Notes Versus FIU

Marshall game captains for FIU, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, are running back Tony Pittman and tight end Ryan Yurachek on offense; defensive lineman Ryan Bee and safety Corey Neely on defense.

Rodney Allen intercepted two passes in the first quarter, becoming the first Herd player with multiple interceptions in one game since Tiquan Lang against Purdue on Sept. 6, 2015. The interceptions were the first two for Allen this season, and he now has five for his career.

The first quarter sack by MU linebacker Frankie Hernandez gives him four consecutive games with at least a share of a sack.

Marshall's second drive of the game ended in an interception thrown by Litton, which ended multiple streaks. It was Marshall's first turnover since the third quarter versus Charlotte, a span of 214 minutes and 8 seconds of game time. The Herd offense went 43 drives and 211 plays between turnovers. The interception was Litton's first in the opening quarter this season, and his first in the first quarter since Litton's first pass against Kent State on Sept. 26, 2015. Litton hadn't thrown an interception in the first quarter in 169 passing attempts, and hadn't thrown an interception this season in 123 throws.

Leaves Fall, Herd Wins

The Herd is 14-1 (.933) at home after Oct. 27 in Doc Holliday's six-plus years as head coach.

Sure-Handed

The Thundering Herd has committed just 14 turnovers thus far in 2016, a figure that could come in lower than the 17 Marshall posted in 2007, its lowest number since the start of the 2000 season.

6-0

Chase Litton is now 6-0 when he pairs a multi-TD pass game with a zero interception game.

Turning Them Over

Marshall was +4 in turnover margin for the fifth time under Doc Holliday after it defeated Middle Tennessee 42-17. The program is undefeated when that happens. Marshall also has five wins against no defeats when it collects at least two interceptions and two fumble recoveries under Holliday.

Rushing Attack

Marshall ran for 207 yards in the 42-17 win over Middle Tennessee. The program has won 22 of its last 23 when rushing for at least 200 yards.

Youth Movement

Marshall now has 27 sacks this season (tied for third in C-USA), 20.5 of those sacks are by freshmen or sophomores.

Stingy

Overall, Middle Tennessee finished with 15 first downs in Marshall's 42-17 win over the Blue Raiders. The Thundering Herd improved to 15-0 under Doc Holliday when holding opponent to 15 or fewer first downs.

Leading the League

The Thundering Herd has done an excellent job covering kickoffs in 2016 as the program currently sits atop the league statistics with a net kickoff average of 43.3.

Marshall leads the league in fourth-down conversions at 71.4 percent (15-for-21).

Individually, Rodney Allen sits atop the league with 11 pass breakups, 13 passes defended and four forced fumbles (fourth nationally).

Sack Artist

MU senior defensive end Gary Thompson recorded a sack at FIU, which brings his career total to 19 and vaults him into the top 10 on Marshall's career sack list. Thompson stands alone at No. 9 in program history. Next up: Jamus Martin, who recorded 19.5 sacks from 2001-04.

Climbing The List

Litton's two touchdown passes at FIU has him seventh in program history in passing TDs with 47. Next up: John Gregory, who had 51.

Streaks!

Tight end Ryan Yurachek caught a pass for the 28th consecutive game versus Middle Tennessee, a streak that dates back to his freshman season. Yurachek's last game without a reception was Nov. 8, 2014 at Southern Miss. He missed the game at FIU due to injury so the streak remains intact.

Marshall QB Chase Litton connected with Emanuel Byrd for a 17-yard

touchdown pass in the first quarter at FIU, which extended Litton's touchdown pass streak to 21 games.

What's up? ... Doc

Marshall Coach Doc Holliday is in his seventh season on the Herd sideline, and the only current Conference USA head coach who was in the Texas-based league when Holliday arrived is Rice's David Bailiff.

Holliday, named at Marshall in December 2009, was part of a 23-man FBS coaching-hire class prior to the 2010 season. Of those 23 coaches, only three remain on the job at the schools hiring them in 2010 - Holliday, Florida State's Jimbo Fisher and Notre Dame's Brian Kelly.

Holliday is 53-36 (.596) in six-plus seasons.

Herd Finishes Under Holliday

Since Doc Holliday became head coach in 2010, the Herd has an excellent record of finishing off its opponents once it takes the lead. Marshall is 39-7 (.848) when it scores first, 37-6 (.860) when leading after the first quarter, 41-3 when leading at halftime and 41-4 (.911) when leading after three quarters. In fact, Marshall was won 27 of its last 28 contests (Charlotte, 2016) when it has the halftime lead.

Hang on!

It's easy to see why Herd Coach Doc Holliday talks about ball security so often. His six previous Marshall teams have provided a strong indicator of why turnover margin is so important.

Holliday's Herd teams have a combined 53-36 record. When Marshall has an edge in turnover margin, it is 30-8 (.789). When the turnover number is equal, Marshall is 12-6 (.667). But when the opponent is more sure-handed, the Herd is 11-22 (.333).

Of Marshall's 89 games under Holliday, the Herd has played 46 while producing zero or one turnover, amassing a record of 32-14 (.696) in those games.

Protecting the Home Turf

Marshall is nationally known for being one of the toughest places to play in college football. The program has won 83.9 percent (151-29) of its home games in Joan C. Edwards Stadium, the third-highest mark in the country for programs playing in their current stadium. Marshall has won 23 of its last 27 home games.

10+

Since the start of the 2012 season (64 games), MU boasts 1,114 10+ yard plays (147 in 2016), an average of 17.4 per contest. As you might imagine, those numbers have yielded the following: In that same period, offensive coordinator Bill Legg's attack has 31 games of 500 or more yards total offense and 30 games with 40 or more points.

50+

Marshall's 62-0 win over Morgan State was the 16th time that the Thundering Herd has reached the 50+-point plateau under coach Doc Holliday, one more than Jim Donnan (1990-95) for the all-time school mark. Bob Pruett (1996-2004) reached that mark 14 times and Cam Henderson (1936-42, 1946-49) did it on 13 occasions.

Perfect Versus Texas at Home

Interestingly enough, Marshall has never lost to a school from Texas at home. The Thundering Herd is a perfect 12-0 against Texas schools in games played in Huntington. Marshall owns two wins over North Texas (1988, 2015), two wins over Houston (2008, 2012), three wins over Rice (2007, 2011, 2014), two wins over SMU (2005, 2009), two wins over UTEP (2006, 2010) and one victory over UTSA (2013).

Holliday Versus (and in) south Florida

It's no secret that Doc Holliday has made recruiting the south Florida area a hallmark of his career. The Thundering Herd's head coach has left his mark **ON** the field where that area is concerned as well as he is now 8-1 versus FAU and FIU. He is 7-1 in the regular season against the pair and has an additional win over FIU in the 2011 Beef 'O' Brady's Bowl when the Panthers were members of the Sun Belt Conference. His 16-10 win over UConn in the 2015 St. Petersburg Bowl gives him a 9-1 mark against, *and in*, south Florida.

Notes Versus Middle Tennessee

Marshall game captains for Middle Tennessee, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were running back Tony Pittman, linebacker Chase

Hancock, tight end Ryan Yurachek and defensive end Ryan Bee.

The Thundering Herd defense held the Blue Raiders to 283 yards of total offense – the first time MT hasn't eclipsed 300 yards in 20 games (275 vs. No. 1 Alabama on Sept. 12, 2015). The 283 yards allowed is also Marshall's best performance against a Football Bowl Subdivision team this season. Middle Tennessee running back I'Tavius Mathers was held to a season-low 45 rushing yards.

The Marshall defense was plus-four in turnover margin for the fifth time in Doc Holliday's seven seasons with the program (88 games). It is the first time in Holliday's head coaching career his team has forced four turnovers without the offense committing at least one.

Marshall's rushing offense finished with 207 rushing yards – a season high against FBS opponents – and running back Anthony Anderson finished with a career high 109 rushing yards. Fellow running back Tony Pittman added a season high 88 rushing yards.

Quarterback Chase Litton finished with four passing touchdowns, the fourth time he has accomplished that in his two-year career. Litton had never thrown at least four touchdown passes without throwing an interception against an FBS opponent.

Herd senior defensive back Terry Richardson snagged an interception in the first quarter, which was his second this season and the 26-yard return was the longest of his career.

MU running back Hyleck Foster's first quarter touchdown run was his first since Nov. 27, 2015 at Western Kentucky, and his first at home since Oct. 24, 2015 against North Texas. Foster's touchdown reception in the fourth quarter was his first since Nov. 28, 2014 against Western Kentucky.

Justin Hunt caught touchdown passes of 25 and 28 yards – his second two-touchdown game this season – and established a new career high for receiving yards with 87 (previous career high: 68 yards on Sept. 19, 2015 vs. Norfolk State). He also tied a career high with five receptions.

Herd freshman linebacker Damien Dozier recorded his first career sack on the final play of the third quarter. Dozier is the fifth different MU freshman with a sack this season.

Frankie Hernandez and Malik Thompson recovered their first fumbles.

Senior defensive back Corey Neely had a team-high and career-high 13 tackles, while adding an interception and a forced fumble.

In the second half, Marshall had as many touchdowns as Middle Tennessee had first downs (four).

The Marshall defense held Middle Tennessee to 283 yards of total offense, MT's lowest output in 20 games. The last time the Blue Raiders were held to fewer than 300 yards: last season at #1 Alabama (275 yards).

Forty-two points against MTSU are Marshall's most in a C-USA game since the 52-0 shutout of FIU last year -- played on Nov. 14, in black jerseys.

Notes Versus Old Dominion

Marshall game captains, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were receiver Justin Hunt, running back Tony Pittman, cornerback Rodney Allen and defensive end Ryan Bee.

Marshall had a shakeup along the offensive line, as Sandley Jean-Felix started at left tackle, Clint Van Horn slid from right tackle to right guard, and Fedrice Binot moved from left tackle to right tackle. Van Horn started the first eight games at right tackle and Binot the first eight games at left tackle. It was Jean-Felix's first start of the season, but 14th of his career. Van Horn now holds the team lead for career starts with 34, surpassing the 33 by Michael Selby, who is out for the season with an injury.

Herd sophomore linebacker Frankie Hernandez received his first career start on defense. Hernandez started in place of Chase Hancock, who had started the first eight games.

True freshman Brandon Rodgers returned a kickoff 35 yards in the first quarter, his first career kick return. He later added a 44-yard kickoff return – a career long.

Rodney Allen's forced fumble in the third quarter was his fourth this season. The rest of the Marshall defense has four combined.

Defensive tackle Nyquan Harris had a career-high in tackles with eight. His previous high was seven.

Notes Versus Southern Miss

Marshall game captains for Southern Miss, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were defensive lineman Ryan Bee, defensive lineman Blake Keller, wide receiver Deon-Tay McManus and offensive lineman Clint Van Horn.

Southern Miss snapped a five-game losing skid to Marshall and took an overall series lead of 7-5. USM hadn't defeated Marshall since Oct. 2, 2010, a 41-16 win by the Golden Eagles in Hattiesburg, Mississippi.

Kaare Vedvik's first quarter punt of 72 yards is a career long and the fifth-longest punt in Marshall history. The punt is the longest by the Herd since Curtis Head's 75-yard punt at Toledo in 2001. The MU record is 79 yards (John Arnold, at Temple, 1974).

The second quarter touchdown run by Marshall's Keion Davis was his sixth of the season and the third consecutive game in which he has scored via a rushing attempt.

Sophomore linebacker Frankie Hernandez recorded the first sack and first tackle for a loss of his Marshall career. He also registered a career-high in tackles with eight.

Herd defensive end Ryan Bee was credited with his fourth career fumble recovery.

Defensive linemen Gary Thompson and Joe Massaquoi combined for a sack in the second quarter. Thompson, a senior, now has 18 career sacks, which puts him 1.5 behind Jamus Martin for eighth on the career list. Massaquoi hadn't recorded a sack since Sept. 20, 2014 at Akron.

Vedvik Named Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Week

Marshall punter Kaare Vedvik was named Conference USA Special Teams Player of the Week following his performance against Southern Miss. He kept the Golden Eagles backed up all night as he averaged 46.9 yards on 10 punts, while downing six inside the 20 yard line, a figure that is just one off the school record. His 72-yard kick in the first quarter, the fifth-longest in Marshall history, forced USM to start from its five-yard line.

Notes Versus Charlotte

Marshall game captains for Charlotte, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were tight end Emanuel Byrd, wide receiver Josh Knight, defensive end Ryan Bee and defensive tackle Tomell One.

True freshman cornerback Jaylon McClain-Sapp made his first collegiate start against the 49ers. Sapp saw action in each of the Herd's first six games, but all in relief of senior Rodney Allen.

Marshall had the same starting five along the offensive line for the first six games, but that changed against Charlotte. Sophomore guard Nate Devers made his first start of the season at left guard in place of Michael Selby, who did not dress. It was Devers' second career start.

MU's Jason Smith blocked field goal was the team's first since Ryan Bee blocked a field goal on Oct. 9, 2015 against Southern Mississippi.

Chase Litton passed Brian Anderson (37) and Stan Hill (38) on the career touchdown passes list. Litton entered the game tied with Anderson for 10th place on the all-time list. Litton is tied with Carl Fodor for No. 8 in program history with 39 touchdown passes.

A pair of MU receivers set a career high for catches. Deon-Tay McManus finished with seven receptions, topping the six he had last season at Charlotte. Josh Knight had 10 receptions, which is one better than the nine he had last week against Florida Atlantic.

Notes Versus Florida Atlantic

Marshall game captains for Florida Atlantic, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were running wide receiver Deon-Tay McManus, offensive lineman Michael Selby, cornerback Rodney Allen and defensive lineman Gary Thompson.

Sophomore running back Keion Davis had his longest rushing play of the season on a 30-yard touchdown in the first quarter. The touchdown was Davis' third of the season, which is a single-season best for him (he had two as a freshman last season).

Marshall sophomore receiver Donquell "Gator" Green's 8-yard reception in the first quarter moved the chains for the Herd. It was also Green's longest reception of his collegiate career.

Sophomore receiver Nick Mathews hauled in an 18-yard reception in the second quarter, the longest catch of his collegiate career. It was Mathews' first reception of the season and the fifth of his career.

A couple of firsts on turnovers: Blake Keller, a junior defensive end, recovered his first fumble at Marshall after teammate Rodney Allen stripped FAU running back Gregory Howell in the second quarter. Later in the second quarter, MU freshman cornerback Chris Jackson intercepted FAU's Jason Driskell for his first collegiate pick.

The Herd's top two tacklers against FAU set career highs in that category: C.J. Reavis, whose season best was seven tackles finished with 15, and Chase Hancock, who twice recorded eight tackles earlier this season.

Junior kicker Amoreto Curraj twice set his personal career long for field goals. He connected on a 31-yard field goal in the first quarter, which broke his personal-best of 29 yards, and then he booted a 39-yarder through in the third quarter to again establish a new career long.

Marshall senior receiver Josh Knight recorded his second 100-yard game of the season with nine catches for 129 yards (he also had seven catches for 118 yards against Akron on Sept. 17). He entered this season with 57 career receiving yards.

Herd QB Chase Litton went over 300 yards passing for the third time this season and the fifth time in his career.

Notes Versus North Texas

Marshall game captains for North Texas, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were running back offensive lineman Michael Selby, offensive lineman Clint Van Horn, defensive lineman Blake Keller and linebacker Devontre'a Tyler.

Keion Davis opened the second half with a 99-yard kickoff return for a touchdown, the third-longest kickoff return in Marshall history (Ray Crisp, 1977 vs. Akron; Troy Evans, 2010 vs. Southern Miss – both 100 yards). Davis' return was the Herd's first kickoff return for a touchdown since Deandre Reaves had a 97-yard return against FIU on Nov. 27, 2015. Davis' previous career long kickoff return was 44 yards.

Gary Thompson set a career single-game high in tackles (10) versus North Texas, and it was his third career multi-sack game (the other two came in 2015).

On separate plays in the first half, Thompson recorded a forced fumble and recovered a fumble. The forced fumble was the seventh of his career and recovery was the fifth of his career. It is the second time in Thompson's career he has been credited with a sack, forced fumble and fumble recovery in the same game (the other was Oct. 3, 2015 vs. Old Dominion).

Texas native Rodney Allen stripped a ball carrier in the first half for his second forced fumble of the season (and also second of his career).

Junior college transfer C.J. Reavis recovered a North Texas fumble in the first quarter for his first fumble recovery at Marshall.

Chase Litton scored on a 6-yard quarterback keeper in the first quarter for the first collegiate rushing touchdown.

MU sophomore wide receiver Michael Clark set a new career high for receptions in a game (eight) and had his second consecutive 100-yard performance on the road (147 yards on Oct. 1 at Pittsburgh).

Sophomore linebacker Frankie Hernandez finished with three tackles for a loss against North Texas. He had one TFL in 14 career games entering Saturday.

Freshman linebacker Omari Cobb recorded the first two sacks of his career.

The Herd recorded six sacks against the Mean Green, the most since totaling that many versus Florida Atlantic in 2014 (10/25/14). The last time the program had more was the previous season at FIU (7, 11/23/13).

Notes Versus Pittsburgh

Marshall game captains for Pittsburgh, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were running back Tony Pittman, defensive end Ryan Bee, offensive lineman Clint Van Horn and linebacker Chase Hancock.

True freshman Matt Beardall started at long snapper for Marshall, the eighth true freshman to play for the Thundering Herd this season. The others: Willie Johnson, receiver; Brandon Rodgers, receiver; Garett Morrell, quarterback; Omari Cobb, linebacker; Jaylon McClain-Sapp, cornerback; Chris Jackson, cornerback; and Jeremiah Maddox, safety.

Tony Pittman made his second career start and first of the season at running back. Junior Hyleck Foster started the first three games for the Herd.

Willie Johnson, a freshman wide receiver who departed the game with an injury in the second quarter, was the deep man on kickoff returns to start the game for the first time this season. Johnson had two returns for 51 yards before the injury. He entered the game with one career kickoff return for 34 yards.

Omari Cobb, a true freshman, made his first career start at linebacker (strongside). Cobb is the fifth freshman – redshirt and true – to start on offense or defense for Marshall this season, joining linebacker Damien Dozier, quarterback Garett Morrell, cornerback Chris Jackson and offensive lineman Levi Brown.

Michael Clark twice established a new career high for longest reception at Marshall. Clark's 44-yard catch in the first quarter initially was a career best, only to be surpassed by his 83-yard catch-and-run in the fourth quarter. It was MU's first pass play of 80-plus yards since Oct. 13, 2010, when QB Eddie Sullivan connected with WR Aaron Dobson for an 86-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter of a 35-14 home loss to UCF. The play ranks as the 15th longest pass play in Marshall history and the sixth 80-plus passing play since 2000.

Clark finished with four receptions for 147 yards, which more than doubled his career output through his first season of collegiate football (115 yards in his first three games).

Marshall QB Chase Litton connected with WR Josh Knight for a 15-yard touchdown pass early in the third quarter, which extended Litton's touchdown pass streak to 14 games. Litton also tossed two touchdown passes, marking the 11th time in 14 games he has accomplished that feat.

Litton's 83-yard touchdown pass to Clark was a career long. His previous long was a 66-yard scoring pass to Davonte Allen on Oct. 31, 2015 against Charlotte.

First-year sophomore running back Anthony Anderson rushed for a career-high 56 yards on 13 carries. His previous single-game best was Sept. 24 against Louisville (46 yards). Anderson's 11-yard touchdown run in the third quarter was his first at Marshall.

Marshall is Pitt's first opponent this season to not allow at least three sacks (2). Pitt ranks No. 4 nationally with 19 sacks.

Marshall rushed for 104 yards against Pitt, which is the most the Panthers have allowed this season. Pitt ranks No. 4 nationally in rush defense. The Herd's 3.47 yards per carry was also the best performance against Pitt in five games this season. Pitt was allowing 2.1 yards/attempt.

Notes Versus Louisville

Marshall game captains for Louisville, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were receiver Josh Knight, linebacker Devontre'a Tyler, cornerback Rodney Allen and offensive lineman Michael Selby.

Saturday's attendance of 40,592 ranks as the second-highest in the 26-year history of Joan C. Edwards Stadium, behind only the 2010 visit from West Virginia (41,382).

Louisville entered Saturday night's game ranked No. 3 in the Associated Press poll, which equals the highest-ranked FBS team to visit Huntington. West Virginia was also ranked No. 3 in 2007 when the Mountaineers defeated the Herd, 48-23. Louisville received six first-place votes in this week's poll, while the 2007 WVU team had one first-place vote.

Marshall true freshman quarterback Garett Morrell made his first career start against Louisville. Morrell is the sixth different starting quarterback in MU coach Doc Holliday's seven seasons with the Herd. Defensive tackle Jason Smith also made his first start.

Garet Morrell made his first career start and completed his first collegiate touchdown pass to Ryan Yurachek, a 16-yard connection with 36 seconds left of the second quarter. That score was Yurachek's second of the season. The junior tight end has a receiving touchdown in eight of his last nine games.

Herd sophomore running back Keion Davis caught a 12-yard touchdown pass from Garet Morrell, Davis' first receiving TD at Marshall.

Marshall sophomore linebacker Chase Hancock sacked Louisville quarterback Lamar Jackson on the Cardinals' first drive of the game, Hancock's first career solo sack. In the fourth quarter, Hancock forced a fumble – the first of his career.

MU freshman defensive end Ty Tyler returned a fumble 26 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter. It is Tyler's second fumble return for a touchdown in three career games. He also had a 20-yard fumble return for a touchdown in the season opener against Morgan State.

Notes Versus Akron

Marshall game captains for Akron, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were sophomore quarterback Chase Litton, senior receiver Justin Hunt, senior linebacker Devontre'a Tyler, junior defensive lineman Blake Keller and senior defensive back Cody Carter.

Marshall's Josh Knight became the sixth different Herd player to catch a touchdown pass this season when he hauled in a 21-yard reception from Chase Litton in the first quarter.

Litton had his second career 400-yard game (413) and third career four-touchdown game. He completed 32 passes in a career-high 57 attempts, and it was his first career three-interception game.

Litton completed passes to 12 different receivers, led by a seven-reception, 118-yard, two-touchdown performance by Knight. Coming into the game, Knight had six career catches for 81 yards.

Tight end Ryan Yurachek added five catches for 65 yards – and his nation-leading streak of six consecutive games with a touchdown came to an end. Receivers Deon-Tay McManus and Michael Clark each caught a touchdown for the second consecutive game. Running back Keion Davis scored his third career rushing touchdown – his first of the season – and caught a career-high four passes for a career-best 52 yards.

Notes Versus Morgan State

Marshall game captains for Morgan State, as selected by Doc Holliday and staff, were senior wide receiver Justin Hunt, senior offensive lineman Michael Selby, senior defensive end Gary Thompson and senior linebacker Devontre'a Tyler.

Ryan Yurachek's 58-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter was the longest of his career. His previous long reception was 31 yards.

Marshall won its 27th consecutive game when leading at halftime. The Herd led 49-0 at intermission.

Chase Litton became the fourth Marshall quarterback to throw at least six touchdown passes, joining Rakeem Cato (seven), Chad Pennington (six) and Byron Leftwich (six). Litton's previous career high for touchdown passes in a game was four, set last season against Norfolk State.

George Davis' 95-yard fumble return for a touchdown is the longest in Marshall history, breaking the 94-year-old record held by James Hagan (85 yards vs. Georgetown College, 1922).

Marshall had two fumble returns for touchdowns – Davis in the second quarter and a 20-yard return by Ty Tyler in the third quarter. The last time the Herd had two fumble returns for scores in the same game was 2002 against Buffalo (34 yards by J.T. Rembert and 11 yards by Marcus Hairston).

The 115 combined fumble return yards is a school record for Marshall.

After converting his first eight extra points of the game, Marshall's Amoreto Curraj missed a point after attempt following the Herd's ninth touchdown. The miss ended a streak of 160 consecutive extra points for the Herd, dating back to Justin Haig's miss against Southern Mississippi on Nov. 2, 2013.

Marshall had eight first-time starters: three on offense and five on defense. Receiver Michael Clark, receiver Josh Knight and center Levi Brown made their first starts on offense. Defensive lineman Nyquan Harris, linebacker Chase Hancock, cornerback Chris Jackson, safety Corey Neely and safety C.J. Reavis started their first game for the Herd.

Reavis played in 12 games but made did not make a start at Virginia Tech in 2014, so Saturday was his first FBS start.

The 62 point score differential ranks tied for 17th all-time in Herd history with a 62-0 win over Ohio Wesleyan in 1938. It is the Herd's second most lopsided win at Edwards Stadium, next to the 71-7 win against Morehead in 1994. The last shutout in a home opener was 1993 vs. Morehead State (56-0).

Emanuel Byrd's 58 yards are a career-high. Ryan Yurachek had a career long catch, his sixth-straight game with a touchdown. Overall, five pass catchers had their career-long catch (some were debuts): Ryan Yurachek-58, Justin Hunt-44, Michael Clark-35, Willie Johnson-22 and Josh Knight-24.

Including the two fumble returns for TDs, the average length of the Herd's nine scores: 35.9 yards. Only one (Tony Pittman's nine-yard touchdown) was fewer than 10 yards.

Marshall allowed 47 rushing yards (fewest since allowing 39 to Memphis on Nov. 17, 2011) and 1.3 yards per rush. The last time the defense posted a lower number: Tulane in the 2010 finale (1.2 yards per carry).

Litton's average of 19.3 yards per pass attempt is a new Marshall single-game record. The previous record was 18.0, set by Eric Kresser against Delaware in the 1996 playoff game and tied by Chad Pennington against Army in 1997.

Marshall averaged 8.55 yards per play, the 17th-highest total in school history.

Herd in Home Openers

The 62-0 win over Morgan State was the 117th season opening game for the Herd and the 117th home opener in school history.

The Herd is 85-24-8 in home openers and has won the last six in a row. The longest streak in Marshall history is 20 (1984-2003).

Herd Has Four Named Preseason All-Conference USA

Marshall offensive linemen Michael Selby and Clint Van Horn were named preseason All-Conference USA by the league's 13 head coaches, along with tight end Ryan Yurachek and defensive lineman Gary Thompson.

Selby and Van Horn were also first-team preseason picks by Athlon, as was Thompson, while Yurachek was named to the publication's second team.

Selby has started every game the past two seasons for coach Alex Mirabal's offensive line, amassing 106 knockdowns. He has seen action for 2,016 offensive snaps over the course of his three-year career.

Van Horn, who was selected to the Outland Trophy Watch List for the second straight season earlier this month, is a two-time all-league honoree. The Beckley native has started 25 games for the program and was named to C-USA's Commissioner's Honor Roll a year ago.

Yurachek has collected several accolades this summer. Last week, he was named to the Wuerffel Trophy Watch List and the AFCA Good Works Team on the heels of his selection to the John Mackey Award Watch List. He had 44 catches for 417 yards and nine touchdowns last year, a total that led all Thundering Herd non-kickers in scoring, and was named to the league's 2015-16 Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Thompson was an honorable mention all-conference selection last season after racking up a team-high nine sacks and 12.5 tackles for loss.

Hamrick Appointed to NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee

Marshall Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick has been appointed Conference USA's representative on the NCAA's Division I Football Oversight Committee, replacing former C-USA Senior Associate Commissioner Alfred White. White is now the College Football Playoff's Senior Director of Marketing and Strategic Partnerships.

Hamrick serves on the committee through June 30, 2018, after which he will be eligible to be reappointed to an additional four-year term.

The Football Oversight Committee ensures that appropriate oversight of football for both the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) and Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) is maintained; enhances the development of the sport and make recommendations related to regular-season and postseason football. The committee prioritizes enhancement of the student-athlete educational experience (academically and athletically), and in doing so, promotes student-

athletes' personal growth and leadership development. It works in conjunction with appropriate governance entities to provide solutions to issues impacting the health and safety of football student-athletes.

"It is an honor to be selected to such a prestigious committee," said Hamrick. "I look forward to continuing my service to the great game of football and contributing to its betterment in the coming years."

The committee also supervises procedures for licensing of postseason bowls and qualifications and/or selection procedures for the FCS Championship. The committee reviews recommendations from the NCAA Division I Football Championship Committee and processes other issues related to the administration of the FCS Championship. The committee assumes many of the duties of the former NCAA Division I Football Issues Committee and provides direction to the NCAA Football Rules Committee regarding playing rules governing FBS and FCS football.

Thundering Herd to Face Gamecocks in 2018

Marshall football will visit the University of South Carolina on Saturday, Sept. 15, 2018, Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick announced.

The Thundering Herd will receive a \$1.4 million guarantee for the game, the largest in school history.

Marshall will host NC State the following Saturday, the backend of a home-and-home series that begins in 2017.

"We're excited to play an SEC school, especially one that is in a fertile recruiting ground for our program and within driving distance for our fans," said Hamrick. "We had an opportunity to play a game of this caliber in 2018 and it was too good to pass up."

The two schools have met just once, with the Thundering Herd pulling out a 24-21 road victory on Sept. 19, 1998 via a late interception by 2016 Marshall Athletics Hall of Fame inductee Dani Derricott and Billy Malashevich's 37-yard field goal as time expired.

Friday's announcement is the latest in the continual upgrade to the program's non-conference schedule under Hamrick. Since his arrival, Marshall has landed home-and-home football series with NC State, Pittsburgh, Louisville, Purdue, Boise State, Cincinnati, East Carolina, Navy and Appalachian State, and rekindled longtime series with regional Mid-American Conference members Ohio, Miami (Ohio), Akron and Kent State.

The Gamecocks hired former Florida coach Will Muschamp last December, who went 28-21 with the Gators.

Marshall University Board of Governors Approve Expansion of Joan C. Edwards Stadium Beer Sales

The Marshall University Board of Governors approved the expansion of beer sales into the chairback sections on the west side of Joan C. Edwards Stadium. The measure had also been approved by the Big Green Scholarship Foundation Board.

Beer will now be available in sections 108, 110, 112, 114, 116 and 118.

Since 2005, beer had only been sold in the stadium's Big Green Room and could not be taken outside. Moving forward, Big Green Room purchases will continue and cans of 16-ounce beer may also be purchased from servers in those sections.

Athletics will increase security measures in those sections this seasons and Sodexo, the University's concessions vendor, will provide appropriate training to its staff members.

"Before moving forward with additional selling points, we felt this trial run, of sorts, was necessary," said Marshall Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick. "This is a growing trend in college athletics and this approach has been used recently at other schools, including Ohio State, Penn State and Pittsburgh."

Marshall will open the season at home against Morgan State on Sept. 10.

Curry Gives \$200,000 to Marshall Athletics for Facility Project and Scholarship

Vinny Curry, a former Thundering Herd All-American defensive end from 2008-11 and a second-round NFL Draft pick of the Philadelphia Eagles in 2012, has announced that he has donated \$200,000 to the Big Green Scholarship Foundation to jumpstart a facility renovation project in the Shewey Building, as well as endowing a scholarship in his mother's name. Curry just signed a lucrative, multiyear contract in the NFL's offseason.

"Marshall means a lot to me," Curry said. "Without the opportunity I was given to receive an education and play football, I would not be in the position I am today. I haven't forgotten that. The people of Huntington are special and have always had my back and my best interests in mind. This financial commitment is a token of my appreciation to ensure we can continue football's winning tradition."

With the gift from Curry, Marshall Athletics and the Big Green Scholarship Foundation will officially launch the "Vinny Curry Project," a fundraising campaign geared toward all Marshall Football alumni. All of the program's alumni will be given the opportunity to donate \$1,000 to have a locker in the current locker room dedicated to them.

"We have 118 lockers in our current locker room and it is our goal to put a name on every single locker, and I have pledged the first \$1,000 to purchase mine," Marshall Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick said. "This is an exciting time for Marshall Athletics and Marshall Football, and Vinny's generosity shows what being a true Son of Marshall is all about. This is a tone-setting gift he has given and it shows what kind of person he is and what Marshall meant to him."

The matching gifts will go toward an extensive renovation of the locker room along with other football areas in the Shewey Building.

In addition to the facility project, a portion of Curry's gift will go toward an endowed scholarship in the name of his late mother, Linda "Cissy" Jackson. The scholarship will be part of the total pool of Thundering Herd scholarships.

"If I can send a softball player, basketball player, soccer player -- whomever it may be -- to Marshall from Neptune, N.J., and know that I helped provide them a scholarship, that is crazy to think about," said Curry. "My education is important to me and was always important to my mother. If she was still here, I know how proud she would be that I am a college graduate. I came here with not a lot of direction and the academic foundation that Marshall provided gave me a chance to be successful in life."

Herd Coach Doc Holliday underscored and appreciated Curry's commitment.

"Our football program, along with all of our Marshall Athletics programs, are competing at a championship level and when I heard of what Vinny had planned, it just checked another box of how special this place is," Holliday said. "I am excited to reach out to our alumni and make sure they know how important it is to get involved and continue helping the young men in our program today. This is a monumental moment for our program and I could not be more proud that such a special individual like Vinny believes in what we are doing."

BOGACZYK: Herd Can't Run, and WKU Passes for Title

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. -- Marshall's bid to become the first team to play in three consecutive Conference USA Championship Games turned out like plenty of Thanksgiving turkeys this week. It was stuffed.

When Western Kentucky decided to overload on its run defense against the Herd on Black Friday here at Houchens-Smith Stadium, Marshall had no answer for the Hilltoppers' vaunted passing game before 17,687 spectators.

With a 49-28 victory in the regular-season finale, WKU (10-2, 8-0) took the C-USA East Division crown the Herd (9-3, 6-2) had worn the past two seasons.

Now, the Hilltoppers await the winner of Saturday's West Division showdown between Louisiana Tech and Southern Miss to play host here for the Dec. 5 league title game, while Marshall waits likely until Dec. 6 to learn its bowl destination for later that month.

"They forced us to have to beat them throwing the football," Herd Coach Doc Holliday said. "That's exactly what they did. We couldn't run the ball; they had too many guys in the box. They packed it in and forced us to have to beat them throwing the football, and we weren't good enough ... They made us one-dimensional and we didn't execute well enough."

It took WKU only 46 seconds to score, and Western led 21-0 with 6:21 to go in the first half. It was 35-14 by halftime, even though the Hilltoppers had fumbled the ball away on their second and third offensive series.

By the end of the third quarter, Marshall had only two yards rushing on 17 carries. The Herd finished with 25 runs for 31 yards, the yardage low in Holliday's six MU seasons.

The Herd's longest rush was 9 yards. The last time a Herd team had fewer yards was in a 27-20 loss to Southern Miss in November 2009 -- with 26 carries for the same number of yards.

Marshall got a 97-yard kick return touchdown from senior Deandre Reaves -- his second kick runback score to go with a punt return TD this season -- but that was the Herd highlight on a day when he set the school's single-game kick return yardage record with 221.

WKU dominated the game up front offensively and defensively. While the Herd managed three sacks and eight hurries against star sixth-year quarterback Brandon Doughty, it wasn't nearly enough as the senior from Davie, Fla., was 27-of-39 for 370 yards and five touchdowns.

"They put an extra guy in the box and we knew we had to throw it," Marshall center Michael Selby said. "They definitely wanted to take running the ball inside out of the game plan and they did a good job with that. They were the better team."

While Doughty's quick release on timing patterns troubled the Herd, Marshall true freshman QB Chase Litton had his struggles. He was 19-of-38 for 230 yards, but was intercepted twice and lost two fumbles. His first of those -- on the first series of the second half stopped the Herd at the WKU 28.

If Marshall could have gone in for a touchdown there, the hosts' lead could have melted to 31-21.

"I've just got to get better," said Litton, who was predictably hard on himself. "We were put in a situation in the second half to succeed and there were three straight times (a pick and two fumbles) I just really just let this team down."

"They came with a great game plan to stop our run and make us beat them by the pass and I just didn't capitalize ... They expected me to beat them, and I didn't do it."

Western rolled to 546 yards total offense, almost double the 273 by the Herd. Because Marshall couldn't run the clock by running the ball and keeping Doughty and his talented receivers off the field, WKU had a time-of-possession advantage of 10:22.

"Give them credit," Holliday said. "It's obvious that's an excellent football team. That quarterback is as good and as accurate as anyone around and the thing that makes them so good on offense is they have players who can make plays."

"Those receivers are good, the running backs are good. Their offensive line is solid. We just didn't play well enough to win the football game. That's obvious. Give that offense credit. We didn't play well in all three phases to have a chance to win that game."

"It's always disappointing. You work your tail off to get to the point to where you're playing for a championship and when it doesn't happen, you're disappointed. Our goal -- and it always will be -- was to win a conference championship. Unfortunately, we didn't get that done. So, it's back to work ... Get ready for who we'll play in a bowl game."

Holliday speculated that WKU tight end Tyler Higbee would return and make an impact after missing four games due to injury -- and the Marshall coach was right. Higbee troubled the Herd safeties and linebackers with a six-catch, 92-yard day that included two touchdowns.

"(Doughty's) got good receivers," said Herd junior strong safety Tiquan Lang, who led Marshall tacklers with a game-high 12. "When you've got good receivers, they're going to make plays for you. It isn't real hard if you get 'em the ball."

And Doughty did that. Western -- it had an Edwards Stadium-record 738 yards in its 67-66 overtime upset of the host Herd a year ago -- piled up 424 yards by halftime in this one. In defensive coordinator Chuck Heater's three Marshall seasons, the Herd has allowed 500 or more yards four times -- two losses apiece to Middle Tennessee and WKU.

Holliday was asked about the Herd's first-down difficulty against the improved WKU defense that returned nine starters from last season.

"It was," the Marshall coach replied. "All downs were very difficult to be honest, but there's no question when you keep coming up second-and-10, third-and-long, it's tough. And we did not stay ahead of the sticks very much today."

Holliday and Reaves agreed that the senior's kick return -- only two have been longer in Herd history -- gave Marshall a spark after it trailed by three scores.

"It felt great," said Reaves, who also caught two passes for 45 yards. "We needed something. We were down at that point, 21-0, so we needed some juice and we think highly of our special teams, I guess you'd say. We needed a spark, needed something and that touchdown did it."

"Absolutely ... once we got a little juice we were going to open up our playbook, which we did, but we got down, and we started hanging our heads a little bit and so we tried to keep everybody on course and make something happen."

"They were good up front and a lot of times by the time Chase got the ball (on the snap) he had a guy or two in his face ... We just tried to stick to what we've been doing all year, staying the course and sticking to our bread-and-butter and it kind of took us a little to get going, but it happens. It's football."



Doc Holliday **Head Coach - Seventh Season** **(53-36 overall, 35-20 C-USA)**

Coach John "Doc" Holliday, who has returned Marshall University football to the national picture, has guided the Thundering Herd to three consecutive seasons of 10 or more victories.

That run (2013-15, 33-8 record) stands alone among the 61 Group of Five conference programs. Only Alabama, Clemson, Ohio State and Florida State have longer current streaks of 10-win seasons than the Herd.

Marshall has won five consecutive bowls – the current long streak in the FBS – with four of those triumphs coming under Holliday in the last five seasons. Marshall's three straight 10-win seasons also are a first in the 20-season history of Conference USA football.

His 2015 Herd finished 10-3 with a win over Connecticut in the St. Petersburg Bowl. His 2014 and '15 teams – with a combined mark of 23-4 – have the best record among the Group of Five programs in the two-year College Football Playoff era.

In Holliday's six MU seasons – with a 50-28 record – he has built the Herd into a perennial Conference USA contender. His teams have sported 23 All-C-USA first team selections, 17 second-teamers, 32 honorable mention picks and 16 All-Freshman team selections. He has

had nine players selected for C-USA's top individual player-of-the-year awards. His last three teams have produced a 20-4 C-USA record.

Holliday's 2014 Herd (13-1) grabbed the school's first C-USA Championship with a thrilling comeback, title-game win over Louisiana Tech. MU headed to the Boca Raton Bowl, where it routed Mid-American Conference champion Northern Illinois, 52-23. The Herd finished the season in the major polls – No. 22 in the USA Today Coaches poll and No. 23 in the Associated Press media poll. It was Marshall's first appearance in the final polls since 2002.

The Herd coach was named the 2014 Conference USA Coach of the Year in voting by his peers and Marshall boasted a C-USA-record 10 all-conference first team selections.

Holliday received a six-year contract extension (through July 2021) for \$755,500 annually on April 8, 2015.

The 2014 title season followed a successful 2013, as Marshall went 10-4, won the C-USA East Division crown and downed ACC member Maryland in the Military Bowl -- the Terps' last game before heading to the Big Ten.

In December 2014, Holliday was named the 15th annual Gazette-Mail Sportsman of the Year by Charleston Newspapers. In April 2015, the Herd coach was honored as the 2014 Lowell Cade Sportsman of the Year by The (Huntington) Herald-Dispatch.

And in concert with Herd Athletic Director Mike Hamrick, Holliday has helped bring about upgrades in the Marshall non-conference schedule, with home-and-homes against Louisville, Pitt, North Carolina State, Purdue, Navy, Boise State, Cincinnati, Appalachian State, East Carolina, Akron and Ohio.

Holliday, named as Herd coach on Dec. 17, 2009 in his first collegiate head coaching job, is widely regarded as one of the top recruiters in the nation. Since he has become a head coach, he has added a reputation for finding and hiring assistant coaches who have made a strong impact on his program. He has more than 30 years of collegiate coaching experience, including previous stops at Florida, North Carolina State and West Virginia, his alma mater.

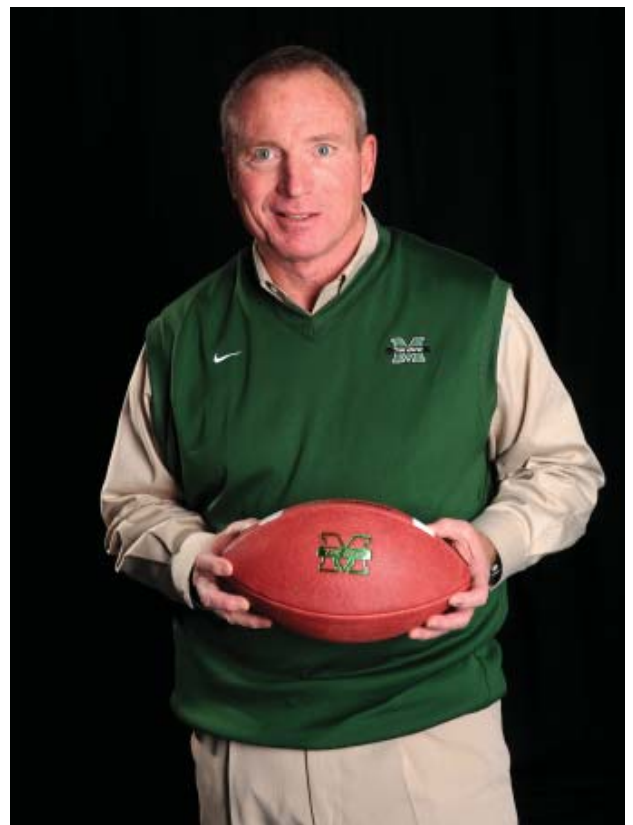
During his time in Huntington, Holliday's teams have consistently improved as the season stretches into the winter months. The Herd is 24-8 under Holliday after Oct. 29 on the calendar, including an eye-popping 14-1 mark in the friendly confines of Joan C. Edwards Stadium.

In 2011, the Herd went 7-6 against the 16th-toughest schedule in the nation, a slate that was ranked second among non-BCS schools. Two of those victories came against eventual C-USA champion Southern Miss and Big East co-champ Louisville, the latter coming on the road for the program's first non-conference road win since the early 2000s. Marshall also won five Conference USA games, the most for the program since it had joined the league in 2005.

During his coaching career, Holliday has coached in 25 bowl games, three national championship games and coached 15 players who have gone on to the NFL. He also has coached five All-Americans.

A native of Hurricane, W.Va., Holliday was born April 21, 1957. He was a three-year letter winner as a linebacker at West Virginia (1976-78) and has earned bachelor's (1979) and master's (1981) degrees from WVU. He won a West Virginia state wrestling title at 175 pounds (all divisions) in 1975 at Hurricane High.

Holliday and his wife, Diana, have four children -- Meghan, Cade, Chase and Cody.
