MIAMI BASEBALL FINISHES 2002 SEASON WITH 31-28 RECORD AND SIXTH STRAIGHT TOURNAMENT APPEARANCE: Despite not reaching the Mid-American Conference tournament championship game for the first in three years the Miami baseball team still had a very respectable 2002 campaign. The RedHawks split their final regular-season series with Kent State to secure a spot in the conference tourney, and once there knocked off Eastern Michigan before being knocked out themselves by Ball State.

In a typical baseball season filled with win and hitting streaks the Red and White opened the 2002 season with a 9-3 record, which included a six-game winning streak from March 5-March 12. An 11-5 victory at Cincinnati on March 7 marked the first time since 1998 that the RedHawks defeated UC at Johnny Bench Field. March 24 was a memorable date for Miami as it played its first game in its new ballpark, McKie Field at Hayden Park, against Purdue. After dropping an 8-0 decision to the Boilermakers, Miami went on to register a 14-8 record in its friendly confines compared to an 11-16 tally on the road. The RedHawks' 16-12 MAC record was good enough to earn them the sixth and final seed in the tournament, as well as marking the third straight season with a 16-12 conference tally.

Please do not use Miami of Ohio, University of Miami of Ohio, etc. Also, in 1997, the University began using its new nickname, the RedHawks. It is one word with a capital H. Thank you.

MAC TOURNEY - GAME ONE VERSUS BOWLING GREEN: The RedHawks struck first with two runs in the second inning off three hits. Starting the two-run rally with a double to left field was freshman **Paul Frietch** (Montgomery, Ohio/Moeller). Sophomore **Ryan Edginton** (Chester Springs, Pa./Arizona State) singled up the middle to move Frietch over the third. Frietch scored on a wild pitch while Edginton to score when junior **Andi Scheidt** (Cincinnati, Ohio/LaSalle) ripped an RBI single through the left side.

Facing a 2-0 deficit and Red and White senior hurler **Russ Bayer** (Naperville, Ill./Naperville North) the Falcons notched three runs in the third frame to take a 3-2 lead. Corey Loomis tagged the right-hander for a two-run home run in the frame.

A solo home run by Nick Elrod in the fourth and a two-run double off the bat of Kelly Hunt in the fifth gave the Falcons a 6-2 advantage.

Miami mounted a comeback in the sixth inning by scoring three runs to knot the game at 6-6. Freshman **Brian Canada** (Fishers, Ind./Hamilton Southeastern) opened the frame with a single through the right side, and was followed by a single from junior **David Cook** (Columbus, Ohio/St. Francis DeSales). Sellery did the rest from there by blasting a three-run home run over the left-center field wall.

A single run in the seventh frame gave the RedHawks their second lead of the ball game 7-6. Canada registered the RBI when he hit a flyball deep enough to center field to sacrifice Edginton home from third base.

Bowling Green took the lead for good 10-6, however, with a grand slam in the bottom of the seventh stanza. With runners on first and second Bayer intentionally walked the MAC Player of the Year Hunt to face Andy Hudak. Hudak made the RedHawks pay for the walk by clearing the bases with a blast over the left-field wall. BGSU went on to win the contest 15-6.

MAC TOURNEY - GAMES TWO AND THREE VERSUS EASTERN MICHIGAN AND BALL STATE: The RedHawks regrouped in a must-win contest against Eastern Michigan with a decisive 14-13 victory. Junior **Michael Carlin** (Pittsburgh, Pa./Mt. Lebanon) lit up the Eagles pitching staff with a career game belting four home runs in four consecutive at-bats. It was the first time in Miami history that an individual hit four home runs in a single game, as well as setting the MAC tournament record.

The Red and White broke the game open in the third frame when Carlin hit his first of four home runs, one of the three-run nature to give Miami a 4-1 lead. Carlin's next three dingers were all of the solo sort coming in the fourth, fifth and eighth innings. In addition to Carlin's blasts, Scheidt hit his third grand slam of the year while Edginton and Cook each had solo home runs.

Senior hurler **Shawn Landis** (Pleasant Hill, Ohio/Dayton) didn't have his best stuff on the mound but held the lead for 6.1 innings to improve his record to a perfect 8-0. Prior to the tournament Landis was named to the All-MAC Second Team after going 6-0 with a 3.97 earned run average in conference action. Also earning first-team all-MAC honors were Carlin and junior **Mike Galloway** (St. Thomas, Ontario/Central Michigan).

Miami's seven team home runs set a MAC tournament single-game record, and catapulted it into a third game against Ball State. In their fifth meeting of the season the Cardinals scored in all nine innings to eliminate the Red and White from the postseason with a 19-16 victory.

The RedHawks didn't go down without a fight, however, as they entered their final three outs down 19-10. Miami's first four batters all scored to narrow the gap to five, 19-14. Junior **George Stegmiller** (Columbus, Ohio/Upper Arlington) ripped a single to load the bases for Cook who delivered with a two-run double. Cook crossed the plate to give Miami 16 runs, but it never got any closer as the Cardinals retired the third out for the victory. Finishing the season with a 31-28 record, the RedHawks' hottest batter was Edginton who ended with a 10-game hitting streak.

LIVESTATS AVAILABLE FROM HERE ON OUT: On April 21 at home against Buffalo the RedHawks appeared live on the internet via www.MURedHawks.com for the first time. The gamecast used was very similar to what ESPN.com and CBS.Sportsline.com run on their websites. All of next year's home contests and some away games will be available so the Red and White faithful can now catch the action even when unable to attend the game.

CARLIN'S MAC TOURNAMENT: In three games at the MAC tournament **Michael Carlin** was seeing watermelons as he led the team with a .500 batting average (7-14), four home runs and seven RBI. After setting a MAC tournament record with four dongs against Eastern Michigan Carlin was named to the all-tournament team. He was Miami's only representative on the all-tourney team joining four Kent State players, four Ball State players and one Central Michigan Chippewa.

Carlin also tied MAC tournament single-game records with four runs and seven RBI against Eastern Michigan. His four round-trippers tie John VanBenschoten of Kent State for the tournament record as well.

THREE REDHAWKS NAMED TO ALL-MAC TEAMS: Juniors **Michael Carlin** and **Mike Galloway**, and senior **Shawn Landis** all earned all-MAC honors at the conclusion of the regular season. Both Carlin and Galloway were named to the first team while Landis garnered second-team accolades.

Carlin was named to the first-team as a designated hitter after belting out a team-high 19 home runs, the highest single-season total in Miami history. Carlin also is ranked 10th in the MAC with a .651 slugging percentage, and is tied for sixth in the conference with nine dingers in league action. Twice this season Carlin has belted three round-trippers in a contest, and is tied with three other RedHawks with four three-baggers. His three-run home run in the 10th inning at Northern Kentucky (March 5) gave the Red and White a 19-15 victory. He capped the season with a record-breaking four home run performance against Eastern Michigan in the MAC tournament.

An NCAA Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American and first-team selection at Central Michigan Galloway garners his second first-team honor in 2002 by leading the conference with a .436 batting average at the end of the regular season. His versatility with the RedHawks this season led to his being named the MAC's top utility player. He started all 59 games this season for the RedHawks, 34 as a first baseman, 15 behind the plate, nine at third, and one as a designated hitter. Galloway also led the MAC in hits and runs scored.

Landis emerged from the bullpen mid-season and was perfect in all six of his starts for the RedHawks. He posted a 4.87 earned run average while running up a perfect 8-0 mark on the hill. For the past two and a half seasons Landis has been a stalwart reliever for the RedHawks tossing 11 wins while never losing in the Red and White uniform. In six conference starts Landis continued is outstanding pitching by leading the conference with 6-0 tally.

DOUBLE CENTURY MARK: Known in the Miami dugout as "Skip" or "Coach Smith", Miami's head coach Tracy Smith joined a distinguished list of Miami baseball coaches when the RedHawks defeated Eastern Michigan at the MAC tournament. The 14-13 win kept Miami alive in the tournament and brought Smith's career record to 200-156, making him the third coach in Miami history to top the 200-win plateau. Jon Pavlisko (379 wins) and Bud Middaugh (356) are the only other two Miami skippers with more than 200 wins on their resume.

HEAD COACH TRACY SMITH: In his sixth year at Miami, Smith has reached the Mid-American Conference Tournament finals four times and claimed the 2000 championship to earn a trip to the NCAA Tournament. Smith, who was

named the 2000 Ohio College Coach of the Year, has amassed a 200-157 (.560) career record and a Mid-American Conference regular-season record of 102-74 (.581). He is only the fourth baseball coach in school history to register 150 wins, which occurred with Miami's 3-1 win at Buffalo on April 13, 2001.

During Smith's era in Oxford, Miami players have been named to the all-MAC First Team eight times, and three also were named to last year's all-tournament team. In addition, 15 student-athletes have been recognized as academic all-MAC selections, including 2001 Verizon academic all-American Luke Reinhart. Last year, right fielder Jason Knoedler added another notch to Smith's belt by being named a second-team all-American.

KEEL MAKES IT AN EVEN TRIFECTA FOR THE REDHAWKS: Only one time this season Miami baseball earned Mid-American Conference East Division Pitcher of the Week honors. Garnering the award for the RedHawks was junior pitcher **Adam Keel** who tossed his first nine-inning complete game of the season against Kent State for a win, and tossed in a save in a mid-week contest at Wright State

Keel earned his second save of the season on Wednesday, May 15 at Wright State by working two solid innings of relief, allowing only one hit in two frames while striking out two Raiders' batters. He followed up this performance with his best work of the season on Sunday, May 19 at home against Kent State. Keel toed the rubber for all nine innings against the Golden Flashes allowing three hits and one run in his first complete game of the season. The win was an important one as it prevented Kent State from becoming the host of the MAC Tournament, instead Bowling Green is the host.

In 11 innings of work Keel allowed only one earned run for a 0.82 earned run average. He also held opponents to a .108 (4-37) batting average while striking out four. The complete game against Kent State was his first since his freshman season.

THE CUTTING EDGE-INTON: Sophomore **Ryan Edginton** may have had a slow start in his first season with the RedHawks, but he finished it in style with a 10-game hitting streak. During this stretch Edginton was second on the squad with a .432 (19-44) batting average while crossing the plate a team-high 14 times. He saved his best for last by going 4-for-5 from the dish with two RBI and three runs in Miami's final game of the season against Ball State. He also collected five assists from right field, registering the highest assist total by a RedHawks' outfielder in over three seasons.

The only blemish on Edginton's season was a team-leading 47 strikeouts. His mark of 47 is the fifth highest single-season total.

GALLOWAY'S ASSAULT ON THE RECORD BOOKS: In his first season with the RedHawks junior **Mike Galloway** has not disappointed anyone but Miami opponents. After batting .579 (22-38) over the final two weeks of the regular season and a 2-for-12 tourney performance, Galloway finishes short of several Miami records.

His final batting average of .422 the second-highest single-season clip behind Chris Sexton's .429 average in 1993. Galloway's 94 hits, 161 total bases, 72 runs, and 63 RBI are also all the second-highest season totals at Miami. On a national level Galloway's .422 clip is tied for 22nd among all Division I players.

TOO MUCH TO BAYER FOR OPPONENTS: Senior **Russ Bayer** wrapped up his career at Miami as one of the most consistent pitchers to ever wear the Red and White. After a 7-4 senior season Bayer brought his career mark to 28-14, piling up the second-highest win total in Miami history. His 224 strikeouts is the sixth highest at Miami, surpassing the likes of professional hurlers Nate Tekavec and Scott Sauerbeck.

Bayer also showed his versatility as an athlete making several pinch-hit appearances for the RedHawks. In 12 at-bats Bayer managed to knock two hits, including a two-RBI single against Youngstown State on March 28.

SMOOTH AS SCHMIDT: Junior second baseman **Zach Schmidt** (Cincinnati, Ohio/McNicholas) enjoyed his best season with Miami in 2002. In 59 games Schmidt batting a career-high .310 (54-174) from the dish. He surpassed his career high for RBI with 28, and also tied for the team lead with three triples.

But it wasn't Schmidt's bat that kept him in the lineup day-in and day-out, instead it was his glove. He was the RedHawks most consistent infielder this season committing only nine errors in 286 chances. His .969 fielding percentage was the best among Miami's everyday infielders, and also was a career best for Schmidt. Schmidt led Miami with 161 assists.

LUCKY SEVEN NOT SO LUCKY FOR SLONE: Freshman **John Slone** (Cincinnati, Ohio/St. Xavier) went two-for-three at Indiana on April 9 to extend his hitting streak to seven games, but the streak came at a cost. In his fourth plate appearance Slone drew a base on balls but was hit on the hand during the at-bat. The result was an unfavorable one for the RedHawks as Slone's left-hand pinky was broken. He returned to the lineup for the MAC tournament, and despite not being able to bat was called upon for pinch-running duty against Eastern Michigan.

CARLIN'S FIRST CAREER WEEKLY ACCOLADE: For the second time this season Miami earned MAC Player of the Week kudos when junior **Michael Carlin** earned the distinction. Carlin paced the team in every statistical category, minus hits, during the week of April 22-29.

Carlin played both first base and left field in six games against Wright State, Cincinnati and Marshall, going 11-for-21 from the dish to lead the Red and White with a .524 batting average. He also led the team in runs scored (8), doubles (3), triples (1), home runs (5), RBI (10), total bases (31), slugging percentage (1.476) and on-base percentage (.583).

He matched his single-game record of three home runs at Marshall (April 26) when he left the park three times in a 16-8 RedHawks' victory. Carlin continued to swing for the fences in the next three games swatting two more out of the park en route to finishing the weekend with seven dingers. He was 3-for-4 from the plate in Miami's come-from-behind victory at Marshall on April 27, and was a triple short of the cycle.

Over a six-game span Carlin led the Red and White with four multiple-hit and three multiple-RBI games. Nine of his 11 hits went for extra bases, while he raised his batting average 33 points, from .305 to .338. He leads Miami with 12 home runs.

GALLOWAY EARNS FIRST PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS FOR MIAMI:

Junior first baseman **Mike Galloway** was named the Mid-American Conference's East Division Player of the Week after leading the Miami University baseball team in several offensive categories during the team's spring break trip to Boca Raton, Fla. The award is both the RedHawks' and Galloway's first of the 2002 season.

The junior transfer led the RedHawks with a .464 (13-for-28) batting average, 11 RBI and eight runs scored in seven games in Florida. He opened the week with a five-RBI performance against Monmouth, which included crossing the plate three times in Miami's 16-1 rain-shortened victory against the Hawks. The next day against Radford, Galloway went 4-for-5 with a double and a triple, finishing just a home run short of hitting for the cycle. In the seven games, Galloway had four multi-hit games as well as three multi-run and multi-RBI contests.

Galloway's bat was a crucial component of the RedHawks' 12-7 victory over Kansas State on March 14, going 3-for-6 with three RBI. The two most important Galloway RBI were the two that came courtesy of a two-run shot in the sixth inning which put the Red and White on top for good, 8-7. Until an 0-for-3 performance against Florida Atlantic, Galloway had registered a hit in 10 straight contests for Miami.

LEONARD EARNS PRESEASON HONOR: Junior left-handed pitcher **Chris Leonard** was selected by the *Collegiate Baseball* newspaper as a member of the 2002 Louisville Slugger third-team pre-season all-America team. This is the second pre-season honor garnered by the junior southpaw.

Last season with the RedHawks, Leonard led the team with an 11-3 record and was fourth in the Mid-American Conference with a 3.36 ERA in 17 appearances. Twice during the 2001 campaign Leonard was named the East Division Pitcher of the Week. He broke Miami's single-season record for innings pitched with 112.2 and tied the single-season record of 11 wins.

LEONARD NAMED CAPE COD BASEBALL LEAGUE PITCHER OF THE YEAR:

Leonard added to his resume this summer when he led the Cape League Baseball League with a 6-0 record and a paltry 0.98 earned run average. In 55 innings pitched, the lefty struck out 64 and walked only 11, resulting in a 5.8/1 K/BB ratio. On July 8, Leonard was named the Cape's Pitcher of the Week after fanning 15 Falmouth hitters and walking none in a complete game victory. His ERA that week was 0.38. He wrapped up the summer by leading the Gatemen to the CCBL championship and was named the Cape Cod Baseball League Pitcher of the Year.

Also on the Wareham Gatemen were senior left-hander **Russ Bayer** and junior first basemen **Mike Galloway**.

A MAJOR TRANSFER-ANCE OF OFFENSE: Lost from last season's RedHawk team is 74.6 percent of its run production and 59 of its 73 dingers. Miami, however, received a pleasant boost at the plate in transfers **Mike Galloway** and **Ryan Edginton**.

A likely candidate for the starting job at first base, Galloway came to the RedHawks after two solid seasons with MAC foe Central Michigan. In

2000, Galloway was named a freshman all-American after batting .345 with 11 roundtrippers and a team-high 47 RBI. Edginton, a redshirt transfer from Arizona State, was Miami's starting right fielder this season.

REDHAWKS TABBED TO FINISH SECOND IN MAC EAST: The Mid-American Conference released its 2002 Baseball Preseason Coaches' Poll on Feb. 12 with the Miami baseball team seated second in the East Division behind last year's champion, Kent State. After a 35-25 season in 2001 and a MAC championship game appearance, the RedHawks received 75 points and three first-place votes.

Ball State was head-and-shoulders above the competition in the West Division, receiving 12 of 13 first-place votes and 77 points. The Cardinals also received the majority of votes for winning the MAC Tournament, with eight. Miami garnered two votes to win the MAC Tournament while Kent State and Central Michigan raked in one vote each.

SEVEN COMMITTED TO REDHAWK BASEBALL FOR 2003: Coach Smith announced in November the early signing of seven incoming freshmen to National Letters of Intent for the 2003 season. The early signees are comprised of five pitchers and two position players.

Wes Ireton, a 6-foot-4, 195-pound pitcher signs with the RedHawks after a decorated career at New Castle Chrysler High School in New Castle, Ind. He was rated as one of the "top prospects" in Indiana by *Team One Baseball*. A rightie on the mound, Ireton also was selected to the White Sox Area Code Team two consecutive years. Last season he was Indiana's "Top Junior."

One of the two left-handed pitchers among the new signees is Sam Shorts, a 6-foot-1, 185-pound southpaw from Glenbard East High School in Glen Ellyn, Ill. As a junior, Shorts was a Team One participant and led his team in earned run average last season.

A native of Granville, Ohio, Matt Long signs with the RedHawks after another solid season at Granville High School. A 6-foot-5, 195-pound right-hander, Long has accumulated a 17-9 record over three years at Granville. He has pitched 133.2 innings, striking out 188 batters while only allowing 69 free passes. Last season as a junior, Long was named to the all-Ohio Division III and all-Region second-teams.

Coach Smith's second left-handed pitcher of the bunch, 6-foot-4, 200-pound Graham Taylor, commits after being named a first-team all-star in the Cincinnati Fall League. Taylor competes for Dixie Heights High School in Villa Hills, Ky., where he was named MVP of the 9th Region tournament as a junior. He carries an 8-3 career record and an impressive 1.41 ERA into his final season.

Matt Raguse, a transfer from St. Louis Community College, rounds out the pitchers in the early signee group. A 6-foot-3, 180-pound right-handed thrower at STLCC, Raguse finished his first season with a 3.30 ERA and 5-3 record. Prior to committing to Miami, Raguse had been drafted by the Arizona Diamondbacks in the 43rd round of the Major League Baseball Entry Draft.

Geoff Orr, a 6-foot-1, 170-pound shortstop for Carl Sandburg High School in Orland Park, Ill., is one of two position players to commit to the Red and White. During the 2001 season, Orr set a school record for stolen bases with 24 and also was selected by Team One as the Top Rated Shortstop in Illinois. In addition to setting a school record, Orr batted .456 and knocked in 33 runs to lead his team.

Rounding out Coach Smith's early signees is second basemen Will Reynolds from Brownsburg, Ind. At 5-foot-11 and 165-pounds, Reynolds led his team with 49 RBI and seven home runs while batting from both sides of the plate. Reynolds was an all-Metro West selection and first-team all-state selection at second base.
