MURFREESBORO, TENN. (AP) - Brenda Frese sounds grateful enough to send a thank-you note to her friend, Middle Tennessee coach Rick Insell.

His Blue Raiders gave her top-ranked Maryland Terrapins a lesson Friday night on what it's like to be the team everyone wants to beat. Kristi Toliver hit a 3-pointer with 3:11 left to break a tie at 72, and the defending national champions pulled out an 80-76 victory in the opener for both teams.

Not exactly a game to ease into the season.

"They made us better tonight, and that was tremendous," Frese said.

"One of the better college games I've ever been a part of. ... They made us work for everything. It was a tough battle like you saw but a tremendous environment. We loved the fans, the energy. ... It's just going to make us both better."

The victory extended Maryland's winning streak to seven straight, a run that started in the NCAA tournament last spring en route to the school's first national title. Opening on the road, the Terrapins drew 10,010 - a record crowd that was more than twice the previous best for a Blue Raiders women's game.

"Middle Tennessee has prepared us for what's going to come ahead in every game," said Crystal Langhorne, the Terrapins' preseason All-American. "We know we're going to get everybody's best game."

The teams swapped the lead five times with one tie, all in the second half. Chelsia Lymon scored with 1:59 left to pull Middle Tennessee to 75-74, but the Blue Raiders missed their next three shots.

Laura Harper hit a free throw, and Langhorne put back a miss by Shay Doron with 27 seconds to make it 78-74. Middle Tennessee turned over the ball once again, and Maryland got the victory.

Insell said his Blue Raiders got a little tired and had to come out of the press that had worked so well. Maryland had 23 turnovers the Blue Raiders turned into 30 points.

"But you know, they're the national champions. They've been picked No. 1 already this season by everybody. I'm proud of our young ladies. They made the plays when they had to make plays, and that's what they're supposed to do."

Marissa Coleman had 19 points for Maryland. Langhorne and Doron each finished with 16, while Harper had 11.

Coleman said they knew they would be a target for opponents this season.

"I don't think we knew what that meant until tonight. We knew they were a great team, but I don't think we realized how good a team they were," she said. "They were coming after us based on what we accomplished last year."

Amber Holt, a junior college transfer who originally signed with Georgia, led all scorers with 28 points for Middle Tennessee. She signed in August, and Frese's staff had no tape to study on the 6-foot guard. Chrissy Givens had 14 points, and Lymon added 13.

"They could definitely play in our league," Frese said of Givens and Holt. "They're that talented. They're tremendous."

These teams met Friday for the first time. Frese had a couple reasons for opening on the road: She's friends with Insell; and junior guard Ashleigh Newman is from Murfreesboro and won three state championships with Insell at Shelbyville Central High School.

Newman had about 200 family, friends and fans wearing special Maryland shirts for the occasion, and she knew Insell would have Middle Tennessee ready.

"He's really prepared them. They're going to do some great things this year," she said.

The Terrapins must wait until Sunday's home opener against George Mason to unfurl their national championship banner.

But Maryland started as if it hadn't taken a break since beating Duke in overtime for the national title in April. With its starting five back, the Terps scored the first six points and led by as much as 15 when Langhorne scored with 2:52 left and put Maryland up 38-23.

But the Blue Raiders forced the Terrapins into 14 first-half turnovers, and Maryland didn't score again after Langhorne's bucket. Middle Tennessee finished the half with a 10-0 run with five coming from Holt, who went 5-of-6 at the line, and they trailed 38-33 at halftime.

"I think we're just really excited for that day and to be able to celebrate with our fans at home," Langhorne said.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Top-ranked Maryland unfurled its national championship banner, then staged an impressive performance reminiscent of its play a year ago.

Kristi Toliver and Ashleigh Newman each scored 16 points, and the Terrapins rolled to a 99-43 rout of George Mason on Sunday.

Toliver had 10 points during a 22-0 run that put Maryland (2-0) up 43-15 in the first half. The margin swelled to 40 points with 13:34 left, and 50 with 7:14 to go.

Crystal Langhorne scored 14 points and Shay Doron and Christie Marrone had 12 apiece for the Terrapins.

"The most encouraging thing is how unselfish we were with the ball, offensively, and then being able to focus defensively on what we needed to get done," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said.

That was the Terrapins' method of operation last season, when they used a balanced attack to go 34-4 and beat Duke in the NCAA title game.

Maryland shot 66 percent in the first half and went 6-for-10 from 3-point range in building a 50-20 lead. The blowout was a sharp contrast to the Terrapins' opener two days earlier, an 80-76 struggle at Middle Tennessee.

Lateisha Wade scored 15 for the Patriots (0-1), who failed to make a basket over the final 10 minutes of the first half.

"Obviously, Maryland was the national champion last year for a reason," Mason coach Debbie Taneyhill said. "They're going to win a lot of games this year."

The afternoon began with a video tribute to the women's first national championship team. At the same time, still images were displayed on long white curtains that extended from the scoreboard to the center of the floor.

Then the curtains dropped, revealing the 12-foot white banner that ultimately will hang from the rafters, directly across from the red banner from the men's national title in 2002.

"Obviously, it was a very special day for us in terms of being able to unveil the banner and being able to share that moment with our family, friends and supporters," Frese said.

Before the Terps came out to the floor, Frese gathered them to stress the significance of the event.

"I told the team to really reflect on that moment," Frese said. "That banner means so much, in terms of the hard work the players put into it. They were so unselfish and cared about each other. That's the team we want to be this year."

Maryland returns all five starters from last season's squad. Although the Terrapins were pressed on the road in the opener, their talent and depth were evident against the Patriots.

Maryland made nine of its first 12 shots and received points from five different players in taking a 21-12 lead. Langhorne was 3-for-3,

including two straight layups at the outset that put the Terrapins ahead to stay.

After the Patriots closed to 21-15, Doron hit a 3-pointer and scored off her own steal to begin the 22-point blitz that put Maryland in control. Toliver then connected from beyond the arc, sank a 10-footer and buried another 3-pointer.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Laura Harper quit thinking and started playing. The result was a performance reminiscent of her play in the Final Four last year when she earned Most Outstanding Player honors in leading Maryland to a national title.

Harper, who entered the game having scored a total of 14 points in Maryland's first two games, made 12 of 16 shots and scored a career-high 27 points to lead No. 1 Maryland to an 82-64 win against TCU (0-1).

"Things were just falling, and I was just playing basketball," Harper said. "Coach was telling me all week to stop thinking so much and just play. I play my best when I come out and not think about too many things."

Shay Doron scored 22 points for Maryland (3-0) and Crystal Langhorne finished with 11 points and 11 rebounds. Kristi Toliver had 10 assists for the Terrapins.

Adrianna Ross led TCU with 15 points.

Maryland opened the game with a 16-0 run, powered by six quick Harper points. All five Terps starters scored in the outburst, which ended with a Harper layup at the 16:23 mark.

"I thought that was a tremendous first half," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "I thought we executed well and got out in our transition game. I thought it was the best we have done."

The Horned Frogs answered Maryland's initial run with five quick points to cut the deficit to 16-5, but never got closer.

"They came out really fast and hit some good shots," TCU coach Jeff Mittie said. "I think we got a little frustrated. We weren't so bad early as Maryland was very, very good."

The scariest moment for Maryland occurred when Marissa Coleman, the reigning ACC Rookie of the Year, lost her balance going in for a layup and bruised her tailbone at the 10:29 mark of the first half. Coleman left the court under her own power, but didn't return to the game. Her status for Saturday's game with Arizona is uncertain.

TCU, which returned four starters from a 19-12 team that advanced to the second round of the 2006 NCAA tournament, was overwhelmed on both ends of the court, falling behind 51-28 at the half. The Frogs trailed by as many as 36 before finishing strong. Maryland, which enjoyed its biggest lead at 72-36, recorded assists on 27 of its 31 baskets.

"Our ball movement was tremendous and we were unselfish

making the extra pass," Frese said. "I thought we really communicated well."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Maryland has made a habit of controlling games early before allowing opponents to come back.

For the second consecutive game, the top-ranked Terrapins were outscored in the second half but still won comfortably.

Ashleigh Newman scored 17 points to lead Maryland to a 75-61 victory over Arizona on Saturday. Laura Harper added 14 points for the Terrapins (4-0), who had four players score in double figures.

Joy Hollingsworth led Arizona (1-2) with 22 points - 14 in the second half.

Crystal Langhorne continued her efficient start to the season, making five of six shots to finish with 11 points to extend her double-figure scoring streak to 28 games. She has missed just five field-goal attempts in four games and is shooting 81 percent for the Terrapins.

Maryland's defense effectively put the game out of reach early. After making their first basket, the Wildcats missed their next nine shot and made only two field goals in the first 10:26. By that point, Maryland led 31-5.

"We put ourselves in a hole early," Arizona coach Joan Bonvicini said. "They took advantage of every opportunity."

The Terps maintained at least a 20-point lead until Kelsey Burns hit a 3-pointer with 4:15 left in the half to pull Arizona to 42-23. After a quick timeout by coach Brenda Frese, the Terps went back up by 21 on a pair of free throws by Laura Harper.

Arizona trailed 48-28 at halftime but outscored Maryland 33-27 in the second half, shooting 51.9 percent from the floor. On Friday night, Maryland suffered a similar lapse against TCU. The Terps won 82-64 despite being outscored 36-31 after halftime.

"Being able to hit that knockout punch early, I'm excited about our starts," Frese said. "Now I'm focused on our finishes."

Maryland native Ashley Whisonant, Arizona's third-leading scorer, picked up three quick fouls in the first half and played only 19 minutes. She finished with eight points.

Arizona, which has lost two games on its current road trip, plays TCU on Sunday in the final game of the BTI Classic, a round-robin tournament hosted by Maryland. The Terrapins will face George Washington.

"We're not satisfied with the way we've been playing for two games," Harper said. "I think (Sunday's game) is going to be really big, proving something for us. We're playing three games in three days. We're trying to see how we can fight through fatigue."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Three games in three days wasn't a problem for No. 1 Maryland.

Crystal Langhorne had 20 points and 11 rebounds to lead the top-ranked Terrapins to a 73-48 win over George Washington (No. 25 ESPN/USA Today) on Sunday.

Shay Doron scored 17 points, Laura Harper added 14 and Jade Perry had 10 for the Terps, who won their first five games for the first time in coach Brenda Frese's five-year tenure.

Kimberly Beck scored 17 points to lead the Colonials (4-1), who fell to 0-6 all-time against No. 1-ranked teams. Sarah-Jo Lawrence scored 15 and Jessica Adair added 10.

"I'm excited about how we played against a very good GW team," Frese said. "We really talked about focusing for a 40-minute game and I thought we were close to that."

In just the fourth meeting between the schools, which are located about 15 miles apart, Maryland took control with a 15-2 run to close the first half. A 3-pointer by Doron sent Maryland into the break with a 36-22 lead.

"That run at the end of the first half obviously (hurt)," Colonials coach Joe McKeown said. "We felt good about where we were."

Both teams were playing their third game in as many days as part of the BTI Classic, and their shooting showed it. Maryland, which entered the game shooting 53.6 percent from the field, made a season-low 43 percent of its shots, but compensated with a 53-30 rebounding advantage.

Langhorne, who came into the game shooting 81 percent, remained accurate, hitting 9 of 12 shots, including an assortment of layups.

"She catches everything you throw in there," Frese said. "She is a dominant inside presence. Crystal is obviously one of the best post players in the country, and she continues to show that each and every game."

After a basket by Adair 12 minutes into the second half, George Washington made just one field goal over the next 7:44. Maryland built a 42-27 lead, then erupted with a 9-0 run, capped by consecutive 3-pointers by Doron and Kristi Toliver.

George Washington shot 33 percent from the field and grabbed just six offensive rebounds.

"I feel like we are ahead of the curve defensively," Frese said. The Terps were more than happy to play on three consecutive days.

"I think the more games, the better for us," Doron said. "We are excited about having more games. The whole season is preparation for NCAA tournament time."

**FREEPORT, Bahamas** - Shay Doron had 23 points and seven assists to help No. 1 Maryland rout Mississippi 110-79 on Saturday night in the Junkanoo Jam title game. The Terrapins improved to 7-0 on the season, their best start since the 1991-92 campaign.

"I thought we did a tremendous job again of being unselfish," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "Our intensity was there."

The 110 points are the most scored on the road by a Terrapin squad since defeating Arkansas, 110-84, on Nov. 26, 1988. It also set a new tournament record.

"They just took it to us," Rebels coach Carol Ross said. "They played like the No. 1 team. ... Physically, they were clearly better than us."

Maryland ran out to a 9-0 start, before Ole Miss (5-2) got on the scoreboard. Mississippi hung around, keeping the lead within five on four different occasions. Leading 27-18 with 9:31 remaining in the game, the Terps began to pull away, going on a 16-5 run to jump ahead, 43-23, on a Doron three pointer with just over five minutes left to play in the half.

A pair of made free throws by Christie Marrone gave Maryland the biggest lead of the half, 54-27, before Ole Miss closed out the period on an 8-2 run to go into the half trailing, 56-35.

The Terrapins shot 64.5 percent in the half as Doron and Laura Harper led all scorers with 16 and 14 points, respectively. They also limited Wooden Award and Wade Trophy Candidate Armintie Price to zero points in the half.

In the second half, Maryland never let up, pushing its lead to a 29-point cushion just three minutes in. Ashleigh Newman's layup at 14:59 put the Terps ahead by the overwhelming margin of 72-42.

Late in the period, the Terrapins went out in front, by an insurmountable 40-point margin, 101-61.

With 53 seconds left in the game, Kristi Toliver's free throws tied and broke the tournament single-game scoring record, netting the Terps' 105th and 106th points of the game.

Harper scored 19 points and Langhorne had 17 points and 13 rebounds for the defending NCAA champion Terrapins, who had five players reach double digits. Both were named to the all-tournament team. Doron was selected the tournament MVP.

Alliesha Easley had 15 points for Mississippi and Shantell Black added 13. Price ended the game with just nine points.

**HUNTINGTON, W.Va. (AP)** - Maryland overcame another mistake-filled game.

The top-ranked Terrapins committed 21 turnovers but never trailed in a 68-49 win over poor-shooting Marshall on Wednesday night.

Maryland (8-0), off to its best start since the 1991-92 team opened 9-0, surpassed 20 turnovers for the fourth time in six games.

"It's something we've addressed early on and we need to get better at," coach Brenda Frese said.

Crystal Langhorne led a balanced Maryland offense with 15 points. Marissa Coleman added 13 points, and Kristi Toliver and Shay Doron scored 12 apiece.

Defending national champion Maryland has beaten its opponents by an average of 25 points. Frese said it's difficult to get a complete performance from her team every game, although Maryland came close in a 101-79 win over Mississippi on Saturday to win the Junkanoo Jam tournament in the Bahamas.

The Terrapins' 33 first-half points on Wednesday were a season low and they didn't put away Marshall until the second half. Maryland had its worst shooting performance of the season from the field at 37.5 percent (24-of-64).

"Up until this point we've been shooting the ball well," Frese said. "It was a different kind of game for us where we needed to find offense in different ways. We did a tremendous job in trying to get to the glass until we were able to find our offense again."

Meg Withrow scored 11 points to lead Marshall (5-2), which hosted a top-ranked team for the first time and was held to its lowest point total of the season.

"They're so good," Marshall coach Royce Chadwick said. "The only thing they're doing wrong right now is they're shuffling their feet a little bit too much and traveling in situations because they're a little rusty. When they get going in the spring, holy smokes."

Moderate Ishola made a free throw and a layup to bring Marshall to 35-25 with 18:37 left. But Toliver made a pair of 3-pointers to start a 21-5 run that put the Terrapins ahead 56-30 with 9:22 to go.

"Every time she shot it, it crippled me," Chadwick said. "She's just big-time."

Marshall struggled to get off shots against Maryland's full-court press. The Thundering Herd made just 31 percent (19-of-62) of their field goals and only 11 of 25 free throws and were outrebounded 53-37.

"If you get a look against Maryland, you better put it in. If you want to play at that level, you've got to make those shots." Chadwick said. "We missed some opportunities and Maryland doesn't give it to you twice."

The Terrapins made only three of their first 15 shots and went nearly seven minutes between first-half field goals.

Toliver's 3-pointer started a 14-4 run midway through the first half for a 28-11 lead, but Maryland softened on defense and Withrow made three free throws and scored off a steal to pull the Thundering Herd to 30-22 with 2:08 left in the half. Marshall got no closer.

Langhorne scored 11 points after halftime and finished with 10 rebounds for her fifth double-double of the season.

"In the first half we didn't get her enough touches," Frese said. "We came out right away after halftime and were much more aware of being able to get her the ball. She really gave us a lift in the second half."

Ishola, Marshall's leading scorer, was held to seven points, six below her average.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Once top-ranked Maryland got going, Siena couldn't keep up.

Marissa Coleman had 19 points and 12 assists to help Maryland rally from a sluggish start and the top-ranked Terrapins defeated Siena 93-54 Monday night.

Maryland improved to 10-0, the team's best start since 1991-92. The school record is the 16-0 start the Terrapins had in 1982-83. Their 16-game winning streak, dating back to last season, is the nation's best.

"I thought Siena played really scrappy," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "I didn't like our (early) intensity. The second half we did a much better job. I'm proud of how we responded in the second half, being much more focused and ready to play."

This was Maryland's second game in three days, and even though the Terrapins made their first eight shots from the field, they had trouble finding a rhythm against fired-up Siena. Maryland pulled away with a late first-half run and then outscored Siena 48-20 in the second half.

"This year everyone knows that we're the defending national champion," Coleman said. "They want to come right after us."

Coleman was named the Atlantic Coast Conference's Player of the Week earlier Monday for recording the program's first triple-double (15 points, 14 rebounds, 10 assists) in Saturday's 105-44 victory over the University of California Santa Barbara.

Kristi Toliver (14 points), Crystal Langhorne (13 points), Ashleigh Newman (11 points) and Christie Marrone (10 points) all scored in double figures. Shay Doron had nine points, and Laura Harper added six points and 10 rebounds.

Maryland shot 67 percent from the field (36-for-54) and held a 38-16 edge in rebounding that resulted in easy follow-ups and scoring chances from inside. The Terrapins also went 17-for-23 from the free throw line.

Siena, meanwhile, was 0-for-3 in free throws. "They're a machine," Siena coach Gina Castelli said. "We ran out of gas a little bit, but they're a great team. They got to the line a lot more in the second half, and obviously we didn't and that hurt us quite a bit."

Siena (1-7) stayed close in the early minutes and had a few leads thanks to some good outside shooting. The Saints couldn't get the ball inside, but Shondaya Burrell (17 points) made a number of tough

shots.

Maryland took command with a 14-point run late in the first half. Siena had taken a 26-25 lead on Kately Dooley's three-pointer with 7:28 left.

But Coleman and Toliver hit back-to-back jumpers, and Langhorne twice got putbacks along with a layup to help Maryland take a 39-26 lead with 2:32 left. The Terrapins took a 45-34 halftime lead and then turned the game into a rout by scoring 15 of the first 21 points in the second half.

CEDAR FALLS, Iowa (AP) - Maryland's suffocating defense helped coach Brenda Frese enjoy a sweet return home.

Kristi Toliver scored 15 points, Laura Harper had 13 and No. 1 Maryland closed the first half with a 20-0 run in a 77-33 romp of Northern Iowa on Wednesday night.

Crystal Langhorne added 12 points for the Terrapins (11-0), off to their best start since winning their first 16 games of the 1982-83 season.

Frese, who grew up in Cedar Rapids, about an hour south of the Northern Iowa campus, had a large contingent of family and friends wearing Maryland gear sitting behind the Terrapins' bench.

Before the game, Northern Iowa athletic director Rick Hartzell read a proclamation from Iowa Gov. Tom Vilsack recognizing Frese for her achievements and "her service to her sport and to Iowa." Northern Iowa coach Tony DiCecco presented the proclamation to Frese while the crowd stood and applauded.

"It's very special to be recognized and honored like that," said Frese. "I always feel very appreciated every time I come to Iowa."

Northern Iowa (2-5), playing a No. 1-ranked team for the first time, kept it somewhat close for a while. But the Panthers shot 20.6 percent and never threatened after Maryland charged to a 35-8 halftime lead.

The Terrapins forced the Panthers into 4-for-35 shooting in the first half and kept up the defensive pressure in the final 20 minutes.

"I'm really pleased with our defense," said Frese. Our focus has been to come out and guard for 40 minutes, especially with the way Northern Iowa shoots the ball."

They intimidated the Northern Iowa players inside, deflected passes and generally made life miserable for their overmatched Missouri Valley Conference opponent. When the Panthers had open shots on the perimeter, they couldn't knock them down.

"The toughest part about it is we didn't shoot the ball very well," DiCecco said. "To be honest about it, we didn't shoot the ball at all. When we couldn't make shots, it snowballed on us."

Despite its shooting woes, Northern Iowa hung with the Terrapins for the first 14 minutes. After Tara King and Kristyn Ferris scored on layups to draw UNI to 15-8, Frese called a timeout.

Her team responded by scoring the next 20 points and looking more like the defending national champions.

"We weren't getting a lot of transition baskets," Toliver said. "We just started pushing the ball more and kept playing defense."

Langhorne had eight points during the burst, including a pair of 3-point plays, and Toliver added seven. Toliver closed out the half with a 3-pointer, and the run grew to 22-0 when Harper scored inside to start the second half.

A 13-0 run stretched the lead to 52-13 and by then, it was only a question of whether the Panthers would reach 30. They did when Megan Keefe scored with 3:20 left, making it 73-30.

King led Northern Iowa with 10 points on 4-for-19 shooting.

"I loved the way we came out," DiCecco said. "I didn't think we were intimidated. I thought we played hard, I thought we competed. We just couldn't shoot it."

Frese substituted liberally to avoid running up the score, but her options were limited with just nine players. Harper played only 15 minutes and no one played more than 28.

"I definitely think our size gave them problems," Langhorne said. "Our coaches stressed that. I think we used that to our advantage."

**BALTIMORE (AP)** - Any worries that an 11-day layoff for final exams would slow Maryland's juggernaut were quickly laid to rest with another lopsided victory.

Marissa Coleman scored 21 points, Crystal Langhorne added 18 on 9-for-9 shooting and No. 1 Maryland remained unbeaten with a 110-55 rout of Loyola of Maryland on Thursday night.

"I thought we played 40 minutes of inspired ball. ... We were unselfish moving the basketball and we were really up-tempo," said Terrapins coach Brenda Frese.

Laura Harper had 11 points and 12 rebounds for Maryland (13-0). The Terrapins have won 19 straight over two seasons, the nation's longest current winning streak.

Maryland, which had six players in double figures and shot 66 percent from the field, has won seven straight and 13 of 16 against the Greyhounds (4-6). The Terrapins matched their season high in points, their most since amassing 111 against La Salle on Feb. 15, 1978.

"We tried to come out with intensity and put them out early," Langhorne said.

Jill Glessner scored 13 points and Meghan Wood added 11 for Loyola, which had won three of four. But the Greyhounds were

no match for the depth and strength of the defending national champions, who led by as many as 25 in the first half.

"When we were in zone, they made 3s. When we were in man, someone made layups. ... They really, really score at will," said Greyhounds coach Joe Logan, whose team committed 22 turnovers.

Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood, a junior transfer from Tennessee, had seven points and eight assists in her Maryland debut. She had to sit out the Terrapins' first dozen games because of NCAA transfer rules.

"I had butterflies pregame. I hardly ate anything, thinking about it. ... It's hard to come in and get a place on this team," Wiley-Gatewood said. "But I just felt comfortable out there."

The Terrapins were buoyed by a sellout crowd of 2,862, many of whom were red-clad Maryland supporters.

"We're [still] in the state of Maryland," Langhorne joked. "I guess a lot of people like us."

Langhorne had 14 points in the opening 20 minutes, helping Maryland to a 54-32 halftime lead. Two big runs -- an 11-0 burst early and a 10-0 spree midway through the first half -- did most of the damage. The Terrapins converted 21-of-32 first-half attempts from the field.

Maryland went ahead 13-2 with 17:29 left in the first half, with Coleman nailing a 3-pointer from the left corner to finish the first run. When a layup by Glessner cut the deficit to 24-15 with 11:14 to go, the Terrapins responded with the next 10 points.

The Terrapins opened the second half with a 26-5 barrage, more than enough to make up for what Langhorne thought was an uneven first half.

"We had to pick it up," she said. "We weren't playing our best defense and we had a lot of turnovers."

Wiley-Gatewood's short jumper with 6:48 remaining in the game made it 101-48.

**COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)** - Maryland showed few signs of being rusty despite playing for only the second time in 19 days.

The top-ranked Terrapins set a school record with 12 three-pointers and Kristi Toliver scored 16 points in a 92-57 rout of UNC Greensboro in the first round of the Terrapin Classic on Friday.

Maryland (14-0) extended its winning streak to 20 games, the longest in the nation. The Terps shot 57 percent from the floor, made 24 of 25 free throws and outscored the Spartans 45-19. Maryland's start is the best since it won 16 games in a row in 1982-83.

"Offensively, I like where we are. I thought we were extremely unselfish, almost to a fault," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "I'm pleased with our efficiency. The shots we're taking are good shots. ... I'm very pleased with where we are."

Toliver, who led six Maryland players in double figures, scored

14 points during a 35-5 first half run. She made all four of her 3-point attempts.

Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood added 15 points, Marissa Coleman had 13, Crystal Langhorne and Ashleigh Newman scored 11 apiece and Shay Doron had 10.

It was the fourth time this season that Maryland had six players score in double figures. The Terps also had 23 assists, registering one on each of their first 13 baskets. Toliver led in that area, too, with seven, and Coleman added five.

Maryland trailed 13-10 early in the game before going on the decisive run that led to a 48-25 halftime lead. In the second half, Greensboro closed to 64-48 with a 27-7 Maryland spurt.

"I thought our starts in both halves were really slow; we need to sustain our intensity for 40 minutes," Frese said. "We had a lot of time off for Christmas. We have played just two games between exams and the Christmas break. Plus, we're using a lot of different lineups, working with a lot of different combinations."

Jasmine Byrd led Greensboro (6-5) with 15 points. The Spartans had 16 turnovers and shot 35.9 percent from the floor.

The loss kept coach Lynne Agee stuck on 499 career victories at Greensboro. She is in her 26th season at Greensboro and ranks in the top 20 in career victories with 543 in 29 seasons.

It was the Spartans' first game against a No. 1 team. Earlier this season, they lost to No. 2 North Carolina, 103-48. They're now 0-19 all-time against top 25 opponents.

"The game for us today was about composure and ball control," Agee said. "It's hard to talk about winning this game and beating the No. 1 team in the country. We wanted to maintain our composure when they made their runs."

"We went about the game as best we could. With their height advantage and 3-point shooters you are between a rock and a hard place."

Rachele Fitz answered with a layup for Marist, but successive 3-pointers by Coleman and Wiley-Gatewood expanded the margin to 14. It was 32-18 before Langhorne made two free throws and Wiley-Gatewood scored from beyond the arc to make it 37-18.

Wiley-Gatewood has no complaint about coming off the bench; no matter what role she plays, she does it with enthusiasm.

"I try to bring more energy to the team, get everybody ready to play," she said.

"All of us couldn't wait for Sa'de to step on the floor. She brings a lot of energy and we feed off that," said Coleman, the tournament MVP.

The Terrapins led 48-25 at halftime after shooting 63 percent from the floor and outrebounding the Red Foxes 19-7.

It was 59-35 in the second half before Wiley-Gatewood made two free throws and Ashleigh Newman sank a 3-pointer to boost Maryland's lead to 29.

Maryland has won three tournaments this season: The BTI Classic, the Juncanoo Jam and the two-day Terrapin Classic, which the Terrapins began with a 92-57 rout of UNC-Greensboro on Friday.

Maryland opens Atlantic Coast Conference play Wednesday at home against North Carolina State, then hosts No. 21 Michigan State on Saturday.

"This should give us a ton of confidence going into the real stuff, starting on Wednesday with ACC play," Frese said. "We're ready for the next challenge."

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - If there were any questions about how good the defending NCAA women's basketball champions are this season, Maryland erased any doubts with a dazzling performance against No. 19 Michigan State.

Crystal Langhorne scored 28 points on 13-for-14 shooting. Kristi Toliver made four 3-pointers and the Terrapins snapped the Spartans' five-game winning streak with a 97-57 victory Saturday.

"Just a lot of fun today. We really talked about being able to make a statement," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "We got after it in so many dimensions of the game."

Playing in front of 12,295 fans and a national television audience, the Terrapins turned the Spartans inside out. After Toliver made three straight 3-pointers to put Maryland up 20-6, Langhorne dominated the post against 6-foot-9 freshman Allyssa DeHaan.

"Toliver was the key to the game," Michigan State coach Joanne McCallie said. "Her shots in the first half were very significant; that opened up the inside more."

Reserve Jade Perry had 12 points and 10 rebounds for the Terrapins, who had five players score in double figures. Langhorne, a 6-foot-2 center, grabbed nine rebounds and Toliver finished with 12 points on 4-for-4 shooting from beyond the arc.

"This was a big statement game," Toliver said. "We came out with a lot of energy, and made that statement by playing great on both ends of the floor. We wanted the country to know that we're a talented team and we're fun to watch."

Talented, yes. Fun to watch? Not for the Spartans.  
 "Not much to say. Maryland played great," McCallie said. "They played very well together and are obviously very well-coached."

Maryland has won 23 straight, and at 17-0 is off to the best start in school history.

Victoria Lucas-Perry led the Spartans with 20 points and DeHaan, the nation's leading shot blocker, swatted away five shots before fouling out.

Playing a ranked team for the first time this season, Maryland expected to be tested by a Michigan State squad that came in tied for the Big Ten lead. It turned out to be just another blowout for the Terrapins, who have won 14 games by at least 18 points.

With Langhorne going 8-for-9 and Toliver displaying uncanny accuracy from the outside, the Terrapins went up 46-25 at halftime. A layup by Langhorne with 15:20 left expanded the lead to 30 points, and the margin reached 40 with just under 8 minutes to go.

DeHaan blocked two shots on Maryland's first possession, serving notice that scoring inside might not be easy for the Terrapins. Undaunted, Langhorne got Maryland's first points on a driving layup and guard Shay Doron followed with a 10-footer over DeHaan's outstretched arms.



The Terps then provided Michigan State a sample of their quickness. Doron got free in transition before being fouled, and Langhorne added a breakaway layup for a 9-3 lead.

McCallie switched to a zone defense, which proved to be a mistake. Toliver hit three straight 3-pointers over a 61-second span to put Maryland up by 14. Lucas-Perry followed with a 3-pointer for the Spartans, but by then Michigan State was 3-for-13 from the floor with six turnovers.

Minutes later, Langhorne worked around DeHaan for two straight layups to put Maryland up 31-11. After Michigan State closed to 37-22, Toliver hit a 3-pointer and Marissa Coleman added a fastbreak layup to restore the 20-point cushion.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Even by Maryland standards, the latest blowout stood out.

Reserve Jade Perry had 19 points and 14 rebounds to help the top-ranked Terrapins achieve a season-high point total by beating the Miami Hurricanes 111-53 Wednesday night.

Fellow reserve Ashleigh Newman also scored 19 points, sinking six of seven 3-point tries for the Terrapins.

Defending national champion Maryland (18-0, 2-0 Atlantic Coast Conference) earned its 24th consecutive victory, extending a school record. The Terrapins face No. 3 Duke at Cameron Indoor Stadium on Saturday.

"We just really talked about wanting to come out with our first ACC road game and being able to make a statement," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "Our team's playing with the most confidence I've seen us play with."

Miami (9-9, 0-3) lost its fourth game in a row but only its second this season at home.

The Terrapins, who lead the nation in shooting, finished at 57 percent and topped 100 points for the fourth time this season. Perry went 8-for-10, repeatedly hurting Miami from the top of the key.

"The high-post shot was open," she said. "I was making them, so it was boosting up my confidence."

Marissa Coleman had 14 points, all in the first half, and added nine rebounds for the Terps, who had a 56-25 advantage on the boards.

Crystal Langhorne had 13 points and nine rebounds. Shay Doron scored 14 points, and Kristi Toliver added 12.

"We're just so unselfish, always making that extra pass," Frese said.

Maurita Reid led Miami with 24 points, and Albreys Grimsley added 13. Renee Taylor was held to eight, well below her average of 20.5 per game.

The Terrapins raced to leads of 19-4, 36-8 and 57-16.

"They're an awesome team," Hurricanes coach Katie Meier said. "But we would have lost to a lot of teams tonight, the way we played. Our energy level, effort and intensity were not there."

The Terps scored a season-high 59 points in the first half, and their 39-point lead at the half was also a season high. During one stretch midway through the game, they scored on 15 of 16 possessions to lead 66-22.

Maryland kept gunning until the end - Newman sank a pair of 3-pointers in the final 4 minutes. Her point total was a season high.

"I really like where we're at in terms of the offensive end and the ability to shoot the ball," Frese said. "And obviously, defensively we're really starting to get after it."

The Terrapins came into the game with an average victory margin of 32 points, and Newman sank three consecutive 3-pointers to put them ahead 19-4. A 16-point run late in the first half boosted the margin to 41 points.

Miami missed all 11 3-point tries in the first half, while Maryland went 7-for-12.

"I don't know if we were intimidated, or what it was," Reid said. "Definitely this was a learning experience."

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Lindsey Harding scored 16 of her 28 points in the first half, Alison Bales flirted with a triple-double and No. 3 Duke routed top-ranked Maryland 81-62 Saturday in a rematch of last season's national championship game.

Bales finished with 18 points, 12 rebounds and seven blocked shots for the Blue Devils (18-0, 4-0 Atlantic Coast Conference), who closed the first half with a 13-4 run, didn't let up in the second and made a strong case to take over the No. 1 ranking from the Terrapins.

Duke's smothering defense dominated a Maryland offense which entered with the nation's best field-goal percentage at 53.8 percent. The Terrapins were held to 37.8 percent by the Blue Devils - who have the country's stingiest defense - and were held 1-of-15 shooting during the final 5:49 of the first half.

"We knew Duke's defensive pressure was tremendous," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "In the first half when we weren't hitting shots, we didn't find other areas in the game to have an impact on."

Duke won its sixth game against a ranked team, and for the Blue Devils, this one clearly was the most satisfying. Maryland beat Duke 78-75 in an overtime thriller in the national title game last April, a classic that included Kristi Toliver's game-tying 3-pointer at the end of regulation.

This time, the Blue Devils wouldn't give Toliver another chance to break their hearts, holding her to eight points - and just two at halftime on 0-of-8 shooting - before she exited with 5:37 remaining after apparently injuring her ankle. She downplayed the injury, saying it wasn't serious and that she simply slipped on moisture.

"Our frustration came from us not knocking down shots," Toliver said. "That's something we need to improve on. We can't let our

offense dictate our defense, which is what we did tonight."

Crystal Langhorne had 14 points and Shay Doron added 11 for the Terrapins (18-1, 2-1).

Wanisha Smith added 15 points and Abby Waner had 11 for the Blue Devils, one of two remaining unbeaten in the country, and the other is Tobacco Road rival No. 2 North Carolina.

Duke's two stars - Harding and Bales - led the way during its game-breaking run late in the half.

Duke led 28-26 before Harding started the burst with a layup. Bales blocked three shots during the stretch and Harding closed the spurt with two free throws, making it 41-30 at the break.

**COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)** - Maryland has raised its expectations so high that coach Brenda Frese talks about team shortcomings - even after a 23-point victory for the defending national champions.

Marissa Coleman had 21 points and six rebounds to lead No. 3 Maryland to an 83-60 win over Wake Forest on Sunday. Ashleigh Newman came off the bench to score 20 points for the Terrapins (20-1, 4-1 Atlantic Coast Conference).

Kristi Toliver had 10 points, five assists and five rebounds and Shay Doron also scored 10 for the Terrapins. The Terrapins entered the game having defeated Virginia 95-68 Friday.

Still, Frese didn't like the way her team played defensively, especially in the second half when the Terrapins allowed the Demon Deacons to connect on six of 10 three-point attempts.

"Today, I liked where we were on the defensive side in the first half," Frese said. "That is an area we have been trying to improve. In the second half, we definitely had our lapses and lost some concentration. The biggest thing is just to keep our focus and intensity for 40 minutes."

Yolanda Lavender led Wake Forest (8-11, 0-6) with 22 points, and Alex Tchanguoe finished with 20. The Demon Deacons, who shot 18.1 percent from the field in the first half and 31.1 percent for the game, have lost nine straight after having won seven straight earlier in the season.

Trailing 41-16 at halftime, Wake Forest pulled within 55-37 following a pair of 3-pointers by Lavender. Maryland answered with a 14-5 run, including 10 straight from Newman.

Frese said Newman's performance meant even more since forward Crystal Langhorne had a rare off night. The junior finished with seven points, marking the first time in 44 games that she failed to score in double figures.

"I loved to see the kind of floor game that Ashleigh had today," Frese said. "She made smart decisions."

Tchanguoe answered Newman's spurt by scoring Wake Forest's next 12 points, pulling the Demon Deacons within 72-54 with 4:56 remaining. But the game didn't get any closer.

"I thought we played pretty well in the second half," Wake Forest coach Mike Petersen said. "We shot 18 percent in the first half, and 45 percent in the second half. We took about the same quality of shots, but we just made shots in the second half."

**CLEMSON, S.C. (AP)** - Maryland's Crystal Langhorne was so surprised by Kristi Toliver's perfect 3-point shooting, she had to double check for herself.

"You went 6-for-6?" Langhorne asked her teammate. Toliver finished with 20 points and the third-ranked Terps continued the best start in school history with a 76-62 victory over Clemson on Thursday night.

The Terps (21-1, 5-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) head into their Sunday night showdown against undefeated and second-ranked North Carolina filled with confidence.

"I just trusted my shot and looked for it," Toliver said. "But I knew I was feeling pretty good when I made the first back-to-back shots there."

Toliver became a cherished name in Maryland hoops history last April with her 3-pointer to force overtime in the NCAA tournament finals. The Terps went on to beat Duke for the championship and Toliver's play is simply called, "The Shot" in the land of the turtle.

Her shooting helped Maryland surpass the 20-1 start of its 1991-92 team - and win its sixth straight over the Lady Tigers (9-12, 1-5).

She was perfect on five 3-point attempts in the first half as the Terps built a 23-point lead.

Maryland was still comfortably ahead 68-46 with 6:42 to go when Clemson threw a little scare into the national champs with a 13-1 run that drew the Lady Tigers within 10.

That's when Toliver struck with her sixth 3 from several steps behind the line with 2:30 left to regain momentum for the Terps. It was her only field-goal attempt of the second half as she tied her career best for 3s, set last March 27 against Utah in Maryland's run to the NCAA tournament title.

"We told them they can all shoot, but (Toliver) was the most dangerous," Clemson coach Cristy McKinney said. "And everytime we did, she hit it."

Langhorne added 17 points and Marissa Coleman 15 for Maryland, which has won its past three since losing its No. 1 ranking after an 81-62 defeat at Duke.

Instead of ranting about Clemson's comeback, Maryland coach Brenda Frese was happy her club played tighter defense in the second half. The Terps held Clemson's top scorer, D'Leshia Lloyd, to six points, nine fewer than her average.

"We know we've got options on offense," Frese said. "We've got to get our defense up to our offense."

Moreemi Davis had 10 points to lead Clemson (9-12, 1-5), which has lost its past five games.

Maryland couldn't break free of the Lady Tigers, who trailed 28-22

after Christy Brown's two foul shots with 8:35 left. Toliver led a 20-4 run, during which the Terps went 8-for-9 from the field.

Toliver opened the surge with her third 3 of the half. She added another long-range shot two minutes later. By the time Toliver had swished her fifth 3-pointer with 3:49 remaining, Maryland led 47-24.

Toliver finished with 15 points while Langhorne had 10 as Maryland led 48-30 at the break.

Clemson could not contend with its stronger, deeper opponents, getting outbounded 26-14 in the first 20 minutes.

Frese says her players will need every bit of that effort to get past the Tar Heels.

"Obviously, (North) Carolina has had a week to prepare for this game," Frese said. "The ACC was kind enough to give them a week and we get two days. We've got to get back tomorrow and get to work."

North Carolina has not played since defeating North Carolina State, 86-65, this past Sunday.

Still, Langhorne likes where her team is right now, no matter how much practice time Maryland opponents get in.

"I think we're doing really well, but we have to get better in rebounding," she said. "Against North Carolina that's going to be crucial."

Toliver knows the Tar Heels hope to avenge their NCAA tournament semifinal loss to Maryland last spring. "Overall, it's going to be intense and hopefully we can take the things we're learning into that," she said.

Erlana Larkins had 20 points and 13 rebounds, and Camille Little scored 17 points for the Tar Heels, whose 23-game winning streak is longest in the nation. North Carolina and top-ranked Duke, which handed Maryland its other defeat this season, are the lone remaining unbeaten teams in the nation.

North Carolina lost only two games last season - both to Maryland. The first loss came in overtime during the regular season, and the second came in the semifinals of the Final Four.

"We just tried to play our game and stay focused," Latta said.

Shay Doron led Maryland (21-2, 5-2) with 19 points and Crystal Langhorne added 14 points and 10 rebounds. The Terps committed 21 turnovers and shot 39 percent.

"We felt like if we pressured them with different looks, we could force them into turnovers," North Carolina coach Sylvia Hatchell said. "I guess it worked."

The Terrapins waited too long to match the intensity of their enthusiastic fans. Maryland fell behind with five minutes elapsed and never caught up, crumbling under a series of turnovers and missed shots.

"For 30 of the 40 minutes, we were on the back of our heels, just making soft passes and not displaying the type of confidence we usually have on the offensive end," Frese said. "Anxiousness, nerves, you name it. We've got to find a way to get our swagger back."

Maryland trailed 65-59 before Doron hit a 3-pointer, Kristi Toliver scored in the lane and Doron added a short jumper to make it 67-66.

Larkins followed with a layup, however, and a jumper in the lane by Latta put North Carolina up 71-66 with 2:02 remaining. Little then hit a short jumper, and two foul shots by Latta gave the Tar Heels a nine-point cushion with one minute to go.

"We didn't play well, and a lot of that was dictated by Carolina's defense," Frese said. "It took a lot of courage to step up and play the way we did the last 10 minutes."

North Carolina limited the Terrapins to 22 percent shooting and forced 14 turnovers in taking a 35-27 halftime lead.

Playing in a charged atmosphere usually reserved for the postseason, both teams appeared jittery at the outset. Despite going 2-for-10 with five turnovers in the opening five minutes, Maryland trailed only 7-6 because the Tar Heels missed eight of their initial 11 field-goal tries.

With eight minutes elapsed, Langhorne was 2-for-3 from the floor and the rest of the Terrapins were 1-for-12.

At that point, North Carolina finally found its shooting touch. Little hit a jumper in the lane and added a layup before Larkins scored on a driving layup and nailed a 15-footer to cap an 8-0 run that made it 20-9.

After Frese called a timeout, Doron hit a jumper to end a scoring drought of more than five minutes. Soon after that, however, Heather Clayton and Latta each made a 3-pointer in an 8-2 spurt that put the Tar Heels up 29-15.

The Terrapins closed to 33-27 before the usually reserved Frese went onto the floor to complain after Toliver appeared to be fouled in the backcourt. Frese was called for a technical foul, and Latta made both free throws.

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - After two straight losses, No. 4 Maryland was looking for a big win to regain some of its swagger. Boston College wound up being just what the defending national champions needed.

Shay Doron scored 15 points to lead Maryland's 71-39 rout of the Eagles, and Marissa Coleman and Laura Harper added 11 points apiece as every player on the squad scored.

Maryland (22-3, 6-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) lost back-to-back games to North Carolina and Georgia Tech, and lost two weeks ago to Duke, to drop from atop the national rankings.

"None of us likes losing. It's not a feeling we liked having," said Coleman, who also had nine rebounds and five assists. "People say you learn a lot more from losing than winning and we certainly learned from those three losses."

Mickel Picco scored 13 points for Boston College (11-12, 1-8), which shot 14 percent from the floor in the second half, making 5 of 35 shots, and just 23.4 percent for the game. The point total and shooting percentage were the worst of the season for the Eagles.

Sarah Marshall added eight points, six in the game's first 6 minutes, for BC.

The 39 points allowed by Maryland are the fewest the Terps have given up in a conference game since Jan. 28, 1994, when they defeated Florida State, 83-39.

"I think we're slowly getting our swagger back," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "We did a great job getting our teammates open, being unselfish and looking to attack more. I thought we were more aggressive on our press. Those are all things you need to do well to play better and get that swagger back."

"I really liked the way we approached the game today. I think we improved and in the big picture, that's what we are striving for."

Harper said the team was a little rattled by its two losses, but not down.

"The losses gave us a sense of urgency," Harper said. "We already have a target on our back because we were the national champions, but losing gave us a sense of urgency. We needed to get out and start having fun again."

The Eagles trailed 36-23 at halftime, but made just two of their first 26 shots in the second half and went more than 8 minutes without scoring a field goal during a 31-9 Maryland run that made the score 67-32 with 8 minutes to play.

"We made a greater commitment to a quick start in the second half," Frese said. "We wanted to improve our focus and communication and I thought that happened."

The Terps trailed just once in the game, 10-9, after Kaydia Kentish's layup at 12:32 ended a 6-0 run for the Eagles.

Maryland countered with a 19-4 run to take a 28-14 lead with 4:54 left in the half. Doron scored eight straight points during the run.

"I've tried to be a leader to this team for a couple years now," Doron said. "I had some good looks and got some great passes and I took those opportunities. I wasn't being any more aggressive than I normally am."

Kathrin Ress broke the Eagles' drought with a basket and Picco added a 3-pointer to pull the Eagles back to within 28-19.

Maryland opened the second half with a 20-7 run and opened up a 56-30 lead with 10:01 to play. The Terps extended the run with an 11-2 stretch for its biggest lead of the game. Maryland held a 55-36 rebounding advantage. Jade Perry led the team with 10.

**COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP)** - Maryland is showing signs of recovering from a mini-slump that dropped the defending national champions into fourth place in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Kristi Toliver scored 19 points, Crystal Langhorne had 15, and the sixth-ranked Terrapins used an impressive defensive performance to coast past Virginia Tech 78-59 Thursday night.

"I thought we got better tonight. We made another step forward," said coach Brenda Frese, whose team has won two in a row after dropping successive games to North Carolina and Georgia Tech. "I really like where our defensive intensity and focus is."

The Terrapins (23-3, 7-3) scored 45 points in the first half and shot 60 percent before emptying the bench, but Frese was far more excited about a swarming defense that limited the Hokies (16-10, 5-5) to 26 points after halftime.

"I thought our defensive energy and intensity brought our offense," she said. "Every night we should be able to bring our defense, regardless of how shots are falling. I'm pleased with the progression we're making."

Frese has convinced the Terrapins that their chances of successfully defending their title depends heavily on their ability the defend.

"We made progression on the defensive end. We just have to try to continue to get better," guard Marissa Coleman said. "One of main focuses in practice is defensive energy and intensity. Each game we've been playing, we've been getting better at it."

Coleman scored 12 points and Laura Harper contributed eight points and eight rebounds for the Terrapins. Maryland made 60 percent of its field-goal attempts during the first 30 minutes and finished 32-for-61, led by Langhorne (7-for-8) and Toliver (7-for-10).

But the defense made the difference. "I thought we had a tough time getting in sync offensively, but that was a credit to Maryland," Hokies coach Beth Dunkberger said. "Maryland's defense was much improved. That had as much to do with it as anything."

Brittany Cook scored 12 points, and Britney Anderson and Kirby Copeland had 10 apiece for Virginia Tech. The Hokies, who came in with five wins in six games, fell to 0-5 against ranked teams this season.

After Toliver scored 15 first-half points to stake the Terrapins to a 12-point lead, Langhorne took over after halftime, scoring nine points in the paint during the opening 8 minutes to put Maryland up 60-40.

"Once (Toliver) hit some open shots, we stretched our defense too much," Dunkberger said.

Early on, Maryland struggled. The Terps led 13-10 before Copeland made two straight baskets to give the Hokies their first lead. After 9 minutes, Maryland had seven turnovers and trailed 20-15.

That's when the Terrapins began to show the form that enabled them to open the season with 18 successive wins.

A basket by Ashleigh Newman, a 3-pointer by Sa'de Wiley-Gatewood and two straight layups by Harper gave Maryland a 24-20 lead. Minutes later, Toliver scored eight points during a 10-0 run that stretched the margin to a dozen.

Then, after the Hokies closed to 40-33, Toliver ended the first-half scoring with a 3-pointer and a driving layup.

Maryland opened the second half with a 10-3 spurt to take a 55-36 lead. The Terrapins made five of six field-goal attempts during the run, including a 3-for-3 effort by Langhorne.

**CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP)** - In its drive for what it hopes will yield a second straight national championship, No. 6 Maryland got two things it needed on Sunday.

Crystal Langhorne had 19 points and 15 rebounds and Marissa Coleman added 18 points and 12 rebounds as No. 6 Maryland dominated most of the way, then let up early and allowed Virginia to make what could have been a blowout a respectable 83-74 loss.

With the victory came a lesson. "I thought we kind of got slow, lethargic," Terrapins coach Brenda Frese said of the second half, when Virginia outscored the defending national champions 47-36.

"We've obviously had a tendency to do that this season," she said. "It's something that we're trying to correct to be a dominant team. We need to focus for 40 minutes."

Langhorne also had four assists as Maryland (24-3, 8-3 Atlantic Coast Conference) finished with a 52-42 edge in rebounding. The Terps led 63-35 with 14:21 remaining.

"When you get a lead like that, I think sometimes you just relax and loosen up a little bit," Langhorne, who missed 7 of 10 free throws, said. "I think when we're up 30 points, we just need to focus on getting defensive stops and executing plays."

Coleman agreed and said Maryland hasn't played its best yet. "Definitely not. We need to play a complete 40-minute game," she said.

Virginia (14-11, 3-7) had its two-game winning streak snapped and lost at its new John Paul Jones Arena for the fifth time in 16 games this season. The Cavaliers saw their hopes of making a push for the NCAA tournament damaged by another lopsided loss.

Monica Wright led Virginia with 19 points and Sharnae Zoll had 14. Wright said a season that has been filled with adversity has also brought valuable experience.

"You don't learn about yourself or learn about your teammates or the people you love until you go through adversity and you go through hard times, and no matter what happens, we've gone through

a lot of hard times this year, and no one has ever folded, no one has ever tried to leave or pointed fingers at each other," she said.

"We've all taken the blame on ourselves and carried each other." Virginia had five players with at least two fouls by halftime as it tried without much success to defend the bigger Terrapins. No one struggled more than scoring leader Lyndra Littles, who finished 3-for-16 from the field with 14 points and 16 rebounds.

"I thought they did a good job playing her tendencies," Virginia coach Debbie Ryan said. "She was trying to force the puzzle piece the way she wanted it, and it wasn't quite the way it was supposed to be. ... She did a lot better in the second half."

For Ryan, the frustration finally boiled over and she was whistled for a technical, which she said was her first in 15 years and came after building up over time.

"I don't even know how to get a technical," she said. "I was just trying to stand up for my players. That's all I was trying to do. I didn't say anything disrespectful."

Kristi Toliver, a Harrisonburg Va., native who broke Ralph Sampson's career scoring records in high school, added 11 points for the defending national champions. They led 47-27 at halftime and never let the Cavaliers rally until it was too late.

Virginia shot 35 percent despite grabbing 20 offensive rebounds.

### #1/1 Duke 69, #6/6 Maryland 57 February 18, 2007 • Comcast Center

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Duke knows how to perform in front of a full house, even when most of the fans are rooting for the other team.

Lindsey Harding scored 20 of her career-high 29 points in the pivotal first half, and No. 1 Duke disappointed a spirited sellout crowd by defeating No. 6 Maryland 69-57 Sunday night to remain undefeated and clinch the Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season title.

The Blue Devils (28-0, 13-0) took control late in the first half and never trailed over the final 25 minutes in beating the defending national champions for the second time this season.

The crowd of 17,950 matched the largest single-game attendance in ACC history, set earlier this season when the Terrapins hosted North Carolina. The six largest crowds to see an ACC game have all been at Maryland, and the Terps have lost each one - including four against Duke.

"We love playing in big games. We love playing in great environments," Blue Devils coach Gail Goetseniors said. "I can't say enough about my team and the way they handle themselves in these type of situations."

Duke led by as many as 13 points in the second half. After Maryland (25-4, 9-4) got within seven, the Blue Devils kept the Terrapins scoreless for nearly 4 minutes.

Maryland then closed to 55-48 before Harding and Alison Bales made successive baskets for an 11-point cushion with 5:54 to go.

Harding went 9-for-10 from the floor in the first half and finished 12-for-20. Her previous career high was 28, set in the Blue Devils' 81-62 win over Maryland last month.

"I'll tell ya, if Lindsey Harding isn't player of the year, I'd like to know who is," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "She has stepped up big in every big game against any opponent they've played. She's on a mission. I just want to make sure the NCAA doesn't give her another year of eligibility because she is phenomenal."

Carrem Gay scored 14 points for the Blue Devils, and Bales had 12 points and 12 rebounds. But Harding was clearly the star.

"Once again Lindsey showed she's one of the best, if not the best, players in the country," Goetseniors said. "She does whatever it is that we need for her to do to be successful. Tonight in the first half we

needed her to score, and she did a great job."

In explaining her success against Maryland, Harding said, "I'm just attacking the basket. I know this year I have to step up more offensively. In some of the other games, the whole team has gotten involved, but I know in big games I really do want to set the tone."

Crystal Langhorne had 15 points and 12 rebounds for the Terrapins, and Marissa Coleman had 12 points, 10 rebounds and six assists. The 57 points were the fewest Maryland has scored this season; the previous low came in the first game against the Blue Devils.

The Terrapins shot 33 percent after halftime and finished 3-for-16 from 3-point range.

"We take great pride in our defense," Goetseniors said.

Up 35-29 at the break, the Blue Devils extended their lead to 46-34 with an 8-2 run that included five points from Bales and a three-point play by Harding. It was 50-37 when a three-point play by Langhorne started a 9-3 spree that got the Terrapins to 53-46.

All this happened without Gay, who picked up her fourth foul with 17:33 left.

Maryland seniors Shay Doron and Aurelie Noirez were honored before their final home game. Doron was in the starting lineup, as usual, and Frese marked the occasion by giving the seldom-used Noirez her first start of the season.

Noirez opened the scoring by sinking a soft jumper from just beyond the foul line for her only points of the game. Doron finished with four points.

Harding accounted for Duke's first 11 points on 5-for-5 shooting before teammate Wanisha Smith hit a 3-pointer for a 14-12 lead. Maryland quickly tied it before Harding sank a 3-pointer to put the Blue Devils back in front.

Harding missed her first shot with 6:26 left in the half, but Gay got the rebound and made a short jumper to spark a 10-2 spurt that put Duke up 31-23.

### #6/5 Maryland 76, Boston College 60 February 25, 2007 • Conte Forum

BOSTON (AP) - Crystal Langhorne helped Maryland get things rolling in the city where last year ended so memorably.

Langhorne scored 21 points and grabbed 10 rebounds and No. 5 Maryland rebounded from a loss to top-ranked Duke to clinch third place in the Atlantic Coast Conference by beating Boston College 76-60 on Sunday.

The Terrapins, playing in Boston for the first time since capturing their first NCAA title last April about five miles away at the Boston Garden, will get a first-round bye in the conference tourney, which begins Thursday in Greensboro, N.C.

"We talked a lot about it in the locker room before the game, the perspective of being here to finish the season where we finished the season last year," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "Obviously, we love Boston."

Kristi Toliver and Marissa Coleman each scored 12 points, and Shay Doron had 11 for Maryland (26-4, 10-4 ACC). The Terrapins will open their ACC tourney play on Friday.

For one weekend, they were able to briefly reflect on their NCAA title run last year before playing the Eagles.

"As a team we talked about in before the game," Langhorne said. "We were excited about coming back here. We knew a lot of good things happened in Boston."

Kathrin Ress led BC (13-15, 3-11) with 26 points, but the Eagles couldn't stop Langhorne down the stretch.

Maryland, which led 34-27 at halftime, relied on its inside strength to gradually wear down the smaller Eagles midway into the second half.

BC had some success in the first half, double-teaming inside, but Langhorne scored 13 of her points in the final 12:12.

"A kid like that is tough to stop," Eagles coach Cathy Inglesse said. "Why weren't we double-teaming her in the second half? I don't know. We kept mentioning it [to our players]. That was the key part in the second half. She went to town and had a good game."

The Terrapins lost to top-ranked Duke, which it beat in last year's NCAA title game, 69-57 last Sunday.

"That Duke loss made us more excited to get back on the floor," Toliver said.

Behind Ress, BC kept its deficit in single digits until Jade Perry, Toliver and Coleman had baskets during a 6-0 spree that helped Maryland open its first double-digit lead of the game, 48-36, with 12:56 to play.

"Being in close games and having success, they have that feeling they can get stops or make shots when they need to," BC point guard Sarah Marshall said.

BC closed it to five points twice, the last 56-51 on Ress' free throw with 5:03 left, but Langhorne converted a 3-point play and Doron hit a 3-pointer to open it to 62-51 with 3:44 to play. The Eagles never moved closer than 11 points the rest of the way.

In the opening half, the Eagles led 20-19 before the Terps scored 15 of the half's final 22 points, taking a seven-point lead into the break on Toliver's 3-pointer over two defenders at the buzzer.

Maryland came out with a hot hand from the outside early, hitting its first five jumpers to open a 10-5 edge before BC got on track offensively, mostly behind Ress' play.

BC's Ayla Brown, an American Idol final 13 contestant last year, sang the National Anthem.

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Jackets in Atlanta and drew a spot opposite fourth-ranked and second-seeded North Carolina in Saturday's 4:30 p.m. semifinal. The Tar Heels were responsible for one of the Terps' other regular-season losses, an 81-74 decision at College Park on Jan. 28.

"We have players in our locker room with a lot of character and a lot of heart, and they're tremendous competitors," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "We definitely took that game at Georgia Tech to heart, and we didn't want to feel that way again."

Langhorne echoed her coach's sentiment. "I know I've never been so angry in college as I was when we lost that game at Georgia Tech," Langhorne said. "We were so excited when we found out we were going to be able to play them (in the ACC Tournament), and we knew we were going to come out with a lot of energy."

Can the defending national champion Terps respond with that same kind of energy against UNC on Saturday? Guard Marissa Coleman plans on it, and she was quick to note that top-ranked Duke -- which handed Maryland its other two losses -- also lurks in the tournament field.

"Coming into the tournament, our coaching staff stressed that if we keep playing 40 minutes, we're going to be able to get revenge on all three teams that handed us losses this year," Coleman said. "We beat Georgia Tech, and now we're very anxious to play Carolina."

Coleman scored 16 points and pulled down 11 rebounds as Maryland posted a huge 46-21 advantage on the boards. That was a point of emphasis to the Terps, who felt they were physically outplayed in the game at Atlanta.

Georgia Tech (20-10) found it difficult to match up after forward Janie Mitchell picked up three early fouls. The Terps looked primarily inside to build a 40-26 halftime advantage.

"Obviously, Maryland is a phenomenal team," Yellow Jackets coach MaChelle Joseph said. "We couldn't counter their inside game in the first half. It was a very physical game, and we like a physical game. But I don't know that we responded the way we would have liked to."

Kristi Toliver added 12 points for the Terps, who shot 59 percent from the floor and led by 24 points with just over four minutes to play.

Stephanie Higgs' 16 points led the Yellow Jackets. Mitchell finished with 14, and Chioma Nnamaka added 12 before being forced to the sidelines in the second half by what Joseph said was apparent dehydration.

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) - Fourth-ranked North Carolina broke open a tied game with two minutes left and beat fifth-ranked Maryland 78-72 Saturday in the semifinals of the ACC Women's Basketball Tournament in the Greensboro Coliseum.

The win sends the Tar Heels, the defending ACC champions, to the championship game set Sunday at 1 p.m. against N.C. State.

"We didn't get rattled, and we made some big shots when we needed to," said North Carolina coach Sylvia Hatchell, whose team is now 29-3.

Maryland, which never led, tied the game at 67-all on Kristi Toliver's jumper from the top of the key with 2:01 left on the clock.

But North Carolina dominated the rest of the way. It started with point guard Ivory Latta finding LaToya Pringle open under the basket to take the lead for good with 1:34 remaining.

"Coach called the play, I saw LaToya in there and I threw it to her," Latta said.

Latta was then on the receiving end of an assist from teammate Alex Miller, who grabbed a crucial rebound with 1:05 left and Latta scored on an all-alone fast break.

Pringle then partially blocked a shot by Shay Doron with 35 seconds left, and UNC salted away the win with four free throws by Latta, two by Miller and one by Little.

Latta led the winners with 19 points, followed by Jessica Breland with 14, Erlana Larkins with 12, and Pringle and Camille Little with 11 each.

North Carolina center Erlana Larkins chalked up a double-double with 10 rebounds to go with her dozen points.

Maryland, now 27-5, put three different post players on Larkins throughout the game.

"Sometimes it's Laura Harper, sometimes it's Langhorne, and sometimes it's Perry," Larkins said. "I'm a big woman, but three women coming at you the entire 40 minutes, it kind of wears you down."

Hatchell had high praise for Larkins, noting, "I've called her many times my warrior, and she is. When we need her, she's there."

Maryland coach Brenda Frese said, "It was just a tremendous game for both teams. We didn't want to go home, but I'm proud of our effort. A Final Four game--that's what it felt like."

Maryland, the defending NCAA champion, trailed 37-30 at the half and by 10 points in the second half before mounting a furious rally to tie the game.

"Jessica Breland was their X-factor today," Frese said. "It speaks volumes for their depth."

Breland went 5-for-6 from the field and hit 3-of-4 free throws in just 16 minutes of play.

"Jessica was a McDonald's High School All-America," Hatchell said. "Today was not a fluke. She's going to play like she did today and probably better."

Doron said it was tough finishing her career without an ACC championship, but added if the Terps had to lose Saturday to win another national championship, she would take it.

"I'm looking at the big picture," Doron said. Marissa Coleman led Maryland with 18 points and eight rebounds, followed by Crystal Langhorne with 16 points, Doron with 13 and Toliver with 12.

Coleman said, "Toward the end of the game, we let them get some crucial rebounds."

Hatchell said down the stretch, her Tar Heels showed mental toughness--and played as a team.

"We had 20 assists out of 28 field goals made," Hatchell said, pointing out that's good team basketball.

Hatchell said another key to the victory was having Little guard Toliver.

"I was proud down the stretch when Maryland made their comeback, and we did a couple of things that really made a difference and were able to pull the game out. Maryland is so good at so many areas of the game. You take one thing away, they make up for it with something else. Those kids can shoot the lights out, especially Toliver and Shay and Coleman. They got hot at the end."
