KEY STORYLINES

Saturday will be the final regular season home match and "Senior Night" for the Golden Eagles, who will be honoring their six current seniors during a brief pre-game ceremony. Marquette needs just one BIG EAST point with two regular season matches remaining to earn its first-ever trip to the league's postseason tournament, which begins Wednesday, Nov. 4.

POSTSEASON PICTURE

Marquette is one point shy of clinching the No. 6 seed in the Blue Division. MU would earn the final spot in the 2009 BIG EAST Men's Soccer Championship with a win (3 pts) or a tie (1pt) against either Pittsburgh or UConn. Marquette would also clinch a postseason berth if West Virginia defeats or draws with Seton Hall on Saturday, regardless of the outcome of MU's final two regular season matches. However, Seton Hall would earn the No. 6 seed if the Pirates were to beat WVU and if MU lost both of its matches.

ABOUT THE OPPONENT

Pitt is coming off a 3-2 home win over Seton Hall, its first victory since a 3-1 decision over Robert Morris in the regular season opener on Sept. 1 and lone BIG EAST win of the 2009 campaign. Half of the Panthers' 12 goals this season have come in those two matches. Offensively, Pitt is led by Ryan Brode, who has registered seven points on three goals and an assist, and Mike McDade with three goals. On the other end of the pitch, goalkeepers Keega Gunderson and Zack Matthews have combined for a 1.78 goals against average and 29 goals allowed.

"SENIOR NIGHT"

A pre-game ceremony is planned prior to Marquette's final regular season game of the season, Oct. 31 vs. Pittsburgh, to celebrate the six current seniors who will be graduating from the program. Matt Pyzdrowski, Tim Jallow, Nick Kay, Tom Lynn and Billy Von Rueden will be honored before the match.

LAST TIME OUT

Marquette lost its second straight match with Saturday's (Oct. 24) 1-0 loss at Providence. The Friars netted the game-winning goal in the 55th minute and out-shot the Golden Eagles 13-9, as three MU players placed shots on goal.

SERIES HISTORY

Pitt has won all four of its matches against Marquette, which includes a pair of victories at Valley Fields. MU fell to the Panthers 1-0 last season in Indianola, Pa.

UCONN MATCH MOVED TO MONDAY

Marquette's match at No. 8/5 Connecticut, originally scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 28, was postponed due to unplayable field conditions. That match has been re-scheduled for Monday, Nov. 2 at Morrone Stadium in Storrs, Conn.

MARQUETTE AGAINST TOP-RANKED TEAMS

In all, the Golden Eagles have faced seven teams in 2009 that were nationally ranked or receiving votes in one or more of the four major polls at the time of the game. Three of those matches have been played against teams ranked in the top 10 nationally, according to the NSCAA/adidas poll. MU fell to No. 9 UC Irvine earlier this season, 1-0, and came from behind to draw at No. 5 USF (1-1) and against No. 9 Louisville (2-2).

DELIVERING IN THE CLUTCH

Calum Mallace's goal against Georgetown was his third of the season and fourth of his career. All four of his collegiate goals have been game-winners in big games for the Golden Eagles, including two Milwaukee Cup victories, this season's first BIG EAST win (Sept. 25 vs. Cincinnati), and a win over the Georgetown Hoyas (Oct. 21), who were nationally ranked at the time.

WELCOME TO THE CLUB

Marquette had gone three consecutive matches without scoring a goal following its 1-0 season-opening win over Wisconsin-Milwaukee. Freshman Adam Lysak ended the scoreless stretch with a masterful goal at USF on Sept. 18, the first goal of his collegiate career. Since then, four other Golden Eagles have netted their first career goal -- Chris Madsen (9/20 vs. DePaul); Amicar Herrera and Billy Von Rueden (9/27 vs. Louisville); and Andrew Krynski (10/13 vs. Bucknell).

RISING STARS

All but three of Marquette's 21 points on offense this season have come from underclassmen. Sophomore Calum Mallace's six points (three goals) leads the pack followed by classmate Amicar Herrera and freshman Andrew Krynski each with three points (one goal, one assist).

MARQUETTE MEN'S SOCCER GAME NOTES

BETWEEN THE POSTS, IN THE RECORD BOOKS

Senior goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski ranks among Marquette's all-time leaders in several career statistical categories. "Pyz" entered this week ranked seventh in program history in saves (197) and shutouts (10), while his 5,156:08 minutes between the posts ranked fifth in the Marquette record book.

INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR

Known as the "world's game," soccer's global reach is reflected in the geographical breakdown of Marquette's roster. Currently, there are five Golden Eagles that hail from outside of the United States: Michael Greene (Liberia), Tim Jallow (Sweden), Calum Mallace (Scotland), Amilcar Herrera (Panama City, Panama) and Ryan Robb (England). Additionally, head coach Louis Bennett and director of soccer operations Dave Doggett were both born in England and volunteer assistant coach Marcelo Santos is from Brazil.

ILLINOIS INROADS

In addition to finding some of the top talent in Wisconsin, head coach Louis Bennett and associate head coach Stan Anderson have recruited heavily across the state's southern border. This is evident by the fact there are 10 players on the roster who hail from Illinois, mostly from the Chicagoland area -- Ben Calvopina, Anthony Colaizzi, Andy Huftalin, Andrew Krynski, Matt Leonard, Tom Lynn, Greg Pignataro, Matt Pyzdrowski, Anthony Selvaggi and Matt Stummer.

ON THE TUBE

Marquette has played two matches this season televised locally in Milwaukee on Time Warner Cable Sports32. MU's 1-0 season-opening win over Wisconsin-Milwaukee and 2-0 loss to Notre Dame on Oct. 7 were televised.

WEEKLY HONORS

Matt Pyzdrowski and Calum Mallace both were named to the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll on Oct. 19 following Marquette's 1-0 win over nationally ranked Georgetown. Mallace scored the game-winner and Pyzdrowski tallying five saves in his fourth shutout of the year. The honor is the second of the season for Pyzdrowski, who also earned the honor the week of Sept. 28 following a 1-0 double overtime shutout against Cincinnati and a 2-2 draw versus 9/7 Louisville. Mallace was also one of 12 NCAA Division I players named to the Oct. 20 *Soccer America* Team of the Week.

MILLER BOUNCES BACK

MU captain Scott Miller has had an impressive comeback following injuries that sidelined him for most of the 2008 season, all the while making the switch from central defender to a defensive midfield role during the offseason. Miller has played every minute of every match this season, making him the only Golden Eagles player to play in every game.

MATCH #1

Marquette 1, Milwaukee 0 Sept. 1 • Valley Fields

MILWAUKEE - The Marquette men's soccer team kept possession of the Milwaukee Cup as sophomore Calum Mallace's goal in the 85th minute off a direct kick secured a 1-0 victory for the Golden Eagles at Valley Fields Tuesday night.

At the 84:10 mark, Mallace placed a direct kick around the defensive wall, netting the ball in the far side of the goal past a diving John Shakon. The 35-yard direct kick came off of a Milwaukee foul in front of a crowd of 1,147. The sophomore also tallied the game-winner in last year's Milwaukee Cup.

The first half saw scoring chances for both squads, with each team unable to capitalize on the opportunities.

In the eighth minute, Marquette sophomore Chris Madsen, who tallied his first collegiate start, crossed the ball from the right side and found senior Nick Kay in the middle of the box, who forced freshman Shakon to make a diving save. The Panthers countered in the 16th minute, as a dangerous cross by junior Peter Sanger was cleared out of the box by sophomore Scott Miller.

MU senior goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski made his lone save of the game in the 37th minute on a shot by UWM's Sanger. Sanger carried the ball up the left side of the field and into the box, drew Pyzdrowski out of the net and forced the MU keeper to make a diving save at the near post.

Marquette led with six shots to the Panthers' three at halftime. MU also saw an advantage in corner kicks, 5-2. Pyzdrowski made one save in the first half, the only of the match, while Shakon made three for the Panthers.

Coming out of halftime with no score, both teams battled for the win in the second half, their physical play resulting in five yellow cards in the final 45 minutes.

In a span of five minutes towards the beginning of the second half, the Golden Eagles tallied four shots off of five corner kicks. An Amilcar Herrera corner kick in the 50th minute found sophomore Michael Alfano in the box, who forced Shakon to punch the ball over the crossbar. On the resulting MU corner kick, Miller narrowly missed a goal with his header off of Mallace's corner deflecting off Shakon.

The Panthers had an opportunity in the 58th minute when UWM sophomore Zach Funk had a breakaway towards the goal, but was taken down with no call. Mallace's goal in the 85th minute was the last major scoring opportunity for either team in the half.

On the game, Marquette outshot Milwaukee 13-3, and overwhelmed the Panthers on corner kicks, tallying 11 to Milwaukee's three. Milwaukee's Shakon tallied five saves on the game, while the first half save by Pyzdrowski was his only of the game. Six yellow cards were handed out in the game, to Marquette's Billy Von Rueden (44:50), Scott Miller (56:20), Anthony Colaizzi (83:03) and Calum Mallace (84:10), and to Milwaukee's Stephen Romanello (69:28) and Kevin Acevedo (84:05). Fouls were even, with 13 apiece.

The Panthers lead the Milwaukee Cup record 25-9-3, but Tuesday night's win was the second in a row for Marquette.

MATCH #2

Drake 2, Marquette 0 Sept. 6 • Des Moines, Iowa

DES MOINES, Iowa -- Nationally ranked Drake (2-1) used a pair of second half goals to hand the Marquette University men's soccer team its first loss of the 2009 season Sunday with a 2-0 decision over the Golden Eagles (1-1) at Cownie Soccer Stadium.

Drake, which entered the non-conference contest ranked No. 21 in the nation according to the College Soccer News preseason Top-30 poll, controlled possession for most of evening. But it wasn't until midway through the second half when the Bulldogs were able to break through.

Senior goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski was busy early on as the Bulldogs had some early opportunities off of set pieces. Drake used five corner kicks in the first five minutes of action to put three shots on target.

Another Bulldog set piece proved dangerous for the Golden Eagles' when Ted Schleisman's free kick from 23 yards out curled off the near post.

Although their scoring opportunities were not as plenty in the first 45 minutes of action, sophomore midfielder Calum Mallace gave the Golden Eagles two exciting chances with a pair long-range rockets -- one that hit the left post from 30 yards out and another strike that deflected off the Drake keeper from roughly the same distance.

"Matt Pyzdrowski was our best player, so that was an indication as to how the game went for us," said Marquette head coach Louis Bennett. "Despite Drake's first half dominance, Calum Mallace actually came as close as any one of their chances. In the end, I think it was a fair result."

The second half was more of the same as the Bulldogs used ball possession to create more opportunities. But it wasn't until the 64th minute that Drake was finally able to get on the scoreboard when keeper Michael Drozd punted the ball forward to Matt Kuhn who settled the long pass, beat one MU defender and placed a near perfect finish into the top-left corner of the net.

Moments later the Bulldogs were awarded a penalty kick after a Marquette defender was whistled for a foul in the box. Drake's Kevin Shroul capitalized by putting it past a diving Pyzdrowski inside the right post to give his team a 2-0 lead at 67:59.

Pyzdrowski made five saves on the night as Drake out-shot the Golden Eagles 13-6. Meanwhile, Marquette managed just one shot on goal.

MILWAUKEE -- On the first day of the second annual Marquette Invitational, the Golden Eagles fell to Buffalo, 4-0, on Friday night at Valley Fields.

Despite outshooting the Bulls 19-12, including a 12-1 dominance in the first half, head coach Louis Bennett's squad was unable to get on the scoreboard over their 90 minutes of play. MU also led in corner kicks, 19-1, tallying 13 corner kicks in the second half.

"Between the 18-yard boxes, we were at our best," said Bennett. "We created opportunities. We created set pieces, things that we have practiced, and we couldn't follow through. It's bitterly disappointing. We'll just simply have to be better. Where it counts -- in front of the goal -- we were by no means anywhere where we have to be."

Scoring opened in the 17th minute for Buffalo when senior Steffen Thoresen took a direct kick from 40 yards out and found the head of junior midfielder Rich Wilson, who finished the goal. The goal was UB's only shot of the half.

Marquette junior Matt Stummer almost tallied an assist when his cross from the right side of the field to sophomore Amilcar Herrera's header went just wide of the goal. Less than a minute later, senior Michael Greene teed up from the top of the box, but fired over the crossbar.

Buffalo's second shot of the game came after halftime, when junior Mike Unwin lofted a shot from inside midfield, trying to beat MU goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski, who was out of the box.

UB tallied the second goal in the 57th minute when senior Dan Bulley crossed the ball from the right side to Unwin. He settled the pass, turned and fired from 16 yards out to the lower left of the goal.

Within five minutes, head coach John Astudillo's team cushioned their lead with a third goal. Junior Casey Derkacz's shot rebounded inside the box, and sophomore Lucas Bassan one-touched for the finish.

At the 85:49 mark, UB freshman Risto Latti sent a diagonal from the right side to Unwin, who beat Pyzdrowski and netted the final goal of the game to give Buffalo a 4-0 advantage. The goal was Unwin's second of the game, on four shots and three shots on goal.

Pyzdrowski tallied two saves in 90 minutes, while UB sophomore keeper Nick Fetterman saved six MU threats. Buffalo led Marquette in fouls, 13-9, and each team was even with two yellow cards apiece. Buffalo's Alex Mihal and Derkacz received cautions, as did Marquette's Michael Greene and Anthony Selvaggi. Sophomore Calum Mallace's six shots were a career high.

MILWAUKEE - The Marquette men's soccer team fell to nationally ranked UC Irvine, 1-0, on the final day of Marquette Invitational action at Valley Fields Sunday afternoon.

"A loss is a loss," said Marquette head coach Louis Bennett. "I still feel the same dagger for losing, but did we perform better? Yes. We created some opportunities, the keeper made some saves, they blocked a couple of shots -- It was a great college game."

UC Irvine junior Spencer Thompson tallied the lone goal of the afternoon at the 56:33 mark in the second half. Senior Carlos Aguilar fed Thomas from the middle, where the forward settled the ball on the left side of the box, beat a Marquette defender, and slotted the ball past goalkeeper Keenan Flynn to the near post. The goal was one of Thomas' seven shots of the afternoon, five of which were on frame.

Play for much of the game was even, as the Anteaters outshot head coach Louis Bennett's squad, 19-14. UC Irvine led in corner kicks, 8-7.

Sophomore Calum Mallace almost tallied an early goal for the Golden Eagles in the seventh minute, when a shot from 35 yards out on the left side forced sophomore Andrew Fontein to make a diving save and knock the ball away for an MU corner kick. The shot on goal was one of Mallace's three of the game. His six total shots led Marquette as he and teammate Michael Greene were named to the 11-person all-tournament team.

The Anteaters nearly got on the board in the closing minutes of the first half when freshman Jonathan Prieto's shot ricocheted off the crossbar and rebounded to classmate Zach Olow, whose header was saved by Flynn.

Flynn, a junior who transferred from St. Mary's (Calif.) prior to the 2008 season, made his first career regular season start in net for the Golden Eagles. He allowed one goal in 90 minutes while tallying seven saves.

Following halftime, Marquette had the first opportunity to get on the board, as senior Tom Lynn drew a foul outside of the box in the offensive third. Mallace took the resulting direct kick in the 55th minute, and placed a shot on goal from 35 yards out.

After UC Irvine's goal in the 57th minute, the Anteaters outshot MU 8-5. Flynn came up big for Marquette in the 66th minute when Irvine's Thompson received the ball on the endline inside the box and squared off against Flynn, who deflected the shot for a corner kick.

A Marquette direct kick in the 75th minute led to a UCI counterattack, as junior Jorge Reyes collected the deflection off the MU kick, carried the ball up the middle and found Aguilar on the left side of the box, whose shot deflected off of junior Matt Stummer.

The Golden Eagles had their final opportunity to even the score in the 89th minute when a foul at the top of the box and subsequent yellow card to sophomore Joel Bagby resulted in a Marquette direct kick. Mallace drilled the ball into the wall, but couldn't get it through to the net.

Fontein collected four saves for the Anteaters, who finished third in the Marquette Invitational. Buffalo finished in second place, with as many points as UCI, but a better goal differential. Bennett's squad finished in fourth place in the second annual event.

TAMPA, Fla. -- The Marquette University men's soccer team battled No. 5/9 USF (4-0-1) to a 1-1 draw in the BIG EAST Conference opener for both teams Friday night from USF Soccer Stadium. Playing in his first collegiate match after sitting out the first five weeks of the season with injury, Golden Eagles (1-3-1) freshman Adam Lysak netted the equalizer in the 57th minute.

Lysak's game-tying goal came off a shot by sophomore midfielder Amilcar Herrera, whose strike hit the left post. Lysak gathered the rebound from within the six-yard box and calmly deposited the ball into the top right corner of the net.

"I just saw the goalie trying to scurry back across the goal, and remember the ball being in the air," said Lysak. "From that point, natural instincts just took over. I remember shooting it, striking the ball as I was laying on the ground watching it go in the goal. I'm very happy with how our team performed. I didn't know what to expect. I feel that we definitely played the way we were supposed to, and it's unfortunate that we couldn't get a better result."

USF garnered the advantage in the 30th minute. Marquette goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski tried intercepting an intended cross from the Bulls Bernardo Anor, who side-stepped a Golden Eagles defender to the end line. But the cross which was sent from the left side of the box deflected off a diving Pyzdrowski and bounced into the net to make it 1-0 in favor of USF.

Marquette dodged a big bullet with just 45 seconds remaining in regulation when a penalty kick was awarded to the Bulls. Pyzdrowski, who finished the evening with a season-high nine saves, dove right but USF's Javed Mohammed missed the PK attempt wide left.

MU sophomore Scott Miller had a crack at a game-winner minutes into the first overtime period. In the 107th minute, classmate Calum Mallace sent a corner kick into the box to Miller who was positioned in front of the goal. But Miller's header rattled the right post and the ball was cleared away by the Bulls.

Although it was a relatively clean match overall until extra time, MU defender Billy Von Rueden picked up his second yellow card of the evening with four minutes remaining in the second overtime period. Despite playing a man down for the remainder of the match, the Golden Eagles were able to stave off the USF attack until the final horn, while still mounting pressure on their side of the field.

The Bulls had their final chance to put the match away in the 107th minute on a corner kick sent into the box by Mohammed. The ball curled over the head of Pyzdrowski, but was cleared at the goal line by MU junior defender Matt Stummer.

USF out-shot the Golden Eagles 27-18, but shots on goal were even at 10 apiece. The Bulls, the reigning BIG EAST champions, remain unbeaten at home in their last 21 matches -- a streak that dates back to the 2007 season. Meanwhile, the Golden Eagles were able to find the back of the net for the first time since its 1-0 season-opening win over Wisconsin-Milwaukee back on Sept. 1.

CHICAGO -- As raindrops and darkness fell on Wish Field, DePaul's Antonio Aguilar bent a free kick inside the far post for the golden goal as the Blue Demons (4-3, 1-1 BIG EAST) claimed a 2-1 double-overtime victory Sunday afternoon over Marquette (1-4-1, 0-1-1 BIG EAST).

DePaul was listed as taking four of the five shots that were credited in the half, although each squad appeared to have at least a handful of half chances that they were not able to capitalize on.

A pair of headers by the Blue Demons taken just outside the six-yard box were perhaps the closest either team was to scoring in the first period, but both shot attempts sailed wide of the goal. The lone shot credited to the Golden Eagles was taken by junior midfielder Matt Stummer that flew over the crossbar in the 13th minute.

Both teams came out in the second half with a better sense of urgency. In the 77th minute, Adam Lysak put a shot on goal that was blocked by a DePaul defender. In the 81st minute, the Golden Eagles built another attack that culminated in a point-blank strike by Calum Mallace from the top of the box that was saved by the DePaul keeper.

DePaul was without midfield Steffen Vroom, the reigning NSCAA/adidas National Player of the Week. Vroom was injured in the Blue Demons' 2-1 loss to Notre Dame on Friday. Meanwhile, the Golden Eagles were without senior defender Billy Von Rueden, who had picked up a pair of yellow cards Friday at USF. Von Rueden had played in every game since his freshman season before tonight.

MILWAUKEE - The Marquette men's soccer team had enough endurance to outlast Cincinnati, 1-0, Friday night at Valley Fields for its first BIG EAST win of the season. With both teams scoreless through regulation time, sophomore midfielder Calum Mallace found the back of the net on a direct kick with 109:55 on the clock, sealing the victory in double overtime.

A Cincinnati foul placed the ball 22 yards out towards the center of the field for the Golden Eagles. Mallace and junior Anthony Colaizzi both stood over the ball, and on the whistle Colaizzi ran over the ball before Mallace struck the ball into the left side of the net for the golden goal.

With the win, the Golden Eagles improve to 2-4-1 overall, and 1-1-1 in the BIG EAST.

Cincinnati (5-3-0, 1-2-0 BIG EAST), which entered the game as the top scoring team in the BIG EAST with 16 goals in seven games, was held to just two shots on goal. Both squads had chances in regulation to take the lead, but neither took advantage of the slippery conditions in a game played in heavy rain.

In the 39th minute, just three minutes after replacing Adam Lysak, senior Nick Kay tallied a shot on goal from the left side, as his attack from eight yards out forced Cincinnati goalkeeper Matt Williams to make a diving save. After a scoreless 90 minutes of play, the Golden Eagles entered their third consecutive overtime game in a row, after tying 5/9 USF and falling at DePaul in the last week. The extra time was the first of the season for Cincinnati, which left Milwaukee with their second BIG EAST loss.

Overtime was evenly played, as both teams played cautiously with the wet conditions but still played the ball in their attacking areas. UC outshot the Golden Eagles, 4-2, in the final 20 minutes. In the 97th minute, Bearcats defender Kit North served a dangerous cross into the area, which Pyzdrowski deflected. A quick counterattack gave the ball to sophomore Chris Madsen up the middle, who couldn't get a shot off.

With the clock ticking down in the first overtime, Mallace served a cross from the left side and found Madsen in the box, who got a head on the serve in the far side of the box, but headed it just wide of the right post.

The first and only Bearcats opportunity of the second overtime came at the 106:25 mark when redshirt freshman midfielder Darren Weber passed the ball to junior midfielder Mark Konitsch on the right side, forcing Pyzdrowski to make his second, and final, save of the game.

Cincinnati outshot Marquette, 14-11, but MU was able to garner more shots on frame, tallying eight on goal versus the Bearcats' two. Williams recorded seven saves for UC, all in regulation. Five MU players were on the field the entire game, with Mallace and Scott Miller joining the backline of Pyzdrowski, Alfano and Stummer.

MILWAUKEE -- The Marquette men's soccer team rallied from a 2-0 first half deficit to tie the Louisville Cardinals, 2-2, Sunday afternoon at Valley Fields.

Freddie Braun and Mark Knight tallied goals for the Cardinals in the first half before Golden Eagles Billy Von Rueden and Amilcar Herrera netted two in the second frame to even the score.

Mallace and junior Anthony Colaizzi received cautions in the game. Colaizzi picked up another yellow card in the 80th minutes which caused Marquette to play a man down for the final 9:38 of the game.

Krynski and Von Rueden led the Golden Eagles with three shots apiece. Freshman Abel Sebele led the Mountaineers with four total shots, and five WVU players had a shot on goal. MILWAUKEE - SOUTH ORANGE, N.J. -- Marquette earned a crucial point Saturday in BIG EAST men's soccer action to remain ahead of Seton Hall in the Blue Division standings following a 0-0 draw with the Pirates at Owen T. Carroll Field.

Neither squad was able to find the back of the net despite at least a dozen solid scoring opportunities for each side. In 110 minutes, Seton Hall produced 18 shots -- three more than the Golden Eagles. But MU placed six shots on goal, led by sophomore midfielders Calum Mallace and Scott Miller with two apiece, compared to just three shots on target for the Pirates.

Seton Hall controlled possession in the opening minutes, forcing the Marquette backline to get established early. The freshman striker received a cross in the 47th minute and had just the keeper to beat, but headed the ball off the cross bar. Moments later, Brayon Martinez returned the favor and got the Seton Hall fans on their feet after he recovered a ball at the top of the box and whipped a bicycle kick wide of the left post.

MU created another one-on-one opportunity with Seton Hall goalkeeper Paul McHenry in the 67th minute. Anthony Colaizzi stole a throw-in on the defensive end and quickly played it forward to Krynski who sent a perfect through ball to the middle of the field where Anthony Selvaggi beat his defender. Selvaggi wasn't able to get off a solid shot, however, as McHenry was able to smother the freshman attacking midfielder.

Seton Hall wasn't able to capitalize on three corner kicks in the first overtime period, and Marquette generated only two shots in extra time as both teams were visibly fatigued from the high-energy, fast-paced affair.

With the tie, the Golden Eagles are now 2-6-3 overall and 1-3-3 (six points) in league play, while Seton Hall is 4-6-2 (14-2 BIG EAST) on the season with five points within conference.

MILWAUKEE - In a rare Tuesday matinee, the Marquette men's soccer team fell, 2-1, in the second overtime period to Bucknell after tallying the equalizer in the 87th minute of regulation to force extra time.

Bucknell freshman Brendan Burgdorf tallied the first goal of the match in the 64th minute, as C.K. Kumah played the ball into Burgdorf, who beat three defenders to the top of the box and placed the ball inside the left post, just past a diving Keenan Flynn.

Marquette netted the equalizer with under four minutes left in regulation. Freshman Andrew Krynski recorded his first collegiate goal when he one-touched a loose ball headed by Michael Alfano into the back of the net.

After a scoreless first overtime which saw just one shot by either team, Bucknell's Kumah gathered the ball on the left side of the box, and bounced his shot off the inside of the far post into the goal. The unassisted goal at the 108:00 mark was the freshman's third of the season, and his second game-winner in as many games.

Flynn started in net for the Golden Eagles, his second start for Marquette this season. In 108:00 minutes, the junior recorded two saves.

Marquette outshot the Bison in every period but the final overtime, totaling a 15-10 advantage. The Golden Eagles also led in shots on goal, recording six to Bucknell's four. Krynski and Kumah led both teams with two shots on goal apiece, while MU senior Michael Greene and BU junior Ross Liberati took three shots each.

The Golden Eagles dominated possession in the first half, taking five shots to Bucknell's three. The best goal scoring opportunity of the frame came in the ninth minute when a Scott Miller header found freshman Ryan Robb at the top of the box, whose shot to the upper left corner of the net forced sophomore goalkeeper Tommy Caso to make one of his five saves of the afternoon.

After halftime, a Marquette handball gave Bucknell head coach Brendan Nash's squad a direct kick from 25 yards out on the left side. Reigning Patriot League Player of the Year and 2009 Hermann Trophy watch list player Conor O'Brien lined up to take the set piece for the Bison, whose shot was saved by Flynn. The Marquette defense held O'Brien, who has recorded 22 points on nine goals and four assists, to just two shots in all 108 minutes of play.

The win was the fifth straight for the Bison, who tallied their second victory over a BIG EAST opponent after Tuesday's match, beating both Marquette and Syracuse. Bucknell improved to 10-3 on the season with the victory.

With the loss, the Golden Eagles fall to 2-7-3 overall. The first all-time meeting against the Patriot League's Bucknell was the sixth overtime game of the season for MU, which has won just won game in extra time this season. The overtime was the first of the season for the Bison.

The Golden Eagles have lost four games by one goal, and are winless this season when allowing two or more goals in a match.

MARQUETTE MEN'S SOCCER GAME NOTES

Marquette 1, Georgetown 0 Oct. 17 • Valley Fields

MILWAUKEE - The Marquette men's soccer team tallied its first win over a ranked opponent this season, beating RV/16 Georgetown, 1-0, Saturday night at Valley Fields. The goal at the 28:19 mark by Calum Mallace was the earliest goal scored by the Golden Eagles this season, and the only MU was tallied in the first half.

With the win, Bennett's squad picks up three valuable points in the BIG EAST Conference, and now stand at fifth in the Blue Division, moving up a spot following a Providence-Seton Hall draw Saturday night. The top six teams in each division advance to the BIG EAST Tournament in November.

The win over Georgetown was the first-ever for the Golden Eagles, who entered the match with four losses all-time against the Washington, D.C. school. The Hoyas boast one of the top defenses in that nation, tallying eight shutouts and a 0.60 goals against average this season.

Marquette (3-7-3, 2-3-3 BIG EAST) took the lead in the 29th minute, which it would maintain for the rest of the game, after a corner kick by junior Anthony Colaizzi was redirected by sophomore Michael Alfano and found the head of sophomore Calum Mallace at the back post, who headed the ball past Georgetown junior goalkeeper Matthew Brutto. The goal was Mallace's third of the season, and the fourth of his career, all of which have been game-winners. He tallied a team-leading three shots in 90 minutes, including two on frame.

The Hoyas outshot Marquette in both halves, holding an 18-16 advantage on the match, but managed only five shots on goal to MU's eight.

Georgetown (8-5-1, 5-3 BIG EAST) nearly evened the score in the first half when a ball rebounded from a direct kick in the 31st minute and freshman Tommy Muller tallied a shot on goal. In the 39th minute, a close range shot from Georgetown freshman Jimmy Nealis hit the side netting of the goal. Minutes later, a header in the box by sophomore David Madison forced MU senior goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski to deflect the ball out of the area.

Marquette had a quality opportunity to cushion its lead in the first half when freshman Andrew Krynski found himself isolated with two Hoya defenders in the corner of the box, and managed to rocket a strong shot directly at Brutto.

After halftime, intensity in the match increased as Georgetown scrambled to net an equalizer and the Marquette defense resisted the pressure from the Hoyas while trying to tally an insurance goal.

The last minutes of the game were a push effort for each squad, with Marquette taking two shots in the final three minutes, and Georgetown nearly netting the equalizer with less than 30 seconds on the clock.

Senior Tom Lynn's bicycle kick in the 89th minute nearly saved a goal for the Golden Eagles. The senior defender cleared the ball as Pyzdrowski went down for a save with a crowd gathering in front of the net.

With under 30 seconds left, a Georgetown shot by junior Seth C'deBaca from the right side was blocked by MU senior defender Billy Von Rueden.

The shutout was the second straight for Pyzdrowski, and his fourth of the season, matching last season's total. Brutto tallied seven saves in 90 minutes for the Hoyas, who Marquette had previously never beaten.

MADISON, Wis. -- Wisconsin netted a pair of second-half goals to take a 2-0 decision from Marquette in non-conference men's soccer action Wednesday evening from the McClimom Complex.

Wisconsin (5-6-2) netted a pair of second-half goals to take a 2-0 decision from Marquette (3-8-3) in non-conference men's soccer action Wednesday evening from the McClimom Complex.

Eric Conklin got the Badgers on the scoreboard in the 69th minute with an unassisted goal. Wisconsin tacked on another score less than five minutes from time when Scott Lorenz found Jon Rzepka on a set piece to make it 2-0.

Both sides shared the run of play at various increments throughout the match, and it didn't take the Golden Eagles' attack long to create some chances. But in the end, Marquette placed just one of its nine shots on target.

Marquette's first legitimate crack came in the 23rd minute when junior Anthony Colaizzi headed the ball to the top of the box where sophomore Calum Mallace fired a one-touch volley over the cross bar.

In the 29th minute, Wisconsin's Aaron Nichols picked up the contest's lone yellow card with his foul on Anthony Selvaggi at the right corner of the box. Mallace took the free kick from 18 yards but sent it wide right of the goal.

MU started out the second half with an attacking mindset, creating its first scoring opportunity in the 55th minute. Mallace made a run toward the goal after his marker slipped on the damp playing surface, but Tom Lynn's through ball from midfield was run down by the Wisconsin goalkeeper.

Wisconsin quickly changed the tone of the match at the 68:23 mark with its first goal. Marquette tried to clear a ball that was deflected to the top of the box. Conklin carried the ball past a pair of Golden Eagles defenders to the left side of the box where he beat MU goalkeeper Matt Pyzdrowski with a left boot into the far side of the net.

Marquette had six corner kicks -- compared to five corners for the Badgers -- its last coming in the 82nd minute. It was after head coach Louis Bennett brought Nick Kay, a second striker, onto the field. Neither the set piece nor the tactical change were enough for MU to find the back of the net.

Wisconsin's final tally came at the 85:20 mark. Following a foul in front of the MU bench, Lorenz found Rzepka back post on the direct free kick and Rzepka headed it in.

PROVIDENCE, R.I. -- Matt Marcin scored in the 55th minute, tallying the game's lone goal, as Providence College defeated Marquette University by a final of 1-0 Saturday in a pivotal BIG EAST men's soccer match at Glay Field.

A scramble in MU's offensive half led to a quick counter attack by the Friars, who used a minimal amount of touches to get the ball forward to Marcin. The Providence midfielder received the ball in the left corner of the box from teammate Daniel Fabian. From 15 yards out, Marcin turned and skidded the ball across the goal, inside the right post, for the decisive score.

Providence (6-6-3, 3-4-2 BIG EAST) picked up three points with the victory to jump ahead of the Golden Eagles (3-9-3, 2-4-3 BIG EAST) in the Blue Division standings. The Friars are currently in fifth place with 11 points followed by MU (9 points).

Both squads have two matches remaining in the regular season, while seventh-place Seton Hall (6 points) plays tonight at Connecticut. UConn has already clinched one of six Blue Division spots in the BIG EAST postseason tournament.

Play was even throughout the rainy afternoon and shots were tied at four apiece through the first 45 minutes of the match. Marquette's first attempt came eight minutes in when senior Michael Greene headed the ball across the box to sophomore Anthony Colaizzi who brought the ball back across his body and sent a left-footed strike wide left of the goal.

A corner kick resulted in Marquette's lone shot on goal in the first half. Colaizzi sent the corner to the far side of the box where it was knocked back to sophomore Calum Mallace who slid and redirected the ball into the arms of the Providence goalkeeper.

Providence's most dangerous opportunity in the first period came at the 22:14 mark. A through ball found the Friars' Tim Ritter, who appeared to be wide open 10 yards in front of the net, but junior defender Matt Stummer came from nowhere to slide tackle the ball away past the endline to force a corner kick.

A more frantic pace ensued following the Friar's goal, as Providence looked to be anxious to build upon its lead while the Golden Eagles scrambled for the equalizer. MU tallied one more shot in the second half than it did in the first, but trailed Providence 12-9 in total shots at the end of the contest. Three different Marquette players placed shots on goal, compared to five shots on goal for Providence.

Marquette had a flurry of chances in the closing minutes, including a pair of set pieces, but couldn't capitalize.
