2007 SEASON IN REVIEW OVERALL RECORD - 7-6; C-USA RECORD - 6-2

BACK TO BOWLING

Not only was the 25-9 victory over UAB special because it snapped a seven-game losing streak to the Blazers, but also because the contest gave Memphis its sixth win of the season. With the victory, Memphis became bowl eligible for the fourth time in the last five years. The Tigers went to three straight post-season contests (2003-05) before snapping the streak in 2006. Of the three contests, Memphis won both the 2003 New Orleans Bowl and the 2005 Motor City Bowl, and lost in the 2004 GMAC Bowl. With the loss to Florida Atlantic in the 2007 New Orleans Bowl, Memphis now has a 4-2 all-time bowl record, which also includes victories in the 1956 Burley Bowl and the 1971 Pasadena Bowl.

IN GOOD COMPANY

The University of Memphis was one of just seven teams in the country who participated in a football bowl game, the NCAA men's basketball tournament and the NCAA baseball tournament in the 2007 calendar year. The Tigers are the only non-BCS program who could make the above claims in 2007. The other squads were: Arkansas, Ohio State, Texas, Texas A&M, UCLA and Virginia.

FIVE SELECTED ALL-C-USA IN '07

The University of Memphis placed five players on both the Coaches and Media All-Conference USA teams. The only difference between the two teams for Memphis is that offensive lineman Andy Smith was picked to the *first team* by the coaches and the *second team* by the media. Joining Smith in earning league honors are wide receiver Duke Calhoun and linebacker Jake Kasser who were named to the C-USA Second Team as well as offensive lineman Dominik Riley and deep snapper Keenan Bratcher who were selected to the All-Freshman Team. This is the second season that C-USA has picked two different league teams.

3-0 TO END THE REGULAR SEASON

With the wins over Southern Miss, UAB and SMU to close out the 2007 schedule, Memphis has finished the year with three straight regular-season wins for the first time since 2004. Memphis won three straight at the end of the 2005 campaign, but that included the Akron win in the Motor City Bowl. Prior to 2004, Memphis had not ended the year with three consecutive regular-season wins since 1988.

TIGERS FINISH 2ND IN C-USA EAST

The win over SMU to close out the regular season gave Memphis its sixth C-USA victory of the season. The Tigers tied for second in the East Division with East Carolina which also turned in a 6-2 record. This is the most C-USA wins for Memphis since the league began playing football in 1996, and also marks the fourth time that the Tigers have logged at least five league victories. The other three times were all under coach Tommy West's direction in three consecutive years from 2003-05.

WEST IS IN GOOD COMPANY

With the win over SMU, Tommy West guaranteed a winning season and became just the fourth coach in Memphis football history to secure four winning seasons while guiding a Tiger program. Included in the group of coaches who led Memphis to at least four winning seasons and coached at least five seasons

are Zach Curlin (1924-36), Ralph Hatley (1947-57) and Billy J. Murphy (1958-71).

In addition, West entered the New Orleans Bowl with 41 career wins at Memphis and is only the fourth head coach to secure 40 or more wins at the university. He ranks third among those who coached at least 60 games with a .482 winning percentage.

TIGERS SWEEP C-USA WEST DIVISION

Since Conference USA went to a two-division football format in 2005, the Tigers, an East Division member, have faced three West Division foes each season. In 2005, Memphis was 2-1 versus the C-USA West, and last year, the Tigers were 1-2.

With the triple overtime win over SMU in the final regular season game, the Tigers swept the West Division. Memphis had already posted wins over Rice (38-35) and Tulane (28-27). Memphis is now 6-3 over the West Division in the last three years.

TOMMY WEST

Head Coach • 7 Years • 41-44, 76-79



Tommy West came to Memphis in 2000 as the defensive coordinator and a year later became the Tigers' 21st head football coach. In just seven seasons at the helm of the program, West has guided the U of M to four bowl game appearances in the last five years and is one of just two coaches in Tiger football history to win seven or more games a season in three-plus years.

The Gainesville, Ga., native was hired as the Tigers' head coach on November 30, 2000, and continues to work towards the team goal of a C-USA championship.

Under West's guidance, the Tigers won five of their last six games in 2003 en route to an 8-4 record and snapped a 32-year bowl drought. The Tigers went on to defeat North Texas in the New Orleans Bowl and ended the year at 9-4. West was named the Coach of the Year by the Tennessee Sports Writers Association.

The 2004 Tigers opened the season at 5-1 and rolled off three straight wins at the end of the year to earn their second straight bowl invitation. Despite the loss to Bowling Green in the GMAC Bowl, the Tigers ended the year at 8-4, which was good for second in Conference USA. The eight wins also marked the first time since 1962 and 1963 that the Tigers had amassed eight wins in consecutive seasons. In 2004, West's Tigers also made history ranking 25th in the *Associated Press* poll following their victory over Ole Miss. It was the first time ever that Memphis had been ranked by the national entity.

In 2005, West and his staff did an amazing job in getting the Tigers to their third straight bowl game despite numerous injuries that threatened to derail the team's post-season streak. Memphis finished the year with a 7-5 record and a victory over Akron in the Motor City Bowl, and was one of just 29 schools in the nation playing its third straight bowl game that year.

Despite a rough beginning in 2006, the Tigers did show marked improvement by year's end. This was evident in the latter weeks of the season when Memphis narrowly lost to UCF, 26-24, and then a week later stunned eventual league champion Houston with a solid effort, forcing the Cougars into overtime and ultimately losing by a field goal. By the last game of the season, the Tigers were confident and handed UTEP a 38-19 loss at the Sun Bowl on its Senior Day.

West led his 2007 squad to a 7-6 overall record and a 6-2 showing in C-USA as the Tigers entered the New Orleans Bowl on a three-game winning streak. The six victories in Conference USA action are the most ever for a Tiger team since Memphis began playing in the league in 1996. In addition, the Tigers won all three of their games against C-USA West Division foes and finished the season tied for second in the East Division with East Carolina.

West enters the 2008 season with a 41-44 record at Memphis and is one of just four coaches in school history to secure four winning seasons while guiding a Tiger program for at least five seasons.

West and his wife, Lindsay, have one son, Turner, who was a freshman receiver for the Tigers this season.

TOP TURNAROUNDS

The U of M tied for fourth nationally in biggest improvements after winning seven games just a year after winning two. Memphis' five-game improvement tied with Mississippi State, Fresno State, Connecticut and Air Force. The leader was Illinois with a seven-game improvement, followed by UCF (6) and Kansas (6).

MOST IMPROVED OFFENSES

Memphis also ranked in the top 10 nationally in offensive improvement, and was one of two Conference USA teams listed in the top 10. The Tigers ranked fifth in the country after increasing offensive production by 1,741 yards from 2006.

TIGERS HAVE BEST PASSING OFFENSE

With Martin Hankins guiding the offense and having many targets to pass to in the loaded Tiger receiving corps, the U of M closed out the season ranked 13th nationally in passing offense. That is the highest ranking for a Tiger squad in at least nine years. The previous best in that span was the No. 25 ranking in 2004.

TIGER CAPTAINS

As is customary for Tiger football, the team voted for permanent captains prior to the final game of the season. Selected by their peers was QB Martin Hankins, RB Joseph Doss, LB Jake Kasser, OL Andy Smith and DL Clinton McDonald. McDonald is the first junior to be selected as a team captain. The group made their debut during the coin toss of the SMU game on Nov. 24.

DON'T PUT THE BALL ON THE GROUND

This season, Tiger backs have carried the ball 332 times and have only put the ball on the ground twice. Of the four fumbles the Tigers have given up this season, only two have been by Tiger running backs. Sophomore Miguel Barnes coughed the ball up against Ole Miss and sophomore T.J. Pitts fumbled against Middle Tennessee. Senior Joseph Doss has only fumbled twice in his career which includes 537 carries.

The 2007 Tigers finished the season tied for third nationally in fumbles lost. LSU and San Jose State led the nation in least fumbles lost with just three. Memphis was tied with three other teams for third as Florida Atlantic, Eastern Michigan and fellow C-USA member Marshall also only coughed up the ball four times.

WEST LEADS STRONG FINISH

The theme for the Tigers under Tommy West is "finish". And recent history has shown that the Tigers do finish strong. In both 2007 and 2003, West led the Tigers to wins in five of their last six regular season games. And with the 2003 New Orleans Bowl victory, that squad ended with wins in six of their last eight for a 9-4 overall record.

In the last five years, Memphis has ended its season (incl. bowl games) with a victory three times.

MAKE IT SIX STRAIGHT

In six of the last seven games of 2007, Memphis produced a 100-yard receiver. The streak was snapped in the New Orleans Bowl as Carlos Singleton led all Tiger receivers with 63 yards. Quarterback Martin Hankins spread the wealth in the bowl as five different Tigers posted 35 or more yards receiving in the game. It was only the second time this season (vs. Marshall) that five players tallied 35-plus yards receiving.

games versus East Carolina (107), Southern Miss (124) and UAB (159) and also logged 119 yards versus Rice. Most recently, Steven Black tallied a career-high 112 yards and Carlos Singleton hauled in eight passes for 127 yards in the regular season finale versus SMU.

Maurice Jones tallied his first 100-yard game with 117 versus Tulane, while the ECU game produced two 100-yard receivers as in addition to Calhoun's 107 yards, Carlos Singleton had 100 yards on six catches. The chart below details the six straight games Memphis had a 100-yard receiver:

STREAKING TIGERS

Two Tigers ended the 2007 season with substantial receiving streaks after catching passes in the New Orleans Bowl. Sophomore receiver Duke Calhoun will enter his junior season having caught a pass in each of his 24 games played. He closed out the 2007 campaign with four receptions for 40 yards against FAU. In four of the last seven games of the season, Calhoun posted 100-plus yards receiving. He totaled four receptions for 119 yards against Rice, 107 yards on eight receptions versus East Carolina, 124 yards on eight receptions against USM, and then set a career high for yardage with 159 yards on four catches in the win over UAB. He snapped his streak of 100-yard games in the season finale versus SMU in which he was held to six receptions for 65 yards.

Carlos Singleton advanced his streak to 21 games after totaling four receptions for 63 yards and a touchdown in the bowl meeting. He had previously set a new career high with 127 yards on eight catches against SMU. It was Singleton's second career game of 100-plus yards.

HOW ABOUT THESE NUMBERS?

In the last seven games of the season, which included wins over Rice, Tulane, Southern Miss, UAB and SMU, Martin Hankins passed for 2,388 yards and 20 touchdowns. He averaged 341.1 passing yards per game and completed 60.9 percent (184-302) of his passes in that seven-game span.

Prior to the UAB game, Hankins passed for 300 or more yards in four straight games. Against the Blazers, Hankins just missed his fifth straight 300-yard game with 298 yards. He answered back the following week with

336 yards and four touchdowns in the triple-overtime win over SMU.

Hankins finished his senior season ranked 13th nationally in passing yards per game and 17th in passing. He also ranked in the top 25 in total offense, total passing yards and points responsible for. In Conference USA, Hankins ranked second in passing yards per game and fourth in pass efficiency.

"BIG GUYS" MAKE WAY FOR BIG OFFENSE

And now is the time for a plug for the unsung heroes of the Tiger offense - the "Big Guys". The Tiger offensive line finished the season ranked 10th nationally in sacks allowed, having given up just 14 this season. Two key components were the right side of the line made up of senior guard Andy Smith and junior tackle Brandon Pearce. Both have started 33 games in the Tiger o-line, which has led C-USA in sack denial the last four straight years.

Below is a chart detailing Memphis' ranking nationally and in C-USA in sacks allowed. *Note: The NCAA did not rank sacks allowed until 2005.

TIGERS IN DECEMBER GAMES

The Memphis Tigers are 4-4 in games played in December, which include the 2007 New Orleans Bowl, bowl games in 1971 and 2003-05 as well as regular season contests in 1918, 1950 and 1972. Memphis played its first Dec. 21st contest with a loss to Florida Atlantic in the New Orleans Bowl this year, and the latest they have played in school history was Dec. 26 in the 2005 Motor City Bowl.

THREE TIGERS EARN ACADEMIC HONORS

The University of Memphis placed three Tiger football players on the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District team as announced by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Senior linebacker Jake Kasser and junior safety Brandon Patterson were both selected to the district first-team and were included on the national Academic All-America ballot. Junior offensive lineman Brandon Pearce was selected to the second-team.

Patterson became the first football Academic All-American since 1992 when he was named to the second team in late

MEMPHIS VERSUS THE SUN BELT

The Tigers have an all-time record of 64-46-6 against current members of the Sun Belt Conference. Memphis has played Arkansas State (27-22-5), Louisiana-Lafayette (9-4), Louisiana-Monroe (1-1), Middle Tennessee (7-13-1), North Texas (16-4), Troy (4-1) and Florida Atlantic (0-1).

Memphis lost to ASU, 35-31, in Jonesboro and lost to Middle Tennessee, 21-7 in Memphis during regular season contests. They later dropped a 44-27 decision to FAU in the New Orleans Bowl. Memphis' last win over a Sun Belt foe was a 47-35 victory over ASU in Jonesboro on Sept. 18, 2004.

WEST VS. NON-CONFERENCE FOES

Memphis is currently 14-15 against non-Conference USA foes under head coach Tommy West.

Memphis lost to FAU in the New Orleans Bowl and ended 2007 with a 1-4 record versus non-league opponents. During the regular season, the Tigers dropped decisions to Ole Miss, Arkansas State and Middle Tennessee, and defeated Jacksonville State.

From 1996 (when C-USA started football) through 2000 (the last season prior to West as head coach), the Tigers had a 7-16 record against non-conference opposition.

ANY DAY OF THE WEEK

The Tigers have an all-time record of 71-85-15 since the program's inception in 1912 for games played on days other than Saturday. The most popular day for the squad has been Friday, which accounts for 114 of the 170 non-Saturday contests. The list below details Memphis' record by day:

THE TIGERS ON ESPN

In the last four years, Memphis has appeared on ESPN 12 times, including this season's Oct. 2 meeting with Marshall and the 2007 New Orleans Bowl, which both aired on ESPN2.

Memphis had three games broadcast by ESPN in 2006 (Ole Miss, Tennessee & Southern Miss). In 2005, Memphis appeared on ESPN three times, including the opening meeting against Ole Miss on ESPN, the mid-season contest with UAB on ESPN2, and the Motor City Bowl on ESPN.

During the 2004 season, the Tigers played Louisville (Nov. 4), Southern Miss (Nov. 12) and USF (Nov. 27) on ESPN, and closed out the season in the GMAC Bowl.

The Tigers have played on ESPN 18 times dating back to a 34-3 loss to Georgia in 1982. Memphis has won six ESPN games -- the 27-17 victory in the 2003 New Orleans Bowl; a 44-34 win over Ole Miss, also in 2003; a 30-26 win over USM and a 31-15 victory over USF in 2004; the 38-31 victory in the 2005 Motor City Bowl; and the 24-21 emotionally-charged win over Marshall earlier this season.

TIGERS GET FIRST-EVER OT WIN

The Tigers and SMU Mustangs went three overtimes in the regular-season finale for the second 3OT game in Tiger history (the other was versus Houston in 2000). This 55-52 win over SMU was Memphis' first overtime victory in five games. All five of the Tigers' extended games have been against C-USA opponents and all have occurred at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium. The following shows Memphis' record in OT:

FANS GET THEIR MONEY'S WORTH

The Memphis-SMU sure gave the fans their money's worth as the highest scoring game in school history and the longest game ever. The two squads combined for 107 points for a new school record, surpassing the previous mark of 105 points from the 56-49 Tiger loss to Louisville in 2004. In addition, the triple-overtime contest lasted a grueling 4 hours and 33 minutes. The only other four hour game the squad has played since 1989 was a 4:05 contest with Arkansas State in 2004. Memphis also set a school and C-USA record for plays, having run 108 plays against the Mustangs.

TIGERS IN TOP 5 NATIONALLY

The Tigers tied for third in the country in fumbles lost this season with just four. In addition, Memphis ranked 28th nationally in fumbles recovered with 13.

In four games this season, Memphis recovered two or more fumbles. The Tigers opened the season having recovered a fumble in each of the first six games but have only recovered one in the last seven contests. Memphis has; however, picked off a pass in eight of the last nine games and the only team this season to not give up a single turnover was East Carolina.

For the season, Memphis gained 26 turnovers and only turned the ball over 16 times, which ranked the Tigers 15th in the

country in turnover margin. Unfortunately, the Tigers were unable to consistently capitalize on the opponents' miscues, having only scored on six of the 26 takeaways (5 TD, 1 FG) and averaging just 3.0 points off of turnovers per game.

CALHOUN ENTERS TIGER TOP 10

In just two seasons wearing the blue and gray, Duke Calhoun has already etched his name in the Tiger Top 10 in receiving yards. He ranks seventh all-time with 1,571 yards on 104 receptions. His career mark got a huge boost against Rice when the Memphis native totaled 119 receiving yards, thus becoming just the 20th Tiger in school history to amass 1,000 yards receiving.

In three of the last five games of the season, Calhoun registered 100-plus yards and jumped from 16th all-time to eighth. In addition, Calhoun's 104 receptions is good for 8th all-time.

FIVE TIGERS WITH 60 CAREER CATCHES

Five current Tigers have registered 60 or more receptions in their careers. Sophomore Duke Calhoun has tallied 1,571 yards on 104 receptions and junior Earnest Williams totals 76 catches for 812 yards. Tailback Joseph Doss was held without a catch for the first time in five games by SMU and has 71 receptions for 487 yards.

Maurice Jones and Carlos Singleton most recently joined the group as both totaled two catches against UAB. Jones has 62 career receptions for 866 yards, while Singleton boasts 73 catches for 1,067 yards.

While Calhoun ranks seventh all-time in receiving yards, Carlos Singleton, Maurice Jones and Earnest Williams are now all ranked in the Tiger Top 35. Singleton is 17th (1,067 yards) while Jones is 30th

(866 yards) and Williams is 34th (812 yards). All four of those Tiger receivers will be back in 2008.

CALHOUN HOLDS RECEIVING RECORD

Sophomore Duke Calhoun tied the school record with six career 100-yard receiving games when he tallied 124 yards on eight catches in the come-from-behind win over Southern Miss. One week later, Calhoun garnered the record with his seventh 100-yard game, surpassing Earnest Gray who totaled six from 1977-78.

A sophomore from Memphis, Tenn., Calhoun set a career high with 159 yards on four catches against UAB. Two of his receptions were for 70-yard gains, which are new highs for the Tigers' leading receiver.

In the last seven games, Calhoun was a favorite target of Martin Hankins, registering 653 yards and three touchdowns on 39 catches. He averaged 93.3 yards and 5.6 receptions during that seven-game span.

CALHOUN MISSES 1,000 YARDS

Duke Calhoun needed 150 yards receiving in the New Orleans Bowl in order to become just the second Tiger in school history to amass 1,000 receiving yards in a single season. Ten different Tigers caught passes against Florida Atlantic and Calhoun tallied just 40 yards on four receptions and only had a long catch of 17 yards. It was only the fourth time this season that he did not catch at least one pass of 20 or more yards.

Calhoun ended the season with 890 yards and has a current receiving streak of 24 games which ranks in a tie for third all-time. His 890 yards is good for second all-time in a single season behind Isaac Bruce.

A 14-year NFL veteran, Bruce is the only player in Tiger history to log 1,000 receiving yards in a single season as he tallied 1,054 yards in 1993. He totaled 1,054 yards on 74 receptions in 11 games that season. His longest catch of the season was 44 yards and he also tallied 10 touchdowns that season.

HANKINS HITS 3,000 YARDS

In the 2007 New Orleans Bowl, Martin Hankins became only the second Tiger ever to hit the 3,000-yard milestone in a single season. He passed for 281 yards before having to leave the game late in the third quarter with a knee sprain. Hankins ended the season with 3,220 yards, setting a new U of M single season record. He also set records with his 262 pass completions and 25 touchdown passes in 2007.

Hankins hit the 2,000-yard milestone in just eight games (vs. USM) after missing two earlier contests with a hip injury. He was named C-USA co-Offensive Player of the Week following the USM game in which he passed for 396 yards and four touchdowns. With 2,000-plus yards passing, this was the seventh season in school history that a Memphis signal caller had passed for 2,000-plus yards. Danny Wimprine accomplished this in three straight seasons (2002-04) and Hankins totaled 2,550 yards in 2006. Bernard Oden tallied 2,249 yards in 1997 and Steve Matthews passed for 2,084 yards in 1992.

TIGER QB'S PASSING FOR BIG YARDS

This season, Tiger quarterbacks totaled 300-plus yards passing in eight games, including the record-setting 416 yards versus ECU. Memphis did not have a sub-150 yard performance in '07 and was only held below 200 yards by UCF (173) and Middle Tennessee (157).

TIGER OFFENSE PUTS UP BIG NUMBERS

The Memphis Tigers logged 400 or more yards of total offense in nine games this season, including the season-high 571 yards in the win over Rice. They just missed the 400-yard mark in the New Orleans Bowl, rolling up 398 yards against Florida Atlantic.

On the other side of the ball, the Tiger defense allowed its opponents 400-plus yards in eight games, with two of those contests being for 600 or more yards. In two straight games (USM & UAB), the Tiger defense held the opponent to below 350 yards of total offense.

2007 SQUAD SETS PASSING RECORDS

The Tigers tallied five passing touchdowns in the win over SMU and set a new single season record for touchdowns with 30, surpassing the 2004 Tigers which totaled 25 passing TDs. They ended the year with 33 after Hankins tossed three TD passes against FAU in the New Orleans Bowl.

The 2007 Tigers also hold the single-season record in attempts (551), completions (323) and yardage (3,975). This season, the Tigers tossed three or more touchdowns in eight games; did not have an interception in six contests; and threw for over 300 yards in eight games. In fact, Memphis did not have a single interception in 140 passing attempts as the U of M was not picked off in four straight games (UCF, ASU, Marshall, MT).

Both of Memphis' TDs in the UAB win came by way of the ground, which marked the only game in 2007 that the Tigers did not have a passing touchdown. The last time that Memphis did not have a passing TD was in the 2006 season finale against UTEP. In that game, Memphis scored five TDs from the run.

THE SPREAD

In 2007, 10 different Tigers caught touchdown passes. Eight of the 10 were wideouts and the other two are fullback Greg Hinds and tight end Brett Russell. Six Tigers caught multiple TD passes this season, including receivers Carlos Singleton (11), Duke Calhoun (5), Earnest Williams (5) and Maurice Jones (2), fullback Greg Hinds (3) and tight end Brett Russell (2).

In addition, four different Tigers tossed TD passes including QBs Martin Hankins (25), Will Hudgens (5) and Matt Malouf (2) and receiver Dave Thomas.

LONG DRIVES

Memphis logged 16 drives of 80 or more yards, 14 of which resulted in a touchdown in 2007. The Tigers logged two drives of more than 90 yards in the win over UAB, including a season-long 99-yard drive of five plays that resulted in a touchdown. Memphis' previous long for the year was a 94-yard, 12-play effort in the fourth quarter against UCF.

On the flip side, Memphis' opponents have totaled just eight drives of more than 80 yards this season.

TIGERS GET THIRD STRAIGHT ROAD WIN

For only the third time since the Tigers began playing as a member of Conference USA in 1996, Memphis strung together three straight league victories on the road with the wins over Rice, Tulane and Southern Miss.

The Tigers defeated Houston, Tulane and Louisville in road contests in 2003 and won their last three road C-USA games in 1999 over UAB, Tulane and Cincinnati.

In addition, the Nov. 10 victory over Southern Miss on the road also marked just the fourth time since 1980 that Memphis had secured three straight road victories (2007, 2003, 1999 & 1983).

GRANDBERRY SNAGS KO RETURN RECORD

Junior Michael Grandberry started returning kicks full time in 2006 and with his 124-yard effort against Tulane, broke the school record for career kickoff returns and return yards, which

was previously held by William Arnold (1987-90) who totaled 1,202 yards on 55 returns.

Through 34 career games (only 22 of which include at least one KO return), Grandberry holds the school record with 1,826 yards on 81 returns. He also holds the Tiger record for 100-yard KO return games with eight after rolling off 153 yards on eight returns against FAU. He set a school record earlier in the year with his 168 yards against Southern Miss.

Grandberry is only the fourth Tiger in school history to hit the 1,000-yard milestone for kickoff returns.

CALHOUN BY THE QUARTER

Receiver Duke Calhoun is poised to be a premier receiver for the Tigers and has already shown that he can be a go-to guy. The quarter-by-quarter breakdown includes games in 2006 and 2007.

SINGLETON IS 2007 SCORING LEADER

Receiver Carlos Singleton led the Tigers in scoring in 2007 by a non-kicker with 72 points. He took the lead with his touchdown against Tulane and then extended his lead with two TDs against both ECU and USM. He set a career high with three touchdown receptions in the win over SMU, and became the first Tiger since Russell Copeland in 1992 (vs. Tennessee) to haul in three TD receptions in a single game.

Singleton's 72 points were the result of 11 TD catches and three two-point conversions. His 11 TD receptions ranks tied for second all-time with Tavares Gideon (2004) and his 767 yards is good for fourth all-time in a single season.

The overall scoring leader in 2007 was kicker Matt Reagan who amassed 80 points off 15 FGs and 35 PATs.

INJURY UPDATE

The Tigers suffered several devastating injuries this season, particularly on defense. Starting outside linebacker Greg Jackson injured his knee early in the second game against Jacksonville State and was out for the year. Starting middle linebacker Winston



Bowens missed the final six games - also from a knee injury. Reserve linebackers Corderick Govan and Jeremy Longstreet missed games while rehabbing minor injuries and safety Tony Bell missed two early games with a thigh bruise.

Offensively, senior reserve running back Jamarcus Gaither suffered a career-ending injury against Marshall. Gaither injured his knee covering a punt and had patella tendon reconstructive surgery on Friday, Oct. 5. He is expected to have another surgery in the spring to repair his anterior cruciate ligament. Joseph Doss and Duke Calhoun each missed one game with knee sprains and running back Miguel Barnes was lost for the year with a PCL injury he suffered in the Southern Miss game. In addition, running back T.J. Pitts was out against Tulane and East Carolina with an ankle sprain and left the bowl game with a broken ankle. Wide receiver Maurice Jones suffered a shoulder separation early in the SMU game and after working so hard to come back for the bowl game, he had to leave the FAU contest early with a dislocated hip.

TIGERS NEED LEAD AT HALFTIME AND IN 4TH

Under Coach West, the Tigers are 30-10 when leading at the half, and 36-4 when leading at the start of the fourth quarter. Most interesting, though, is the fact that in the last five years (2003-07 included), Memphis is 25-5 when leading at the half, and an impressive 28-3 when leading through the third quarter. The only three losses in that span were the 35-32 loss to Arkansas State in 2007, the 35-20 loss to East Carolina in 2006 and the 20-16 loss to Tennessee in 2005.

Against UT, Memphis entered the fourth quarter with a slight 16-14 lead but UT dropped two field goals on the Tigers for the win. Early in the 2006 season against ECU, Memphis was leading 20-14 at the start of the fourth quarter and allowed ECU 21 points for the 35-20 loss.

For the first time since that ECU game last season (Memphis had 20-7 halftime lead), the Tigers lost a game they were leading at halftime when they let go of a 31-6 lead against Arkansas State on Sept. 27, 2007. The Indians

scored 15 points in the third quarter and 14 in the final stanza to gain the 35-31 advantage.

Memphis was 5-1 in 2007 when leading at the start of the fourth quarter.

TIGERS LOOKING FOR 30 POINTS

The number 30 seems to be key for the Tigers under Tommy West. Since 2001, Memphis has an impressive 27-7 record (.794 winning percentage) when it scores 30 or more points in a game. This year, Memphis was 3-2 when scoring over 30 points which included wins over JSU, Rice and SMU.

On the other hand, the Tigers have a 7-29 mark (.194 winning percentage) when they allow the opponents 30 or more points. Memphis was 2-4 this year when the opponent scored 30 or more with the wins being over Rice and SMU.

HANKINS LEADS TO BIG PLAYS

Of the 62 offensive plays that Memphis registered for 20 or more yards in '07, Martin Hankins had a hand in 44 of them, including 18 passes for 40 or more yards and six over 50 yards. Hankins had two 70-yard passes to Duke Calhoun against UAB. He hit Maurice Jones for eight passes of more than 20 yards, including a pair of 42 yarders against Tulane and a 58-yard TD pass against Jacksonville State.

DOSS HITS 2,000-YD RUSHING MARK

With his 50 yards rushing against Arkansas State, senior tailback Joseph Doss entered the Tigers' Top 10 in career rushing yardage, surpassing Dornell Harris who previously held the No. 10 spot with 1,641 yards. Doss jumped to No. 8 with his career-high 175-yard effort in the win over Rice and then inched up to No. 7 with his 50 yards in the win over Tulane. Doss' 40 yards against East Carolina was enough to move him to No. 6.

Doss played his 47th career game in the New Orleans Bowl and just missed the 100-yard mark with 91 yards on 20 carries versus FAU. He completed his career ranked fourth all-time with 2,339 yards. He also ranks third in career carries with 537 and is tied for sixth with his five 100-yard games.

RUSSELL COMES UP WITH TD IN BOWL GAME

Tight end Brett Russell caught his second touchdown pass of the season in the New Orleans Bowl on an eight-yard strike from Martin Hankins with 9:20 remaining in the first quarter. Hankins was 5-for-5 on that drive. Russell ended the day with a season-high 45 yards on four receptions.

SINGLETON SCORES VERSUS FAU

Carlos Singleton caught a 16-yard pass in the first quarter of the New Orleans Bowl to extend his receiving streak to 21 games. Later in the second quarter, Singleton was on the receiving end of a 41-yard toss from Martin Hankins. The reception was Singleton's 12th reception over 20 yards this season and the pass was Hankins' 18th over 40 yards in 2007. Singleton ended the game with four catches for a team-high 63 yards.

CALHOUN EXTENDS STREAK

Sophomore receiver Duke Calhoun caught a three-yard pass in the second quarter versus

Florida Atlantic to extend his receiving streak to 24 games. He has caught a pass in each of his 24 career games. The 24-game streak ties for third all-time in the Memphis record book. He is tied with Darron White (2001-04). The Memphis school record is 27 games by Russell Copeland (1989-92).

MACK SCORES IN RESERVE ROLE

Senior kicker Joey Mack booted a 38-yard field goal with 12:12 left in the second quarter of the New Orleans Bowl. It was only Mack's second attempt of the season as his first attempt versus UCF was blocked. The 38-yard FG tied a season high for the Tigers as Matt Reagan hit a 38 yarder vs UAB. Mack also connected on a 35 yarder in the second quarter marking the third straight game that a Memphis kicker had hit two 30-yard kicks. Mack came in for Matt Reagan who was injured (concussion) on a tackle he made on a kickoff. He finished with eight points in the game.

MCDONALD GETS SACK VS FAU

Clinton McDonald sacked FAU's Rusty Smith for a loss of eight yards on the final play of the second quarter for his fourth sack of the season. It was his third sack in the last four games.

ONARHEIM CATCHES FIRST PASS

Redshirt freshman tight end Deven Onarheim caught his first reception of his career on a 10-yard strike from Hankins in the third quarter of the New Orleans Bowl. Onarheim played in nine games in 2007 and made his first career start against SMU.

SINGLETON TIES FOR SECOND WITH 11 TDS IN 2007

Carlos Singleton caught a six-yard touchdown pass from Martin Hankins with 9:30 left in the third quarter versus FAU for his 11th TD reception of the season and the 14th of his career. He tied for second all-time with Tavares Gideon in TD catches in a single season. The record is 12 by Bill Robertson set during the 1950 season.

INJURIES TAKE A TOLL IN BOWL GAME

Several Tigers left the New Orleans Bowl with injuries. Both receiver Maurice Jones and running back T.J. Pitts were carted off the field. Pitts (broken ankle) left with 7:01 left in the first quarter and Jones (dislocated hip) left the game with 13:22 remaining in the second quarter. Quarterback Martin Hankins left with just over a minute left in the third quarter with a knee sprain. In addition, kicker Matt Reagan suffered a concussion and was sidelined in the first quarter.

Pitts had surgery upon returning to Memphis.

MATHIS REGISTERS PICK VS FAU

LeRico Mathis picked off FAU quarterback Rusty Smith on the Memphis 8-yard line and returned it 34 yards for the third interception of the season for Mathis. The three interceptions tied Brandon Patterson for the team lead in interceptions in 2007.

SUTHERLAND BOOTS 70-YARD PUNT

Brent Sutherland had a career high 70-yard punt in the fourth quarter versus Florida Atlantic. It was his second 50+ yard punt in the game.

The 70 yards was a New Orleans Bowl record and ranked tied for fifth in Memphis history. Roland Eveland holds the Memphis record with an 85-yard punt in 1950. Sutherland has six punts over 50 yards in '07.

MEMPHIS SCORES 55 VERSUS SMU

The Tigers scored 55 points in the triple-OT win over SMU, marking the most points scored by Memphis this season. The U of M had previously scored 40 points in a loss to East Carolina. This is also the most points scored by the Tigers since 2005 when Memphis scored 59 points against UT-Chattanooga in Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium. The 55 points is the most scored against a Conference USA opponent since the inception of the league in 1996. The previous high was the 52 points scored in a win over Houston in 2001 on the road.



BLACK IS GO-TO GUY VS MUSTANGS

There was no shortage of receivers on the UM roster and that group of talented Tigers proved this season that any one of them can put up big numbers on any given day. This was true again versus SMU when junior receiver Steven Black hauled in 12 receptions for 112 yards, both of which were career highs. Black registered a catch in all but the Jacksonville State game this season and hauled in multiple receptions in 10 games. His 12 catches ranked second all-time in a single game as the record is 13 by Maurice Avery against UAB in 2003.

TIGER DUO TEAMS UP FOR 2ND TIME

Earlier this season against Rice, receiver Duke Calhoun and tailback Joseph Doss turned in 100-yard games. Calhoun tallied 119 receiving yards and Doss totaled a career-high 175 rushing yards. Fast forward four games, and the duo did it again in the victory over UAB. In that win, Doss rushed for 168 yards and Calhoun set a new career best with 159 receiving yards.

The Tigers also had two 100-yard receivers in the same contest against East Carolina as Calhoun caught eight passes for 107 yards and Carlos Singleton hit the century mark for the first time in his career with exactly 100 yards on six receptions.

For the year, Memphis had two or more players register 100 or more yards (receiving or rushing) in four games. And, for just the third time ever, Memphis had three 100-yard performers in the same game as T.J. Pitts rushed for 110 yards and Steven Black and Carlos Singleton totaled 112 and 127 yards, respectively.

TIGER DEFENSE KEY IN USM & UAB WINS

The Tiger defense, which had been decimated by injuries this season, particularly at linebacker, came together and had its best game this season in the 29-26 win over Southern Miss on the road. For the first time in six games, the defense held the opponent below 400 yards of total offense. USM managed just 306 yards (123 passing/147 rushing) and two offensive touchdowns.

A week later, in the crucial win over UAB, the defense held UAB to 338 yards (233 passing/105 rushing). UAB's longest run from scrimmage was 11 yards as the Blazers averaged just 3.5 yards on 30 carries.

Prior to those two contests, the Tigers gave up 841 total rushing yards to Tulane and East Carolina. This season, Memphis held its opponent below 150 yards rushing in six contests, including a season-low of 74 by Ole Miss in the season opener.

REAGAN SETS CAREER HIGH VS UAB

Sophomore kicker Matt Reagan took some heat this season following an early struggle that saw him miss four straight field goals in the first three games of the season. Reagan also missed three PATs, two of which were in the East Carolina loss. He redeemed himself in the UAB victory in which he scored 13 of the Tigers' 25 points.

Against the Blazers, Reagan booted a career-high four field goals and totaled 13 points. He hit FGs of 32 and 21 yards in the second quarter to send Memphis to the locker room with a 13-3 advantage at the half. He had the game's lone score in the third quarter off a 24 yarder and then put the game out of reach with a season-long kick of 38 yards with just four minutes remaining in the game.

Reagan, who was twice named C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week this season, hit multiple field goals in five games this year and the UAB game marked the first time in 2007 that he registered two makes of 30 or more yards. He did it again a week later against SMU.

A native of Knoxville, Tenn., Reagan received his most recent league recognition after equaling his career high of 13 points in the 55-52 win over SMU. He was 7-of-7 on PATs and hit the game-winning 32-yard field goal in the third overtime period.

Reagan was sidelined early in the New Orleans Bowl after taking a hit on a kickoff return that resulted in a concussion. He converted his only PAT prior to his injury and was replaced by senior Joey Mack who booted FGs of 38 and 35 yards.

TIGER RUNNING GAME GETS BOOST

Coach Tommy West was honest about the fact that the Tigers need to run the ball to be successful and to take some pressure off the passing game. This season, Memphis has been held below 100 yards five times this season, including a season-low 26 yards by USM.

The Tigers answered West's challenge against UAB, rolling off 265 yards against the Blazers. Senior Joseph Doss registered his fifth career 100-yard game with 168 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries. His 8.8 yards per carry mark is a career high in games that he has logged at least 15 runs. Sophomore T.J. Pitts tallied 71 yards on 13 carries and backup quarterback Will Hudgens totaled 21 yards and

a touchdown on six carries.

A week later in the triple-OT win over SMU, Memphis rushed for 196 yards on 47 carries behind the efforts of Pitts who rushed for a career-high 110 yards on 19 attempts. He was not dropped for a loss in the game and scored on a 25-yard run in the third quarter.

This season, Memphis rushed for 150-plus yards in five games, including the impressive 265 yards against UAB and the 247 yards in the win over Rice. The U of M also rushed for multiple touchdowns in five games (Ole Miss, JSU, ASU, UAB & SMU). In 13 games, Memphis only rushed for 13 touchdowns and just three of those were for more than 10 yards. The other 10 TD runs were for five or fewer yards.

WEST WINNING IN NOVEMBER

The nation's top teams always seem to peak at the end of the regular season -- the month of November -- and this season, the Tigers did just that, posting a 3-1 record in November. Since West took over in 2001, Memphis is 15-13 in games in the month of November. Prior to West's tenure, the Tigers only had six November victories from 1994-2000 (6-16 record).

HANKINS SETS CAREER HIGH WITH 4 TDs

Quarterback Martin Hankins tossed four touchdowns in the loss to East Carolina, setting a career high for the senior signal caller. He returned one game later to match that total with four in the win over Southern Miss and closed out the year with a four-TD effort versus SMU.

Hankins previously registered games of three TD passes twice in 2007 (vs. Rice & JSU) and five times in his career. His four TD passes tied for second all-time at Memphis in a single game, and marked the first time a Tiger QB had thrown four TDs in a single game since Danny Wimprine did so in the 2004 GMAC Bowl loss to Bowling Green State. No other Tiger QB has registered consecutive games of four TD passes, and Wimprine is the only other Memphis signal caller to log four TD passes in multiple games in the same season (2004).

Prior to Hankins' showing against Southern Miss, the last QB to register four TDs in a Tiger win was Wimprine in a 41-24 victory over ECU in 2003.

KEEPING IT CLEAN

After going three straight games (UCF, ASU, Marshall) without a turnover, the Tigers committed a turnover in five straight games. That streak was snapped when Memphis did not yield a fumble or interception to the UAB Blazers.

Earlier this season, Memphis snapped a 10-game streak of forcing at least one turnover when East Carolina did not yield a miscue in their 56-40 win over the Tigers.

HANKINS MAKES WAY UP UM CHARTS

In five of the last seven games, Martin Hankins passed for 300 or more yards, including his record-setting 416 yards against East Carolina. He also tossed multiple TDs and completed 20 or more passes in six of the last seven games.

With just 23 games in a Tiger uniform, Hankins ranks second all-time in completions (487), yardage (5,770), pass attempts (805) and touchdowns (43). In each category, Hankins is behind Danny Wimprine who was under center for 46 games from 2001-04.

HANKINS HAS BIG DAY VS PIRATES

Martin Hankins registered a career high with 416 yards and four touchdowns against East Carolina. Hankins completed 34 of 60 passes and threw two picks in the 56-40 loss. The 60 attempts equaled his career high, which he posted in the first game against Ole Miss. Hankins is the first Tiger in school history to pass for 400 yards in a single game. He surpassed Danny Wimprine who held the record with 398 yards in 2003 against Mississippi State. The four touchdowns is the most for a Tiger signal caller since Wimprine threw for four TDs versus Bowling Green State in the 2004 GMAC Bowl.

Hankins also takes over as the record holder in most offensive plays with 68 and in total offense with 405 yards.

KASSER IS DEFENSIVE SPARK

Linebacker Jake Kasser was a defensive force in the last two games of the 2006 season and continued that role through 2007. Against Ole Miss, Kasser logged seven tackles and two fumble recoveries and he tied his career

high with 11 tackles against both Jacksonville State and Marshall. Kasser later upped his career high with a 12-tackle effort in the win over Tulane, and once again **set a new personal best with his 13-tackle performance in the win over UAB.** In his last 15 career games, Kasser has totaled 119 tackles, three sacks and four fumble recoveries.

TIGERS SNAP TURNOVER STREAK

Up until the 2007 East Carolina game, Memphis had forced at least one turnover in 10 straight contests. During that streak, the last opponent to not give up a fumble or an interception was UCF during the 2006 season. UCF won the meeting 26-24 and it was a clean game for both sides as neither squad produced a turnover.

East Carolina did not toss an interception or lose a fumble in the Nov. 3 win over the Tigers, thus snapping Memphis' 10-game streak of forced turnovers.

KASSER SEMIFINALIST FOR DRADDY TROPHY

Senior linebacker Jake Kasser was one of four C-USA football players who was a semifinalist for the Draddy Trophy as announced by the National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame. Kasser is the third Memphis Tiger in as many years to be selected as a semifinalist for the prestigious scholarship award. Kicker Stephen Gostkowski was a semifinalist in 2005 and deep snapper Rusty Clayton made the cut in 2006. Kasser holds a 3.47 grade point average in accounting and expects to graduate in May 2008. One of college football's most sought after and competitive awards, the Draddy Trophy recognizes an individual as the absolute best in the country for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary community leadership.

HUGDENS REPLACED INJURED HANKINS VS MARSHALL AND MIDDLE TENNESSEE

Junior Will Hudgens started the Marshall and Middle Tennessee games at quarterback. He replaced Martin Hankins who suffered a hip injury against Arkansas State and had been limited at practice. Hudgens passed for 346 yards in the win over Marshall but connected on just 13 of his 35 attempts for 134 yards in the loss to MT. Hankins returned as the Tigers' starting signal caller and led Memphis to wins in five of the last seven games, turning in 300-yard passing performances in five contests.

A TOUGH STRETCH

The Tigers went through a tough stretch of games that ultimately had them playing three contests in just 11 days. The situation came about from a weather postponement of the ASU-Memphis game in Jonesboro that was originally scheduled for Sept. 8. After a three-hour delay university officials from both sides agreed to move the game to Sept. 27, which was right in between Memphis' road meeting with UCF on Sept. 22 and its home ESPN2-televised game with Marshall on Tuesday, October 2.

The U of M dropped the conference opener with UCF, 56-20, and then five days later suffered a heartbreaking loss at Arkansas State -- a game in which Memphis was up 31-6 at the half, 35-31.

Three days after the Tigers lost to ASU,

they were grieving the loss of a teammate when reserve defensive lineman Taylor Bradford was shot and killed on campus Sunday night. The decision was made to go on with the Marshall game that was scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 2, on ESPN. The Tigers pulled together and snapped the two-game losing skid with an emotional 24-21 win over the Thundering Herd.

TIGERS MOURN THE LOSS OF TEAMMATE

On Sunday, Sept. 30, reserve defensive lineman Taylor Bradford was killed in an act of violence on the U of M campus. The Tigers rallied together and mourned their fallen teammate in a campus vigil held Monday evening and several players and members of the coaching staff traveled to Nashville for the funeral on Oct. 6. A memorial service was held on campus Wednesday, Oct. 10.

HUGDENS HAS STRONG SHOWING IN WIN

Junior Will Hudgens got his first start at quarterback since 2005 when he opened the Marshall game under center in place of Martin Hankins who was injured in the Arkansas State contest. Hudgens started two games in 2005 when Patrick Byrne was injured in the season opener and then suffered a season-ending injury in his second game as the starter (vs. Tulsa).

In the 24-21 win over Marshall, Hudgens completed 30 of 45 pass attempts for 346 yards and two touchdowns -- all of which were career highs for the junior who missed a majority of the last two seasons after suffering a broken leg in both 2005 and 2006. He completed four passes in the game for more than 30 yards, and completed TD passes of 19 and four yards. Hudgens' 346 yards ranks 9th all-time at Memphis, while his 30 completions ranks seventh all-time. He did not toss an interception in the victory and finished the game having completed 67 percent of his passes.

BARNETT GRABS FUMBLE RECORD

Defensive lineman Freddie Barnett registered his first career fumble recovery and returned the ball 88 yards for a touchdown with just over a minute remaining in the first half against Arkansas State. The return was the longest fumble recovery in school history, surpassing the previous record of 84 yards by Corey Irby in 1999 against Louisville. The last time that Memphis returned a fumble for a touchdown was against Arkansas State in 2004 on a 10-yard return by Tim Goodwell.

TRIPLE THREAT

For the first time since at least 1965, three Tiger quarterbacks threw touchdown passes in a single game when Memphis accomplished this feat in the loss at UCF. All three scores were in the second half. Starter Martin Hankins connected with Carlos Singleton for a 17-yard TD in the third quarter and redshirt freshman Matt Malouf logged a four-yard strike to Earnest Williams at the start of the fourth quarter. Back-up QB Will Hudgens rounded out the trio with a 10-yard pass to Dave Thomas with just under six minutes remaining in the game.

50-50

Against Arkansas State and Jacksonville State Maurice Jones caught passes of 50-plus yards. He scored on a 58-yard pass from Martin



Hankins against JSU for a new career high and logged a 56-yard reception versus ASU on Memphis' first play of the game, ultimately setting up a Tiger TD. Jones ended his junior season third in receiving yards with 639 and was fourth in receptions with 37. He left the New Orleans Bowl with a dislocated hip after snagging just one reception for five yards.

Jones had multiple receptions in each of the first five games of the season, but was held without a catch by Middle Tennessee. He did, though, log his second pass completion of the season in that game when he tossed a 23-yard pass back to QB Will Hudgens.

Jones answered the MT game with three receptions for 74 yards and a TD against Rice and registered his first career 100-yard game with 117 yards on four catches in the win over Tulane. He closed out the season on a seven-game receiving streak.

DOSS FROM THE RUN

Senior tailback Joseph Doss scored his 10th career rushing touchdown in the season opener against Ole Miss and his 11th in the loss at ASU. He was held scoreless by Marshall and Middle Tennessee before he logged his 12th career rushing TD versus Rice. His 13th career TD run came on a two-yard scamper against East Carolina and he had a long TD run of 20 yards in the fourth quarter against UAB for his 14th career score from the run. He scored from the run in 10 of his last 18 career games. Doss missed the Jacksonville State game with a knee injury and was held scoreless by UCF. It was the first time he was held scoreless from the run since the Arkansas State game in 2006 -- though he did score on a 37-yard pass from receiver Ryan Scott. For his career, Doss totals 16 career TDs (14 rushing, 2 receiving).

SINGLETON SCORES LATE IN SEASON

Carlos Singleton scored in five of the last six games of '07 and registered multiple receptions in all 13 games. He scored multiple touchdowns in three games this season (vs ECU, USM and SMU) and led Memphis in scoring by a non-kicker. He tied a school record when he caught his third touchdown pass in the third quarter against SMU. He tied five other Tigers who have scored three receiving touchdowns in a single game, and the last one to do so was Russell Copeland against Tennessee in 1992.

Against the Mustangs, Singleton hauled in three receptions on Memphis' second drive of the second quarter, including a 20-yard touchdown catch with 7:30 remaining in the first half. He also scored on an 11-yard reception with 10:27 left in the third quarter and on a 40-yard reception with 2:15 left in the third. He finished the day with eight catches for a career-high 127 yards and three touchdowns.

MIXIN' IT UP

Memphis used a 14 play, 72-yard drive with three different quarterbacks under center on its first drive of the SMU game to tie the score at 7-all. Will Hudgens scored his second rushing touchdown of the season on a one-yard scamper with 7:01 left in the first quarter. Hudgens came in again and tossed a seven-yard TD strike to Earnest Williams to give the Tigers a 14-7 advantage with 0:23 remaining in the first quarter.

DOWN BUT NOT OUT

The Tigers were down 28-21 to SMU at the half and managed to score 21 points in the third quarter to remain in the tight contest. The SMU game was the first contest this season that Memphis had been down at the half and came back to win. Earlier in the year, Memphis had dropped decisions to Ole Miss, UCF and East Carolina -- all games which Memphis trailed heading into the third period.

PITTS SETS CAREER HIGH VS SMU

T.J. Pitts rushed for his first TD of the season; the second of his career, when he broke loose up the middle on a 25-yard score with 4:50 left in the third quarter against SMU. Pitts' first career TD was in the season finale last year against UTEP. The 25-yard run tied his career high for long runs, which was also against the Miners in 2006. Pitts ended the day with a career-high 110 yards on 19 carries. This was the second straight game that Memphis has had a 100-yard rusher.

WEAVER & MCDONALD SACK SMU

Sophomore defensive lineman Josh Weaver was credited with his second sack of the season when he dropped SMU's Justin Willis for a loss of six yards on 2nd-and-3 from the SMU 34. Junior Clinton McDonald registered his third sack of the season when he stopped Willis for a loss of six yards on 3rd-and-6 from the SMU 29 near the end of the third quarter.

HANKINS TOSSES 4 TDS FOR THIRD TIME

The SMU game marked the third time in 2007 that Martin Hankins tossed four touchdown passes. He completed 30 of his 59 pass attempts for 336 yards against the Mustangs. It was his sixth 300-yard passing game of the season. With his three TD passes in the bowl game, Hankins finished his senior season with 25 TD passes for a school record, surpassing the previous record of 23 that was set by Danny Wimprine in 2002.

SINGLETON HITS 1,000 YARDS

With his 127 yards receiving against SMU, Carlos Singleton became the second Tiger on the 2007 squad to hit the 1,000-yard receiving mark. He ranks 17th all-time in the Tiger record book with 1,067 yards on 73 receptions.

Earlier this year, Duke Calhoun became the 20th Tiger in school history to amass 1,000 yards receiving.

TIGERS SNAP STREAK WITH WIN OVER UAB

The 25-9 win over UAB marked the first time in eight meetings that the Tigers have defeated the Blazers. The only other win that Memphis has over UAB at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium was during the 1997 season. The win was a first for head coach Tommy West over the Blazers.

TIGERS CELEBRATE 425TH WIN

The win over UAB on Nov. 17 marked the 900th game for the Tigers, but more importantly, it was the program's 425th victory since the Tigers fielded a squad in 1912.

HUDGENS PLAYS ROLE WELL VS UAB

The Tigers used a dual-QB attack in the UAB game, using Will Hudgens several times for ground yardage. The first time he came in the game was in the first quarter on 2nd-and-8 from the Memphis 3. Hudgens rushed nine yards for the first down and ran for three yards on the next play. He came in again in the second quarter and registered his first career rushing touchdown when he pushed the pile for a one-yard score with 12:54 left in the half. Hudgens finished the day with six carries for 21 yards and one score.

MILLS AND PATTERSON HAVE PICKS

Early in the third quarter defensive end Corey Mills picked off UAB signal caller Sam Hunt at the Memphis 34-yard line and made a nine-yard return for his first career interception.

Later in the fourth quarter, Brandon Patterson intercepted Hunt's pass with 2:18 remaining in the game to end a UAB drive that stalled at 2nd-and-4 from the Memphis 5. It was Patterson's eighth career interception and his third on the season.

UAB STOPS TIGER PASSING TDS

The UAB meeting was the first and only game this season that the Tigers did not have a passing touchdown. The last time that Memphis did not have a passing TD was in the 2006 season finale against UTEP. In that game, Memphis scored five TDs from the run. The UAB game was also the fourth contest this season that Memphis has scored multiple touchdowns from the run.

HANKINS HITS 5,000-YD MILESTONE

With his 298 yards passing in the UAB game, Martin Hankins reached a key milestone and became the second Tiger signal caller in school history to pass for 5,000 or more yards. The other was Danny Wimprine who totaled 10,215 yards in 46 games under center from 2001-04.

Hankins closed out his career with 5,770 yards and completed 487 of his 805 pass attempts.

WILLIAMS CREDITED WITH BLOCK

Junior defensive end Ryan Williams, who missed the Southern Miss game with a knee sprain, was credited with a blocked PAT in the fourth quarter against UAB. The block was originally credited as a team block, but video showed Williams going air and getting his hand on the ball.

PITTS RUSHES FOR CAREER HIGHS IN FINAL TWO GAMES

T.J. Pitts helped the Tigers run for 265 yards against the UAB Blazers when he tallied a then career-high 71 yards on 13 carries. A week later, he came in off the bench against SMU and rushed for 110 yards and one touchdown on 19 carries. He was not dropped for a loss of yardage in the SMU contest.

Pitts, who finished his freshman campaign in 2006 with just 22 carries for 98 yards, registered double-digit carries in eight games in '07.

Pitts had just one carry for zero yardage in the New Orleans Bowl before leaving the game with a broken ankle. He finished his sophomore season with 481 yards on 106 carries.



MALOUF KEY IN TOUGH FIELD POSITION

Freshman quarterback Matt Malouf was clearly an all-purpose threat for the Tigers having rushed for three touchdowns and passed for two. Against UAB, Malouf was key in setting UAB up with tough field position as he punted twice and dropped the ball inside the 10 both times.

In the first quarter with Memphis' drive stalled at the 50, Malouf set his punt on the UAB 1 and the Blazers ran 13 plays before being forced to punt. Malouf was called to the field again in the third quarter and put UAB on their own 7. The Blazers went three and out on that drive.

HOME SWEET HOME

Martin Hankins returned home to Hattiesburg, Miss., and had a strong showing in leading Memphis to a come-from-behind win over Southern Miss on the road. The Tigers were down 26-14 and Hankins led Memphis to scores in their final two drives of the game. He passed for four touchdowns for the second straight game and his 396 yards passing is the third-highest single-game total in school history.

Hankins put Memphis up 7-0 to start the game with a 65-yard TD pass to Duke Calhoun for his longest pass play of the season. He then secured the victory with a 52-yard pass to Carlos Singleton under heavy pressure with just over a minute remaining in the game. In the game, he completed 35 of his 48 pass attempts, with the 35 completions ranking second in school history. Hankins also connected on seven passes over 15 yards and 19 over 10 yards in leading Memphis to its second straight win over USM in Hattiesburg for the first time in school history.

HINDS AND ROCKETTE HAVE FIRST STARTS

Fullback Greg Hinds and linebacker Jeremy Rockette got their first starts of the season in the Southern Miss game. Rockette ended the day with seven tackles, five of which were solo stops, and Hinds had two carries and one reception.

AT 6-8, SINGLETON IS GO-TO GUY

Carlos Singleton scored his second touchdown of the game with a little more than a minute left in the fourth quarter against USM on a 52-yard reception. Singleton totaled five catches for 96 yards versus the Golden Eagles. In 2007, Singleton scored multiple TDs against East Carolina, USM and SMU. He also scored in five of the last six games of the season.

TIGERS GO FOR TWO

Maurice Jones caught a two-point conversion in the fourth quarter against USM to give Memphis a three-point lead with 1:04 left in the game. It was his first two-point conversion in 2007, while three of the conversions were passes to Singleton. Memphis failed on its seventh conversion attempt of the year against UAB and was 5 of 7 this season.

A BIG WIN IN HATTIESBURG

Not only was the win over Southern Miss big because Martin Hankins was playing in front of his hometown crowd, but it was also the second straight win for the Tigers in Hattiesburg. The Tigers won 24-22 in 2005.

Before those two wins, Southern Miss was 18-1 against Memphis in Hattiesburg.

FORD HAS FIRST PICK VERSUS USM

Senior cornerback LaKeitharun Ford came up with a crucial interception in the final minute of the Southern Miss game that gave Memphis the ball back with 47 seconds remaining on the clock. Ford picked off Jeremy Young on USM's first play of their final drive for his first interception of the year and the second of his career.

HUDGENS AT FULLBACK VS ECU

Senior fullback Greg Hinds was suspended and did not see action in the Homecoming contest versus ECU. He was replaced at fullback by quarterback/deep snapper Will Hudgens who caught his second pass of the season in the game. He snagged a six-yard pass from Martin Hankins in Memphis' first drive of the game. Hinds was back in uniform versus USM and started at fullback in that contest.

REAGAN HITS 37 YD FG AGAINST ECU

Sophomore kicker Matt Reagan put the first points on the board for Memphis with his 37-yard field goal with 10:36 remaining in the first quarter. The 37-yard make was a season-long for Reagan, though one week later against UAB he connected on a 38-yard attempt.

Reagan, however, missed two PATs in the USM game, marking the first time since the Louisville game in 2002 that Memphis had missed two PATs. The kicker in that game was current New England Patriots kicker Stephen Gostkowski who was a freshman for the Tigers in 2002. In that game, he had one kick blocked and missed an attempt in the fourth quarter.

JONES HAS FIRST KICK RETURNS

Maurice Jones registered his first career kick return when he replaced Earnest Williams in the second quarter against ECU. Williams left the game following an injury he suffered on a punt return at the end of the first quarter. Jones had 11 yards on his only punt return, and ended the day with three kickoff returns for 36 yards.

HARRIS SEES ACTION VERSUS ECU

Redshirt freshman Henry Harris (Memphis, TN) recorded his first kickoff return in the third quarter against ECU. Harris, who saw action against both Ole Miss and Jacksonville State, returned the ball 21 yards. It was his only return of the game.

SINGLETON HAS CAREER DAY IN LOSS TO ECU

Carlos Singleton caught touchdown passes of five and 14 yards against East Carolina, marking the first game that the sophomore from Brownsville, Tenn., has caught two TD passes in a single game. Singleton ended the day with 100 yards on six receptions for his first 100-yard receiving game.

With Duke Calhoun turning in 107 receiving yards, this was the first game since 2003 that Memphis had two receivers with 100 yards in a single game. That year, Darron White and Darren Garcia totaled 102 and 104 yards, respectively against Mississippi State. *The Tigers accomplished that feat again in the season finale versus SMU when Steven Black had 112 yards on 12 catches and Singleton tallied 127 yards on eight receptions.*

TIGER DEFENSE ALLOWS 600 YARDS

For the second time this season, the Memphis defense allowed over 600 yards of total offense when ECU racked up 641 yards in the 56-40 win. Earlier in the year, Memphis allowed UCF to roll off 601 yards. ECU registered 494 yards on the ground for the first time a Memphis opponent has rushed for over 400 yards since 1982 when Georgia tallied 408 yards. In that game, Georgia's Hershel Walker totaled 219 yards on 33 carries.

KNOCKUM SCORES FIRST CAREER TD

Senior Taz Knockum scored his first career touchdown on a 1-yard catch with 2:38 left in the game against ECU. He finished the game with a career-high three receptions. The Tigers opted to go for the conversion following the touchdown, with Martin Hankins completing a pass to Carlos Singleton. It was Singleton's third conversion catch of the season.

MEMPHIS SCORES 40 IN LOSS TO ECU

Memphis scored 40 points in the ECU game, marking the first time since 2005 that the Tigers scored 40 or more points. Memphis defeated Chattanooga, 59-14, in the second game of the 2005 season. The last time Memphis scored 40 or more points in a conference game was in a 56-49 loss to then 14th-ranked Louisville in 2004.

Three games later, the Tigers scored 55 points in the triple overtime win over SMU.

This marked the first time since 2004 that Memphis had scored 40-plus points in more than one C-USA contest. That season, Memphis defeated Houston (41-14) and Tulane (49-24) and lost to Louisville (56-49).

BELL IN FIRST START VS TULANE

Junior Tony Bell registered his first start of the season when he was in at safety for Alton Starr. Bell finished the game with four tackles, one for a loss of a yard, and one pass breakup.

HANKINS IS KEY TO WIN OVER TULANE

Martin Hankins led Memphis to a 28-27 win over Tulane on the road with his then career-high 355-yard passing effort. Hankins recorded his third 300-yard passing game of the season, and his second consecutive 300-yard performance. He connected on four passes over 40 yards and 10 of his completions were for 10 or more yards. Hankins was responsible for 11 of Memphis' 17 total first downs. *Hankins returned a week later to up his career high with 416 yards passing in the loss to East Carolina.*

Hankins passed for 231 yards in the first half of the game against the Green Wave, marking the first time since the Marshall game last season that he had passed for 200 or more yards in a single half. His two passing scores were with the clock winding down for the half and at the end of the game. He logged a 47-yard completion to Earnest Williams with 39 seconds remaining in the second quarter to give Memphis the 14-13 advantage at halftime, and then secured the win with a five-yard pass to Duke Calhoun with 36 seconds remaining in the game. Hankins completed 66 percent of his passes (25-of-38) and averaged 14.2 yards per completion.



TIGERS GET BACK-TO-BACK ROAD WINS

With consecutive road wins over Rice and Tulane, the Tigers won two straight road games for the first time since late in the 2004 season. In the final two regular season contests, Memphis defeated East Carolina (38-35) and USF (31-15).

Memphis improved on that streak with a 29-26 win over Southern Miss in Hattiesburg, marking the first time since 2003 that the Tigers have strung together three straight road wins.

MAKE THAT TWO FOR E-WILL

Receiver Earnest Williams logged his first rushing touchdown of the season on a 3-yard reverse with 11:47 remaining in the second quarter against Tulane. It was his fourth career rushing TD and his eighth overall career score. Williams scored later in the quarter off a 47-yard pass from Martin Hankins.

Williams was the first Tiger to score two touchdowns in a single game this season. One game later versus ECU, Carlos Singleton caught two TD passes and became the first Tiger this season to register two receiving touchdowns. He did it again one game later in the win over Southern Miss and caught three TD passes vs SMU.

STARR PICKS OFF GREEN WAVE

Alton Starr was credited with his first career interception when he picked off Anthony Scelfo on 1st-and-10 from the Tulane 33 with just over a minute remaining in the second quarter. Memphis scored on a 47-yard pass from Martin Hankins to Earnest Williams as a result of the turnover and went into the locker room up, 14-13.

The Tiger defense forced its opponents to turn the ball over at least two times in 10 of the 13 games this season. Memphis has also forced at least one turnover in 14 of the last 15 games. The only team in 2007 to not give up a turnover to the Tigers was East Carolina.

JONES IS 2ND TIGER WITH 100 YDS RECEIVING

Receiver Maurice Jones had a career day for the Tigers against Tulane. He totaled a career high 117 yards on four catches, marking the first time Jones had gone over the century mark. This was the second game in a row the Tigers have had a 100-yard receiver as Duke Calhoun posted a 119-yard effort in the win over Rice.

Memphis made it three in a row for a receiver with 100 yards when both Calhoun (107) and Carlos Singleton (100) turned in impressive numbers against East Carolina. It was the first time since the 2003 game against Mississippi State that Memphis had two receivers go over 100 yards in a single game. The Tigers upped the streak to five games when Duke Calhoun logged a career-high 124 yards on eight catches in the win over Southern Miss and then tallied a career-high 159 yards on four receptions against UAB.

The streak was at six games heading into the New Orleans Bowl as Steven Black (12-112) and Carlos Singleton (8-127) had 100-yard efforts in the win over SMU.

DAVIS GETS WORK VS GREEN WAVE

True freshman defensive back Darius Davis logged his first extensive action on defense in the fourth quarter against Tulane. He came in at corner for LeRico Mathis who left the game with a quad strain. Davis broke up a would-be touchdown pass in the quarter on third down. Tulane then missed the ensuing field goal attempt that could have put the game out of reach for Memphis. Davis played in eight games this season, working with the defense and as a member of the special teams unit.

BARNETT HAS FIRST START VS RICE

Junior Freddie Barnett logged his first start of the season when he lined up at defensive tackle against Rice. He had backed up sophomore Steven Turner at that spot in the previous six games. Barnett was credited with two tackles, including a sack for a loss of three yards, in the win over the Owls. Barnett closed out the season having started the last seven straight games on the defensive front.

DOSS HAS CAREER DAY VERSUS OWLS

Senior running back Joseph Doss led the Tigers to a 38-35 victory over Rice in Houston on Oct. 20 as he rushed for a career-high 175 yards on 25 carries. It was the fourth 100-yard rushing effort of his career.

In the victory, Doss rushed for over 20 yards twice and for over 10 yards on eight carries. He scored his third rushing touchdown of the season; the 12th of his career, off a 15-yard run with seven minutes remaining in the third quarter to give Memphis the 28-21 advantage. He averaged 7.3 yards per carry, which was a career high in games that he tallied 20 or more carries. He also was responsible for 10 of Memphis' 30 first downs. In addition, Doss was instrumental in Memphis scoring on 3rd-and-4 from the Rice 45-yard line when he picked up the blitz and came through with a key block to allow quarterback Martin Hankins to reach Maurice Jones for a 45-yard TD that put Memphis ahead 38-28 with just over five minutes remaining in the game.

Doss registered his fifth career 100-yard game in the win over UAB as he totaled 168 yards and a touchdown on 19 carries. Doss was not dropped for a loss the entire game and he had a season-long run of 31 yards in the win.

CALHOUN RECORDS 100-YARD DAY

Sophomore Duke Calhoun recorded his fourth career 100-yard receiving game when he totaled four receptions for 119 yards in the win over Rice on Oct. 20. He went over the century mark for the fifth time in his career when he totaled 107 yards on eight receptions against East Carolina and then tied the school record for career 100-yard games with six after totaling a career-high 124 yards on eight receptions in the win over Southern Miss. Calhoun shattered the record one week later with a career-high 159 yards on four receptions versus UAB.

In two seasons as a Tiger, Calhoun has caught multiple passes in 21 of 24 career games, and led the Tigers in receiving yards in seven of the last nine games.

Calhoun and Joseph Doss (175 rushing) combined for 294 offensive yards against Rice, marking the first time since 2005 that Memphis has had a 100-yard rusher and a 100-yard receiver in the same contest. The last time the

Tigers did that was against Akron in the Motor City Bowl when DeAngelo Williams had 238 yard rushing and Ryan Scott had 103 yard receiving. **The Tigers did it for the second time in 2007 in the win over UAB and the twosome was once again Calhoun (159 receiving) and Doss (168 rushing). And, Memphis closed out the regular season with two 100-yard receivers (Singleton/Black) and a 100-yard rusher (Pitts) in the win over SMU.**

RUSSELL REGISTERS FIRST TD OF '07

Junior tight end Brett Russell caught his first touchdown pass of the season to give Memphis the 7-0 advantage over Rice with six minutes remaining in the first quarter. He caught the 10-yard pass from Martin Hankins, which also marked Hankins' 24th touchdown pass of his career. Russell ended the day with a career-high five catches for 28 yards. He logged multiple receptions in six games in 2007.

MATHIS HAS SECOND INTERCEPTION

Junior LeRico Mathis picked off Rice QB Chase Clement in the second quarter for his second interception of the season. Mathis' first pick of the season was in the win over Marshall on Oct. 2. Mathis started the last nine straight games at cornerback. He left the Tulane game in the fourth quarter with a quad strain.

REAGAN BOOTS THREE FGS AGAINST OWLS

Matt Reagan converted three of his four field goal attempts and was 3-for-3 on PATs to add 12 points in the 38-35 win over Rice on the road. Reagan's missed FG was from 47 yards out, but he converted two kicks of 22 yards and one of 24 yards. His three FGs marked the second time in three games that Reagan has booted three or more field goals. He was named the C-USA Special Teams Player of the Week following the Rice game. It was the first such honor for the sophomore from Knoxville, Tenn. **He upped his career high with four field goals and 13 points in the win over UAB, and received league accolades for the second time this season following his 13-point effort against SMU. He kicked the game-winning field goal in the third overtime versus the Mustangs.**

THREE TOUCHES...THREE SCORES

Senior fullback Greg Hinds caught his third touchdown pass of the season off a six-yard toss from Martin Hankins with 6:29 left in the second quarter against Rice. Hinds' first three receptions this season were for touchdowns as he also scored against Jacksonville State and Marshall. He ended the Rice game with three receptions for 22 yards. For the year, Hinds caught 10 passes and totaled four receiving TDs. **He came up with a big score in the second overtime period against SMU when he hauled in a six-yard TD strike from Martin Hankins.**

TURNER HAS KEY PICK LATE VS RICE

Sophomore defensive lineman Steven Turner registered his first career interception in the fourth quarter on a ball he tipped off a pass by Rice's Chase Clement on 2nd-and-4 from the Memphis 48. The Tigers scored three plays later for the 38-28 advantage with just over five minutes left in the game.



MEMPHIS HAS IMPRESSIVE NUMBERS VS OWLS

The 571 yards of offense that Memphis tallied against Rice is the most for a Tiger squad since 2005 against Akron in the Motor City Bowl when the Tigers put up 516 yards. The total yardage ranks sixth all-time in the Tiger record book. In addition, the Tigers registered eight offensive plays over 20 yards in the key Conference USA victory.

Memphis also hit the 500-yard mark in the final two games of the season. The Tigers ran 71 plays and turned in 563 yards of total offense versus UAB and set a school and C-USA record with 108 plays for 539 yards against SMU.

RAWLS ENTERS STARTING LINEUP VS MIDDLE

Junior Malcom Rawls got his first start as a Tiger in the non-conference meeting with Middle Tennessee. He started at left guard for Dominik Riley who was injured in the Marshall game. Riley did see action in the offensive line later in the game. Rawls is a Memphis native who transferred in 2006 from the University of Tennessee.

JONES TOSSES COMPLETION TO HUDGENS

Junior Maurice Jones registered his second pass completion of the season when he connected with quarterback Will Hudgens for 23 yards on Memphis' first series of the game against Middle Tennessee. Jones is the second receiver this season to complete a pass as Dave Thomas connected with Steven Black for an 80-yard TD against Arkansas State. For the year, Jones completed two of his five pass attempts.

BELL LOGS FIRST PICK VS BLUE RAIDERS

Junior defensive back Tony Bell logged his first interception of the season when he picked off MT's Patrick Honeycutt on the Memphis 19 at the start of the second quarter. Bell was back in the lineup after missing two games with a thigh bruise. Bell recorded his second interception in the SMU victory. Memphis as a team forced its opponent to turn the ball over in 13 of the last 14 games.

GRANDBERRY SCOOPS UP FUMBLE

For eight straight games (incl. 2006), the Tigers recovered a fumble as Michael Grandberry picked up a Middle Tennessee fumble on its punt return and made a two-yard return in the second quarter. The streak was snapped one game later as Rice did not yield a fumble to the Tigers. **In the final NCAA rankings, Memphis was listed 28th in fumbles recovered with 13.**

PATTERSON PICKS OFF BLUE RAIDER

Senior safety Brandon Patterson recorded his second interception of the season when he picked off MT's Dwight Dasher at the Memphis goal line. Memphis turned the ball over on the very next play (fumble by T.J. Pitts) and Middle Tennessee scored for the 14-7 advantage. This was the first time in four games that Memphis had yielded a turnover. Patterson also hauled in a key interception in the fourth quarter in the win over UAB.

KASSER IS SECOND IN RECOVERIES

Senior linebacker Jake Kasser was credited with his third fumble recovery of the season when he picked up the ball knocked loose by Clinton McDonald in the fourth quarter against Middle Tennessee.

DAVIS MAKES FIRST APPEARANCE

True freshman Darius Davis saw his first game action against Middle Tennessee. He was on the kick cover teams for the Tigers and became the fourth true freshman to play in 2007. He also worked some on defense late in the game. Also seeing action this year were defensive lineman Tommy Walker, deep snapper Keenan Bratcher and receiver Curtis Echols.

PITTS SETS CAREER HIGHS IN 2007

Running back T.J. Pitts tied his career high with 14 carries against Middle Tennessee. A week earlier against Marshall, he rushed 14 times for 57 yards. Pitts missed the Tulane and ECU games with an ankle sprain he suffered in the Rice game. He had a breakout game against SMU when he carried the ball 19 times and rushed for 110 yards, including a 25-yard touchdown.

REAGAN BOOTS THREE FGS VS MARSHALL

Sophomore kicker Matt Reagan put the first points on the board for the Tigers when he booted a 25-yard field goal with 12:48 left in the first quarter against the Thundering Herd. Reagan hit a 26 yarder with 7:19 left in the first quarter and added a 30-yard FG with four seconds remaining in the first half. Reagan ended the day 3-for-3 on FGs and 1-for-1 on PATs. This was the fifth time in his short career that Reagan converted multiple field goals in a single game, and was the first time since the 2006 Houston game in which he was 2-of-4 on FGs. **Reagan also converted three field goals in the win over Rice, booted two in the loss to East Carolina and set a new career best with four field goals in the win over UAB. His two field goals late against SMU were key in the Tiger win.**

MATHIS PICKS OFF MARSHALL'S MORRIS

Junior college transfer LeRico Mathis registered his first career interception when he picked off Marshall signal caller Bernard Morris at the Memphis 46-yard line in the first quarter. The Marshall game also marked Mathis' first career start in a Tiger uniform. Mathis started the final nine straight games at corner and picked up his second interception of the season against Rice.

SINGLETON MAKES BIG PLAYS VS HERD

Sophomore receiver Carlos Singleton hauled in a 19-yard touchdown pass from Will Hudgens with 6:52 remaining in the third quarter against Marshall. It was Singleton's second TD catch of the year and the fourth of his career. Singleton was also the recipient of the pass from Hudgens for the two-point conversion. Later in the season against Rice and ECU, Singleton was again on the receiving end of a two-point conversion as the Tigers were 5-of-7 on 2-point attempts.

Singleton caught four passes for 63 yards and a TD in the New Orleans Bowl to extend his receiving streak to 21 games.

He led the Tigers in scoring by a non-kicker with 72 points. He hit the century mark for the first time in his career with 100 yards receiving against ECU and also was the first Tiger to total two TD receptions in a single game this year with his 5-yard and 14-yard scores versus the Pirates. He recorded two TD catches one game later against USM and had a 124-yard, three TD effort in the overtime contest with SMU.

TIGERS LET 25-POINT LEAD SLIP BY

The Tigers were ahead by 25 points, 31-6, at halftime and allowed ASU 29 points in the second half. It was the largest halftime lead Memphis had given up in at least 48 years. The last time Memphis gave up a substantial lead was in 2006 against East Carolina when the Tigers were up by 13, 20-7 at the half, and ECU came back to win the game 35-20.

TRICKY TIGERS

Tiger receivers came through with some big passing plays against Arkansas State that led to Memphis leading 31-6 at the half. On Memphis' first drive of the second quarter on first and 10 from the 20, Dave Thomas received a lateral from Martin Hankins and tossed his second career touchdown pass when he reached Steven Black for an 80-yard score to give Memphis the 17-3 advantage with 13:52 remaining in the second quarter. Thomas had previously tossed an eight-yard pass to Carlos Singleton in the Ole Miss game last season. The 80-yard pass was the longest play from scrimmage for the Tigers this season. The last time Memphis logged an 80-yard pass play was on a Hankins to Ryan Scott 82-yard pass against UAB last season.

On Memphis' next series, Maurice Jones took the handoff from Matt Malouf and then logged his first career completion when he connected back with Malouf on a 19-yard pass.

BIG GUY GETS BIG RETURN VS ASU

Defensive lineman Freddie Barnett (6-2, 300) registered his first career fumble recovery and returned the ball 88 yards for a touchdown with just over a minute remaining in the first half against Arkansas State. The return was the longest fumble recovery in school history, surpassing the previous record of 84 yards by Corey Irby in 1999 against Louisville. The last time that Memphis returned a fumble for a touchdown was against Arkansas State in 2004 on a 10-yard return by Tim Goodwell.

SPECIAL TEAMS WOES

Memphis gave up a punt return for an 89-yard touchdown in the third quarter against ASU, marking the first time since 2004 (East Carolina) that a Tiger opponent had returned a punt for a score. Earlier in the season opener against Ole Miss, the Rebels blocked a Tiger punt and landed on the ball in the endzone for a touchdown.

TERRELL AND MILLS TEAM UP ON ASU

Defensive lineman Greg Terrell forced ASU quarterback Corey Leonard into a fumble and in doing so recorded his third career forced fumble. The ball was recovered by Corey Mills in his first-ever fumble recovery.

Memphis recovered a fumble in each of the first six games this season, and registered multiple fumble recoveries in four games.



GRANDBERRY POSTS 100-PLUS YARDS

Michael Grandberry had his third career 100-yard kickoff return game with his career-high 160 yards on eight returns versus UCF. His eight returns tied a Memphis record set by Antoine Harden against Tennessee in 2001.

Grandberry set a new standard with his school-record 168 yards on six returns against Southern Miss. The previous Tiger record was 167 yards set by Jerry Harris against Southern Miss in 1983.

With his 153 yards on eight returns against FAU in the New Orleans Bowl, **Grandberry holds the school record with eight career games of 100-plus yards.**

TIGERS SHATTER RETURN RECORD

The Tigers set a school record with 214 kickoff return yards in the UCF meeting on Sept. 22. The previous record was 196 yards set in 2002 against Cincinnati. Memphis tied the record for kickoff returns in a game with nine, which has been done three other times in the program's history.

KNOCKUM HAS LONG CATCH VS UCF

Senior receiver Taz Knockum registered a career high with a 48-yard reception from Martin Hankins in the third quarter against UCF. His previous long catch was 17 yards against UAB in 2005. The catch was the first of the year for the reserve wideout. **Knockum logged his first TD catch of his career when he scored on a 1-yard pass from Martin Hankins late in the ECU game.**

MALOUF MAKING PLAYS

Redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Malouf registered his first pass completion of his career in the fourth quarter against UCF and it was for a touchdown to Earnest Williams. The four-yard strike to Williams marked his first touchdown of the season also.

Malouf tossed his second touchdown pass of the year in the win over Tulane when he reached Carlos Singleton for a five-yard score in the third quarter to put Memphis up, 21-20.

THREE QBs TOSS TDS VERSUS UCF

Three different quarterbacks registered passing touchdowns in the loss at UCF. Martin Hankins connected with Carlos Singleton in the third quarter for Memphis' first score of the game. Matt Malouf recorded his first career TD on a four-yard pass to Earnest Williams in the fourth quarter, and Will Hudgens hit Dave Thomas from 10 yards out late in the fourth quarter for his first TD pass since 2005.

TIGERS TAKE HEAVY DEFICIT AT HALF

For the second time in three games, the Tigers were down by 20 or more points in the first half vs UCF. In the season opener against Ole Miss, the Tigers went into the locker room at the half down 20-0. Against UCF, the Tigers were down 42-0 at the half, marking the biggest deficit since 1997. That year Memphis was down 42-0 when Michigan State scored 28 in the first quarter and 14 in the second quarter at Spartan Stadium in East Lansing, Michigan. MSU won the game 51-21.

UCF USES HEFTY GROUND FOR WIN

UCF running back Kevin Smith, who entered the contest as the national leader in rushing with an average of 183 yards per game,

managed 124 yards on 22 carries. He only carried the ball once in the second half. UCF did, however, roll off 313 total rushing yards and seven touchdowns, marking the first time since 1978 (Texas A&M) that a Tiger opponent rushed for seven scores. The 313 yards on the ground by UCF also was the first time an opponent rushed for 300-plus yards since TCU rolled off 350 yards against Memphis in 2002. In addition, UCF's 601 yards of total offense was the first time a Tiger foe had 600-plus yards of total offense since Texas A&M's 615-yard effort in 1978.

Memphis faced another running back that was leading the nation in the Tulane game on Oct. 27. Matt Forte' rushed for 278 of Tulane's 350 yards on the ground, but it wasn't enough to secure the win for the Green Wave. In 2007, three opponents (UCF, MT, Tulane & ECU) rushed for 250-plus yards and Memphis held six to under 150 yards (Ole Miss, ASU, Rice, USM, UAB & FAU).

ECU used its ground game in the 56-40 win over Memphis as the Pirates totaled 491 yards on the ground, led by Chris Johnson's 301 yards.

TWO VERY DIFFERENT HALVES

The momentum never seemed to swing in the Tigers' direction in the first half against UCF, which saw the Knights go up 42-0 at the half. In the first half, Memphis had just four first downs, 57 yards of offense, was forced to punt the ball four times and held the ball seven minutes less than the Knights (Memphis had the ball for a mere 2:22 in the first quarter). UCF on the other hand went into the break with 16 first downs, 330 yards of offense and did not have to punt the ball.

Fast-forward to the second half, and the Tigers showed they were trying to claw their way back from a 42-point deficit. In the final two quarters, Memphis scored three receiving touchdowns and held UCF to just two scores. In addition, Memphis tallied 15 first downs and 246 yards of offense in the second half and only had to punt the ball two times, while converting 4-of-8 third down attempts in the second half. The Memphis defense also forced UCF to turn the ball over three times in the third quarter, but the 42 points proved difficult to recover from.

PITTS HAS SECOND CAREER START VS JSU

Sophomore T.J. Pitts got his second career start at tailback against Jacksonville State. He replaced senior Joseph Doss who was out with a knee injury. Pitts finished the night with a then career-high 11 rushes for a career-best 52 yards. **He later upped his mark with 14 carries for 57 yards against Marshall and turned in his first 100-yard performance with 110 yards on 19 carries against SMU.**

MEMPHIS HAS FIRST BLOCKED PUNT SINCE '03

Junior defensive back Tony Bell blocked Zach Walden's punt which was ultimately recovered by Walden at the JSU 21. The last time that Memphis blocked a punt was in 2003 against Southern Miss.

TIGERS GET BIG RETURN FROM E-WILL

Junior Earnest Williams busted off a 52-yard punt return in the third quarter against Jacksonville State, and helped set up the 20-yard touchdown run by Greg Hinds two plays

later. The return was the longest for the Tigers since Darron White made a 60 yard return against Tulane in 2004.

ONE PLAY IN, AND A SCORE

Senior fullback Greg Hinds made his first appearance of the season in the third quarter against JSU, and on his first play on offense, he caught a 20-yard touchdown pass from Martin Hankins. It was Hinds' first career touchdown and just his 10th career reception. Hinds was on defense for the Tigers up until fall camp last season when he transitioned from linebacker to fullback.

MALOUF IS VERSATILE THREAT

Redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Malouf is going to have a hard time "sneaking around" on offense as long as he continues to make plays. Against Jacksonville State, Malouf came in on third-and-three at the start of the fourth quarter and gave the Tigers the boost they needed with a 12-yard run for a first down. Three plays later, Malouf logged his second TD of the season when he dashed 38 yards on a third-and-four situation. In addition, Malouf had lined up at QB for a punt in the third quarter and logged a 41-yard kick for a touchback.

Malouf tossed his second TD pass - a five-yard strike - in the third quarter in the win over Tulane.

STATS DON'T ALWAYS LEAD TO WIN

If you look at the team statistics from the Tigers' season opener with Ole Miss, you would think that there may have been a typo in the score. Memphis was left with a 23-21 loss despite leading in first downs (30-19), rushing yards (124-74), passing yards (343-201), total offense (467-275), total plays (96-59) and time of possession (33:11-26:49). Key miscues including four interceptions, one of which was for a 99-yard touchdown return, a blocked punt for a TD and a missed 25-yard field goal all led to the final outcome. Despite being down 23-0 at one point in the third quarter, the Tigers continued to claw their way back and held Ole Miss to just three points in the second half.

DEFENSIVE EFFORT KEEPS TIGERS IN THE GAME

The Tiger defense did about as good a job as they could do to keep the Tigers in the season opener with Ole Miss. Memphis limited Ole Miss' key running back BenJarvus Green-Ellis to just 79 yards and forced the Rebels into three fumbles. In addition, the Tiger defense sacked QB Seth Adams twice and limited the Rebels to just one offensive touchdown (a 16-yd pass early in the 1st quarter) on the day. The Rebels also only totaled two plays over 20 yards (a 21-yard run and a 23-yard reception) in the game.

FOUR TIGERS HAVE FIRST CAREER STARTS VS REBELS

Four Tigers, two on offense and two on defense made their first career starts in the season opener versus Ole Miss. On the offensive side of the ball, redshirt freshman Dominik Riley started at left guard and junior college transfer Steven Black started at receiver. On defense, redshirt freshman Winston Bowers had his first start at middle linebacker and Ole Miss transfer Dontae Reed started at safety.



CALHOUN TIES RECORD VS OLE MISS

Sophomore receiver Duke Calhoun registered 10 receptions for 87 yards against Ole Miss, tying the No. 2 single-game receiving record at Memphis. Calhoun is tied with seven other former Tigers and is the first receiver to log 10 catches since Darron White caught 10 passes versus Mississippi State in 2003. Maurice Avery holds the record with 13 receptions against UAB in 2003.

TIGERS RECOVER THREE FUMBLES

Senior linebackers Quinton McCrary and Jake Kasser accounted for three fumble recoveries in the loss to Ole Miss. Kasser had two recoveries to his credit, both of which were in the third quarter. Kasser picked up the fumble that was forced by Tyler Griffin on the opening kickoff and then just minutes later recovered another fumble on Ole Miss' first drive of the third quarter when Mike Wallace was jolted by Greg Jackson. Kasser's two recoveries ranks in a tie for second all-time in the Tiger record book.

BLOCKED PUNT LEADS TO TD

Punter Brent Sutherland was blocked on his first attempt in the second quarter and Ole Miss returned the ball for a TD. It was the first time that Memphis had been blocked on a punt since the Louisville game in 2003. The last time that a Tiger opponent returned a blocked punt for a touchdown was in 2002 -- also against Louisville.

REBELS TURN PICK INTO 99-YARD TD

Martin Hankins was picked off for the second interception of the Ole Miss game at the 1-yard line in the second quarter by Dustin Mouzon who returned the ball 99 yards for a touchdown. It ties the longest return (INT or fumble) for a TD against Memphis at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium, which was set by Izell McGill (Mississippi St.) off a 99-yard fumble return in 1996. The most recent longest interception return for an opponent was by Tennessee (Art Reynolds) in 1972, which was a 96-yard return.

MALOUF SNEAKS IN FOR SIX

Freshman Matt Malouf lined up at quarterback and rushed four yards for his first career touchdown with just over 10 minutes left in the fourth quarter against Ole Miss. Malouf is a redshirt freshman from Oxford, Miss. He also booted a punt to the 8-yard line in his collegiate debut.

TIGERS SET RECORD FOR PLAYS

The Tigers ran a record-setting 96 plays against Ole Miss in the season opener. It surpasses the previous record which was 92 plays set against Murray State in 1985, and marks only the fourth time in school history Memphis has run 90 or more plays.

Memphis closed out the regular season with a U of M and Conference USA record 108 plays in the triple OT win over SMU.

MAKE IT THREE IN A ROW FOR BLOCKED FGS

In the final two games of the 2006 season, the Tigers blocked field goal attempts against Houston (returned for a TD) and UTEP. Memphis upped the streak to three games when Greg Terrell was credited with the block of Joshua Shene's 28-yard attempt in the fourth quarter against Ole Miss.

HANKINS ON DAVEY O'BRIEN LIST

Senior Martin Hankins was one of four quarterbacks in Conference USA to earn recognition on the preseason watch list for the 2007 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award, presented annually to the nation's best college signal caller. In his first season as the Tigers' starting quarterback after transferring from Southeastern Louisiana, Hankins completed 59.9 percent of his passes for 2,550 yards and 18 touchdowns. He threw for over 200 yards in seven games and finished fifth in C-USA in passing average. Hankins tossed multiple touchdowns on five occasions and completed 33 passes that produced a gain of 20 yards or more.

In the 2007 season opener against Ole Miss, Hankins set or tied Tiger records in attempts (60) and completions (41), while also turning in a then career-best performance in yardage with 343 yards.

PEARCE PICKS UP PRESEASON HONOR

Junior offensive lineman Brandon Pearce was selected by league coaches to the 2007 preseason All-Conference USA first team. Earlier this summer, the 6-foot-6, 300-pound offensive lineman was selected to the preseason All-Conference USA Team as noted in Street & Smith's College Football 2007 Yearbook. Pearce is the only returning Tiger to have earned All-C-USA honors last season, not including all-freshman picks.

THE OC

The Tiger offense is under new direction as long-time assistant coach Clay Helton assumed the role for the 2007 season. Helton has been a part of the Tiger staff since 2000 and replaced Randy Fichtner who took a job with the Pittsburgh Steelers. A former college signal caller, Helton moved his emphasis from receivers to QBs this season. He was promoted to assistant head coach in February 2004 and has served as the Tigers' recruiting coordinator. Helton comes from a football family as his father, Kim, and his brother, Tyson, are both on staff at UAB.

MISSISSIPPI PIPELINE

There are 19 Tiger players on the current roster who are from the state of Mississippi. This is remarkable considering that in 2001 when West took over as head coach, there were only three players on the roster that called Mississippi home. The number gradually increased and by 2003 Mississippi was represented by 11 Tigers.

FOOTBALL TIGERS EARN ACADEMIC RECOGNITION

One hundred and forty-nine University of Memphis student-athletes were named to the Tiger 3.0 Club in July 2007, and football led the way with 27 entries for the spring semester. By the start of the 2007 season, two football Tigers had already earned their bachelor's degrees. Brandon Patterson earned his degree in August, while Andy Smith graduated in December 2006 and was working on a master's degree in geography.

THREE TIGERS CONTINUED TO LEAD FROM SIDELINES THIS SEASON

There were three Tigers on the sidelines this season who may have been as vocal as any in cheering on their teammates. Rod Smith, who would have been a senior this season, fractured two vertebrae in his neck last season and suffered a football career-ending injury. Smith has remained a visible part of Tiger football and has "not missed a thing" according to coach Tommy West. He has been at every practice and continues to work on regaining strength and mobility.

Two Tigers who are anticipating a return to the field at some point are Antonio McCoy and Stacy Jones. McCoy suffered a devastating knee dislocation against Southern Miss and has had three surgeries to repair the damage. He remains hopeful for a return to the field as he continues rehabilitation this season. Jones is an inspiring example of overcoming adversity. He found out in February 2007 that he had a cancerous tumor in his neck and would have to begin treatment. The cancer diagnosis also carried with it a 20-percent survival rate. He was expected to have to undergo treatment until about January 2008. In May, he had 98 percent of the shrinking tumor removed and continued chemotherapy. In August, he received news that he is cancer-free. A candidate for the FWAA Courage Award this season, Jones is regaining his strength and stamina working out with the strength and conditioning staff. His personal goal is to be back in pads this coming spring.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — If, before the Mid-South rivalry with Ole Miss, someone told Tiger head coach Tommy West that his squad would still have an opportunity to win despite:

- His team's five turnovers.
- One fumble that halted a possible scoring drive at the 9-yard line.
- Two interceptions that stopped potential scoring chances inside the 15-yard line.
- Two special teams miscues with a missed 25-yard field goal and a blocked punt returned for a touchdown.

Tiger Nation could count on two responses from its coach. One would probably be an "are-you-kidding-me" look. The other would be a "I'd-take-it" expression.

Well, that's what faced West and his Tigers after spotting the visitors from Oxford, Miss., a 23-0 lead late into the third quarter. However, that's when Memphis found a rhythm and mounted a near comeback in the final 16:28 of the contest.

The Tigers scored three touchdowns and came within a tipped-away two-point conversion with :31 left, but dropped a narrow 23-21 decision to Ole Miss before a crowd of 45,457 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium. It was the third-straight year the Rebels were able to pull out a close call, as they won 10-6 in 2005 (Memphis) and 28-25 in 2006 (Oxford).

After a Josh Shene 30-yard field goal made the score 23-0 Rebels with 3:46 left in the third period, the Tigers began their climb back into the game. On the ensuing possession, Memphis drove 66 yards on nine plays to cut the lead to 23-7. Doss rushed three times for 20 yards on the drive, including the 1-yard touchdown run.

Ole Miss went 3-and-out on its next possession, and after the punt, the Tigers took over on their own 16. Memphis quarterback Martin Hankins — who set career highs for completions (41), attempts (60) and yards (343) — went 7-of-10 passing for 57 yards on the drive and directed the Tigers down to the Ole Miss 4. From there, redshirt freshman Matt Malouf, who played his prep career at Oxford High School, hit paydirt from four yards out. After a Hankins-to-Duke Calhoun two-point conversion, Memphis pulled to within eight points at 23-15 with 10:16 left.

On the Rebels' next possession, it looked as if they were going to put some insurance points on the scoreboard. Ole Miss drove from its own 37 to the Memphis 11, where Joshua Shene set up for a 28-yard field goal to put the contest out of reach. However, Greg Terrell got a hand on the field goal attempt, and it bounced off the crossbar and gave the Tigers one final chance to tie the game.

Beginning at its own 20 with just over five minutes left, Memphis used a mixture of the run and pass and moved to the Ole Miss 8. Hankins then hit Calhoun for an 8-yard scoring strike with 0:31 left to cut the Rebel lead to 23-21. The Tigers needed to come through with another two-point conversion, but it was not to be, and the Rebels secured the win.

The Tigers dug their own hole in the game's first 40 minutes with miscues. After a Seth Adams-to-Greg Hardy 16-yard touchdown connection gave Ole Miss a 7-0 lead, the Rebels scored their next two touchdowns courtesy of Memphis mistakes.

With under four minutes left in the first half, the Tigers had to punt from deep in their own territory. Instead of setting up a return, the Rebels went after the punt, and Jamarca Sanford blocked the attempt into the end zone where Kendrick Lewis recovered the ball for the score and a 14-0 lead.

The Tigers then attempted to cut into the Rebel lead just before the halftime buzzer. Memphis took over with 3:41 left and drove to the Ole Miss 10. With under a minute to play, Dustin Mouzon intercepted a Hankins' offering and raced 99 yards for the score. Despite the missed PAT, the Rebels were up 20-0 at the break.

Hankins' 41 completions were a Memphis single-game record, while his 60 attempts tied Danny Wimprine's single-game mark. Carlos Singleton led the Tigers with 91 receiving yards, while Calhoun hauled in a game-high 10 catches. Both players — Singleton (9-game) and Calhoun (13-game) — extended their respective receiving streaks. Joseph Doss led the Tiger rushing attack with 59 yards on 14 carries.

The Tiger defense played well, holding the Rebel ground game to only 74 yards on 29 carries. Winston Bowens led Memphis with nine total stops, while Jake Kasser had seven tackles and two fumble recoveries.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — If one looks at the numbers following Memphis' game versus Jacksonville State, it seems the visiting Gamecocks gave the Tigers a run for their money.

The Tigers had just one more first down than Jacksonville State (24-23) and only outgained the Gamecocks by fewer than 100 total yards (485-392). Furthermore, Jacksonville State dominated time of possession by more than 12 minutes (36:06-23:54).

But, in the end, the only two numbers that matter are those on the scoreboard: Memphis 35, Jacksonville State 14. Despite the closeness in the statistics, the Tigers used a quick-strike offense en route to their first victory of the 2007 campaign, before a crowd of 28,298 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

When the Memphis offense struck, it did so with flair. Three of the Tigers' five touchdowns were from over 35 yards out, and Memphis' five scoring drives averaged five plays and a little over 1:30 per possession.

Senior quarterback Martin Hankins led the Tiger offense with three touchdown strikes on 16-of-22 passing for 289 yards. Hankins hit nine different receivers in the game. Sophomore running back T.J. Pitts, starting in place of the injured Joseph Doss, led the Tiger rushing attack with 52 yards on 11 carries. The start was the second of Pitts' collegiate career.

After a sluggish first quarter in which the Gamecocks outgained Memphis 101-49 in yardage, the Tigers hit their stride in the second period. On the second possession of the second quarter, Memphis went 80 yards on seven plays in only 3:24 to increase its advantage to 14-0. Hankins went 3-of-3 for 77 yards on the drive, including a 48-yard touchdown connection with junior Carlton Robinzine. The touchdown catch was the first career score for Robinzine.

However, the Gamecocks did not go away. Jacksonville State responded to the Tiger score with a nine-play, 67-yard scoring drive that culminated in a Anthony Jones 2-yard touchdown run to cut lead to 14-7 with only 2:37 left before halftime.

With just over two minutes left, most of Tiger Nation had thoughts of just running out the clock. But, not this Memphis offense. Taking over on their own 27 yard line, the Tigers moved to the 42 with around 1:30 left on the clock. On a 2nd-and-6, Hankins took to the air again and hit Maurice Jones, who out-jumped his defender for the ball and raced 58 yards to give Memphis a 21-7 at the intermission.

Much like the opening quarter, the Tigers took some time to get their rhythm in the third period. Memphis' first two drives of the second half produced no points, but after an Earnest Williams electrifying 52-yard punt return, the Tigers were back in business.

The Williams' return set Memphis up on the Gamecock 24 yard line, and two plays later, Hankins connected with Greg Hinds for a 20-yard

scoring strike to push the Tigers ahead further at 28-7. Hinds' touchdown reception was the first of his collegiate career, while it was Hankins' fourth three-touchdown passing performance of his Memphis career.

Each team added another score in the fourth quarter for the 35-14 final. Memphis' final touchdown came courtesy of a redshirt freshman quarterback Matt Malouf 38-yard scamper early in the final period. It was Malouf's second rushing touchdown in as many games. Jacksonville State added a score with only :25 left in the game on an Alphonso Freeney 1-yard run.

Williams led all Tiger receivers with five catches, while Jones had a game-high 88 receiving yards. Williams finished the game with 177 all-purpose yards (35 rushing/67 receiving/21 kick return/54 punt return).

Jake Kasser paced the Memphis defense with 11 total stops and one TFL. Dontae Reed and LaKeitharun Ford each added seven tackles. Alton Starr had three pass break-ups to lead the Tigers.

Gamecock quarterback Cedric Johnson led his team in both rushing and passing. Johnson rushed for a game-high 71 yards and added 214 yards via the air on 23-of-39 passing. James Wilkerson was Johnson's favorite target with five receptions for 73 yards. John Scott led the Jacksonville State defense with eight total tackles.

UCF 56, MEMPHIS 20

SEPT. 22, 2007 • BH NETWORKS STADIUM

ORLANDO, Fla. — Sometimes, it's just not your day. Or, either Murphy's Law was in full effect.

Whatever it was, Memphis ran into a buzzsaw when it entered Bright House Networks Stadium, as UCF scored on its first seven possessions and cruised to a 56-20 Conference USA victory over the Tigers. The win was the Knights' first victory in their new home before a crowd of 42,153.

The Knights piled up 601 yards of total offense, the most yards against a Tiger defense since Texas A&M had 615 yards against Memphis in 1978. UCF's seven rushing scores were the most via the ground since Texas A&M also had seven rushing touchdowns in that same 1978 contest. The Knights gained 313 of their 601 total yards with their ground attack. The 300-yard rushing performance was the first for a Tiger foe since TCU rushed for 350 yards in 2002.

Leading the UCF offensive explosion was the quarterback tandem of Kyle Israel and Michael Greco and running back Kevin Smith. Israel was 6-of-9 passing for 137, including a 72-yard scoring strike to Kamar Aiken to open the second half. Greco was just as impressive, going 11-of-12 passing for 151 yards and rushing 10 times for 77 yards and two scores.

Smith, who entered the game as the nation's leading rusher, did not disappoint with a 124-yard, three-touchdown performance. Phillip Smith added 96 yards on 19 carries and a touchdown.

The Memphis quarterback trio of Martin Hankins, Will Hudgens and Matt Malouf combined for 16-of-33 passing for 173 yards. Each quarterback threw for one touchdown. Joseph Doss led the Tiger rushing game with 48 yards on nine carries.

The Knights began their offensive display on the game's opening drive. UCF drove 81 yards on 10 plays, and it was capped by Kevin Smith's first touchdown. After holding Memphis to a 3-and-out on its first possession, the Knights put together a 9:13, time-consuming drive that ended with an Israel 1-yard touchdown run to give UCF a 14-0 advantage.

At first quarter's end, the statistics showed UCF's domination. The Knights outgained Memphis 169-12 in total yardage, and won the time of possession battle 12:38-2:22.

The outlook did not get better for the Tigers in the second period. UCF scored four more times in the second quarter to take a 42-0 halftime lead. Kevin Smith scored the Knights' first two touchdowns of the period, and Greco added two 10-yard scoring scampers.

The halftime break didn't slow down the Knights. On the second play of its first second-half drive, Israel dropped back and hit Aiken on a 72-

yard scoring connection for a 49-0 lead.

Memphis got on the scoreboard with just over 11 minutes left in the third quarter when Hankins found Carlos Singleton from 17 yards out.

The Tigers added their second score a quarter later at the 11:55 mark of the final period. Malouf connected on his only toss of the game, a 4-yard scoring strike to Earnest Williams. After UCF's final touchdown, Hudgens hit Dave Thomas from 10 yards out to close the game's scoring.

UCF's 56 points were the most by a Tiger opponent since Florida State scored 57 in a 57-20 win over Memphis in the 1989 season finale. The last time a Memphis opponent score 50 or more points was in the 2004 GMAC Bowl, where Bowl-green rolled up 52 points.

Maurice Jones led the Tiger receiving corps with three catches for 50 yards. Memphis punter Brent Sutherland averaged 41.5 yards on six attempts.

Brandon Patterson (8 tackles), Jake Kasser (7 tackles) and LaKeitharun Ford (6 tackles) paced the Tiger defense. Quinton McCrary had five tackles, one quarterback sack and three fumble recoveries.

Jason Venson led UCF with nine tackles, and Leger Douzable had six tackles, one quarterback sack and two TFLs.

ARKANSAS ST. 35, MEMPHIS 31 SEPT. 27, 2007 • INDIAN STADIUM

JONESBORO, Ark. — The old football saying goes, "It was a tale of two halves." And that was never more true about a game than the Memphis-Arkansas State 2007 encounter.

In a rescheduled game from Sept. 8 when the contest was called due to inclement weather, the visiting Tigers jumped on the home team in the first half, racing out to a 31-6 halftime advantage. However, the second half was a different story.

Arkansas State used a punt return for a touchdown midway through the third quarter to ignite the program's biggest come-from-behind win in nearly two decades, defeating Memphis 35-31 before a crowd of 27,774 at Indian Stadium. The comeback was Arkansas State's biggest since 1989 when the Indians were down 31-0 to Lamar and rallied to defeat the Cardinals 41-31.

In addition to the punt return for the touchdown, Indian quarterback Corey Leonard's strong play helped lead Arkansas State to victory. Leonard totaled a career-high 329 yards (255 passing, 74 rushing) and passed for three scores.

While the focus of the Indian comeback was on the offense, the Arkansas State defense played a big hand in the win. After the Tigers rolled up 31 points and 297 total yards in the first half, the Indian defense held Memphis scoreless and allowed only 98 yards of total offense after the break.

After a slow start in their previous game at UCF, the Tigers jumped on Arkansas State early and often. Memphis scored on all four of its first-half offensive possessions, building a 24-6 lead.

The Tigers took the opening kickoff and drove 84 yards on nine plays for a quick 7-0 lead. Joseph Doss, who led the Memphis ground game with 50 yards on 17 carries, punched in the first Tiger touchdown from one yard out. The drive's highlight came on the first play from scrimmage when quarterback Martin Hankins connected with Maurice Jones for a 56-yard gain to the Indian 28 yard line.

After an exchange of field goals made it Memphis 10-3, the Tiger offense struck again — and this time quicker than the first. On its first possession of the second quarter, Memphis started on its own 20 yard line and went to its bag of tricks. Hankins took the snap and threw a lateral to Dave Thomas, who fired an 80-yard touchdown strike to Steven Black for a 17-3 Tiger lead. It was Black's first career receiving touchdown at Memphis.

The Indians answered with another Josh Arauco field goal, but Memphis responded with another touchdown. For their third touchdown of the contest, the Tigers put together a 13-play, 72-yard drive that ended with a Matt Malouf 1-yard run. After a Matt Reagan PAT, Memphis held a 24-6 lead.

With just over three minutes left before the break, the Indians tried to cut into the Tiger lead. Arkansas State started a drive on its own 38 and drove to the Memphis 14, but on a 1st-and-10 play, Cedric Wilkerson fumbled the ball and Tiger defensive lineman Freddie Barnett picked up the loose ball and rumbled 88 yards for the score. The fumble return for the touchdown gave the Tigers

a 31-6 lead which Memphis took into halftime. Barnett's 88-yard fumble return was the longest in school history, breaking the previous mark of 84 yards set by Corey Irby versus Louisville in 1999.

However, after halftime, the tide turned midway through the third period with Kevin Jones' 89-yard punt return for a score. The touchdown only pulled the Indians to within 31-13, but gave Arkansas State the momentum for its comeback.

The Indians' next three touchdowns came via the air. Leonard hooked up with Vernon Catlin (10 yards), Levi Dejohnette (27 yards) and Preston Brown (1 yard) to give Arkansas State its first lead of the contest at 35-31 with 7:52 left in the game.

On the ensuing possession, the Tigers moved the ball to the Arkansas State 30 yard line, but the Indians halted the Memphis drive there. The Tigers got the ball one last time with 3:16 left, but was unable to move past midfield.

Hankins was 10-of-21 passing for 119 yards, and Maurice Jones led the receiving corps with three catches for 71 yards. For Arkansas State, Leonard was 16-of-37 passing, and Dejohnette was his favorite target with seven receptions for 99 yards and one score.

Greg Terrell led the Memphis defense with nine tackles, 1.5 TFL and a forced fumble. Winston Bowens added eight hits. Koby McKinnon led the Indian defense with 11 total tackles. Alex Carrington had nine tackles, while Khayyam Burns added eight hits.

MEMPHIS 24, MARSHALL 21

OCT. 2, 2007 • LIBERTY BOWL STADIUM

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — It's amazing the Tigers could even walk onto the Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium field and actually play its Conference USA home opener after the events that occurred 48 hours prior to the contest.

Two days before the game, the Memphis team lost one of its own, as defensive lineman Taylor Bradford was shot and killed on campus. The following morning, West met with Bradford's parents, and they gave their blessing for the team to play its game the next day. With that, it was up to Bradford's teammates to make the final decision.

In a unanimous team vote, the Tigers wanted to play — and play in honor of their fallen teammate. The night before the contest when most squads are usually focused on final game preparations, the Tigers walked, as a team, to a campus candlelight vigil in Bradford's memory.

In his tenure as the Tigers' mentor, West has said repeatedly that he wants guys with solid character, and that was truly seen in his Tigers this night. Game time arrived, and just minutes before the kick-off, the Tigers and their head coach took the field arm-in-arm.

Then, football took over, and Memphis dug deep to post an inspirational 24-21 C-USA victory over the Thundering Herd before an emotional crowd of 25,324. In the locker room following the game, the Tigers chanted Bradford's nickname to not only celebrate the win but also their teammate's life.

On top of the events prior to the contest, Memphis was playing its third game in 11 days, and also was carrying a two-game losing streak into the Marshall contest. The losing streak, the bumps and bruises, and maybe even a very small portion of the pain were washed away with the victory.

With starting quarterback Martin Hankins injured, junior Will Hudgens took over the reins behind center for the first time since 2005. And the Memphis native made the most of it.

Hudgens was 30-of-45 passing for 346 yards and two touchdowns. The completions, attempts, passing yards and touchdown passes all were career highs for Hudgens. The 346 yards were the seventh-most for a single game in Tiger history, and the 30 completions the fourth-most for a single contest.

Hudgens hit nine different receivers, and sophomore Duke Calhoun was his favorite target. Calhoun had six receptions for a game-high 74 yards. Carlos Singleton had five catches for 69 yards, and had the touchdown and two-point conversion that gave Memphis the lead for good in the third quarter.

T.J. Pitts led the Tiger ground attack with 14 carries for 57 yards and both were career bests for him. Joseph Doss added 22 yards on 10 carries.

On the strength of three Matt Reagan first-half field goals, the Tigers held a slim 9-7 advantage at the intermission. The momentum, however, swung to the Thundering Herd to start the second half.

Marshall took the second half opening kick-off and marched down the field to take a 14-9 lead. The Thundering Herd kept the ball on the ground

and gained all 69 yards on the drive running the ball. Darius Marshall punctuated the drive with an 11-yard score.

The Tigers immediately answered. Starting on its own 14 yard line, Memphis scored the go-ahead touchdown 11 plays later when Hudgens hit Singleton across the middle, and Singleton made a spectacular run to the end zone. The Tigers then went for the two-point conversion, and the Hudgens-Singleton connection worked again for a 17-14 lead.

It looked as if Marshall would answer Memphis' score, but on the ninth play of the ensuing drive, Darius Marshall fumbled and Quinton McCrary recovered the ball for the Tigers at their own 23. Memphis took advantage of the turnover and drove 77 yards for a 24-14 lead. Hudgens tossed his second touchdown pass of the game to Greg Hinds from four yards out.

Marshall cut the Memphis lead to 24-21 with 5:22 left when Bernard Morris connected with Darius Passmore on a four-yard score. After forcing a Tiger punt, the Thundering Herd had one final opportunity to tie or win the game. Marshall started on its own 20 and drove the ball to the Tiger 41, but on a 4th-and-3 play, Morris' pass fell incomplete, and Memphis had earned the win.

Darius Marshall led the Thundering Herd rushing game with 90 yards on 15 carries. Morris was 23-of-32 passing for 220 yards, while Passmore had seven receptions for 69 yards.

Jake Kasser (11 tackles) and McCrary (10) led the Tiger defense. LeRico Mathis recorded his first career interception in a Memphis uniform.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — When results are like the one the Tigers went through in their in-state game against Middle Tennessee, it's just best to let the head coach sum it up.

"I'm not pointing the finger at anybody but me," said Memphis head coach Tommy West in the post game press conference. "That was about as poor of an offensive performance that we've had since I've been here. That's my responsibility.

"I haven't done a very good job at improving our football team. I've got to find a way to get us there."

If there is a coach that can get it turned around, it is West, who has led the Tiger program to three-straight bowl game appearances. But, with their 21-7 loss to Middle Tennessee, the Tigers put themselves in a tough position to make a fourth bowl game in five years. With a 2-4 record, Memphis now has to win four of its final six contests to qualify for a bowl spot.

Tiger Nation, though, has seen Memphis near this same position in recent memory. In the Tigers' 2003 bowl, Memphis dropped to 3-3 after a mid-season setback at Mississippi State. The Tigers, however, reeled off five-straight victories to earn a bowl berth.

That could still happen in 2007 with a few bounces of the ball for the Tigers. But, in the game against the Blue Raiders, the breaks went the visitors' way before a crowd of 30,101 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

Middle Tennessee quarterback Dwight Dasher had a career game against the Tigers, passing for 230 yards and running for another 180 yards. Dasher's 180-yard rushing performance was the best by a Blue Raider quarterback in the program's history. Dasher finished the contest 16-of-26 passing with one touchdown and one interception. The game was Dasher's first start at quarterback in a road game.

DeMarco McNair also helped the Middle Tennessee offensive effort. McNair rushed for 50 yards on 17 carries and a score and also caught one pass for 55 yards and a touchdown.

The way the game began gave the indication it was going to be a shootout between the two high-powered offenses. After taking the opening kick-off, the Blue Raiders moved the ball from their own 20 to the 45 in six plays. On the next play, Dasher hit McNair in stride down the right sideline for a 55-yard touchdown strike to give Middle Tennessee a 7-0 lead only four minutes into the contest.

The Tigers attempted to answer back immediately, but Matt Reagan missed a 47-yard field goal attempt to end Memphis' first scoring opportunity.

However, the Tigers got another chance in the first period and took advantage. After taking over at its own 20 after a Blue Raider punt, Memphis drove 80 yards in eight plays to tie the game at 7-all. Tiger quarterback Will Hudgens connected on two huge pass plays on the drive. The first was

a 41-yard "leaping-over-the-defender" reception by Carlos Singleton, while the second was a 19-yard touchdown pass to Duke Calhoun with a defender on his back.

After a scoreless second quarter, Middle Tennessee took its first possession of the third period down to the Memphis 13 yard line. The drive, though, was thwarted when Brandon Patterson intercepted Dasher's pass in the end zone.

The Tigers had new life on their own 20, but quickly gave the ball back to the Blue Raiders when T.J. Pitts fumbled and Middle Tennessee recovered the loose ball on the 14. Four plays later, McNair hit paydirt from one yard out to give the Blue Raiders a 14-7 lead.

The Memphis offense was unable to muster any further threat in the game, and when Dasher broke away for a 61-yard touchdown scamper with just under four minutes left in the game, Middle Tennessee had secured the 21-7 victory.

Hudgens was 13-of-35 passing for 134 yards and a score, and Calhoun was his favorite target with four receptions for 51 yards and the Tigers' lone touchdown. Pitts led the Tiger ground game with 49 yards on 14 carries.

Patterson and Winston Bowens led the Memphis defense with nine tackles apiece. Tony Bell recorded the first interception of his Tiger career.

Tavares Jones led the Middle Tennessee defense with seven total tackles and a fumble recovery that set up the Blue Raiders' go-ahead score in the third quarter.

HOUSTON, Texas — One thing Tiger fans can't say about their head coach is this: Tommy West doesn't know his team.

After sub-par production from the rushing game the previous couple of outings, West said the following in his weekly press conference heading into the Rice game:

"I feel like we are closer than we have ever been in being able to develop a running game ... I'm sick of saying that we don't have a running game, but I really believe we are on the right track. I think we're pretty close.

"You've got to be able to run the ball some and get 150 yards rushing. If you can do that with the way we throw it ... then you've got a chance."

Chalk another one up for West. In a game the Tigers needed to win to keep their bowl hopes alive, Memphis put together an impressive 247-yard rushing performance en route to a thrilling 38-35 Conference USA victory over Rice, before a crowd of 11,122 at Rice Stadium in Houston. The game was the first-ever meeting between the two programs.

The 247 yards via the ground was the Tigers' best rushing game since the 2005 Motor City Bowl versus Akron when Memphis put up 351 rushing yards. Leading the ground game was senior Joseph Doss, who had a career game in the victory over the Owls. Doss rushed for a career-high 175 yards on 24 carries and a touchdown.

The Memphis rushing attack complemented the passing game which accumulated 324 yards and accounted for three touchdowns. Senior quarterback Martin Hankins returned under center after missing the previous two games due to injury and was 21-of-32 passing for 306 yards and three scores.

The Tigers finished the game with 571 yards of total offense, the highest output by a Memphis squad since the 2004 campaign. The last time a Tiger team produced more total offense was in the 2004 epic battle against the Louisville Cardinals at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium, piling up 603 yards of total offense.

The back-and-forth Memphis-Rice contest entered the final quarter tied at 28-all, and the offensive fireworks continued. The Tigers took over their first possession of the fourth period on their own 10 yard line, but three plays later, Memphis moved to the Rice 27. The key play was the Hankins-to-Duke Calhoun 49-yard connection. The Tigers moved the ball to the Owl 5, but had to settle for a Matt Reagan 22-yard field goal for a 31-28 lead.

On the ensuing drive, Rice was looking for the go-ahead score, and the Owls moved the ball to midfield. The Tiger defense, however, stepped up, and when Steven Turner intercepted his first collegiate pass, the Memphis offense was back in business.

This time, the Tigers punched the ball in the end zone. On the third play after the turnover, Hankins found Maurice Jones from 45 yards out for his third touchdown pass of the game. The score gave Memphis a 38-28 advantage with just

over five minutes to play.

In this game of offensive firepower, the Owls were far from done. In just over three minutes, Rice drove 80 yards, and when Chase Clement hit James Casey for a 20-yard touchdown, the Owls cut the lead to 38-35 with 2:09 left.

Rice attempted an on-sides kick, but the Tigers recovered and ran out the clock on the strength of their rushing game.

The scoring started early in the game as both teams posted touchdowns in the opening period. In the second quarter, Memphis built a 17-7 lead on a Reagan field goal and a Greg Hinds receiving score from Hankins. The Owls, though, responded with a Jarett Dillard touchdown catch to slice the lead to 17-14. Memphis added another Reagan field goal just before halftime for a 20-14 lead.

A Dillard 42-yard touchdown reception gave Rice its only lead of the game at 21-20 early in the third quarter. Each team added another touchdown for a 28-all score heading into the final quarter.

Hankins' favorite target was Calhoun, who finished the game with four catches for 119 yards. It was his fourth career 100-yard receiving game. Dillard led the Owl receiving corps with five catches for 85 yards and three touchdowns.

Dontae Reed (9 tackles), Jake Kasser (6) and Winston Bowens (6) paced the Tiger defense. In addition to Turner's interception, LeRico Mathis picked off his second pass of the season.

The Owls had three players with double-digit tackles in Vernon James (12), Brian Raines (12) and Andrew Sendejo (10). Scott Solomon had the game's lone sack for nine yards.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — Following a victory many years ago in the Louisiana Superdome, a coach said, "You have to be good and you have to be lucky to win."

The Tiger football team was both in their thrilling 28-27 come-from-behind victory over Conference USA foe Tulane, before a crowd of 23,267 at the Louisiana Superdome. With the win, Memphis moved closer to becoming bowl eligible and also remained in the race for the Conference USA East Division title.

The lucky part — or maybe call it fortunate — for the Tigers was Tulane kicker Russ Thevenot's missed 22-yard chip-shot field goal with just over five minutes to play. The Green Wave was leading 27-21 at the time, and the field goal would have increased the lead to nine points (30-21) and essentially put the contest out of reach.

The good part is the Memphis offense made play after play on the game-winning drive following Tulane's missed opportunity. The Tiger quarterback tandem of Martin Hankins and Matt Malouf directed a nine-play, 80-yard scoring drive that ended with a Hankins-to-Duke Calhoun 5-yard touchdown pass to tie the game at 27-all. Matt Reagan's PAT put the Tigers ahead 28-27 with only :36 left.

On that Tiger possession, Hankins and Malouf each made a huge play to keep the drive going. Facing a 3rd-and-3 on the Memphis 27, Hankins hooked up with Earnest Williams for a 41-yard gain to the Tulane 32. Two plays later, Malouf found Maurice Jones for a 19-yard pick-up to the Green Wave 6, which set up the Tigers for the winning score.

But, the good fortune did not end for the Tigers there. On the ensuing possession, the Green Wave moved the ball to near midfield with under :25 left. Scelfo hit Gabe Ratliff for a four-yard gain to the Memphis 49, and then confusion followed. The Tulane offense thought the clock stopped with Ratliff going out-of-bounds, but the officials ruled he was tackled in-bounds. The Green Wave ran one more play, but quarterback Anthony Scelfo was tackled after a five-yard rush and the Tigers had secured the victory.

So, after nearly two seasons of breaks going the other way, Memphis had the ball bounce its way.

However, for most of the contest, the tremendous rushing performance of Tulane All-America candidate Matt Forte seemed as if it would trump all the breaks the Tigers could get. Forte gained 278 yards on a school single-game record 44 carries and also scored two touchdowns. With his 278 yards, Forte set the Tulane single-season rushing mark with 1,539 yards.

Forte's first score was an impressive 51-yard scamper in the second quarter to put the Green Wave ahead 13-7. It was on that 51-yard run that he set the Tulane single-season rushing mark. His second touchdown was only from one yard out, but gave Tulane a 27-21 lead early in the

fourth period.

The Tigers countered Forte's rushing with Hankins' arm. The Tiger senior quarterback was 25-of-38 passing for a career-high 355 yards and two touchdowns. The 355 yards passing is tied for the fourth-best, single-game performance in Tiger football history. Hankins made use of his entire receiving corps, hitting nine different receivers in the contest. Maurice Jones was one of Hankins' favorite targets, as he had four receptions for a career-best 117 yards.

The game was close throughout with the large lead six points. The Green Wave took an early 3-0 lead on a Thevenot 48-yard field goal, but Memphis responded with a Williams' three-yard touchdown run. After 10-straight points put Tulane ahead 13-7, Williams hit paydirt again — this time on the receiving end of a Hankins' 47-yard pass. The scoring strike gave Memphis a 14-13 lead at the break.

The lead went back-and-forth in the second half, with the Tigers scoring the game-winner with :36 on the clock.

Quinton McCrary led the Tiger defense with 15 total tackles. He also recovered a fumble in the first quarter, which was his sixth recovery of the season. The six fumble recoveries is a Memphis single-season record. Jake Kasser added 12 tackles for the Tigers.

Evan Lee (9 tackles) and Chinonso Echebelem (8 hits) led the Tulane defense. Avery Williams added seven tackles and an interception for the Green Wave.

EAST CAROLINA 56, MEMPHIS 40

Nov. 3, 2007 • LIBERTY BOWL STADIUM

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — For Tiger fans that enjoy offensive football, the Memphis-East Carolina match-up was nearly a complete joy. If proof is needed, then look at the numbers:

- Over 1,000 yards of total offense between the two teams (ECU 641; UofM 493)
- 96 points scored between the two teams, the most by the Tigers and their foe since the Louisville game in the 2004 season (56-49 UL win)
- 41 points scored between the two teams in the third quarter alone, the most points in one quarter since the Tulane game in 1992 (62-20 UofM win)
- Both teams running a combined 159 offensive plays
- Memphis quarterback Martin Hankins throwing for a school-record 416 yards, breaking the previous mark of 398 by Danny Wimprine versus Mississippi State in 2003
- Hankins also threw for four touchdowns, the most by a Memphis signal-caller since Wimprine in the 2004 GMAC Bowl
- East Carolina running back Chris Johnson rushing for a career-high 301 yards, the second-best, single-game performance in Pirate history
- Johnson also set a Pirate single-game record with 408 all-purpose yards (301 rush/12 receiving/95 kick return)

The only thing that stopped a Tiger fan from having a completely enjoyable afternoon was the final score which read: East Carolina 56, Memphis 40. Before a Homecoming crowd of 27,186 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium, the Tigers hung in the contest for nearly three quarters, but the powerful Pirate offense proved too much.

Johnson led an East Carolina ground attack that put up 491 yards rushing on 44 carries for an 11.2 average. Johnson finished the game with 301 yards, and 180 of that came on touchdown runs of 16, 44, 70 and 50 yards. Pirate quarterback Patrick Pinkney was the team's second-leading rusher with 94 yards on eight carries, including a 45-yard scoring scamper.

While the Pirates attacked on the ground, Memphis took to the air. In racking up his school-record 416 yards passing, Hankins hit nine different receivers, including his two favorite targets in Duke Calhoun and Carlos Singleton. Calhoun led the Tiger receiving corps with eight receptions for 107 yards and one score, and Singleton added six catches for 100 yards. It was the first time since the 2003 Mississippi State contest that the Tigers had two 100-yard receivers in the same game.

The Tigers got to within striking distance just before halftime when Hankins found Calhoun from 14 yards out to make the score 21-13 in favor of the Pirates. Immediately after the intermission, each team put another touchdown on the board, and the Tigers were still close at 28-19.

That's when the Pirates began to make their

move. East Carolina scored two touchdowns in a five-minute span to increase its advantage to 42-19 with only 5:52 left in the third quarter. A Joseph Doss two-yard touchdown run pulled the Tigers to within 42-26 with 3:34 in the third, but East Carolina answered with a Pinkney-to-Steven Rogers 25-yard scoring strike to put the game out of reach at 49-26 at the end of the third period.

After a Hankins-to-Singleton touchdown connection opened the fourth quarter, Johnson later added his fourth rushing score of the game on a 50-yard run with 5:22 left for a 56-32 lead.

In the first half, Memphis got on the board first with a Matt Reagan 37-yard field goal, but that was the last time the Tigers led in the contest. East Carolina answered with three-straight touchdowns — two on runs by Johnson of 16 and 44 yards — for a 21-3 advantage that it did not lose the remainder of the game.

Miguel Barnes led the Memphis rushing game with 42 yards on five carries. Doss had 40 yards on 12 rushes and one score. In addition to Calhoun's and Singleton's 100-yard receiving games, Carlton Robinzine had six catches for 80 yards.

Heath Grant (12 total tackles), Tony Bell (10) and Clinton McDonald (10) paced the Tiger defense. All three players each had one TFL.

Travis Williams led the East Carolina defense with 11 total hits. Van Eskridge and J.J. Milbrook each added seven tackles. Milbrook and Jerek Hewett each had one interception in the game.

MEMPHIS 29, SOUTHERN MISS 26 Nov. 10, 2007 • M.M. ROBERTS STADIUM

HATTIESBURG, Miss. — “Can we win one more?”

That question was posed to Tiger Nation by another Memphis head coach during his team's magical postseason ride. While the 2007 football Tigers have had some less than magical moments during the season, they put themselves in a “Can we win one more?” position after their come-from-behind victory over Southern Miss.

Memphis — on the strength of senior quarterback Martin Hankins' arm — scored two late fourth-quarter touchdowns to turn a 12-point deficit into a 29-26 Conference USA victory over the Golden Eagles at “The Rock.” The Tigers scored the go-ahead touchdown with only 1:04 left, and a LaKeitharun Ford interception with under a minute to play sealed the victory.

The win improved the Tigers' overall record to 5-5, and Memphis now needs just one win in its last two games to become bowl eligible for the fourth time in five seasons. The victory was also the second-straight for the Tigers in Hattiesburg, which is the first time Memphis posted back-to-back wins at its long-time rival's homefield in school history. The Tigers took a 24-22 win over Southern Miss in Hattiesburg in the 2005 campaign.

Hankins, a Hattiesburg native, led the comeback victory over his hometown team. The Tiger quarterback was 35-of-48 passing for 396 yards and four scoring strikes. It was nearly another 400-yard performance for Hankins, as he threw for a school-record 416 yards the previous week. He tossed four touchdown passes for a second-straight week.

It was his final two touchdown tosses that guided the Tigers to victory. After Brandon Sumrall picked off a Hankins' offering and returned it 82 yards for a 26-14 Southern Miss lead with just over 10 minutes left, Memphis was staring a double-digit deficit in the face. Hankins and the Tiger offense, though, went to work.

On the ensuing drive, Hankins directed Memphis on a 13-play, 76-yard drive that culminated in a gutsy 12-yard touchdown catch by Earnest Williams on a 4th-and-10 play. Williams crossed the middle of the field and held on to Hankins' throw despite getting leveled in the end zone by a Southern Miss defender. With Matt Reagan's PAT, the Tigers trailed 26-21 with 4:21 left.

The Memphis defense had to answer the call, and it did. The Tigers held the Golden Eagle offense to a 3-and-out and forced a punt, giving Memphis the ball on its own 24 with 2:33 remaining.

It proved to be enough time for the Tigers. After three Hankins' completions moved the ball to the Memphis 48, the Tiger signal-caller hooked up with Carlos Singleton on a slant for what seemed was going to be just another first down. Singleton, however, had another idea, as he shook over his defender and raced to the end zone for a 52-yard scoring strike to give Memphis its first lead of the game since the opening quarter at 27-26. Han-

kins then found Maurice Jones for the two-point conversion and a 29-26 Tiger advantage with only 1:04 left.

The Golden Eagles started the next possession on their own 24, but Ford intercepted Jeremy Young's pass, ending any chance for Southern Miss to tie or win the game.

The Tigers got the scoring started in the first quarter when Hankins and Duke Calhoun hooked up for a 65-yard touchdown connection. Southern Miss responded with two touchdown scores for a 14-7 lead, but just before halftime, Hankins hit Singleton from 10 yards out to knot the game at 14-all heading into intermission.

Two Justin Estes field goals gave the Golden Eagles a 20-14 lead early in the fourth quarter, setting up the final 10 minutes of the contest.

Calhoun led all receivers with eight catches for 124 yards and a score. Singleton added five receptions for 96 yards and two touchdowns, and Jones had five catches for 54 yards. The Tiger ground game was nonexistent, netting only 26 yards on 26 carries.

Damion Fletcher led the Southern Miss rushing attack with 97 yards on 21 carries and a score. Young was 11-of-17 passing for 123 yards and a touchdown. Torris Magee was Young's favorite target, catching four passes for 76 yards and a touchdown.

Jake Kasser (9 tackles), Jeremy Rockette (7) and Tommy Phelps (7) led the Memphis defense. Sumrall paced the Southern Miss defense with 11 hits, one TFL and two interceptions.

MEMPHIS 25, UAB 9

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — As the final seconds ticked off the clock, Tiger Nation was in celebration with Memphis' 25-9 victory over Conference USA rival UAB. But what were Tiger fans' joyous cheers for?

Was it that — after losing to its rival UAB seven-straight years — the Tigers finally ended the streak with the victory?

Or was it that, with the win, Memphis became bowl bound for the fourth time in the last five years with its sixth victory of the season?

It really didn't matter what Tiger fans were cheering for because, with one win, Memphis ended the streak and earned a postseason bowl berth before a crowd of 31,138 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

Unlike most of their previous victories this season, the Tigers won this game over the Blazers with a strong running game and solid defense. The Memphis ground game amassed a season-high 265 yards, and Joseph Doss was the leader for the Tiger rushing corps. The senior rushed for 168 yards on 19 carries and added a 20-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter to put the game out of reach. T.J. Pitts added 71 yards on 13 carries.

The Tiger defense played a huge role in the victory. Memphis limited UAB to 338 yards of total offense and only 105 yards on the ground. Memphis intercepted two Blazer passes and kept UAB out of the end zone until 10 minutes left in the game.

After a scoreless first quarter, Memphis put the first points on the scoreboard early in the second period with an impressive 11-play, 97-yard drive. The Tigers began the drive on their own 3 and moved the ball to midfield, and then on 1st-and-10, Martin Hankins hit Carlos Singleton for a 45-yard pick-up to the UAB 3. Two plays later, Will Hudgens crossed the goal line from a yard out for a 7-0 Tiger lead.

On the ensuing possession, the Blazers answered with a Swayze Waters 26-yard field goal to cut the Memphis advantage to 7-3. With the help of a pass interference call, UAB moved the ball to the Memphis 9, but the Tiger defense forced the Blazers to settle for the field goal.

Memphis responded with two drives that resulted in Matt Reagan field goals before the half. The Tigers' first drive took them to the UAB 15 before the drive stalled, and Reagan kicked a 32-yard field goal for a 10-3 Memphis lead.

After forcing a Blazer punt, the Tigers took over on their own 14 with only 2:04 left. Most teams would just run out the clock and go to half with a 10-3 lead, but not the Tigers — especially when offensive weapons like Duke Calhoun are able to be used. On the first play, Hankins found Calhoun over the middle, and the Tiger sophomore receiver took the play all the way to the UAB 16 for a 70-yard connection. Six plays later, Reagan kicked his second field goal for a 13-3 Tiger halftime lead.

After the intermission, the Memphis defense

got even tougher for the UAB offense. On their first two possessions of the second half, the Blazers ran nine plays and gained only 30 yards, and both drives ended with two Waters' punts.

Memphis extended the lead on its second drive of the second half, and the Tigers used their ball-control ground game on the possession. Memphis gained 49 of the 56 yards on the drive via the ground, and Reagan hit home his third field goal of the contest for a 16-3 advantage.

At the end of the third quarter and heading into the fourth, Memphis put together a drive that ended any hopes of a UAB comeback. Starting on its own 1 yard line with 1:28 left in the third period, Memphis moved the ball to the 6, and then on 3rd-and-6, Hankins hooked up with Calhoun for another 70-yard play that took the ball to the UAB 25. After a Pitts' five-yard run opened the final quarter of play, Doss went the final distance with a 20-yard touchdown run for a 22-3 lead with 14:14 left in the game.

UAB added a late touchdown, while Reagan kicked his fourth field goal for the 25-9 final.

Hankins just missed his fifth-straight 300-yard game with 298 yards on 14-of-26 passing. Calhoun led the Tiger receivers with a career-high 159 yards on four catches. It was his fourth 100-yard receiving game of the season.

Jake Kasser (13 total tackles) and LeRico Mathis (12) paced the Memphis defense. Corey Mills and Brandon Patterson each recorded an interception. It was Mills' first interception of his career.

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Fans can say a lot of things about the 2007 Tigers, but there is one that can't deny — they sure make games exciting and thrilling.

The week before, Memphis assured itself of a postseason bowl berth with a resounding 25-9 win over rival UAB. But, in their regular season finale, the Tigers decided to keep fans on the edge of their seats with a thrilling 55-52 triple-overtime win over Conference USA foe SMU.

The win capped off an amazing turnaround season for Memphis, and for victory No. 7, the Tigers got a postgame gift. Following the contest, the R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl offered an invitation to Memphis to participate in its game, and the Tigers accepted with a chorus of cheers. The New Orleans Bowl trip is the second for Memphis in the last five years, as the Tigers played in the 2003 edition of the bowl.

Before the SMU game, 15 Tiger seniors were honored during "Senior Day" ceremonies, and the crowd of 20,184 at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium cheered those seniors for their hard work and dedication to the program. After the pregame ceremonies, it was time for the Tigers to make their postseason case stronger with win No. 7. But, the Mustangs did not just give the game to Memphis.

Playing only for pride, SMU took the Tigers to the end and then some. After a wild back-and-forth affair through three quarters, Memphis held a 42-35 lead heading into the final period. With only nine minutes left in their season, the Mustangs took over on their own 7 yard line and could have just wilted. Instead, SMU — on the strength of quarterback Justin Willis' arm and legs — put together an impressive 93-yard scoring drive to tie the contest at 42-all with over four minutes left. On the drive, Willis accounted for 69 of the 93 yards (53 passing, 16 rushing).

On the ensuing possession, Memphis drove the ball deep into SMU territory. With under a minute to play, the Tigers attempted a field goal, but Matt Reagan's kick went wide right and the contest went into overtime.

Each team answered with a field goal in the first overtime and a touchdown in the second extra period. In the third overtime, SMU took possession first and drove the ball to a 1st-and-goal at the Memphis 8. Three plays later, the Mustangs were at the Tiger 2 yard line and faced a 4th-and-goal. SMU decided to go for the touchdown, but the Memphis defense was up to the challenge, as Corey Mills pushed Willis out-of-bounds at the 2 to stop the SMU drive.

On its third overtime possession, Memphis moved to the SMU 10, and after a Martin Hankins rush to move the ball to the middle of the field, Reagan was set up for a 32-yard field goal. This time, Reagan did not miss and the Tigers took home the 55-52 win.

The game was offensively dominated from the start, with the Mustangs scoring just over two min-

utes into the contest when Willis hit Zack Sledge for a 16-yard score. The Tigers answered with two touchdowns in the first quarter for a 14-7 lead.

SMU outscored Memphis in the second period 21-7 to take a 28-21 halftime lead. Willis added two touchdown passes in the quarter, while the Tigers' score came on a Hankins-to-Carlos Singleton 20-yard connection. In the third quarter, Memphis turned the tables on SMU, winning the scoring battle 21-7 in the period for a 42-35 lead. Singleton caught two touchdown passes of 11 and 40 yards in the quarter.

The 107 combined points scored was the most in school history, breaking the previous mark of 105 in the Memphis-Louisville 2004 epic battle. The overtime win by the Tigers' was the program's first-ever, extra-session victory (1-4 overtime record).

Hankins, again, paced the Memphis offense on 30-of-59 passing for 336 yards and four touchdowns. It was the third time that he had thrown four scores in a game in the 2007 season. Steven Black (12 catches/112 yards) and Singleton (8 catches/127 yards/3 TDs) were Hankins favorite targets. T.J. Pitts led the Tiger ground game with a career-high 110 yards on 19 carries and a score.

Willis led the SMU offense with 375 yards passing (35-of-48) and 114 yards rushing. He was also responsible for five of the Mustangs' seven touchdowns. Emmanuel Sanders led the SMU receiving corps with 13 catches for 118 yards and three touchdowns.

LaKeitharun Ford led the Tiger defense with 10 total tackles and one interception. LeRico Mathis and Brandon Patterson each added eight tackles apiece for Memphis.

NEW ORLEANS, La. — The Tiger Football team closed out the season at 7-6 with a 44-27 loss to the Florida Atlantic Owls in the 2007 R+L Carriers New Orleans Bowl at the Louisiana Superdome Friday evening.

The loss snapped Memphis' three-game winning streak and drops Memphis to 4-2 all-time in bowl appearances. The only other loss was against Bowling Green in the 2004 GMAC Bowl.

Memphis lost several key players in the game including kicker Matt Reagan (concussion), receiver Maurice Jones (hip), running back T.J. Pitts (ankle) and quarterback Martin Hankins (knee).

Hankins left the game with nearly a minute remaining in the third quarter after taking a hit following a pass attempt. Hankins ended with 281 yards and three touchdowns on 25 of 39 passing. Will Hudgens came in for Hankins and completed one of five pass attempts for zero yardage. Matt Malouf also had two pass attempts.

"I'm disappointed that we didn't do the things we needed to do to win," said head coach Tommy West. "We knew we were going to have to win it with special teams. We knew both offenses were talented, and we knew both offenses would score points. We felt we could win the game by playing special teams and giving ourselves the shorter field and them the longer field. We did just the opposite. They won in kickoff return and kickoff coverage; they won both of them."

"We gave them field position, and then the blocked punt was the turning point I thought in the game," added West. "When the punt was blocked, that kind of took the air out of us. And then we lost our quarterback. We just kind of went down hill from there."

Joseph Doss led the Tigers' ground effort with 91 yards on 20 carries. He had a long of 16 yards and averaged 4.6 yards per carry. Hankins gained 12 yards on two carries and Malouf tallied 11 yards on two carries.

Ten different Tigers caught passes in tonight's game with Doss hauling in a team-high five receptions for 42 yards. Carlos Singleton extended his receiving streak to 21 games and had a team-high 63 yards and one touchdown on four receptions. He scored off a six-yard pass from Hankins in the third quarter. Brett Russell turned in a season-high 45 receiving yards on four receptions and scored Memphis' first touchdown of the game off an eight-yard strike from Hankins with 9:20 remaining in the first quarter.

Sophomore Duke Calhoun has now caught a pass in each of his 24 games played for the Tigers. He had four catches for 40 yards and the 24-game streak ties for third all-time in the Memphis record book. He is tied with Darron White (2001-04). The Memphis school record is 27 games by Russell Copeland (1989-92). Also logging multiple catches were Earnest Williams (3-37) and Carlton Robinzine (2-25). Williams scored Memphis' other receiving touchdown when he pulled in a 19-yard toss from Hankins with under a minute remaining in the first half to cut the Memphis deficit to 10

points (30-20) heading into the break.

Senior kicker Joey Mack scored a career-high eight points in replacing Reagan who left the game with a concussion. Mack hit a 38-yard field goal with 12:12 remaining in the second quarter, marking only his second attempt of the year and the first make of the season. Mack's 38 yarder tied the season high for the Tigers. Mack later hit a 35-yard attempt in the second quarter.

"I thought our guys fought pretty hard and gave us a chance," said West. "I thought the touchdown right before the half was big to get us back into it and then we had the ball first coming out and made it 30-27. Then we had the next kickoff, and we didn't get it out to but the 10 yard line and the next one we had penalties. We didn't do what we needed to win. We had to play defense and we had to play special teams, and we didn't do either."

"We're disappointed in losing the game, but I'm not going to let a loss in a bowl take away from what our senior class has done," West stated. "Our seniors have taken our program to a place it's never been. We're awful proud of that. We're awful proud of what they have accomplished. I take my hat off to Florida Atlantic. They did a great job. To be honest, they deserved to win the game. But we're proud of where we are right now. I can't wait to get back out there and start working towards next year."
