

Memphis On The Road

When it comes to hitting the road two words come to mind in describing how the Tigers travel ... First Class.

Being located in a hub city for Northwest Airlines is an enormous advantage for The University of Memphis when it comes to team travel. And the coordination of travel has another distinctive edge as the U of M plays in Conference USA, a league top heavy with universities located in major metropolitan areas.

When the U of M travels commercially, the Tigers are usually just one flight away from landing in the city they will play the following day. It has meant the team has been able to go to class the day before a game and, in many cases, practice at home before traveling.

The Tigers also use charter flights and often fly with another hometown team, Northwest AirlinK. Headquartered in Memphis, AirlinK has over 2,300 employees.

The Tigers have been able to speed to their games on Northwest AirlinK's new fleet of Canadair Regional Jets (pictured below). This 50-seat aircraft is capable of flying nearly 2000 miles (roughly Memphis to Seattle) at speeds exceeding 500 mph. The CRJ's interior features comfortable leather seating, overhead bin storage and other amenities normally found on much larger jet aircraft. The CRJ is also among the world's most quiet jets, providing those on the ground and on-board with unmatched comfort.

While on the road the Tigers stay in accommodations of the highest standard and in many cases, give the squad an opportunity to explore new locales.

Each of the past three seasons the Tigers have been able to explore New York's Times Square during appearances in the NIT and the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic. The U of M returns to New York and Madison Square Garden this year, playing Wake Forest in the CVC Classic.

During the past five years, Memphis has also played in tournaments in Maui, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. And along the way, the Tigers have stayed in hotel properties along Chicago's Magnificent Mile and just a short walk from New Orleans' French Quarter.

Memphis also ventures to Chicago, Cincinnati, New Orleans and the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex during the season. The Tigers also have road games scheduled at the University of Illinois and Villanova University in Philadelphia.



During this year's Coaches vs. Cancer Classic, the Tigers will stay at the Hilton New York at Rockefeller Center, just a block from Fifth Avenue shopping.



Memphis and John Calipari

In 11 collegiate coaching seasons, University of Memphis fourth-year coach John Calipari has led his teams to 10 postseason appearances. Calipari's teams have appeared in the NCAA Tournament six times, advancing to the Final Four in 1996. Four other squads have appeared in the NIT, including Memphis's 2002 NIT championship squad. Through 11 collegiate seasons, only four coaches in the history of the NCAA have won more games.

However, Calipari's success on the basketball court has been a microcosm to what he has meant to the U of M and the Memphis community.

Early in his tenure at the U of M, Calipari began developing a relationship with Memphis-based FedEx. The overnight courier has employed Memphis student-athletes in its internship program during the past four summers. It is a program where the Tigers gain valuable experience in an area related to their field of study.

Calipari has also founded a program called NetWorks. The program brings together business leaders from throughout the community to network, find employment opportunities and place former U of M players following their playing careers.

Calipari has made several financial contributions to the University and has been honored by the Friends of the Ned McWherter Library on the U of M campus. He presented the U of M a check for \$40,000 which resulted from a partnership between Calipari and Pace Cooper, president and CEO of Cooper Companies, the owner of the restaurant, Cal's Championship Steakhouse in the Hilton East Memphis.

At the conclusion of his first season at Memphis, Calipari joined several area business leaders to form the Y.E.S. Foundation, an organization designed to educate middle school students about the importance of academics and athletics. Y.E.S., an acronym for Youth Education Through Sports, held its first camp on the U of M campus in August of 2001. Over 25 schools are currently taking part in the program.

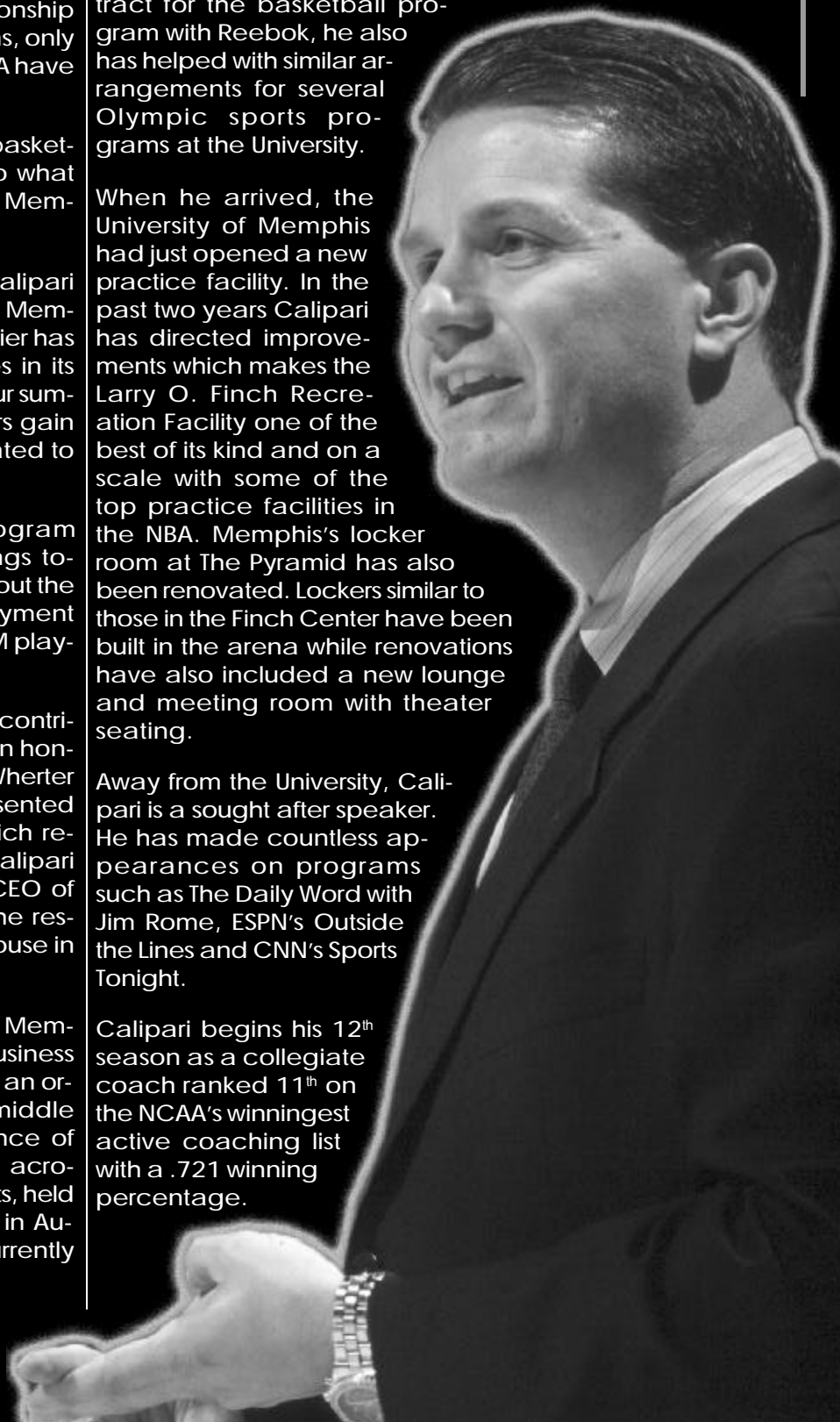
Calipari has also been responsible for raising money and making donations for improvements at the U of M's tennis complex, air conditioning in the Elma Roane Fieldhouse and having courts resurfaced for use by Memphis students for outdoor basketball.

Not only did Calipari secure a shoe and apparel contract for the basketball program with Reebok, he also has helped with similar arrangements for several Olympic sports programs at the University.

When he arrived, the University of Memphis had just opened a new practice facility. In the past two years Calipari has directed improvements which makes the Larry O. Finch Recreation Facility one of the best of its kind and on a scale with some of the top practice facilities in the NBA. Memphis's locker room at The Pyramid has also been renovated. Lockers similar to those in the Finch Center have been built in the arena while renovations have also included a new lounge and meeting room with theater seating.

Away from the University, Calipari is a sought after speaker. He has made countless appearances on programs such as The Daily Word with Jim Rome, ESPN's Outside the Lines and CNN's Sports Tonight.

Calipari begins his 12th season as a collegiate coach ranked 11th on the NCAA's winningest active coaching list with a .721 winning percentage.

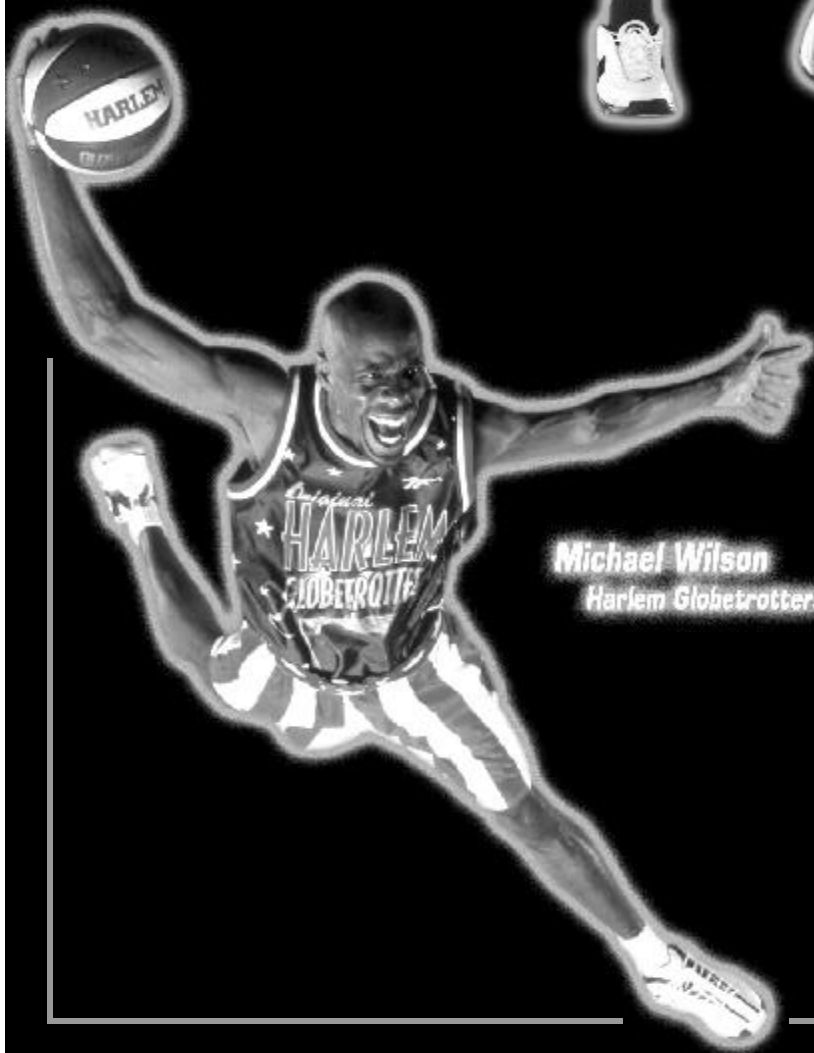

Memphis & The NBA

The University of Memphis has a long-standing tradition of sending its players on to the National Basketball Association and professional leagues throughout the world. Two Tigers have also recently gone on to play for the most famous basketball team in the world, the Harlem Globetrotters.

Memphis has had 41 players selected in the NBA draft. Currently four Tigers are playing in the NBA. One of the players in the league plays right here in Memphis for the Grizzlies. The Tigers are also represented on the rosters of the Cleveland Cavaliers and Phoenix Suns.

The Tigers have had five lottery picks — Keith Lee (Chicago, 1985), William Bedford (Phoenix, 1986), Anfernee Hardaway (Golden State, 1993), Lorenzen Wright (LA Clippers, 1996) and Dajuan Wagner (Cleveland, 2002).

The lounge area of the locker room includes a pool table as well as big screen television and stereo system. Adjacent to the lounge is the dressing room complete with individual wood locker cabinets. One side of the dressing room includes wood lockers containing jerseys and mementos of Memphis players playing in the NBA. Where once was a blank east wall now framed is a banner dedicated to the desire and dedication it takes to be a University of Memphis Tiger.



The Larry O. Finch Center



Away from The Pyramid, the Tigers have a world-class practice facility in the Larry O. Finch Recreational Facility located on The University of Memphis campus.

The 31,000 square foot center cost \$3.2 million. It features a regulation court which runs east to west. With the removal of portable goals, the build-

ing can be divided into three north-south courts for intramural play. Besides the courts, the building features every amenity the Tigers could desire.

Within a week of John Calipari's hire at the U of M, the center's weight room was equipped with \$50,000 of state of the art weight and cardiovascular equipment through a generous donation from Memphis businessmen Richard Mercer, Harry Phillips and George Sneed.

And in the past three years, the facility has continued to take shape.

The locker room features individual wood lockers along two walls while built into another wall are open lockers featuring uniforms and mementoes from former Tigers in the NBA. Adjacent to the locker room is a player lounge which includes a pool table, big screen television and sound system.

Additional training equipment has been added to the weight room. The center's fully-equipped training room includes heat packs, electrical stimulation units, ultrasound, whirlpools, three treatment and two taping tables as well as a separate doctor's examination room.

Also, the classroom which overlooks the court has been transformed into a dining area for post-practice meals for the team.

The Larry O. Finch Center was dedicated Feb. 24, 2000. In Finch's three years as a player at Memphis, the Tigers recorded a 63-21 record and either won or tied for two Missouri Valley Conference championships. He scored 1,869 career points and averaged 26.8 points in the 1973 NCAA Tournament when the Tigers advanced to the championship game.

He was named all-America honorable mention by both The Associated Press and UPI and was a two-time Missouri Valley Conference Player of the Year.

As a coach, Finch is the all-time winningest coach in Tiger history, posting a 220-130 record in 11 seasons. Under his leadership the U of M advanced to the NCAA Tournament six times, including the Elite Eight in 1992 and the Sweet 16 in 1995.

The Pyramid

Not many basketball arenas in the nation can equal the prominence amidst a city's skyline quite like The Pyramid in Memphis.

Driving from the west, The Pyramid seems to grow out of the fertile fields of eastern Arkansas. Descending the bluffs on Riverside Drive to the south of downtown, the arena anchors the city's skyline on the bank of the Mississippi River. And from the east, The Pyramid's stainless steel finish can be blinding in the midmorning sun.

The 32-story Pyramid is the third largest pyramid in the world and soars even taller than the Statue of Liberty or the Taj Mahal. The building pays homage to Memphis's namesake — Memphis on the Nile.

Seating capacity is approximately 21,000 for concerts while capacity for basketball is 20,004. With a footprint larger than six football fields, The Pyramid's base covers 360,000 square feet. There is more than a half million square feet of usable space inside.

The arena underwent a \$7 million renovation as the NBA Grizzlies moved into the arena for the 2001-02 season.

A new playing court and expanded club areas greeted Memphis fans for the 2002 season. An expanded media center was also included in the renovations. The University of Memphis's locker room includes a marble entry way into a 2,200 square foot facility which includes a lounge, meeting room with theater seating, fully-equipped training room and dressing area. And while the Tigers occupy one of the finest dressing facilities in college basketball, the squad will move into a facility with four times the space and additional amenities when the Grizzlies move into their new home.

The Pyramid celebrated its 11th anniversary last year. The U of M has compiled a 158-42 (.790) record in the building the past 12 seasons.

In addition to being the home of The University of Memphis, the arena has served to first/second round NCAA games on three occasions, the women's NCAA Mid-east Regional Championship as well as three Conference USA tournaments.



Memphis Sports

Whether it's cheering on the University of Memphis Tigers, catching a Redbirds' game downtown or following the touring professionals at the PGA FedEx St. Jude Golf Classic, when it comes to sports, the city of Memphis offers something for everyone.

The U of M plays its home football games in the Liberty Bowl, which also plays host to the annual bowl game pitting the Conference USA champion against the Mountain West champion. The Tigers' basketball games are played in The Pyramid which is home of Memphis's NBA franchise, the Grizzlies. A new \$250-million basketball arena, The FedEx Forum, is under construction in downtown Memphis and is expected to be completed by Fall of 2004.

The Lady Tiger basketball and volleyball teams have a definite home-court advantage playing in the Elma Roane Fieldhouse located in the middle of The University's main campus.

The Memphis Redbirds have just wrapped up their third season in AutoZone Park. The University of Memphis played several of its home games in the 14,320-seat ballpark in 2002.

The Memphis Redbirds are the only not-for-profit team in the country. All operating profits are put back into The Memphis Redbirds Baseball Foundation which funds two youth baseball programs, RBI (Returning Baseball to the Inner City) and STRIPES (Sports Teams Returning In the Public Education System).

This year's 46th annual FedEx St. Jude Classic continues to be one of the longest, continuous running sporting events

in the city's history. The tournament adopted St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital as its beneficiary in 1970 and to date the event has generated over \$13 million towards fighting childhood catastrophic diseases. Past champions have included such noted players as Greg Norman, Jack Nicklaus, Fred Couples, Nick Price and Curtis Strange.

For race fans, there is Memphis Motorsports Park with its four distinctive racing venues. MMP features a $\frac{3}{4}$ -mile paved oval which plays host to a NASCAR Craftsman Truck Series event in the summer and a NASCAR Busch Series race in the fall. The track's quarter-mile dragstrip plays host to an NHRA event in September. The park also features a quarter-mile dirt oval as well as a road course.

The Kroger St. Jude is one of only nine championship-level tennis tournaments in North America and one of only two in the world to be held in a private club. For 26 years, the sports brightest stars including 2002 U.S. Open champion Pete Sampras (pictured above right) have come to Memphis and have voted the February tournament among their favorite stops worldwide on the ATP Tour.

Memphis also offers its citizens 10 public and 15 private golf courses throughout the city. There are also 230 parks (totaling over 23,000 acres), 17 public swimming pools, 26 community centers and 80 public tennis courts.



City of Memphis

Considered the Home of the Blues and the Birthplace of Rock 'n Roll, the city of Memphis's musical roots run deep. However, music is just a chapter in the history as well as the future of the city located in the heart of Mid-America.

Memphis, named after the capital of ancient Egypt, boasts all the amenities you would expect in a city with over 1,000,000 residents while retaining the charm and down-to-earth feel of a small town.

Downtown is served by the Main Street Trolley. The trolley system, which first opened in April of 1993, currently consists of the Main Street Line which passes near such Memphis landmarks as Beale Street, the Pinch District, Court Square and the National Civil Rights Museum. The Riverfront Loop includes a station in front of The Pyramid and offers riders a unique vista of the Mississippi River.

Memphis musical roots can be traced to band leader W.C. Handy who wrote the first blues song here in 1909, a campaign theme for Memphis mayor "Boss" Crump called "Boss Crump Blues" and later published as "The Memphis Blues." The sound soon caught on and blues bands filled the clubs along Beale. Young musicians who performed along Beale included Muddy Waters, Furry Lewis, Albert King, Bobby "Blue" Bland and B.B. King.

Where Beale Street meets the Mississippi River is Tom Lee Park, site of the annual Beale Street Music Festival. The weekend-long musical festival is just a part of the month-long Memphis in May International Festival which also includes the World Championship Barbecue Cooking Contest and the Sunset Symphony.

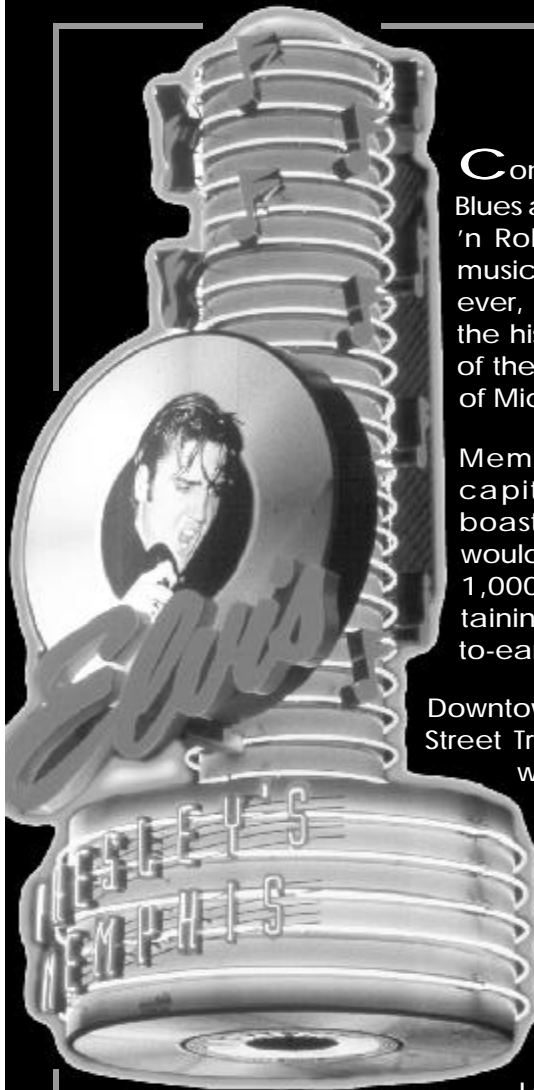
Located just off Beale Street is the Peabody Place Retail and Entertainment Center which opened in the fall of 2001. The 300,000 square foot retail complex features a 22-screen theater as well as shops ranging from Tower Records and Books, the Gap and Ann Taylor Lofts. Another major tenant is Jillian's, a multi-dimensional entertainment venue complete with a sports video cafe, dance club, billiards and more than 150 electronic simulation games.



Also located within a block of Beale is Gibson Guitar Memphis which includes factory tours and cultural exhibits. Also on the same property is the Smithsonian's Rock 'n Soul Museum which includes artifacts documenting music's past.

Memphis's musical roots also includes Stax and Hi-Records as well as Sun Records recording studios. Stax became known for "sweet soul music" through such artists as the MarKeys, Booker T. and the MGs, Otis Redding, Wilson Pickett, Sam and Dave and Isaac Hayes. The Soulsville U.S.A. Music Academy and the Museum of American Soul Music are located on the Stax Records site. One of Hi-Records premier artists was Al Green. Sun Records most famous recording artist was Elvis Presley and boasted Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins and Johnny Cash among its artists.

Elvis Presley's Graceland is one of the five most visited home tours in America and is the most famous home in America after the White House. In 1991, Graceland was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Over 600,000 visitors tour Graceland each year.



University of Memphis

Committed to education and service in a metropolitan community, state and nation, The University of Memphis is a step ahead in developing programs to educate and train the area's workforce. Two major new projects on campus are the Kemmons Wilson School of Hospitality and Resort Management (top photo) and the FedEx Emerging Technology Complex.

Situated on Central Avenue just north of the law school, the Kemmons Wilson School of Hospitality began operations in the spring. Memphis entrepreneur and Holiday Inns founder Wilson built the \$15 million, 82-suite hotel as a gift to The University.

The school operates as part of the Fogelman College of Business and Economics. Students majoring in hospitality management must complete the University's general education requirements as well as basic business courses as part of the hospitality curriculum.

The University of Memphis and FedEx Corporation broke ground May 2, 2001 on a facility that will blow the circuits off traditional forms of education. The FedEx Emerging Technology Complex's primary goal will be to dramatically increase the skill level of the greater Memphis workforce with technologically-talented, globally-oriented and critically-minded graduates.

Students will graduate with a blend of both a traditional academic degree from any discipline offered by The University as well as recognized practical accomplishments. Initial efforts in the program will focus on Broadband Internet Content and Delivery, Virtual Reality, Wireless Telecommunication and Rapid Application Development.

Also just completed is the Student Plaza (middle photo). Just east of the plaza is the Michael D. Rose Lecture Hall which was completed in 2001 and provides seating for up to 1,000 in an auditorium configuration for student and other university events, lectures and films. To the south of the new plaza is the University Center while the Administration Building is located adjacent to the plaza on the west side.

The University Bookstore (bottom photo) opened in the fall of 2002. In addition to class supplies and text books, the bookstore is home to an on-campus spirit store and a coffee shop.





University of Memphis

The University of Memphis may be considered an urban university but the U of M campus's appearance is far from just brick and mortar. The U of M is located in a suburban, residential area of the city some nine miles from downtown Memphis. The campus has several "green areas" including Alumni Mall which is bordered by academic buildings on the east and west as well as one of the University's signature buildings, The Administration Building to the north.

The University of Memphis has received the Mayor's Award of Excellence from the Memphis City Beautiful Commission for having the best overall exterior appearance of local schools, hospitals and businesses. Criteria included contribution to the neighborhood, waste handling and litter prevention, and horticultural improvements.

The University of Memphis offers 15 bachelor's degrees in more than 50 majors and 70 concentrations, master's degrees in 46 subjects and doctoral degrees in 21 disciplines, in addition to the Juris Doctor (law) and a specialist degree in education. The U of M campus is located on 1,160 acres with nearly 200 buildings at more than four sites.

Opened in 1912 as a teacher training college, The University of Memphis has grown into one of the largest comprehensive universities in the southeast United States. Still offering the teaching, research and service functions it was founded to provide, The U of M has established five destination areas: information technology, international studies, performing arts, public health and undergraduate education.

The University of Memphis is one of Tennessee's two comprehensive institutions of higher learning. The U of M is the flagship of the Tennessee Board of Regents system. It awards more than 3,000 degrees annually.

With an enrollment of over 20,000 students, The University of Memphis has 25 Chairs of Excellence, more than any other Tennessee university, and five state-approved centers of excellence.

The centers of excellence include the Center for Applied Psychological Research, the Center for Earthquake Research and Information, the Center for Research Initiatives and Strategies for the Communicatively Impaired, the Center for Research in Educational Policy and the Institute of Egyptian Art and Archeology Research and Information Center.

While students entering Tennessee universities average ACT scores are 20 and the national average is 21, the average ACT score for students entering The University of Memphis is 22.

National Exposure

Basketball can be the city's pulse when it comes Memphis. But basketball at the University of Memphis extends beyond the city's boundaries.

The Tigers receive their fair share of national exposure whether it is a preseason story in USA Today, an update on recruiting by ESPN.com or a player profile during a CBS network triple-header.

In the three seasons John Calipari has been at the helm of the U of M program, the Tigers have made 32 national television appearances – 15 appearances on ESPN, 14 on ESPN2, two on CBS as well as an appearance on ABC.

This year, the University of Memphis will play on national television 11 times during the regular season. The Tigers appear on ESPN or ESPN2 nine times starting with the season opener Nov. 13th against Wake Forest at the Coaches vs. Cancer Classic played in New York's Madison Square Garden. The Tigers also appear on ABC twice this season when they play at Louisville Feb. 28th and at Cincinnati March 6th.

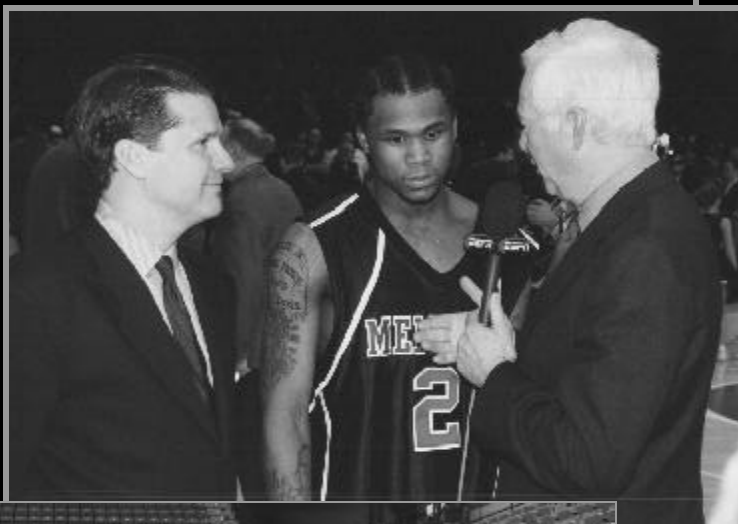
A number of games not broadcast nationally will be televised locally by WLMT-TV in Memphis and several games are carried regionally as part of the league's ESPN+ package. Over the last three years, all but one of the Tigers' 102 games have been broadcast. Last season every Tiger game was carried live in the Memphis television market.

In addition to national attention, Memphis basketball is covered extensively by the area's media outlets.

WMC-AM 790 is the flagship station of the Memphis Radio Network and not only broadcasts every game but also lengthy pregame and postgame shows. WMC is also the home of the John Calipari Radio Show.

WLMT's sister station, WPTY, is the host of the Memphis Basketball Show which airs each Sunday night during the season and features game highlights, player interviews, university features and commentary by Calipari.

Information on the Tigers is also updated throughout the season and available on the U of M athletic department website, goTIGERSgo.com.
