching victory at Akron on Oct. 14, 2001 with a 1-0 win over Wright State. After a 10-6-1 season

and second-place finishes in the Mid-American Conference regular season standings and tournament, the Zips became the first MAC school to receive an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Lolla's Akron squads were 62-9-5 all-time in regular-season MAC play and he has tutored 38 first-team All-MAC players.

In 1998, the Zips captured the regular-season MAC title with a 7-0-1 mark, and won their first MAC tournament title with a 4-1 win over Bowling Green to advance to the NCAA Tournament. Lolla earned his third MAC Coach of the Year honors and was named the NSCAA Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year.

The 1999 season brought Akron an unbeaten mark of 6-0-1 and its third-consecutive MAC title. Although the Zips posted a 4-2-0 MAC mark in 2000, they finished in a four-way tie for first place during

the regular season.

In 1993, his first Akron squad captured the school's initial MAC title with a perfect 5-0-0 league mark. In 1995 the Zips once again went through MAC play 5-0-0 record. Lolla earned MAC Coach of the Year honors both seasons.

Lolla has also taken his skills to the national level. In the fall of 1999, he was appointed head coach of the U.S. Soccer Federation Under-15 National Team. His travels with the national team have taken him around the world, including stops in Italy and South America.

Prior to his stint at Akron, Lolla posted a 49-16-3 record in three seasons at Belmont Abbey in Belmont, N.C., including a 19-3-2 mark in 1992. The Crusaders were the sixth-ranked team in the NAIA that season.

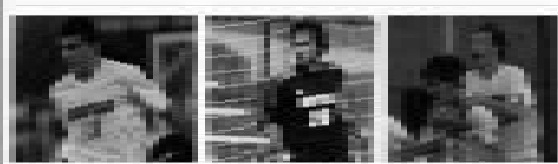

Championships which earned Lolla numerous accolades. He was named the Carolinas Conference Coach of the Year in 1990. In 1992, Lolla received NSCAA-NAIA National Coach of the Year honors.

As a player Lolla was considered one of the finest midfielders in the Atlantic Coast Conference, earning all-conference honors three times and earned All-South and All-America honors in 1981 and 1983 while at Duke University. In 2002 he was one of 55 players named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Soccer Team.

Lolla played professionally for the Canton Invaders of the National Professional Soccer League from 1984 through 1988. In 1984, Lolla played professionally with the Charlotte Gold of the USL. He then moved to the Canton Invaders of the NPSL and finished his playing career with the New Jersey Eagles and the Penn-Jersey Spirit of the ASL in 1988 and 1989, respectively.

He also served as the Youth Development Director for the Canton Invaders in 1985 and 1986. He handled community and public relations in 1987 and 1988 in conjunction with appearances as a player for the NPSL franchise.

Following his professional career, Lolla returned to Duke as an assistant coach in 1985 and then again for the 1988 and 1989 seasons.

Lolla holds a bachelor's degree in biology from Duke, which he received in 1983. He was a high school All-America pick in 1980 at St. Rose High School in Belmar, N.J. and also played on the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival teams in 1979 and 1983.

While playing in Canton, Ohio, Lolla, 45, met his wife the former Tina Bowman. The couple resides in Louisville with their three children, 10 year-old Tyler, 6 year-old Kristiana, and 4 year-old Elijah.

Robert Craig is in his first season with the Louisville men's soccer staff. Craig joined the staff in February after a three year stint as head coach at Saint Francis University.

Craig guided his 2006 Saint Francis squad to the school's first-ever appearance in the Northeast Conference championship match. He led the Red Flash to a 10-7-3 mark, tying a school record, which was previously set in Craig's second season with the program in 2004.

In four seasons with Saint Francis, Craig recorded a 31-31-13 career mark, which is second on the school's all-time coaching wins list. He led the Red Flash to its first two NEC Tournament appearances. Craig was named Northeast Conference Coach of the Year in 2004.

Craig joined the Red Flash staff after serving as an assistant coach at Dartmouth College from 1998-2003. In the fall of 2002, he helped lead the perennial Ivy League power to a conference championship and a 9-7-1 final record. The Big Green posted a 5-1-1 league mark and finished the 2002 season ranked third in the Northeast Region. Craig also helped direct the Big Green to an NCAA Tournament berth in 2000.

Prior to joining the Dartmouth staff, Craig served as an assistant coach at his alma mater Gordon College in Wenham, Mass., from 1995-96. During his tenure at Gordon, the Fighting Scots posted a 30-8-4 record and qualified for the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Tournament both seasons.

Craig is a 1993 graduate of Gordon College with a bachelor's degree in mathematics. He lettered three seasons for Gordon College, helping lead them to a Commonwealth Coast Conference championship in 1992. Craig earned a master's degree in education from the University of Massachusetts Lowell in 1997. He is a member of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and holds a USSF B License.

2006 Highlights



Lolla Has Cards Rolling

Anyone following men's soccer at Louisville knew that the school got a steal in first year head coach Ken Lolla when he decided to take over the program following a successful 18-4-1 season at Akron in 2005. Inheriting a young team, with only four seniors, Lolla guided the Cardinals to a 5-10-3 record that included four Big East conference wins, two of which were on the road.

The 2006 season provided glimpses of what to look for in Ken Lolla's teams, including an aggressive offense and stifling defense that kept the Cardinals close in every contest of the season. With many of the Cardinals top performers being underclassmen in 2006, the future of Louisville soccer looks bright for many years to come.

Guzman and Jonke Collect Honors

Midfielder David Guzman and forward Frank Jonke were named to the All-Big East teams by the leagues coaches. Guzman earned first team honors for the second year in a row, while Jonke made his first appearance as an all-conference selection on the second team.

Lolla was proud to have his sensational junior tandem selected to the teams, and recognized that the honors were "a reflection of all the hard work our team has put in this season" alluding to the off-season conditioning, hard practices, and grueling games that helped make the recognitions possible for his two juniors.

Guzman earned his repeat selection by leading the team in points with 19 that included seven goals and five assists.

Jonke was just behind him with 18 total

points on the year, with a tying seven goals and four assists that placed him second on the team.

Taking On the Nation's No. 1

The Cardinals got an up close and personal look at where they would like to get in the polls when they traveled to College Park, Maryland for the seasons first road game to take on the No. 1 ranked Maryland Terrapins. Louisville did more than just show up for the game as they held tight with the Terrapins all game long before losing 1-2. The upset would have given Louisville two straight years of knocking off a No. 1 after beating Connecticut at home when they were the nation's top team in 2005.

Senior Ryan Meyer scored the lone goal for Louisville during the 82nd minute of play off a perfect assists from David Guzman that gave him a shot 25 yards out that hit in the high-left portion of the goal. Cardinal goal keeper David Simolike finished with four saves to help hold the defending national champions to only two goals.

Nothing like a Rivalry Game

You never know what can happen when Louisville and Kentucky meet up to play in any sport. The 2006 soccer contest between the two did not disappoint in terms of fierce play and tense moments, and may have been the most exciting finish all season long.

At the end of the double-overtime contest, which was the fifth overtime in the series, there were no winners or losers as the Wildcats and Cardinals had to accept a tie. Simolike forced the overtime with a save in the 86th minute to keep the score knotted at 1-1. Then in the first overtime the Cardinals had the closest shot to end the game when Gerard Voutier's shot at the

start of the period was barely stopped by the Kentucky keeper.

The 1-1 score was the first of three tie finishes the Cardinals would accumulate at seasons end as they had the same decision in the final two games of the regular season on the road in Big East play. The first, at Rutgers, was also played to two overtime periods, with neither team coming up with a goal to finish at 0-0.

Four Freshmen with Goals

Othaniel Yanez, Steve Sloan, Bryan Kanu, and Dustin Dawes all wasted no time getting their names into the stat book as freshman. What better sign for a first year head coach than to see your youngest players, who you hope can lead your team in the future, score a goal during their first collegiate playing experiences?

Yanez led the way for the freshmen, scoring two goals on the year and adding an assist. The remaining three all finished with one goal a piece and Steve Sloan also contributed an assist.

Getting Tournament Ready

Louisville may not have made it to the NCAA tournament in 2006, but they got plenty of experience against teams that did, which can only help them as they ready themselves for their own run in 2007. Eight teams that the Cardinals faced made it into the field, many from their own conference.

Those eight teams include Cincinnati, Indiana, Maryland, Notre Dame, Providence, Rutgers, St. Johns, and West Virginia. The Big East got seven bids into the NCAA Championship out of the 48 team field.

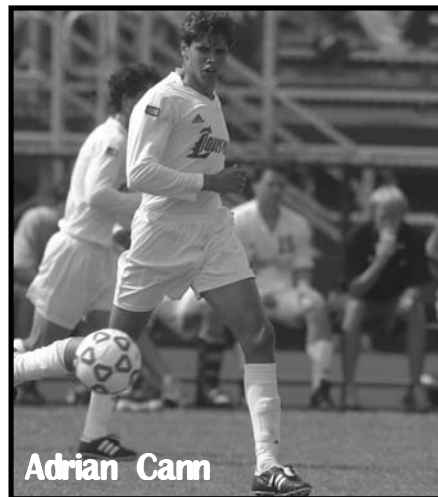
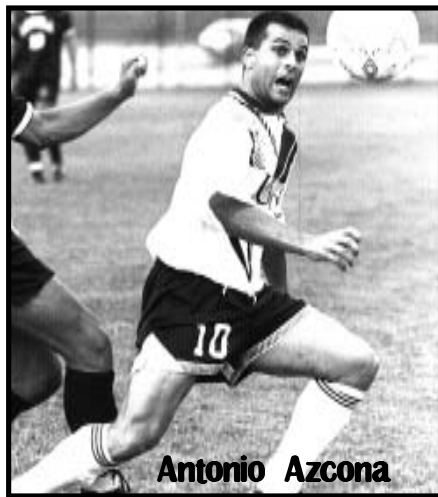

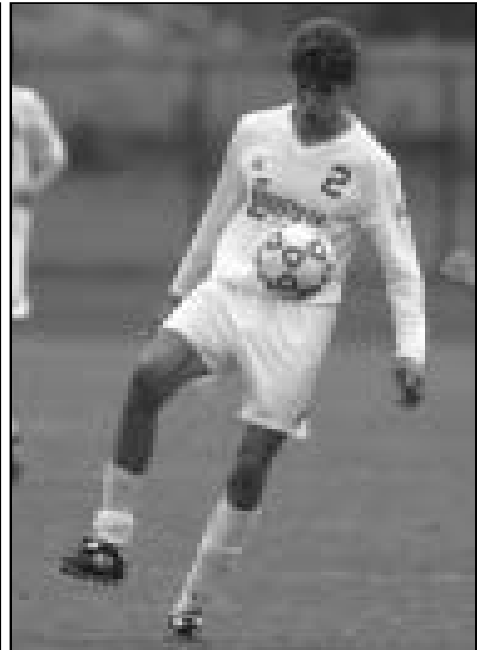

“One of the Nation’s Top Metropolitan Universities”

The University of Louisville offers a real-world education for its students and much needed services for the community

Dare to be great.

When the University of Louisville adopted that simple motto in the winter of 2000, it challenged itself and its community to strive for excellence. It also sent a message to the nation that Kentucky’s metropolitan research university is on the verge of greatness.

One of the nation’s oldest metropolitan universities, U of L has a long-standing reputation in areas such as business, law, engineering and medicine. The university is building on that reputation, establishing itself as a national leader in areas ranging from the humanities to entrepreneurship, from logistics and distribution to music composition, from social work to nursing and dentistry.

In 1998, U of L announced its Challenge for Excellence, a program designed to raise the university to national prominence within 10 years. Efficiency on campus has been improved in recent years and university funds have been refocused on high-priority programs.

The effort already has paid off through national attention on the university and through benefits to the citizens of Louisville, Kentucky, Indiana and other areas around the nation and the world.

In fall 2000, the university was one of 147 universities to achieve the Doctoral/Research University-Extensive designation from the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching.

U of L’s transplantation research program received international acclaim in 1999 after performing only the second successful hand transplant in the world.

A new Cardiovascular Innovation Institute, a partnership with Louisville’s Jewish Hospital, will focus on the development, testing and clinical delivery of leading-edge treatments for heart failure.

The Institute for Cellular Therapeutics, which relocated to U of L from Philadelphia in 1998 as part of the Challenge for Excellence, is working on leading-edge immunosuppression research

that soon may lead to better, less risky transplantation procedures and treatments for diseases ranging from cancer to sickle cell anemia.

U of L’s entrepreneurship program, ranked among the nation’s top 10 by *Success* magazine, has helped its students launch several successful ventures and is grooming tomorrow’s business leaders.

Its logistics and distribution program works with the United Parcel Service hub and other Louisville-area businesses to improve delivery systems throughout the world.

Its School of Education works closely with Louisville-area schools and others throughout the state to continue refining Kentucky’s nationally acclaimed efforts to reform education in grades K through 12.

Through the presentation of its \$200,000 Grawnmeier Award for Music Composition, U of L’s music school has built one of the world’s best collections of contemporary music.

And U of L’s Brandeis School of Law, which was one of the first in the nation to require pro bono work as part of its curriculum, boasts a student body that has won several national competitions in recent years.

U of L has begun to gain recognition on the national level in a variety of ways. A *Wall Street Journal* article cited U of L as being among the top 30 schools in the nation for sending students to elite graduate schools. And *Consumers Digest* rated the university 25th in the Top 50 Best Values for Public Colleges and Universities based on academic excellence, educational quality and costs of attendance for the 2003-2004 academic year.

U of L’s students also have gained national recognition in 2004. U of L ranked seventh in the nation in the number of students receiving



Fulbright English teaching assistantships in 2004. The university ranked seventh among schools in the South for producing Fulbright research fellows.

And U of L’s Debate Program finished fifth in the National Debate Tournament.

Most students study on the Belknap Campus. Located in the heart of Kentucky’s largest city, the park-like campus is noted for its combination of historical and contemporary buildings. Three motion picture companies filmed on campus this year alone.



The City of Louisville



The Louisville area owes its existence to the Falls of the Ohio, the only place where the 981-mile river flows over bedrock. The falls were really a rapids where the river dropped about 27 feet in three miles, usually blocking passage by boat.

Early explorers recognized the strategic importance of the Falls. George Rogers Clark established the first settlement there in 1778, to use as a base for invasion of British territory in Southern Illinois and Indiana. Two years later that settlement became Louisville -- named for King Louis XVI of France, who was supporting the American Revolution.

Louisville quickly became a vital transportation center for the young nation. Ports were established above and below the Falls. Passengers and freight moved overland around the rapids. Trails and roads connected the ports to inland settlements in Kentucky and Indiana. The steamboat brought prosperity and growth to the area; by 1850, Louisville was the 10th largest city in the nation.

In the decades that followed, railroads greatly improved connections with cities throughout the nation, and Louisville became known as the "Gateway to the South." Businesses and industries were attracted by the strong and convenient transportation network and Louisville became an industrial center.

In recent years, the economy of the Louisville area has shifted from a heavy reliance on industry to an increasing emphasis on services, including transportation. Once again, location is a key factor. Louisville is located near the center of the eastern half of the contiguous 48 states, with nearly half of the

nation's consumer markets within a 500-mile radius. The climate is mild enough that Louisville's airport is rarely closed because of weather.

Climate, location and a good transportation system helped convince United Parcel Service to establish its national hub in Louisville in the early 1980s. UPS, in turn, is attracting business that depend on fast and efficient transportation of their goods to other parts of the nation and throughout the world.

The Kentucky Center for the Arts is one of the nation's premier performing arts facilities, housing three spacious theatres.

Sports, including U of L athletics, are an important facet of life in the Louisville area. Churchill Downs has hosted three Breeders' Cups and continues its traditional Run For The Roses each May. The 1996 and 2000 PGA Championships, which sold out nearly a year in advance, were staged at Valhalla Golf Course in eastern Jefferson County. The Louisville Bats, the triple-A baseball team of the Cincinnati Reds, drew over one million fans to games in a single season. Over 140 public parks, 20 public golf courses and 226 public tennis courts also provide outdoor entertainment.

Yet even though Louisville has changed through the years, it still has the flavor and gentleness of a Southern town. The Belle of Louisville steamboat still paddles its way up and down the Ohio River daily, mint juleps are still served under an old oak tree during the hot

and muggy summers and fishing in the many lakes and rivers of Louisville and surrounding counties is still a favorite pastime.

Another favorite in Louisville is trying to figure out the correct pronunciation of the city. So if you're a tourist, don't say Louie-ville or Lewis-ville. Natives claim it's Lou-a-vuhl. Either way, Louisville is still the same happy place.



Athletic Director



Growth, innovation, achievement and excellence have been the trademarks of Tom Jurich's tenure as the Vice-President for Athletics at the University of Louisville for the last 10 years.

Jurich's unyielding desire to succeed has driven him to the pinnacle of college athletics and has put the University of Louisville on the national scene. Since coming to the Derby City in 1997, Jurich has been the man behind the continued development of the university's entire athletic program.

Jurich's desire and vision for the University of Louisville has led the division to unprecedented development and accomplishment. For his efforts, he was selected as the Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal/Sports Business Daily Athletic Director of the Year in 2007.

From facilities to gender equity, from community involvement to national leadership, Jurich's actions prompted one state media outlet to recently write that "It all shows yet again that the hiring of Tom Jurich, the architect of this Louisville emergence, as U of L AD in the fall of 1997 stands as one of the most significant events in our state's modern sports history." After just eight years working his constructive efforts, he was inducted into the state of Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 2006.

U of L took a dramatic step toward maintaining that upward trend by signing Jurich to an unprecedented contract extension in December of 2006 that will keep him with the Cardinals through 2023. U of L President Dr. James Ramsey enhanced Jurich's contract again last year. In an unprecedented appointment, he was named Vice President for Athletics at U of L in 2003.

Since Jurich was named Director of Athletics for the Cardinals on Oct. 21, 1997, there has been an unmatched flurry of activity on the U of L campus and Louisville area since his arrival.

Jurich continues to push U of L to the forefront of college athletics. While diligently working to keep the Cardinals on the cutting edge nationally, Jurich has turned heads while quickly guiding major changes in the face of Cardinal Athletics including:

- Engineering U of L's historic move to the Big East Conference, which has a long-term relationship with the lucrative Bowl Championship Series. This is the Cards' second year in the league.

- Attracting sixth-year men's basketball coach Rick Pitino to U of L, a move many deemed impossible. Pitino's arrival has energized the Cards' tradition-rich program and quickly restored it to a position among the nation's top teams. U of L capped a 33-5 record in 2004-05 by returning to the Final Four for the first time in 19 years.

- Taking a major step in achieving gender equity, upgrading funding and support staff for existing women's programs while adding four new sports — softball, golf, rowing and lacrosse (in 2008). Jurich's

efforts also moved field hockey, women's soccer and baseball to fully-funded programs. He received the Citizens for Sports Equity 2000 Sports Leadership Award and was honored as the Louisvillian of the Year in 2005 by the Louisville Urban League Guild.

- Rapidly building the football program from the ground up. The Cardinals have been ranked in the top seven in two of the last three seasons, including the school's first BCS Bowl berth in 2006.

- Addressing multiple facility needs, including an extensive sports park to serve as a front lawn for the University. Owsley B. Frazier Cardinal Park features Ulmer Stadium (softball), Trager Stadium (field hockey artificial surface field), a soccer field surrounded by a state-of-the-art track, fitness trail, outdoor basketball and sand volleyball courts and a playground. Three new facilities opened in 2005: Jim Patterson Stadium (baseball), Ralph Wright Natatorium and the Trager Center indoor fieldhouse. The YUM Center Practice Facility will be finished this year and will house the men's basketball and women's volleyball and lacrosse programs.

- Strengthening U of L's athletic administration by enlarging the compliance department with the school's first associate athletic director for compliance and adding the school's first female associate athletic director/senior woman administrator.

- Placing U of L on the cutting edge of sports medicine with a comprehensive partnership with Louisville's world-renowned Jewish Hospital.

- Bolstering the community outreach arm of U of L athletics, developing CardsCare and CardsFIT to promote student-athlete community involvement.

- Academic success has risen dramatically during Jurich's watch as well. There 130 BIG EAST Academic All-Stars named for the 2005-2006 season plus 11 named to the 2005 Big East Football All-Academic team. The 2006 Big East Football All-Academic team had 12 members this year. There were numbers for the 2006 Fall semester were 296 of 643, including spirit groups, managers and trainers. For the 2007 Spring semester, we were 290 of 595, including spirit groups, managers and trainers (231 of 458 without those three groups).

Jurich's high energy, community and family-minded approach has been contagious, infecting the university, city and U of L fans everywhere with a positive outlook for the future of Cardinal Athletics. It is a formula that has provided a trail of success in each situation Jurich has touched.

Jurich has been active in the scope of college athletics on a national level, within conference issues, and in his local community. He served three years as a member of the NCAA Management Council, one of the top legislative bodies of the NCAA, and the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee. He sits on the Board of Directors for Republic Bank, Willpower Foundation

and American Heart Association.

Jurich recently received the Louisvillian of the Year Award by the Louisville Advertising Federation and the Dan Mangeot Memorial Award, for contributions to the advancement of tourism and hospitality.

Guiding Colorado State University as its athletics director for the four years prior to his arrival at U of L, Jurich oversaw not only one of the most successful time periods in the school's history in terms of on-field competitiveness, but he was the driving force behind a successful capital campaign drive that included facility renovation.

Prior to his constructive efforts at Colorado State, Jurich operated as director of athletics for eight years at his alma mater, Northern Arizona University. When appointed at NAU, he was the youngest director of athletics at the NCAA Division I level at the age of 29.

He became athletic director at Northern Arizona in 1988, after previously serving as co-director (1986-88) and assistant director ('84-86). He was inducted to the NAU Sports Hall of Fame in 1989.

Jurich is among the finest football players in Northern Arizona history. A punter, placekicker and backup quarterback for the Lumberjacks, Jurich earned first-team Kodak All-America honors in 1977 — the first collegiate kicker to make the Kodak honor list — and also received All-America acclaim from The Sporting News. He is the only kicker in Big Sky Conference history to be named the league's offensive player of the year (1977).

A 10th-round NFL draft pick of the Pittsburgh Steelers, Jurich later played with the Minnesota Vikings before a brief coaching stint at the University of Minnesota.

He and his wife, Terrilynn, a former Miss Wyoming, have four children: sons Mark, an outfielder in the Atlanta Braves organization, and Brian; and twin daughters, Haley and Lacey.





University President

University of Louisville President James Ramsey has worked aggressively during his five-year tenure to move UofL to its state-mandated goal of becoming a pre-eminent metropolitan institution of higher learning.

Dr. Ramsey has identified five strategic areas of focus for the campus:

- Continued commitment to educational quality
- Growing extramural research
- Enhancing campus diversity
- Building community partnerships and
- Ensuring accountability to taxpayers, students and donors.

The quality of U of L's freshman class has improved each year, with the average ACT score of incoming freshmen climbing to 24.2 in 2006 from 20.7 in 1995. What's more, the university's students are claiming a much larger share of the nation's most prestigious academic honors.

A record seven UofL students received Fulbright Awards in spring 2007, bringing the school's five-year total to 19 student winners. An additional half dozen students earned other international scholarships this spring.

Ramsey also has created a university culture focused on conducting research that improves the quality of life for people in Kentucky and beyond. This research already has led to major milestones in health care, business and the environment. Today, U of L's volume of federal research funding is four times higher than it was seven years ago, and

the university has become America's fastest growing research university in National Institutes of Health funding.

Ramsey also has set the tone for encouraging diversity on campus. U of L has reached or made substantial progress on all eight of its goals set in The Kentucky Plan for Equal Opportunities.

The university's ties with its community have never been stronger. Not only has U of L been a major player in the award-winning Partnership for a Green City with Jefferson County Public Schools and Louisville Metro government, it has launched a Signature Partnership Initiative to improve education, health care, social services and economic opportunity in Louisville's West End.

As U of L has continued to advance toward meeting its state-mandated goals, it has been significantly underfunded by the state relative to its peer institutions — a true indicator of its accountability and stewardship.

The university has been so successful, in fact, that it concluded its 10-year, 11-point Challenge for Excellence strategic plan more than a year ahead of schedule. Ramsey is leading development of a new strategic plan, which will be unveiled by fall 2007, to carry the university through 2020.

A strong commitment to serving the community and commonwealth is nothing new for Ramsey. Before assuming U of L's top post, he served as senior policy advisor and state budget director for the Commonwealth of Kentucky and senior professor of economics and public policy at U of L.

He also has held several other positions in state government, serving as interim commissioner of the Office of the New Economy and special advisor to the chairman of the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education.

On the academic side, he has served as vice chancellor for finance and administration at both University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and Western Kentucky University. He has been associate dean, assistant dean and director of public administration in the

College of Business Administration at Loyola University and a research associate for the University of Kentucky's Center for Public Affairs.

He has served on the faculties of UNC, WKU, UK, Loyola University and Middle Tennessee State University.

A frequent national speaker and writer on economic issues in the public sector, Ramsey received the National Governors Association's Outstanding Public Service Award in 2001 and was named Kentucky's Distinguished Economist of the Year in 1999.

A Kentucky native, he holds a bachelor's degree in business administration from Western Kentucky University and master's and doctoral degrees in economics from UK. Sharing his commitment to public service is his wife, Jane Ramsey, who is involved in a host of community activities and organizations. She heads an effort to beautify U of L's Belknap Campus and revitalize its surrounding South Louisville neighborhood. That effort is highlighted by the upcoming renovation of Stansbury Park, which borders the Belknap Campus. That Olmsted-designed park is being restored to its former glory thanks to partnerships among the university, Louisville Metro and the Olmsted Conservancy.

The Ramseys have two daughters. Jenny, an Auburn University graduate, has recently completed her nursing degree at UofL. Jacque is a junior at UofL.

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BIG EAST Conference



In 2007-08, the BIG EAST will be in its third academic year as a 16-member conference. While many outside the league were curious and sometimes skeptical of the long-term prospects of the largest Division I-A conference, the student-athletes concentrated on their tasks at hand and continued the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned plenty of recognition at the highest levels in 2006-07. In basketball, the Georgetown men's team and the Rutgers women's team each advanced to their respective Final Fours with Rutgers playing in the national championship game.

The 2006 football season was the BIG EAST's best ever. Louisville, West Virginia and Rutgers all finished in the top 12 in the final national polls. The BIG EAST posted a 5-0 bowl record and won the ESPN Bowl Challenge Cup.

On the diamond, the Louisville baseball team played its way to the College World Series. In softball, DePaul also participated in the College World Series. The Notre Dame women's soccer team advanced to the NCAA title game and the Connecticut field hockey team made it to the Final Four.

The BIG EAST took the men's and women's M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the top individual award in soccer. The winners were Joseph Lapira and Kerri Hanks, both of Notre Dame.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 student-athletes have won individual national titles.



The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors. Last year in football, Brian Leonard of Rutgers won the Draddy Award, known as the academic Heisman. In addition, Rhema Fuller of Connecticut and Jay Henry of West Virginia were named national scholar-athlete award winners by the National Football Foundation.

Louisville field hockey standout Jessica Javelet, the 2006 BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year, was named first team academic all-America. The Louisville team was recognized by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association for the highest team GPA in the nation for a second straight year.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women took home the NCAA crowns. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last nine NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last eight NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities.

Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads. The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.



Academic Advising



The University of Louisville Athletic Academic Services Office assists each student-athlete in planning their academic career through a variety of services. The University of Louisville achieved several academic milestones during the 2005-06 year. Below is a list of student-athlete academic accomplishments for 2006-07:

- 157 student-athletes (199 including spirit squads and managers) were named Red and Black Scholar Athletes (3.25 cumulative GPA or better). The 199 total is a new high.
- 10 of 18 teams had a 3.0 or higher in the Fall 2006 semester. 9 of 18 teams had a 3.0 or higher in the Spring 2007 semester
- Field Hockey earned the highest GPA for the fall with a 3.600 and the spring with a 3.577



- Field Hockey earned the 2006 National Field Hockey Coaches Association Division I National Academic Team Award. The Cardinals were ranked first in the nation with a 3.600 GPA. This marks the second consecutive year that Louisville has posted the nation's highest field hockey GPA.

- Three-time Field Hockey All-American and ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American®, Jessica Javelet graduated with a perfect 4.0 GPA and was named the College of Business outstanding spring student and was the student commencement speaker for the 2007 Spring Graduation. She has been selected as the 2006-07 BIG EAST Aeropostale Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year and has won an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship. She was also a finalist for the Walter Byers, Jr. Postgraduate Scholarship and is a member of the USA National Field Hockey Team.



- Women's Soccer player Amy Seng was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America® Women's Soccer First Team and the CoSIDA Academic All-District IV First Team. She is Women's Soccer's first Academic All-American, who was the winner of the National City Postgraduate Scholarship to attend graduate school at the university of Louisville.

- Football players Amobi Okoye and William Gay both finished their degrees in 3 ½ years and were drafted in the first and fifth round of the 2007 NFL Draft.

- Football had 12 named to the Big East Academic Team comprised of letter-winners with a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or better

- A total of 18 student-athletes

graduated at the end of the 2006 Fall semester, including two members of the Bridgeman-Houston Fellows degree completion program.

- Baseball player Daniel Burton was named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District Second Team.

- Baseball player Chris Cates was named as a semifinalist for the Inaugural Lowe's Senior CLASS (Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School) Award.

- Softball players Catherine Bishop and Kristi Cunningham were named to the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District IV Second Team.

- 100% of the Women's Golf team was on the AD Honor Roll for the 2007 Spring semester.

- Rowing had a school record 10 athletes named as CRCA (Collegiate Rowing Coaches Association) National Scholar Athletes.

Academic enrichment is offered through training in study skills, time management, academic integrity, and goal setting.

Most services are directed toward academic achievement, but U of L realizes that success in one area often leads to and supports success in other areas.

Successful people usually thrive at whatever they do. Services are directed at the whole person - the student, the athlete, and the individual. College is about helping people develop and its purpose is to prepare them to be leaders in their communities and in society. This is also the goal at the University of Louisville.

The university and BIG EAST have established several awards to recognize academic achievement. The Athletic Directors Honor Roll recognizes student-athletes each semester who earn a 3.0 grade point average or higher (on a 4.0 scale).

The BIG EAST Academic All-Stars honor student-athletes who have participated in at least one sport and have earned a 3.0 or better grade point average during the past academic year.

The University of Louisville's top award, the Ed Kallay Award is awarded annually to one male and one female senior student-athlete who best exemplify excellence on the field, in the classroom and commitment to the community
