STORYLINES

1. PLAYING FOR PRIDE: With the MAC East title already decided, Miami and Ohio are playing for pride in Friday's regular-season finale. A young but promising Miami team is looking to build momentum heading into the offseason, while Ohio attempts to end a six-game losing streak versus the RedHawks before heading to the MAC title game.

2. SENIOR FAREWELL: Prior to Friday's game, Miami will honor an 11-member senior class that has posted a four-year record of 30-19 and captured at least a share of three MAC East Division Championships.

3. ROBINSON'S LAST RUN: Senior punt returner **Ryne Robinson** enters Friday's game needing 85 punt return yards to break the NCAA record for career punt return yardage and one punt return touchdown to match the NCAA punt return yardage record. In three career games versus Ohio, he has returned nine punts for 263 yards and three touchdowns.

4. A FINE LINE: The margin of error has been minimal for Miami's football program this season. Of the 11 games played so far, seven have been decided by seven points or less, including four MAC losses by three points or less.

5. HUDSON ON A ROLL: Sophomore middle linebacker **Joey Hudson** is coming off a career-high 16 tackles last week and is the first Miami defender since 2001 to record consecutive games with at least 15 tackles. He also has a team-high five interceptions on the year.

SERIES NOTES

- Miami and Ohio are meeting for the 83rd time since first meeting in 1908, when Miami picked up a 5-0 victory.
- The RedHawks own a 51-29-2 series advantage over the Bobcats and have won 14 of the last 16 meetings, including all six meetings since 2000.
- Miami owns a 30-10-2 record versus Ohio when the teams meet in Oxford. The Bobcats, who have only two series victories in Yager Stadium, have not won in Oxford since 1993.
- This marks the second straight season that the teams have collided in the regular-season finale but only the third time in series history (1996, 2005).
- Last season, Miami restricted the Bobcats to just 185 yards of total offense and got 297 yards passing from Josh Betts in a 38-7 defeat of the Bobcats in Athens.
- Ohio's last series win came in Athens in 1999, when Ohio scored three third-quarter touchdowns in a 40-28 victory.

NOTES

Miami finished the season by winning for the seventh time in nine games and posted its fifth straight seven-win season ...the victory, along with a Toledo defeat of Bowling Green, allowed Miami to forge a three-way tie with the Falcons and Akron for a share of the MAC East Division title ... senior Martin Nance extended his Miami record to 15 career 100-yard receiving days, totaling 123 yards on eight catches...junior Ryne Robinson returned his sixth career punt for a touchdown, expanding his MAC record, and became the first player in league history to top 1,500 career punt return yards.

GENERAL NOTES

MIAMI CLOSES OUT REGULAR SEASON AGAINST MAC EAST CHAMPS: Coming off a hard-fought 9-7 win over Bowling Green last Wednesday, in which it overcame nasty conditions, Miami University's football team (2-9; 2-5 MAC) closes out the 2006 season Friday when it hosts Mid-American Conference East Division Champion Ohio University (8-3; 6-1 MAC) in a game that is all about pride for both teams. The RedHawks, boasting a promising young team that has shown steady improvement, look to build momentum for the offseason, while the Bobcats are looking to reverse their fortunes against a Miami team that has won the last six meetings between the teams.

SCOUTING THE BOBCATS: Riding a six-game winning streak, Ohio clinched its first MAC East Division Championship last Thursday when it downed Akron, 17-7. Coached by second-year mentor **Frank Solich**, the Bobcats stand at 8-3 overall and 6-1 in the MAC, with their only league loss coming at Bowling Green, 21-9, on Sept. 30. Ohio, which has not won a league title since 1968, faces MAC West Champion Central Michigan on Thursday, Nov. 30 in both teams' first MAC Championship game appearance. The Bobcats lead the MAC in scoring defense and have held their last four opponents to 10 points or less.

A LOOK AT THE SERIES: Miami and Ohio meet for the 83rd time Friday in a series that began with a 5-0 win by the Red and White in 1908. Long-time rivals, who happen to be the first two public institutions founded in Ohio, the RedHawks and Bobcats have collided in every season since 1945. Miami leads the series, 51-29-2, and has been dominant since 1990, winning 14 of the teams' last 16 meetings. The RedHawks own a current six-game winning streak over the Bobcats and have not lost to the Green and White since 1999. The Bobcats have not won in Yager Stadium since 1993 and trail the series 30-10-2 when playing in Oxford.

THE LAST HURRAH: Friday's game marks the final collegiate appearance for 11 Miami seniors, who will be honored during pregame. Over the course of the past four seasons, the group has helped Miami to a 30-19 overall record and at least a share of three MAC East Division titles. Included in the group are wide receiver **Ryan Busing**, safety **Joey Card**, wide receiver **R.J. Corbin**, center **Steve Kosky**, longsnapper **Dave McClain**, running back **Jimmy Murray**, wide receiver **Ryne Robinson**, fullback **Matt Voge**, wide receiver **Josh Williams**, cornerback **Frank Wiwo** and linebacker **Dontae Wright**.

HOME AT LAST: After playing six of its last eight games on the road, Miami's football team finishes the 2006 season in the friendly confines of Yager Stadium, where it has 70-39-4 record since the stadium was completed in 1983. The RedHawks have struggled at home this season, posting an 0-4 mark, though the last three losses have come by a combined eight points. Miami is attempting to avoid its first winless home campaign since 1988.

FINISHING STRONG: Miami, which has won its last three regular-season finales, has a history of finishing the season with an exclamation point. The RedHawks have won 13 of their last 15 regular-season finales and have lost just once on Senior Day since 1989.

ON THE TUBE: Friday's game will be carried nationally on ESPNU, marking the fifth nationally-televised contest for the RedHawks this season. **Doug Bell** will handle the play-by-play call while **Charles Arbuckle** provides color analysis. Friday marks Miami's 19th appearance on ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU or ABC since the 2003 season.

A FINE LINE: There has indeed been a fine line between winning and losing for Miami's football program since the start of MAC play. The RedHawks have lost their five MAC games by a combined total of just 22 points or 4.4 points per game. Among those losses were a two-point loss to Kent State and three-point losses to Northern Illinois, Ball State and Western Michigan. The RedHawks have owned second-half leads in four of their five league losses.

A LONG TIME COMING: When Miami tallied a go-ahead 28-yard touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter of last week's 9-7 victory over Bowling Green, it marked the first time the Red and White won a game in which it trailed after three quarters since 2000. Entering the night, Miami had lost 23 consecutive games in which it trailed after three.

FRESH FACES: With the graduation of 19 seniors from its 2005 two-deep, including 16 senior starters, there are plenty of new faces on the field for Miami this season. The RedHawks have had to replace six offensive starters, nine defensive starters and their placekicker from one of the most decorated classes in program history. So far this season, 18 different RedHawks have made their first career starts.

BANGED UP: Adding to Miami's depth and inexperience issues this season have been a series of injuries that have ravaged the two-deep. Entering the final two weeks of the season, Miami already has endured nine players—all starters or key reserves—suffering season-ending injuries. The most recent additions have included starting offensive linemen **Charlie Norden** and **Matt McKeown**, who both have undergone season-ending surgery.

If Miami Wins ...

- It would finish the season at 3-9 overall and 3-5 in the MAC.
- The RedHawks would win back-to-back games for the first and only time in 2006.
- It could climb as high as a third-place tie in the final MAC East standings with losses by Akron and Bowling Green.
- It would extend its current winning streak against Ohio to seven games.
- It would end a five-game home losing streak that dates back to last season.

If Miami Loses ...

- It would finish the year at 2-10 overall and 2-6 in the MAC.
- The RedHawks would lose their 10th game of a season for just the second time in program history.
- It would end a six-game winning streak versus the Bobcats and mark Ohio's first win at Yager Stadium since 1993.
- It would extend Miami's home losing drought to six games.

THE OFFENSE

MIAMI'S OFFENSE: Plagued by key injuries and struggles on the offensive line, Miami's offense, which has traditionally ranked among the top nationally under Shane Montgomery, has struggled in 2006 ... the RedHawks rank 28th nationally in passing offense (236.27 ypg) but have struggled on the ground, posting 82.9 ypg and ranking 110th nationally ... junior quarterback **Mike Kokal**, a mobile first-year starter, ranks 19th nationally and second in the MAC in total offense (242.1 ypg) ... senior wide receiver **Ryne Robinson** leads the nation in receptions (7.55) and rates fourth nationally in receiving yards (98.82) per game.

OHIO'S DEFENSE: The Bobcats have earned their first MAC East Division title behind a defense that is giving up just 15.5 points per game and leads the league in scoring defense ... Ohio is third in the MAC in both rushing defense (130.3) and total defense (290.1) and has held its last four opponents to 10 points or less ... the Bobcats also have been tough against the pass, allowing only 159.8 yards per game through the air and ranking fifth nationally in pass efficiency defense (97.33) ... the Bobcats have totaled 53 pass break-ups and 10 interceptions ... leading the charge is the linebacking tandem of seniors **Tyler Russ** and **Matt Muncy**, who have totaled 78 and 71 stops, respectively.

NINE IS ENOUGH: Miami's nine points in its 9-7 win over Bowling Green last Wednesday marked its lowest scoring total in a victory since 1981, when it downed Cincinnati 7-3. Since joining the MAC in 1948, the Red and White has won 18 games when scoring less than 10 points, but it had been 283 games since the last time the RedHawks had last accomplished the feat. The game was marred by gusting winds, rain, cold temperatures and poor field conditions.

NOT ADDING UP: While Miami's offense has had trouble translating possessions into points, it is not from a failure to move the ball. The RedHawks have had an edge in time of possession in nine of their 11 games and have equaled or surpassed the opposition in first downs in nine of the last 10 games. Miami ranks 17th nationally in time of possession (31:47) and is averaging 18.1 first downs per game to rank fifth in the MAC.

REDHAWKS IN THE REDZONE: Since converting on 14 straight redzone trips over a three-plus game stretch from Oct. 8 to Oct. 28, Miami has struggled to convert inside the opposition's 20-yard line. The RedHawks are 5-of-10 in redzone efficiency over the last three games, losing three fumbles inside the 20 and missing a pair of field goals. On the year, Miami is 27-of-37 in the redzone (.730) while scoring 17 redzone touchdowns.

PATCHING THE LINE: Since allowing 40 quarterback sacks over the first eight games of the season, Miami's offensive line has settled down over the past three games. Hindered by the graduation of three all-MAC starters and the loss of two other starters to season-ending injuries, the RedHawks have used six different starting combinations on the offensive line this season. Over the last three games, Miami has allowed just six sacks, including only one to a Western Michigan team that ranks fifth nationally in sacks.

HE CATCHES TOO: Though known early in his career as one of the nation's top punt returners, senior **Ryne Robinson** has cemented his reputation this season as one of the nation's top receivers. Robinson, who is the first receiver in Miami history to record consecutive 1,000-yard receiving seasons, is the nation's active career leader in receiving yardage (3,606) and ranks among the MAC's all-time top four in both receiving yards and receptions (250). He is saving some of his best for last, totaling 19 receptions for 266 yards over the past two games and climbing to the top of the heap nationally in receptions per game (7.55).

DEEP THREAT: Redshirt freshman **Dustin Woods** has quickly emerged as Miami's second option in the passing game, using his game-breaking speed to stretch the field and bring the deep ball into play. Woods, who is second on the team with 24 receptions, is averaging 20.5 yards per catch and has caught four touchdown passes from outside of 25 yards. He broke out versus Northern Illinois (Oct. 8), when he hauled in eight passes for 178 yards.

AIR APPARENT: Though succeeding a pair of quarterbacks currently employed by the NFL is a daunting task, junior **Mike Kokal** has been able to successfully go about business his own way. Kokal ranks second in the MAC in total offense (242.10 ypg) and is passing for a 223.9 yards per game. The junior also is making plays with his legs, rushing for 182 yards on the year, despite taking more than 40 sacks. If NFL rules applied and sacks were not deducted from his rushing total, Kokal would be Miami's leading rusher with 398 yards on 84 carries or 4.7 yards per carry.

QUICK HITS: Of Miami's five returning offensive starters from last season, three have missed at least four games this year ... wide receivers **Ryne Robinson** and **Dustin Woods** are tied for the team lead in big plays, each totaling 17 plays of at least 20 yards ... Miami graduates just three starters and five total seniors from its offensive two-deep following this season ... Friday marks the last run for one of Miami's most accomplished receiving classes. Seniors **Ryne Robinson**, **R.J. Corbin**, **Ryan Busing** and **Josh Williams** have combined for 446 receptions for 6,003 yards and 33 touchdowns ... offensive linemen **Steve Kosky** and **Steve Sutter** are both Eagle Scouts.

Missing Pieces ...

Miami's usually potent offense has been plagued by key injuries that have taken key players out of the lineup in every game this season and hindered the unit's continuity. Following is the breakdown.

Charlie Norden—Miami's starting left tackle and one of only two returning starters on the offensive front is out for the season after undergoing surgery two weeks ago. He made four starts but never finished a game in 2006.

Brandon Murphy—A 1,000-yard rusher and 2005 all-MAC pick, Miami's starting tailback has been limited all year by an ankle injury. Murphy has missed four games this season and has played just one complete game this year.

Matt McKeown—Miami's starting right guard was limited by a back injury all season and underwent season-ending shoulder surgery last week.

Josh Williams—A second-year starter at wide receiver, Williams has been sidelined since the third game of the season with a foot injury and might not return.

Man in Charge

When offensive guru Shane Montgomery was hired as Miami's 32nd head coach, one of his first moves was to bring back former linebacker coach **Taver Johnson** to run the RedHawk defense. Johnson, who had spent the 2004 season as a special teams assistant with the Cleveland Browns, had been the RedHawks' linebacker coach from 2000-03. Armed with a fiery personality, Johnson directs an aggressive defense with an emphasis on the big play. The defense responded to his swarming system in 2005, forcing 35 opponent turnovers in just 11 games and ranking third in the MAC in total defense (347.4 ypg).



Taking it Away ...

A year after forcing 35 turnovers in just 11 games and ranking fourth nationally in the category, Miami's aggressive style of defense continues to reap benefits. This season, the RedHawks have forced 19 turnovers, including 13 interceptions, and continue to rank among the Top 40 teams nationally in turnovers gained.

MIAMI'S DEFENSE: Though very young with nine new starters from last season and eight redshirt and true freshmen on the two-deep, Miami's defense has been solid in 2006 ... the RedHawks enter the week ranked sixth in the MAC in total defense (322.2 ypg) ... the majority of the opposition's damage has been done on the ground, where the Red and White is allowing an uncharacteristic 4.5 yards per carry and 162.6 yards per game ... Miami's pass defense, which is permitting just 159.5 ypg, has not been tested often this season, as only Purdue and Western Michigan have attempted more than 25 passes against the RedHawks ... Miami has forced 19 opponent turnovers, including 13 interceptions.

OHIO'S OFFENSE: Powered by a solid running game, Ohio's offense has been efficient in scoring, averaging 20.5 points per game, despite ranking 107th nationally in total offense (271.6 ypg) ... junior running back **Kalvin McRae**, ranks 32nd nationally and fifth in the MAC in rushing yards per game (87.2) to pace the nation's 45th-ranked rushing attack (148.1 ypg) ... senior quarterback **Austen Everson** is passing for 106.1 yards per game, throwing six touchdowns and seven interceptions, but also is rushing for 34.4 yards per game ... McRae also leads the Bobcats in receiving, totaling 27 receptions on the year.

TOUGH YARDS: While field position has put it in some difficult spots in terms of scoring defense, Miami's defense has performed well in terms of yardage. The RedHawks have actually held four of their last five opponents under 325.0 yards and have allowed just one opponent on the year to post at least 400 yards of offense. The 322.2 yards of total offense per game allowed by the RedHawks is Miami's lowest average since 1998.

TAKING IT AWAY: Since second-year defensive coordinator **Taver Johnson** took the reins of Miami's defense last season, the RedHawks have ranked among the national leaders in takeaways. Last season, the RedHawks forced 35 turnovers in just 11 games to rank among the top five teams nationally. This season, Miami has added 19 more takeaways, including 13 interceptions. Miami's 54 takeaways over the last two seasons rank seventh nationally and are tied with Western Michigan for the MAC lead.

A BIG STOP: When Miami used a redzone stand to hold Bowling Green to a missed field goal late in the fourth quarter of the RedHawks' 9-7 defeat of the Falcons, it marked the first time in 27 trips inside the redzone that an opponent failed to score. Opposing kickers had been lights out versus the RedHawks, converting 12 straight field goals and 14-of-15 on the year entering the Bowling Green game. The only other miss came on a blocked field goal versus Kent State.

STOP THE RUN: The MAC's top rushing defense from 2003-05, Miami has struggled against the run this season, ranking ninth in the MAC against the run (162.6 ypg) and allowing a 100-yard rusher in six of the last eight games. The RedHawks have responded recently, holding four of their last five opponents under 130 yards rushing.

JOEY ON THE SPOT: Sophomore middle linebacker **Joey Hudson** totaled a career-high 16 tackles last Wednesday at Bowling Green, topping 15 tackles for the second straight week and moving into Miami's team lead with 87 tackles. He is the first Miami player to record back-to-back games with 15 tackles since Matt Pusateri (2001-04) achieved the feat over the first two games of 2001.

NICE HANDS: Sophomore middle linebacker **Joey Hudson** picked off his fifth pass of the season in the fourth quarter at Western Michigan (Nov. 4), returning it a personal-best 29 yards. The sophomore picked off two passes each at Purdue (Sept. 9) and Buffalo (Oct. 15) earlier in the year, and ranks in 16th-place tie nationally at 0.45 interceptions per game. Hudson's five INTs are the most by a Miami linebacker since **John Busing** intercepted five passes in 2003 and trail only Boise State's Corey Hall, who has six picks, among linebackers nationally.

MULLINS HEATING UP: Sophomore outside linebacker **Clayton Mullins** also is having a breakout campaign in 2006. After playing a limited role as a redshirt freshman, Mullins has come on this season to rank second on the team and 15th in the MAC at 7.5 tackles per game. Along with his two interceptions on the year, Mullins also has recovered a pair of fumbles and been in on two quarterback sacks. He has three double-digit tackle outings this year.

DEALING OUT PUNISHMENT: Senior safety and team co-captain **Joey Card** has stood out as the leader of the Miami defense in 2006. The second-year starter and 2005 second-team all-MAC pick, known for his punishing hits, ranks fourth among MAC defensive backs at 7.3 tackles per game and has made fewer than five stops only once this season.

QUICK HITS: Of Miami's 19.0 quarterback sacks this season, 12.5 have come from its four-player rotation at defensive end ... the RedHawk defense graduates only three senior starters and no key reserves from its current two-deep following this season ... over the past two meetings with Ohio, Miami has allowed just 223.5 yards of total offense per game against Ohio.

SPECIAL TEAMS

MIAMI'S SPECIAL TEAMS: Miami returns its starting longsnapper, punter and holder from last season, leaving it with a veteran group of specialists ... true freshman place kicker **Trevor Cook** has converted nine-of-12 field goals on the year and has missed only twice from inside of 50 yards ... sophomore kicker **Nathan Parseghian** took over Miami's kickoff duties versus Akron (Oct. 21) ... punter **Jake Richardson** is averaging 40.8 yards per punt ... led by dynamic punt returner **Ryne Robinson**, Miami ranks fifth in the MAC in punt returns.

OHIO'S SPECIAL TEAMS: Senior **Matt Lasher** handles both the punting and place kicking responsibilities for Ohio, averaging 39.4 yards per punt and converting 10-of-15 field goals on the year ... true freshman **Chris Garrett** has been an electrifying return man for the Bobcats, averaging a league-high 17.3 yards per return on 19 punt returns, including an 88-yard punt return touchdown versus Western Michigan ... the Bobcats feature two of the nation's top coverage units, allowing 4.27 yards per punt return to rank ninth nationally and 14.97 yards per kick return to rank second nationally.

HERE'S TO YOU, MR. ROBINSON: Miami's most lethal special teams weapon is senior punt returner **Ryne Robinson**, who has forced numerous Miami opponents to alter their punting strategies. Robinson, who has averaged an impressive 14.1 yards per punt return for his career is the nation's active career leader in both punt return yardage (1,677 yards) and punt return touchdowns (7). Though his opportunities have been reduced as opponents have learned to punt away from him, he is within 85 yards of surpassing former Texas Tech standout Wes Welker's NCAA record for career punt return yards.

ROBINSON'S LAST RUN: Senior punt returner **Ryne Robinson** enters Friday's game with one last shot at two NCAA records. Robinson needs 85 punt return yards to break the NCAA's record for career punt return yardage and one punt return touchdown to tie the NCAA record for punt return TDs. The senior has had few opportunities to return punts this season but faces an Ohio team which has allowed him 263 yards and three touchdowns on nine career returns (29.2 ypr).

NICE DEBUT: True freshman placekicker **Trevor Cook**, who was named Miami's starting kicker prior to the Cincinnati game, has not disappointed. The native of Sioux Falls, S.D., received his first career attempt in the first quarter of Miami's game at Cincinnati, and proceeded to connect on a 49-yarder that gave the RedHawks their first lead of the season at 3-0. The kick was the longest by a Miami kicker since **Andy Brumbergs** connected on a 49-yard attempt at Ohio State in 2000 and tied for the ninth-longest field goal in program history. Cook is 9-of-12 on the year, with only two misses coming from inside of 50 yards.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES: A year after showing a big leg but struggling with consistency, sophomore punter **Jacob Richardson** has hit his stride. After averaging 38.4 yards per punt as a freshman, Richardson is averaging 40.8 yards per punt to rank fourth in the MAC. The sophomore hammered a career-long 69-yard punt versus Northwestern (Aug. 31) and averaged a career-best and Miami record 53.0 yards per punt on three kicks at Purdue. When removing a rough outing versus Ball State (Oct. 28), when he punted six times into a wind that was gusting up to 40 miles per hour, he is averaging 42.1 yards per punt this season.

FARMHAND WITH A BIG FOOT: Punter **Jacob Richardson** was featured on an episode of Ohio Public Television's *Our Ohio* earlier this month, because of his agricultural background. Richardson, a hometown product who grew up on a farm outside of Oxford, was a member of 4-H and FFA growing up and raised championship hogs.

VETERAN SNAPPER: Considered one of the best at his trade in the MAC and an NFL prospect, senior **Dave McClain** is a fourth-year starter at longsnapper for the RedHawks. McClain, who gets the ball out with surprising quickness, has been remarkably consistent during his career, with only three missed punt snap exchanges in 163 career punt snaps—all three of which came in a single windy, rainy game versus Bowling Green in 2005.

KICKING UP THE KICK RETURN GAME: While Miami has been one of the nation's best in the punt return game recently, it has not measured up as well in terms of kickoff returns. The RedHawks have not returned a kick for a touchdown since 1997 when **DeMarrio Jones** returned a kick 88 yards to pay dirt—111 games ago. Miami has used four different players on kick returns this season, with **Dustin Woods** averaging a team-best 23.2 yards per return and boasting a season-long 51-yard return at Purdue.

QUICK HITS: After allowing 21.9 yards per kick return over the first seven games, Miami has allowed just 19.4 yards per return since sophomore **Nathan Parseghian** took over the team's kickoff duties ... the combination of high winds and muddy conditions resulted in a field goal and PAT being blocked at Bowling Green last week ... the blocked PAT last week was Miami's first missed PAT of the season.

HEAD COACH SHANE MONTGOMERY

In an unprecedented move, Miami University Director of Athletics Brad Bates made a locker room announcement in front of a national television audience prior to the playing of the 2004 Independence Bowl, naming offensive coordinator Shane Montgomery the 32nd head coach of Miami's venerable football program.

The ecstatic reaction of the team and college football fans across the nation was perhaps best summed up by ESPN color analyst Bill Curry moments later.

"I wish I had the words to let you know what you've just seen," said Curry. "The most storied producer of college football coaches in the history of college football, Miami University—the Cradle of Coaches, just made an announcement on our air that Shane Montgomery will be its next head coach. This is really a signal moment, not just for Miami University, but for college football, and we're lucky to be here."

Montgomery, who had served as the program's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach since 2001, succeeded Terry Hoepfner, who accepted the head coaching position at Indiana University two weeks earlier. According to Bates, after a diligent coaching search, Montgomery's talents and impact on the program made him the clear choice.

"After a search process that moved quickly but with purpose, it became clear that Shane Montgomery is the right man to continue the advancement of Miami University's proud football tradition," Bates said. "Coach Montgomery has been a key factor in the recent successes of this program and is truly one of the rising stars in the college coaching profession. I'm excited about the innovative mind and energy he brings to the position and see a promising future for Miami's football program under his guidance."

In his first season, Montgomery proved worthy of the challenge, leading the Red and White to a 7-4 record and a share of a third straight Mid-American Conference East Division title. Montgomery's seven wins ranked among the top five for first-year coaches in Division I-A while ranking as the fourth-best start all-time among a prestigious list of first-year Miami head coaches.

Along the way, Montgomery's 2005 team, which won five of its final six games, placed a league-high 11 individuals on the all-MAC first and second teams. Seven individuals went on to sign NFL contracts following the season, while Miami continued to rank among the nation's top Division I-A college football programs in graduation rate and APR—the NCAA's new measuring stick for retention and graduation rate.

Montgomery, who came to Miami in 2001 as one of the youngest coordinators in the nation, injected new life into a RedHawk offense that has consistently ranked among the nation's best under his tenure. Since Montgomery's first season, Miami has never ranked outside of the top 45 nationally in total offense and has consistently ranked among the top 30 in passing offense. In 2003, Montgomery's offense ranked second nationally at 501.1 yards per game and shattered Mid-American Conference records for yards of total offense in a season (7,016) and touchdowns rushing and passing in a season (74).

A two-time nominee and 2003 finalist for the prestigious Frank Broyles award, which is presented annually to the nation's top assistant coach, Montgomery has guided four of the top six offenses in Miami football history, based on yards per game, and has helped the RedHawks to at least a share of three straight MAC East Division titles. Miami's five-year record with Montgomery on staff as offensive coordinator and head coach is an impressive 42-20 (.677).

A native of Newark, Ohio, Montgomery came to Miami from the University of Tennessee-Chattanooga, where he had served in several capacities from 1993-2000.

After an impressive playing career at North Carolina State, Montgomery made his coaching debut as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, where he worked from 1991 to 1993. As a quarterback for the Wolfpack from 1987-89, Montgomery earned three straight varsity letters and saw action in three straight bowl games. The Offensive MVP of both the 1988 Peach Bowl and 1989 Copper Bowl, Montgomery was a second-team all-Atlantic Coast Conference selection as a senior. He finished his collegiate career completing 421-of-746 passes for 5,298 yards and 31 touchdowns.

Montgomery was recruited to N.C. State from Newark Catholic High School, where he starred on the football field from 1981-85 and helped the Green Wave to two state championships. In 2001, he was inducted into the Newark Catholic Hall of Fame.

Montgomery resides in Oxford with his wife, Sandy, and two sons, Tanner and Trent.



THE CRADLE OF COACHES

Throughout the sports world, Miami University is recognized as "The Cradle of Coaches" because of the number of coaching legends who began their careers on the Oxford campus. College football luminaries such as Woody Hayes, Bo Schembechler, Ara Parseghian and John Pont used Miami as a training ground, as did professional coaching greats like Weeb Ewbank, Paul Brown and Sid Gillman.

At one point in 1977, five of the 10 head football coaches in the Big Ten were products of Miami University. Presently, three of the Big Ten's head football coaches have Miami roots: Ron Zook, Illinois; Jim Tressel, Ohio State; Terry Hooppner, Indiana.

Cradle of Coaches Devasted By Loss Of Two Of Its Own in 2006

On June 29, 2006, the world of college football was rocked with the news of Northwestern head coach Randy Walker's unexpected passing. Walker, who had been at the helm of the Northwestern program since 1999, was a standout football player for Miami during the mid-'70s and served as the head coach of the Red and White for nine seasons.

One of the proudest members of Miami's esteemed Cradle of Coaches, Walker was entering his 31st season in the college coaching profession. He was a 1976 Miami graduate.

With his hiring in 1990, Walker breathed life into a Miami program that had won just two games over the previous two seasons. In his nine years, the Red and White churned out seven winning seasons and returned to its traditional status as a MAC contender. Walker accepted the head coaching job at Northwestern in 1999, departing Miami as the program's all-time winningest coach.

The Miami family was rocked again this past Friday, Nov. 17, when college football coaching legend Bo Schembechler passed away unexpectedly. A 1951 Miami graduate, Schembechler was a college head coach for 27 seasons and never suffered through a losing campaign. At Michigan, he led the Wolverines to 13 Big Ten Championships and 10 Rose Bowl appearances during his 21-year tenure.

Schembechler, who played under Sid Gillman and Woody Hayes at Miami, was head coach at Miami from 1963-68. He compiled a 40-17-3 record while directing the Red and White and led the program to a share of the MAC title in both 1965 and 1966. He finished his college career with a 234-65-8 record.
