

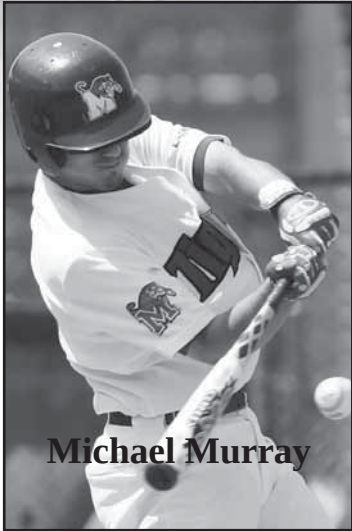

# 2007 Year-In-Review

## Lucky 13:

## Tigers Earn First NCAA Bid Since 1994 Season, Finish 36-27

*Led by a solid group of seniors, Head Coach Daron Schoenrock and the Tigers returned to NCAA Regional action after a 12-year absence.*

When Head Coach Daron Schoenrock was hired as Memphis' Head Coach, he had one goal—one grand dream that at the time seemed a lifetime away for the Tigers.

"The previous year (2006), our goal was to change the record and last year our goal was to take the next step and get into an NCAA Regional."

To-date, Schoenrock's three seasons at Memphis have been nothing short of a success story. After suffering the program's worst season ever with a 13-42 mark in 2005, the Tiger skipper led the Tigers to a 32-28 in his second year, representing the nation's second-best win turnaround. It also tied for the best improvement from one season to another in Memphis baseball history. The Tigers continued Schoenrock's dream and realized his goal in 2007, as for the first time

since the 1994 season, Memphis earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Regional tournament. The U of M's run culminated in a 36-28 finish and opened the eyes of college baseball fans and media that the Memphis baseball program is changing.

With an experienced group of eight senior starters returning, and a heralded offensive attack, talk of a possible NCAA appearance began even before a bat was swung or a pitch was thrown.

"When you have so many seniors, keeping them focused in the fall is tough, so I used the word 'Regional' a lot in the fall and tried to prepare like Regional teams do," Schoenrock said. "It was a way of motivating our team in the fall. And that became their focus—What do we have to do to become a Regional team."

The 2007 season got under with a matchup versus rival Ole Miss. With the Rebels ranked 11<sup>th</sup> in the country and the Tigers coming into the year with such expectations, this proved to be a preview of what was to come for Memphis in the months to come. Memphis scored three runs in the first inning, but No. 11 Ole Miss responded by scoring 11 runs in its first two trips to the plate, and then held on to outlast the Tigers 12-9. The loss was Memphis' first season-opening setback since 2000, and the first since Head Coach Daron Schoenrock took the post at Memphis. Despite the loss, the Tigers' performance encouraged the coaching staff and showed signs that led fans to believe that they would achieve something special in '07.

"That game showed me that that team had some fight in it and that we could score runs against good pitching," said Schoenrock. "I felt like we had an offensive attack that would be solid and once we got going and got on track this team would be ok down the stretch."

Schoenrock's bunch bounced back quickly from its season-opening loss, reeling off seven straight wins to improve to 7-1. In that stretch, a much-improved pitching staff took the limelight as four pitchers recorded wins and the staff as a whole held the opposition to a combined 15 runs. Opposing teams were held to four runs or less in all seven games. While the contributions of the pitching staff held opponents at bay the offense was coming through in the late innings. The Tigers won four of the seven straight victories in their final at-bat.

Senior Ben Grisham lifted a sacrifice fly to rightfield to bring home freshman Tyler Huelsing and give Memphis a 3-2, 10-inning win over BYU in the opening game of the 2007 Service Academies Spring Classic in Millington, Tenn. Meanwhile, closer Matt Yokley twice worked out of late-inning jams and fanned five in 4.1 innings of shutout work to pick up the win.

After notching its first back-to-back wins of the year with a 4-2 triumph over Akron, the Tigers were faced with a tough task in 2006 Super Regional participant Missouri. Mizou's ace held Memphis scoreless through seven innings, before the U of M offense exploded for five runs in its final trip to the plate to wrap up an undefeated weekend and claim the program's first Service Academies Spring Classic title since 1996. Senior shortstop Michael Murray drove in the title-winning run and took home the Classic's MVP honors. In his first collegiate outing on the mound, two-sport standout, Will Hudgens fanned two of the four batters he faced in 1.1 innings of work to lock up the win for the Tigers.

Next up for the Tigers were the UT-Martin Skyhawks. Despite its winning tradition versus UT-Martin, it took more pitching dominance and late-game heroics to extend the win streak four games.

Pitchers Brach Davis, Neil Schenk, Chris South and Matt Yokley combined to serve up Memphis' first

one-hitter since 1994 en route to a 2-1 win over the Skyhawks in the Tigers' home-opener. Jason McComan was the last Tiger hurler to post a one-hitter when he held Iowa to one hit in an 8-3 win 13 years ago. Davis no-hit the Skyhawks through three innings, before giving way to reliever Schenk, who kept the no-hit bid going through 4.1 innings in Memphis' 12th-straight against UT-Martin. Yokley picked up the win to improve to 2-0 on the year. Grisham came up with the late-game heroics in the final frame, lining a single up the middle to score Michael Murray from second to win the game.

Memphis pitching again proved to be the deciding performance as the Tigers edged Northern Iowa, 3-2, in the AutoZone Classic. Philip Utley, Chris South and Dusty Davis combined to hold UNI to just three hits in Memphis' fourth-straight win. The late-game successes continued for Memphis, as Kyle Norrid scored the game-winning tally in the ninth.

The Tigers made it seven-straight with a 5-4 win over Eastern Illinois to captured the first-ever AutoZone Classic. Bill Moss earned MVP honors for Memphis, who at 7-1 were off to the program's best start since 1994.

That win streak came to an abrupt halt in the Tigers' first true road series at Samford. Solid pitching held the Bulldogs to just three runs on eight hits in the two-game series, but the Memphis offense went cold, scoring just one run on seven hits in 18 innings, resulting in a pair of losses. The 1-0 loss in the series finale was the first time the Memphis offense had been shutout in 81 games dating back to the 2005 season.

But just as displayed after the loss to Ole Miss, the 2007 club was a resilient bunch and regrouped for the biggest weekend series of the early season—a three-game set at No. 6 Clemson. Memphis stunned Clemson and led 4-3 heading into the bottom of the ninth. Clemson forced extra frames with a run in the ninth. But the night would belong to the Tigers from Memphis as senior Josh Irvin (one of the best clutch hitters in Memphis baseball history) broke a 4-4 tie with a two-run single to leftfield, and Will Hudgens retired the side in the 10th to give Memphis a 6-4 victory, clinching the program's first win over a Top-10 opponent since an 8-7 triumph over Mississippi State in 2003. It also marked the first Top-10 win under third-year coach Daron Schoenrock. Clemson would take the next two games to win the series, but that Friday night win would figure to be a significant one on the Tigers' NCAA resume.

"Anytime you can win a close game, no matter who it's against, it's very important," Schoenrock said. "But when you do it on the road against a top-10 team, it shows that if the game is executed as we preach to these guys on a daily basis, we could play with anybody. We learned a lot about the depth in our bullpen that day. A lot of things we did in that game carried us throughout the year."

Memphis returned home to win six of the next seven games, including a five-game win streak. Tiger fans saw a 22-year program record fall against Illinois State on March 14, 2007. Junior K.K. Chalmers stole second base in the fifth inning, making him Memphis' all-time stolen base record holder. In that same game, Moss clubbed a pair of homers and tied a program record with nine RBI. However, 13 runs were not enough as the Cardinals hitters baffled Memphis pitchers all night, pounding out 19 hits and scoring runs in each of the final seven innings en route to handing Memphis its first home loss of the year, 15-13.

The Tigers offense then began to return to 2006 form as Memphis claimed victory in each of the next five games, including scoring 17 runs on 17 hits in a 17-3 thumping of Middle Tennessee.

Memphis was then set to enter a tough and challenging Conference USA schedule. Its first test would be on the road versus a 22nd-ranked East Carolina team that had won its previous 10 games. An eight-run outburst by the Tigers midway through gave them a 10-4 cushion and it looked as if they would snap ECU's streak and extend their own to six games. However, the Tigers were unable to hold off a furious Pirates rally. ECU crossed five runs in the bottom of eighth to hand Memphis a 12-10 defeat in the league opener. ECU went on to sweep the series.

The road only got tougher as Memphis headed into Starkville for a two-game midweek series against Schoenrock's mentor Ron Polk and the Mississippi State Bulldogs. MSU got ninth-inning heroics to defeat Memphis in the series opener, and then held off a late Tiger charge in the finale to increase the Memphis losing skid to a season-long five games.

At 14-11 and on a five-game slide, talks of Regional play dissipated as doubts began to creep in.

But again the Tigers put those doubts to rest and showed their resolve as that 14-11 mark would be as close to .500 as the team would get through the remainder of the season. Memphis impressively went 11-3 over the next 14 games to improve to 25-14.

In that stretch, the Tigers swept No. 29 Southern Miss, took two-of-three from No. 21 Tulane and swept UAB in the next three C-USA series.

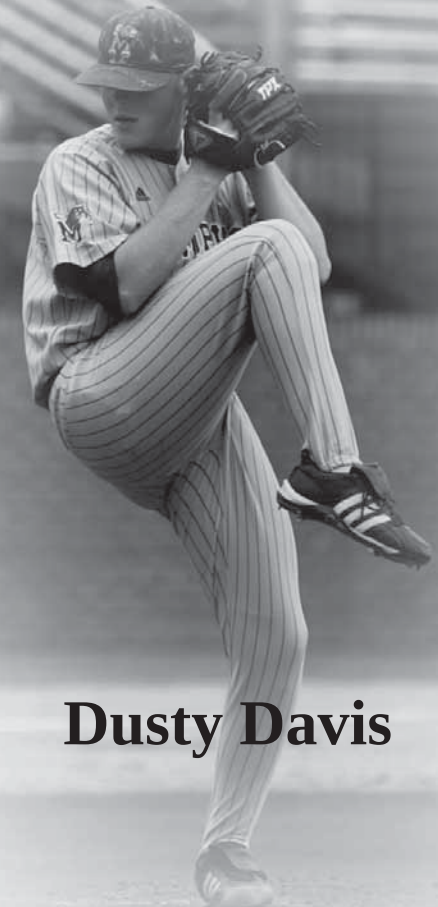
With several injuries in the Tiger pitching staff, Schoenrock was forced to move senior Grisham from the No. 2 spot in the weekend rotation into the No. 1 role. That move sent normal No. 1 starter Scott McGregor to the Saturday slot. That move turned out to be one of the best moves of the year as Memphis won three-straight Friday and Saturday contests. In his first career Friday night start Grisham tossed eight shutout innings and fanned six on his way to hauling in C-USA Pitcher of the Week and College Baseball Foundation Player of the Week honors.

The next weekend, it was Michael Murray's time to shine as he was nearly perfect in leading Memphis to its second straight C-USA series win and first league win over Tulane in 11 years. In the three games in New Orleans, Murray hit .818, with five runs scored, a pair of doubles and an RBI. The senior went 7-for-7 in his first seven at-bats in the two Tigers wins. Murray posted multiple hits in each contest and extended his hit streak to 17 games—the longest hit streak at Memphis since Kevin House ended the 2003 season with an identical 17-game hit streak.

"That stretch was the defining point in our season," stated Schoenrock. "The way this group of veterans came back after five difficult losses to rattle off five very important wins against opponents that have been perennial top-25 programs for several years. It showed that we could show up and separate the days and not let one day spill over into the next."

After the sweep of UAB, Murray struck again—this time with late-game heroics to give Memphis a five-game win streak via a 4-3 win over Austin Peay. Murray shot a single through the right side to score Kyle Norrid for the go-ahead run and Matt Yokley (4-2) sat Austin Peay down in order in the ninth to seal a 4-3 win for Memphis, snapping a five-game losing streak to the Governors. Memphis pounded out 18 hits the next night to sweep the Gobs 13-7.

The Tigers improved to 27-16 with one of the most impressive games in program history. A day after claiming the opening game of a two-game midweek series at Southeast Missouri, Memphis clinched the series sweep with a dominating 19-3 win. The 19 runs scored was a season-high, but what was more

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impressive was the offensive production the Tigers put forth in the fifth inning of the win.

The University of Memphis record books were rewritten as the Tigers exploded for a school-record 12 runs in the frame. Adam Amar went 3-for-4 on the day to claim Memphis' all-time hits mark, surpassing former Tiger standout Steve Moss' 240 career hits.

The Tiger offense reset a total of four single-inning marks with the 12-run outburst. Among those new records are the 15 plate appearances, 14 at-bats and the 18 total bases. The former mark for runs scored in a single frame was 11, set by the 1978 Tigers in a 39-run route of Delta State.

"That showed the capability and strength we had offensively last year," Schoenrock said. "It was one of those days when everyone was seeing the ball and everything was clicking. The contagious part about hitting is that guys started feeding off of one another and it all happened in one inning. That was a fun day to be a Tiger. We didn't set out that day to set all kinds of records. It was just something that happened"

On the heels of the record-setting performance, a date with No. 13 Ole Miss awaited the Tigers. The Rebels scored runs in five consecutive innings to down Memphis 10-2.

The Tigers again bounced back—this time by winning the weekend series versus UCF and then sweeping a midweek series from Arkansas State. The sweep of the Indians proved to be one of the determining factors in Memphis bid for 35 wins.

In a night in which Amar became the program's RBI record holder, the Tigers again benefited from late inning fortunes. With the Tigers trailing by a run in the bottom of the ninth and down to its last strike, freshman Tyler Huelsing lifted a game-tying RBI-single to center and then scored from first on an error by the Arkansas State outfield to push Memphis past ASU 8-7.

The Tigers won just twice in the final seven games of the regular season. However with the team on the bubble, the schedule turned out to help Memphis rather than hurt them, despite being swept in the final series of the regular season.

A 12-12 league mark landed Memphis the No. 5 seed in the Conference USA Championships.

Senior Adam Amar led a 19-hit, four home run offensive attack, with a pair of round-trippers, and red-shirt freshman Brennon Martin scattered nine hits en route to his first career complete game, as the Tigers opened the 2007 C-USA Championship with a 12-4 triumph over Houston.

Next was a quarterfinal battle with Rice. In the fourth meeting in a week between the two teams, it was Memphis who dealt the first blow, striking for five runs in the first inning. Unfortunately, one big-inning does not a victory make as the Tigers were unable to muster anymore offense, while Rice scored five unanswered runs to pick up a 7-5 decision and send Memphis into the loser's bracket.

With its back against the wall and the NCAA Regional hopes still in sight, the Tigers took on UCF to earn the right for a fifth game against Rice. This time the Tigers did not squander an early lead. Memphis jumped got out of the gates with five runs in the opening frame and were able to expand the lead. Behind a complete-game from pitcher Ben Grisham, the Tigers earned their 35th win of the year and advanced to the Conference USA Championship semifinal round for the second consecutive season with a 12-6 triumph over UCF.

Memphis had lost to Rice by no less than three runs in four straight games and knew a victory could help its NCAA case, Schoenrock's confident crew went to battle and managed just four hits in the game, but fortunately for the Tigers those two base knocks were back-to-back home runs on consecutive pitches by Bill Moss and Adam Amar in the fourth inning. Behind a gutsy performance on the mound by Will Hudgens, closer Matt Yokley worked out of a jam in the eighth and retired the side in the ninth to earn his single-season record ninth save of the year to lead Memphis to a 2-1 win over top-seed and No. 2 nationally ranked Owls. Hudgens cruised through five innings and kept Rice from producing the clutch hit. Hudgens avoided danger and held the Owls to just three hits and struck out a pair before handing the ball to Dusty Davis, who also held Rice scoreless.

"When the regular season ended and we entered the Conference USA tournament, we had some guys thingking 'What do we have to do to get into a Regional?'," said Schoenrock.

"We had two capable pitching staffs going head-to-head. It was one of those epic battles

where every pitch was magnified. We made every play that day and two middle-of-the-order hitters got two pitches up in the zone and hit them out of the ballpark and that was the difference in the game. When you play defense and pound the strike zone like Will (Hudgens), Dusty (Davis) and Matt (Yokley) did, your offense doesn't have to do a whole lot and that was one of those days that those things fell into place."

Rice regrouped to eliminate Memphis 20-9 in the second semifinal game, but the Tigers had given themselves an opportunity to be considered in the NCAA selection process.

Memphis returned home and held a "Watch Party" just in case fortunes shined its way. It did not take long as early into the NCAA Selection Show it was announced that the Tigers would take on Michigan as the No. 3 seed in the Nashville Regional.

The dream had become reality! The 12-year wait was over!

"It was a culmination of alot of sweat, alot of tears, alot of work. I told our guys not to take that for granted. A lot of schools get to experience that every year, but we haven't had that luxury at Memphis."

In its first NCAA Regional contest since 1994, Memphis jumped on the board first as Amar quickly jumped on a Zach Putnam fastball, sending it over the 35-foot leftfield wall and onto the roof of Memorial Gymnasium. The Tigers went up 2-0 in the third when Michael Murray drove Tyler Huelsing in with a single through the left side.

That's when Tiger starter Scott McGregor (5-4) ran into trouble. The Wolverine offense touched the right-hander for three runs in the inning and never trailed from that point on, sending the Tigers into the elimination round of the 2007 NCAA Nashville Regional with a 10-7 loss.

Fortunes were not on the Tigers side the next day as the fell victim to a hot-hitting Austin Peay club in the elimination game. The Governors, who the Tigers had swept earlier in the season, opened the contest with a six-run first inning, and then plated six more runs in the fifth en route to eliminating Memphis from the NCAA Championships Nashville Regional with an 18-7 decision. Amar homered for the third time en route to taking home Nashville Regional All-Tournament honors and Michael Murray finished his Tiger career with a 22-game hit streak—just one game shy of the program record of 23 straight games produced by Mark Little in 1994. The Tigers, who posted an improved record for the second straight season finished the year 36-27—the most wins by a Memphis club since 1994.
