### No. 18 Golden Eagles Head to New York with Divisional Title on the Line

The No. 18 Marquette women's soccer team will close out its last weekend of regular season play in the Empire State with an opportunity to win the BIG EAST American Division title. Marquette will first play at Syracuse on Friday, Oct. 23 before taking on St. John's on Sunday, Oct. 25.

#### Marquette Quickhits

- The Golden Eagles currently sit in a tie for first place with USF in the American Division with 17 points and a 5-2-2 BIG EAST Conference record following a pair of shutouts at Cincinnati (1-0) and at Louisville (2-0) in its last weekend of play. The Golden Eagles are unbeaten in their last five games.
- The Golden Eagles' 11 wins mark the 14th consecutive season they have registered 11 or more wins.
- Marquette moved up four spots in the Soccer America poll to No. 18 this week.
- Marquette went 2-0-0 in its last weekend of play shutting out Cincinnati (1-0) and Louisville (2-0) on the road. Marquette is 4-2 on the road this season.
- In the latest RPI released by the NCAA, the Golden Eagles are ranked No. 36. Marquette is 2-3 against teams in the top-50 in the RPI this season.
- Sophomore Rachael Sloan leads the Golden Eagles' attack with 12 points on four goals and four assists.
- It was a family affair for goal scoring last week as sisters Brittany and Ashley Bares accounted for all three of MU's goals. It was Ashley Bares' first goal of the season at Cincinnati. Overall, 14 different Golden Eagles have now scored at least one goal this season.
- Junior defender Lauren Thut continues to involve herself in MU's offense as she is third on the team with six points on one goal and a team-best four assists for the season.
- Speaking of defense, MU's stifling backline has been superb this season, registering a league-best 11 shutouts. Nationally, the Golden Eagles are No. 15 in team goals against average (0.564), while goalkeeper Natalie Kulla stands at No. 18 with a 0.564 GAA.
- With 11 shutouts this season, sophomore goalkeeper Natalie Kulla set the single season shutout record. Kulla has played in every minute of every match this season. Kulla has 17 clean slates for her career to stand in sole possession of third place on MU's all-time shutouts list.
- Head coach Markus Roeders is closing in on his 200th win. Roeders is 198-79-30 all-time in 14 seasons at Marquette.

#### A Look at Syracuse

With just one conference win, Syracuse (4-10-3) sits at the bottom of the league with a 1-7-1 BIG EAST mark. Its lone win came over Providence, 2-1 in overtime, on Sept. 24. Tina Romagnuolo leads the Orange with seven goals, while goalkeeper Eliza Bennett-Hattan has allowed 26 goals this season. Marquette is 3-0-1 all-time against the Orange. The Golden Eagles won both meetings at Syracuse in 2006 (1-0 in overtime) and in 2008 (1-0).

**A Sneak Peak at St. John's**

St. John's (11-4-1) enters the last weekend

of regular-season play in third place in the division with a 5-3-1 BIG EAST record. CJ Ludemann leads the Red Storm with 10 points on two goals and six assists, while Kaitlin Haas has registered a team-high four goals. Kristin Russell has spent all 1469:20 in goal with a 0.61 goals against average. Marquette is 4-0 all-time against the Red Storm. In the two teams' last meeting in 2008, Marquette won at St. John's, 2-1, in double overtime.

St. John's will play USF Friday evening before hosting Marquette on Sunday.

**Honors Roll in for McBride**

Senior defender Allison McBride earned a pair of honors this week as she was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week and to the Soccer America Team of the Week.

McBride earned the honor after leading the Golden Eagle defense to a pair of shutouts in a 2-0-0 week. Marquette won at Cincinnati, 1-0, and at Louisville, 2-0. McBride played an integral role in holding its opponents to just eight shots in the two games. The wins helped Marquette move into first place of the American Division standings heading into the final weekend of the regular season.

**Golden Eagles Jump Into National Polls**

Following a thrilling come-from-behind 3-2 victory over No. 24/13 Connecticut and a 0-0 tie against Providence, the Marquette women's soccer team jumped into the national rankings Monday. The Golden Eagles are ranked No. 22 by Soccer America in its latest poll.

After the Huskies went ahead 2-0 by the 20th minute, junior Stephanie Vasos and senior Anna Sawicki helped even the score for the Golden Eagles with goals in the 41st and 43rd

minute, respectively, while sophomore Rachael Sloan put away the game winner in the 108th minute. Against Providence, Marquette out-shot the Friars, 24-5, yet was unable to find the back of the net in 110 minutes of play Sunday.

The Golden Eagles have played four Top-25 teams, including then-No.1 North Carolina, and a handful of others who have received votes. MU stands 2-2 overall this season against ranked foes with wins over then No. 23 Minnesota (1-0) and then-No. 24/13 Connecticut in double overtime (3-2).

**PTP**

Marquette's leading scorer, sophomore Rachael Sloan, was named a CollegeSoccer360.com Primetime Performer following the Golden Eagles' dramatic 3-2 come-from-behind victory over No. 24/13 Connecticut and a 0-0 tie against Providence.

Sloan netted MU's golden goal in the 108th minute. Sloan received a feed from junior Rosie Malone-Povolny inside the box, drew Connecticut's goalkeeper out and drilled the game winner into the far side of the net.

One of Marquette's most dangerous forwards, Sloan has started in all 15 matches this season and leads the team with 11 points on four goals, three of which are game winners, and three assists.

**Miller, Kulla Honored by the BIG EAST**

The Marquette women's soccer team picked up two BIG EAST Conference weekly honors, announced Sept. 14, as freshman defender Ally Miller was named BIG EAST Rookie of the Week and sophomore goalkeeper Natalie Kulla was named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll.

Miller, the only freshman to start in each game this season at defender, helped the Golden Eagles to wins over Green Bay (3-0) and No. 23 Minnesota (1-0). Miller played 163 minutes over the two games, and helped the

## **Honor Roll**

---

Sophomore goalkeeper Natalie Kulla was named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll Monday following her stellar effort in a 1-1 week for the Marquette women's soccer team.

Kulla earned her third shutout of the season Thursday, Sept. 3 in a 2-0 defeat at UW-Milwaukee, which ended the Panthers' 24-game home unbeaten streak, and allowed just one goal against No. 1 North Carolina. She totaled six saves while directing the defense and facing 40 shots over the two games. For her efforts, Kulla was named the Inn at Saint Mary's Classic Most Valuable Goalkeeper and to the all-tournament team.

## **All-Tournament**

---

A trio of Golden Eagles have been named to all-tournament teams in each of the tournaments Marquette has played in. Following the Inn at St. Mary's Classic, Natalie Kulla was named the tournament's most valuable goalkeeper, while Rachael Sloan and Michelle Compty each picked up all-tournament honors. It was the second all-tournament honor of the year for Sloan who was joined by Lindsey Page and Katie Miller each on the MKE All-tournament team.

## **Let's Take Shots**

---

Regardless of the amount of goals Marquette has scored this season, the Golden Eagles are dominating the opposition in their shot attempts. MU averages 17.5 shots per game and has out-shot its opponents 298-137. It's 268 shots are a league high. Marquette has launched a season-high 26 shots twice (Green Bay and Pittsburgh), and has registered at least 10 shots in all but one game this season.

## **Katie Miller has CLASS**

---

Marquette senior defender Katie Miller is among 30 senior female NCAA college soccer players listed as candidates for the 2009 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. The award is presented annually to an NCAA Division I student-athlete in nine sports.

Miller, a three-year starting defender for the Golden Eagles, is a double major in marketing and human resources. She boasts a

cumulative grade point average of 3.98, and registered five consecutive semesters of a perfect 4.0 grade point average. She earned National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA)/adidas Scholar All-Central Region Team Honorable Mention honors and was named to the CoSIDA and ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District 5 First Team in 2008.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities. It honors the attributes of senior student-athletes in four areas: classroom, community, character and competition.

From the list of 30 candidates, it will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Lowe's, an official corporate partner of the NCAA, will announce the Senior CLASS Award winner during the 2009 NCAA Women's College Cup championship in early December.

## **Page Tallies First**

---

Sophomore Lindsey Page made the most of her first career start and wasted little time recording her first career goal at Marquette, as she scored in the third minute. Classmate Rachael Sloan sent a cross in front of the goal mouth right to Page who one-timed the ball to the far post past Pepperdine keeper Roxanne Barker.

## **Golden Eagles Picked to Finish Third in the BIG EAST**

---

The Marquette women's soccer team was selected to finish third in the American Division in the 2009 BIG EAST preseason women's soccer poll announced by conference officials. The votes were cast by the league's 16 head coaches, who were not permitted to vote for their own team or players.

Notre Dame and West Virginia were tabbed as the favorites as the Irish received all 15 first-place votes and were picked to win the National Division, while the Mountaineers received 13 first-place votes and were picked to win the American Division. Both programs also won their respective divisions last year. Marquette picked up 95 points - the fifth

highest total behind Notre Dame, West Virginia, Connecticut and Rutgers. The Golden Eagles capped the 2008 campaign with an 11-8-3 overall record, 6-3-2 in BIG EAST play, and earned their seventh NCAA Tournament berth. Marquette finished second in the American Division standings and advanced to the BIG EAST Tournament Semifinals for the third time in program history.

## **Plentiful Playing Time**

---

Playing time has been plentiful this season as no fewer than 20 Golden Eagles have seen action.

## **Home Sweet Home**

---

Protecting their home pitch is something the Golden Eagles do not take lightly, and it shows as Marquette is an impressive 117-33-14 all-time at Valley Fields. MU has lost just eight games on its home turf over the last four seasons.

## **Mature Offense**

---

For the 2009 season, Marquette welcomed back all but one goal scorer from last season, Katie Kelly (1g, 3a -- 5pts), and returned 91.9 percent of its scoring this season.

## **Roeders Weekly Podcasts**

Following the game-tying strike Marquette furiously tried to decide the game in regulation, but was unable to find the back of the net. 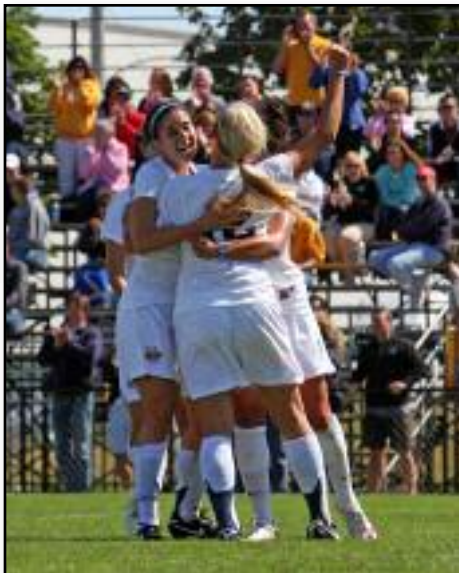

"We have played two games in a row where I thought we played extremely well and just couldn't score," said head coach Markus Roeders. "I like the way we played today.
