Service

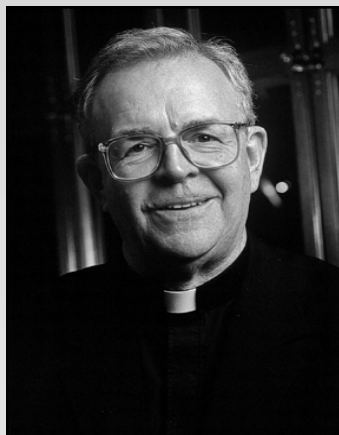

MARQUETTE PRESIDENT ROBERT A. WILD, S.J.



Robert A. Wild, S.J., is the 22nd president of Marquette University. He began his duties as chief executive on June 17, 1996.

Father Wild is building on Marquette's core strengths: an academically rigorous, values-centered curriculum; solid, practical preparation for work in a world of increasing complexity and diversity; formation for life of students as ethical and informed leaders in their

religious, cultural, professional and civic communities; and graduating women and men who will dedicate their lives to the service of others.

Under his leadership, the university in 2000 embraced a statement of shared vision for the future:

"Our vision is to provide a Catholic, Jesuit education that is genuinely transformational so that our students graduate not simply better educated but better people, and to do so with such excellence that when asked to name the three or four best Catholic universities in America, people will include Marquette as a matter of course."

Marquette has established clear, measurable goals and specific strategies to achieve this long-term vision. Under Father Wild's leadership, the university has improved academic quality, increased and stabilized enrollment and enhanced partnerships with the City of Milwaukee and community groups. In 2005 Marquette completed the most successful comprehensive campaign in the history of the university raising a total of \$357 million. Marquette is committed to updating academic facilities for students in the 21st century: a new School of Dentistry opened in 2002, the John P. Raynor, S.J., Library was dedicated in 2003, and the Al McGuire Center, a practice facility for student-athletes, opened in 2004. Father Wild and his Marquette colleagues remain committed to providing students with a Catholic, Jesuit education in an atmosphere of care and faith.

Immediately prior to assuming the Marquette presidency, from 1992 to 1996 Father Wild served as president of the Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass., a graduate school which trains clergy and laity for leadership roles in the Catholic Church. From 1985 to 1991 he served as provincial superior of the Chicago Province of the Society of Jesus, directing the activities of Jesuits in northern Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and southwestern Ohio. A biblical scholar and author of two books and numerous scholarly articles, Father Wild taught theology at Marquette from 1975 to 1984. He has been a member of

the university's Board of Trustees since 1990.

Father Wild, 66, is a native of Chicago. He holds a doctoral degree in New Testament and Christian origins from Harvard University, a master's degree in classical languages, a bachelor's degree in Latin from Loyola University Chicago, and a licentiate in theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Chicago. He has held visiting professorships at Loyola University Chicago and the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. Father Wild began his teaching career at St. Xavier High School in Cincinnati, where he taught Latin, Greek and speech and debate from 1964 to 1967. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1957 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1970.

Father Wild is chair of the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities and a member of the boards of Saint Joseph's University, the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, the Big East Conference, the Council for Opportunity in Education, the Greater Milwaukee Committee, the Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce and the Center for International Health.

Madeline Wake, Ph.D.

Madeline Musante Wake, Ph.D., R.N., is the provost of Marquette University. Reporting to the president, the provost is responsible for academic affairs and institutional planning.

The provost provides intellectual vision and strong leadership for the 10 academic deans and the dean of libraries.

Prior to her current role, Wake was dean (for nine years) and faculty member in nursing management at Marquette since 1977. She has held administrative positions as assistant director of the university division of continuing education, hospital nurse administrator and chair of a hospital board of directors.

Wake has spoken nationally for the American Organization of Nurse Executives, the American Nurses Association, the American Association of Critical-care Nurses and the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, and internationally on various topics in nursing management and education. She chaired the task force for the Second International Conference on Intensive Care Nursing held in The Hague, the Netherlands, in 1986. She has consulted on continuing education, effective nursing departments, financial management in nursing education and strategic planning. Active in professional associations, she was president of the American Diabetes Association – Wisconsin Affiliate, chaired the program committee for the 1983 AACN National Teaching Institute and was a member of the American Nurses Association 1992 Convention Education Program Committee. Kliebhan has strong Marquette University legacy roots and a deep family allegiance. His father, wife Linda, daughters Kelly and Katy, brother, sister and brother-in-law are all Marquette alumni.

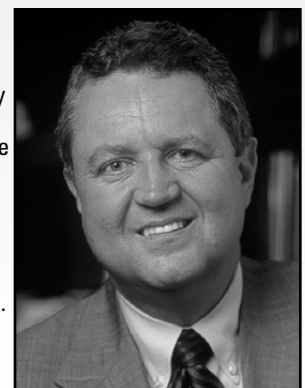
Kliebhan, himself, is a product of a Marquette education, having earned his undergraduate degree in 1973 from the College of Liberal Arts (now Arts and Sciences). He went on to earn his M.B.A. at the University of Illinois at Urbana – Champaign. He was very pleased to return to Marquette in 1976 to join the university's administrative team as a management analyst.

Since that time, Kliebhan has assumed increasing responsibility for university administration, finance and planning, and has held more than a dozen positions including key strategic positions such as bud-

get director, director of budget and institutional research, vice president for planning, vice president for administration, interim vice president for university advancement, corporate secretary, and now senior vice president and corporate treasurer.

Every team of employees Kliebhan has led at Marquette has been strongly encouraged to share his personal philosophy to dedicate themselves completely to the university and its students. Kliebhan and his wife Linda, who graduated from Marquette in 1974 as a physical therapist, consistently bring a similar commitment to volunteer activities. As a couple, they served as president of Kelly and Katy's high school parents association at Divine Savior/Holy Angels (DSHA). Greg also was active in the family's parish school, Sts. Cecilia and James School, including serving as coach of the girls' basketball team for eight years. He also coached grade school and high school AAU basketball teams for many years.

In addition to his role as Marquette's corporate treasurer, Kliebhan currently serves on the board of the Bridging the Gap Learning Center, a choice school in Marquette's neighborhood, and has served on the board of DSHA High School.

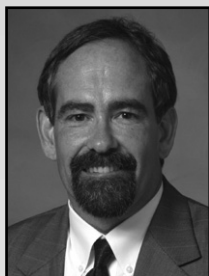

MARQUETTE DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS BILL CORDS

Bill Cords is in his 20th year at Marquette University. The native of Butte, Montana enjoyed a seven-year high school teaching and coaching career in Montana before leaving in 1971 for Washington State University. During his 11 years at WSU he served as head freshman football coach, assistant varsity football coach, director of intramurals, academic advisor, assistant athletics director and associate athletics director while earning a master's degree and completing doctoral work in education administration.

In 1982, he became the athletics director at the UTEP. During that five-year tenure, a strong broad-based program was developed with a rapidly improving football program, development of a women's athletic conference, a very successful men's basketball program, and highlighted by the elimination of a previous \$1 million deficit.

In 1987, Cords accepted the position of director of athletics at Marquette. From that time Marquette moved from independent status to the Midwestern Collegiate Conference (MCC) in 1988-89, a charter membership in the very successful and widely-respected Great Midwest Conference from 1990-95, a charter membership in the nationally prominent and prestigious Conference USA from 1995-2005, membership in the BIG EAST Conference.

The mission of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is to strive for excellence in academics, athletics, leadership and service to others. Marquette student-athletes, teams and coaches across the broad spectrum of the program continue to achieve academic, athletic, personal and professional prominence at the conference, regional and national levels.

"We are very proud of our students and coaches. They take great pride in representing Marquette and do so striving to be the very best they can be as people, students and athletes," remarked Cords.

Attendance at men's basketball games continues to rank among the top 20 nationally. Women's basketball attendance continues to improve along with that of volleyball and men's and women's soccer.

Marquette has hosted conference championships in men's and women's basketball, cross country, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis and men's and women's outdoor track and field. Marquette has hosted very successful NCAA Men's Basketball Championship First and Second Rounds in 1992, 1996, 1999, and 2004. Marquette also hosted the NCAA Women's Basketball Midwest Regional in 2002. In 2005, Marquette hosted the BIG EAST Women's Soccer Championships as well as the First and Second Rounds of the NCAA Tournament.

Beginning July 1, 1993, he assumed responsibility as director of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics and Recreational Sports which combined the activities of intercollegiate athletics, intramurals, club sports and open recreation. This allowed the department to provide more services to the community, in particular the inauguration of the summertime National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) designed to benefit underprivileged youth in the Milwaukee area, while encouraging community use of Marquette facilities such as the Valley Fields Complex, Rec Plex, Helfaer Tennis Stadium, Helfaer Recreation Center and Marquette Gym.

Cords was honored nationally by his peers as the 1999 NACDA/Continental Regional (Central) I-AA/I-



AAA Athletic Director of the Year.

"This award is not about one individual," said Cords. "It is a recognition, at the national level, of the support, hard work and dedication of students, coaches, staff, fans and administration over the past 12 years."

"It is an individual honor, but more importantly it is a very positive recognition of Marquette University and all of the people who have and continue to make our program better and stronger."

Sarah Bobert is in her seventh year on the Marquette athletics staff and oversees the business operations of the Athletic Department. In her position, she is responsible for budget development and management, financial processing and reporting, oversight of facility management, all departmental human resources elements and other internal matters.

BIG EAST CONFERENCE

In 2006-07, the BIG EAST will be in its second year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference. The first year with 16 members was wrought with curiosity among those in the world of collegiate athletics and in the media, but the league thrived in its new alignment, enjoying significant success in the athletic arenas, on the playing fields and in the classroom.

The goals of the BIG EAST have remained constant throughout its history — to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

In men's basketball last year, BIG EAST squads secured a league-record eight NCAA bids. Seven BIG EAST women's basketball teams earned NCAA berths. In football, West Virginia garnered the attention of the college football world with its victory over Georgia in the Nokia Sugar Bowl. The Mountaineers were the BIG EAST's representative in the Bowl Championship Series.

In 2005-06, the BIG EAST welcomed five new members to increase its membership to 16: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida. Some were ready to call the new BIG EAST alignment too unwieldy, but the league showed that there can be strength in numbers even when that number is a large one.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

In 2005-06, Providence College's Mary Cullen won the NCAA 5,000-meters crown. Also, the Villanova women's cross country team was named the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Cross Country Program. The Wildcats have won seven NCAA team titles since 1981. Former Wildcat standout Carole Zajac was named the top individual performer of the women's cross country era.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors. Last year, West Virginia's Joe Herber was named the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American of the Year in men's basketball.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA crowns the previous year, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last seven women's basketball crowns and three of the last eight men's titles.

Moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The BIG EAST has continually turned challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

COMMISSIONER MICHAEL A. TRANGHESE



Mike Tranghese has accepted and answered the challenges of The BIG EAST Conference since he opened the league's doors as the first full-time employee in 1979. Now in his 17th year as Commissioner, he embarks on the second

academic year of serving the nation's largest Division I-A conference. He will help the 16-member BIG EAST continue on its path of success with his effective leadership and staunch commitment to integrity.

The BIG EAST has always been a prominent player in the world of intercollegiate athletics, in large part because of Tranghese's efforts. He believes his job is to foster the best possible climates for BIG EAST student-athletes to succeed academically and athletically.

During his tenure as Commissioner, which began in 1990, Tranghese has been faced with critical membership issues on several occasions. The league has always emerged in a stronger position. In 2003-04, the BIG EAST addressed a changing national landscape and coordinated the entrance of five institutions for '05-06: the University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

The number of sponsored sports, now at 23, has risen steadily under Tranghese. He orchestrated the formation of BIG EAST football, which began in 1991. Tranghese, who is acknowledged as an industry leader in television negotiation and production, has been a central figure in every television negotiation in the league's history. All of this has been accomplished in an NCAA environment that seems to be in a continual state of change.

Tranghese's negotiating expertise has resulted in a long-term partnership with Madison Square Garden, host of the BIG EAST Men's Basketball Championship since 1983. The league and the Garden will be partners at least through 2011.

Tranghese has ensured the league's position as a leader in television exposure. The BIG EAST has been a long-time partner with CBS Sports and ESPN and has enjoyed multi-year agreements with both entities in basketball and football. The league's current television contract also includes appearances on ABC.

Additionally, Tranghese was the force behind The BIG EAST Television Network, which was a benchmark for regional network television. In 1995, the league awarded ESPN, Inc. exclusive rights to all of its basketball and football games not broadcast on a national network.

Tranghese moved into the Commissioner's

chair on June 21, 1990 and has been an active leader nationally since his appointment. During the 2002 and '03 football seasons, he was the lead administrator of the Bowl Championship Series, the group of major conferences and bowls that produces a national championship game and the best possible bowl matchups.

In 2000-01, he concluded a five-year term on the NCAA Men's Basketball Committee by serving as chair. Tranghese also has served as chair of the NCAA Men's Basketball Subcommittee on Television. He was on the NCAA's negotiating team that secured a record \$6 billion contract from CBS for broadcast rights to the men's basketball championship.

In addition, he has served as chair of the Division I-A Commissioners and the Collegiate Commissioners Association.

Shortly after being named Commissioner, Tranghese laid the groundwork and put together The BIG EAST Football Conference. In response to the genesis of significant conference realignment nationally, he directed an expansion and created a unique eight-team football group. Despite its newborn status, the BIG EAST was a charter member of the major conference alliance now known as the Bowl Championship Series.

After establishing BIG EAST football, Tranghese guided the league through a critical time that many observers felt could have resulted in a permanent split among its members. In March, 1994, the conference added football members Rutgers University and West Virginia University as its 11th and 12th full-time members and maintained its overall structure.

Just four months later, the University of Notre Dame, clearly the nation's premier men's basketball independent, joined the BIG EAST. Rutgers, West Virginia and Notre Dame began BIG EAST competition in 1995-96.

The league's athletic directors unanimously appointed Tranghese in 1990 after his 11 years of service, the last nine as associate commissioner. As Commissioner, he has led the BIG EAST while maintaining the principles which have marked the conference's explosive rise to prominence -- promoting and cultivating intercollegiate athletic programs in an environment of integrity while pursuing excellence at the highest possible level.

Tranghese's career in college athletics began

at American International College in his hometown of Springfield, Mass.

He was the sports information director at Providence College where he generated publicity for the nationally successful Friar teams of the 1970s under Dave Gavitt. As the media attention on Eastern college basketball and the growth of sports events on television increased, Gavitt and Tranghese were ready to take advantage. Gavitt became the BIG EAST's first Commissioner in 1979 and served until 1990 when Tranghese assumed the helm.

Under Tranghese, the BIG EAST championship slate has expanded from seven men's championships in 1979 to 23 men's and women's championships today.

Tranghese is a 1965 graduate of St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vt. He is married to Susan Huntemann.
