In its 15th season as a division of IMG College, the Michigan Sports Network represents one of the largest and most-listened to college sports network in the Midwest. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan IMG Radio Network is comprised of 40 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio during football season. Wolverines and Spartans

This will be the 109th meeting between Michigan and Michigan State. The Wolverines hold a 68-35-5 advantage

in the all-time series and has won 23 of the last 37 games played between the two schools. U-M looks to end a three-game losing streak in the series on Saturday.

Michigan at Spartan Stadium

The Wolverines have compiled a 19-14-2 record on the road against the Spartans, including a 17-14-2 mark at Spartan Stadium.

Battle for the Paul Bunyan Trophy

Today's game will be the 64th meeting for the Paul Bunyan Trophy. Since the battle for the trophy began in 1953 with Michigan State's inception into the Big Ten, Michigan holds a 35-26-2 advantage in the series and quest for the coveted trophy. Michigan has won 31 of the past 46 games played between the two rivals (since 1970).

1,300th Game in School History

- Saturday's game at Michigan State will be the 1,300th in the 137-year history of the University of Michigan football program
- Michigan has compiled a NCAA-leading 932 victories; 932-331-26 all-time record
- The Wolverines picked up their 900th victory in school history with a 12-10 victory against Michigan State on Oct. 20, 2012

Battle for State Supremacy

- The annual battle on the gridiron between Michigan and Michigan State started in 1898 and has featured some of the most exciting contests in both schools' histories.
- The two programs have met every year since 1945, a streak of 71 consecutive seasons.
- With the exception of 1943 and 1944, when the series was suspended due to World War II, the Wolverines and Spartans have met on the football field every year since 1910.

Michigan State Series History

- This will be the 109th meeting in the all-time series with Michigan State
- The Wolverines lead the all-time series, 68-35-5, and have won 23 of the last 37 games played between the two schools dating back to 1979
- U-M has compiled a 31-15 mark against MSU since 1970, with winning streaks of eight games (1970-77) and six-games (2002-07) during that stretch of 46 games
- After losing his first game against the Spartans in 1969, head coach Bo Schembechler won 13 of his next 14 games in the series and posted a 17-4 record during his tenure at U-M
- Michigan has won four of the last 10 games in the series; their last win came in 2012, a 12-10 affair at Michigan Stadium
- The last game in the series was played at Michigan Stadium, as the Wolverines saw a win slip away in the final seconds of the game when Michigan State recovered a fumbled snap and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown

64th Battle for the Paul Bunyan Trophy

- Today's game between the in-state rivals will be the 64th played for the Paul Bunyan Trophy
- The Wolverines hold a 35-26-2 advantage in the trophy game
- Michigan has won 31 of the past 46 games played between the two schools since 1970
- Michigan State has won seven of the past eight games played in the series, and has held possession of the Bunyan Trophy for the past three seasons

Paul Bunyan Trophy History

- The Paul Bunyan Trophy dates back to 1953, when Michigan State entered the Big Ten Conference, and has become the cornerstone of the Michigan-Michigan State rivalry since its inception
- It was a donation by then-Michigan governor G. Mennen Williams, the Paul Bunyan Trophy stands nearly four feet tall
- The wooden trophy depicts the figure of legendary folk hero Paul Bunyan astride an axe, with his feet planted over the state of Michigan. On each corner of the state lies a flag emblazoned with the Michigan 'M' or the Spartan 'S.' Each year the winner of the Michigan-Michigan State game is awarded ownership of the prize

U-M vs. MSU at Spartan Stadium

- Michigan sports a 19-14-2 all-time record against Michigan State in East Lansing, including a 17-11-1 mark at Spartan Stadium
- This will be Jim Harbaugh's first appearance at Spartan Stadium as a head coach
- U-M looks to end a four-game losing streak against MSU at Spartan Stadium
- Michigan has a 4-6 record against MSU in the last 10 games played at Spartan Stadium
- This will be the 26th time that Michigan enters East Lansing ranked in the top 25 of the AP poll, with the Wolverines holding a 14-10-1 mark

Greater Rushing Effort Key to Victory

- One of the major components to securing victory in the annual Michigan-Michigan State football game has been the ground game
- From 1969 through 1994 -- 26 consecutive games -- the winning team gained more yards on the ground
- MSU put an end to the string by winning in 1995 despite being out-gained in the rushing department by the Wolverines 218 to 73
- Michigan lost the rushing battle in 2007, 191-100, but came out on top 28-24 at Spartan Stadium

Michigan When Ranked vs. MSU

- This will be the 51st time that Michigan enters a match-up with Michigan State ranked in the top 25 of the Associated Press national poll
- The Wolverines have compiled a 30-19-1 record in those contests, but is 6-10-1 when both teams are ranked in the AP poll
- U-M has won 28 of the past 42 games when they enter the game listed in the top 25

Big Ten Conference Season

- U-M is looking for its first 5-0 start in Big Ten play since 2007; started 6-0 before losing its final two conference games
- Michigan opened its 110th season of Big Ten action with home victories against Penn State (49-10) and No. 8 Wisconsin (14-7) and a road win at Rutgers (78-0)
- U-M has compiled a 494-200-18 record all-time in conference action, tops in Big Ten history
- Michigan has a 9-2 mark in Big Ten action under second-year head coach Jim Harbaugh
- Harbaugh's only setbacks in the Big Ten came against Michigan State and Ohio State last year

U-M Ranked Second in Both National Polls

- Michigan ranks second in both national polls, the Associated Press media poll and the Amway Coaches poll
- This is the first time that the Wolverines have been listed No. 2 in the country since the 2006 season
- This is the ninth straight week that U-M lists in the top 10 of the national polls, including its seven straight week listed in the top 5
- The Wolverines started 2016 listed No. 7 in the AP poll and No. 8 in the Amway Coaches poll; it was the first time since 2012 that U-M began the season listed in the top 10 of both polls
- Michigan won a 14-7 contest against No. 8 Wisconsin on Oct. 1 to collect its first victory over a top 10 team since 2008 (27-25 win over No. 9 Wisconsin)

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- Michigan has 88 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 41 years of NFL coaching experience and 37 years of playing experience
- Eight of Michigan's 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Jedd Fisch, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Mattison, Brian Smith, Tyrone Wheatley and Mike Zordich
- Three of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with each of those individuals logging more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years), Tyrone Wheatley (10 years) and Mike Zordich (12 years)
- Those three coaches totaled 37 years of playing experience at the NFL level
- This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert and the 21 years of coaching experience gained by defensive analyst Dave Adolph

The Team, The Team, The Team

- Michigan is ninth nationally and second in the Big Ten in turnover margin (1.0 avg.)
- The Wolverines have held possession of the football for an average of 34:17 per contest (11th nationally and third in the conference)
- U-M has won the time of possession battle in the past five games, including holding the ball for 35 minutes in three Big Ten contests (41:23 vs. Illinois, 35:49 vs. Penn State and 35:41 vs. Wisconsin)
- The Wolverines typical starting field position is outside of their own 38-yard line while the opposition is averaging their own 25-yard line

- U-M is averaging 4.43 penalties per contest, ranking 13th nationally and third in the Big Ten

- Ten (10) players have earned their first career starts this season: Devin Asiasi (TE), Ian Bunting (TE), Juwann Bushell-Beatty (LT), Ben Bredeson (LG), Chris Evans (RB), Michael Jocz (TE), Patrick Kugler (LG), Mike McCray (LB), Wilton Speight (QB) and Chase Winovich (DE)
- A total of 91 student-athletes have played this season, with a record 79 players seeing action against Hawaii; 33 first-time players and 18 freshmen played in the opener

Offense

- Michigan ranks in the top 20 of seven offensive categories: turnovers lost (2nd), interceptions (2nd), scoring offense (3rd), rushing offense (11th), third down conversions (17th), fumbles lost (17th) and pass efficiency (19th)
- U-M has been a balanced offensive unit this fall, averaging 257.1 yards per game on the ground and 225.9 yards passing
- The balanced U-M offense averages more than 100 yards and 10 points per quarter; has been held under 80 yards in a quarter just four times in 24 quarters this year
- The Wolverines have run 531 offensive plays for 3,381 yards, an average of 6.4 yards per play
- U-M is averaging 483 yards per contest
- U-M has gained 500-plus yards of total offense in four games: 512 yards vs. Hawaii (306 rushing, 206 passing), 515 yards vs. Penn State (326 rushing, 189 passing), 600 yards at Rutgers (481 rushing, 119 passing) and 561 yards vs. Illinois (270 rushing, 291 passing)
- The offense has gained 1,530 rushing yards on 270 carries (5.7 avg.) and scored 25 rushing TDs
- The offense has turned the ball over only five times through seven contests; an interception on the first play of the 2016 season (vs. Hawaii), a fumble by Wilton Speight on a sack against Colorado, an interception during the third quarter against Wisconsin, a fumble by De'Veon Smith at Rutgers and a fumble by Jehu Chesson vs. Illinois
- Michigan has an 14:2 touchdown to interception ratio
- U-M is second nationally and tops in the Big Ten with only five turnovers lost
- The Wolverines are 36-of-40 on red zone chances this season, with 30 touchdowns and six field goals; had perfect efforts against Hawaii (6-6), Penn State (6-6), Rutgers (8-8) and Illinois (5-5)
- Michigan ranks 17th in the country in third down conversions, moving the chains on 48.5 percent of its third down opportunities (47-97); was a perfect 7-for-7 on third down opportunities vs. Hawaii and went 11-of-16 vs. Penn State
- The Wolverines lead the Big Ten and are 22nd nationally in completion percentage at 63.9 per-

- The Wolverine program was established in 1879 when a group of 13 men fielded the first football team in school history and played a pair of off-campus games. U-M defeated Racine 1-0 at White Stocking Park in Chicago, Ill., on May 30, 1879, for the first victory in school history. The Wolverines tied Toronto 0-0 in Detroit to finish the year 1-0-1.
- U-M enters its 133rd year of uninterrupted gridiron action, with 1882 being the only season that the program did not play any varsity games.
- The Wolverines are the sixth-oldest football program in NCAA history.

- Butt, Lewis, Peppers and wide receiver Jehu Chesson received All-Big Ten first team honors
- Butt was named the Big Ten's Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year and Peppers was named the Thompson-Randle El Freshman of the Year
- Chesson was named the Bo Schembechler Most Valuable Player of the 2015 team in a vote of his teammates
- Butt, Chesson and Amara Darboh became the first trio of pass-catchers in school history to eclipse the 50-reception and 500-yard receiving mark in a season
- Lewis ranked third nationally in pass breakups; set U-M's season record with 22 PBUs during the season
- Quarterback Jake Rudock was named the Citrus Bowl Most Valuable Player; he became the second quarterback in school history to pass for 3,000 yards (3,017; John Navarre in 2003)
- Rudock led the Big Ten in completion percentage (64 %)
- Michigan led the nation in attendance for the 39th time in the past 41 years; drew 771,174 fans to Michigan Stadium for the seven-game schedule (110,168 avg.)

MICHIGAN FOOTBALL SERIES HISTORY

THE PAUL BUNYAN TROPHY

The annual Michigan-Michigan State game gives the winner state bragging rights, an inside track to a bowl game, and last, but certainly not least, ownership of the mammoth Paul Bunyan Trophy. The four-foot wooden statue, donated by then-Governor G. Mennen Williams in 1953, portrays the legendary figure astride an axe with feet planted on a map of the state of Michigan. Two flags—one with the Michigan 'M' and the other with the Michigan State 'S'—are planted on either side of Bunyan.

Since the battle for the trophy began in 1953 with Michigan State's inception into the Big Ten Conference, Michigan holds a 35-25 edge with two ties. Since 1970, Michigan has won 31 of the 45 games played between the two schools.

The first game for the Paul Bunyan Trophy was a disputed one for the Wolverines, who said before the Michigan State game that they would refuse the trophy if they won. However, Michigan State won the initial contest 14-6 in East Lansing. In 1954, Michigan was glad to take the trophy back when it defeated Michigan State 33-7 in Ann Arbor.

He is deployed in-line, in the slot as well as split out wide. He routinely beats safeties and even cornerbacks locked in man coverage. He beat an Indiana cornerback up top on a stutter-go route. That's not something you see very often from a big tight end. He has outstanding hands. He attacks the ball in the air (see TD vs. Utah) and wins a lot of 50-50 balls. After the catch, he lacks elite speed but he's nifty to make defenders miss and he has the power to run through tackles. He doesn't go down easily."

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2015 (89 Years)

The football program is in its 89th season in the "Big House" in 2016, with a 418-127-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capacity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 271 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators. Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 -- Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-yard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0.

REDEDICATION GAME: September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927 -- 48,866,430 record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 271 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30, 2015. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the *Chicago Tribune* Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.

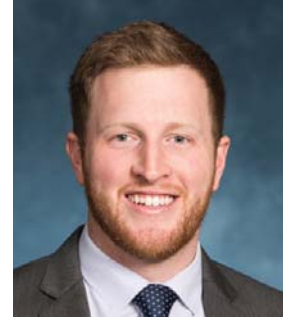
