2004 REVIEW NOTEBOOK

- The Maryland Terrapins advanced to the College Cup for the third consecutive season. The Terps' season ended in the national semifinals to eventual champion Indiana, as John Michael Hayden scored with just 48 seconds remaining in the second overtime. Noah Palmer tied a career-high with eight saves and the Terps got goals from Jason Garey and Maurice Edu in the losing effort.
- Maryland has won 57 games over the past three seasons -- the most of any three-year stretch in Maryland history and more than any other team in the nation during that span.
- The Terps scored 62 goals in 2004 -- the most in school history. The previous record of 61 goals in a season was set in 1963.
- Maryland was both ACC regular season and tournament runner-up in 2004.
- In 10 games against ranked opponents, Maryland was 5-4-1.
- The Terps finished in the top four in the NSCAA poll for the third straight year. They are the only team to be ranked in the top four in each of the last three seasons. Maryland was ranked No. 1 for the second time in school history in the NSCAA poll on Sept. 20.
- Jason Garey and Abe Thompson were named NSCAA third team All-America honors. It was the third straight year that Maryland has had players earn NSCAA All-America recognition. Garey was a second team All-America honoree by College Soccer News. Freshman Stephen King was a second team All-Freshman selection by College Soccer News.
- Noah Palmer shattered Maryland's career mark for shutouts with 34, surpassing Dom Macina's record of 27. Palmer finished his career with a GAA of 0.86, just 0.04 away from Macina's record of 0.82 set from 1985-88.
- Abe Thompson became Maryland's all-time points leader with his goal against Clemson at the ACC Tournament. Thompson has 112 career points (43g, 26a) -- surpassing Eberhard Klein's mark of 109 set from 1962-64. Thompson finished his career first in

- points, second in goals and fourth in assists.
- Jason Garey's score against Indiana in the national semifinals gave him 53 points on the year, surpassing Cliff Krug's 24-year old record of 52. Garey finished the season second in the nation in total goals (22) and total points (53).
- Michael Dello-Russo and Chris Lancos each had 10 assists on the season, tying them for seventh-most in a single season at Maryland.
- Maryland finished the season with 12 shutouts, including eight of its last 12 games.
- Terp seniors Jason Arnold, Domenic Mediate, Noah Palmer, Ian Rodway, Abe Thompson and Ellis Welker were a part of some of the most successful seasons in Maryland history during their time with the Terps. Fourth-year seniors Mediate, Palmer, Rodway and Welker won 67 games during their time in College Park, including three straight College Cup appearances in addition to the ACC regular season and tournament titles. Arnold and Thompson, who began their careers in 2000, have been a part of 77 Maryland victories.
- Noah Palmer played in 92 games during his career, and Ian Rodway played in 91.
- On the year, Maryland was 10-2-1 at Ludwig Field this season. For the third straight season, Maryland utilized home field advantage to get to the College Cup. Over the past three seasons, Maryland is 37-3-1 at Ludwig Field (including NCAA Tournament games). Maryland averaged nearly 2,000 fans per game in 2004.
- Assistant coach Brian Pensky was named one of the top assistants in 2004 by College Soccer News. He was among 21 assistants across the country to be recognized.
- Domenic Mediate was drafted in the second round (23rd overall) of the MLS Draft by the Columbus Crew. Abe Thompson and Noah Palmer were selected in the MLS Supplemental draft. The Terps have sent seven players to the MLS in the past two seasons.

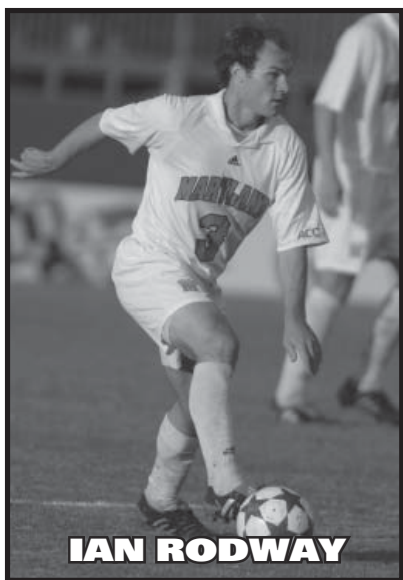

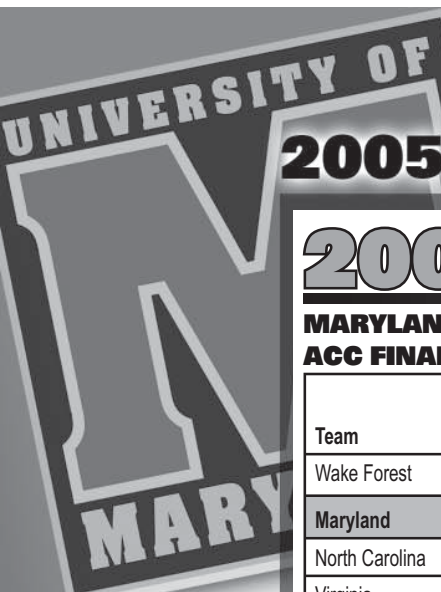

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va.— Five different Maryland Terrapins found the back of the net as the Terps won a 5-0 decision in the first game of the Virginia/Nike Classic Friday night at Klockner Stadium. Maurice Edu's first career goal for the Terrapins at 18:50 proved to be all Maryland would need as Noah Palmer and Craig Salvati combined for the shutout.

The Terps notched the early goal on a throw in by Kenney Bertz. Bertz's throw landed on the far side of the box and found Edu, who settled the ball and bounced the ball in off the crossbar for the score at 18:39.

The Terps carried the momentum into the second half as Jason Garey put up the third goal of the day for the Terps at 51:13.

Thompson was rewarded for his hard work in the 63rd minute after a cross by Garey was touched by Mediate from the left side of the box to Thompson in the middle for the finish. Just 30 seconds later, the Terps netted their fifth score after Mediate worked his way all the way to the goal line before crossing to Stephen King.

The defense for the Terps helped keep all of the action on the Maryland side of the field. The Terrapins allowed just three shots on goal (two saves for Palmer, one for Salvati), and just six total shots for the game.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va.— The Maryland Terrapins got three goals in the first 15 minutes and cruised to a 6-0 victory over Marshall in the second game of the Virginia/Nike Classic. Maryland's 11 goals over the two days sets a Virginia/Nike Tournament record and is the most goals in consecutive games since 2001 when Maryland scored 13 against Manhattan and NC State.

Domenic Mediate was pulled down in the box near the touch line and a foul was called. Thompson buried the penalty kick into the left side of the net just two minutes into the game.

Just over a minute later, Thompson sent a high cross to the right side of the box. The ball landed five yards from the far post, and A.J. Godbolt was there to finish for the score on a tough angle.

The Terps kept the offense coming, this time with Jason Garey providing the goal in the 14th minute. The forward combo of Thompson and Garey combined for the next goal as Garey countered a Marshall attack and sent a through ball for Thompson, leaving him one-on-one with the goalkeeper. Just under two minutes later, Garey headed a cross from Michael Dello-Russo into the net.

In the second half, Marshall (0-2) was able to possess the ball a little better, but the Thundering Herd settled for mostly long-range shots. The Terps lit up the scoreboard again on its first shot of the second half at 59:06 after Erwin Diaz sent a cross to the middle of the box where Jason Arnold headed the ball in for the score.

COLLEGE PARK, Md— The Maryland Terrapins waited nine months to play St. John's after the Red Storm eliminated the Terps from the NCAA Tournament, but waited only 58 seconds into the match to tally the score as No. 3 Maryland rolled to an impressive 5-2 win over second-ranked St. John's Friday night at Ludwig Field. Jason Garey tallied the first hat trick of his career, Abe Thompson added a pair of goals and A.J. Godbolt had three assists to pace the Terp offense.

A crowd of 3,332, the fourth-largest crowd in Ludwig Field, watched as it took less than a minute for Thompson to send a quick touch to Garey and the junior striker buried the chance in the back of the net for a 1-0 Terrapin lead.

Maryland made it 2-0 after Chris Lanco sent over a cross that made its way to Thompson who drilled a rocket past St. Johns keeper Bill Gaudette to make it 2-0 in the 17th minute.

In the 22nd minute, Gaudette's attempted clearance from wide of the net was deflected, leaving to blast into the open net for a 3-0 Terp lead.

For their efforts, Garey and Thompson were named co-MVPs of the tournament.

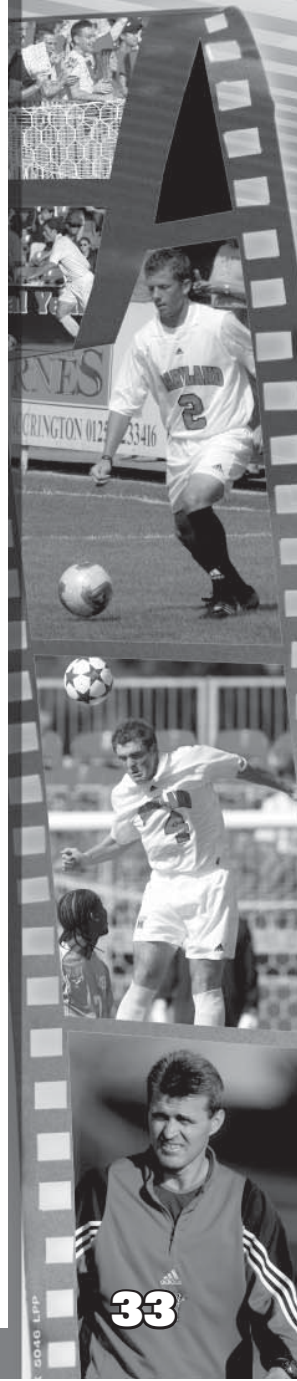

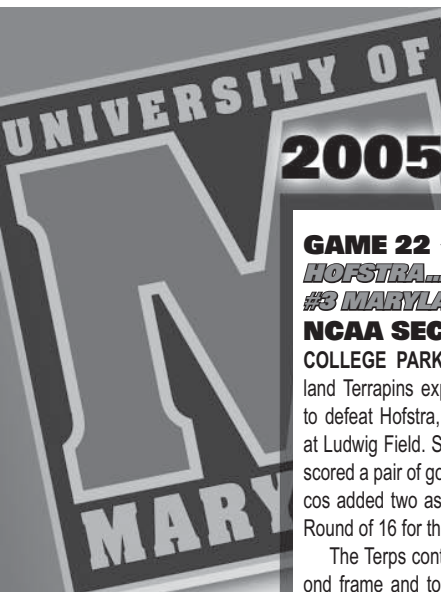
Garey, Lancos and Palmer were named to the all-tournament for their performances in the tournament.

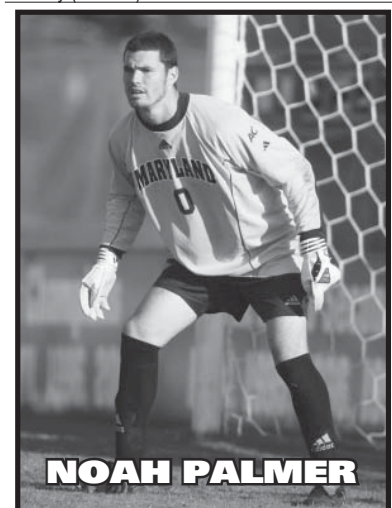
