DEC. 9-11 NCAA COLLEGE CUP TBA

- The winner of Saturday's match will advance to the NCAA College Cup held in Hoover, Ala.

SCOUTING UCLA

UCLA finished the regular season ranked No. 4 by Soccer America and the NSCAA. The Bruins enter Saturday's match with an overall record of 17-4-1. The Bruins earned victories over Delaware in the second round and Rutgers in the third round to advance to the Quarterfinals.

UCLA received an automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament after winning the Pac-12 Championship. The Bruins earned the No. 13 seed in the tournament after finishing 15-4-1 in the regular season record and undefeated 10-0-0 conference record. UCLA finished the regular season with five straight shutout wins and victories in 10 of its last 12 games.

Junior forward Chandler Hoffman leads the team in scoring with 18 goals and four assists for 40 points. Kelyn Rowe leads the team in assists with 10 on the year. Rowe also ranks second on the team in scoring with 20 points. Brian Rowe leads the team in goal this season. Rowe owns a 0.74 goals against average with 11 shutouts on the year.

THE SERIES

Louisville leads the series 2-0 against UCLA. In last year's NCAA Quarterfinal match, the Cardinals defeated the Bruins 5-4. Louisville surrendered three goals early to the Bruins but with their backs against the wall, the Cards rose to the occasion. The Cardinals scored three unanswered goals in a 16-minute span to go ahead 4-3. UCLA ended their scoring drought with a throw in deflected into the net for the equalizer. But the Cardinals' destiny was in the hands of freshman Aaron Horton. The reserve came in to score the game-winning goal with just under a minute to play. The Bruins had a shot but Austin Berry headed the ball out for the dramatic win. The two teams met again in the Cards' 2011 season opener. Louisville prevailed once again with a 2-0 win. UCLA put in an own goal in the 6th minute and Louisville senior forward Colin Rolfe added another goal later to hand the Bruins the loss.

LAST TIME OUT

The 12th seeded Louisville (14-6-2) men's soccer team defeated fifth seeded Maryland on Sunday night at Ludwig Field in the third round of the NCAA Tournament. The Cardinals advance to the Elite Eight for the second consecutive season. Senior Colin Rolfe finished the night with one goal and three assists, tying his career high for assists and making him the only player in the nation with two three-assist games this year.

The Cardinal attack applied pressure early to the Terps' defense. Colin Rolfe had a shot in the second minute for the Cardinals which Maryland keeper Keith Cardona punched out for the save. The Terps also attacked early when Jerome Raley had a shot sail just high in the fifth minute. A few minutes later Maryland's Casey Townsend sent a header from a throw in wide right.

Louisville continued to gain possession, which paid off in the 19th minute as Rolfe sent a cross just inside the box to a streaking Nick DeLeon for the first goal of the game. Louisville continued to keep possession for a seven minute span but was unable to get a shot on goal during that span.

Maryland regrouped offensively and Townsend had a shot in front of the right post in the 30th minute but sent the ball over the net. Three minutes later Patrick Mullins sent a cross into the right post

where Townsend headed the ball in the net, scoring the equalizer. DeLeon had another opportunity when he got a one on one in the box but sent the shot just wide in the 35th minute.

Maryland finished the first half with a 7-6 shot advantage while the Cards held a 2-1 corner kick advantage. Cardona finished with one save while Andre Boudreaux was not tested. The Cardinals started out on the attack early in the second half. Senior Austin Berry had a header punched out by the keeper. Redshirt freshman Alexander Obbey gathered the deflection but sent it just wide in the 46th minute. Maryland then gained possession but was unable to get anything started offensively.

In the 52nd minute Kenney Walker sent a long ball to Rolfe who got ahead of the defense and sent a shot off the keeper's hand, finding the back right corner of the net for a 2-1 Cardinal lead. The Terps pressed offensively while Kaoru Forbess sent a shot high in the 54th minute. Four minutes later, Mullins had a shot at the left post but Boudreaux punched the ball out for the save.

Maryland's offensive pressure paid off in the 67th minute when Matt Oduaran scored the equalizer. The Cardinal defense dug in as Maryland continued to apply offensive pressure and Oduaran sent a shot high in the 72nd minute. The Terps were awarded a free kick in the 75th minute just outside the box but Helge Leikvang's shot went wide.

Rolfe continued to elude the Terps' defenders late in the second half. He sent a cross into the box to freshman Daniel Keller who blasted the ball past the keeper in the 78th minute for the game-winning goal. Two minutes later Rolfe blasted a shot from outside the box that sailed just high over the crossbar.

Maryland's Townsend had a shot in the 82nd minute but it went just high. On the next possession DeLeon had a shot in the 83rd minute and that sailed high. Less than a minute later Rolfe sent a cross into Michael Roman for the insurance goal, giving Louisville a 4-2 lead.

Maryland applied the offensive pressure and Andrew Farrell cleared out a shot out of the goal when Boudreaux went down in the 87th minute. Maryland sent a final shot into the goal in the final minute but Boudreaux collected the ball for the save.

Maryland finished the game with a 17-14 shot advantage and a 6-4 corner kick advantage. Boudreaux finished with three saves and one credited team save while Cardona finished with four saves.

CARDS IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Louisville makes its fifth consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Under head coach Ken Lolla, the Cardinals made their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament back in 2007. Last season, Louisville made a thrilling run that included a 5-4 last minute victory in the snow over UCLA to make their first ever NCAA College Cup. After another last minute 2-1 win over North Carolina in the semifinals the Cardinals played for the national championship, but fell 1-0 to Akron. The Cardinals own a 7-4-0 overall record in the NCAA Tournament

LOLLA IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

Louisville head coach Ken Lolla is making his 11th appearance in the NCAA Tournament. Lolla guided Akron to six NCAA Tournament appearances, including five consecutive appearances. He owns an 9-9-2 overall record in the NCAA Tournament. He guided the Akron Zips to an Elite Eight appearance in his final season with the Zips in 2005. Last season, Lolla made his first appearance in the NCAA College Cup as a head coach.

CARDS AGAINST THE FIELD

This season the Cardinals have played one of the toughest schedules in the nation which is reflected in this year's NCAA Tournament field. Of the 48-team field, Louisville has faced nine of the teams and an impressive six of the top 16 seeds. The Cardinals are a combined 4-5-1 against those opponents during the regular season, having played No. 3 seeded UConn twice.

BIG EAST TOPS IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

This season the BIG EAST earned seven bids to the NCAA Tournament, the most of any conference. This is the second consecutive season the BIG EAST has led all conferences in NCAA Tournament bids. The next conference with the most was the ACC with six, along with C-USA and the Colonial with four apiece. As the tournament heads into Elite Eight action the BIG EAST once again leads all conferences with three teams competing in the Elite Eight.

CARDS EARN NO. 12 SEED IN NCAA TOURNAMENT

For the second consecutive season, the Cardinals have been named one of the Top 16 seeded teams in the NCAA Tournament. This season Louisville earned the No. 12 seed in the Boston College Region. Last season, the Cardinals were named the No. 1 overall seed in the tournament, the first time in program history. The Cards' three previous tournament appearances were as at-large bids in 2007-09.

CARDINAL QUICK HITS

- Junior All-American Colin Rolfe is currently third on the all-time goals list with 33 career goals. He recently passed former Cardinal and current assistant coach Simon Bird for sole possession of the third spot. Bird had 28 career goals in his three seasons at Louisville.

• Rolfe currently has 87 career points, which ranks him third on the all-time points list. He recently passed former Cardinal standout Ali Elwakhi.

• Last season Cardinal keeper Andre Boudreaux surpassed Jeremy Morales for the school-record for career shutouts of 23 with his sixth shutout of the season in the 2-0 win against Notre Dame. He started the 2011 season off with back-to-back shutouts to continue to set the record. Boudreaux currently has 11 shutouts this season. He now owns the record with 37 career shutouts.

• Louisville's five goals against Providence were the most goals scored this season. The last time the Cards scored five goals was on Dec. 4 against UCLA in the Elite Eight of the 2010 NCAA Tournament.

• Rolfe's three assist game against Maryland makes him the only player in Division I to record two games with three assists. Rolfe also dished out three assists in the Cards' 4-0 win over Butler earlier in the season.

FIVE SENIORS NAMED TO BIG EAST ALL-CONFERENCE TEAMS

Five Cardinal seniors earned BIG EAST men's soccer postseason honors, as awards and all-conference teams were announced on Nov. 10 at the 2011 BIG EAST Men's Soccer Championship Banquet. Seniors Austin Berry and Nick DeLeon earned first team honors while seniors Andre Boudreaux, Colin Rolfe and Kenney Walker earned second team honors.

DELEON EARNS BIG EAST ALL-TOURNAMENT HONORS

Senior Nick DeLeon was named to the BIG EAST All-Tournament team on Nov. 13. The Phoenix, Ariz. native helped lead the Cardinals to their fourth BIG EAST semifinal in five years contributing an assist in the Cards' 5-0 victory over Providence in the first round.

ROLFE EARNS NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS FOR TWO CONSECUTIVE WEEKS

Senior All-American Colin Rolfe was named the Top Drawer Soccer and College Soccer News Teams of the Week on Nov. 21 after scoring a goal and dishing out an assist in the Cards' 3-2 win over Bradley in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Rolfe scored the equalizer in the 86th minute when he eluded five Bradley defenders and blasted a shot past the keeper. A minute later Rolfe found Kenney Walker streaking down the middle of the field for the assist. Then on Nov. 28 Rolfe was named to both teams again after scoring a goal and dishing out a career tying three assists in the Cards' 4-2 win at Maryland. Senior teammate Nick DeLeon was also named to the College Soccer News team.

ROLFE EARNS NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS

Senior All-American Colin Rolfe was named the National Player of the Week by College Soccer News and Top Drawer Soccer for the week of Nov. 7. Rolfe led the team in scoring with four goals in the BIG EAST Tournament this week with wins over No. 23 Providence and Blue Division top seeded Marquette. Rolfe scored his first career hat trick in the Cards' 5-0 win over Providence on Thursday night in Cardinal Park. He became the first Louisville player to score a hat trick against a ranked opponent, and the first to score one since 2005. In the second round of the Big East Tournament Rolfe scored the game-winning goal for the Cardinals in the 23rd minute. The goal was his seventh of the season and his 31st career goal.

ROLFE SCORES FIRST CAREER HAT TRICK TO START POSTSEASON

Senior All-American Colin Rolfe scored his first career hat trick against No. 23 Providence in the first round of the BIG EAST Championship on Nov. 3. Rolfe is the first Louisville player to score a hat trick against a ranked opponent. He is the seventh Cardinal in school history with a hat trick and the first in six years. The last Cardinal to score a hat trick was Frank Jonke against Rutgers on Oct. 8, 2005.

TRANSFERS COCHRANE AND ROMAN MAKE IMMEDIATE IMPACTS

Junior Greg Cochrane transferred from Virginia Tech in January while junior midfielder Michael Roman joined the Cardinals in August after transferring from UCLA. Cochrane was

BERRY NAMED BIG EAST DEFENDER OF THE WEEK

Louisville senior defender Austin Berry was named BIG EAST Defender of the Week the league announced on Oct. 10. It is the first honor for the senior this year and the fifth BIG EAST weekly honor of his career. Berry helped Louisville shut out Syracuse in a 0-0 tie as well as stage a 3-2 come-from-behind win at No. 10/10 Indiana. Berry came up with two blocks in the 80th minute against the Hoosiers after tying the game up with a header assist. Berry and the defense held the Hoosiers to just one shot in the overtime period. He also helped the Cardinals to their sixth shutout of the season against Syracuse. They held the Orange to just four shots on goal in 110 minutes.

WALKER NAMED TO THE COLLEGE SOCCER NEWS TEAM OF THE WEEK

Senior midfielder Kenney Walker was named to the College Soccer News Team of the Week on Oct. 10, he was also named to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll. Walker scored the game-winner and the equalizer in the Cards overtime road win at No. 10 Indiana last week. After falling behind 2-0 to the Hoosiers, the Cardinals scored the first goal in the 73rd minute, and 47 seconds later Colin Rolfe threw the ball in and Nick DeLeon flicked the ball to Walker who blasted a shot in for the equalizer. Five minutes into the overtime period Andrew Farrell crossed the ball to Walker and he blasted the shot past IU's keeper for the game-winner.

CARDS' RALLY THE FIRST IN SCHOOL HISTORY

When Louisville rallied for the 3-2 overtime win at Indiana after falling behind 2-0, it marked the first time the Cards overcame a two-goal deficit to claim a road victory since at least the 1984 season (box scores unavailable prior to 1989). It was just the third time at any site (since 1986) Louisville won after being down two goals, with the other occasions coming in the NCAA quarterfinals last season (2-0 and 3-1 deficits erased in the epic 5-4 win over UCLA) and on Sept. 8, 1991, against Dayton. In the latter contest, the Cards found themselves down 2-0 at home in the 11th minute after the Flyers scored twice in 27 seconds, but countered with four scores in the second half to pull out the win.

U of L has not dropped a regular-season home contest to a team outside the BIG EAST since Lolla's first game with the Cardinals, a 4-3 defeat at the hands of Memphis on Aug. 25, 2006. Senior Colin Rolfe tied a Louisville record with three assists in the Cardinals' 4-0 victory over Butler on Sept. 17, needing just 32 minutes of field time to match the mark set by current junior Paolo DelPiccolo on Oct. 31, 2009, at Villanova. Rolfe also dished out three assists in the Cards' 4-2 win over Maryland in the third round of the NCAA Tournament.

Rolfe's 10 assist this season is just one short of tying the season record and he is also one assist short of tying the career record for assists. Rolfe is also the only player this season to record two three assist games. He is the only Louisville player to notch two three assist games in a career. Junior Paolo DelPiccolo is the only other Louisville player to dish out three assists. DelPiccolo did against Villanova on Oct. 31, 2009.

CARDINALS IN THE POLLS

For the third straight season, the Cardinals started the season ranked in all the preseason polls. In 2009, the Cardinals started the season ranked in all the preseason polls for the first time in school history. Last season the Cardinals jumped into the top 15 of all the polls after one week of play and after nine weeks, Louisville moved into the No. 1 spot in a majority of the major polls last season. The Cardinals own a 44-9-10 record in Cardinal Park since Lolla took over the program six years ago.

ROLFE AND BERRY NAMED TO THE HERMANN TROPHY WATCH LIST

Seniors Colin Rolfe and Austin Berry were named to the Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy Watch List for the 2011 season. The MAC Hermann Trophy is the highest individual award in intercollegiate soccer. The recipients are selected by head coaches of NCAA Division I programs who are members of the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Rolfe was the second runner-up for the Hermann Trophy last season and the only finalist to return to the field in 2011. He was named the preseason BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year and a candidate for the Lowe's Senior Class Award. He returns for his senior season after leading the team in scoring for the second straight season with nine goals and seven assists for 25 points. Last season he was named an All-BIG EAST First Team selection for the second straight season. He was also a consensus All-American, earning the distinction for the second straight year. He was also named to the BIG EAST All-Tournament team and the College Cup All-Tournament team.

Berry was also named a Lowe's Senior Class Award Candidate and the preseason BIG EAST Defender of the Year. Last season he earned numerous All-American honors, including his first NSCAA All-American honor. Berry was named the 2010 BIG EAST Defender of the Year and earned first team All-BIG EAST honors. He was also named to the BIG EAST All-Tournament team and the College Cup All-Tournament team. Berry has already earned his Bachelor's degree in communications and is currently working on a Master's degree in Justice Administration.

BERRY AND ROLFE NAMED LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS CANDIDATES

Seniors Austin Berry and Colin Rolfe were two of 30 men's soccer players selected as candidates for the 2011 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in collegiate soccer. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have

notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

ROLFE AND BERRY EARN PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Seniors Colin Rolfe and Austin Berry gained a lot of preseason attention, earning All-American honors from College Soccer News and Soccer America. Both Rolfe and Berry were named first team preseason All-Americans by College Soccer News. Both were also named to the Soccer American Preseason All-American list along with sophomore Dylan Mares.

CARDS EARN HIGHEST RANKINGS IN PROGRAM HISTORY

The Louisville Cardinals received their highest ranking in school history on Oct. 4, 2010. The Cardinals were ranked No. 1 by Top Drawer Soccer. Louisville's success continued as they were ranked No. 1 in four of the five polls at the end of the 2010 season. The Cardinals started the 2011 season ranked No. 1 in four of the five polls, ranked No. 4 in the Top Drawer Soccer Preseason poll.

FOUR CARDS IN TOP DRAWER SOCCER'S TOP 100 UPPERCLASSMEN LIST

Four of Louisville's upperclassmen are ranked in the Top Drawer Soccer's Top 100 Upperclassmen list. The rankings include the highest ranked college soccer players in the nation and are updated weekly. Colin Rolfe, Austin Berry, Nick DeLeon and Andrew Farrell were all named to the list. Rolfe is ranked in the Top 10 at No. 7 while Berry is in the Top 25 at No. 24. DeLeon is ranked No. 54 and Farrell is ranked No. 95.

PRESEASON CRYSTAL BALL

The University of Louisville was selected as the BIG EAST Red Division favorite, while Connecticut was chosen to win the BIG EAST Blue Division in the 2011 BIG EAST Preseason Men's Soccer Coaches' Poll. The votes were cast by the league's 16 head coaches, who were not permitted to vote for their own players. Both teams advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2010, with the Cardinals reaching the national title game. In the Red Division, Louisville tallied 120 points, selected as the unanimous favorite to win the divisional crown. The Cardinals were undefeated last season until the title game of the NCAA Championship, Louisville finished the season 20-1-3 overall and 9-0-0 in conference action. 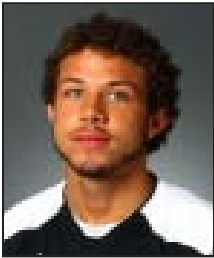

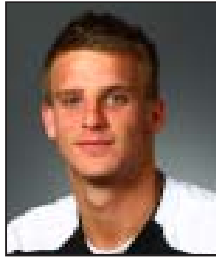

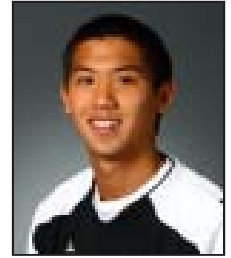

Ken Head Coach | Louisville Soccer

LOLLA

When it comes to building a soccer program into a national power, head coach Ken Lolla has the midas touch, making him the perfect fit when the University of Louisville needed to find a coach that could take a program with no winning tradition and make it into a national contender. Lolla did that in just two short seasons, turning Louisville into a Top 25 program and earning their first NCAA Tournament bid. In his fifth season at Louisville the Cardinals competed for their first NCAA Tournament title. Prior to Lolla's arrival, Louisville men's soccer had no previous winning tradition. The Cardinals had only managed seven winning seasons in 27 seasons as a varsity program.

Lolla guided the Cardinals to a school record 20-1-3 record last season and their first College Cup appearance. Louisville earned its highest ranking at No. 1 in the majority of the polls heading into the postseason. The Cardinals entered their fourth consecutive postseason as the top seed in the NCAA Tournament, marking another first for the Cardinals. He led Louisville to a remarkable NCAA Tournament run that saw the Cardinals draw record crowds of more than 5,000 for every game at Cardinal Park. The Cardinals advanced to their first national championship appearance before losing a heartbreaker to Akron (1-0).

For the second straight season the Cardinals had two players earn All-American honors. Colin Rolfe was named a consensus first team All-American while Austin Berry earned second team honors. Freshman Dylan Mares was also named a Freshman All-American. Rolfe became the first player in school history to be named a Hermann Trophy Finalist, the most prestigious award in collegiate soccer. Lolla earned numerous honors as well, he was named the 2010 NSCAA/Mondo Coach of the Year, Soccer America Coach of the Year and NSCAA Great Lakes Coach of the Year.

Louisville won their second straight BIG EAST Red Division title and captured their first BIG EAST Tournament title. The Cardinals earned three major BIG EAST awards in the regular season - Berry was named Defender of the Year, Mares was named BIG EAST Rookie of the Year and Lolla and his staff earned Co-BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year honors. Three Cardinals earned first team All-BIG EAST honors, Rolfe, Berry and Nick DeLeon. Mares earned second team and all-rookie team honors. Kenney Walker and Paolo DelPiccolo earned third team honors, making the 2010 squad the most decorated in school history. After winning the BIG EAST Tournament Rolfe was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player and Andre Boudreaux was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player. Berry and JT Murray were named to the BIG EAST All-Tournament team.

Capping off a record setting season, seniors Murray and Charlie Campbell were drafted in the second round of the MLS SuperDraft. It was the first time in school history that two players were taken in the MLS Draft.

In 2009, Lolla guided the Cardinals to their first BIG EAST title after finishing 8-2-1 in the Red Division. The Cardinals set records in wins and shutouts with 13. The Cardinals also earned their highest ranking at the time at No. 5 in the nation. The Cardinals also advanced to the BIG EAST semifinals. Senior Phil Edginton was named BIG EAST Co-Defensive Player of the Year while Lolla and his staff were named BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year. Edginton and Rolfe earned first team All-BIG EAST honors, marking another first in Louisville history. The Cardinals earned their third consecutive NCAA Tournament bid. Edginton and Rolfe earned numerous All-American honors. Rolfe became the first Cardinal to be named a semifinalist for the Hermann Trophy. Paolo DelPiccolo also earned Freshman All-American honors. Topping off an impressive season, Othaniel Yanez was drafted by the Columbus Crew and made the final roster.

In 2008 Lolla guided the Cards to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances. Louisville pulled off upsets of No. 3 Notre Dame and No. 2 St. John's in back-to-back games, earning their highest ranking at the time at seventh in the nation. Once again the Cardinals earned a spot in the BIG EAST Tournament and



advanced to the quarterfinals but fell to Notre Dame 1-0 in South Bend. Rolfe earned BIG EAST Rookie of the Year honors while Aaron Clapham and Berry also earned All-BIG EAST honors. The Cardinals then earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament, making the first back-to-back appearance in school history. The Cards' season ended in the first round with a 4-3 overtime loss to Jacksonville.

Lolla's 2007 squad put together back-to-back wins over ranked opponents to begin the month of October. The Cardinals defeated No. 12 South Florida followed by an overtime win over No. 13 Indiana. It was the Cards' first win over Indiana and landed them in their first national ranking at No. 25 in the Soccer America Poll. Louisville finished the month of October with just one loss and finished second in the BIG EAST's Red Division and earned a first round bye for the tournament. The Cards then tied No. 14 West Virginia in the quarterfinals and advanced to their first semifinals on penalty kicks.

The Cardinals fell to BIG EAST Champion Connecticut in the semifinals but earned their first at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. Lolla's squad was not happy just to be there, they were all business as they defeated No. 20 Duke 1-0 in Cardinal Park. Louisville faced No. 14 Ohio State in the second round in Columbus. The Cards fell 1-0 to the Buckeyes to end their most successful season in school history.

In his first season with the Cardinals, Lolla doubled Louisville's BIG EAST win total from the previous season to finish with a 4-5-1 record. The Cardinals also qualified for the BIG EAST Tournament, making its first league tournament appearance in three seasons. The Cardinals made a dramatic improvement at the end of the season. Lolla's first squad finished their last three league games with a perfect record of 1-0-2.

Lolla came to Louisville after guiding Akron to its most successful season in school history with an impressive 18-1-4 record in the 2005 season. Lolla guided the Zips to a final ranking of fifth in the nation by the NSCAA/adidas poll and at one point in the season the Zips were ranked at the top of the polls.

Lolla guided the Zips to their eighth Mid-American Conference Regular Season title and their fourth MAC Tournament title. He was named MAC Coach of the Year for the fourth time. The Zips advanced to the NCAA Tournament Elite Eight and tied eventual national champion Maryland but in the final outcome fell 4-1 in penalty kicks. Akron also became the only school with two players named first team NSCAA All-Americans and a third player named to the second team.

Lolla spent the last 13 seasons at the University of Akron. During his tenure at Akron he compiled a 160-68-25 record along with eight MAC Championships and a school record, five straight NCAA Tournament appearances.

In 2004 Lolla directed the Zips to the MAC Tournament title and a then school record fourth-consecutive NCAA Tournament berth. The Zips finished the season with a record of 13-5-3, making Lolla the all-time winningest coach in the program's storied 50-year history.

In 2003 Lolla's Zips finished 15-5-2 and advanced to the third round of the NCAA Tournament. Akron also became the first-ever MAC school to earn a tournament seeding, claiming the No. 15 spot and a first-round bye.

During the 2002 season the Zips made their second-consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament and won their second MAC Tournament championship.

That came after a 2001 season which was marked by several milestones for Lolla and his team. He notched his

100th coaching victory at Akron on Oct. 14, 2001 with a 1-0 win over Wright State. After a 10-6-1 season and second-place finishes in the Mid-American Conference regular season standings and tournament, the Zips became the first MAC school to receive an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Lolla's Akron squads were 62-9-5 all-time in regular-season MAC play and he has tutored 38 first-team All-MAC players.

In 1998, the Zips captured the regular-season MAC title with a 7-0-1 mark, and won their first MAC tournament title with a 4-1 win over Bowling Green to advance to the NCAA Tournament. Lolla earned his third MAC Coach of the Year honors and was named the NSCAA Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year.

The 1999 season brought Akron an unbeaten mark of 6-0-1 and its third-consecutive MAC title. Although the Zips posted a 4-2-0 MAC mark in 2000, they finished in a four-way tie for first place during the regular season.

In 1993, his first Akron squad captured the school's initial MAC title with a perfect 5-0-0 league mark. In 1995 the Zips once again went through MAC play 5-0-0 record. Lolla earned MAC Coach of the Year honors both seasons. Lolla was inducted into the Akron Hall of Fame last year.

Lolla has also taken his skills to the national level. In the fall of 1999, he was appointed head coach of the U.S. Soccer Federation Under-15 National Team. His travels with the national team have taken him around the world, including stops in Italy and South America.

Prior to his stint at Akron, Lolla posted a 49-16-3 record in three seasons at Belmont Abbey in Belmont, N.C., including a 19-3-2 mark in 1992. The Crusaders were the sixth-ranked team in the NAIA that season.

His Belmont Abbey clubs won three consecutive Carolinas Conference Championships which earned Lolla numerous accolades. He was named the Carolinas Conference Coach of the Year in 1990. In 1992, Lolla received NSCAA-NAIA National Coach of the Year honors.

As a player Lolla was considered one of the finest midfielders in the Atlantic Coast Conference, earning all-conference honors three times and earned All-South and All-America honors in 1981 and 1983 while at Duke University. In 2002 he was one of 55 players named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Men's Soccer Team.

Lolla played professionally for the Canton Invaders of the National Professional Soccer League from 1984 through 1988. In 1984, Lolla played professionally with the Charlotte Gold of the USL. He then moved to the Canton Invaders of the NPSL and finished his playing career with the New Jersey Eagles and the Penn-Jersey Spirit of the ASL in 1988 and 1989, respectively.

He also served as the Youth Development Director for the Canton Invaders in 1985 and 1986. He handled community and public relations in 1987 and 1988 in conjunction with appearances as a player for the NPSL franchise. Following his professional career, Lolla returned to Duke as an assistant coach in 1985 and then again for the 1988 and 1989 seasons.

Lolla holds a bachelor's degree in biology from Duke, which he received in 1983. He was a high school All-America pick in 1980 at St. Rose High School in Belmar, N.J. and also played on the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival teams in 1979 and 1983.

While playing in Canton, Ohio, Lolla, 47, met his wife the former Tina Bowman. The couple resides in Louisville with their three children, 14 year-old Tyler, 10 year-old Kristiana, and 8 year-old Elijah.
