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Tim Grogan

HEAD COACH 17th Season

Tim Grogan is in his 17th season at the helm of the Marquette University men's golf program. Grogan arrived at Marquette after graduating from UNLV in 1992. Since that time, he has guided the Golden Eagles in becoming one of the top collegiate programs in the Midwest and an annual contender for the BIG EAST Championship.

With the addition of All-America honorable mention Mike Van Sickle, the men's golf program at MU has reached unprecedented heights while it continues to climb in the national rankings.

Since the start of the 2005 campaign, Grogan has directed the Golden Eagles to 10 top-10 finishes in tournament competition, including four team titles. MU has boasted six individual medalists during that span and nine individual champions in the past eight years (Van Sickle, 5; Nathan Colson, 2; Mark Wentz, 1; Ben Sieg, 1).

Grogan and the Golden Eagles got off to a great start in 2007-08, posting two victories in the fall. MU won the 19-team Xavier Invitational before claiming their second victory at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge in the last three years. In the past two BIG EAST Championships, Marquette has finished third (2006) and fourth (2007), respectively.

In 2006-07, Grogan coached Marquette's first-ever NCAA tournament qualifier in Van Sickle. Van Sickle was also Grogan's first All-American selection, an honor that provided Van Sickle with an invitation to the prestigious Western Refining College All-America Classic in 2007. Under Grogan, MU has also had All-BIG EAST selections in

each of the last two years – Van Sickle in 2007 and Joe Weber in 2006. Both players finished runner-up in each of the last two respective BIG EAST Championships.

Grogan's influence helped Marquette make strides during the 2004-05 season. He developed Ted Gray during the course of the season and helped him win Conference USA All-Freshman team honors. In 2003-04, Grogan's influence continued the development of players like Weber and Kyle Murphy. Weber and Murphy's improvement over the course of the season was evidence for Grogan's teaching skills and philosophy.

Grogan was instrumental in the development of a young team in 2002-03, including Colson. The MU freshman led the team in scoring and won one tournament during the season. The 2001-02 season, Grogan was faced with several newcomers and seasoned veterans. He blended the squad into a cohesive unit that played well as a team.

In 1999-2000, Grogan led Marquette to the title of the Billiken Intercollegiate, its first event championship in three seasons. During the 1996-97 season, he guided the Golden Eagles to the Butler Fall Invitational title, the first championship at the Division I level in MU history. In addition, Tom Uutala became the first individual champion at Marquette since it went to Division I by capturing medalist honors at the Bradley Fall Classic in 1996.

Academic success has been a staple of the program during Grogan's tenure. Colson was named a GCAA All-America Scholar in 2004 and garnered

the same award in 2005 along with Weber. Most remarkably, however, has been Grogan's sound track record of graduating players – since the NCAA began tracking each student-athlete's Academic Progress Rate (APR), Marquette has been perfect, graduating 100 percent of its players, a monumental accomplishment compared with other schools and other men's golf programs across the nation.

Grogan has also pioneered practice facility development, helping MU build a short game practice facility in the Marquette Gymnasium.

Grogan is a member of the Professional Golfers Association of America. He is currently the head professional at the Missing Links Golf Club in Mequon, Wis. In addition, he serves as a director of Nike Junior Golf Camps. Grogan also served as a PGA assistant at the Ozaukee Country Club in Mequon from 1992-93.

As a player, Grogan competed in the 1996 Greater Milwaukee Open, a PGA Tour event, and was the runner-up at the Wisconsin PGA Assistants Championship. He also competed in the 1994 U.S. Open sectional qualifier and was a U.S. Junior Amateur participant.

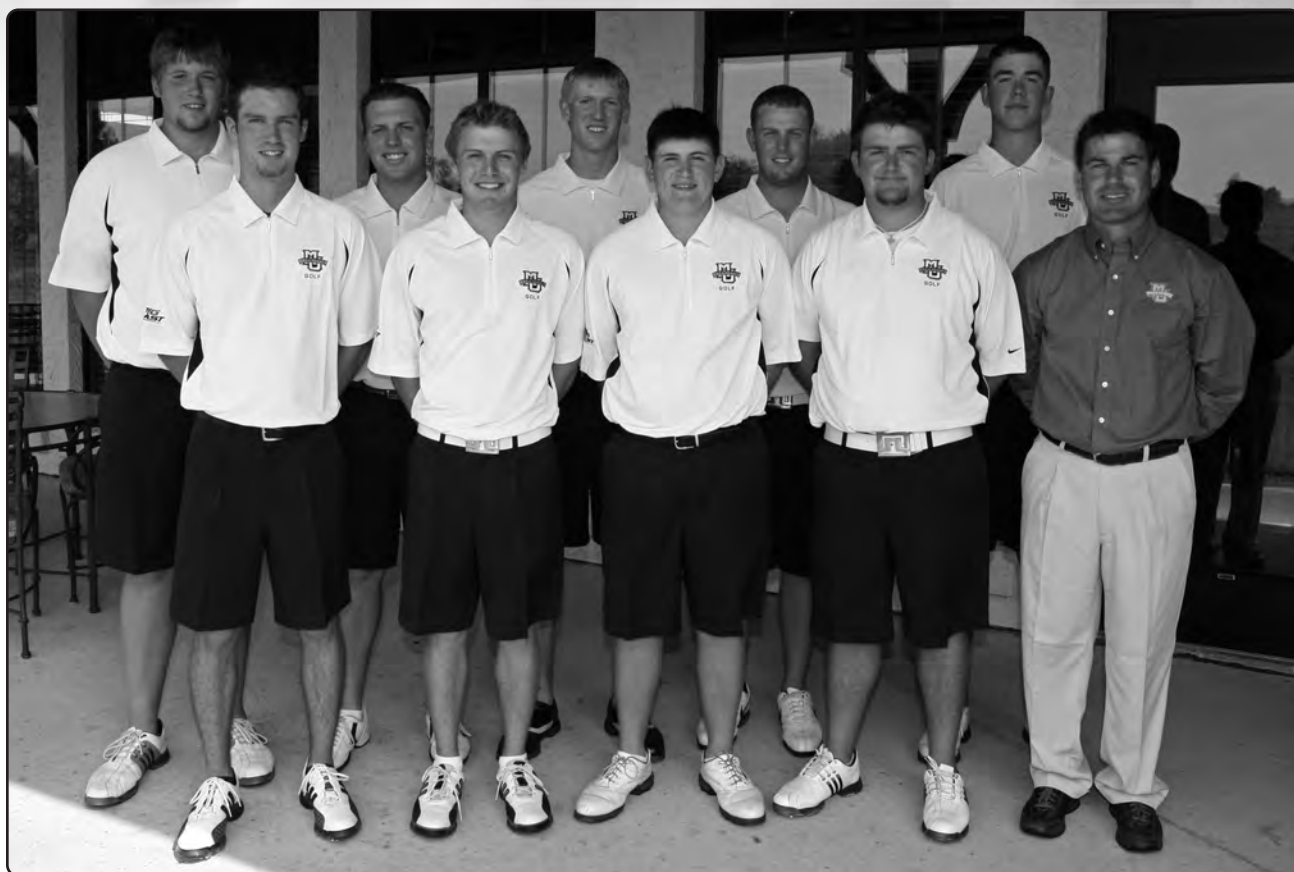

Senior (Fall 2007) – Bielawski's best finish of the Fall campaign came in the team's final event at the Stockton Sports Commission Pacific Invitational. There he carded a final-round 65 to finish at two-under, 214. After five tournaments, Bielawski averaged 74.20 strokes per round.

Junior (2006-07) – Bielawski didn't play in 2005-06, earning a redshirt and maintaining his junior status for the 2006-07 campaign. His best finish of 2006-07 came early on when he finished second with a career-low, four-under, 206, just two strokes off the individual medalist, at The McLaughlin held at the Bethpage Red Course in Farmingdale, N.Y. It was the squad's best individual score, propelling MU to a third-place team finish. The following weekend, Bielawski fired a six-under, 210, at the Xavier Intercollegiate thanks to a 68 in the final round. He placed fourth at the Marshall Invitational for his second top-5 finish of the season. Bielawski carried a 74.61 average, second-best on the team, during his junior season and lowered his overall career average to 75.32. He was one of four Golden Eagles to play every round in all of the team's 11 tournaments.

Sophomore (2004-05) – Bielawski competed in all 13 MU events, shooting a 74.68 season average. His season was highlighted by a 19th place finish at the Conference USA Championship. He was MU's top finisher, shooting a final-round 69 to finish at five-over 221.

Freshman (2003-04) – Bielawski had a solid first season in collegiate golf. His season was highlighted early on by a second place finish at the Xavier Intercollegiate in the final tournament of the fall season. He paced Marquette to a second place finish. Both the individual and team finishes were the highest of the season for MU golf. He set a school and course record with a 63 in the first round. He finished the season at 76.34, the fourth best average on the team. He was just one of two golfers to play in all 12 events for the season.

Prior to Marquette – Michael Bielawski was a four year letter winner at Nathan Hale High School in West Allis, Wis. He led his team to a Greater Metro Conference championship as a junior. The team finished second at the WIAA state championships that year. He tied for the conference title as a senior and was named a first-team all-conference performer. As a junior, he finished fourth in state and was a first-team all-state and all-conference selection with a 75.6 scoring average. He was also the 2002 Wisconsin Junior Player of the Year and 2003 Junior Masters Champion.

Personal – Michael Jon Bielawski was born April 30, 1985, in Milwaukee. His parents are Lynn and Charles Bielawski. His grandfather was a Marquette graduate in 1948. He has a younger sister, Amy. He is a public relations major.

Senior (Fall 2007) – Gray enjoyed perhaps the finest Fall season of his MU career with a combined stroke average of 72.87 after five tournaments. His low-round of 66 came at the Xavier Intercollegiate where he matched a career-best three-round total of 209. He finished 12th individually and helped MU to it's first title of the season. He placed sixth at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge, another tournament won by MU, with a two-over, 218.

Junior (2006-07) – Gray struggled to find his rhythm during the Fall season, but stepped up mightily during BIG EAST head-to-head competitions. His best score of the campaign came at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge, the last event of the Fall, where he posted a 218, finishing 12th overall and helping his MU squad to a runner-up showing, just two strokes behind team champion Akron. At the BIG EAST Championship, he carded a three-day total of 220 to tie for 15th place with teammate Dustin Schwab. Recorded a 75.83 scoring average for the season, resulting in a 74.58 career scoring average after three years at MU. He was one of four Golden Eagles to play every round in all of the team's 11 tournaments.

Sophomore (2005-06) – Gray turned in yet another great year as he recorded a scoring average of 74.41. With a career mark of 73.91 after two years, he ranked second on Marquette's all-time scoring average list behind Nathan Colson. After a decent fall, he came out in the spring and shot well in MU's first tournament, the Wexford Plantation. He finished 10th to lead MU. He had one other top-10 finish on the season, placing ninth at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge. He shot a one-under, 215 to help Marquette to its second team title of the year.

Freshman (2004-05) – Gray had a sensational initial season, recording Marquette's best single season average at 73.48. He made a big splash in his collegiate debut, shooting three-under, 213 to finish fourth at the John Piper Intercollegiate. He shot a 65 in his first collegiate round. He led MU with a 15th place finish, shooting one-under, 215, at the the Xavier Invitational. He placed a season best second at the 49er collegiate classic, after finishing the tournament with a 68 and 69 to finish at seven-under, 209. He was also MU's top finisher at the St. Croix Collegiate Classic. A 26th place finish at the Conference USA Championships led him to a spot on the C-USA All-Freshman team.

Prior to Marquette – A four time letterwinner at Oshkosh West, Gray was all-conference each of his four seasons. He was captain each of those seasons and was a second-team all-state selection during his high school career. He led his team to a pair of state championship tournaments and qualified for state each of the four seasons he played.

Personal – Gray was born January 9, 1986, to Todd and Karen Gray in Tucson, Ariz. He has an older brother, John, and younger brother, Charlie. He is a communications major.

Junior (Fall 2007) – After a disappointing opening weekend, Schwab rebounded to lead Marquette to a win at the Xavier Invitational, posting the team's best finish. He placed ninth with a nine-under, 207, a career-low that included a final-round 65, a career-low round that tied him with Eastern Kentucky's Phillip Hendrickson for low-round of the 19-team tournament.

Sophomore (2006-07) – Schwab adjusted quickly to the competition at the NCAA Division I level, placing 12th in two of his first three tournaments at Marquette. He tied with teammate Mike Van Sickle, carding a 212 at the McLaughlin held at the Bethpage Red Course in Farmingdale, N.Y., where the Golden Eagles finished third in the 16-team event. Schwab followed up with another 12th-place showing the very next weekend at the Xavier Intercollegiate, where he posted a six-under, 210. He ended his first season of competition at MU with a fine performance at the BIG EAST Championship, where he placed 15th individually. He was one of four Golden Eagles to play every round in all of the team's 11 tournaments. Overall, Schwab averaged 75.97 strokes per round and was second on the team with seven rounds equal to, or under par, including a season-low 68 on three separate occasions.

Freshman (2006) – Schwab did not play in his one semester at Marquette as a freshman.

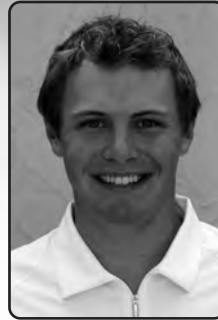
Prior to Marquette – Schwab played one semester at Edgewood College in Madison, Wis., where he led the team to a Lake Michigan Conference title, winning medalist honors. At Waunakee High School, he was a member of the 2005 Badger North Conference Championship Team. He placed second at the WIAA state meet in 2005 and also won the WSGA State Junior Championship that season. He won seven letters while at Waunakee High School, winning four in golf and three in ice hockey.

Personal – Schwab was born March 14, 1987, in Madison, Wis. to Howard and Linda Schwab. He has three older siblings – Tina, Angie and Rick. He is a communications major.

Junior (Fall 2007) – Streff did not play in any team competitions during the Fall season.

Sophomore (2006-07) – Streff played in one tournament for the Golden Eagles, carding a low-round of one-over, 73, at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge. He finished the tournament tied for 38th with a three-round total of 226, the best finish of his young career.

Freshman (2005-06) – Streff played in one tournament in his second year as a freshman. He carded a second round 73 en route to a 234 as he finished 56th at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge.

Redshirt Freshman (2004-05) – Streff did not see any action in his first season, as he sat out the year as a redshirt.

Prior to Marquette – Streff earned four letters at Monroe High School and was captain each of those four years for the Cheesemakers. He was named conference player-of-the-year as a senior. Streff was runner up in the 2003 Future Collegiate World Tour event at TPC of Deere Run. He was co-medalist of the 2003 U.S. Junior Qualifying tournament and was eighth at the 2004 Wisconsin amateur tournament. He was a three-time all-conference selection and led his team to a conference title as a senior.

Personal – Streff was born December 1, 1985, to Kathryn and Steven Streff in Madison, Wis. He has an older sister, Tara, and a younger sister Kayla. Streff is a biomedical sciences major.

Junior (Fall 2007) – Already a candidate to repeat as an All-America performer, Van Sickle was named to Golf World's Mid-Season All-America team and was labeled "The Best Player You've (Maybe) Never Heard Of" by the publication's senior collegiate writer Ryan Herrington. Van Sickle boasted two more tournament wins during the Fall season, bringing his career-victory total to five, one victory shy of matching the school's all-time record of six career wins set by Tom Uutala (1994-98). Uutala's most victories in a single season was three, matched by Van Sickle as a sophomore.

Van Sickle claimed medalist honors in consecutive tournaments at the Windon Memorial Classic and the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge, posting a seven-under, 206, and a 10-under, 206, respectively. Both scores resulted in the young star's lowest three-round total at the school until he carded an 11-under, 205, at the Stockton Sports Commission Pacific Invitational.

He went on to record five straight sub-70 rounds to wrap up team competition during the Fall season to finish with an impressive 69.67 scoring average. Van Sickle then participated in the invitation-only 2007 Western Refining College All-American Golf Classic. He finished 16th at the prestigious tournament, which has included numerous past champions now playing on the PGA TOUR, including Tiger Woods.

Prior to the start of his junior season at MU, Van Sickle was busy on the amateur circuits. In May, he was named co-recipient of the 2006-07 Western Pennsylvania Golf Association's Fran Fuhrer II Award, along with Penn State's Robert Rohanna, presented to the area's outstanding collegiate golfer. Later he was honored by Chestnut Ridge Golf Resort and Conference Center for breaking the course record at Tom's Run Golf Course, where Van Sickle carded a 12-under par 60 while winning the Dick's Sporting Goods Tri-State Amateur Championship. Van Sickle also claimed victory at the 91st Chuck Deardorff Memorial Open Championship, the state open championship of Pennsylvania.

Sophomore (2006-07) – A First Team All-BIG EAST selection, Van Sickle earned PING All-America Honorable Mention and All-Midwest Region accolades, tabbed by the Golf Coaches Association of America, at the conclusion of the season and became the first-ever Marquette golfer to qualify for the NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championships. He posted three top-10 finishes during the Fall season before beginning his run into uncharted territory for a Marquette golfer and finishing the season with a school-record 71.91 stroke average. At final tally, Van Sickle was ranked 39th in the Golfstat Cup and also nationally ranked by Golfweek.

Van Sickle opened the Spring campaign with an unprecedented three consecutive victories, winning the Wexford Plantation Intercollegiate, the Ron Smith/USF Invitational and the Mission Inn Collegiate Invitational in back-to-back-to-back fashion, an accomplishment that helped him earn Golf Week's national Player of the Week honor.

Freshman (2005-06) – Van Sickle came out of the gate strong, recording Marquette's best finish in the first three events of the season. In all, he led MU in scoring five times in the year. He finished the season

with a 73.53 scoring average, the second best season scoring average in MU history. He started strong, placing second in his first collegiate tournament, the John Piper Intercollegiate. He shot a 69 in his first collegiate round and finished the event at six-under, 208. He placed fifth at The Cardinal Intercollegiate with a five-under, 211, helping MU win its first tournament of the season. He also shot a five-under, 211, at the Xavier Intercollegiate. He led MU in scoring to conclude the fall, shooting a five-under, 211, at the BIG EAST/MAC Challenge. His final round 68 helped guide MU to the tournament win. He led MU in one other event, shooting 66 against Rollins College in a dual match prior to the BIG EAST Championships. At the BIG EAST Tournament, he placed 20th, shooting one-over, 217. For the year, Van Sickle led MU with 10 under par rounds and seven rounds below 70.

Prior to Marquette – Van Sickle was a well decorated golfer out of high school. He was ranked no. 1 on the Future Collegians World Tour golf ranking in 2004-05 and was the points leader in the 16-18 year old division. He was the Eastern Region Player of the Year by the FCWT and was a first-team All-American by the FCWT in 2004-05. He was also a member of the FCWT's All-Academic team and was the Western Pennsylvania Golf Association Junior Player of the Year. As captain of his Pine-Richland High School team, he led the squad to Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League titles in 2004 and 2005. He was a three year state championship qualifier and a two-time WPIAL champion. Van Sickle also played basketball, lettering three times.

Personal – Van Sickle was born December 17, 1986, in Milwaukee to Gary and Betsy Van Sickle. His father is a senior writer for Sports Illustrated and his mother was formerly the sports information director at Marquette. He is majoring in broadcast communications.

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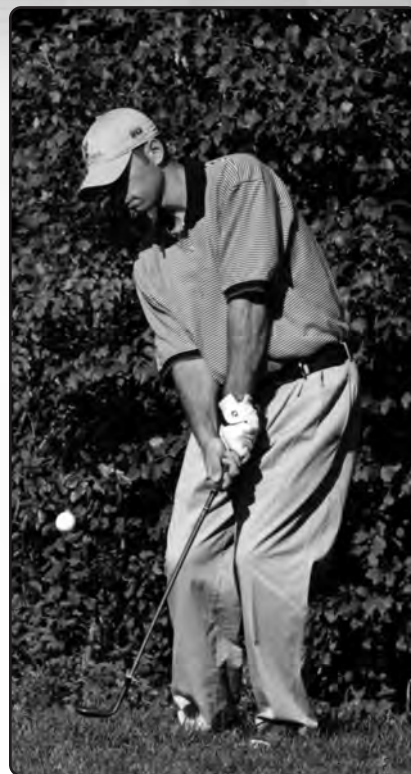

MARQUETTE GOLF FACILITIES

Brown Deer Golf Club

The Brown Deer Golf Course has long attracted national attention and has routinely appeared in the media lists of the top 10 public courses in the country.

It has played host to the USGA National Public Links Championship three times and has been home of the U.S. Bank Championships (formerly the Greater Milwaukee Open) since 1994.

The Brown Deer Golf Club opened for play in July of 1929 and was a big hit with golfers from the start. Brown Deer was designed by long-time Park Superintendent George Hansen, who designed five of Milwaukee County's 16 courses.

Brown Deer offers golfers 6,759 yards of challenging play. It offers long par fours (five over 400 yards), requiring strong drives that must avoid abundant stands of large trees. The course crosses streams at eight locations, with ponds adjoining three of the holes.

This traditional course features sand bunkers coming into play on nearly every hole. In addition, water hazards come into play on 10 holes. Most of the narrow fairways are tree lined, and the undulating greens are fast.

The Brown Deer course has benefitted from major improvements over the years. Since 1985, nearly \$3 million in renovations have been made to prepare it for the GMD. Additional improvements are planned for the course and the clubhouse.

Brown Deer Park Golf Course is part of the Milwaukee County Park System which includes 15 other golf courses and numerous other recreational facilities. The system includes everything from beaches on Lake Michigan to the Milwaukee County Zoo and everything in between. Brown Deer Park itself besides the championship golf course includes a lagoon, softball diamonds, tennis courts, volleyball courts and numerous picnic facilities.

The Bog

Designed by Arnold Palmer and Ed Seay, The Bog's 18 holes flow through 297 acres of wetlands, woods, rolling hills and wildlife habitat. The entire western boundary of The Bog abuts the Cedarburg Bog, the largest peatland in southern Wisconsin. The Cedarburg Bog contains over 1,700 acres and has been designated a National Natural Area Landmark and part of the national system of Experimental Ecological Reserves. It will never be developed thus providing a beautiful, natural backdrop for golf.

The Bog is a par 72 championship golf course. The course will play anywhere from 5,110 yards to 7,221 yards thanks to the 91 tee boxes which have been constructed. The Bog's design offers an enjoyable yet challenging blend of long and short holes, left and right doglegs, wide and narrow fairways, varying elevations, hazards, strategic bunkering, and gentle undulating greens. The Bog's site, almost double the size of most area courses, creates a secluded golf

environment because very few fairways run parallel to each other.

All of The Bog's tees, fairways and greens consist of various bentgrass strains. Roughs have been seeded or sodded with bluegrass. Out-of-play areas have been seeded with native grasses and wildflowers.

Among The Bog's most dramatic and penal features are revetment-faced bunkers. Early Scottish and Irish architects created revetment bunkers to minimize wind erosion on links courses. The Bog's original topography welcomed this type of bunker construction. The Bog contains a total of 116 bunkers. Of these, 15 are revetted.

The Bog has hosted a number of championship events recently, including the 2006 WPGA State Open Championship, 2005 WPGA Pro-Assistant, 2005 USGA Senior Amateur Qualifying, 2005 Wisconsin State Women's Open Championship, 2004 WPGA State Senior Open, and 2004 WSGA State Amateur Championship.

INDOOR SHORT-GAME PRACTICE FACILITY

While the Marquette Gym has been home to the Marquette golf team for the duration of the program, the Marquette Gym now houses a new practice area for the golf team.

Built in the lower level of the Marquette Gym, just steps from the entrance to the team locker room, sits the program's on-campus practice area, designed for work on putting and around-the-green scenarios.

The surface is a Field Turf surface that replicates an actual putting green and offers a realistic feel and lie to shot-making practice. The new practice area offers MU golfers a weather-protected practice area available at any time.

MARQUETTE PRESIDENT ROBERT A. WILD, S.J.

Robert A. Wild, S.J., is the 22nd president of Marquette University. He began his duties as chief executive on June 17, 1996.

Father Wild is building on Marquette's core strengths: an academically rigorous, values-centered curriculum; solid, practical



preparation for work in a world of increasing complexity and diversity; formation for life of students as ethical and informed leaders in their religious, cultural, professional and civic communities; and

graduating women and men who will dedicate their lives to the service of others.

Under his leadership, the university in 2000 embraced a statement of shared vision for the future:

"Our vision is to provide a Catholic, Jesuit education that is genuinely transformational so that our students graduate not simply better educated but better people, and to do so with such excellence that when asked to name the three or four best Catholic universities in America, people will include Marquette as a matter of course."

Marquette has established clear, measurable goals and specific strategies to achieve this long-term vision. Under Father Wild's leadership, the university has improved academic quality, increased and stabilized enrollment and enhanced partnerships with the City of Milwaukee and community groups. In 2005 Marquette completed the most successful comprehensive campaign in the history of the university raising a total of \$357 million. Marquette is committed to updating academic facilities for students in the 21st century: a new School of Dentistry opened in 2002, the John P. Raynor, S.J., Library was dedicated in 2003, and the Al McGuire Center, a practice facility for student-athletes, opened in 2004. Father Wild and his Marquette colleagues

remain committed to providing students with a Catholic, Jesuit education in an atmosphere of care and faith.

Immediately prior to assuming the Marquette presidency, from 1992 to 1996 Father Wild served as president of the Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, Mass., a graduate school which trains clergy and laity for leadership roles in the Catholic Church. From 1985 to 1991 he served as provincial superior of the Chicago Province of the Society of Jesus, directing the activities of Jesuits in northern Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and southwestern Ohio. A biblical scholar and author of two books and numerous scholarly articles, Father Wild taught theology at Marquette from 1975 to 1984. He has been a member of the university's Board of Trustees since 1990.

Father Wild is a native of Chicago. He holds a doctoral degree in New Testament and Christian origins from Harvard University, a master's degree in classical languages, a bachelor's degree in Latin from

Loyola University Chicago, and a licentiate in theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Chicago. He has held visiting professorships at Loyola University Chicago and the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. Father Wild began his teaching career at St. Xavier High School in Cincinnati, where he taught Latin, Greek and speech and debate from 1964 to 1967. He entered the Society of Jesus in 1957 and was ordained to the priesthood in 1970.

Father Wild is chair of the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities and a member of the boards of Saint Joseph's University, the Association of Jesuit Colleges and Universities, the Big East Conference, the Council for Opportunity in Education, the Greater Milwaukee Committee, and the Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce.



MARQUETTE LEADERSHIP

Madeline Wake, Ph.D. **Provost**

Madeline Musante Wake, Ph.D., is the provost of Marquette University. Reporting to the president, the provost is responsible for academic affairs and institutional planning.

The provost provides intellectual vision and strong leadership for the 10 academic deans and the dean of libraries.

Prior to her appointment as provost in 2002, she was dean of Marquette's College of Nursing for nine years and directed the nursing continuing education program for 14 years. She has been a nursing faculty member since 1977. She has held positions of clinical nurse specialist and hospital nurse administrator.

Wake has consulted on nursing care systems design, continuing education and strategic planning. She has spoken nationally and internationally on nursing and nursing education. She chaired conference committees for national conferences on critical care and the 1986 International Conference on Intensive Care Nursing held in The Hague. She has served as president of the American Diabetes Association — Wisconsin Affiliate, treasurer of the American Association of Colleges of Nursing, and chairperson of the Trinity Hospital Board of Directors. She is currently board chairperson of Aurora Visiting Nurse Association and a member of the board of directors for St. Francis Seminary, the Blood Center of Wisconsin, and the Cen-

ter for International Health.

Wake has conducted research and has published articles on nursing care delivery systems in U.S. hospitals and on nursing classification. From 1992 to 1999 she was a member of the eight-person core team which developed the International Classification for Nursing Practice. She and three other nurse leaders founded the Wisconsin Nursing Redesign Consortium, a collaborative effort of health care and educational institutions.

Wake was inducted as a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing in 1994. She has received the Outstanding Alumnus Award of Marquette's graduate nursing program, Wisconsin Nursing Association Excellence in Nursing Education Award, Professional Dimensions Sacagawea Award, and the Sigma Theta Tau Distinguished Lecturers Award.

Wake received her diploma from St. Francis Hospital School of Nursing in Hartford, Conn.; her B.S.N. and M.S.N. degrees from Marquette University; and a Ph.D. with a major in urban education and a minor in nursing from the University of Wisconsin — Milwaukee.



Greg Kliebhan **Senior Vice President**

Greg Kliebhan is the senior vice president of Marquette University. Reporting to the president, Kliebhan is responsible for top university support functions, which include these divisions: Administration, Finance, General Counsel, Intercollegiate Athletics, Marketing and Communication, Public Affairs, Student Affairs and University Advancement.

Kliebhan has strong Marquette legacy roots and a deep family allegiance. His father, wife Linda, daughters Kelly and Katy, brother, sister and brother-in-law are all alumni.

Kliebhan, himself, is a product of a Marquette education, having earned his undergraduate degree in 1973 from the College of Liberal Arts (now Arts and Sciences). He went on to earn his M.B.A. at the University of Illinois. He was very pleased to return to Marquette in 1976 to join the university's administrative team as a management analyst.

Kliebhan has assumed increasing responsibility for university administration, finance and planning, and has held more than a dozen positions, including key strategic positions such as budget director, director of budget and institutional research, vice president for planning, vice president for administration, interim vice president for university advancement, corporate secretary, and senior vice president and corporate treasurer.

Passion for Marquette and putting students first have charac-

terized Kliebhan's career at Marquette. His personal philosophy reads in part:

"Together, we need to convince all of our staff that their work for students is noble, enriching, and absolutely vital to Marquette University's success — whatever position they might hold and however far from daily contact with students it might be. Marquette University and the work it does with all of its publics is a vocation, not a job... "technical" competence is simply not enough by itself — competence coupled with sincere involvement in this institution is what we should expect and insist on."

Kliebhan and his wife Linda, who graduated from Marquette in 1974 as a physical therapist, bring a similar passion to volunteer activities. As a couple, they served as president of Kelly and Katy's high school parents association at Divine Savior/Holy Angels (DSHA). Greg also was active in the family's parish school, Sts. Cecilia and James School, including serving as coach of the girls' basketball team for eight years. He also coached grade school and high school AAU basketball teams.

In addition to his role as MU's corporate treasurer, Kliebhan has served on the boards of a number of community organizations, including the Bridging the Gap Learning Center and DSHA High School.

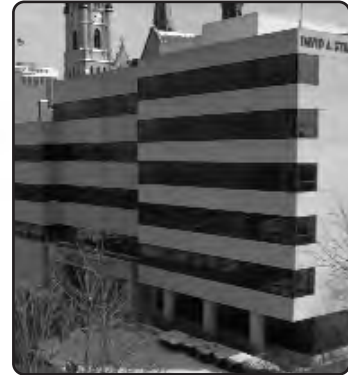

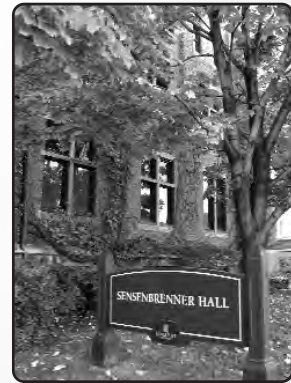

A member of the Marquette University family for more than a decade, Athletic Director Steve Cottingham has played an intricate role in the development of the Intercollegiate Athletics program at the University.

As Athletic Director, Cottingham oversees Marquette's 14 intercollegiate sports and coaching staffs.
