## 2002-03 SEASON REVIEW



### JOHNSON AND HAUSFELD GARNER POSTSEASON HONORS

Guards **Juby Johnson** and **Josh Hausfeld** earned Mid-American Conference postseason honors. Johnson was a second-team all-MAC selection, while Hausfeld was named to the MAC all-Freshman Team. Johnson became the first Miami player to earn second-team honors since Alex Shorts in 2001. Doug Davis was an honorable mention all-MAC pick in 2002. Hausfeld was the third-straight all-freshman honoree for Miami, following Danny Horace and Johnson.

### JOHNSON HIGHLIGHTS MIAMI AWARD WINNERS

**Juby Johnson** garnered two of the most prestigious awards at the annual postseason men's basketball banquet, being tabbed the RedHawks' William Rohr Most Valuable Player and Richard Shrider Defensive Player of the Year.

Johnson led Miami in scoring with 14.8 points per game and 15.7 ppg in league action. His 15.7 ppg ranked 13th among MAC leaders. Johnson scored in double figures 21 times, including five 20-plus point performances. Typically drawing the toughest defensive assignments, Johnson held his defensive assignment under his respective scoring average in 21 of Miami's 27 regular-season games.

**Tim Schenke** also earned two awards: The Darrell Hedric Most Improved Player and Randy Gunlock Scholar-Athlete Award. Schenke owns a 3.10 grade-point average and played in 24 games last season, while starting four contests.

Seven other RedHawks earned individual awards. **Matt Jameson** was honored with the Marshall North Award, which is presented to the player who best exemplifies the virtue of loyalty—to the University, team and coaches—and whose personal sacrifice of time, effort and energy contribute materially to the advancement of the record of the team. **Nate VanderSluis**, who has overcome two foot injuries the past two years, was tabbed the Jamie Mercurio Award recipient, which is given to the player who exemplifies courage, determination and perseverance. **Doug Williams** and **Gene Seals** shared the Holdie Wilson Spirit Award, given to a player who best demonstrates an unconditionally positive spirit.

**Josh Hausfeld** was named the team's Arthur and Olga Adkins Freshman of the Year, following a freshman campaign in which he earned MAC All-Freshman honors. **Chet Mason** was honored for being the team's leading rebounder with 173 boards this season. Mason finished the season ranked fifth nationally for small rebounders and 10th in the MAC, averaging 6.2 boards per game. **Danny Horace** was presented

the Dr. Terry Hunt Free Throw Award for owning the team's top free-throw percentage. Shooting .758 from the free-throw line, Horace ranked 14th in the MAC.

Miami, which finished second in the Mid-American Conference's East Division and earned its first automatic berth into the MAC Tournament as the No. 3 seed, finished the year 13-15 overall and 11-7 in the Mid-American Conference. The RedHawks made their 15th consecutive MAC Tournament quarterfinal appearance but fell to Ohio, 65-55, in overtime.

### MASON TIED FOR SIXTH ON SINGLE-SEASON STEAL LIST

Amassing 51 steals last season, guard **Chet Mason** catapulted himself onto Miami's single-season steal list, tying Derrick Cross' 1994 and 1995 season tallies for sixth. The single-season thieving standard is 101, set by Ron Harper in 1986.

### MASON STEALS SHOW

**Chet Mason** grabbed a game-best and season-high six steals against Ohio on Jan. 18, all of which came in the second half, which tied for fourth on Miami's single-game list. The six steals are the second-highest single-game sum in Miami history. Three people have recorded seven steals.

### MASON ONE OF NATION'S TOP SMALL REBOUNDERS

For two seasons, **Chet Mason** has ranked nationally among the top small rebounders (6-foot-3 and under), according to Stats, Inc. Mason finished the 2002-03 campaign ranked fifth on the list, averaging 6.18 boards per game. Boston College's Ryan Sidney topped the list, averaging 6.94 rpg.

# 2002-03 SEASON REVIEW

## THE HORACE FACTOR

It is no secret that when Miami scores at least 70 points, it wins games. A key factor for that scoring surge is forward **Danny Horace**. In Miami's wins over the past two years, Horace averaged 11.7 points per game, 6.8 rebounds per game and shot 52.0 percent from the field. Contrastingly, he scored just 6.5 ppg, shot 31.7 percent from the field and notched 5.3 boards per game in Miami's losses. As a sophomore, Horace averaged 14.8 ppg and 6.6 rpg in Miami's wins and 8.7 ppg and 4.9 rpg in its losses. During his freshman stint, Horace notched 8.8 ppg and 7.1 rpg in the RedHawks' wins and 4.8 ppg and 4.9 rpg in their losses.

## DANNY ON THE BLOCK

In just two short seasons, forward **Danny Horace** already has placed his name among Miami's career block leaders. Horace, who owns 47 career blocks, ranks eighth on the list. He needs 23 more to tie for seventh on the list.

## STINGY DEFENSE

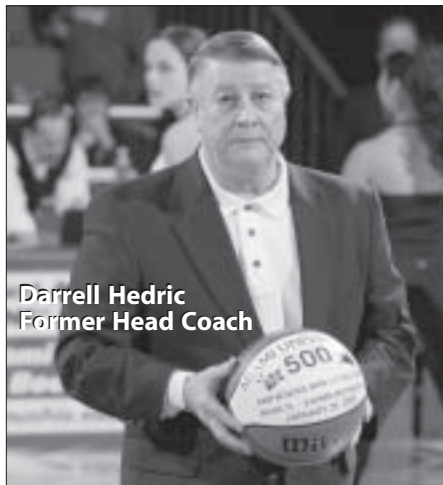
One of the hallmarks of **Charlie Coles** coached Miami basketball teams is a strong emphasis on defense. Miami finished the season ranked third nationally in scoring defense according to ESPN.com, giving up just 58.7 ppg on the season. Air Force led the nation in scoring defense, allowing only 57.0 ppg.

## MIAMI IS FIRST TO 500!

With a 73-58 win at Eastern Michigan on Jan. 29, 2003, Miami became the first Mid-American Conference school to attain 500 league wins. In their 56-year history in the MAC, the RedHawks hold a 505-293 record in conference play and boast a league-best .633 winning percentage. The next closest school in the win column is Ohio University, which owns a 452-357 record over 57 years in the MAC. Miami also owns 20 regular-season MAC crowns, more than twice the number of any other league school.

## MIAMI BOASTS ONE OF NATION'S TOP NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULES

Over the past three seasons, Miami's strength of schedule has been among the Top 15 nationally at the conclusion of non-conference play, and the 2002-03 slate was no different. As has become the signature of Miami's non-conference slate, the RedHawks' strength of schedule at the end of 2002-03 non-conference play was among the nation's top five according to CollegeRPI.com and in the Sagarin Index (No. 4 in CollegeRPI.com and No. 5 in the Sagarin Index). Heading into its game against Cincinnati on Dec. 28, 2002, Miami's strength of schedule was No. 1 in both indexes. At the end of the season, the RedHawks' strength of schedule was ranked No. 63 in the Sagarin Index and 81st by CollegeRPI.com. Miami finished the season ranked 114th according to Sagarin and ranked 133rd with CollegeRPI.com.

## TURNOVERS

Last season, Miami set a single-season standard for fewest turnovers with just 327. Each of the past four years rank among the top six in fewest single-season team turnovers: No. 2. 330 (2000), No. 4. 362 (2001), No. 6. 378 (2002).



## 2002-03 SEASON REVIEW

### IT'S BEEN A LONG TIME ...

With its 63-35 win at Buffalo on Feb. 22, Miami held an opponent to 35 points for the first time since Dec. 7, 1948, when it downed Defiance, 75-32. It also marked the third time during the 2002-03 campaign the RedHawks held an opponent to less than 40 points and the fourth time they held the opposition to fewer than 50 points. The last time Miami held opponents to under 40 points three times in the same season was during the 1946-47 campaign.

### JOHNSON CASHING IN THE 20'S

During the 2002-03 season, guard **Juby Johnson** went to the bank and cashed in the 20's ... 20-point games, that is. Over a five-game stretch, Johnson scored 20-plus points in four contests (26 at Eastern Michigan; 21 vs. Buffalo; 21 at Kent State; 21 vs. Marshall). During the stretch he hit 51.4 percent of his field goals, 44.7 percent of his three-point shots and 83.3 percent of his free throws to average 20.8 points per game.

**THE BILL COSBY OF COLLEGE BASKETBALL MEETS BILL COSBY:** Truly the Bill Cosby of college basketball, you would be hard pressed to find anybody who more embodies the spirit of the sport than Miami University head coach Charlie Coles. The eighth-year RedHawk mentor has a unique flare for combining his fiercely competitive nature with father-figure attributes and his always-effervescent personality, which makes him one of the most popular sideline generals around the Mid-American Conference. Never without a fitting anecdote, which neatly interweaves an explanation to a situation or answer to a question with an entertaining tale, Coles' zest for life and for basketball have kept him in the game, despite the odds. In October of 2002, Coles had the opportunity to not only meet Bill Cosby, who was performing in Miami's Millett Hall for Parents Weekend, but introduced Cosby to open the show.

### SPORTS ILLUSTRATED UNCOVERS "PROFESSOR HOOPS"

In the 2002-03 basketball preview edition of *Sports Illustrated*, senior writer Grant Wahl uncovered Miami University's "Professor Hoops" Charlie Coles—the only head coach at any of the nation's 150 largest schools who teaches a course in basketball theory. Coles teaches a nine-week sprint course called Basketball Theory (PHS 331), which goes through the fundamentals of coaching basketball as part of Miami's coaching minor. Coles personally teaches every class, which meets for two hours every Tuesday and Thursday at 8 a.m. over the first nine weeks of the fall semester.

### SCHENKE NAMED MAC SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF WEEK

**Tim Schenke** was named MAC Male Scholar-Athlete of the Week after back-to-back wins over Dayton and Western Michigan.

Schenke, who owns a 3.37 GPA and majors in finance, hit a critical three as time expired in the first half against Dayton to cut the Flyer lead to five and give the RedHawks momentum going into the second half. During a 17-0 second half run, Schenke hit another three to push Miami's lead to five. Miami's bench was a key component to the Dayton win, outscoring the Flyers 18-7. Schenke accounted for nine of those 18 points.

For the second straight game, Schenke drilled a critical three against Western Michigan. All seven of his points came in the second half.

### JOHNSON NAMED MAC EAST DIVISION PLAYER OF THE WEEK

**Juby Johnson** was named Mid-American Conference East Division Player of the Week on Feb. 17 after helping Miami to its most lopsided win this season against a Division I opponent and securing its second-place East Division standing, the conference office announced Feb. 17.

Johnson poured in a game-high 21 points en route to a 69-49 win over Marshall in Miami's lone contest of the week, which snapped a two-game skid for the RedHawks. In addition to accounting for nearly 30 percent of Miami's points, he also pulled down six rebounds, including a season-high three offensive boards, and snagged two steals.

### JOHNSON'S 20/20/20 VISION

For the first time since 2000-01, a Miami player put together three-straight 20-plus point games. Junior guard **Juby Johnson** poured in a career-high-tying 26 points at Eastern Michigan and turned around to toss in a game-best 21 points against Buffalo and a team-high 21 points at Kent State. Alex Shorts was the last player to accomplish the feat, with three consecutive 21-point games from Feb. 3-11, 2001.

### HORACE TABBED MAC

#### EAST DIVISION PLAYER OF THE WEEK

**Danny Horace** was tabbed player of the week by the MAC on Jan 27 after pacing the RedHawks in wins over Akron (74-59) and Ball State (58-56). He poured in a career-high-tying 21 points against Akron to lead all scorers, drilling 10-of-13 field goals to shoot a sizzling 76.9 percent from the field, helping Miami to its best shooting efficiency of the season (.583). His seven boards against the Zips lifted Miami to a season-high for rebounds (35) and its greatest rebounding margin of the season (+16).

Against the Cardinals, Horace tallied a game-best 18 points and pulled down a team-best nine boards as Miami battled to rebound BSU, 34-32.

For the week, Horace averaged 19.5 points per game, and 8.0 rebounds per game to lead the RedHawks. He also shot 55.2 percent from the field (16-of-29).

### MASON TABBED MAC

#### EAST DIVISION PLAYER OF THE WEEK

**Chet Mason** earned Mid-American Conference East Division Player of the Week honors following games against Toledo and Ohio.

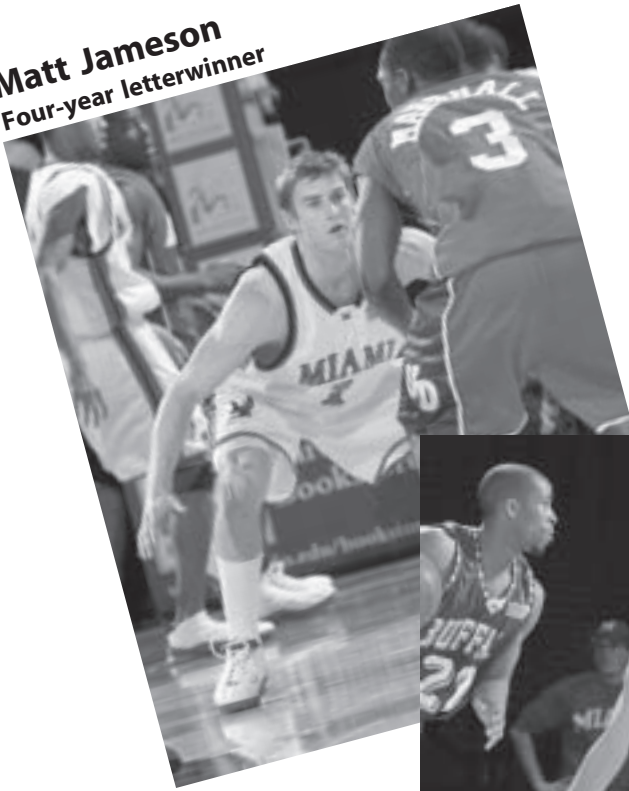
Mason led Miami against Toledo and Ohio, scoring 17 and 22 points, respectively, to average 19.5 points per game for the week. Mason's career-high 22 points against Ohio lifted Miami to a 77-65 win over the Bobcats, its first road win since Feb. 6, 2002, and first win in The Convo since 1998.

Mason was a sizzling 8-of-10 from the field (.800) and 3-of-4 from three-point range (.750), single-handedly putting together two second-half runs to cinch the game against the Bobcats.

He also grabbed a game-high and career-best six steals, all in the second half. For the week, Mason hit 65.2 percent of his field goals 55.6 percent of his three-point attempts, averaged 7.0 rebounds per game and collected eight steals.

### Miami 78 Dayton 63

Dec. 4, 2002—Oxford, Ohio

Spurred by a career-high 21-point effort by sophomore forward Danny Horace and a 17-0 run late in the second half, Miami overcame a five-point halftime deficit to upend the previously unbeaten Dayton Flyers, 78-63. The RedHawks were bolstered by a .700 field goal percentage in the second half, which included an .800 shooting percentage from three-point range. Dayton went on an 8-2 run from 10:42 to 4:35 in the first half to take its largest lead of the game—11 points—16-27. Miami, however, outscored the Flyers 9-3 over the final three minutes of the half to cut the Dayton lead to five, 30-25. Sophomore forward Tim Schenke drilled a three-point shot as time expired in the half. Horace connected on a pair of jump shots, while junior guard Chet Mason notched two free throws during the late spurt. The RedHawk shooters were on fire in the second half, connecting on their first five three-point attempts to evaporate Dayton's 11-point lead. Horace drained a trey at the 16:32 mark to knot the score, 36-36, tying the game for the first time since the opening buckets of the contest. Dayton took a four-point lead at 12:50 as Nate Green hit one of his two free-throw attempts, and the Flyers held a two-point edge with 11 minutes left, 48-46. That would be the last lead for the Flyers. Miami went on a 17-0 scoring surge over a seven-minute span to construct a 15-point lead, 63-48, with 3:38 left in the contest. A trio of threes by Horace, Schenke and junior forward Gene Seals along with a powerful dunk by Horace off the assist from Mason highlighted the RedHawk rally. From there, Dayton got no closer than 10 points as the RedHawks handed the Flyers their first loss of the season. Miami's bench was a key factor as the RedHawk bench outscored the Flyer bench 18-7, due in large part to the efforts of Schenke, who had a career-best nine points off 3-of-4 three-point shots, and Seals, who chipped in seven points. Junior guard Juby Johnson collected 15 points for Miami, all

in the second half, while Mason added 14. Horace grabbed a game-high-tying eight rebounds.

### Miami 44 Western Michigan 39

Dec. 7, 2002—Oxford, Ohio

Miami took its first lead against Western Michigan since a one-point edge with 11 minutes left in the first half, 6-5, when senior guard Matt Jameson connected on one of two free-throw attempts to hand the RedHawks a one-point lead, 38-37, with 2:51 remaining in the game. The RedHawks never looked back as they collected a 44-39 win over the Broncos to open Mid-American Conference play. Miami held Western Michigan to a season-low for points and earned its first win scoring under 50 points since February 2001. It also was the first time since 1995 that Miami held a team under 40 points. Neither team led by more than five points throughout the contest. Sophomore forward Danny Horace produced a team-best 13 points, going 7-of-8 from the free-throw line. Horace was one of just two players in double figures for the game. WMU's Collum tallied 14 points. Horace also snagged a game-high seven rebounds.

Mason tipped in a Johnson miscue to initiate the RedHawk rally. Sophomore Tim Schenke drained a trey at 10:36 to spark the RedHawks, and Mason nailed a jumper just 30 seconds later to give the RedHawks momentum. Xavier's Romain Sato was fouled and hit just one of his two free-throw attempts to move the Musketeer lead to four, 52-48, with 8:31 left, but Johnson came back and launched a three-pointer to punctuate Miami's run. Another set of Sato free throws gave Xavier a three-point edge, but Miami's Mason answered with a tip-in to move Miami back within one, 54-53, with 5:06 left to play. The RedHawks, however, hit just two field goals and went 1-for-2 from the free-throw line down the stretch, while Xavier collected three field goals and went 8-of-12 from the charity stripe over the final five minutes. Mason led all scorers with a career-high-tying 19

## Cincinnati 66 Miami 54

Despite a strong start at the onset of the game, Miami fell to Cincinnati, 66-54, in the first neutral site contest of the series, which dates back to 1905-06. A layup by junior guard Chet Mason and three-point buckets from senior guard Matt Jameson and junior guard Juby Johnson sparked the RedHawks, who jumped out to an 8-1 advantage by the 15:35 mark. Miami was able to prevent Cincinnati from scoring a field goal until the 14:30 mark, as the Bearcats collected their first three points off free throws. With 7:02 left in the first half, UC owned a four-point edge, 17-13. A pair of three pointers by freshman guard Josh Hausfeld knotted the game, 19-19, but the Bearcats went on an 11-0 run over the next three and a half minutes, and outscored the RedHawks 15-7 over the final six minutes of the first half to make the halftime margin 34-26 in favor of the Bearcats. Mason also started the second-half scoring with a layup just 30 seconds into the stanza to cut the Bearcat lead to six, 34-28. By the 16:42 mark, Cincinnati had rebuilt its lead to 10, 40-30, off a pair of three-point bombs. A three-pointer from sophomore forward Danny Horace and a tip-in by sophomore forward Tim Schenke shrunk the UC lead to six, 45-39 with 12:15 left in the game, but that would be as close as the RedHawks would get. Statistically, the RedHawks were fairly close to the Bearcats in number of field goals, three-point field goals and rebounds. Miami even dished out five more assists than UC. The Bearcats, however capitalized at the charity stripe, going 18-of-27, while the RedHawks were 9-of-11 from the free-throw line. Cincinnati also was much more efficient from the field, hitting 47.7 percent of its field goals and 54.5 of its three-point attempts, compared to Miami's 38.0 shooting percentage and 36.8 three-point field goal percentage. Mason paced the RedHawks with 13 points and a game-best eight rebounds, while Johnson added 12 points and Hausfeld chipped in 10. Schenke notched a career-high seven boards and dished out a game-best and career-high five assists.

Despite a sizzling start in which Miami drilled all five of its three-point attempts over the first five minutes of the game, a 10-minute scoring slump to end the first half and start the second half was too much to overcome as the RedHawks fell to Evansville, 66-58. Sophomore forward Danny Horace drained three of Miami's first five treys and was fouled on the third one. He connected on the free-throw attempt to up his scoring output to 10 points over the first 3:30 of the contest and give the RedHawks a 16-7 lead. Johnson put forth a superior defensive effort against Evansville's top scorer, Clint Cuffle, while leading all scorers with 17 points over 40 minutes as he went 5-of-10 from the field and 5-of-6 from the free-throw line. Johnson held Cuffle, who averaged over 20 ppg and was the nation's top three-point shooter, hitting more than 60 percent of his three-point attempts, to a mere four points as Cuffle went just 1-for-9 from the field and missed all three of his treys. Horace and Seals each chipped in 12 points for the RedHawks.

### Kent State 60 Miami 52

Jan. 8, 2003—Oxford, Ohio

Junior guard Juby Johnson scored a game-high 23 points, but it was not enough as Miami fell to Kent State, 60-52. A 58.6 percent free-throw efficiency (17-of-29) was costly for the RedHawks, who were hitting 73 percent of their free throws entering the game. Miami lead through much of the first half, opening up a five-point advantage—its largest lead of the game—at the 4:26 mark, 23-18, off of one of Johnson's five three pointers. However, the RedHawks failed to score over the final minutes of the first stanza as the Golden Flashes shrunk the Miami lead to one at the half, 23-22, off a pair of Nate Gerwig layups. Kent State continued its run into the second half, collecting a total of nine unanswered points to produced a five-point lead, 28-23, with 17:26 remaining. Sophomore forward Danny Horace drained a pair of free throws at the 17:12 mark to end a seven-minute scoring drought for the RedHawks. Less than a minute later, Johnson tossed in a layup and connected on the ensuing free throw to knot the game, 28-28, with 16:02 remaining. KSU came back and regained the lead off an Eric Haut jumper. After jumper by junior forward Gene Seals, freshman guard Josh Hausfeld hit one of his two free-throw attempts to give the RedHawks a 31-30 lead with 13:08 left in the game, their only lead of the second half. From there, the Golden Flashes went on a 15-5 run to build a nine-point advantage with 7:05 left, 45-36. Almost single-handedly, Johnson revitalized the trailing RedHawks, drilling back-to-back treys and going 1-for-2 from the charity stripe to pull the RedHawks within two at the 4:18 mark, 45-43. Seals connected on one of his two free-throw attempts to further shrink the KSU lead, 45-44, but the RedHawks were unable to stave off the Golden Flashes' steady free-throw shooting down the stretch as KSU collected 10 of its final 15 points from the line, missing just two free-throw attempts. Johnson hit 62.5 percent of his three pointers and also collected a season-high seven rebounds for the RedHawks. He was the only Miami player to score in double figures.

Behind a 58.3 percent shooting effort, including a sizzling 68.2 percent second-half showing, Miami downed Akron 74-59. Sophomore forward Danny Horace tallied a career-high-tying 21 points, while freshman guard Josh Hausfeld added a career-best 19 points in the winning effort, combining to go 17-of-22 (.773) from the field. Behind a blistering 71.4 first-half shooting percentage, Miami seized a commanding 45-17 halftime lead and rolled to a 73-58 win at Eastern Michigan. The win marked Miami's 500th league triumph, becoming the first school in Mid-American Conference history to achieve the feat. Juby Johnson scored 19 of his game-best and career-high-tying 26 points to pace the RedHawks. Johnson was a scorching 80.0 percent from the field in the first half (8-for-10) and ended the game hitting 62.5 percent of his field goals (10-of-16) and 50.0 percent of his three-point field goal attempts (4-for-8). In the second half, a trey by Josh Hausfeld handed Miami its largest in any game this season—29 points—at the 18:40 mark, 48-19. A 15-0 run by the Eagles, however, closed the gap to 14, 48-34, with 14:20 left. Tim Schenke thwarted the Eagle run, hitting a three pointer with 13:46 left. A late 22-5 run catapulted Miami to a 57-55 come-from-behind win over Buffalo. The trio of junior guard Juby Johnson, sophomore forward Danny Horace and freshman guard Josh Hausfeld combined for 28 of Miami's 32 second-half points en route to the win. Starting the game on a 9-2 run, Miami's momentum was quickly stopped as Buffalo went on an 11-2 run over the next five minutes to take a 13-11 lead. Miami owned a 25-24 lead at the 4:30 mark in the first half, but gave up nine unanswered points at the end of the half and trailed 33-25. Horace missed the front end of a one-and-one with eight seconds left, and Buffalo grabbed the rebound, but was unable to get its final shot off in time as Miami inched out the two-point win. Johnson scored a game-best 21 points, while Horace added 16 points and a game-high nine rebounds for the RedHawks.

Despite a 19-point first-half lead, a 24-point performance by Kent State's Antonio Gates and an 18-point outing from Eric Haut lifted the Golden Flashes to the 70-60 come-from-behind win over Miami. Juby Johnson collected 17 of his team-high 21 points in the first half, leading Miami on two separate runs, going 5-of-7 from the field and hitting all three of his treys in the first half. After Kent State collected the first three points of the game, Miami went on a 16-3 run, spearheaded by eight points from Johnson and a pair of three pointers from Josh Hausfeld, to post a 16-6 lead at the 16:22 mark. Miami was able to regain a seven-point edge, 53-46, at the 9:41 mark off a Chet Mason layup, but the RedHawks were only able to score seven points over the final portion of the second half to Kent State's 24. Haut drilled a three pointer with 7:19 remaining to hand KSU its first lead since the opening minute of the contest, 55-53. Tim Schenke answered for the RedHawks draining a three pointer to hand Miami the one-point edge, 56-55. A layup by KSU's Nate Gerwig at the 5:52 mark handed the Golden Flashes the lead for good, 59-57. Schenke hit another three pointer to pull the RedHawks within two, 62-60, with 2:43 remaining, but Miami was unable to score over the final minutes of the game. In addition to Johnson's 21-point performance, Mason added 14 points and a team-best nine rebounds and four steals, while Hausfeld collected 10 points for the RedHawks.

In addition to his career-high 22 points, Horace also posted a team-best nine rebounds. Hausfeld added 18 points, while junior forward Gene Seals handed out a career-best eight assists.

Juby Johnson knocked down one of his three treys just seconds into the game to give Miami a lead it would never relinquish as the RedHawks went on to down Marshall 69-49. Johnson poured in a game-high 21 points to bolster the RedHawks. In the first half, Miami connected on three of its first five three-point attempts to claim a 9-6 lead. The RedHawks did not take a shot within the three-point arc for the first 4:40 of the contest. In addition to Johnson, Bryan Reed and Josh Hausfeld drained treys for the Red and White in the opening minutes of the contest.

A 59.3 free-throw percentage stifled Miami as it lost its seventh straight contest at Bowling Green's Anderson Arena, falling to the Falcons, 51-48. The RedHawks put together a late surge, but were unable to capitalize on a critical possession at the end of the game. The two teams went back and forth early in the first half, but a pair of Josh Hausfeld layups off BGSU turnovers quickly handed the RedHawks an 8-4 lead. Miami continued to surge to a six-point advantage, 14-8, with 6:15 left in the first half. A dismal 36.2 shooting percentage stymied Miami in a 64-56 loss to Ohio. The RedHawks failed to connect on a two-point shot until the 18:43 mark of the second half and hit just eight two-point field goals for the game. Despite its struggles from the field and a sweltering 64.7 percent shooting effort from the Bobcats, Miami was able to keep things close in the second half until the final minutes of the game. After Miami captured an early 4-2 lead, Ohio went on an 18-6 run to post a 20-10 lead at the 6:58 mark of the first half. A three-point play by Johnson cut the Bobcat lead to four, 60-56, with 23 seconds left, but Ohio was able to connect on all four of its free-throw attempts to make the final margin eight points, 64-56. Four players scored in double figures for the RedHawks led by Johnson's 17 point-performance. Horace added 11 points and a team-high nine rebounds, while Hausfeld and Mason chipped in 10 points apiece. Ohio's Brandon Hunter led all scorers and rebounders with 21 points and 12 boards.

In its first overtime game of the season, Miami was crippled by 44.4 percent free-throw shooting as it lost its Mid-American Conference Tournament Quarterfinal game to Ohio, 65-55. After earning a first-round bye as the No. 3 seed, the RedHawks bowed out of the tournament in their first quarterfinal meeting with the Bobcats in program history. Miami led by as many as seven points on three occasions in the first half. After a 15-15 at the 8:39 mark in the first half, Miami went on a 9-2 surge, sparked by a Josh Hausfeld jumper at 6:39 and capped by a Hausfeld trey at 3:17 to hand the RedHawks the 24-17 edge. Hausfeld knocked down a jumper and a three-pointer to lift Miami to a 36-32 lead with 13:17 remaining in regulation and Mason drained a three-pointer at 10:34 to give the RedHawks a five-point edge, 39-34. The RedHawks continued to preserve their lead and posted a seven-point advantage off a Larry Drake sunk a three-pointer at 3:51 to make the score 51-44. Over the final 2:20 of regulation, however, Miami's offense went cold and the Bobcats went 3-for-3 from the free-throw line, while Brandon Hunter chipped in layups at 1:38 and at 0:05 to knot the game, 51-51. Stephens opened overtime with a three-pointer at the 4:37 mark and Jaivon Harris tossed in a free throw to give the Bobcats a four-point lead, 55-51, at 3:42. Johnson cut the lead to two with a dunk at 3:15, but Ohio knocked down two field goals, including a three-pointer, and 5-of-6 from the free-throw line down the stretch to post the 65-55 overtime win. Hausfeld paced the RedHawks with 15 points, while Danny Horace added 10 rebounds. Johnson added 12 points. Ohio had four players score in double figures, led by Stephens' 17 points.
