UCF Series

- This will be the first meeting between the Wolverines and Knights
- UCF becomes the fourth different school from the state of Florida that the Wolverines will face during its 137 years of gridiron action
- The Wolverines sport a 5-2 mark against schools from the state of Florida: Florida (3-0), Florida State (1-1) and Miami (1-1)

U-M vs. American Athletic Conference

- Michigan has compiled a 22-5-1 record against teams that currently compete in the American Athletic Conference: Connecticut (2-0), Houston (3-0), Memphis (1-0), Navy (12-5-1), SMU (1-0) and Tulane (3-0)
- The only game that Michigan has played against an American Athletic Conference school happened in 2013, when the Wolverines won a 24-21 affair at Connecticut (Sept. 21)

U-M Ranked in Top 10 to Start 2016 Season

- The Michigan football team opens 2016 ranked in the top 10 of both major national polls
- The Wolverines are listed No. 7 in the pre-season AP poll after receiving a No. 8-ranking in the preseason Amway Coaches Poll
- This is the first time since 2012 that Michigan enters the season listed in the top 10 of both major polls

Jordan on Michigan's Sidelines

- The University of Michigan became the first and only college and/or professional football program to wear brand Jordan on its uniforms and on its entire sideline apparel
- Michigan and NIKE began its 15-year apparel agreement on Aug. 1, 2016
- Jordan will outfit the program from head-to-toe on all game day apparel needs

Five Straight Home Games

- U-M will play five straight home games at Michigan Stadium to start the 2016 season
- This is the 16th time in school history that the Wolverines will begin the year with at least five consecutive home games
- Prior to last season, U-M played five straight at the Big House during the 2011 season
- Following are the seasons with at least five consecutive home games to start the year: 2011, 1976, 1956, 1946, 1917 (8 games), 1916 (7), 1915 (7), 1905 (8), 1903 (7), 1901, 1899, 1898 (7), 1897 (6), 1895 and 1894

The 2016 Schedule

- Michigan's 2016 opponents had a combined record of 78-56 (.582) during the 2015 season
- U-M will play six teams that played in bowl game during the 2015 season: Penn State (Music City), Wisconsin (Holiday), Michigan State (Cotton/College Football Playoff), Iowa (Rose), Indiana (Pinstripe), Ohio State (Fiesta)
- Five of the seven teams in the Big Ten East Division played in bowl games last year
- The Wolverines crossover opponents in the Big Ten West Division are Wisconsin and Iowa
- The 2016 team will play two night games this season: at Rutgers and at Iowa

Butt and Wormley Voted Captains

- The University of Michigan football team elected seniors Jake Butt and Chris Wormley as co-captains for the 2016 season
- Butt will represent the offense and Wormley the defensive side of the football
- The Ohio natives were selected in a vote of their teammates during fall camp on Friday, Aug. 26
- It's the first time since 2011 that a tight end or a defensive lineman were elected captain: TE Kevin Koger and DT Mike Martin were selected captains

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- Michigan has 88 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 41 years of NFL coaching experience and 37 years of playing experience
- Eight of Michigan's 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Jedd Fisch, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Brian Smith, Tyrone Wheatley and Mike Zordich
- Three of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with each of those individuals logging more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years), Tyrone Wheatley (10 years) and Mike Zordich (12 years)
- Those three coaches totaled 37 years of playing experience at the NFL level
- This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert and the 21 years of coaching experience gained by defensive analyst Dave Adolph

The Team, The Team, The Team

- Michigan played 79 student-athletes in their season-opening 63-3 victory over Hawaii.
- Thirty-three (33) of the 79 players made their collegiate debut in the Hawaii game, including eighteen (18) true freshmen.
- Four players earned their first career starts against the Rainbow Warriors: Ian Bunting (TE), Patrick Kugler (LG), Mike McCray (LB) and Wilton Speight (QB)
- The Wolverines return 14 total starters (players who made six or more starts in 2015).
- Pro Football Focus lists U-M No. 3 among teams which return the most production from 2015 to 2016
- ESPN lists U-M No. 3 nationally among teams with the most NFL Draft Talent for 2017. ESPN credited Michigan with nine NFL Draft Prospects, tied with Alabama and LSU for the most in the nation
- U-M has six returning starters on defense: DB Jeremy Clark, DT Ryan Glasgow, S Delano Hill, CB Jourdan Lewis, DB Jabrill Peppers, and DT Chris Wormley
- Michigan returns eight players on the offensive side of the ball, including four offensive linemen: OG/OT Ben Braden, OT Mason Cole, WR Amara Darboh, TE Jake Butt, WR Jehu Chesson, RB De'Veon Smith, and OG Kyle Kalis
- Michigan returns five specialists from the 2015 season: K Kenny Allen, KR Jehu Chesson, KR Jourdan Lewis, KR/PR Jabrill Peppers, and LS Scott Sypniewski
- Quarterback John O'Korn is eligible to compete for the Wolverines after sitting out last season after transferring from Houston

Recapping the 2015 Season

- U-M finished in the top 12 of the national polls for the first time since 2011, finishing 11th in the Amway Coaches poll and 12th in the Associated Press media poll
- Michigan defeated Florida, 41-7, to claim the 2016 Buffalo Wild Wings Citrus Bowl Championship, the program's fourth Citrus Bowl title in five appearances in the New Year's Day game
- The Wolverines posted a 10-win season for the 27th time in the 136-year history of the program
- The U-M defense led the nation in pass efficiency defense (94.6 rating) and listed in the top six of five categories (pass efficiency defense; pass defense, total defense; third downs allowed and scoring defense)
- The Wolverines were tops in the Big Ten and third nationally in kickoff returns (28.4 avg.)
- Michigan finished seventh in red zone offense (92.9 %); scored on 52-56 opportunities this season with a pair of kneel downs to finish games counted in that total
- U-M finished ninth in college football in time of possession (33:27 avg.); won the TOP battle in 10 of the 13 games
- Tight end Jake Butt and cornerback Jourdan Lewis earned first-team All-America honors and cornerback/safety Jabrill Peppers was a second-team selection
- Butt, Lewis, Peppers and wide receiver Jehu Chesson received All-Big Ten first team honors
- Butt was named the Big Ten's Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year and Peppers was named the Thompson-Randle El Freshman of the Year

While he's not a great blocker, he faces a lot of challenging matchups in Michigan's pro style system, and there are a number of impressive blocks on tape."

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2015 (89 Years)

The football program is in its 89th season in the "Big House" in 2015, with a 413-127-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 266 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927 -- 48,313,825 fans have watched the Wolverines play 555 games. The stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 266 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30, 2015. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the *Chicago Tribune* Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.

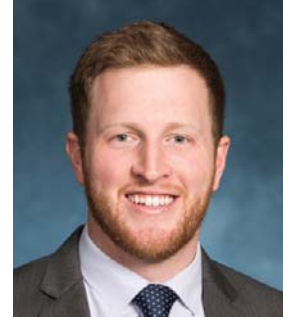
